Grassroots efforts key to NCBA success

It was while serving an internship in Washington D.C. that Kristina Butts first grasped the importance of ag producers being involved in policy-making at the national level. "It made me really nervous about how many decisions are being made in Washington and how few people really have a background or a science to be applied in the field of agriculture," she told the audience at the Beef Producers Information Seminar at the Flint Hills Beef Fest in Emporia August 23. Now the executive director of legislative affairs for the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, Butts said that at the time, many people were surprised to learn she was not a political science major and instead an agriculture major with a cattle production background. "A lot of the policies that you have going on here in D.C. impact my family's operation and if people like me aren't interested in coming up here and helping you, then we're really going to be in a whole host of trouble when I go back home," she would tell them.

After earning her master's degree from Texas Tech, Butts returned to D.C and worked for five and a half years for the Congressman she had interned with. Upon learning that NCBA had an opening on their lobbying team, she applied. While she had no lobbying experience, she had a valuable quality they quickly recognized - a strong passion for agriculture. "My job is to communicate," she said. "Yes, I'm a lobbyist, but I see myself more as an advocate, a communicator and an educator. My job is to take what we do in the cattle industry and make sure that

these congressional staffers understand."

To help get a bill passed in congress, Butts needs 218 votes, for which she says she cannot rely solely on rural America votes. "There's not enough rural American representation in Washington," she explained. "So I spend a lot of my time working with urban members of Congress and their staff."

Antibiotic use in livestock was the hot button issue when Butts first started with NCBA. While it's not as strong as it once was, she says there are several members of Congress, typically from California and New York, who believe that human resistance to antibiotics is due to the overuse and abuse of them in the livestock industry. She described 6'x6' poster ads in the metro stations with a sow in a gestation crate asking, "Who's hogging the antibiotics?" Or posters on metro cars with a picture of a baby calf and caption that said, "70% of all antibiotics are going to healthy animals." These metro stations were the ones used by Congressional staff to get to and from work. "It was inaccurate, it was inappropriate, but yet it was there," she said. "And that was some of the messaging we were having to message against on Capitol Hill. I have to spend a lot of my time trying to correct the misinformation and propaganda these members of Congress are getting approached with every single day."

One of her projects has been to launch an educationpertise of several Kansas State University experts. "What we do is take complicated topics, that to you would seem very, very simple; but to people who don't know our industry are a little overwhelming." The first one was on food safety and was done in the middle of a big food safety debate. They invited a speaker to come and talk about E.coli O157:H7. "We know about that in the beef industry, but average consumers don't know. So we talked about what we do as an industry, what we do as cow/calf producers, as feed yard owners, as packers and processors, an then what the role of consumers are," Butts described. "Because every time that there is an outbreak or there is a situation that hits the headlines, we typically have legislation that gets introduced in Washington that

usually is not going to be a benefit to the cattle industry. It's going to be more of a harm or some kind of a negative economic impact to what you do every single day.'

tends to be somewhat easier for Butts, because nearly every state has at least some beef production, so there is a way to connect with them. But on the House side, the atmosphere is different, as most of the representatives don't have a beef producer in their district. "But they do have people who eat beef," Butts pointed out as she described her method for showing members of Conal series called Beef 101, in gress the relevance of beef in which she calls on the ex- every state. NCBA used the 2010 census information to determine how much consumers spend on beef at food service and retail. "Remember, I'm talking to city people, so food service and retail," she stressed. They calculated that number to be \$357.27 per person per year. Then they determined the population in every Congressional district in the United States. "So I could actually go into an office and say, 'You have zero cattle producers, you have zero head of beef animals, but you have 650,000 constituents who are spending \$357.27 a year on beef products. And that information opened doors."

> Along with her efforts to educate, Butts credits the grassroots nature of NCBA for many of its successes. "The real reason we are successful in D.C. is because we have membership," she said.

cessful. Because we're coming together from that grassroots approach all the way to Washington."

While there has not been a farm bill passed and the deadline for the extension passed last year is rapidly approaching, Butts says there have been victories for cattlemen on that front. NCBA's membership came together two years before the 2008 farm bill was to expire and put together their priorities, giving Butts her marching orders. Foremost, they wanted the livetock title taken out of the farm bill. Prior to that bill, livestock issues were typically under the miscellaneous title. Neither of the final versions voted on in the Senate and House contained a livestock title.

Membership did want them involved in the conservation title and their voices were heard loud and clear when it looked as though the 60% allocation to help livestock producers get in compliance with environmental regulations was about to be slashed. "Not only did my membership say, 'No, leave that 60% number in there,' but they said, 'Hell no, make sure that number doesn't change." Butts said. "So we went to Congress and delivered the message. A few weeks later we had the NCBA fly-in in Washington and then I got a phone call that afternoon and the staffer said, 'Call off your cowboys and your cowgirls, we heard the message loud and clear.

That 60% number is still in there, it has a lot of support.' We wouldn't have been able to achieve that if it wasn't for our grassroots."

The contentious nutrition title of the farm bill that caused its failure in the House and eventually its removal from the bill altogether was a blow to agriculture. The Senate-passed version of the bill contained \$4.5 billion in savings while the failed House version called for \$20 billion. Because the bill failed, there would be no savings or reforms made to the Nutrition title because its authorization is mandatory and not discretionary spending. "They don't need a fiveyear farm bill to authorize their programs," Butts explained. "But you do need a five-year farm bill to authorize your farm programs."

Republican leadership has said they will bring a nutrition bill back to the House when they get back on September 9 and Butts says they have also been told it will contain \$40 billion in cuts. With Congress only in session for ten days in September, it will be difficult, though not impossible to get the bill passed before the extension expires on September 30. "We're going to make a huge effort and a big push to get this farm bill done," she stated. "We want to get a five-year farm bill, we don't want another extension and we don't want to kick the can down the road any further."

