

Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay trade moderate to active. Demand moderate to strong for dairy, stock cow, grinding alfalfa and alfalfa pellets, moderate for grass hay. Fall grain harvest is winding down everywhere but northwest Kansas, stalks are being baled and grazed. Alfalfa baling is done except for those waiting for a freeze to cut and bale the last cutting. The first freeze is late this year in much of the state. Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

This week we have an election and an FOMC meeting, both of which could cause gyrations in the markets. The FOMC meeting has the potential to cause the biggest moves and the most volatility, because no one is sure what the Fed will say about the latest round of quantitative easing, or how traders will react to the news. The general consensus is that there will be another \$500 billion to \$1 trillion put into the money supply, but we are all waiting on the details of how that will be done. Thoughts are that if the package is smaller than \$500 billion it would be supportive to the dollar and therefore negative to the rest of the markets and if the plan calls for more than \$1 trillion then it will be negative to the dollar and therefore supportive to commodities in general.

The natural gas market showed some signs of life for the first time in months. Natural gas is cheap relative to many other markets, which isn't a good reason to buy, but be aware that we are seeing the first indications of a change in trend.

Friday the December corn made its best close of the year and finished 22 cents higher for the week. Ideas that USDA will make

another significant cut to the yield estimate keeps solid support under the corn market as do persistent rumors that China will eventually be a significant importer of corn. We haven't seen big purchases by China yet, and in fact exports have been relatively poor, but if the Chinese do make big buys the corn market will be explosive, which has bearish traders nervous.

The charts also suggest further strength in the corn market. I am still looking for the December corn to reach the \$6.20 area before expiration. Beyond that, it will depend on what our final yield actually is and if the export market improves. There is also the issue with the U.S. Dollar and if the trend remains down for a prolonged period of time.

Finally, the wheat is moving out of the sideways pattern it has been stuck in for months. The December KW gained 52 cents last week and reached the highest level since mid September. Meanwhile the July contract made a new contract high of \$8.03 and gained 50 cents for the week.

The fundamental outlook is getting friendlier. Dry weather in the HRW region is already causing traders to think about production problems next summer. Plus we still have all the is-

sues with weather in Russia and Australia. Low production in either of those areas next year would help to draw down world supplies significantly and send wheat prices even higher.

With last week's break out, the charts now suggest we will see the March KW move up to the \$8.83 level and longer term a move up to \$10.00 is not out of the question. The technicals look very good after such a long period of consolidation. Be prepared for large gains.

The soybeans made new highs for the move last week and the market continues to grind higher. The January soybeans gained 24 1/2 cents for the week.

Soybean export sales were tremendous again at 2.03 MMT. There seems to be no end to the Chinese appetite for our soybeans and we have to expect another big sales number in this week's report. This year's sales total would now be the 8th largest ever if the mar-

keting year ended now, but we still have over 10 months left in the crop year.

The market is still overbought, so we could see a correction at any time, but breaks are a buying opportunity. Long term we are still looking for the July contract to reach the \$12.80 area and if the Chinese keep buying, the market could move much higher.

The December LC made two consecutive closes below the 50-day moving average, which I don't like, but the market did hold support just above the \$98 area. Technical traders will look at a close below \$98.15 as very negative to the market, so watch that level closely this week.

I liked the fact that the boxed beef market was firm last week, but the lower cash trade and lower futures don't feel good to me. I will say that the feeder cattle held on rather well considering the weakness in the live cattle and the strength in the corn, and maybe that is something I should be optimistic about.

Lee Ranch wins CAB Commercial Commitment to Excellence award

Bill and Judy Lee admit they didn't know much about cows when they graduated from Kansas State University (K-State) and married in 1963. "But we were determined to learn," says Bill.

Across the span of 47 years, they would raise sons Nathan and Patrick, and develop the ranch into a source for some of the most predictable and high-quality commercial Angus cattle in the country. Lee Ranch was named 2010 Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) Commercial Commitment to Excellence Award winner at the CAB Annual Conference in San Juan, Puerto Rico, Oct. 1. Nathan traveled to the conference along with his children to accept the award.

