

February pork exports well above last year; beef export value remains strong

U.S. pork exports remained well ahead of last year's record pace through February, while beef exports trended slightly lower in volume but posted excellent results in terms of value, according to statistics released by the USDA and compiled by the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF).

Pork export volume (187,629 metric tons) was 9 percent higher than in February 2011, while value (\$526.2 million) was up 21 percent. For the first two months of the year, pork exports totaled 399,086 mt valued at \$1.09 billion - increases of 18 percent and 31 percent, respectively. This is the first time U.S. pork export value has reached the \$1 billion mark after only two months.

February beef export volume (87,131 mt) was 3 percent lower than a year ago but export value remained exceptionally strong, increasing 10 percent to \$409 million. Through the first two months of the year, beef exports totaled 176,585 mt (-2 percent) valued at \$815 million (+12 percent).

"Export results were quite solid, especially considering the impact of market access issues in some $destinations, \ particularly$ Taiwan and Southeast Asia," said USMEF President and CEO Philip Seng. "We continue to expand the presence of U.S. pork in all key destinations - especially in North Asia and in Western Hemisphere markets. In the beef complex, export volume may be struggling somewhat due to price, but we are having great success directing beef cuts to the markets that value them most. This is keeping beef export value very strong well ahead of the record pace established last year." Value per head, percentage

of total production very strong for U.S. pork

February pork exports equated to 27.7 percent of total production when including both muscle cuts and variety meat, 24 percent for muscle cuts only. This compares to 27 percent and 22 percent, respectively, in February 2011. Export value equated to \$58.17 per hog slaughtered, up 14 percent from last year's figure of \$51.06.

Exports to Mexico, the largest volume market for U.S. pork, were lower than the record tonnage recorded in December and January but still outpaced last February's results in both volume and value. For the year, exports to Mexico were up dramatically compared to the first two months of 2011 – increasing 20 percent in volume (113,424 mt) and 24 percent in value (\$208 million).

Japan remains the value pacesetter for U.S. pork, as February exports were steady in volume with last vear but still achieved an increase of 17 percent in value. Through February, 2012 exports to Japan were 8 percent higher than a year ago in volume (80,316 mt) and 22 percent higher in value (\$342 million).

"It takes a strong effort at every level to keep these mainstay markets performing at such a strong pace," Seng explained. "The retail, foodservice and processing sectors are all critically important to the U.S. industry's ability to remain the leading supplier to both Japan and Mexico, and USMEF continues to target them aggressively. We also are very focused on the branded market in Japan, which offers fertile ground for expanding sales of U.S. pork."

Other pork export highlights for the first two months of 2012 include:

Exports to China/Hong Kong were 39 percent higher in volume (78,193 mt) and nearly doubled in value (\$158.2 million, up 94 percent). February volume. however, was the smallest since June 2011.

Exports to Canada increased 36 percent in volume (36,484 mt) and 45 percent in value (\$129.9 million).

While lower tariff rates prescribed in the Korea-U.S. FTA did not take effect until mid-March, exports to South Korea increased 11 percent in volume (36,399 mt) and 28 percent in value (\$104 million).

Exports to Australia were one-third higher in both volume (12,423 mt) and value (\$38.9 million).

Led by strong demand in Chile and Colombia, exports to the Central and South America region increased 18 percent in volume (13,091 mt) and 23 percent in value (\$34.8 million).

Destinations where export volume was lower for the year included Taiwan (steady in value at \$10.4 million but down 19 percent in volume to 4,693 mt), where the controversy over ractopamine residues has created an uncertain business climate and lowered imports from all sources. Regulatory issues in the Philippines and Singapore held back exports to the ASEAN region, where export value (\$18.3 million) still achieved a small increase despite an 18 percent decline in volume (7.169 mt).

Russia, Middle East. Latin America lead beef export value surge production when including both muscle cuts and variety meat and 9 percent for muscle cuts only. This compares to 12.9 percent and 10 percent, respectively, in February 2011. Export value equated to \$208.05 per head of fed slaughter, up 14 percent from last year's \$182.12.