AGCO unveils \$45 million paint center

Gleaner® combines and Mercedes-Benz automobiles seldom come up in the same conversation, but the two brands now have something in common. Thanks to an investment of more than \$45 million in its Hesston manufacturing facility, both have the same stateof-the-art paint and finishing technology.

A ribbon-cutting held August 16, 2013, in conjunction with the launch of the new Gleaner S8 Super Series combines, marked the unveiling of the new AGCO paint facility. As a result, AGCO is the first agricultural equipment manufacturer to E-coat and powderpaint all major parts on harvesting and hay equipment products.

The new 200,000-square-foot dip and powder-coat paint facility consolidates AGCO Hesston Operations' paint stations from two operations into one streamlined, efficient building. Parts for all products manufactured in Hesston will be painted and finished there before being assembled into final products. Nearly 75 percent of parts will go through a Continued on page 3



Hunting is one of my hobbies, I enjoy being outdoors. Deer hunting is one of my favorites; I relish the peace and quiet that comes with sitting in my stand. However, I must admit that I also enjoy seeing big bucks. Oh, I know you can't eat the horns but few things are as interesting as a big set of deer horns.

That is one of the reasons I enjoy watching hunting shows. I am far too poor to be able to travel to hunt other places so I live vicariously through deer hunting shows on TV. More and more lately they have been coming here to Kansas to hunt and I find that intriguing also, I like to try to figure out where in the state they are hunting.

All of this leads up to one day last week when I was in the house working on my "honey-do" list with a hunting show on the TV in the background. That was when I heard the announcer say that this week's show was coming from Kansas and I immediately stopped work on my "honey-do" list (a common occurrence) and immediately started watching. The host of the show described the great deer habitat (I think somewhere in south central Kansas) and how he had seen many huge bucks on a trip several years earlier.

The hunt started out and the host explained that Kansas had been in the throes of a terrible drought. He walked and looked for deer, but to his dismay, no "trophy" bucks could be found. He then proceeded to explain why he could find no "trophy" bucks and that statement floored me on two counts.

The camera panned over the surrounding acres, showing cattle grazing on very short grass and as it did he made the following statement. "All of these fields used to have crops on them, but the owners have chosen to pull them out of agricultural production and graze cattle on them. Unfortunately this has ruined the deer habitat."

My first thought was, "You have got to be kidding. This guy thinks grazing cattle is not agricultural production." Apparently in his mind the advice and counsel of the previif the land did not have corn, soybeans or wheat on it, it was a barren wasteland. My second thought was, "I feel so bad for you, Mr. Professional Hunter. Some bumbling farmer has planted his entire deer habitat to grass for his cattle. What will the deer eat? How will they survive? How dare that farmer put his livelihood ahead of deer hunting?"

All of this shows what I really think is a disconnect between those bent on pursuing trophy deer and farmers and ranchers. A couple of years ago one of the outdoor magazines came out with an article proclaiming that Kansas was the home of huge "trophy" whitetail deer. It produced a boom in tourism and brought dollars into our small rural communities. Agricultural lands were leased up and it brought in a much-needed stream of cash to many landowners. Life was good, for a while.

But, as with anything, we seem to have taken this a little too far and our unsuspecting deer hunting show host is a prime example. The use of our lands for agriculture (and that does include cattle) and the subsequent management of those lands is what made them great deer habitat. The diversity of our agricultural production provided the deer with both abundant food sources and the right kind of cover.

Fast-forward that to today. Many acres have been purchased specifically for deer hunting and taken out of agricultural production. Practices like brush control, prescribed burning and grazing have been discontinued to allow the property to grow into brush and forest. Food plots have been planted in an effort to concentrate the deer on the property. All of this has led to two things happening.

First, I really suspect (this is just my observation from many years of deer hunting) that this has resulted in a decline in the number of trophy bucks. Every trophy deer I have ever encountered was a loner. They prefer isolated patches of cover where they can see what is coming and either hide or sneak away from it. I suspect a properly managed native pasture with isolated timber and pockets of brush would hold bigger bucks.

Second, taking this land out of agricultural production has hurt many, many farmers and ranchers. I recently talked to one producer who had lost over 4,000 acres to hunting over the past ten years. I am a big believer in private property rights and I truly believe the owner has the right to do with their land as they choose.

All I ask is that they consider ous tenant. This person has managed the land over, in most cases, many years. During this time trophy deer and agriculture have peacefully co-existed and even thrived. I am sure most farmers and ranchers would be more than happy to work with the new landowner to develop a plan that will be mutually beneficial to both

This would be a win/win situation for all and would keep the land in agricultural production, and yes, Mr. Hunting Show Host, that does include cattle.

Phone usage and etiquette have changed significantly during the past few vears. Before Apple launched its iPhone on June 29, 2007, all you could do on a phone was send and receive calls - and painfully, text.

Can you ever forget your first text - 1,2,3 or maybe it was a,b,c. In technology terms, that was eons ago.

Cellular phones are smart today. Most of the time they are smarter than their users, especially in my case. They are as much appdriven as talk and text.

17-step E-coat process, which involves dipping parts in a series of solutions that remove all rust, scale and laser oxides, then applies a high-performance corrosionand weather-resistant finish comparable to that used in the luxury automotive indus-

The E-coat primer is applied using a high-voltage and high-amperage charge for 180 seconds, ensuring thorough coverage. After curing in one of ten 375-degree Fahrenheit ovens, parts receive a powder topcoat with one of five colors, then another final oven cure.

The remaining 25 percent of parts, including gearboxes and drives; components that cannot withstand heat; and parts that are best painted after they are assembled will be painted using a liquid coating system. However, even parts painted in the liqsix-step process similar to the powder-paint system.

