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Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

We had another very active week in the markets. The Kansas City wheat was very strong. The March KW gained 87 cents and the July gained \$1.18. Two things are driving the wheat market, the cut in acreage, and the fact that the export sales pace will not slow down enough. The cut in acres was bullish, but the threat of a domestic shortage is much, much more bullish. The bear spreads did work this week, which kind of goes against what I just said, but the March KW had a very strong finish to the week and I don't think that traders would be concerned about losing a few HRW acres if the old crop stocks weren't so tight.

The trend is up right now and it looks like we will see new contract highs in the March KW very soon and perhaps this will be our next leg up. If it is, I think we have to look for \$12.50. Sales aren't slowing and I just don't see a reason for lower prices right now. For the new crop, we should look for the July KW to test the \$10 area. I still like March at the money calls. They are running out of time, but they are still working. Hold off on any further new crop

The amazing wheat fact of the week is that the March Minneapolis wheat was up \$1.32 this week. The most it could have been up was \$1.50. I think there is

someone out there that wants wheat.

Corn futures didn't do much this week. The March was up about 3 cents. I was surprised that the corn didn't do better. We had 93.5 million bushels of export sales, so it isn't like price is slowing demand. We only need to sell about a quarter of that to meet expectations so it looks like USDA will have to raise the export estimate again and cut ending stocks again in a future crop report. A cut in ending stocks means the corn will have few acres to give up. Informa thinks we will see at little over 90 million acres of corn planted this year. Last month they thought it would be 87.4 million. Perhaps the higher

price will attract keep more acres in corn, I don't know. I do, however, know that with 90 million acres we will still most likely see a reduction in ending stocks next year and that in 2009 we will need to see an increase in acreage. It doesn't look like the bull market is over yet.

From time to time I mentioned the potential for Index fund rebalancing and I wanted to touch on how that actually turned out. Index funds were supposed to sell wheat and soybeans and buy corn and that is what they did.

The Index fund position in soybeans shrunk back to where it was in November, so there wasn't too much selling there. In the Kansas City wheat they reduced about 10% of their position and are now where they were last April.

In the corn they now have the largest position they have had since last January when Index fund rebalancing took a large amount of positions out of the corn. They still aren't as

large as they were in December of 2006, but it has

Cash cattle trade was very quite this week. There were a few that traded at \$143 in Nebraska. The front months of the live cattle futures act like they are trying to bottom. I have thought that before so I am cautiously optimistic. The beef market is working lower, so I don't like that. It doesn't look like we will see a fast, strong recovery. Right now it looks more like we could see a corrective bounce. Feeder cattle also act like they may try to bounce a little.

The feeder market got a break from the corn this week and I don't think the strength will last long in the feeders. I still like put options in the feeder cattle. I would consider selling strength in the April LC and I would leave the deferred months alone.

To get ahead, start with financial check-up

The new year may be the most difficult time to take a hard look at one's finances, what with bills from the holidays in the mail, but it's also one of the best, according to a financial management specialist.

Assessing your financial situation is a good first step in reducing debt, building an emergency fund and reaching both short- and long-term financial goals, said Marilyn Bischoff, Extension family economics specialist, University of Idaho, Boise.

To begin, make a list of the current value of assets such as the equity in your home, balances in savings and retirement accounts and emergency fund, said Bischoff, who was in Manhattan to train K-State Research and Extension agents.

List liabilities such as the balance due on a home mortgage, loans, such as school, automobile or other loans; credit card and other

Then, to estimate net worth, subtract the amount owed from the dollar value of assets.

The bottom line may not meet current goals or expectations, but Bischoff offered money management tips to track spending, reduce debt and build financial security:

Make a list of estimated weekly, bi-weekly, monthly and annual expenses.

Carry a small notebook to jot down actual expenses.

Periodically, compare actual expenses with estimated expenses. If spending more than anticipated in one or more categories, look for ways to trim unnecessary expenses, such as a daily trip to the vending machine at work. Take fruit or a cereal bar for a snack, or carry a thermos of coffee or small cooler of water to yield a

Shop with a list — and stick to it.