Beef exports to Russia are expected to benefit from a higher muscle cut tariff rate quota (TRQ) in 2012, as the TRQ was increased from 41,700 mt in 2011 to 60,000 mt this year. January-February exports to Russia were up 58 percent in volume (9.297 mt) and tripled in value to \$38.2 million. The pace was even hotter when including only muscle cuts, which increased 131 percent in volume (5,746 mt) and 238 percent in value (\$29.9 million). Egypt led strong results

for U.S. beef in the Middle East, with exports to the region increasing 13 percent in volume (23,507 mt) and 19 percent in value (\$53.3 million). Volumes were lower for the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, but both destinations still achieved substantial increases in value.

Led by strong results in Chile, Peru and Guatemala, exports to the Central and South America region increased 63 percent in volume (5,651 mt) and 91 percent in value (\$21.8 million).

"Export growth in these markets is reflective of a very successful effort to expand the global footprint of U.S. beef," Seng said. "At one time, these markets were only a small factor in our global results, and buyers were exclusively interested in variety meat. But the U.S. industry has made great strides in marketing



equated to 12 percent of beef muscle cuts, many of which are underutilized domestically.

Other beef export highlights for the first two months of 2012 include:

Mexico was the leading destination in terms of both volume (38,070 mt) and value (\$170.6 million). This represents a decrease in volume of 6 percent, but a 13 percent increase in value.

Exports to Canada, which was the only \$1 billion market for U.S. beef in 2011, slipped 3 percent in volume (24,072 mt) but increased 11 percent in value (\$136.9 million).

Exports to Japan, which are still limited to beef from cattle 20 months of age or vounger, were down 5 percent in volume (19.344 mt) but increased 16 percent in value (\$123.6 million).

Having set a blistering pace in early 2011, beef exports through February to Korea were down 19 percent in volume (22,850 mt) and 15 percent in value (\$102 million). Conversely, exports to Taiwan were very slow in the early months of 2011 because of an unsteady regulatory environment. Taiwan's results for this year show an increase of 26 percent in volume (4,938 mt) and 30 percent in value (\$30.7 million), but market conditions remain very fragile and March results will likely be lower. Exports to Indonesia have been dramatically reduced due to smaller import quotas, which contributed to a decline in exports to the ASEAN region of 15 percent in volume (9,938 mt) and 5 percent in value (\$39.2 million).

Lamb muscle cut exports higher, variety meats sluggish

U.S. lamb exports through the first two months of the year were down 10 percent in volume (2,362 mt) and 4 percent in value (\$3.8 million). However this was primarily due to a soft market for lamb variety meat exports, which were down 21 percent and 15 percent respectively. Lamb muscle cuts were up 6 percent in volume (1,162 mt) and 4 percent in value (\$2.5 million), driven by strong results in the Caribbean and Canada






Food of Civil War Soldiers at Mine Creek Battlefield State Historic Site

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Earthworms play crucial role in earth's ecosystem

How can you know if your soil is healthy? With all the different types of soils, from sandy to heavy clays, it's not easy to determine the quality of any given soil without a laboratory analysis.

However, one almost universally good sign of a healthy soil can be easily seen with just a little digging - an abundant population of earthworms, said Peter Tomlinson, K-State Research and Extension environmental quality specialist. Taking steps to maintain and increase earthworm populations is one good way to celebrate Earth Day 2012 year-round, he said.

The beneficial effects of earthworms on soil physical, chemical and biological properties have been observed for a long time by those who have studied and observed nature. For example, in 1881 Darwin published his observations on the importance of earthworm activity in the formation of vegetable compost," Tomlinson said. Earthworms improve soil structure, which in turn improves soil porosity, aeration, water-holding capacity, the rate of water infiltration, and soil carbon accumulation, the K-State scientist explained. This helps prevent the soil from being eroded and degraded while protecting water quality, plant productivity, and the earth's climate, he added.

How, exactly, do earthworms improve soil quality?