The Lees started with Herefords and built a name on the show circuit, but saw their future in the commercial market. That led them to start using registered Angus bulls 20 years ago when Nathan came back from K-State to partner in the ranch. "We might have coasted toward retirement with 300 Herefords, but instead we began the transition to Angus and expanded to support another family," Bill says. The last traces of baldy influence in their 1,200 cows were sold five years ago.

"If we were just selling feeder cattle, we might con-

sider crossbreeding with Charolais or Simmental, but feeding our cattle, as we have for 15 years, and adding value, our need for predictability and simplicity points to Angus genetics," Nathan says. "The Angus EPDs [expected progeny differences] go back to 1977, so Angus genetics have a 10- or 15-year jump on predictability over other breeds."

Terminal crossbreeding would complicate pasture rotations and herd composition, as well as relationships with neighbors who all run Angus bulls, he adds. It's also important to avoid complications at calving. "In our low-labor operation we just can't afford to babysit even the heifers, and with Angus bulls, we never worry about it," Nathan says. Steers perform well in the feedlot and this year saw acceptance rates of more than 73% Certified Angus Beef (CAB®) brand. "But the better money may be in the really nice Angus females," he adds. "It really is 'the business breed.'"

Bill and Judy say course work with the Ranching for Profit School and animal handling lessons from Bud Williams helped build their focus on profit generation. Judy's degree in zoology (pre-veterinary track), and Bill's in economics help them evaluate new ideas.

Artificial insemination (AI) had been a basic tool for several years when in 1999, they began a five-year program of ultrasound-scanning all heifers to help find the top ones to make up an elite sustaining herd of the top 10% of cows.

"At first, there was a lot of variation in the heifers, and we were lucky to find some with 5% intramuscular fat (IMF)," Nathan says. "We kept track of those and noticed that it made a difference—their daughters have 7% IMF." "It's not complete-

ly about the numbers," he adds. "We might pick some that excel for disposition and phenotype as well as their EPDs and sire. Of course, we look at progeny data, where we want to see a pattern of consistency for Prime or CAB."

Developing nearly all heifers for replacements, and breeding them AI to Angus bulls with highly predictable carcass traits has had the planned side effect: no more selling cows by the pound.

"Our goal is to sell young bred cows by the head, and turn the generations just as fast as we can for genetic progress," Bill says. Another recent change for the Lee herd is the use of their own AI-sired bulls from that top herd to improve uniformity, which along with grade is key to the value-based market, Judy says.

She recalls the first years of feeding black baldies, when an entire pen was sold based on average finish: "Some cattle would be too big, and there would be the little guys that were Select and a couple of Standards because they were too young." Since 1998, their calves have been finished at Pratt Feeders, 2010 CAB Feedlot Partner of the Year, which nominated the Lees for the CAB cow-calf award. "They really know what they are doing when they sort for those truckloads," Judy says. "This year we only had three Select steers; the rest were Choice and Prime, and the whole bunch averaged more than 60% CAB."

Both ranch and feedyard are charter members of U.S. Premium Beef. "If you're going to build a superior product and go through the expense of creating those genetics, the only way to get paid is to feed them out and realize that bonus on the grid through U.S. Premium

and Certified Angus Beef," Bill says. Harvest reports show ups and downs in the truckload lots over the years, but the average quality keeps improving. As they

keep evaluating new ideas, it's a sure bet the Lees won't implement them unless they combine simplicity with sustainability and profit, with consumers in mind.

How You Can Tell If Your Children Are Finally Adults

You get through the teenage years. Your very mature and capable high school graduates go off to college, join the service, or go away from home to work. You can relax now. These young adults are now grown up and on their own, right?

Wrong! At least, not quite. Well, sometimes they are and sometimes they are not.

Hopefully the young adults are managing their day-to-day lives well: being responsible, making friends, working toward goals and making good choices. From time to time, you are reminded by friends, teachers and their accomplishments how pleasant and responsible your children are.

And they are. Generally speaking, the less you hear, the better off they are doing. It is when there are problems that they call home. It is when they come home for the summer, Christmas vacation, and other visits beyond three or four days that you are forcefully reminded that they are still a work in progress.

