Ranchers still skeptical of safety of **National Bio-Lab coming to Kansas**

SALINA (AP) — Although he made no promises, the dean of agriculture at Kansas State University told a cattlemen's group that he believes a new federal laboratory to study livestock diseases is no threat to their herds.

Fred Cholick on Friday assured the Kansas Cattlemen's Convention that he would not be afraid to live next door to the National Bio and Agro-defense Facility, which is expected to open on the Kansas State campus in five or six

"I wouldn't be concerned if my brother-in-law had a beef and sheep operation next to it." Cholick

The government made the best choice when it chose the Kansas State campus as the site for the \$450 million, ultra-secure laboratory, Cholick said.

'We do have the expertise, vision and passion to protect the food industry," he said.

But Cholick's presentation left "a lot of unanswered questions," said Brandy Carter, executive editor of the KCA, which is

based in Junction City with 1,500 members in 24 states. The cattlemen's group wanted the lab to stay at its current site in Plum Island, N.Y. Now that it will be built in Manhattan, KCA members intend to learn more.

"When something happens, we want to make sure there's protection for producers," Carter said.

Cattlemen are concerned about building a lab that researches many of the most deadly diseases for animals, including foot and mouth disease, and some that could infect humans, such as West Nile

No strains that can be passed between humans will be researched at the laboratory.

The group plans to take its concerns to the Department of Homeland Security and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"It depends on the answers we get. We will take it to Congress." Carter said.

Members asked Cholick about compensation if herds, or the food system, are contaminated.

"I just don't have an answer for you (about liability)," Cholick said. "I just don't know.

Cattleman also expressed concerns about potential flooding or a possible terrorist attack on the lab.

And Paul W. Henningsen, of Wamego, asked if foot and mouth disease could be stopped, or if such a scenario would lead to stopping cattle from Mexico to the United

Cholick said the NBAF would look at the migration of disease and how to reduce the effects.

"We can't build a wall around us. We have to understand the organisms and develop countermeasures. It's an approach we need to take," Cholick said.

John Edwards, cattleman from Hamilton, recalled his grandfather's stories about a case of foot and mouth disease that required the killing, burning and burving of livestock in the early 20th century.

"We went through this once, fellers. Let's not let it happen again," Edwards said.

Ranchers hear of what administration may mean for the cattle business

changed political climate and the implications for the cattle industry were discussion topics for a National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) Issues Forum during the 2009 Cattle Industry Convention held recently in Phoenix, Ariz.

Sharing some of their views and expectations with NCBA members were speakers Charlie Stenholm, former congressman from Texas, and Sara Wyant, veteran agricultural policy reporter and president of Agri-Pulse Communications Inc.

Stenholm said he fears the congressional agenda will continue to be complicated with rampant partisan politics. The environment in Washington, D.C., he said, "is the worst that I've seen it." On the positive side, he believes President Obama has made some good choices of people to fill his cabinet.

"Tom Vilsack is a pretty good choice," Stenholm said. "I think he should make a good hand. He seems very teachable." Stenholm said implementing an economic stimulus plan presents a huge challenge, for there is a limit to how much money the world will lend to the U.S. Fundamentally, he added, the country has to make changes in the way it does business. The former congressman warned that U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) must "get its act together" and become the poster child for agency efficiency or face losing regulatory authority over food safety to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The new presidential administration, a country-of-origin labeling (COOL), Stenholm said he can't see how creating trade barriers will benefit the beef industry. However, he called repeal of COOL impractical.

> "Let's see if we can somehow make it work as passed — at least for awhile," he advised. Neither is Stenholm optimistic about repeal of the death tax. He does sense. among members of Congress, some willingness to increase exemption levels. He believes a \$6 million to \$10 million exemption would allow most family farms and ranches to pass to the next generation.

> In her comments, Sara Wyant said, "President Obama is off to a very good start in carrying out his pledge to be transparent. Many of his cabinet picks are very centrist, which could be favorable for agriculture and rural America." However, Wyant expressed uncertainty and even concern regarding some of the new president's choices for advisors and regulatory "czars." Noting how some appointees have extreme environmentalist and animal rightist leanings, she worries about how much weight their extremist views will carry in the new administration. Wyant said she also worries about some of Obama's own statements, which suggest he may be listening to those who unjustly accuse agriculture of contributing to dangerous greenhouse gas emissions, high food prices and diet/health issues that increase health care costs. Obama may be off to a good start, but Wyant wonders where he will land on a number of "wild card issues."

Analyst paints a grim year ahead at national cattle meeting

With a slowing economy and consumers keeping a closer eye on their spending, some of the dynamics in the beef industry are shifting in 2009. Cattlemen attending the annual CattleFax Outlook Seminar here heard that cattlemen face softer beef demand to start 2009, but that could change if the financial markets begin to stabilize.

As in previous years where market volatility was prevalent, risk management will be an important strategy this year. "Know basis," says Randy Blach, executive vice president for Cattle-Fax. "It needs to become second nature. We've got to learn to understand risk."

Consumer are making more meals at home and eating out less at nicer restaurants. That has lowered the value of the higher priced middle meats like the rib and loin. At the same time, the chuck and round are claiming a larger share of carcass value (21 percent vs. 19 per-

cent) compared to a year ago.