"The physical movement of soil as earthworms move through the soil creates an interconnected network of burrows. This is one way that soil porosity and aeration are improved. Earthworms also excrete a mixture of soil and organic matter, and these casts can develop into stable soil aggregates. Depending on the species the cast material may be deposited in the burrow or on the soil surface," Tomlinson said.

The activity of earthworms accelerates decomposition of plant material and mineralization of soil organic matter, increasing the availability of plant available nutrients, he added.

There are some steps people can take to maintain or even increase earthworm populations, he said.

Try to keep from disturbing the soil as much as possible. In agricultural fields, earthworm populations generally become reduced in cultivated fields," he said. "When tillage practices are reduced or eliminated as a result of conversion to a minimal or no-till system, earthworm populations generally begin to increase."

Other ways to encourage earthworm populations include soil testing and liming as needed to maintain optimal soil pH, and ensuring that sufficient organic matter is being returned to the system by minimizing plant residue removal and utilizing crop rotations, Tomlinson said.

It should be noted that as beneficial as earthworms are in most situations, they are not a panacea in all cases he said.

"For example, where drain tiles have been installed to move water from poorly drained soils, earthworm burrows can actually become a problem by increasing the movement of fertilizer and chemicals more readily through the soil to the tile drains," he noted.

In the vast majority of situations, earthworms can do much of the heavy lifting in improving soil quality and help you celebrate Earth Day in a meaningful way, he concluded.

It seems that China has been the major force in markets the lately. Whether it is the rate of their GDP growth or the amount of corn they are buying, or where they are buying their soybeans, any bit of news can move the markets. Moving forward that probably won't change, and the things we have to pay very close attention to are moves to increase liquidity and economic growth and imports of ag products.

On top of what the Chinese decide to do this week, we will also have to deal with our own government and next week's FOMC meeting. The financial markets and to an extent the ag commodity markets have been moving wildly based on the Fed's verbiage or lack thereof in terms of QE3. Another hint of QE3 will likely pressure the dollar and send the gold and silver higher, whereas no mention of it will have the opposite effect. I think that due to fear of a slowdown in the recovery of the U.S. economy QE3 is becoming more likely, but it is impossible to guess what they will say this week.

The July corn lost 17³/₄ cents and the December corn only lost ¹/₄ cent for the week. Much of the bear spreading can be attributed to ideas that early planting will lead to early harvest. which means a supply concern at the end of the crop year. We have to get through the growing season to find out if that is actually what plays out, but for now that is what traders are concerned about. There were rumors of large purchases of old crop corn by the Chinese, but there was no confirmation of the business by USDA, which I am sure disappointed many traders. We may see something show up in Monday's daily sales announcements, but it is likely that we don't see any confirmation of the business until it is shipped. The commercial sources I am in contact with are convinced the business took place and since the Chinese seem to buy corn every time we have a major price break, I have no reason not to believe we let the Chinese off easy again.

The July KW lost 16¹/₂ cents for the week and the only thing to say that is positive about the market is that the market is oversold and that the losses could have been worse. If it weren't for the buying that came with the rumors of Chinese corn purchases then their probably wouldn't have been any buying at all. The only two supporting factors in the wheat are the facts that U.S. wheat is the cheapest in the world and that wheat is generally cheaper than corn in the U.S. Since the Chinese have been buying large quantities of feed wheat elsewhere in the world, it is a little surprising that they aren't buying more U.S. SRW, and perhaps they will when we get the next supply glut at harvest.

My biggest concern in the wheat market is not for pressure in the July contract as we approach harvest, but for the deferred contracts after the July contracts expire. It looks to me like the only thing holding the wheat up is the July corn and once that goes off the board the deferred wheat contracts will quickly come down to the price of the corresponding corn contract. From a hedging standpoint, I think that the best plan is to either sell the carry in the futures or sell call option premium in the deferred contracts. Speculators should buy December corn and sell December Kansas City or Chicago wheat.