Build an emergency fund, rather than using a credit card and adding debt to cover unanticipated expenses like household or auto repairs, emergency travel or illness.

Pay down debt. The usual advice is to pay debt that has the highest interest first, but, for some, paying off the card with the lowest balance first can signal a turnaround that allows people to take control of their fi-

Make the minimum payment due on other debts to avoid late fees, interest charges, penalties, etc.

Mail payments promptly to avoid late fees and added interest charges.

No matter how tight the budget, allow some discretionary money - perhaps a long weekend, rather than a more costly vacation.

Save regularly — even a dollar a day will add up to \$365 a year plus interest.

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

Dear Editor

A lot has been written and read about the National Bio and Agro-defense Facility, or NBAF, and the possibility of it being located in Manhattan, Kan. While there has been tremendous support statewide, some Kansans may have concerns.

I have several interests in this facility: I live in Manhattan; I have a vested interest in the agricultural industry; and I've worked on food security issues at the national and local level.

My wife and I came to Manhattan three years ago and have felt welcomed by this community and by Kansans. Manhattan is important to me. I wouldn't recommend bringing into Manhattan anything that carries with it a tremendous potential for hazard. My friends, neighbors, colleagues and my family would be at risk.

Working in agriculture, I see strong benefits from this facility. There are folks in the agricultural industry who are concerned about the possibility of this facility bringing undue risk to the industry in this region. These facilities and the protocols for bringing materials and pathogens to them are built on idea of redundancy plan for difficulties and build a system that can handle them, three times over.

The impact of agriculture in Kansas is huge. Beef cattle alone are a \$6 billion industry. Dairy, swine and other livestock operations continue to grow, and I haven't even mentioned the plant side of the equation. All in all, around a quarter of all Kansans work in agriculture in one way or another. Kansas and Manhattan are literally at the heart of the industry the National Bio and Agro-defense Facility is charged with protecting.

Surveillance and the development of knowledge are key because food safety is a global issue today. The environment in which we operate today makes disease — animal, plant or otherwise — a more mobile problem. Disease knows no borders and can often spread quicker than a wildfire, and before diagnosis. This reality is why NBAF is so impor-

Research slated for the National Bio and Agro-defense Facility will enable us to keep tabs on disease and develop solutions. By knowing more about agricultural disease, we are better able to protect the food supply.

K-State has recognized this need and worked to address it. From joining the Food Safety Consortium in the 1980s, to breaking ground for the \$54 million Biosecurity Research Institute in 2004, K-State has demonstrated a big commitment to food safety and biosecurity. These are areas of excellence and expertise for the university.

Testifying before the U.S. Senate's Emerging Threats Subcommittee in 1999, K-State President Jon Wefald explained how the threat of agricultural biological weapons was indeed real.

When it comes to food safety, the stakes are high. The National Bio and Agrodefense Facility will help us



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prepare to meet today's threats head-on.

K-State's role in that defense is as a resource. Our research is leading-edge, our researchers are known globally, and our reputation is unquestionable in veterinary medicine, plant and animal sciences, and agriculture. We've already managed to create the scientific environment in which a facility like the NBAF will flourish. Further, a federal facility of this caliber would be a boon to K-State's research mission.

K-State really has an entrepreneurial spirit, which means sometimes risks are taken. We are not walking into this blindly. We have the expertise, we have the people and we have the commitment in place for this to be a success.

The benefits of the National Bio and Agro-defense facility for K-State, for the U.S. — indeed for mankind cannot, and should not, be ignored.

Snow settled the dust at Moser sale

The early morning snow on November 24 was just what was needed to settle the dust the day of the Moser Ranch Production Sale. During the early days of sale week, the Moser familv debated about asking the local fire department to come out and soak their pens and sorting area to combat the dry pen conditions. As it turned out, the light blanket of snow did the job without becoming a weather hazard.

Gallons of coffee and cocoa, along with morning donuts were served to the approximately 300 people attending the 16th Annual Moser Ranch Production Sale, Harry and Lisa Moser, along with their children Cameron, Kendra and Kayla, and herdsman Todd Strahm, hosted the event at their ranch north of Wheaton.