Overall cattle supplies are expected to decline in 2009, following a 1.5 percent dip in 2008. Beef cow numbers have declined 600,000 head to 31.9 million in response to drought in some areas and marginal profitability elsewhere. Beef cow slaughter is projected to be at a liquidation pace in 2009. As a result, the calf crop for 2009 and 2010 is projected to shrink by 2 percent.

A decline in cattle inventory means a smaller beef supply and that could bump beef imports to 2.7 billion

pounds for 2009, also encouraged by a stronger dollar that makes the U.S. market more attractive than it was a year ago. Supplies of competing meats also are projected to be lower in 2009, marking the first time in decades that all the major protein supplies have declined. This is happening partly as a result of higher feeding costs in the livestock industry.

Even with softening domestic demand for beef, worldwide demand for protein is increasing, says Brett Stuart, a CattleFax analyst

specializing in exports. While the credit crunch will limit exports to some top markets, U.S. beef exports should post some growth, led by gains in the South Korean market as Mexico continues to be the No. 1 export destination for U.S. beef. For the year, Cattle-Fax projects that beef exports will reach 2.3 billion pounds. That figure taken with net imports represents an improvement in the beef trade gap as U.S. exports continue to rebuild from the 2003 BSE incident.

Increased production costs for corn, estimated to be as much as 30 to 40 percent more than 2008, will impact planting decisions. The current crop is forecast at 12.5 billion bushels, and increased production is needed to meet ethanol demands, although that market is softening. U.S. and world stock levels remain historically low, which tends to support prices.

"You better have a disciplined approach to how you manage risk or you will not like the results," Blach says. Over the last two years the average price of a bushel of corn has increased \$2.70. CattleFax projects that the overall U.S. price for a bushel of corn in 2009 will be lower than 2008, \$4.25 vs. \$5.30.

"Economic conditions and credit availability, especially in foreign markets, are going to affect us a lot this year," Blach says. "We'll get through this and those who do a better job of managing their risk will get through a little better than the rest of us."

Rise in Kansas farm count first since WWII

HUTCHINSON (AP) — A five-year well as the age and gender of operaagriculture census finds that the number of Kansas farms rose for the first time since World War II.

The 2007 Department of Agriculture census released Wednesday says Kansas is seeing more small farms and a growth of its biggest operations, but fewer middle-sized farms. Donn Teske of the Kansas Farmers Union said the drop in mid-sized farms follows a recent trend.

"It's concerning, very much so," Teske said.

The census, required by law, tallies all aspects of farming, including the number, size and value of farms, as tors and the kinds of livestock and crops raised.

Since the 2002 agriculture census, Kansas has 65,531 farms, up 1,117 farms, or about 1.7 percent. Nationally, farm numbers are up 4 percent.

More people are moving from bigger cities to small parcels of land where they are raising small herds of livestock and acres of crops, said Carol House, deputy administer for programs and product at the National Agricultural Statistics Service. There is also evidence of more hobby farm-

The number of farms valued at tion, I'm afraid."

\$500,000 or more increased by 2,201 from 2002 to 2007.

But the number of Kansas farms with values between \$2,500 and \$100,000 declined.

Teske said while the mid-sized farm is disappearing, large farmers are getting larger with fewer operators.

"This shows where the trend is going to continue, that, over the stretch, we'll see a mass concentration of everything," Teske said. "For an organization, and myself, who wants to see competition in a lot of different markets, the current economic downturn is going to speed up concentra-



Ford County Feedyard honored as Hereford Industry Innovator

Ford County Feedyard Inc., was presented the AHA Hereford Industry Innovator Award by the American Hereford Association (AHA). Danny Herrmann, yard owner and manager, was presented the award at the National Western Stock Show Hereford Carload and Pen Show in Denver, Jan. 15.

Ford County Feedyard, Ford, has been a licensed Certified Hereford Beef cattle feeder since 2004 and a participating Hereford Verified yard since the program's inception in 2005.

Danny is one of the most prolific buyers of Hereford feeder cattle in the country. He annually feeds 20,000-25,000 Hereford-influenced cattle. Jim Williams, Certified Hereford Beef (CHB) LLC vice president of supply, says, "The impact made by Ford County many times goes undetected with the countless times it was runner-up bidder, whether in the country, at the sale barn or on the video. Ethanol processing co-product should not be fed to horses, says specialist

Distiller's grains have become a staple in some bovine diets, but a Kansas State University researcher is not recommending that they be used in horse ra-

"People have asked 'can I feed dried or wet distiller's grains with soluble (DDGS) to my horses?" said Teresa Slough, equine nutrition specialist with K-State Research and Extension.

Given the information researchers have so far, Slough said she would not recommend feeding DDGS to horses.

There has been little research done in feeding DDGS, a byproduct of the ethanol production process, to horses, she said. So far, the studies that have been done examined feeding DDGS for only a short period of time.

"There is no information available so far on the longterm effects of feeding DDGS to working horses, mares or foals," she said.

The upside of feeding DDGS to horses is that they will eat it and, in fact, they like it, said Slough, who is an assistant professor in K-State's Department of Animal Sciences and Industry. In addition, it is sometimes a less expensive source of

But Slough warns that the disadvantages outweigh the advantages. "Horses are very susceptible to fumonisin poisoning from moldy corn. Fermentation during ethanol production doesn't destroy the mold, rather it is concentrated.