July soybeans The made a new high for the move Friday and finished 9 cents higher for the week despite Friday's posted settlement being about 9 cents off the last tick. Regardless, it was an impressive move higher and the market appears to be well on the way to reaching the next upside objective of \$14.70.

USDA has a long historv of underestimating soybean exports and it looks like it is happening again this year. The Chinese and "unknown" destinations have been very good buyers lately and that will likely continue for the rest of the crop year due to the many problems in S. America. Production estimates keep shrinking, which means the world will have to count on the U.S. for the missing supply. USDA might still be 50-100 million bushels too low with the old crop export estimate and it is basically a given at this point that next year's exports will be record large by a considerable margin.

The best chance of tempering the soybean market is for the market to buy acres from the corn, but it is getting a little late for

that. There is a chance of that happening since the corn-soybean spreads have widened so much, but it may take until the June Planted Acreage Report to find out if it happened or not. If the acres don't get switched, plan on higher prices.

It was interesting that there was cash cattle trade at the \$125 level, but the April live cattle are still stuck near \$120. There obviously won't be any deliveries unless they are forced, which is definitely a possibility if the cash and futures don't converge very soon. With the run up in beef prices there isn't much incentive to take lower money, so I think the futures will have to rally.

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K-State scientist on wheat rust diseases: correctly identifying if fungicides needed — or not — is important

The wheat crop in Kansas is generally considered to be ahead of schedule thanks to warmer than normal temperatures in March. The return of cooler weather in early April slowed the crop's development and has also favored the development of diseases, with many reports of stripe rust, leaf rust, Septoria tritici blotch and tan spot from central and eastern Kansas.

The elevated disease activity has many farmers thinking about possibly using a fungicide to help protect the crop.

"Producers have a lot of excellent fungicide options," said Kansas State University plant pathologist Erick De Wolf. "In my experience, based on all the data I have seen in research trials in Kansas and other states, the importance of correctly identifying situations where fungicides are needed or not needed is far greater than the choice of fungicide product.'

Most reports indicate that low levels of rust diseases can be found on the top three leaves but is probably most common on the second and third leaf down into the canopy, said De Wolf, who is a wheat disease specialist with K-

State Research and Extension. Infection of the flag leaf by stripe rust has been reported in southeast and south central regions this past week. Recent reports indicate the disease is increasing rapidly in central and north central regions of the state. Tan spot and Septoria tritici blotch are at moderate levels in many fields, with infections comoccurring on the monly leaves and mid lower canopy.

"The excellent yield potential of many fields and emerging risk of disease has many farmers thinking about fungicide applica-tions," he said. "Based on the information I have to date, it appears that most areas of central Kansas are at a moderate risk for disease-related yield loss this year. I suggest that farmers scout their fields for disease and carefully evaluate the need for fungicides.

The residual life of a fungicide is influenced by many factors, including the rate at which the product is applied, the targeted disease and the level of disease pressure, De Wolf said. Fungicides applied at the full-labeled rate will generally have longer residual life. Fungicides will generally provide longer residual life against rust diseases (often more than 21 days) than leaf spot diseases. Some products may provide additional residual life but this extra residual does not always translate into more grain yield.

"The research I have reviewed indicates that fungicides listed in the publication Foliar Fungicide Efficacy Ratings for Wheat Disease Management 2012, EP130, will generally provide 21 days of solid protection against fungal diseases," he said. "This includes products with the active ingredient tebuconazole that is listed in the table as the product Folicur, but is also marketed in generic formulations. These

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products are generally the least cost product option." The publication is online at: http://www.ksre.ksu.edu/libr ary/plant2/ep130.pdf.

Based on questions he's received so far in April, De Wolf believes there is confusion about the preventative and curative activity various fungicides.

"All of the fungicides listed in the Foliar Fungicide Efficacy Ratings for Wheat Disease Management publication are best applied when the disease is at low levels," the plant pathologist said. "The triazole fungicides are generally considered to provide some limited curative activity, which means they can stop the development of fungi already inside the plant. The triazole-only fungicides include products such as Prosaro, Carmaba, Tilt and Folicur. Triazole fungicides are also included in mixed mode-of-action products such as Quilt

Xcel, Stratego YLD, and TwinLine. Both the triazole and the mixed mode-of-action fungicides provide excellent protection against new infections that is often considered 'preventive' activity."

