Page 25 Kansas NRCS announces funding for innovation grants

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Acting State Conservationist Astor F. Boozer announced \$200,000 available funding for new technology or approaches under the Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG). Through innovation, CIG is an effort to address some of the state's most pressing natural resource conservation needs. CIG is a component of the

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). NRCS is an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture

"Today, effectively getting conservation on the ground means keeping pace with a rapidly changing agricultural environment," said Boozer. "CIG is intended to cultivate a public-private sector relationship to develop and implement innovative technologies and approaches to environmental enhancement and protection on working agricultural land," he continued. State, Tribal, and local governmental entities, nongovernmental organizations, and individuals may apply. Project proposals should demonstrate the use of innovative technologies or approaches to address a natural resource concern.

Project results are expected to improve and create the transfer of conservation technologies, management systems, and innovative approaches (such as marketbased systems) into NRCS technical manuals or guides or to the private sector.


Applications are due in the Kansas NRCS state office by April 8, 2008. Project proposals will be evaluated

with the assistance of the Kansas Technical Committee based on the criteria identified in the announcement of Fiscal Year 2008 program funding. Selected applicants may

receive grants up to 50 percent of the total project cost, not to exceed \$50,000. Applicants must provide non-federal matching funds for at least 50 percent of the project cost. Of the

non-federal matching funds, 50 percent may be from in-kind contributions. Projects may be single or multi-year, not to exceed three years.

The corn did well last week considering the weakness in the Kansas City and Chicago wheat. The March corn gained 7 cents and the December picked up 8. Both of those contracts made their highest closes to date on Friday. The UP trend is alive and well.

It is the same old story in the corn, acres and demand. The corn needs to keep most of last year's jump in acres. If you put any faith in the USDA's Baseline projections, then you should expect to see about 88 million acres this spring and see ending stocks drop in half. I should point out that ending stocks will drop in half if we slow export demand and have a good yield. Things could be as tight in the corn next year as they are in the wheat this year if there are any problems. You don't want to be limiting your upside potential too much.

As for demand, export sales slowed down last week to where they were

only twice as high as what we need each week. If USDA doesn't increase the export estimate in next month's report I will be very surprised.

My objective for the March corn is still a test of the all time high of \$5.54 1/2. Look for that to happen before the month is done.

Late Friday the 8th, after everyone had gone home, limits were expanded to 60 cents in the wheat markets. This got the markets trading, which was the objective, but we have seen some extreme volatility. The limits as they stand now are 60 cents in Chicago, 90 in Kansas City, and 135 in Minneapolis.

The Kansas City wheat ended up seeing quite a bit of pressure this week after making contract highs early Monday. The March KW was 56 cents lower for the week and \$1.16 off of Monday's high. The July KW lost 75 cents this week. With moves like that it makes spending 75 cents on a put option seem almost reasonable.

We didn't quite reach my objective of \$12.50, but with the Minneapolis wheat still making new highs I don't want to say that the bull market is over in Kansas City. The March Minneapolis gained \$3.82 this week and closed 53 cents off of Friday's high.

Export sales were slow in last week's report, but there has been enough recent activity that in the next report we will be back to selling too much wheat. If sales don't slow down the Kansas City chart may look like Minneapolis

Weather is also an issue. Crop condition ratings are very poor in TX and there is a sizeable area of KS that could use some moisture If conditions don't improve in the next two months we could see considerable buying interest in the new crop contracts.

The March soybeans

made a new contract high this week and gained 35 cents. November made it back above \$13.

There isn't much fresh information. The beans need more acres, but no one knows where they are coming from. We are going to rely heavily on double crop it appears.

We also need to slow down demand. Export sales are still at a great pace and soybean oil sales are phenomenal. Demand needs to slow or we could face shortages next year.

The sunflower market is trying to attract acres too, but I don't know how

successful it is either. I haven't talked to anyone yet who is going to increase their sunflower acres.



Daily price limits for wheat increased, breaking gridlock

Increased daily price limits approved by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission had the intended effect this past week week, allowing market participants to cover market positions without price limits stopping trade. As a result, markets moved both up and down in a wider range than ever before allowed in wheat futures.