"Feeding DDGS contaminated with fumonisin just once could cause death," she said.

Another disadvantage, the researcher said, is that DDGS has a high phosphorous content.

"Unless the other feedstuffs in the horse's diet are very high in calcium, the potential exists to create a diet inversed in its Ca:P ratio and negatively affect bone development," Slough added. "This is of particular concern with broodmares and foals."

DDGS has a high sulfur content, which also makes it problematic for

"Sulfur toxicity in horses, although rare, can result in colic, jaundiced mucous membranes, labored breathing, cyanosis and convulsions, followed by death," she said.

"The bottom line is, feeding DDGS to horses is not recommended unless it's been tested for fumonisin and contains less than 5 parts per million, and then it should only comprise a small percentage of the total



Obama administration sends trade signals

Obama wasted little time in sending messages that the U.S. trade agenda has changed.

U.S. Trade Representative Designate Ron Kirk and his staff will take a hard line in compliance with commonly accepted trade principles, such as manipulation; currency and monitoring and enforcing trade agreements, says Rebecca Bratter, Trade Policy Specialist with U.S. Wheat Associates.

Democrat members of the House Ways and Means Committee have proposed legislation that beefs up enforcement of U.S. trade laws, including imposing sanctions on countries that violate trade agreements. The Trade Enforcement Act of 2009 also would give the U.S. Trade Representative's office more resources for fighting unfair trade practices of other countries.

House Democrats also outlined expansion of the Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) program as part of the \$825 billion economic stimulus proposal, Bratter says. Bi-partisan support for the bill exists, and an agreement is close

expand TAA benefits to cover workers who lost their jobs because of trade.

"The bipartisan, bicameral plan will expand TAA benefits not just to services workers, but also communities impacted by trade," Bratter says. "It also will improve current health insurance benefits under the program. If finalized in time, the plan will be added to the stimulus package as an amendment when the legislation goes to the Senate floor."

Bratter reports that President Obama wants to win Congressional approval of stalled free-trade deals with Colombia, Panama and South Korea, but more work is needed. Upon conclusion of his term, President Bush said his failure to win approval of the three agreements was one of the biggest disappointments of his second term. The issue threatening the free-trade deal was whether the administration was prepared to insist on the protection of labor leaders in Colombia. Now that Democrats are controlling both the White House and Congress, it should be possible to work out a solu-

on the bill, which would tion with Colombia that resolves concerns.

> President Obama is committed to upgrading NAFTA to strengthen labor and environmental provisions shared by the United States and Mexico. He proposes creation of a consultative group to work on a host of issues important to the United States and Mexico, including NAFTA, energy and infrastructure.

> "NAFTA has been an important success for the US wheat industry and for US agriculture." Bratter says. "With talk in Mexico of extending NAFTA tariff concessions to other wheat exporting nations, it is crucial that an upgrade of the agreement does not include reopening the text nor changing the terms."

> Bratter says Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack has weighed in on trade. saying that the USDA must make sure the interests of U.S. farmers are "not bargained away." He also pledged to review the Bush administration's initial implementation of the 2008 farm bill and resolve longstanding racial discrimination issues at USDA.

> > Vilsack's choice for Ad-

ministrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service, which provides funding to U.S. Wheat Associates the Market Assistance and Foreign Market Development programs, will be a good indicator of the department's stance on trade. USW will continue to work closely with the USDA and the Foreign Agricultural Serv-

Vilsack, meanwhile, has introduced his priorities for the USDA. He told the Senate Agriculture Committee he would "make a serious effort to market good eating habits as a way of helping your country."

He also noted during his confirmation hearing that farmers across the country share concerns over the lack of control over input costs, the weather and other production factors. All farmers, Vilsack says, deserve "multiple opportunities" to benefit from a variety of USDA programs, including subsidies, conservation and trade programs. Conservation programs, he emphasizes, create rural jobs.

Rural Life

Farmers, how do you live with risk?

An awesome responsibility of farmers is to reduce risk in a business environment that is inherently competitive and risky. Production has to be good. Cash flow is important. Marketing is crucial. The potential is there to make good money and have really good years.

The downside is that farming can have major losses even when the decisions are sound. It is a nervy, high stress way of making a living. Add to that how much farmers love their profession and rural, family based lifestyle, and strong emotions enter the decision-making process.

What to plant? When to plant? How to market? How to deal with equipment repair and replacement? What to spray and when? Fertilizers? Major land purchases? Is there enough work and income to support additional families? What about new technology and new ideas?

With the mainstream economy in recession, how will agriculture be affected? Where is alternative energy headed? Where are prices going to go? Will the cost of inputs come down? Has the boom gone bust too quickly? What will the weather bring?

Depression and anxiety can paralyze the decision-making process. Depression needs medical and psychological attention. Some farmers develop excessive worry or anxiety about their fears and decision-making. Obsessive worry can take the fun out of farming.

How do you reduce psychological risks as well as business risks?

Seek information. Consult with knowledgeable people. Be a good listener. Attend conferences. Get "big picture" information about weather, markets, new technology, etc. Do a "pro" and "con" list but also take your 'gut" feeling into account.