It would be an error to think that a triazole fungicide does not provide preventive activity simply because it also has curative activity, De Wolf added. The curative activity is good thing, especially with a disease such as stripe rust where the fungus grows within the plant to cause additional expansion of the stripes.

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Protecting the soil critical for earth's health

earth's health for future generations? Look no further than the soil all around you, said Gary Pierzynski, K-State Research and Extension interim dean of the College of Agriculture and professor of agronomy.

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"The soil on which we live, grow food, build and more is one of the most important factors in determining the health of the planet we live on. If the soil is degraded, it becomes difficult to sustain the health of the earth in ways that many people may not realize," said Pierzynski, who also serves as the 2012 president of the Soil Science Society of America (SSSA).

Food security, water quality, sustainable energy production, climate stability all of these important factors that contribute to a healthy earth and stable society depend directly on a having a healthy soil resource, Pierzynski said.

"Our future is tied to how well we manage the precious soil resources available to serve and improve water quality.

Looking for a good way to ensure the us. We must continue to work hard to keep soil from eroding. We need to build up the soil's organic matter, encourage a diverse ecosystem within the soil, and avoid dumping harmful materials onto the soil just because it is convenient," the K-State soil scientist said.

> "Agricultural scientists are finding ways to prod%uce even more quantities of nutritious food, while also increasing the production of crops that will provide energy and pharmaceuticals. If we do not pay close attention to soil quality as these advancements occur, the earth's ecosystem will ultimately suffer," he added.

> Soil health faces increasing humanlinked threats from contamination, unplanned urban development, desertification, salinization, mismanagement and erosion, according to the SSSA. Protecting and promoting soil health will ensure food and energy security, assist in climate change adaptation and mitigation and con-



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Proper soil management needed to combat climate change, protect earth

Soils and plants play a significant role in global climate change, said Chuck Rice, K-State university distinguished professor of agronomy. And the relationship is a twoway street since climate change also can affect food and fiber production in the future, he added.

These are some of the most critical issues to consider he said, since the issue will only grow more complex with time if it is not addressed soon.

'Food and energy security, water availability and quality, and climate change adaptation and mitigation are some of the greatest challenges facing our society," Rice said. "Appropriate management of soils offers the potential to provide solutions for each of these challenges."

Agricultural practices must be developed to mitigate climate change, adapt cropping systems to expected changes, meet future demands for food, feed, fiber, and bioenergy, and protect natural resources, Rice said.

"We will have to find ways to increase production for the purpose of providing food security for nine billion people by the middle of the 21st century. while also protecting the environment and enhancing function of global ecosystems," he said "The challenge is further compounded by climate change impacts that now require mitigation."

within agriculture to mitigate emissions of the greenhouse gases carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide and methane, and to sequester carbon in the soil and in the biomass of perennial vegetation, Rice explained.

There are practices that can be implemented to reduce greenhouse gas emissions while increasing productivity and conserving soil, he added. These practices will need to be applied on a wider scale in the future, he said. This will require continued research and outreach efforts, he said.

"Intensified and focused research is needed in several broad areas in agronomy, crop science and soil science," Rice said.

In recognition of this challenge, the American Society of Agronomy, Crop Science Society of America, and Soil Science Society of America (SSSA) issued an official Position Statement on Climate Change, said Rice, a past president of SSSA.

The statement reflects the consensus of a panel of scientists with national and international expertise in climate processes and impacts, mitigation strategies, and adaptation methods for natural and managed ecosystems.

To help Kansas residents adapt to and mitigate climate change, scientists at K-State have partnered with scientists at the University of Kansas, and the Universi- zone map," the K-State sci-

major projects funded by the National Science Foundation, Rice added.