Then you wonder. Are they as discourteous and thoughtless to their friends and roommates as they act when they are home? Prob-

ably not. Hopefully not.

One explanation could be you aren't there to see their mistakes and poor behavior as they inch their way toward maturity. Ignorance is bliss. Or you could take comfort in the fact that the last people on earth with whom they will have a reciprocal, give-and-take, adult/adult relationship is with their parents. Letting go of "mom" and "dad" is the last step on their way to truly being an adult.

Maturity levels. One researcher found that most daughters are able by age 23 to take the perspective of their parents and see them in relatively objective terms. Sons take a little longer. Marriage accelerates the timetable, but not always.

When young married children come for a visit, some "veg" out and take a vacation from their adult roles when Mom and Dad are there to take care of them. In some respects they won't fully appreciate parental sacrifices until they have raised teenagers of their own.

Prior to 40 or 50 years ago, young people were mature for adult responsibilities in the late teens or early twenties. They were getting

married, setting up households, having children and taking responsibility. Nowadays, the amount of emotional and financial support young people need to educate themselves also prolongs their adolescent attitudes well into their twenties.

Even mature adult children can have setbacks. There are times when adult children need help and it is not because they are immature. Robert Frost wrote, "Home is a place when you have to be there, they have to take you in." A little extra help from parents doesn't compromise their integrity or status as responsible human beings.

Are they grown up yet? What are the signs that your young son or daughter "gets it" when it comes to understanding that you have lives with needs and goals in addition to your children's comfort and well-being?

- When they put gas in

the car after they have borrowed it.

- When they even recognize that it is their responsibility to put gas in the car if they had the money.

- When they pay their own bills.

- When they pay for their own phone bills.

- When they pick up after themselves, clean up their own messes, offer to fix their own meals, do their own laundry, make their own beds and leave the bathroom clean.

- When they pitch in to cook or clean up after a meals.

- When they remember your birthday and special occasions with phone calls or gifts.

- When they stop bossing their younger brothers and sisters and relinquish any "assistant" parental concerns about their siblings' behavior.

- When they pay their own car insurance.

- When they ask how you feel and are genuinely interested.

- When they care about not putting you out.

- When they pay back money they owe or return something they borrowed.

- When they say "thank you" for little courtesies and considerations.

- When they finally take

possession of their own keepsakes, books and possessions.

- When it dawns on them that the things on this list are their responsibility.

An ounce of prevention. Parents can insist on responsible behavior, assert their rights, and expect basic courtesy while children are still in their teen years.

Another thing - hard to do - is not to indulge children or give them too much as they are growing up. They need to earn some of their expense money themselves. They need to learn the value of money and to pay as they go. It is unfortunate when young people develop a taste for the parents' standard of living but are not prepared to shoulder the

responsibilities of adult life.

Rewards. It may take a while but the joys and rewards of parenting come into full bloom with these delightful adult/adult relationships. These relationships are based around friendship and love instead of meeting child-like needs.

Some young adults might ask, "What about needy, demanding, intrusive parents who won't let go?" Yes, there are such parents, but that is another story.

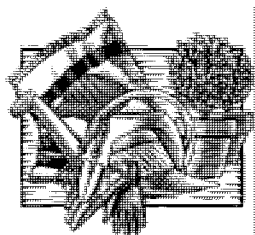

Yard & Garden Tips

Planting for Spring Color

It is not too early to be thinking about spring. Daffodils, tulips, crocus, hyacinths and other spring blooming plants need to be planted this fall. They need to have a cold treatment to initiate blooming. Nature provides this by having a winter season. These flowers can be forced to bloom by putting them in the refrigerator for 12 to 16 weeks for use indoors. This past weekend, I purchased my daffodils. I'm hoping for a rain to make digging easier. We like tulips but the deer munch them off.

Daffodils are dependable to return year after year. Bigger is best when it comes to selecting bulbs to use. The bigger the bulb, the bigger your flower will be this season. That doesn't mean you have to buy only the largest bulbs. Smaller bulbs will be less costly, but less showy this season. All bulbs should be firm and free from blemishes, cuts, molds or soft spots. They should feel heavy for their

size, not light and dried up.