Have consensus decisions on big ticket items. Persuade, educate and give your farming partners time to think through the issue and give their ideas. A family business meeting is ideal for drawing out ideas and developing a unified strategy on key decisions.

Some decisions (land, major equipment) may take months and even years uity base and savings that enable you ture Service

before they are enacted. If decisions are made this way, there will be no "I told you so's." Family members will share in the responsibility. Both sides of an issue need to come out with plenty of comparison information and shopping around to be done.

Control business risks. Carry out experimental decisions on part of your operation before converting the whole enterprise to new ideas. Innovations need to be proven with first hand experience or based on proven results and research data from a trusted

No second guessing. It is a matter of controlling the controllable and letting go of the uncontrollable. Once a decision has been made, detach from it and have the patience to sit back and wait. To second guess or blame oneself puts unnecessary agony and anxiety into

There are plenty of day-to-day decisions to worry about without revisiting a decision you've already made. Make the tough decisions and then work hard to make the decisions the right ones. The time to rethink major decisions is only after new developments

Mistakes are normal. Mistakes are useful information upon which to make future decisions. Success is based on paying attention to mistakes and correcting them. Nobody is perfect. By trying things, people learn and improve what they are doing. As one farmer said, "We try not to make the same mistake twice."

Look at your track record. You also benefit from your inner confidence in your overall decision making. Success builds on success. If over the years your decisions have generally been good, then new circumstances cannot intimidate you as easily.

You may not know the immediate answers, but you have confidence because you have risen to the occasion over and over again. Your experience in farming gives you the security of making decisions under stressful circumstances. Basic optimism goes a long way in life and in farming.

Don't farm on the edge. Decisionmaking is easier when you have an eqto withstand the bad years and capitalize on the good years. A lot of pressure can be relieved when you set aside savings or investments that can buffer hard times. The conservative use of money and the retirement of debt after good years sets you up for a calmer existence in the future.

Seek advice. Farming on the edge has higher levels of stress as the threat of loss becomes more real. If you have high debt loads and a tenuous foothold in farming despite your best decisions, you will battle depression and anxiety.

If you are in this position, consult with outside sources for an analysis of your situation and be open to options and alternatives. Stress will moderate when people have hope and confidence that they have a good plan and that it is working.

Step away from farming. Take time for quality family life, hobbies, community involvement, church activities, friendships, leisure and develop an ability to relax. Be a team with your spouse and make your marriage a source of pleasure.

You manage personal stress better by having outlets that go beyond work and farming. It will bring perspective to farming. If something needs to be done then you do it.

Decisions are the building blocks of life. The big ones take thought, communication and work. Then take a step back, watch, learn, adjust, have fun and go easy on yourself as circumstances unfold. Life is serious but not that serious

Quilts turn barns into works of art

HATTON, Mo. (AP) — To the untrained eye, the Boonville and Marshall. len's Callaway County organic farm is merely a relic. A faded memento to an agrarian life better suited for history books — if not the wrecking ball.

McMillen had another notion. With the help of a local artist, a colorful and prominent quilt now adorns the barn's side. The afterthought is now a work of art, part of a growing movement to promote rural tourism through driver-friendly quilt trails along the nation's back

"These buildings are valuable and wonderful and precious. We can't let them die," said McMillen, a Westminster College English instructor. "An awful number of barns have disappeared, or are just falling apart."

The preservation effort remains a work in progress in Missouri, with a smattering of barn quilts in Call-

Tennessee, home to an 81quilt driving tour in the Appalachian region; or Ohio, Iowa and Kentucky, which each boast more than 250 barn quilts.

The Tennessee project stretches through six counties in the rugged Appalachian Mountain foothills in the state's Northeast corner. The effort enjoys state support, draws inquiries from as far away as Japan and has proven so popular that the state has commissioned a Tennessee Appalachian Quilt Trail license plate.

Ethanol plants saw no profit in December

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — As the price of corn tumbled in the last six months of 2008, so did the price of ethanol, leaving producers with little profits.

That trend turned worse in December. Iowa State University Extension economist Don Hofstrand says the average ethanol plant made zero profit that month.

And Hofstrand isn't opti-

mistic about 2009. He says higher corn production costs will increase the cost of production.

The news isn't much better for corn producers.

The National Corn Growers Association was looking to use the economic stimulus package to pay for rebuilding locks and dams on the upper Mississippi River to speed movement of grain barges.

Water heater replacement can significantly impact home's energy use, says expert

Residential water heaters typically use 13 to 17 percent of the energy consumed within the home, yet more than half are purchased without the benefits of comparison shopping simply because they can be easily installed after the sudden failure of the old heater, a Kansas State University specialist said.

A residential water heater will usually carry a five- or 10-year warranty, but many will provide satisfactory service long after the warranty has expired, said Bruce Snead, a K-State Research and Extension residential energy specialist.

So, how can a homeowner know when to replace an aging water heater?

The volume of use and water quality usually factor into the life of the appliance, Snead said. A residential water heater will have to work harder when a growing family has several teens taking lengthy showers. And, in a hard-water area, build-up of minerals in the water tank also can clog water lines and shorten the life of the appliance.