The price limit for wheat contracts was expanded to 60 cents per bushel, up from 30 cents per bushel, with an option of expanding to 90 cents per bushel on the next trading day if the 60-cent limit is reached. Additionally, should two or more wheat futures contract months within a crop year or the remaining contract month in a crop year close at limit up, the price limit for the remaining months will increase by 50 percent the next business day.

A daily price limit will rise an additional 50 percent each subsequent day two or more contract months within a crop year (or the remaining contract month in a crop year) close at limit up. The Minneapolis Grain Exchange, the Kansas City Board of Trade and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange had collectively filed paperwork asking for expedited review of the changes after wheat futures reached price limits for several days, stopping trading and preventing market movement.

In a joint release last Friday, the three trading boards said, in part: "The joint expansion of price limits is considered necessary due to the unprecedented price levels and volatility in recent market sessions and over the past year. ... [E]xpanded limits will allow wheat contracts to continue performing their price discovery and risk mitigation functions without being unduly constrained by limit price moves.

"By acting in unison, the exchanges will help customers avoid additional risk resulting from distorted intermarket spread relationships that exist among the wheat markets when price limits are not consistent." Wheat futures are at all-time highs due in part to global supply fears and booming exports. "

During the interview in the backdrop of the windmills, suddenly a couple of pheasants flush, their feathers glistening in the morning sun that has broken through the clouds of a morning shower to form a perfect rainbow where a pair of bison graze on newly emerged grass that is surrounded by a host of newly opened prairie flowers. I then, with my cat like quickness, grab my Nikon SR78 wide angle, 10 megapixel camera that hangs around my neck and snap the perfect photo. I then take out an ad in the Grass & Grain promoting wind farms.

The bottom line is, neither my ad nor this one paints an accurate picture of a wind farm.

In this country we won't drill in the Artic National

Wildlife Refuge or offshore, we don't mine oil shale in Colorado and we certainly won't build nuclear power plants.

We won't support lowering the speed limit or God forbid riding to town with our neighbor, instead of firing up our F-250, 4x4, extended cab, with the 6 CD auto changer and chrome grill guard, but yet we expect to have unlimited supply of energy.

Every landowner should do his own research about the pros and cons of wind farms and not base his decision on a single ad or one person's opinion about what is best for himself, his community and his country.

Most of us would tolerate a high-producing oil well in the backyard but few of us want to be anywhere near a wind farm. If we are to maintain our lifestyles we must look at all options and if one of them is wind farms, then they have to go somewhere.

"Plants' earning a place as one of the five all-time classics — so far, at least means these winners' improved traits have really stood the test of time. They're still clearly superior varieties," said Ward Upham, horticulturist with Kansas State University Research and Extension.

The AAS's classics include one vegetable plant and four annual flowers:

Master Gardener Randy Freeland said the landscaping material, including Crepe Myrtle, Rose of Sharon, Monkey Grass and Nandina, came from one of the homes north of the Oklahoma State University campus that was being torn down.

"Now isn't the best time to try to transplant plants, but we're working on a tight deadline," Freeland said. "The house is to be torn down anytime and if we wanted to salvage the plants, we had to dig them up now."

Kelsey McCollum, Payne County Cooperative Extension Service horticulture educator and coor-

dinator of the county's Master Gardener program, said the cool weather is one aspect they have working on their side in the transplant process. "The plants are dormant right now and they're not losing much McCollum moisture," said. "We wouldn't be able to store the plants until the Habitat for Humanity home is ready if we were doing this in the summer."

Once the plants were dug up, the group, which also consisted of Pat Kerns and Bill Erwin, both Master Gardeners, wrapped the roots in plastic to protect them from the elements. The plants will be stored until the soil is ready at the new house.

Stan Waugh, Habitat for Humanity volunteer coordinator, said the plants can be replanted once the dirt work is completed at the new house.