"It is an advancement we're very proud of and it's the most recent example of AGCO's commitment to providing our customers with the highest-quality haying and harvesting equipment products possible," says Bob Crain, senior vice president and general manager for AGCO North America. "That is the reason we have invested in this new Ecoat and powder paint facility, which is the most advanced and extensive coatings application center in the North American agricultural equipment industry today.

As Crain relates, the flexible system will be employed across the full offering of large square and round balers, small square balers, combines, grain headers, pull-type and self-propelled conditioners,

uid paint system undergo a windrower tractors and planters manufactured in Hesston under the Gleaner, Massey Ferguson®, Challenger® and White brand names.

> According to Todd Seeley, director of operations, paint/assembly at the AGCO Hesston facility, the process actually starts in a new load station area where parts are loaded onto new automated guided vehicles (AGVs). The AGVs are a type of robot that follows wires and magnets in the floor to move racks of parts to and from the paint system. Here, they start the 17-step process by passing through 15 different dip tanks, each holding 35,000 gallons of liquid.

All total, the process takes approximately 4 1/2 hours and results in a finish with increased resistance to corrosion, ultraviolet light and weathering. However, the process also has substan-

tial environmental benefits. Seeley relates that the new system not only provides AGCO with a savings in electricity, gas and water, but has reduced VOCs (volatile organic compounds) by approximately 75%. In addition, the powder paint process transfers approximately 95% of the paint to the part, compared to about 50% in a liquid paint process. Plus, all powder paint that doesn't adhere to the product is recovered through an elaborate recirculation and filtering system.

"Kansas is in the middle of two great revivals — agriculture and manufacturing," commented Gov. Sam Brownback, who participated in the ribbon cutting. "I don't know of another business like agriculture that is expected to do more each year with less. Fortunately, with the help of companies like AGCO, we're back and growing and supplying what the world needs.'

AGCO Corporation's commitment to Kansas manufacturing isn't limited to the new Hesston paint facility,

either. Since 2009, \$3.2 million has been invested in laser cutters at the Hesston facility, bringing the total number to 11 high-powered lasers that cut steel of all weights and strengths into pieces used in equipment manufacturing. In addition, in 2011, AGCO invested more than \$830,000 to bring combine rotor production from Brazil to Hesston. The rotor robot cell now produces the axial rotors for all Class 7 and 8 combines and transverse rotors for Gleaner class 6, 7 and 8 combines.

APPLE CRISP

Cooking oil

10 cups all-purpose apples, peeled, cored & sliced

- 1 cup white sugar (may use ½ cup Splenda and ½ cup sugar)
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup water mixed with 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Spray cooking oil in a 9-by-13-inch pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place the sliced apples in the pan. Mix white sugar, 1 tablespoon flour and ground cinnamon together, and sprinkle over apples. Pour water evenly over all. Combine the oats, 1 cup flour, brown sugar, baking powder, baking soda and melted butter together. Crumble evenly over the apple mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes. Serve warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.



Serving The Most Important Meal Of The Day With Grandma's Love

Corning, Kansas ... when you Google it you may find entries such as "highest point in Nemaha County," "halfway between Centralia and Wetmore," and "nearly hit by a killer tornado."

All the above are true but when you zoom into the close-knit community of under 200 residents, you will also discover the "not on Google" story of Dorothy "Grandma" Talley.

In 1924 Dorothy was born in the small Kansas town of Soldier. She grew up, graduated from Corning Rural High School and that same year was married. She worked for dress factories in Holton, Horton and Onaga and operated the Home Cafe in Corning.

She was a 4-H leader, teaching many to bake bread and crochet. She raised her family and cared for many.

Fast-forward to 1997, Dorothy was in her 70s and decided to open her home to her two grandsons, Matt & Ross and the Centralia football team. Rising early on the Fridays before high school football games, Grandma Dorothy would prepare a homemade breakfast of biscuits and gravy and orange juice. The team

would come to her home, a.m. to start the biscuits set up card tables and chairs, devour the offering of fuel for the morning, and then put away the tables and chairs before heading to

She continued to keep the tradition alive on her own until 2002 when some of the mothers stepped in to assist in getting the groceries and organizing moms to help with the meals.

In the fall of 2005, Dorothy was 81 years young but turned the sunrise meal over to the parents of the team and the gathering was moved to the Legion Hall. Since that transition, various Corning moms have taken the leadership role of ensuring the breakfast remains a tradition.

For the past four years, Hannah Huerter (Grandma Dorothy's grand-daughter) and Lydia Steinlage have been working as a team getting the biscuits prepared. Their sons, Cody and Theo, are seniors on the team this

According to Steinlage, "The plan for the 2013 season is for Hannah to brown approximately ten pounds of raw sausage and bag it while I will make four batches of the biscuit mix. We will arrive around 5

from scratch as "Grandma" did for years.

"The other parents arrive around 6 to make a roaster of sausage gravy from scratch, which has been a learning experience for a lot of the young moms."

Then around 7 a.m. the 43-member team from Centralia and Wetmore schools, along with five coaches and three managers arrive. They have their breakfast before going to either Centralia or

the day.

The sausage and milk are donated by team member's families. The boys pay about \$1 per week to cover costs of the biscuits, juice and paper products used.

Then under the Friday night lights, the Centralia/Wetmore Panthers unite on the field for the game.

To kick off the 2013 football season, the breakfast is planned for Sept. 6.

Wetmore high schools for The gathering will be slightly more somber, however, as someone very important will be missing.

Homemade Biscuit Mix 10 cups all-purpose flour

1/3 cup baking powder 1/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons salt

2 cups Crisco shortening

Using a mixer and a large mixing bowl, stir together all ingredients until it resembles coarse crumbs. Store in an air-tight container for up to six weeks at room temperature. Mix can be frozen in freezer bags for up to six months.