Promptly at noon, there was a short welcome along with a moment of silence to honor our troops and all attending veterans. Auctioneer Dan Harris, Holton, then took over and cried a lively sale, taking just three hours and five minutes to sell 224 females and 95 bulls. The barn was packed with people filling the bleachers and standing especially around the areas where the space heaters were located.

The sale got off to a brisk start with 10 fall pairs averaging \$1,460. Nine purebred Angus cows-all four or five year olds-averaged \$1,367, with the Eagle Bar Ranch, Alma, taking home five head. Leon Mosteller-Prairie View Farms, Bern, took home the highselling Angus female lot at

Repeat customer Corey Dean, Kahoka, Mo., paid \$1,600 to own the top selling SimGenetics bred heifer. Five half-blood spring bred heifers averaged \$1,440.

New this year at the Moser Ranch sale was the offering of six March and April born halter heifers. With herdsman Todd Strahm heading up this effort, these heifers averaged \$1.000/head and sold into Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma, with the high

seller, 7506S, going to Shoal Creek Simmental, Excelsion Springs, Mo., for \$1,250.

Eight Moser Ranch customers sold bred and open heifers on a strong market in the next portion of the sale. Topping the bred heifer offering at \$1,500 on a five-head lot was Double B Ranch, Centralia. Lance Roskamp, Sutter, IL, was the buyer. Clyde Aubert, St. Marys, paid \$1,475 to own a draft of five fancy Simmental heifers from Ebert Cattle Company, St. George. Eagle Bar Ranch, Alma, was again a volume buyer, taking home fifteen head of the spring bred heifers, paying an average price of \$1,390/head. 55 head of spring bred heifers averaged \$1,424.

The open heifer division topped at \$1,000/head when repeat customer Doug Keeton, DVM, Cleo Springs, Okla., paid that amount for five Simmental x Angus females consigned by customer Justin Boswell, Onaga. Twenty-five open heifers-all SimAngus crossaveraged \$900.

For the third year in a row, the Moser Ranch offered packages of fall bred heifers at their sale. Seventy head averaged \$1,250, with the high-selling lot of five head going to Bill Hilbert, Meriden, for \$1,325/head. These heifers were AI'd the week after the sale for September 1st calves, and will be picked up by buyers in early February 2008, after pregnancy diagnosis.

The 95 bulls in the offering went to several commercial operations from Kansas and across the nation. Lot 83, a 1/2 Sim x 1/2 Angus bull, sired by GAR US Premium Beef, topped the sale,

going to repeat buyer Allen Childs, Grandridge, FL, for \$5,750. Bidding by phone, Mr. Childs also purchased the Lot 18 bull, for \$4,500.

Jim Hardin, Nevada, MO, purchased the Lot 33 bull, for \$5,700. Zach Teter, a progressive young cattleman and repeat buyer made the trip with his grandfather from Beverly, West Va., to purchase two bulls at \$4,600 each — lots 17 and

Summarizing the Simmental and SimAngus portion of the bull sale: Thirty purebred Simmental bulls averaged \$2,454 and fortythree SimAngus bulls averaged \$2,308.



Audit analyzes meatcase selection

An extensive nationwide audit of retail meatcases shows fresh meat's share of the case has increased, according to the Cattlemen's Beef Board (CBB).

The 2007 audit, conducted by the beef checkoff. Sealed Air's Cryovac Food Packaging and the National Pork Board, also showed that growth of branded programs for meat increased, while store brands gained predominance in the meatcase. Boneless product interest also grew — with whole muscle beef having the largest overall share. Value-added packages (products with flavorings or ingredients added) continued to grow, while enhanced beef saw a decline. While natural and organic packages remained a niche category, their share did grow.

The in-stock condition for case-ready meats was generally better. Retailers also appear to be finding it easier to keep those items in stock, and nutrition labeling increased.

More than 120 retail supermarkets and 10 club stores were audited in 48 metro markets across the

country. Detailed information from more than 157,000 packages representing more than 281,000 pounds (lb.) of meat was captured to help further understand the transformation growing seen in the retail meatcase.