"Stillwater Habitat for

Humanity is a non-profit charitable organization dedicated to the mission of providing decent, safe and affordable housing to our citizens," Waugh said. "We are very dependent on charitable gifts such as reusable household goods to accomplish our mission. The house that will benefit from the landscaping efforts of the Master Gardeners will be ready for a family within the next few weeks." Waugh said Stillwater Habitat for Humanity has benefited greatly by salvaging other items from houses north of campus

that are schedule be to demolished.

"Oklahoma State University has allowed Stillwater Habitat for Humanity to recycle items such as doors, cabinets, fixtures and more that otherwise would have been sent to the landfill," he said. "We couldn't do our missions without the support of so many wonderful volunteers and donors."

The Master Gardener program is a volunteer training program conducted by the OSU Cooperative Extension Service and is designed to help county Extension centers meet the demands for consumer horticulture information.

Master Gardeners take classroom training coordinated by local Extension staff with the assistance of state Extension specialists located at OSU. After classroom training is completed, program participants are involved in an internship program of volunteer service. Volunteer service components vary widely around the state, but in all cases are educational, Extension related and represent the interests of the OSU Extension Cooperative Service.

Master Gardeners have become a vital part of Extension's ability to provide consumers with up-to-date, research-based information. Master Gardening has also become a popular volunteer activity that gives its participants a sense of community spirit, accomplishment and intellectual stimulation.

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Page 31 Good credit is a valuable possession, should be protected

The most valuable thing we possess is our name and the most common reflection of our reputation as a responsible consumer is our credit report.

Many credit reports contain errors serious enough to bring about a contradiction in credit, according to a recent report by the National Association of Public Interest Research Groups on credit file mistakes.

"Unfortunately, the information that is in credit reports does not always tell a true story," said Glenn Muske, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension Service interim associate dean, assistant director family and consumer sciences. "According to the study by PIRG, 79 percent of all individual credit files contain mistakes, many of which are not significant enough to detour a credit application, but are typos, incorrect dates and other entry errors."

Much of the information contained in credit reports is bought and sold daily to anyone who requests and pays for them.

"Consumers with serious flaws in their credit reports can be denied credit, home coverage and the right to open a bank account or have a debit card," Muske said. Some

consumers may be faced with high interest rates as well, due to the serious errors in their reports that falsely place them in the sub-prime, high-cost lending pool.

Some key findings in a study done by PIRG with adults in 30 states include:

Twenty-five percent of the credit reports surveyed contained serious errors that could result in the denial of credit, such as false delinquencies or accounts that did not belong to the consumer.

Fifty-four percent of the credit reports contained personal demographic information that was mis-

spelled, outdated, belonged to a stranger or was incorrect.

Twenty-two percent of the credit reports listed the same mortgage or loan twice.

Nearly eight percent of the credit reports were missing major credit, loan, mortgage or other consumer accounts that demonstrate the creditworthiness of the consumer.

credit accounts that had been closed by the consumer but remained listed as open.

Seventy-nine percent of the credit reports surveyed contained either serious errors or other mistakes of some kind.

"Credit report reviews used to be something that was conducted when a consumer discovered a Thirty percent of the mistake or activity resem-

credit reports contained bling identity theft after they were denied credit," Muske said. "It is very important to encourage people to review their credit so they, too, do not become a victim of credit deception."

GREENSBURG (AP) - This tornado-shattered town's Main Street began its rebirth Sunday with the dedication of its first rebuilt structure.

The Care-N-Share thrift store and food pantry reopened a block south of its original location, restoring a needed source of emergency assistance.

"The first building on Main Street is about giving. It's not about taking or making any money," said Rogers Strickland, whose Olathebased nonprofit agency built the 5,000-square foot building with the help of 20 companies and 100 workers.

The Kiowa County Ministerial Alliance, a group of 14 churches, has operated the story and pantry for more than 25 years, using the annual profits of \$15,000 to \$20,000 for emergency assistance payments and distributing groceries to about 20 needy families a month.

It, like most of Greensburg, was destroyed by a tornado in May. The alliance realized it would need help rebuilding as insurance provided just \$52,000 and the structure, erected in the 1910s or 1920s, needed a lot of work.