Spring blooming flowers need a well-drained soil. When the soil stays wet for a long period of time, they will rot. The addition of organic matter such as compost, humus, aged manures or hay will improve all soil types. Add as much as you can and work it in evenly and deeply to your soil.

The amount of sunlight will determine how quickly the soil will dry. For most, full sun is best. Light is required for food production for the plant. As light diminishes, less food is produced for storage in the bulb.

Planting depth is based on soil and plant species. Heavy clays need a shallower planting to prevent rot. Most are planted at a depth that is equal to three times their diameter. Depth is measured to the bottom of the hole and not from the top of the bulb. Plant the bulb with the pointed end up. It is important to plant

each bulb at the same depth to have them all blooming at once next season.

FSA provides disaster assistance to soybean and upland cotton producers for 2009 losses

Adrian J. Polansky, state executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Kansas announced last week that disaster payments are available for certain producers of 2009 upland cotton and soybeans that suffered losses because of excessive moisture or related conditions. The Crop Assistance Program (CAP) will make payments available to producers of eligible crops that received Secretarial disaster designations due to excessive moisture or related conditions in 2009. Eligible counties in Kansas include: Bourbon, Chautauqua, Cherokee, Cheyenne, Cowley, Hamilton, Haskell, Meade, Montgomery, Rice, Sherman, Stevens, and Sumner.

The crop must have been physically located in an eligible county to be eligible for payment. Producers of eligible crops on farms in disaster counties who had a 5 percent or greater crop loss in 2009 due to excessive moisture or related conditions will receive a payment based on the planted and considered planted acres of the crop. Per acre payment rates will be prorated by FSA in order to keep payments within available

funds for the program. Producers will initially receive 75 percent of their CAP payment.

The predetermined payment rates are: Soybeans \$15.62 per acre and Upland Cotton \$17.70 per acre. Signup for CAP ends December 9, 2010. The general eligibility provisions, payment limits and adjusted gross income limits that apply to FSA programs apply to CAP. Additionally, CAP payments will be treated as 2009 revenue under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program.

CAP is funded through Section 32 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1935, which allows the Secretary to use funds to re-establish the purchasing power of farmers, ranchers and producers.

Producers of 2009 soy-

beans and upland cotton in eligible counties must sign up no later than December 9, 2010. For more information about disaster assistance programs, visit a local FSA county office or online at <http://disaster.fsa.usda.gov>.

USDA report ranks farm co-op sales and income second highest on record

USDA Under Secretary for Rural Development Dallas Tonsager released a report last week showing that farmer, rancher and fishery cooperatives had \$170 billion in sales in 2009, the second highest level on record, trailing only the \$192 billion record set in the previous year. USDA Rural Business and Cooperatives Program Administrator Judith Canales made the announcement on Tonsager's behalf during the National Association of Guaranteed Government Lenders annual conference in Anaheim, Calif.

"Rural cooperatives not only provide thousands of jobs, they invigorate local communities and rural farms, ranches and businesses," said Canales. "This report shows how critically important producer-owned cooperatives are to the nation's agricultural economy."

There are an estimated 2,389 farmer co-ops. These co-ops provide their member-owners with services, including crop storage, marketing and processing,

while other co-ops provide members with farm supplies, agronomy services and insurance. Farmer, rancher and fishery cooperatives remain one of the largest employers in many rural communities, with 180,000 total workers in 2009. The number of full-time employees decreased slightly, to 123,000 (down 1,800 from 2008), while the use of part-time and seasonal employees increased 7 percent, to 58,000.

Canales said lower commodity and energy prices were the main reasons for

the decline in sales from 2008. Net income (before taxes) of \$4.4 billion was also the second best showing ever for farmer co-ops, although down almost 9 percent from the record \$4.8 billion in 2008. This breaks a string of four consecutive years when the nation's agricultural cooperatives set a record for net income.