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
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


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

"This is an exciting first step toward better supporting community development in rural Kansas," said Secretary Kerr. "Rural Kansas faces a unique set of challenges, and the Office of Rural Opportunity will help us address those challenges and keep our communities strong.'

The ORO will help rural communities develop strategic plans designed to attract businesses, families and capital investment. The Office's programs and services will be aligned with longstanding community and economic development programs administered within the Department of Commerce.

"We're pleased to have this new Office housed within the Department of Commerce," Secretary Kerr said. "As the state's lead economic development agency, Commerce is the state's primary source of community deprograms, velopment services and financial assistance. The ORO will

Don't overlook the value of cattle hair

Health never can be underestimated. Having been confined lately, that concept is even more appreciated. Comfort, the lack of stress and the need to allow time for recovery are important.

All three factors also are part of cattle management, so appropriate managerial reactions must be thought through. One concept often overlooked in good cow health is hair.

Cow comfort and stress are related to how a cow or calf is clothed. Many studies have been done on hair coat, but most are on how cattle survive in hot climates rather than cold. Regardless, hair in cold climates is important.

Notably, in northern climates, we all can appreciate those days when everything is covered with frost. What becomes obvious very quickly are those buildings that have adequate insulation and those that do not.

A heated building, with minimal or no insulation, will shed frost quickly because heat loss from the inside prevents frost from gathering on the roof. A quick look at rooftops and one can tell what homes are efficient to heat.

The same is true of the

beef herd. Healthy cattle will tend to not have frost on their backs, even when the weather gets very cold. A well-fed cow produces a lot of heat, particularly when she is fed high-roughage feedstuffs.

However, as the weather gets colder, the frost eventually settles in. Well- insulated cows, just like well insulated homes, will look like walking frost balls. The hair protects the body from the devastating cold that confronts us all.

Inside, underneath that winter coat of hair, is a very warm, comfortable cow that really is not stressed at all by the cold outside. She doesn't need to depend on constant eating. Instead, she eats what she needs and returns to a protected, comfortable spot on the range where she quietly ruminates and waits for the warm days of spring.

That is in contrast to thin, poor-conditioned cattle that have not developed a good coat of hair. They are not comfortable, are stressed and forced to eat more feed to maintain body temperature.

We don't need fancy technology to understand if our cows are comfortable or stressed. The simple things in life often tell us the most and good managers know the signs.

How cattle respond to the cold is part of that equation. Cattle that don't respond need to be watched for and moved to the sale pen so they may be offered to someone who lives in a bettersuited environment.

Some time ago, one of our dogs, an Australian shepherd, caught an old antelope doe. Having caught up with the dog and reminding her that she should not be catching antelope, I prepared to release the doe.

What was interesting was the antelope's remarkable

coat of hair. Not only did the hair protect her from the dog, it also became very obvious that there probably isn't a winter tough enough to freeze a well-fed antelope. Two layers thick, the outer and inner layers actually were interlocked and the fibers provided a solid, outside cover. The antelope depended on her coat for survival.

Cows are domestic animals that rely on human caretakers. As caretakers, we need to remain aware of the natural traits livestock

We tend and keep those traits front and center for our profit and for the benefit, comfort and well-being of the cattle. Hair may not seem like a big deal, but when it comes to the environment, it means survival.


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Results from county elections revealed

The consolidated Riley/ Geary FSA County Committee recently held elections in all five local administrative areas. Local producers and landowners were mailed ballots which were counted at the January 15th County Committee meeting. Tamie Buckley, Riley/Geary CED, said that the county had a very good voter response this year.

Wendell Anderson has been re-elected to serve a three year term in LAA 1 which is in the northern portion of Riley County. Jeff Schurle was re-elected and will serve a 2 year term in LAA 2 which includes the central portion of Riley County. David Cederberg, also an incumbent, will serve a 1 year term for LAA 3 which includes the southern portion of Riley County and far northeast portion of Geary County. Mike Steinfort was re-elected and will serve as the representative for LAA 4. This LAA covers the eastern portion of Geary County.