Strickland's Side by Side has been putting up buildings in needy communities for 10 years, traveling as far as Sri Lanka for projects. It also helped rebuilding efforts in Mississippi follow-

Strickland said. "It benefited the whole community, not one church."

The group signed the construction contract for the \$52,000 in insurance money but Strickland estimates the project was valued at \$350,000 in donated labor and materials.

John Sheehy, who owns Summit Masonry in Independence, sent six workers to Greensburg to build the store's brick facade, which was meant to match the old downtown's look.

He estimated the job was worth about \$25,000, including donations from suppliers.

"I share the same philosophy that Rogers has," Sheehy said. "I do it because I can. I just feel that when I can go do these things, it always comes back to me in ways I don't even know."

Strickland said the volunteers met on Sunday morn-

ings with nearby residents before heading back to the Kansas City area to explain who they were and why they were helping. The residents would then describe what they have gone through in rebuilding their lives.

"There is no way to measure the blessing they have been to our community," said the Rev. Marvin George, pastor of Greensburg's First Baptist Church and president of the ministerial alliance.

George called the construction "phenomenal" as workers continued through days of heavy snow and winds, at one point having to chip through an inch of ice to install the roof.

"Every other construction effort came to a screeching halt, and they were still working," said George, who waited out the new building by meeting people at the nearby Quick Shop to pay for their gro-

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
ceries.

Greensburg Mayor John Janssen said the reopening of the Care-N-Share was important as so many residents are struggling. He also said he was impressed with how it was built with the help of so many volunteers from around the state.

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Know the numbers and performance will follow when purchasing bulls

A few words on bull buying: Keep it simple. Each year, as the bull-buying season gets under way, the process needs to be thought through. There are many reasons for attending bull sales, but buying bulls is not always the No. 1 reason

Many times the sale is an annual event that gives us an opportunity to gather with family, friends and breed enthusiasts. There also will be that opportunity for a new buyer to stop by. However, regardless of how much socializing there is, by the end of the day, many bulls, if not all, will have new ownership.

But, as time goes on, more evidence or, should one say, opportunity is available for absentee bidding and purchasing. The day of the sale barn phone, limited to one or two lines, slowly has been replaced by cell phones or internet live video. Sound or keyboard transactions are more prevalent, with very satisfaction prominent guarantees by sellers to

producers who buy bulls by ABS Global Inc., which sight unseen.

In the past, that was a questionable practice. The annual inspection and evaluation of potential new bulls meant a mandatory trip. If the trip could not be made physically by the bull buyer, only the most trusted associate was designated to make the trip. Times have changed because of performance numbers. Producers are very reputable and have been that way for many years. Any producer today who is noted for standing behind the cattle that are sold and is armed with performance numbers can offer cattle sight unseen. The numbers provide depth of understanding and confidence in the performance of the cattle.

Once a buyer selects a bull producer, pick up almost any bull-related publication and the performance numbers are evident. To start, pick a breed and find the average numbers for that breed. For example, I noticed the "Spring 2008 Pasture to Plate Genetics" publication arrived in the mail. It is published

is one of several companies that market cattle genetics lists for several breeds.

If one turns to page 38. the breed averages for Angus sires are listed for the traits analyzed by the American Angus Association. If one quickly goes to the Web page for the American Angus Association (www.angus.org/), the same numbers can be found. For simplicity, if one uses the traits of birth weight, weaning weight and milk, the breed average for sires within the Angus breed would be 2.2 pounds for birth weight, 40 pounds for

semen catalogs or other listings of sale bulls, the seller generally will indicate where that particular bull rates according to these reference points within the breed. For instance, one can glance through the ABS Global publication and quickly determine the bulls that rank in the upper 25 percent of the breed on page 38.


In the case of the ABS Global publication, those traits are highlighted in gold. At least the color appears gold to me. I suspect there could be some subtle marketing tools at work

cation, as individual bulls are noted, those traits that rank in the top 25 percent of the breed are circled in red.