While the failure of the appliance can catch a homeowner off guard, cold water from a hot water tap, a leak, an inability to produce the amount of water needed or to produce hot water consistently may be signs that it's time to look for a new water heater. Other signals such as regular clanging, popping or other noises also can signal the need to call a plumber and, most likely, shop for a replacement, Snead said.

His tips for choosing and using a water heater include: Water heater storage tanks typically range from 40- to 80-gallon capacity, with a 50- to 60-gallon water heater most commonly sold. The size of the household, needs of the family, and first hour rating, which is the amount of hot water in gallons the heater can supply per hour (starting with a tank full of hot water), should be considered in gauging the capacity needed.

Look for appliances that have earned the "Energy Star" rating and label with the estimated operating cost, and compare expected performance and warranty.

The EnergyGuide Label on the appliance lists the first hour rating in the top left corner as "Capacity," and also shows the energy factor (EF) indicating the unit's overall energy efficiency. Energy efficiency is based on the amount of hot water produced per unit of fuel consumed over a typical day. The Energy Star website is: www.energystar.gov.

Consider the availability and cost of fuel. In Kansas, natural gas and electricity are commonly used to fuel a water heater. Other options are a heat pump, which draws heat from the air within the home and transfers it to the water; a solar water heater, which can provide up to 100 percent of residential hot water needs during summer months and up to 25 to 35 percent of the hot water needed during winter months, potentially meeting 50 percent of annual residential hot water demand; or a tankless hot water heater, which can heat water on demand and increase the availability of hot water in a high-use area. Locating a tankless hot water heater near a kitchen sink is an example.

Replacement/installation of a water heater can cost \$500 to \$1,000 or more, depending on the size and type of water heater, timeliness of the installation and the location of the installation in proximity to the water system. For example there may be an installation price difference for a basement versus a second or third floor, near bedrooms, a bath or laundry area.

Set water temperature at 120 degrees F to hold down utility costs and reduce the risk of accidental scalding, particularly for children and older adults. Check the water temperature periodically by running hot water into a glass measuring cup and measuring the temperature with a kitchen thermometer.

Installing an insulated "jacket" on an older residen-

tial water heater can help to hold down energy costs, especially if it is located in an unheated or colder space. Insulating pipes, particularly within a crawl space, can be helpful in reducing energy

Choosing an energy-saving appliance can yield long-term savings for a homeowner, who may qualify for a low-interest loan to assist with the purchase of the new energy-efficient appliance, Snead said.



Agency issues guidelines to assist with crop insurance coverage decisions for land just out of CRP

that acreage must have been planted and harvested in at least one of the three previous crop years unless such acreage was left unplanted in order to comply with any other USDA program. Therefore, acreage coming out of a Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contract would be insurable.

To establish a production guarantee for the acreage emerging from CRP, the policyholder may provide acceptable production history for the year(s) the crop was grown prior to the acreage's enrollment in CRP.

If the crop was grown prior to enrollment in CRP; but, acceptable production history is not provided, yields are established differently based on whether the CRP acres are a separate unit.

For acreage emerging from CRP that will be a separate unit:

Coverage will be based on a percentage of the Transitional-Yield (T-Yield). The T-Yield percentage will be based on the number of years of production records the producer has on other land for the same crop and county.

For example: If a producer has 4 years of actual production history for the crop in the county on other acreage, the acres

Federal crop insurance policies require emerging from CRP would receive 100% of the county T-Yield.

If the entire farm operation (all cropland acres) were enrolled in CRP, the percentage of the T-Yield will be 100 percent.

If the CRP acreage is part of an existing unit, it will take the approved yield of the existing unit.

All carryover policyholders must provide production reports.

One thing that producers need to be aware of is that in certain counties (counties west of U.S. Highway 183), insurance for nonirrigated wheat acreage is rated separately for summerfallow and continuous cropping practices. There are also some counties in Kansas that do not have a continuous crop practice established for wheat. To qualify as summerfallow for fall 2009 planting, the land must have been broken out of CRP by fall 2008 and lie fallow for a full crop year.

Based on this definition, anything broken in the spring to be planted in the fall would be considered a continuous cropping

Land broken in the fall of 2009 prior to fall planting would be eligible for coverage as summer fallow for the 2011 crop year.

Grass strips help curb erosion, herbicide transport

Grass filter strips placed in riparian zones not only curb soil erosion, but can help block and degrade the widely used herbicide atrazine, Agricultural Research Service (ARS) scientists report.

Atrazine has been used extensively to suppress weeds in corn production for decades, but because it's applied directly to soil it's especially prone to losses in surface runoff. The contamination of surface water by atrazine and its less-toxic breakdown components has raised ecological concerns.

Riparian zones are transitional areas between upland areas, such as crop fields, and water bodies. The grasses and other vegetation in these zones help reduce pollution in streams and lakes.

Bob Lerch, a soil scientist in the ARS Cropping Systems and Water Quality Research Unit in Columbia, Mo., is working with colleagues in the unit and with University of Missouri research assistant professor for forestry Chung-Ho Lin to study the effect of different grass species on herbicide transport and degradation in field and growth chamber

In the growth chamber, the grasses studied were orchardgrass, smooth bromegrass, tall fescue, Illinois bundle flower, ryegrass, switchgrass, and eastern gammagrass. Plants were allowed to grow for 3 months, to maturity. The rhizosphere soil--the soil zone that surrounds and is influenced by the roots of plants--was then separated from the plants and roots. Atrazine was then added to the rhizosphere soils and incubated in the dark for 100 days at 77 F. The researchers then measured atrazine degradation and mineralization--the conversion of atrazine to carbon dioxide.