LAA 5, which includes the western region of Geary County will be represented by Marjorie Wahle, who was also an incumbent. County committee members serve three year terms and can serve up to three consecutive terms if re-elected. The newly formed 5 LAA consolidated committee has staggered the terms of this year's winners so that in future years only 1 or 2 LAAs will hold an elec-

The county committee

plays an important role in FSA's programs that are administered to producers. The committee makes decisions on price support issues, producer appeals, eligibility issues, and acts as supervisor to the County Executive Director.

Buckley would like to remind area producers that regular monthly meetings of the Riley/ Geary County FSA Committee are normally held on the third Thursday of every month at 10 a.m. in the FSA office at 3705 Miller Parkway, Manhattan, Kansas. Lamb's renewed popularity comes after years of decline

Recent studies have indicated the demand for lamb meat has risen due to checkoffs collected from sheep raisers and used by the American Lamb Board to advertise and promote the

The board does promotion, research and education and tries to strengthen lamb and lamb products in domestic and foreign mar-

Lynn Perry, president of the South Dakota Sheep Growers Association, said most lamb produced in South Dakota doesn't stay in the area but is shipped to big cities.

Perry said that's because lamb is heavily promoted in areas with large ethnic populations, large grocery chains and upscale restaurants that are not found in rural areas.

The focus in area grocery stores around holidays, such as Easter, has been mainly on ham, said Perry, who chairs lamb promotion ef-



forts in South Dakota, Lamb has gotten a good response in giveaways at the South Dakota State Fair and South Dakota State University basketball games, he said.

One study, conducted by Texas A&M for the lamb board, said the board's efforts have nearly doubled the return per dollar spent on promotion.

Another study said lamb demand has increased 5.7 percent during the last 10 years after many years of

A third study said the overall demand for retail lamb is rising, with lamb outperforming all other proteins, as well as total meat, during 2006.

Perry said checkoff-funded promotion is behind the increase in demand.

"If you don't promote it out there to people, they forget about it." he said. "Just like any other business, you have to promote it. No one else is going to do it."



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Survey says December gains are modest in rural economy

survey of rural bankers in nine Midwestern and Plains states indicates continued growth in economic activity, particularly in agriculture.

The overall economic index for the region advanced to 55.7 in January from 54.3 in December and 54 1 in November An index greater than 50 indicates a growing economy over the next three to six months.

The survey includes Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming. The average community population covered in the survey is about 1,300.

The farm equipment sales index soared to a record 71.1 from December's solid 65.9. And January's farmland price index expanded to a record high of 81 from December's healthy 77.3 and November's 68.8.

David Kingland, president of Manufacturers Bank & Trust in Forest City, Iowa, said the agricultural economy is its strongest since the 1970s, partly due to new construction of wind farms and ethanol plants.

Job growth hit its weak-

est reading in nearly two years, with a January new hiring index of 46.6, down from December's 50.6 and November's 50.0. Results from surveys over the past five months indicate that jobs are being added at a pace well below average, even with record farm income.

Jim Caspary, president of First Trust Holdings in Watseka, Ill., said, "It remains to be seen how the stronger ag economy will offset the weaker consumer economy in our rural area."

Retail sales were a weak 42.4, down from December's dismal 45.6.

Looking ahead to the rest of 2008, roughly 37 percent of bankers predicted the downturn in the housing market to be the biggest economic problem, while 11 percent said it would be the ability of businesses to provide health insurance for their employees.

January's home sales index declined for the seventh straight month to 24.6, down from December's 28.0, the lowest reading of the 2007.

Seventy-eight percent of bankers said the subprime mortgage meltdown has little to no impact on their banks. No banker said there was a significant impact, and 2.2 percent said there was modest impact.

"The direct affect has been little to none since we were not making subprime mortgage loans to our clients," said Kent Siltman, president of Citizens First State Bank in Walnut, Ill. "However, the indirect effects in regards to market liquidity, the level of interest rates and the regulation that comes out of this from Washington will be significant."

