The American Soybean Association has joined a coalition of 39 of the nation's foremost agricultural organizations in an effort to raise public awareness of the need for Congress to pass a new, comprehensive, fiveyear farm bill before current farm programs expire in September.

The coalition, called Farm Bill Now, comprises associations and coalitions representing commodity crops, livestock, dairy, specialty crops, state and local governments, minor crops, energy and biobased product groups, farm cooperatives and financial groups, as well as the nation's two largest farm groups, the American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Farmers Union. Each organization has strong and distinct policy priorities, yet all 39 are committed to passing a new, comprehensive bill this year.

The group issued the following statement, titled "Why We Need a Farm Bill", on the importance of new farm legislation for America's farmers:

"Calling the farm bill the

'farm bill' suggests its impact is limited only to farms and to the rural areas to which they are so closely tied. It's really a jobs bill. A food bill. A conservation bill. A research bill. An energy bill. A trade bill. In other words, it's a bill that affects every American.

"The farm bill affects our nation's ability to provide the necessities of life for a global population projected to pass 9 billion by 2050. Here at home, it affects an industry that provides 23 million-or one in every 12-American jobs.

"The farm bill has broad impact on our citizens and our economy. It provides healthy foods to millions of schoolchildren and nutritious options to families in need. It develops and expands trade with valuable foreign markets. By reducing spending significantly compared to prior farm bills, the proposals pending right now in Congress address the need to get our nation's fiscal house in order.

"And yes, it benefits American farms-98 percent of which are owned and operated by families. It helps


big farms and small farms, major crops and specialty crops, organic farmers and conventional farmers, cattle ranchers and cotton ginners, farmers markets and national suppliers, and the vast range of other pursuits that make up American agriculture. This year, it would help farmers tackle the challenges posed by the worst drought in a generation.

"While Congress waits to finish the farm bill, we are united in asking all Americans to encourage legislators-home for summer town hall meetings and speeches-to finish this vital legislation before the current their voices heard, telling farm and food law expires in September. After all, it's your bill too."

In addition to the statement, Farm Bill Now launched an interactive web portal at www.FarmBill Now.com, through which visitors to the site can connect to their members of Congress and show their support for a new five-year farm bill. Using messages to Congress via social media, event locations and times, and an online petition, Farm-BillNow.com gives both farmers and consumers the resources they need to make

In the coming weeks, Farm Bill Now will hold events in Iowa and on Capitol Hill to underscore the message as well.

On the afternoon of Tuesday, Aug. 28, farmers representing multiple groups within the coalition will discuss the Farm Bill Now effort at the annual Farm Progress Show in Boone, Iowa, the nation's largest outdoor farm show.

Wednesday morning Sept. 12, representatives of many of the groups uniting will gather on the grounds of the U.S. Capitol to encourage Congress to pass the bill before programs expire at the end of the month.



The Pro Farmer Crop Tour was obviously the big story of last week. The early findings in South Dakota and Ohio helped start the market off in a strong fashion on Monday and there was good followthrough buying on Tuesday. The rest of the week, at least in the corn and wheat markets, was spent in retreat. After the very poor findings Monday, I think that bullish corn traders ended up being a little disappointed the rest of the week. The data in Illinois, Indiana and Minnesota suggested that USDA might be too low with their yield estimates in those states, while we should expect to see cuts in the rest. The final Pro Farmer corn production estimate, which is not based entirely on the yield samples, was 10.478 billion, plus or minus 1%, and a yield of 120.25 bu/ac. Using those numbers the harvested acreage figure would come in at 87.1 million, which is only 300,00 below USDA. I found that a little odd given the numerous reports of silage being cut on poor yielding fields. Time will tell, but it would seem that there might be more downside potential in the production number due to lower harvested acres.

To me the soybean numbers they came up with were very bullish. In the end they were looking for a 2.60 billion bushel crop, which would be 92 million under USDA, which would imply that we would need to ration another 80-90 million bushels of demand. The problem is that we are doing a poor job of rationing demand already and I think that the end users are unprepared to slow usage even more. I think that explains why we saw new all time highs in the soybeans this week. Demand won't stop until export sales stop and crush margins deteriorate and it will take higher prices to make that happen.

On the charts, the corn looks a little bearish. We had the reversal lower after the crop report and then we had a run towards that high this week, followed by a failure. The December corn managed to gain 1¼ cents for the week on bullish news. What we are left with is a market that seems to have run out of momentum and seems to want to stay in the same old trading range we have been stuck in since mid July. With the supply situation so precarious I don't think we can see a long term down trend develop until more is known about yields, but I do think we may have to visit the \$7.85 area before heading higher going into the September supply and demand report. The Sunday night/Monday trade will set the tone for the week.