To make biscuits: Place 2 cups Homemade Biscuit Mix in a bowl and add 1/2 cup milk. Stir with a fork just until dough follows fork around bowl. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface. Knead gently for 10-12 strokes. Roll to ½ inch thickness and cut with floured biscuit cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in a 450-degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown and baked through. Makes 10 biscuits.


How we make biscuits for the Centralia/Wetmore football team: Make 3 batches of Biscuit Mix. Pour mix into LARGE bowl (we use stainless steel) and pour in milk. Stir with fork or dig in with your hands to mix the dough. Continue to add additional mix or milk until you have thoroughly moistened dough that stays together in a nice ball. It will take approximately 3/4 gallon of milk. Use flour to roll out and cut with a drinking glass or cutter. Take scraps and knead together again and roll out until all dough is used. Makes approximately 96 biscuits.

Note: To speed up processing, a commercial mixer can be used to make huge quantities of biscuit mix. A

Kitchenaid Mixer will do one batch at a time. Some years we have gone to our local Catholic church and made a tub of mix to use. Other years we will make mix as we go. Both methods work well. We have also baked biscuits on Wednesday or Thursday evenings and rewarmed on game day.



Border Justice

Kiowa was established as a trading post on the Medicine Lodge River in 1872. The town was an outpost for traders and cattlemen venturing into Indian Territory. By 1885 the Southern Kansas Railroad was pressing westward toward the isolated border settlements along Kansas' southern border. A railroad offered the prospect of growth to frontier towns. Most towns welcomment.

men evaluated the situa-

ed railroad developers, however, the town of Kiowa refused to provide the railroad with eighty acres of land for a depot and siding development. Railroad men needed the support of townspeople and rarely ventured into a community without public commitment to develop-

In response, a group of forward-thinking cattle-

tion and joined together to form a town company. They proposed to build a new town a short distance from Kiowa. The cattlemen were interested in establishing a location that would serve as a shipping point for the surrounding ranches. The Kiowa" Town Company negotiated an arrangement with the Southern Kansas Railroad to provide just half of its demands, namely forty acres of land for railroad development of the town. By the time the first

train steamed into New Kiowa on August 6, 1885, the town boasted one thousand residents. The first trainload of cattle shipped just three days later, August 9, 1885. By late August

the military established a temporary encampment of three companies of cavalry and four companies of infantry at New Kiowa. The southern Kansas outpost was booming. Adventurers and rounders of every sort converged on the town. Mysterious Dave Mather and Dave Black, former operators of Dodge City's Opera House Saloon quickly established themselves. Black kept a frontier bar reportedly in partnership with Mather who also claimed the position of city marshal for New Kiowa. That may have been too comfortable of a combination for Black.

New Kiowa was every bit the wild border town filled to the brim with excitement. On a warm August evening, his saloon filled with soldiers, Black offered a comment to an infantry soldier that wasn't taken in the spirit it was given. The Kiowa Herald wrote that the two men quarreled, "over some trifling matter, the nature of which we cannot learn. For some real or fancied insult, Black was knocked down by the soldier, and

as soon as he recovered from the effects of the blow, he drew his revolver and fired, the ball entering the groin, and it is thought, penetrating the intestines." Realizing his own safety was at stake, Dave Black slipped away during the ensuing excitement, but city officers sealed off every "every avenue of escape." Marshal



Mather was not mentioned by name, but he would certainly have been among the officers who promptly responded to the disturbance. The Herald reported that Black was captured, "securely guarded (and) placed in the city prison to await the action of the courts."

The soldier died the next evening. The paper described Dave Black as a "Dodge City desperado." Marshal Mather knew that protecting his friend's life in New Kiowa would be an impossible matter with so many soldiers in the town. Quietly Mather and his deputies slipped Black out of jail and hurried him off to the town of Hazelton seven miles northeast of New Kiowa. The officers were barely out of town when according to the September 3, 1885, Herald, a mob of "a hundred or more" soldiers raided the vacant jail. The next morning Black was returned to New Kiowa for a preliminary examination before being whisked off Wellington to await trial in the next term of court

Whether desperado or not, Black had many friends on the southern frontier. He could count among them men who had participated in the famous Dodge City Saloon War of 1883. Both Mysterious Dave and Dave Black backed saloon-keeper Luke Short when A. B. Webster tried to have Short run out of town. Short survived by calling together Bat Masterson, Wyatt Earp, Rowdy Joe

Black's friends took up a collection for his dedepositing the money with Marshal Mysterious Dave Mather. But whispers turned ominous when rumors were heard that the soldiers were planning another this time to capture Marshal Mather. Always vigilant, Mather left town immediately. Neither he nor the three hundred dollars collected for Black's defense were ever seen again. Black was eventually released. Some say Black hunted his "friend" down and dispensed justice the only way he knew how on The Way West.

should be compensated annually and at a fair market value if their property is affected by the construction of the transmission line. The organization also recommends compensation packages include reimbursement for substantial changes in the functionality of operations impacted by the line.

Farm Bureau recommended siting lines along section or property lines when possible; asked the Commission to require notice to landowners before



Agri-tourism business creates obstacle course with repurposed farm equipment

The early morning sun slanted hard across the grassy pastures a few miles east of Palmer when Sheila Rogge, co-owner of Scattered Acres Outfitters, brought the Ranger to a stop. Below us a small farm pond reflected the light like a silvered sheet of metal, but it wasn't the bucolic scenery that drew our attention. We watched a man running hard toward the pond where a series of pontoons loosely tied to one another awaited.

"The trick is to keep going and not slow down," she said.

The man hit the pontoons with the dexterity of a mountain goat leaping from boulder to boulder. But unlike boulders, each platform skittered side-

violently downward before pitching sharply upward an accelerated with amount of force. The man made it to the fourth pontoon before sailing headfirst into the water.