One project consists of more than 60 Kansas scientists who are collaborating on the Climate Change and Renewable Energy initiative, a massive research endeavor that has the potential to significantly affect the Kansas economy. The National Science Foundation awarded \$20 million to Kansas NSF EPSCoR (Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research) program for this five-year award that began October 1, 2009. The research will provide a better understanding of how climate might further change in Kansas and develop strategies for adaptation and mitigation.

The other project, the Central Great Plains Climate Change Education Project, brings together climate scientists, experts in theories on how people learn science, and formal and informal education experts, to help provide the public with a better understanding of climate change.

Kansas State University scientists are playing key roles in both projects, Rice said.

"Our goal is to prepare Kansas and others in this region of the country for the kind of changes in climate projected for the future, as evidenced by the recent change in the USDA's plant hardiness




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

Tree Replacement

The last Friday in April is celebrated as both the Kansas and national Arbor Day.: a day set each year to commemorate our human need for trees. There are numerous benefits of trees. My favorite is the pure pleasure I get from being in the presence of a tree.

How long can a tree live? I think most of us would like to think that a tree is planted for perpetuity. There are various factors that will determine the longevity of any plant. There are only a few diseases that cause tree

death. Pine wilt and Dutch elm disease come to mind. Pine trees that have turned brown need to be cut down and the wood destroyed as soon as possible. The same is true for elms come late summer. This removal can destroy the transfer of diseases.

Arbor Day celebrations usually include planting a tree. The Kansas tree of the year is the bald cypress. It could be a good tree to replace either a pine or an American elm tree. They can get as large as an elm and they have a

similar appearance to a pine during the growing season.

Form of the bald cypress is generally columnar to pyramidal. They can take this form but many in Kansas have a broad spreading form. The one at the corner of the Riley County courthouse is currently columnar. The brown pine to the east of it was removed over the winter. The American elm is still standing to the west.

to the interest of the tree. Knees are not as nearly pronounced in an upland setting and can be mulched over in place of growing grass.

Bald cypress should have green leaves that turn orange-brown before dropping in the fall. Some trees will have iron chlorosis in high pH soils that may

occur. Some may be more tolerant of soil pH. Know your soil pH before planting.

Cowboy Up by Ron Wilson **Poet Lariat**


The Mustachio



U.S. wheat industry welcomes U.S-Colombia **FTA implementation date**

The U.S. wheat industry welcomes the announcement by President Obama and Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos that the countries will implement the U.S.-Colombia free trade agreement (FTA) on May 15. The U.S.-Colombia FTA is vital to the wheat industry's efforts to rebuild market share in one of the largest markets for U.S. wheat in South America.


Implementation of the FTA will eliminate all tariffs on U.S. wheat imports into Colombia. The agreement creates a level playing field for U.S. wheat farmers, as export competitors Canada and Argentina already enjoy duty-free access to the market.

"We are extremely pleased to see this FTA set for implementation," said Alvaro de la Fuente, U.S. Wheat Associates (USW) regional vice president for South America. "Our extensive efforts over the nearly six years since the agreement was first signed have finally become a reality and U.S. wheat exports will now compete on an equal basis with other major exporters."

Colombia is currently the second largest destination for U.S. wheat in South America. In marketing year 2010/11, Colombia imported about 800.000 metric tons of U.S. wheat from five of the six U.S. wheat classes. The implementation of the FTA will help the United States regain the market share lost this year after the Canada-Colombia FTA went into effect on Aug. 15, 2011.

'We have already started the push to win back the wheat export business we lost without this FTA in effect," said Randy Suess, a wheat farmer from Colfax, Wash, and USW. "Based on our work, we know this agreement, and others like them, will help us rebuild and expand markets, grow our economy here at home and remain the most reliable supplier of wheat in the world."

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In a letter to Senate Agriculture Committee Chair Debbie Stabenow (D-Mich.) and Ranking Member Pat Roberts (R-Kan.), a group of eight prominent agricultural associations voiced its support for the Senate's approach to the 2012 Farm Bill, and raised several issues related to commodity and risk management programs.