The December KW posted a reversal lower on Thursday, so the wheat charts don't look so great either. Wheat fundamentals still aren't to the point that the wheat can show independent strength, but just judging by the amount of wheat feeding going on locally, USDA is underestimating wheat feed usage by a great deal and therefore overestimating ending stocks. Russian wheat production estimates keep shrinking, which means they may be underestimating exports as well. Right now I am thinking that the sideways/lower pattern the wheat market has been stuck in is turning into a very large bull flag or pennant formation, that will eventually project a move up to the the \$11.00- \$11.50 area in the December or March contract. It might take some patience, but I think the wheat will eventually head higher. Ι would be careful locking

in new crop prices. The soybeans posted a reversal this week too, which has that chart looking a little negative as well. I would say that I am least worried about the soybeans heading lower at this point due to the strong demand we are still seeing and that fact that any price break will result in more Chinese buying. I think that we will see new highs Sunday night based on the Pro Farmer data and that will negate the reversal lower on the charts and keep the market on track for a move to \$18.00 in the near term.

October live cattle ended their correction on Thursday with a test of the 40 and 50-day moving average support and a reversal higher. The market is oversold and due for a bounce, but also has good fundamental reasons for strength with the solid cash cattle trade and firm boxed beef market. I look for the market to test the \$127 area soon and perhaps even \$129 in the not too distant future.

I still worry about the feeder cattle market, but since the corn really isn't moving anywhere, the feeders continue to drift higher. \$146.50 is a good upside target for the October feeder cattle contract and right now I expect to see a failure there. A close above \$146.50 probably means the corn is heading lower.



dreamed of freshsmelling rain that beat waves against windows and swept slowly through fields to fill every crack before moving on to refill ponds and kick-start the creeks. Dawn light fell on a full rain gauge. I thanked whoever had left their windows open, washed a truck, mowed a sparse third cutting or made plans to load cattle out of some dirt-road pens.

But then I woke to a challenging world of drought and record heat, more nightmare than restful dream.

This is not the new "normal," but it tells us something new and forces us to adjust expectations. The extremes range far from ideal, far from average and maybe far beyond our outdated worst-case scenarios.

There's nothing worse than to stand by and watch a wreck unfold into our world, regardless of the form it takes. Waiting for a rain or better prices while you do nothing different in selection or management that's a true worst case. We can't fight the weather, but we can do more than watch and wait. Are you trying anything new this year? Opportunities are the silver linings of challenges.

Agronomists have а dream year for collecting data on how different vari-

eties and hybrids respond to these conditions. Ponds that have yet to receive the foreseen runoff could be repaired or cleaned out while the sun shines. In the feedlots, shade and sprinklers have seen wider use this year as innovative managers find the perfect year to see how much difference these small comforts can make to cattle. Positive impacts will add black ink to the closeout, from gain to grade and consumer accept-

ance. Early weaning on the ranch was just an interesting concept until now. This could be the year to jump that up by a month or two, on at least some of your calves. Research proves it saves feed costs while setting cows up for a better next year as calves live up to their feedlot and carcass potential

Cows may have been hard pressed to maintain pregnancy in the heat and perhaps nutrient-deficit environment that developed at the expense of the calf they should have been carrying. You probably can't find feed for a nickel a pound. It may cost three times that or more—can you afford to feed it to open cows? Pregnancy diagnosis by ultrasound or blood test can work after just a few weeks and palpation generally takes 12, but by any means this is a great time to


be sure when you can.

If your resources are stretched too thin. it's a great time to cull for greater efficiency or ability to thrive in spite of everything. I'm sure going to take a look at which cows weaned the heaviest calves this year and compare to their historical records.

On the other hand, let's recognize the departure from average weather on the farm and in the feedlot. Those gathering data often discard the outlier results, even though some other kind of "500-year event" comes up every few years. Don't discard a promising program or practice based on one year. Let the extremes inform rather than instill worry. This year simply presents unique opportunities to learn.

My vision of rain will come around to real. I have resolved to make ready the flood gaps and fix that hole in the barn roof.





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2012 Carcass Data Project winners named

The Kansas Angus Association 2012 Carcass Data Project (CDP) named winners and closed out its second year at McPherson County Feeders, Marquette, with plans to return this fall. "We're excited that our participation doubled this year," said manager Anne KAA Lampe. She thanked Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) for partnering on the 79head project, and for sponsoring awards of more than \$1,200.