Co-ops recorded sales increases in 2009 for farm supplies, crop protectants, seed and feed. Co-ops also saw increased marketing levels for rice, processed

fruits and vegetables, sugar and tobacco. All other sales of supplies and crop/livestock marketing fell from the record levels of 2008. In the farm supplies sector, petroleum products sales declined by almost \$7 billion, due to a combination of lower prices and demand.

Dairy products sales had the largest declines, down more than \$9 billion from 2008, followed by declines of almost \$3 billion

for grain and oilseed; cotton sales by cooperatives declined by more than \$1 billion. Dairy products and grain/oilseed sales by co-ops were lower due to price declines, while cotton experienced lower prices and a large decline in production.

The value of cooperative assets fell in 2009, mainly as a result of decreased inventories and receivables due to lower prices of products market-

ed and sold. Liabilities fell by 19 percent while equity capital held by cooperatives increased almost 4 percent, to nearly \$24 billion. Equity capital still remains low but is six points higher than in 2008 and now represents 39 percent of all co-op assets. Patronage income (refunds from other cooperatives due to sales between cooperatives) grew almost five percent, to \$904 million, up from \$864 million in 2008.

Benefits of deep tillage depend on soil compaction and moisture

With harvest proceeding quickly this fall, agricultural producers have had time to consider performing some fall tillage. Since the preceding two fall harvests were fairly wet, many producers might be considering deep tillage for the purpose of alleviating compaction, said DeAnn Presley, K-State Research and Extension soil management specialist.

Whether deep tillage will prove beneficial depends on soil conditions, she said.

"In research studies, it is commonly concluded that deep tillage is only beneficial if the zone of compaction is truly root limiting. If it isn't, deep tillage probably won't be of much benefit," Presley said.

The only way to really know if the compaction is root limiting is to leave about three to five un-

tilled strips through the field and then compare the yields in those areas to the tilled parts of the field next year, she explained.

If tillage is performed when the soil is too wet, the zone of compaction could be moved even deeper.

"To know if the soil is too wet for tillage, try to make a ribbon out of the soil without wetting it. If you can make a texture ribbon, it is too wet. Alternatively, if you can roll out a 'snake' of soil by rubbing it between your palms, it's too wet," Presley said.

This is called plasticity and if the soil is plastic, or bendable, it can smear and compact easily. Producers will need to test this to the entire depth that they want to till, she said.

"Your goal is to create fracture, so the soil has to be dry enough to shatter, not smear. To see if you're

achieving this, dig between the shanks with a spade and see if the soil is loosened. If you bring up huge clods, the soil isn't shattering and it would be better to wait until it's drier. Straight shanks are going to cause the least amount of soil disturbance," Presley said.

Also, keep in mind that certain areas of the field are more compacted than others, she added. Those areas might not be ready for deep tillage at the same time as the rest of the field because compacted areas tend to stay wetter, longer.

"A case in point is a recent trip that I made to a producer's farm. I observed soil shattering

from deep tillage across the entire 30 inches between the shanks in the average part of the field, but in the end rows where the grain cart was driven, I dug up clods that were about one cubic foot in size, most likely because the more compacted areas were wetter," she said.

Is deep tillage economical? "Only if a root-limiting layer is really present, and even then this is a costly operation due to the fact that it requires a lot of power to go deep. Deep tillage is slow-going and the implements are not very wide. As a result, deep tillage requires a lot of operator time, diesel fuel, and usually a few shear bolts!" Presley said.