Co-signed by the American Farm Bureau Federation, American Soybean Association, National Association of Wheat Growers, National Barley Growers Association, National Corn Growers Association, National Sunflower Association, U.S. Canola Association and USA Dry Pea & Lentil Council, the letter commended the committee for adhering to its original proposal of \$23 billion in deficit reduction, brought forth to the Joint Select Committee on Deficit Reduction last fall. Additionally, the groups applauded the Committee's decision not to restructure the federal crop insurance program or to reduce its funding for deficit reduction purposes.

"Even with the clear and real need to reduce our federal deficit, it remains in the best interest of our nation to help ensure a basic level of risk management for farmers and our food supply," said American Farm Bureau Federation President Bob Stallman. "Farming is a risky business. There is no doubt about that, and crop insurance is a key principle in the goal to provide farmers a dependable safety net."

"Crop insurance," stated

the groups, "is the core risk management tool used by our producers, and the current program should serve as the foundation for providing additional protection against loss."

In response to concerns from other commodity groups about a revenuebased approach, the groups advocate making changes in the crop insurance program to enhance its viability as a risk management tool, while maintaining the effectiveness of the existing program for other commodities. The groups do not, however, support program alternatives that tie current-year production to fixed price supports, which can distort planting decisions and production between commodities when market prices decline.

"NCGA strongly believes a farmer should be able to absorb a price or yield loss in any given year," said NCGA President Garry Niemeyer, a corn grower from Auburn, Ill. "However, we are trying to protect farmers, especially young farmers, when they are facing these types of losses multiple years in a row."

In addition to crop insurance, the groups advocated heavily for planting flexibility for farmers. "Our top policy priority for Title 1 in the 2012 Farm Bill is to maintain full planting flexibility and avoid potential planting distortions, so producers are encouraged to follow market signals rather than making planting decisions in anticipation of receiving payments under government programs," stated the groups. "With the anticipated elimination of direct payments and possible restructuring or elimination of the counter-cyclical program, it is imperative that any alternative program included in the next farm bill be structured in a manner to not distort planting decisions and to provide full planting flexibility."

"Planting flexibility and limiting planting distortions are musts, not only for soybean farmers, but for farmers in each commodity group," said ASA President Steve Wellman, a soybean farmer from Syracuse, Neb. "We need policies in place that allow and encourage farmers to plant for the market, and not for the government program. Chairwoman Stabenow and Ranking Member Roberts have done a wonderful job thus far in representing the diverse needs of American agriculture in this farm bill process, and we look for that leadership to continue in what appears to be the home stretch.'

In the letter, the groups also advanced their concept for a new program to complement the risk protection provided under crop insurance. "Our organizations support an approach that partially compensates for current-year revenue losses on a crop-specific basis," said the groups. "We believe this approach would have an insignificant impact on planting decisions because of the percentage of risk covered. Also, revenue benchmarks would be adjusted annually to reflect recent average commodity prices, and certification of revenue loss would be required."

"We support this framework that would allow us to continue protect our nation's crops and livestock farms so they can continue to deliver a safe, secure food supply that supports thousands of jobs along the value chain to our consumers," added NAWG President and Hallock, Minn.based wheat farmer Erik Younggren.

Finally, the groups advocated the continuation of the marketing loan program,

urging the Committee to oppose any changes in current law regarding payment limitations or eligibility for farm programs based on Adjusted Gross Income. "Currently, 98 percent of U.S. producers participate in the farm program and comply with their conservation requirements," stated the groups in the letter. "It is important that farmers remain in the program so that our country can maintain conservation compliance on agricultural lands.'

"Both in their various communities and here in Washington, each of our groups has put so much time and effort into crafting a solvent, practical farm bill that works for American farmers," said NBGA President Scott Brown, a barley grower from Soda Springs, Idaho. "As the House schedules its hearings on the bill, we are encouraged by our progress. and we look forward to continuing our work with both chambers in the interest of farmers nationwide."