I almost felt sorry for the guy, but then reminded myself that he had paid good money for the privilege. He had it coming. Not for nothing was the obstacle course named Scattered and Battered. Maybe they should have added Dunked to the name.

Scattered and Battered was held on Saturday, Aug. 24, at Scattered Acres Outfitters. The name was a play on words, partly denoting the name of the business as well as the var-

ways or forwards or tilted jous types of terrain runners would encounter along the four-mile course; battered was what participants could expect.

The idea for the race was originally as a means to promote business opportunities for the hunting lodge during off-season. As word started getting out of the obstacle course race, or OCR as it's known to the legions of fans and fanatics, the race began to take on a life of its own, Rogge said.

"Obstacle racing has grown by leaps and bounds the last few years," she said. "It appeals to people who want more than just running. In fact, it really appeals to people with Attention Deficit Disorder."

Based upon such notable events as Warrior

Dash, Tough Mudder and Spartan Race, OCRs are designed to test resilience, strength, stamina, decisiveness and agility through torturous quasi-military obstacle courses. Individuals or teams can compete. Scattered and Battered certainly fit those terms, only the obstacles were scrounged and found objects, mostly farm-related, something Rogge called "repurposed farm equipment." Stock racks became vertical mazes, tractor tires became objects to flip endover-end across a pasture, hay bales were landing platforms beneath massive

cable spools left over from a major transmission line upgrade, farm ponds were "snake pits" with telephone pole barricades, barbed wire became latticework covering muddy sloughs, corn fields became circuitous paths and left-over industrial pallets formed a tall vertical barricade known as the Road Block. In addition, every aspect of the terrain was utilized to form a devilishly complicated obstacle course, from deep wooded creek bottoms, CRP pastures, cropland and the dreaded Mount Sinai.

But not so complicated

that only fitness buffs could survive. From the start, Rogge wanted it to be a family event. "A lot of races won't allow young kids to participate," she said. "I wanted this to be a family event, too. I wanted it to be for everybody, no matter what shape they were in. One person called it 'extreme adventure walking.' I liked that."

Similar races are held in Omaha and Kansas City, Rogge said, though the latter takes place on a golf course. "We wanted a country theme with as many types of obstacles as possible," she said. "After all,





we're a registered agritourism business."

Party passes were available for spectators or family members who just wanted to watch the fun. Hayrack rides along the course were also available. The inaugural event drew 177 participants, some dressed in costumes ranging from bejeweled princesses to neon green ballerinas with peach and mauve tutus. and a Spiderman outfit. Face-painting was popular among a small segment. cross the finish line, dozens of comments were being posted to Scattered and Battered's Facebook page by enthusiastic participants. They posted photos, offered insights into what they considered their most dreadful obstacle, thanked the Rogges effusively. Mostly they wanted assurance that there would be a second Scattered and Battered, as if the race had been something long overdue, an essential ingredient missing from the fabric of rural Washington Coun-

Rogge, who earlier had expressed doubts about another race due to the logistics of finding enough support staff (there were 41, mostly family members and neighbors), finally responded: "What a race, thanks for all the support! Already planning for next year"

Coming up dry: study focuses on future availability of groundwater in High Plains Aquifer

trends continue, 69 percent of the groundwater stored in the High Plains Aquifer of Kansas will be depleted in 50 years. But immediately reducing water use could extend the aquifer's lifetime and increase net agricultural production through the year 2110.

Those findings are part of a recently published study by David Steward, professor of civil engineering, and colleagues at Kansas State University. The study investigates the future availability of groundwater in the High Plains Aquifer — also called the Ogallala Aquifer — and how reducing use would affect cattle and crops. The aquifer supplies 30 percent of nation's irrigated groundwater and serves as the most agriculturally important irrigation in Kansas.

"Tapping unsustainable groundwater stores for agricultural production in the High Plains Aquifer of Kansas, projections to 2110" appears in the scientific journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences of the United States of America, or PNAS. The study took four years to complete and was funded by the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Kansas State University's Rural Transportation Institute.

"I think it's generally understood that the groundwater levels are going down and that at some point in the future groundwater pumping rates are going to have to

If current irrigation decrease," Steward said. "However, there are lots of questions about how long the water will last, how long the aquifer will take to refill and what society can do."

> Steward conducted the study with Kansas State University's Michael Apley, professor of clinical sciences and an expert in cattle production; Stephen Welch, professor of agronomy, who helped with a statistics method called bootstrapping; Scott Staggenborg, adjunct professor in agronomy who studies agricultural production methods; Paul Bruss, a 2011 master's degree graduate in civil engineering; and Xiaoying Yang, a former post

who is now at Fudan University in China.

Using measurements of groundwater levels in the past and present day in those regions, Steward and colleagues developed a statistical model that projected groundwater declines in western Kansas for the next 100 years and the effect it will have to cattle and crops.

According to their model, researchers estimated that 3 percent of the aquifer's water had been used by 1960. By 2010, 30 percent of the aquifer's water had been tapped. An additional 39 percent of the aquifer's reserve is projected to be used

doctoral research assistant by 2060 — resulting in the loss of 69 percent of the aquifer's groundwater given current use. Once depleted, the aquifer could take an average of 500-1,300 years to completely refill given current recharge rates, Steward

> Although the High Plains Aquifer will continue declining, researchers anticipate even greater efficiencies in water use during the next 15-20 years.

> "Society has been really smart about using water more efficiently, and it shows," Steward said. "Water use efficiencies have increased by about 2 percent a year in Kansas, which means that every year we're growing about 2 percent more crop for each unit of water. That's happening because of increased irrigation technology, crop genetics and water management strategies.'

As a result, researchers anticipate that while peak water use will happen around 2025, western Kansas will see increased corn and cattle production until the year 2040. What happens past that time frame depends on what decisions are made about reducing the use of the aquifer's water in the near future, Steward said.