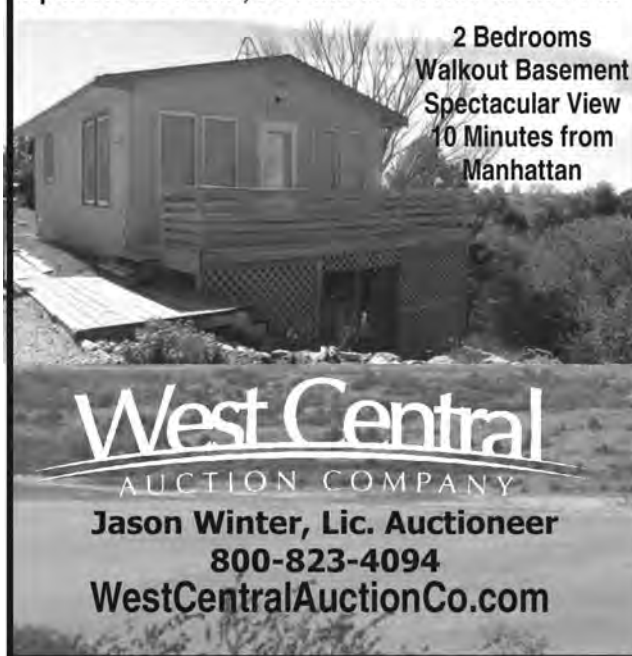

USDA Secretary Vilsack encourages ag unity

One message came out loud and clear during USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack's visit to the Big Iron Farm Show last month – all aspects of farming and ranching must work together, since agriculture represents such a small part of the nation's population.

Referring to the oftentimes heated debates that pop up between biotech and organic farming camps, grain farmers versus livestock producers, and family farmers against the corporate farmers, to name just a few, he said they all need to work together to convey a positive message for agriculture.

"We're less than one percent of the country's population and there isn't enough of us to be fighting each other," he told those gathered for his remarks.

How true.
At a time when our farming base continues to shrink there seems to be

more division within our ranks. Just about every edition of a major newspaper will contain some article telling of one farming group challenging another in either a court of law or the court of public opinion – and in either case, agriculture comes out on the losing side.

An example of the taking our disagreements to court is apparent in the recent court action involving Roundup Ready® sugarbeets, where a small handful of vegetable growers in Oregon have the potential of bringing a major ag commodity to its knees with a court injunction they requested.

And remember two years ago when the great "food versus fuel" debate was taking place in the public? This issue even brought about verbal sparring between livestock and grain producing groups.

And, of course, the urban press was there to pick up every little detail, which isn't a condemna-

tion of the press, but rather the fact that these disagreements between the two factions were being aired in the public.

With this in mind, Vilsack told his audience that we need to find a strategy that will allow all the different factions in agriculture to co-exist, and in some cases, such as the biotech disputes, find a way to compensate those whose crops are contaminated through no fault of anyone. He claimed the main argument of those filing these lawsuits is the fact that they have no other remedy at the present time.

"We have to create another alternative and I think USDA can be involved in the formation of such a program," he said.

This is a critical time for agriculture to pull together as discussion starts on the 2012 Farm Bill.

The new Congress will probably have even less rural representation than the current one, so it's important that agriculture has a united front at this time. The point needs to be driven home, as Vilsack said, that a farm bill isn't just about farmers and ranchers, but rather it's important to every consumer in this country.

The Ag Secretary bristled when someone pointed out that only about 16 percent of the total price of the farm bill actually goes to farmers and ranchers, with the rest going for nutritional programs.

He said that kind of dialogue does little to enhance agriculture's image with the public, and then asked why anyone associated with agriculture wouldn't be happy with a bill that spends that much on nutrition programs, since that means purchas-

ing commodities that are produced by the ag industry.

Vilsack's comments make a lot of sense.

When you are a small minority, as production agriculture is, there is a pressing need to put our small disagreements aside and present a united front, otherwise eventually all of these segments will be picked off, like birds lined up on a fence.

There've been numerous occasions lately where different individuals have called for agriculture to

come together at this critical time – but whether that happens or not is up to those of you reading this.

Will we continue with our bickering? Or will we put up a united front that will not only benefit agriculture, but in the long run, the entire country?

Borlaug posthumously presented United Nations Organization’s top Agricola Medal

Dr. Norman Borlaug, Nobel Peace Prize laureate and world-renowned father of the Green Revolution, was posthumously awarded the prestigious Agricola Medal from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization during the recent World Food Security Conference in Rome.

The organization’s director-general, Jacques Diouf, announced the award and paid homage to Borlaug’s lifelong efforts toward ending world hunger.

Borlaug, who died last year at age 95, has been credited with saving as many as a billion lives through his work in developing a high-yield, disease-resistant semi-dwarf wheat and the “shuttle breeding” technique, which significantly improved agricultural production in nations faced

with serious food shortages.