Among the plant species, eastern gammagrass showed the highest capacity for promoting atrazine degradation. More than 90 percent of applied atrazine was degraded to less-toxic forms, compared to 24 percent in the control. Rhizosphere soil of orchardgrass, smooth bromegrass, and switchgrass also enhanced atrazine degradation.

The studies have shown that grass buffers reduced the transport of herbicides to shallow groundwater and in runoff. These buffers can reduce herbicide transport through trapping of sediment and by increased infil tration of water into the

Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

Tuesday is the February supply and demand report. I don't expect to see a great deal of changes in the U.S. numbers. We could see another increase in the soybean export estimate and perhaps another cut in the crush estimate. For the corn and wheat, I won't be surprised to see no changes at all. The world numbers are a different story. We could see significant cuts in the South American corn and soybean production estimates and therefore cuts in world ending stocks.

The natural gas market posted a weekly reversal higher this week, which is a good sign that a bottom has been made, but we have seen moves like this before and never got any follow through higher. We definitely have to keep a close eye on this market for a hedging opportunity.

The March corn lost 1 1/2 cents last week. The market started the week poorly, but finished off strong on Thursday and Friday.

Better than expected rainfall in South America pressured the soybeans and in turn the corn, but by the end of the week the drier forecasts and strength in the stock market changed traders attitudes. We also had another good week of export sales. Last week's total was 1.16 MMT and was the third marketing year high is a row. Another interesting fact is that this

week's sales were above year ago levels for the first were watching that. There time this crop year.

Things have definitely improved on the demand front and if we can keep export sales above 700,000 MT a week another month or so, analysts will start talking about the need to increase the export estimate. With the problems in South America we have a realistic chance of seeing exports end up being much better than USDA has estimated. Keep in mind that the current export estimate of 1.750 billion bushels is the lowest since the 02/03 crop year and even if it were raised by 300 million bushels it would still be the lowest since 04/05. In other words there is plenty of room for improvement.

The wheat market was the weak link last week. The March KW lost about 14 cents despite the lack of bearish news.

Export sales were ok at 326,800 MT. That is more than adequate, but not enough to impress a speculator. We are also still dealing with competition from Russia, which is one thing keeping us from having impressive sales totals. Every week we get closer to the Russians being sold out, but we aren't there yet.

It is still dry in the HRW area and the drought monitor map looks worse than it did a week ago. There is, however, rain in the fore-

cast, so perhaps traders were watching that. There is also rain forecast for dry areas of China that have been in the news lately. The thing to keep in mind though, is that the rain is only forecast and it hasn't hit the ground yet, so a dry weekend could result in some strength next week.

Most of the wheat's problem this week appeared to be that it was the short leg of corn-wheat and soybeanwheat spreads. That weighed on the market as much as anything. A little bit of wheat specific positive news would cause those spreads to unwind.

The soybeans were very sensitive to the weather in South America last week. In the end the forecasts were dry and the March beans gained 21 cents and nearly recovered all of last week's losses.

Export sales were good at 336,600 MT and meal and oil sales were also good. Oil sales in next week's report will be outstanding. Since crush has been the biggest problem that the market has had, it is good to see large meal and oil sales getting rid of some supply.

This week the things to watch will be the world ending stocks figure, the U.S. export figure, and the forecasts in South America. Weather will probably trump the other two at this point so be prepared for more volatility.

2009 offers potential for prosperity and peril in export market, says speaker

in 2008 exceeded the expectations of many, 2009 could provide even more drama, with the potential for significant improvements as well as the risk of major setbacks, according to one industry leader.

U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) past chairman Dan Halstrom offered his assessment of the global business climate to cattle producers attending the 2009 Cattle Industry Convention and Trade Show in Phoenix. Halstrom, the senior vice president for international sales at JBS, told members of the Joint International Markets Committee that 2008 was a strong year for U.S. beef exports, even though global economic volatility made the final months of the year very challenging.

The first eight months of 2008 were like a dream, where all the stars were aligned for success," he said. "But during the last four months of the year, I was more of a credit manager than a sales manager." Looking ahead, Halstrom identified South Korea, Japan, Canada and Mexico as the foreign markets holding the highest priority for JBS, primarily because the stability and reliability these markets offer during times of very tight credit. He specifically singled out Japan as having the largest potential for growth if the pool of cattle eligible for export to that nation could be expanded from 20 months of age to 30 months.

'People are estimating that a 30-month age limit in Japan could be worth \$80 to \$90 per head in incremental value for cattle producers," Halstrom said. "But I think it could even exceed \$100 if we can get variety meats included. Japan really wants U.S. beef, but we don't have enough cattle that qualify. It's a situation that Australia has really been taking advantage of."