Keeping it simple is the point. Bull selection has been made simple. Not all producers agree and many have a sincere desire and need to physically evaluate bulls. However, as the opportunity to purchase bulls sight unseen increases. along with increased confidence and understanding of what the numbers mean, the phone connections and

keyboards will increase. Granted, prior to any sale, astute producers are making contacts and visiting bull producers and making calculated decisions. Once the relationship is established and credibility sealed, the numbers really do determine the purchase. The beef is always good, but the reality is that bull buying can be simple. With a little confidence, bulls can be purchased, delivered and turned out. Get to know numbers and performance will follow.

K-State programs promote saving, money management tips

We've all most likely read a news story about people of modest means who donate a million dollars to a community library or fund a new recreation facility for kids in their hometown.

Such donors typically cite the value of saving regularly, yet 52 percent of the more than 2,000 representative Americans surveyed by the Consumer Federation of America and Wachovia reported an inability to save adequately, said Carol Young, Kansas State University Research and Extension financial management specialist.

Respondents cited barriers to saving that ranged from large or unexpected expenses to pressures from family and friends and trips to the mall in the 2007 report.

Spending habits can skew perceptions about the ability to save, said Young,

who advised paying yourself first to build an emergency fund, increase personal savings and reduce - and retire credit card or other debt.

Saving as little as \$10 a week adds up to \$520, plus interest; saving \$20, a week will yield more than \$1,000 annually, she said.

Either can be helpful in establishing an emergency fund, said Young, who noted that the Consumer Federation of America reported that Americans, including lower-income households, spent about \$2,000 last year on unexpected expenditures.

Two-thirds of these expenditures were related to medical care or motor vehicles, she said.

To ensure regular saving, Young encouraged automatic savings plans via payroll deductions or transfers from payroll deposits to checking, savings or retire-

"Check ment accounts. with your employer and take advantage of moneysaving employee benefits, such as matching contributions to a 401K or other savings options," she said. If such plans are not available, set up your own automatic deposits from checking to savings.

And, once credit cards are paid off, invest, rather than spend, any annual raise or interest saved, Young said. K-State Research and Extension financial programs support America Saves Week, Feb. 24-March 2, 2008. The public awareness campaign is sponsored by the Consumer Federation of America and numerous partners across the U.S., and targets increasing savings, reducing debt and strengthening personal financial security.



Three keys to planning the spring breeding season

Three key management concepts can help commercial cow-calf operations improve the productivity of their cow herds. However, planning and preparation must take place well in advance of the spring breeding season. The key areas to consider include: 1) assess the bull power; 2) immunize the replacement heifers properly; and 3) breed the replacement heifers ahead of the cows.

Let's examine each one briefly in more detail.

Bull power

Do you have enough bulls to meet the needs of the cow herd? Very young, 12 month to 15 month old bulls should be placed with 10-15 females. Two year-old bulls can be placed with 18-24 females and experienced bulls should be able to breed 25-30 females or even a few more if in small breeding pastures. Have the bulls recently passed a breeding soundness examination? Arrange with your veterinarian a time to check the bulls for breeding soundness. Research has indicated that one of every six bulls will be questionable or unsatisfactory upon examination. It is important

to find sub-fertile bulls in plenty of time to allow for the replacement bulls to be located and purchased for the upcoming breeding season. New bulls should be brought to their new environment about a month prior to breeding. This gives them an opportunity to become adapted to their new environment before the critical start of a breeding season.

Immunize the heifers

Replacement heifers should be immunized for respiratory diseases such as IBR and BVD. If you choose to give the heifers a modified live vaccine for long-lasting protection against these viruses, heifers should receive this vaccination at least one month before the start of the breeding season. This would also be good time to include other reproductive disease protection that may be recommended by your veterinarian. Examples of other diseases that should be considered include leptospirosis and campylobacter (sometimes called vibriosis).