Jeanie Borlaug Laube, Borlaug’s daughter, and Julie Borlaug Larson, Borlaug’s granddaughter and director for partnerships of the Norman Borlaug Institute for International Agriculture, accepted the award from Diouf.

“The conferring of this award to the memory of my grandfather further validates and recognizes his work and his legacy,” said Larson. “But the challenge of helping feed an ever-growing world population and providing food security for all, especially those in underdeveloped and developing countries, continues to be and will remain the mission of the institute which bears his name and shares his vision.”

The Borlaug Institute, part of the Texas A&M University System, was

named in honor of Borlaug, who served as a distinguished professor of international agriculture at the university from 1984 until his death in 2009. According to its website, the institute “strives to carry on Borlaug’s legacy by promoting science-based solutions for the world’s agriculture and food challenges” and currently leads or participates in numerous agricultural improvement projects worldwide.

The Agricola Medal was presented to Borlaug in conjunction with World Food Day, celebrated each year on Oct. 16. According to World Food Day materials, the day is “a worldwide event designed to increase awareness, understanding and informed, year-around action to alleviate hun-

ger.” It is observed annually on that date in recognition of the founding of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization in 1945. The first World Food Day was observed in 1981.

“This is the 30th observance of World Food Day and I am especially proud to have been here to share in the posthumous presentation of this award to one of the world’s great humanitarians,” said Ed Price, director of the Borlaug Institute, who was in Rome for the conference and presentation.

Price noted that it was approximately one year ago that Borlaug died and that few if any, people in history had done as much to promote world peace through agriculture.

“Most of us in the international agriculture com-

munity feel Norm’s impact — past, present and future — on improving the world’s security by improving global food security cannot be overstated,” he said.

Previous recipients of the Agricola Medal include King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand; French President Jacques Chirac; Chinese President Jiang Zemin; Pope John Paul II; President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt; the

prime ministers of Spain and Turkey and India; President Johannes Rau of Germany and King Abdullah of Saudi Arabia.

The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization is based in Rome, as are two other United Nations agencies addressing agricultural development and hunger alleviation — the World Food Program and the International Fund for Agriculture Development.

Ailing Nebraska farmer gets harvest help from others

(AP) - Despite harvest season arguably being the most hectic time of the year for farmers, a group from the Jansen area took a day off from their regular work to help a neighbor in need.

Doctors found a mass on Roy Kendall's pancreas in late September. Due to multiple doctor trips to Omaha and Lincoln for tests and treatments, which require him to be inactive, Roy feared his crops would go unharvested this season.

That's when his friends and co-workers came into action.

Armed with five combines, five trucks provided by the Jansen Co-op and more people coming and going throughout the day, farmers set out to harvest his crops in one day.

"It hurts that you can't do it yourself, but these folks really came through," Roy

said. "I can't show my appreciation enough."

Roy said that he's lived on the farm and took it over more than 60 years ago when his dad died. Roy was only 15 years old at the time.

In the early years Roy received help from his brother and neighbors, but has been self-reliant for most of career.

His wife, Cindy Kendall, said she can tell it hurts her husband to not be able to harvest his crops this season.

"He'd rather be out there doing it himself but he can't," Cindy said. "It's overwhelming. We're blessed that we have such good friends and family and everything. It's a lot to be thankful for."

Roy's daughter, Christina Lyons, said that she's hopeful that all will go well with her father's illness.

"My dad was diagnosed

with a mass on his pancreas and is still undergoing some treatment and we're not sure where we are in that process," Lyons said. "We're very optimistic, but he's still undergoing some treatment."

In addition to farming, Ken also works at the Co-op in Jansen. When his co-workers learned he wouldn't be able to harvest on his own this year, they began recruiting volunteers to help with the harvest.

Brad Hynek, who drove one of three trucks from the Co-op, said that he was happy to help Roy because his own father found himself in a similar situation once.

"My dad got hurt about 45 years ago right around harvest time and the farmers got together to help," Hynek said. "You just don't see this anymore. It's kind of a thing of the past."