Bank indicators were mixed for January. Loan volume declined to 51.7 from 52.2 in December. Checking deposits increased for a fourth consecutive month, to 70 from 65.0 in December and 59.5 in November. Certificates of deposit and other savings instruments advanced to 60.8 from last month's

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Yard & Garden Tips By Gregg Eyestone Instant Landscapes

Recently, I attended a conference where Roger Cook of "This Old House" presented. He showed slides of projects that he had done and discussed landscaping concerns. A common issue that occurs here and on the East coast where he mainly works is planting plants too close. The desire to have instant everything, including landscapes causes this close spacing.

I would like to help you from over planting. Consider enrolling in a home landscape design class. I will be leading this class which is being offered in partnership with the UFM Community Learning Center in Manhattan. The class has its first session on February 6 beginning at 6 P.M. and going to 8 P.M. Following sessions will be at the same time on February 13 and 20. All sessions will be in Pottorf Hall. Sign up by calling UFM at 539-8763. Call me if you want more information.

A downfall of planting too close is poor plant health. Most diseases favor high humidity. Dense plantings reduce air flow which increases chance for disease to develop. Soil moisture, available nutrients, and light competition between plants can lead to unhealthy plants.

Appearance may be the biggest drawback of planting too close. At first planting, it looks good. As soon as the plants root down and take off, the plants will soon grow the available

space. Systematic removal of unneeded plants will need to occur or continuous pruning to keep it in line.

The best recourse is to space plants to the intended mature size. Plants don't read and size will vary some from site to site. Each plant has its optimum growing conditions. The rate of growth and ultimate size of each plant will be determined by its particular situation.

If you need an instant landscape, there are better ways to do it. Instead of planting more than necessary which cost money, purchase larger plants and give them the suggested spacing.

Another way to reduce your bare mulch appearance is to fill the voids between the small plants with annuals or bulbs. As the landscape matures, these areas will be lost. You might miss them so much that you have to enlarge your planting area.

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
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Informational meetings slated across the state in February and March

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Research initiative launched to target animal and public health threats nationally

Authority has launched a \$2.5 million initiative to bring together researchers nationwide to create products that protect Americans from the intentional use of animal-borne diseases to disrupt the national economy or to infect humans. The goals of the new Collaborative Biosecurity Research Initiative (CBRI) are to support interinstitutional research to: (1) develop countermeasures for foreign-animal diseases; (2) provide advanced test and evaluation capability for threat detection, vulnerability, and countermeasure assessment for animal and zoonotic diseases; (3) support licensure of vaccine countermeasures through essential animal-model testing and evaluation; and (4) strengthen biosecurity capabilities of institutions serving certain regions and populations, such as students underrepresented in biosecurity research.

Agricultural and food infrastructure is a key component of U.S. economic productivity and growth, accounting for 12 percent of the nation's gross domestic product (\$1.24 trillion) and representing one in six jobs in direct or related employment.

The CBRI will introduce the unique biosecurity research capabilities and facilities at Kansas State University to investigators nationally and develop strategic alliances to promptly confront animal and public health threats by leveraging multidisciplinary expertise. The initiative will allow academic, federal-agency and nonprofit researchers to collaborate with K-State scientists to perform research not possible at their home institutions.

"The research horsepower leveraged by this initiative will enable K-State and our collaborators to play a critical role in protecting our nation from high-consequence biological threats." Further, Kansas House Speaker Melvin Neufeld said the CBRI advances the important work envisioned for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's National Bio and Agro-Defense Facility (NBAF).

"Kansas State Universi-

ty is one of six sites under consideration for the NBAF, and initiatives like this highlight our commitment to win it on the merits." Neufeld said. "Our state already has established itself as a world leader in animal and plant biosciences. The Collaborative Biosecurity Research Initiative and the NBAF complement and expand the work of the Biosecurity Research Institute, a state-of-the-art facility at Kansas State University, as well as the numerous plant and animal companies already in our state. The NBAF would be a great fit in Kansas."

Kansas, with particular strengths in agri-business and veterinary medicine, is home to nearly one

third of the \$14.2 billion global animal-health industry and 45 animalhealth companies' U.S. or international headquarters.