"It was another great year of feeding some of the best Angus cattle in the country," said Landon Shaw, assistant manager at the CAB-licensed feedlot. "Having an Angus-sired pen that gains almost 4 pounds a day, grades 93% Choice and makes 47% CAB certainly proves the value of the breed."

Cattle in the pen came from nine consignors across the state: Hinkson Angus Ranch, Cottonwood Falls; Hobbs Ranch, Penokee; Jeff Klausmeyer, Clearwater; Thomas Klausmeyer, Conway Springs; Dean Larson, Tescott; Dan Melton, Walton: Andv and Mary McCurry, Burrton; Nemaha Valley Angus, Bern; and Howard Woodbury, Quenemo.

Final standings were based on the top three calves from any owner, taking gain and CAB acceptance into account. There were excellent cattle in each consignment, said Gary Fike, beef cattle specialist with the brand.

In a letter of congratulations to all, Fike noted that the top three gainers (regardless of grade) from each owner had an average range of 3.91 lb. to 4.86 lb. average daily gain (ADG). "Anybody who tells you Angus-sired cattle cannot gain AND grade simply doesn't know what they're talking about," he said.

Considering the individual carcass data received, there were no losers, but the formula of gain plus CAB acceptance highlighted a top cut for the CDP.

"I'm glad my Dad won that's how it's supposed to be-I'll get my chance," said Jeff Klausmeyer, whose cattle came in tied for third. The champions, winning \$500 and CAB merchandise, were from Thomas Klausmeyer's consignment that included three calves from his other son, Todd. The K3 Angus family represented nearly 18% of cattle harvested, and they were the right kind.

Eleven of the family's 15 head were accepted for the brand and the top three for the gain/grade combination were 100% CAB, marbling score 623 and 3.89-lb. ADG. Jeff's trio, winning \$200 and CAB

merchandise, made 67% CAB, marbling at 577 and 3.85-lb. ADG. In fact, all other groups of three in the finals turned out with 67% brand acceptance.

Five calves were out of AI (artificial insemination) sires, the rest homeraised bulls that trace back to the top K3 cow family for moderation and marbling. Nearly half of the steers were from firstcalf heifers.

"I think we're steering in the right direction,' Thomas said. Cattle that competed in the CDP were backgrounded in a fall grazing program, he says: two weeks in a grass trap, then rotating to an alfalfa patch before wheat-stockering and on to McPherson County Feeders.

The Klausmeyers rarely retain ownership of any cattle on feed, but after this showing, they may do more of it in the future. "With the genetics we use, it'd be nice to get paid for what we've put into them,' Jeff said.

Terry Hobbs came in second (\$300 and CAB merchandise) in the CDP, just like last year even as the award switched from individual cattle to groups of three. "We still came in second," he said. "Like last year, and like next year, the steers are one sire group and out of firstcalf heifers "

wood New Level out of the New Design line on their dams' side. Superior marbling was the edge, with that score at 603 and ADG at 3.77 lb.

Dean Larson's thirdplace (\$200 and CAB merchandise) steers came from a group of five from heifers that were pasturebred to a calving-ease Green Garden Angus bull. "I didn't breed them for growth, but they sure gained," he said of the 3.77 ADG and 553 marbling score. "We aim for moderate rather than the biggest cattle." Larson said his 135 commercial cows all have similar bloodlines from the same breeder.

"This was kind of a learning experience," he added. "I'm proud of my cattle and those steers represented our herd. It's nice to know they did well." Aside from the combination cash prizes, KAA recognized the top gaining group overall with CAB merchandise. These came from Nemaha Vallev Angus at 4.26 ADG on 14 head that made 50% CAB.

"I would like to think the bulls we kept for breeding stock would do even better," said farm owner-manager Neal Haverkamp. "I entered the CDP to see how they stack up against other quality cattle and to get an idea about what traits we could improve."

Lampe said the KAA mission in the project is. "that our participants gain valuable information that they can in turn use to improve and promote their programs and genetics."

Haverkamp said, "I'd love to see over 100 entries this next year. Competition keeps us working hard to improve our product, and this is a good way to draw attention to the quality of Angus cattle in Kansas.'

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Top producers named in 2012 Kansas Wheat Yield Contest

Three Kansas wheat farmers have each earned \$1,000 by winning their respective regions in the 2012 Kansas Wheat Yield Contest

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John Niswonger, Wallace. harvested 84.65 bushels per acre with a field of the white wheat variety Snowmass to win the Western Kansas Region. Snowmass comes from Plains Gold. Ron Ohlde, Palmer, harvested 84.05 bushels per acre with the Kansas Wheat Alliance variety Everest to win the Central Kansas Region. Steve Tuttle, Basehor, achieved 67.36 bushels per acre with Everest to win the Eastern Kansas Region.