While the U.S. government has been seeking approval for beef from cattle of all ages, industry experts believe that expanding the age limit to 30 months could restore as much as 95 pe cent of the U.S. export busi-

Halstrom cautioned cattlemen not to assume that a 30-month age limit would eliminate the need for age verification. He said retailers in Japan are likely to continue to require age verification, even if the age limit is expanded to include the majority of fed cattle. On the risk side of the spectrum for 2009, Halstrom expressed great concern over potential interruptions in

While U.S. beef exports trade with Canada and Mexico because of their importance to U.S. exporters. Both Canada and Mexico have raised issues regarding the United States' implementation of Country of Origin Labeling (COOL).

"It is estimated that the loss of the NAFTA markets would cost cattle producers \$50 to \$60 per head," Halstrom said, "but I think it would be quite a bit more than that because of all the end cuts and variety meats we would have to absorb into the domestic market."

Halstrom noted that despite the severe economic downturn, U.S. beef exports through the first 11 months of 2008 increased 29 percent in volume and 40 percent in value over the same period in 2007. When all 2008 results are final, beef exports will total well over billion pounds

more than \$3.5 billion in value. Both the per-head export premium for cattle and the percent of total U.S. beef production exported are approaching the pre-BSE peaks achieved in

He cited four major challenges the beef industry must overcome in order to maximize export growth in 2009: global liquidity; risk related to specific markets; a strong U.S. dollar; and shifts in demand toward lowercost cuts and proteins. "At JBS, we expect to grow our U.S. beef exports in excess of the industry forecast of 6 percent, but this will require a change in the way we do business," Halstrom said.
"We need to manage our risk carefully, and focus on stable markets and affordable cuts. Opportunities are there, but if we don't take advantage of them, other

Later in the Joint International Markets Committee meeting, the committee formally addressed the age limit on beef exports to Japan by unanimously passing a resolution brought forward by representatives of the Nebraska Cattlemen. The resolution urged U.S. negotiators to pursue Japan's approval of a 30month age limit as an incremental step toward restoring full access to the market. The following day, the resolution was approved by members of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) at its annual meeting. The directive will become official association policy if it is approved by a majority of NCBA members though a mail-in ballot process that concludes in mid-March.



Health costs impact entire feedyard

Low mortality isn't the only way to measure the success of your health program.

Pfizer veterinarian Robin Falkner told attendees at last fall's Feeding Quality Forums, held in North Platte, Neb., and Amarillo, Texas, to start thinking about disease management a little differently.

"We want to worry about things that can change and that can matter," he said.

Consider the steer with a 10% chance of living. A cowboy treats him, sends him to a holding pen and spends extra time with him — only to increase his chance of survival to 14%.

"Your total focus is on saving that one," Falkner noted. "How much of my time can I burn up on him that I could better invest somewhere else? In this situation, the bunks aren't cleaned out. The water troughs aren't getting cleaned. We don't have that extra five minute in another pen to pull one early."

A change of mindset would help the bottom line, Falkner said: "We need to move away from asking what can we do to save him to asking what he can kill."

That's because the real risk goes beyond wasting time. That one calf is shedding to the rest of the population — after all, he has pathogens that have already beaten the drugs and management at that yard, Falkner said. "That's why it's not about saving him. It's about saving the other

Rather than managing health on an animal-by-animal basis, feeders need to think of keeping disease under control in groups of cattle and their yard as a

"I'm not a veterinarian who thinks the world revolves around health, but if you intentionally manage pathogens, your world will change," Falkner said. He referenced Texas Ranch-to-Rail data that shows a sick calf costs \$100, and Iowa research illustrates a 10point drop in Certified Angus Beef ® (CAB®) acceptance rate for calves treated twice.

"That's not the whole story, though, because it affected the other calves in the pen," he said. Sick cattle cause problems with everything from bunk reading to final marketing, but managing health will improve both the efficiency of groups of cattle and the feedyard as a whole.

"Does heath impact any decisions we make about filling pens at any point in time? I think it's the biggest bottleneck to profitability we've got," Falkner said. "We are scared to buy certain types and classes of cattle because we don't know if we can handle the health. We're scared to wreck and overload our labor."

When those health disasters happen, feeders often put off buying until they have it under control. Some try to change vaccines, nutritionist, veterinarians or even order buy-

know is probably not a good deal," he said. Instead, Falkner provid-

ed some practical prevention recommendations, including not placing your hospital pen next door to receiving.

"You don't know how many feedyards I've been to where the cattle are going to stand right next to a pen of chronics, overnight, before they're processed in the morning," he said. Following up with ironic humor, he asked, "Are you just trying to inoculate them early so we can go ahead and get over it? We make sure we give our brand new, naïve, stressed-out cattle good, early access to the worst bugs we've collected in the past six months, year or 10 years."

He also suggests keeping cattle out of that treatment pen if at all possible.

"A low flow of cattle into the hospital works well, because that flushes the bugs out regularly and they don't accumulate as much," he said.

Cattle that have been in the yard for 10 to 35 days are the "most dangerous," Falkner said. "The bugs have all gone through them and they're shedding a whole lot."

Sometimes sickness doesn't show itself in one group of cattle until you mix them with another after they've had a couple of weeks to get settled in the vard.

"You create the perfect storm and you blow them completely up," he said. "This disease is going on in one group and by itself it's not any more than a runny nose, but you put it on top of another disease that's going through the other group and it's really bad."