The team conducted several hypothetical scenarios that reduced the current pumping rate by 20 percent, 40 percent, 60 percent and 80 percent. Steward said the researchers went as high as 80 percent because that closely aligned with the aquifer's natural groundwater recharge rate of about 15 percent of current pumping.

"The main idea is that if we're able to save water today, it will result in a substantial increase in the number of years that we will have irrigated agriculture in Kansas," Steward said. "We'll be able to get more crop in the future and more total crop production from each unit of water because those efficiencies are projected to increase in the future."

Steward said he hoped the study helps support the current dialogue about decisions affecting how water can help build resiliency for agriculture in the future.

"We really wrote the paper for the family farmer who wants to pass his land on to his grandchildren knowing that they will have the same opportunities that farmers do today," Steward said. "As a society, we have an opportunity to make some important decisions that will have consequences for future generations, who may or may not be limited by those decisions."

Governor updates drought emergency, warnings and watches in Kansas counties

tions continue for western Kansas while central and eastern counties see improvement. This has led Gov. Sam Brownback to update the Drought Declaration for Kansas counties with an Executive Order 13-02. For the first time since July 2012 conditions have improved enough to remove or decrease the emergency drought status for some Kansas counties.

"We are thankful recent rains have helped remove 23 counties from a drought designation," said Brownback. "Unfortunately, our state continues to battle drought as most of the state remains in some level of drought status." The updated drought declaration has moved 20 counties into a warning status and 25 into a watch status while 37 counties continue to be in emergency. This action was recommended by Tracy Streeter, director of the Kansas Water Office and chair of the Governor's Drought Response Team.

"Our focus is to ensure communities, livestock have the available resources they need," said Streeter. "With most federal reservoirs refilling and streamflow restored by rains over the past few weeks, the concerns have lessened, however we remain very cautious as we compare where we are today to last year based on total soil moisture and precipitation amounts. Some areas of western Kansas are behind more than ten inches in soil moisture."

Counties who are still in emergency stage remain eligible for emergency use of water from certain state fishing lakes due to the Kansas Water Office (KWO) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Kansas Department of Wildlife (KDWPT). Emergency haying and grazing is also still available for those counties on a case-by-case request to the USDA-Farm Service

Individuals and communities need to contact KWO for a water supply request prior to any withdrawals from lakes. They

the appropriate KDWPT office to obtain the necessary permit to withdraw the water. For emergency haying and grazing, requests need to be directed

This Executive Order shall remain in effect for those counties so identified until rescinded by Executive Order or superseded by a subsequent Executive Order revising the drought stage status of the affected counties. Effective immediately:





Labor Day on the Farm

Labor Day was created by unions to recognize the American worker. It did not include ranching and farming; if they did it would destroy the ability of a farmer to get a loan. If a farmer included the cost of his daily labor on a financial statement, no banker could find a way to show a profit. But things have changed. 'Haying' used to be a full time job for teens in the summer. Tossing bales onto a flatbed, stacking them on the truck, hauling them back to the hay yard or the barn, throwing bales off and restacking them. It was always hot, sticky, scratchy, sweaty and hard. But if you were on the football team in high school you'd finish the last cutting with money in the bank and muscles like Arnold Schwarzenegger! Oh, and the suntan was free

Fast forward to today. Teenagers in farm communities now have to go to the gym all summer to get in shape. Because one farmer

with a round baler, a selfpropelled inline bale wrapper, and a tractor with a bale spear can do the work of a full teenage hayin' crew in half the time.

One of the most labor-intensive chores on the ranch is building fence. I worked for a big outfit that had several large ranches with miles of fence. We had a four-man crew. They would set the corners and the brace posts with posthole diggers and tamping bars. The roll of barbwire would be strung out, carried by two men often walking for miles when the country was

too rough to drive along the fence line. Then the wire was stretched and the steel posts were driven in the ground with a 15-pound post pounder every 20 or so feet. Stays and clips were spun on to finish. Sometimes they could do a mile a day.

Today we have a tractor with a posthole digger on the three-point hitch and a post pounder (or pusher in places where it rains). For those who still want to "rough it" there is the handheld hydraulic post driver. Some handwork always has to be done; stretchers, inline strainers, corner braces, and a good eve for a straight line but we have reduced the amount of sweat work and the need for a crew of four strong men.

How about the old days of chopping weeds in the row crops? I remember the Bracero program along the Mexican border where workers legally came into

the U.S. to chop weeds, hand plant and harvest crops. The U.S. government stopped the program because it was supposedly taking work from able-bodied Americans. The very next year every cotton farmer in the Rio Grande Valley had bought a McCormick cotton picking machine. Now we spray for weeds or use genetically modified crops that resist insects, weeds and disease. When I was a lad we milked one cow. It supplied butter and milk for our family. Most farmers kept five or ten milk cows. It took an hour or two every morning. It was the longest part of 'doing the chores.' Farmers sold their milk and cream or traded it for goods. Even today in highly automated dairies milking thousands of cows, it is still an intensive, hands-on part of agriculture. The only thing they don't have to do is milk them!

There are many more examples of the amount of 'labor' required in farming and ranching, then and now, but it is that last one that comes to mind. On my wall is a painting of my grandfather walking from the "cooling room" (where the fresh milk was kept in running water to stay cool) carrying a

bucket to the pump at the windmill. Then he would walk back and feed the hogs, scatter grain to the chickens, turn the draft horses out, then up to the house for breakfast. If they painted that picture today, he would be on his four-wheeler and probably weighing another twenty pounds!

Prairie Talk to explore Kansas water issues

The extended drought has reminded us that reliable, clean water is essential for human health, our communities and the environment, as well as for economic growth. Are we still in a drought? What can an individual homeowner, rancher, or farmer expect in the coming year? These questions and more will be addressed in a free community discussion at Pioneer Bluffs near Matfield Green.