The CBRI is open to faculty members of U.S. academic research universities, federal-agency researchers, and nonprofit research institutions. Eligible applicants must conduct research and development at the BRI in collaboration with a Kansas Board of Regents institution. Proposals will be considered on a rolling basis for scientific merit. potential for attracting matching funds, and elements of collaboration.


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

Most of calf's passive immunity occurs in the first six hours

Despite best efforts, a few calves will be born via a long, hard delivery. They may be sluggish or weak at birth and slow to find the cow and nurse. These calves are more prone to scours or pneumonia as babies and "poor-doers" later in life.

Resistance to disease is greatly dependent on antibodies or immunoglobulins and can be either active or passive in origin. In active immunity, the body produces antibodies in response to infection or vaccination. Passive immunity gives temporary protection by transfer of certain immune substances from resistant individuals. An example of passive immunity is passing of antibodies from dam to calf via the colostrum (first milk after calving).

This transfer only occurs during the first few hours following birth. Research from the USDA station in Nebraska has indicated that successful transfer of passive immunity (during the first day of life) enhances disease resistance and performance even through the feedlot phase. Timing of colostrum feeding is important because the absorption of immunoglobulin from colostrum decreases linearly from birth. "Intestinal closure" occurs when very large

molecules are no longer absorbed into the circulation and this occurs because the specialized absorptive cells are sloughed from the gut epithelium.

In calves, "closure" is virtually complete 24 hours after birth, although efficiency of absorption declines from birth, particularly after 12 hours. Feeding may induce earlier closure, but there is little colostral absorption after 24 hours of age even if the calf is starved. This principle of timing of colostrum feeding holds true whether the colostrum is directly from the first milk of the dam, or supplied by hand feeding.

Provide high risk baby calves (born to thin first calf heifers or calves that endured a dystocia) at least 2 quarts of fresh or thawed frozen colostrum within the first 6 hours of life and another 2 quarts within another 12 hours. This is especially important for those baby calves too weak to nurse naturally. Thaw frozen colostrum slowly in a microwave oven or warm water so as to not allow it to over-heat. Therefore denaturation of the protein does not occur. If at all possible, feed the high risk calf natural colostrum first, before feeding commercial colostrum substitutes.

Initiative to bring researchers to K-State

The Kansas Bioscience Authority announced a \$2.5 million initiative that will add more horsepower to Kansas State University's research capabilities in addressing threats to the nation's food supply.

The Collaborative Biosecurity Research Initiative will bring K-State's unique biosecurity research capabilities to investigators across the nation. The program will offer researchers from academia, the federal government and nonprofit groups a chance to conduct research at K-State's Biosecurity Research Institute and develop solutions to today's biosecurity problems. Under this program, the Kansas Bioscience Authority will fund research awards of up to \$500,000 to investigators for projects conducted in partnership with Kansas researchers, and that take place at the Biosecurity Research Institute.

"This initiative will allow us to take the Biosecurity Research Institute to the broader scientific community," said Ron Trewyn, K-State's vice president for research. "Researchers will have a unique opportunity to conduct research they might not be able to accomplish anywhere else."

K-State's Biosecurity Research Institute is a state-of-the-art facility where investigators will be able to address threats requiring BSL-3 and BSL-3Ag level biocontainment. The institute is designed to accommo-

date research in a variety of areas including infectious diseases of livestock and poultry, food safety and processing, plant science and the development of plant-based vaccines, insect vector, and basic molecular biology. The building is 113,000 square feet and houses high-level lab space, as well as a unique educational suite and lecture hall.

This initiative will kick start research at the Biosecurity Research Institute while bolstering K-State's existing pool of scientific expertise in animal health and agriculture," Trewyn said. "The role that K-State will play in fending off high-consequence disease threats to our nation is crucial. This partnership will not only enhance the role of K-State, it also illustrates Kansas' commitment to high-level research like that slated for the National Bio and Agro-defense Facility."

K-State and Manhattan are one of six potential sites for the \$451 million National Bio and Agro-defense Facility. That facility's focus will be on research to address high-consequence threats to the nation's food supply.

The Collaborative Biosecurity Research Initiative is open to faculty members of U.S. academic research universities, federal agency researchers, and nonprofit research institutions conducting biosecurity re-