Kansas Gov. Sam Brownback is expected to present prize checks and plaques to the winners at the Kansas State Fair in Hutchinson. The brief presentation occurs at 2:30 p.m. September 13 at the Kansas Wheat Exhibit inside the Pride of Kansas Building.

"The Kansas Wheat Yield Contest is teaching us that farmers who manage their wheat with a bit more intensity can achieve top vields, even when Mother Nature is not completely cooperative," says Justin Gilpin, chief executive officer of Kansas Wheat, the joint agreement between the Kansas Wheat Commission and Kansas Association of Wheat Growers. "Kansas farmers continue

to prove that they can grow abundant supplies of the world's highest quality wheat."

Cash prizes of \$1,000 come from Kansas Wheat and BASF, the corporate sponsor of the Kansas Wheat Yield Contest. In addition, the Kansas Wheat Alliance and Plains Gold will provide bonus cash awards to each winner Other sponsors include Syngenta, Bayer CropScience and Monsanto.

Western Kansas: John Niswonger, Wallace

At planting, John Niswonger's goals for his 2012 wheat crop were pretty high: he fertilized for 100 bushels per acre. Mother Nature, however, had different plans.

"Our in-crop moisture was only about four inches," says Niswonger, who admits the right amount of rain came at the most opportune time, earning him the top yield in the 2012 Kansas Wheat Yield Contest. His 84.65 bushels was achieved with the variety Snowmass, from Plains Gold (formerly the Colorado Wheat Research Foundation).

Niswonger was fortunate that wheat was planted into moisture, thanks to opportune rains in August and September. He planted 75 pounds per acre, striving for 600 to 900 heads per square yard, a goal set by high-yield agronomist Phil Needham. The crop was planted into a cover crop mixture; Niswonger has notilled the contest field for four years.

Prior to planting, 24 pounds of UAN were applied with the burndown chemical application. Micronutrients were added with the seed at planting: these included 110 pounds of MESZ, TigerSol, cooper, manganese and zinc. Topdress fertilizer was split-applied, 45 pounds at greenup and 80 pounds at jointing. Niswonger used streamer bars for the topdress applications.

Ally was used as a postemerge herbicide. Eight ounces of Twinline were applied at flagleaf.

To achieve top yields in western Kansas, Niswonger has strong beliefs. "No-till is a must, and managing crop fertility is the second most important factor," he says, "We can save and store subsoil moisture; the armor on top of the soil is key."

"Wheat is our main cash crop and it is the crop we do the best in," he says. "I think we can do even better. when the weather conditions are a little more favorable."

Central Region:

Ron Ohlde, Palmer Washington County farmer Ron Ohlde attributes top wheat yields to a "systems approach" of production that includes soil sampling, variety selection, seed treatments, fertilization and fungicide application

Ohlde, whose family runs Ohlde Seed Farms near Palmer, begins the crop with top-quality certified seed that has been lengthgraded and treated with Servo DP. He plants 1.2 million seeds per acre, with a goal of getting two to three tillers per plant

Herbicide application depends on what the plans are after wheat: if he wants to be able to plant doublecrop beans after wheat harvest, he uses a contact herbicide. Otherwise, Finesse and 2,4-D are used most of the time.

"We're in a good area that receives adequate rainfall most years," Ohlde says. "We can kind of push the envelope a bit when it comes to wheat yields. Most of the time it pays off."

The contest field had been no-tilled for nine years. He applied 120 pounds of dry fertilizer along with eight pounds of sulfur and three-quarter pounds of zinc prior to planting; and topdressed with 30 gallons of 28% per acre plus about seven gallons of chloride.

Fungicide applications included four ounces of Headline at greenup in the spring, and additional

14 ounces of Quilt at flagleaf.

Participation in the Kansas Wheat Yield Contest gives Ohlde a chance to compare his operation to others. "I love to see how my operation stacks up. It boils down to testing. You've got to test varieties, fertilizer types and rates. Every field and every operation is different, but we can learn from each other," he says.

Eastern Region: Stephen Tuttle

Wheat plays an important role in Stephen Tuttle's farm operation near Basehor. It provides summer income from grain and straw, and provides an excellent rotation crop between corn and soybeans. A strict notill operator, Tuttle says the combination of no-till and standing wheat straw prevents soil erosion on his sloping fields.