At 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, September 7, community members are invited to a Prairie Talk at Pioneer Bluffs on the topic Water in Kansas. Susan Stover of the Kansas Water Office will discuss water planning and priorities.

The Ogallala - High Plains aquifer in western and south central Kansas has serious longterm declines. New innovative programs have been initiated to help conserve and extend the Ogallala aquifer. However, eastern Kansas is also projected to be facing shortages. Reservoirs play a large role in meeting demands in the eastern Kansas basins. The Neosho Basin is one of the more vulnerable basins, requiring infrastructure and management improvements to meet future needs.

"Water is an essential component of this region's development, and will be a determinant in its future' Stover said. "My talk with cover a few basics on water supply, demand and management, and the priority water concerns facing Kansas. I look forward to an informal open discussion."

Stover, a licensed geologist, is manager of High Plains Issues with the Kansas Water Office, the state's water planning agency, where she is involved in a range of water conservation initiatives. Prior to the Water Office, Susan worked on contamination remediation sites at Kansas Department of Health and Environment. She is a member of the Kansas Water Research Institute, serves on the Geological Society of America's Geology and Public Policy Committee, and is active in K-12 science education.

Lunch will be available at noon for visitors who would like to come early and tour the historic site, including The Gallery at Pioneer Bluffs. There is no charge for the Prairie Talk or for lunch, however donations are gratefully accepted. NASS to resume milk production surveys in October

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service will resume milk production quarterly producer surveys in the new federal fiscal year, which begins October 1, 2013. NASS suspended the surveys in April of this year to meet the budget reductions required by sequestration. The agency uses information gathered in the quarterly surveys along with various sources of administrative data to establish the monthly milk production estimates. With the quarterly surveys, the dairy cow and milk per cow statistics will once again be available. These are critical data points for interested parties to forecast future milk supply. The program will resume with a late September mailing of the survey form to producers and the release of resulting data on October 21.

U.S. farm equipment exports decline 9.5 percent in first half of 2013

Exports of U.S. agricultural equipment dropped 9.5 percent during the first half of 2013 compared to midyear 2012 to total \$6.5 billion, down from \$7.2 billion a year earlier, according to the Association of Equipment Manufacturers (AEM). The AEM off-road equipment manufacturing trade group produces global trends reports for members consolidating U.S. Commerce Department data with other sources.

The steepest declines in American farm machinery exports were to South America, Europe and Australia/Oceania, with Asia among the regions showing a modest gain.

For agricultural equipment exports for the first half of 2013, compared with midyear 2012:

Exports to South America declined 29 percent to \$574 million; exports to Europe dropped 23 percent to \$1.7 billion; and exports to Australia/Oceania decreased 24 percent to \$463 million.

Exports to Asia increased 7 percent for a total \$654 million, with exports to Central America gaining 2 percent to \$603 million.

Exports to Canada increased 8 percent for a total \$2.4 billion. Exports to Africa declined 8 percent for a total \$220 million. The top countries buying U.S.-made farm machinery for the first half of 2013 were: (1) Canada -\$2.4 billion, up 8 percent; (2) Mexico - \$521 million, up 2 percent; (3) Australia - \$429 million, down 25 percent; (4) China - \$289 million, down 1 percent; (5) Germany - \$274 million, down 16 percent; (6) Brazil - \$261 million, down 38 percent; (7) France - \$196 million, down 22 percent; (8) Russia - \$183 million, down 21 percent; (9) South Africa - \$156 million, down 10 percent; (10) Ukraine - \$145 million, down 46 percent.

A stronger feeder-cattle market looming this fall

After being on the defensive for much of the first half of 2013, feeder-cattle markets are poised to hold stronger in the second half of the year.

Derrell Peel, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock marketing specialist, explains good prospects for a big corn crop and corn-price relief combined with significantly improved forage conditions are being reflected in stronger feeder-cattle prices and opening up more marketing options for cow-calf and stocker producers.

"Oklahoma feeder-cattle prices have increased about \$20 per hundredweight for all weights since the lows in late May," he said. "Calf prices are currently about \$25 per hundredweight higher than this time last

In 2012, calf prices increased \$20 to \$22 per hundredweight (cwt.) between August and November. The basis for lightweight feeder cattle continues to be relatively strong compared to feeder-cattle futures.

"An average basis and the current feeder-cattle futures price would indicate that 500-pound steers in Oklahoma City would be at least \$172 per hundredweight in November," Peel said. "However, the current strong basis suggests the price could be \$180 per hundredweight or higher this fall. Both the current cash market and the feeder-cattle futures suggest cow-calf producers should expect calf prices to be \$10 to \$15 per hundredweight higher than last November."

The recent increase in feeder-cattle prices has significantly increased the value of additional weight gain for feeder cattle. The most recent combined Oklahoma auction prices reflect a stocker value of gain between \$1.05 and \$1.15 per pound for all combinations of beginning weight and gains of 50 to 350 lb.

MU researchers study embryonic deaths to find ways to boost beef calf crop

Beef herd owners would be shocked to learn they'd lost 25 percent of cow pregnancies in two weeks. It happens all the time. And owners never know it.

"Huge losses occur before farmers know their cows are pregnant," says Mike Smith, University of Missouri animal scientist. "Many losses occur before

the cows know they are pregnant."

Pregnancy checks in University of Missouri research herds show that three days after breeding, 95 percent of all cows bred are with calf. But 14 to 16 days later pregnancies drop to 70 percent. Early embryonic death loss cuts calf crops.

Preventing pregnancy losses offers profit potential to the beef industry. That research continues at the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources.

Transportation and heat stress cause losses. Loading cows on a truck and moving them after breeding creates stress. Timing and method of moves affect loss rates. Heat stresses come from the sun and from toxic endophyte-infected fescue

Smith studied embryonic death loss while earning his Ph.D. He did the research in the 1970s at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Beeville, Texas.