Taking a careful look at every aspect of bio-containment could help prevent "real wrecks," Falkner said. "You're going to get the bad bugs. You're going to select for them when you use those drugs, but you don't have to accumulate them and you don't have to inoculate them."

More women working on Kansas farms

HUTCHINSON (AP) - Back in the 1970s, when Sue Ann Peter left Kansas for the bright lights of San Antonio, she didn't know when she'd be back.

She knew someday she'd return near the small town of Ellinwood, where she grew up. But the last thing she figured on was finding true love amid central Kansas cropland.

Nearly 30 years later, you'll find 57-year-old Peter alongside her husband, helping him run a small farm operation in Rice County between her day job at the county Farm Service Agency office.

"He taught me to pick up hay, drive the tractor," Peter said of her husband, Rollie, whom she married a few years ago. She added that her list of chores also includes checking the cat-

Although it's still considered a male profession, the number of women who work on the state's farms and ranches has grown dramatically, according to the 2007 census of agriculture data that was recently released.

The report shows 26,794 women farm operators in Kansas, compared with

20,959 in 2002, a nearly 28 percent increase.

Moreover, 7,940 women are the farm's principal operator, up 40 percent from the 5,660 in 2002. Before 2002, the census only acknowledged women's role in the occupation if they were the primary operator.

Mark Schwarzentraub, an extension farm economist with the Hutchinson office of the Kansas Farm Management Association, said he has noticed more women taking front-seat roles on the farm. The association works cooperatively with farm families to provide production and financial management information to help with the decision-making.

"I think it is more prevalent today; they're bolder about it," he said. "Many of the women I work with have the responsibility of the banking, they work with the FSA office, they do the recordkeeping. There are many times I make these visits, and I don't see the husbands."

The growing number has created a movement of sorts as more women want to be educated about farming's daily grind. This week on Thursday through Saturday, organizers expect more than 300 women to attend the Women Managing the Farm conference Hutchinson.

Topics include insurance, estate planning and Farm Bill program changes, as well as organization, networking and family relationships.

Some have been involved in agriculture all their lives. Some are widows who have taken over the farm. Others, like Peter, married into the business.

Whatever the reason, the growing number spurred women to want to be more educated, said Mary Shaffer, with the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Salina, who added that sometimes women feel in-

timidated raising their hands and asking questions in a roomful of men.

It's the fourth year for the women's farm conference, but the bigger effort, Shaffer said, has spurred county and regional groups to meet about topics from crop insurance to simple meal ideas to take to the field.

Smaller groups meet in Beloit and Newton. Peter has been attending a subgroup in Rice County for the past year.

"It's good for women in agriculture to network," said Rice County Extension Agriculture Agent Frannie Miller, who formed the local group. "Many of them are facing the same obstacles, some of the same problems."





Digitized prairie natural history collections available

The biodiversity of the ecosystem of Kansas and the Great Plains in the 19th century fascinated peers of Darwin. They collected specimens avidly and cataloged the collections, looking for patterns and interactions.

The importance of understanding the natural world led Kansas State University to establish a plant museum, or herbarium, in 1877, and an insect museum in 1879 well before farming and ranching dominated the prairie.

Scientists ever since have relied on these K-State collections as a primary source of vouchered information about what species once existed in Kansas and about species distributional changes, including changes across a significant portion of the North American prairie ecosystem that's now imperiled.

the K-State Today, herbarium ranks among the oldest, largest and most diverse plant collections in the Great Plains with holdings of preserved plants estimated at 200,000 specimens. The insect collection contains approximately 835,000 specimens, including some extinct, endangered or declining species.

K-State has now opened an ambitious digitization project that makes about all of its core historical natural history collections accessible to anyone from anywhere in the world. The biodiversity information system Web portal BiodIS available http://biodis.k-state.edu

"The K-State Digital Prairie Plant and Insect Collection: Elevating Biodiversity and Bioinformatics to the Next Level" is a four-year, \$800,000 project funded by the university through its Targeted Excellence program. Directing the project are Greg Zolnerowich, associate professor of entomology and curator of the insect museum; Carolyn Ferguson, associate professor of biology and curator of the herbarium; Mike Haddock, professor and chair of the sciences department for K-State Libraries: and David B. Allen, associate professor and head of the K-State Libraries digital initiatives department. Early-stage support for the project came from National Science Foundation and its EPSCoR program, the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station and K-State Libraries.

K-State's project parallels similar efforts worldwide to digitize collections at natural history museums, herbaria and universities, and eventually to link, via common access points, all the resulting databases to ever-larger networks of like collections.

The K-State databases will link via the BiodIS portal to the vast Global Biodiversity Information Facility, which currently includes 47 countries and 33 organizations as participants.

By scientific custom, every plant or insect specimen is labeled with its scientific name, where and when it was collected, the habitat associated with it, the collector's name and other details. In year two of the K-State project, data about 56,000 of the 800,000 pinned insects and 107,000 herbarium records have been entered into the database, and specimens are being moved to modern storage cabinets for safekeeping.

"Each of the million specimens in our holdings can be seen as a little snapshot of the flora and fauna of the spot where it was collected," said Mark Mayfield, the herbarium's databasing coordinator and plant identification specialist. "One of our aims in digitizing is capturing all the data from the specimens and making that data available to anyone in the world.'