Breed the heifers ahead of the mature cows


Yearling replacement heifers should be mated with bulls or bred artificially about 3 weeks to a month before the start of the breeding season for the mature cows. Breeding the heifers early is important for two reasons. Two-year-old first calf cows normally take longer to return to heat cycles after calving than do older cows. Therefore if they calve early then when they rebreed they are in synchrony with the rest of the cows in the herd as they deliver their second calf. In addition, the manager can watch the heifers more closely early in the calving season and give them additional attention as they are the females most likely to need assistance

at calving time. Naturally, there are other health, nutritional, and management chores that must be attended to during the time prior to breeding, but using these three concepts would aid greatly in improving the productivity of many commercial cow-calf herds.

emotions and opinions, but one that must be addressed by the beef industry," Thomson said. 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


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Herd in the balance

By Steve Suther Most beef producers are conservative. Politics aside, we're talking about cowherd management. If you had to pick a word to describe your ideal, it would be balance.

But can you have too much balance? We might as well ask if you can have too much common sense, love or justice. Still, a lot depends on interpretation. Balance does not mean always staying in the middle of the road when confronted with a range of options.

On the balance beam, sometimes you need to lean toward the left or right to stay the course and move ahead.

You don't pick a balanced bushel of good and bad apples, or find an ethical average between good and evil. Balance at a low level may be no better than that basket of mixed apples. The scales balance at zero, but where's the beef?

Success in the cattle

business takes a balance of risk and reward, leading and following, planning and action. Though you seek advice, you think for yourself, taking that advice and all the evidence into account.

Balance is truly an ideal in genetic selection, but where does it start and end? Some producers only consider one or two traits, balancing on an inverted scale the expected progeny differences (EPDs) for birth weight against that for weaning weight. Others look

at a range of several EPDs, perhaps even including carcass traits.

Typically, the highest value bull is seen as the one that does it all, balanced in top quartile EPDs the across the board. That may not be the most valuable bull for your herd right now.

Think about that herd. Do you know if they are the product of balanced genetics? If so, then you need that balanced bull. In most cases, however, they are not perfectly balanced. They may produce a diverse calf crop from a balanced bull.

To achieve balance in your herd genetics, you must manage the calves to meet their potential, measure performance, keep records and sort the data. Think about the next links in the production chain and look for ways to measure feedlot and carcass values

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as well. cows When you sort out the data and compare to ideal, you'll probably see a few "holes." Armed with that picture, you can find bulls that complete the balance in your herd, although they

do not carry balanced genetics. Some larger operations may have enough cattle and resources to sort and custom breed certain cows to the bulls they need. More producers can do that using artificial insemination (AI). But at the least, you can buy bulls that fill a gap that shows up in most of your

For example, if you find that most of your calves do not gain efficiently or achieve premium quality grades, you can select bulls that stand out for both marbling and feed efficiency. You'll want to maintain reasonably high standards and balance among the other traits as well.

You can achieve balance more quickly through strategic culling and selection on the female side as well. When you get there, it's time to buy those ideal, balanced-trait bulls that produce more than just pounds

or higher marbling. In the big picture, balance takes more than genetics of course. It takes management of those genetics to produce the best beef you profitably can. Analyze potential return on every investment, but don't cut costs beyond the quality tipping point. Look to the past as well as the future, and live in the balance of today.



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



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New crop of Western ranchers buck cattle industry to go green beef producers

CATHEYS VALLEY, Calif. (AP) Seth Nitschke spent his early 20s working at the country's biggest feed lots before he returned home to start a business raising beef cattle fed on the grasses of the Sierra Nevada foothills.

Nitschke, 31, who makes his living herding heifers through pastures near Yosemite National Park, would never call himself an environmental activist. though he's planting saplings to protect nearby streams and runs a light herd to let his pastures breathe.

Unlike some of his conservative counterparts in traditional livestock production, he and a new crop of cattlemen are quietly working to minimize their industry's ecological footprint, and are forging unlikely alliances with environmental groups.

Look at this grass. If I don't take care of it, that's my livelihood," Nitschke said, kneeling as he examined foxtail shoots popping up near a grove of black oaks. "We dress differently than the eco-folks, we probably vote differently, but in the end there's a lot of ways in which our core values are really close."

Throughout the West, cattlemen and environmentalists have locked horns over grazing practices for decades.

But increasingly, ranchers are buying into the idea that they have a role to play

in protecting open space, be it through preserving private wildlands or promoting sustainable grazing techniques that help endangered species flourish.