Until recently, early pregnancy detection was difficult. New tools were

developed by MU scientists in the Food for the 21st Century (F21C) program. They use hormonal assays to detect protein signals from the cow's placenta. Also, new high-resolution ultrasound monitors show early embryos.

"Earlier, we didn't have tools to do this basic work,"

Smith says.

Now, Smith returns to his studies in beef herds at Fort Keogh, Mont., MU Thompson Farm and in Brazil. Study of pregnancy loss requires large herds of cows to get significant results.

With fixed-time artificial insemination, developed at MU Thompson Farm, herd owners regularly achieve 65 percent of cows pregnant at day 90 after breeding. With timed AI, all cows in a herd are bred on the first day of breeding season. "When you get over 70 percent

pregnant, that is phenomenal considering embryonic losses," Smith says.

Basic research on maternal hormones was sponsored by F21C, funded by the Missouri legislature. Smith's students aid in the research. Results are conveyed to farmers through field days and MU Exten-

MU received a five-year grant to study genetic defects affecting early embryonic losses in heifers.

The Sept. 17 field day will show other studies from the MU herd. That includes the new manage-

ment and marketing program, "Quality Beef by the Numbers." Enrolled herd owners can profit from better management.

Farmers attending the free event get a first look at new methods to breed cows. Registration starts at 9:30 a.m. The day ends with wagon tours by 3 p.m. To reach Thompson Farm, go to the end of Highway C, seven miles west of Highway 65 at Spickard. Also, the farm can be reached from Highway A off of Highway 136 from the north, or off of Highway 65 north of Trenton





Kansas crops making progress toward bountiful harvest

Kansas corn is preparing for a positive harvest season with the corn crop condition rated 40 percent good to excellent, as of August 25. Temperatures returned to normal levels across the state following a cool first half of the month. This means, according to USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, Crop Progress Report. there were six days suitfor field work able statewide.

The crop was rated 6 percent excellent, 34 percent good; 32 percent fair; 17 percent poor and 11 percent very poor. The report rated topsoil moisture at 8 percent very short, 20 percent short, 65 percent adequate and 17 percent surplus.

Data collected was provided at the county level by USDA Farm Service Agency and the KSU Extension Service. Sue Schulte, director of communications for Kansas Corn Commission. said the information is a weekly guide for farmers and industry leaders.

"The Kansas Crop Progress report takes into consideration all of the factors that impact corn production," Schulte said. 'It's also a solid analysis of other Kansas crops and a report we watch throughout the growing season Obviously, this year's crop condition exceeds last year's and indicates we should have a pretty solid harvest."

Although cold, wet weather slowed spring

planting, Kansas growers planted 3.1 million acres of corn in a two-week time period in May. Nationally, corn farmers planted at a record pace, planting about 41 million acres of corn in one week in May after planting delays

Late summer rains that most areas of Kansas enjoyed boosted the Kansas corn crop and saved crops in many areas of the state that had been suffering from a dry spell that lasted from mid-June to mid-July.

Following a drought year, Kansas farmers are showing their dedication to producing an abundant crop to meet the needs of their customers. Most Kansas corn is fed to livestock, or used as a feedstock for ethanol production, where a third of the grain used returns as distillers grains, a high-nutrient livestock feed.

Optimum temperatures have allowed farmers to catch up on haying and herbicide spraying activities, along with wheat planting preparation. Additionally, most row crops benefited from the warmer temperatures. Sorghum heading was 86 percent, ahead of 76 last year and an 81 average. Sorghum crop conditions rated 4 percent very poor, 10 poor, 32 fair, 46 good, and 8-percent excellent.

Soybeans were 91 percent blooming, behind 94 last year with crop conditions rated 2 percent very poor, 8 percent poor, 30 fair, 51 good, and 9 percent excellent.

Kansas State receives National Pork Board grant to research PEDV

The National Pork Board (NPB) has stepped forward to lead the industry toward finding answers about the recent impact of fast transmission of Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus (PEDV) and is working with laboratories and researchers to determine what actions can be taken. The Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory (KSVDL) has received a grant from the NPB to lead a six-week study.

In the three months since the first confirmed case in mid-May 2013, the NPB has, to date, invested \$800,000 in Checkoff dollars toward research, education and coordination of efforts to better understand PEDV.

"The National Pork Board (NPB) took this action to help get answers to U.S. producers as quickly as possible to help protect their herds from this devastating disease," says Conley Nelson, National Pork Board president. "Because of the investment producers make as part of Checkoff, we're able to respond quickly to sudden disease threats such as this."

The six-week study, led by Dick Hesse, KSVDL director of diagnostic virology, is an intense sampling during the acute phase of the disease. The objectives are to look at the virus to study tissue localization, shedding, virus carriage, antibody response and aerosol transmission of PEDV following inoculation of feeder pigs. Available space at the Biosecurity Research Institute (BRI) was volunteered to house the study, which allowed research to begin as soon as possible. "This disease is extreme-

ly age-dependent as far as its severity. So if a young nursing pig becomes infected, very few survive. Weaned pigs are not affected nearly as bad so we chose to inoculate four-week-old pigs so we would have a much higher survival rate and samples that we could share with other labs," Hesse says. "The labs are taking a selfless approach to help solve this problem and cross support each other, and there are many others, related to our grant, who deserve to be recognized in this effort."

At the federal level a team from the United States Department of Agriculture's Epidemiology Center is working closely with the NPB and the AASV to track down the origins of the virus and determine ways to reduce transmission rates among farms and geographic regions. Hesse says that the tools being developed to answer questions will come from these base studies so proper models can be developed to assess efficacy and treatment.

PEDV is not a reportable disease, nor is it trade-restricting, but rather a production-related disease. It is also not a zoonotic disease, which means that it will not pose any food safety con-