"Wheat gives us the chance to control diseases and provide a seedbed for sovbeans right behind the wheat," says Tuttle, whose 2012 contest entry was a field of Everest that yielded 67.36 bushels per acre.


"I was actually a little disappointed in that field," says Tuttle, whose crop was at mid-flowering when it was nipped by an April frost. "I thought we could have gotten another 10 bushels per acre out of that field."

Prior to planting, Tuttle sets a yield goal of about 70 bushels per acre. He buys certified seed that has been run over a gravity table, treating it with Cruiser and Dividend Extreme, planting 100 pounds of seed per acre.

Fertilizer is applied based on every-other-year soil tests, which last fall recommended 50 pounds of 18-6-0 pre-plant. Tuttle supplemented that with 50 pounds of potassium pre-

plant. That field was topdressed with 150 pounds of 46-0-0. He applied seven ounces of Twinline fungicide when the crop had reached the Feekes 10.1 growth stage.

The Yield Contest, he reckons, provided a good incentive to push vields on his wheat acreage, and learn new management skills. "I wanted to learn better production practices that can help improve yields in future wheat crops," Tuttle says



ranchers, industry representatives, and community leaders joined Gov. Sam Brownback last Wednesday at meetings in Scott City and Garden City to discuss next steps in conserving and extending the life of the Ogallala Aquifer. The meetings included presentations from K-State and Kansas Geological Survey staff members who shared information on groundwater projection and economic modeling.

"About two-thirds of our state's agricultural economic value come from the counties that are located above the Ogallala Aquifer," Brownback said. "Last summer more than 400 Kansans attended our economic summit on the future of the Ogallala

• SB 272 - Amend the multi-year flex accounts to expand irrigator's capabilities



While the aquifer in many areas has been declining for decades, the intense drought has heightened the issue even more.

"A group of stakeholders in northwest Kansas called the Sheridan 6 have stepped out and have led their own effort to conserve and extend the water in their area," said Gary Harshberger, Kansas Water Authority and Ogallala Aquifer Advisory Committee Chair. "We are here to encourage this type of local leadership to be duplicated all over the Ogallala Aquifer and help establish other local enmanagement hanced areas."

Brownback also shared with stakeholders the state's willingness to dedicate funding to assist in answering questions and getting Local Enhanced Management Areas started if they desired. He emphasized at both meetings that the state wants to assist in any way that is needed, but this must be a locally led effort.

Producers who trucked in supplemental forages from farther north last year will likely be out of luck this season thanks to the expansive drought.

Many producers will be forced to get creative with feeding and grazing this year, said Justin Waggoner, K-State beef systems specialist, during the 2012 K-State Beef Conference on August 9. "We're probably going to have to make do with what we have," he said.

Waggoner advised producers to explore feeding non-traditional forages, such as crop residues or weeds. Most alternative forages have some associated risk though. "They are nontraditional for a reason," Waggoner said. Testing samples of forage for toxic substances helps assess the risk involved with feeding it.

High nitrate levels in forages are especially important to watch for, Waggoner said. When plants experience stress, such as a drought, their nitrate levels rise, which can be deadly for cattle. Nitrate content up to 3,000 ppm is considered safe, while 3,000 to 6,000 ppm only moderately safe and should not constitute more than half of the ration for stressed animals. If the content is 6,000 to 9,000 ppm, the forage could be toxic and should not be the sole source of feed.

Waggoner said nitrate content is typically variable, and he stressed the importance of thorough sampling. Producers should record the field of origin for each sample. Forage from an area with high nitrate levels may be mixed with forage from an area with lower levels and fed to cattle with lower risk of toxicity.

From an economical perspective, Waggoner also recommended grazing forage whenever possible instead of baling it into hay. "Anytime we run a swather and baler, we're going to tie up \$30 to \$35 a ton in that forage," he said.


If it is necessary to hay, Waggoner recommended ammoniating low quality forage to improve digestibility and intake. To ammoniate, stack bales in a 3,2 or 3,2,1 arrangement and cover the stack with 6 mil black plastic. Seal the edges with soil and insert the anhydrous line, applying about 3 percent ammonia of the total weight of the dry stack. The time the stack should remain covered varies with temperature. At temperatures of more than 80 degrees Fahrenheit, leaving the stacks covered for approximately two weeks is usually sufficient. Waggoner warned against ammoniating forages containing weeds or moderate quality forages, as toxic substances can be produced.

If a producer is able to locate available forages to buy, Waggoner recommended asking a few questions to help assess its quality, since forage is rarely bought or sold with sample results.

1) What did the field look like prior to cutting? What were the dominant plant species?

2) What is the history of management? Was it in CRP?