Near Florida's Lake Okeechobee, the World Wildlife Fund has recruited a group of ranchers to build ditches on their lands to improve wetlands habitat for threatened and endangered birds like the wood stork and crested caracara.

In Wyoming, the Audobon Society is trying to convince oil and gas companies to pay ranchers to maintain sage brush expanses key to the survival of the native, chicken-sized sage grouse. Ecologists fear without the ranchers, gas exploration could do away with the bird's habitat.

In California, 75 ranching organizations, environmental groups and state and federal agencies have signed onto a common strategy to enhance the state's rangelands while protecting its ecosystems.

"This new generation of ranchers knows they have to work on the environmental part of it to survive," said Neil McDougald, a rancher at the University of California Cooperative Extension office in Madera County. "I'll guarantee you the guys driving cows today have a better environmental conscience than the ranchers who were riding around holding up stage coaches.'

Still, a history of bad blood between those who live off the land and those who seek to protect it hasn't made coalition-building easy.

Recent research from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization shows that the world's large-scale livestock operations are causing environmental problems ranging from land degradation and air and water pollution to loss of biodiversity.

In last two centuries. foraging has contributed to both the erosion of arid Western rangelands and watershed contamination, said Mel George, a range ecologist at the University of California, Davis.

The environmental movement has hit back by filing lawsuits seeking to ban cattlemen from running their herds on public lands.

Last year, 37.5 million calves were born to U.S.



House lawmakers propose new version of farm bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — House lawmakers are proposing a new version of a wide-ranging farm bill in an attempt to appease the White House, which had contended that the legislation was full of wasteful spending.

House Agriculture Committee Chairman Collin Peterson, D-Minn., and Virginia Rep. Robert Goodlatte, the top Republican on the committee, are proposing stricter limits on subsidies paid to wealthy farmers and slashing extra spending for farm programs.

The administration signaled its support for the draft Wednesday, as two top officials said Peterson's proposal includes some of the changes sought by President Bush. He has threatened to veto the bills passed by both chambers last year.

"We believe this offer represents a package that is moving in a direction of a bill that the president would sign," Agriculture Secretary Ed Schafer and Deputy Secretary Charles Conner said in a joint statement.

However, Democratic Sens. Max Baucus of Montana and Kent Conrad of North Dakota and Republican Sen. John Thune of South Dakota, all members of the Agriculture Committee, criticized Peterson's draft, saying it cuts important programs.

"Senators made it very clear that proposal isn't going to fly," said Baucus, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, which also has jurisdiction over the bill.

One of the programs not be funded in the draft was a \$5 billion fund created by Baucus to subsidize farmers who have lost crops due to weather-related disasters. Peterson's proposal would also reduce spending on federal nutrition pro-

grams and cut back extra subsidies set aside for certain crops.

Peterson and Iowa Sen. Tom Harkin, chairman of the Agriculture Committee, met with Schafer, Conner and White House budget chief Jim Nussle on Wednesday. Baucus and Conrad, both of whom attended the meeting, said the group agreed to meet again Thursday.

"It was a tough meeting," Conrad said afterward.

Peterson said his draft isn't a final offer but an example of how Congress can work to find a bill that Bush won't veto.

The House passed its version of the five-year, \$286 billion bill in July, and the Senate passed its bill in December. Peterson's new version would extend the legislation to 10 years and would spend around \$611 billion, adhering to government estimates of what farm programs will cost over that period.

The Bush administration has objected to spending beyond that government "baseline." Peterson's draft would reduce the extra spending for farm programs to \$6 billion over the 10 years, roughly half what would have been spent in the bills passed by the House and Senate last year.

"This bill is fiscally conservative," Peterson said.

Both Harkin and Peterson have threatened that if the negotiations come to a stalemate, Congress might bypass an extension of current law - it expires March 15 — and allow farm policy to revert to permanent statutes last updated in 1949.

That could cause major problems for the dairy and soybean industries, among others, and would eliminate newer programs designed to protect environmentally sensitive land and extra dollars for the fruit and vegetable industries.


