Pottawatomie County is home to aquaponics farm

What began as an effort to ensure his diabetic father a reliable protein supply if availability to his medication were interrupted has grown into a growing business venture for Pottawatomie County resident James Sperman. Travelers along Highway 24 between Manhattan and Wamego may have noticed the high tunnel, semi-pit greenhouse and large blue pools that house his aquaponic gardening system and tilapia farm.

Aquaponics combines fish farming with hydroponic gardening inside a high tunnel, which allows for the production of fruits, vegetables and fish year-round. The system has a 1,700-gallon fish tank and 165-squarefoot grow bed. Water from the fish tank carries fish waste to the grow bed, where it feeds the plants. Sperman's high tunnel even includes banana and fig trees. "Bananas are a common denominator for people," Sperman described. "When they see bananas growing in Kansas, they can't help but smile and their eyes twinkle."

Constructing the semi-pit greenhouse was no easy venture, as he dug out the 55'x14'x7.5' pit, as well as the fishpond, by hand, hauling the dirt away in a wheelbarrow. He builds a frame over the pond in the winter and covers it with greenhouse plastic. The water in both the pond and the greenhouses helps to keep the temperatures above freezing.

After the first year of tilapia production, Sperman was approached by a grower in Missouri who wanted him to mass-produce the tilapia fry(newly hatched fish) and That first year he sold 50,000 fry at twenty cents apiece. He now produces 60,000 to 80,000 per month

and receives about 13.5 cents each. He's scaled up and expanded to also selling adolescents and older fish for pond stocking.

Sperman now has 220 breeding adults that share 75 nests. "By share, I mean the biggest males take them," he said. He only feeds the fish on one end of the pond, because the mothers release their young at the other end. "In their minds I want to establish that this is the end where you eat, so they don't ever eat anything of any kind at the other end," he explained.

Tilapia are cichlids, meaning mouth breeders. The males excavate a nest on the bottom and attract a female. The female will come in and lay about a dozen eggs. When the male fertilizes them, she will scoop them back into her mouth, then lay some more. According to Sperman, they will continue until she has a thou-

sand or more fertilized eggs, then she'll hold them in her mouth for about two weeks until they hatch. Even after

they've hatched, she'll hold them in her mouth as long as she can to give them the best chance of survival, then will

spit them out. She'll guard them for a couple of days, and suck them back into her mouth if she senses danger.

Once the fry are hatched, Sperman uses a net to scoop them into a bucket to transport to fry pools. The bread and butter of his business is selling three-quarter to oneinch fry in bulk. "When fry are the size of mosquito larvae, they're not the most resilient things in the world," he said. So he waits about two weeks for them to grow to around an inch, then ships them nationwide. "None of my fish go to waste," he continued. "The ones that I don't manage to find homes for can grow and become adolescents and some are just on the verge of becoming breeders and will become pond stockers."

Sperman says that because tilapia are predominantly vegetarian and are filter feeders, the algae and bacteria that grows in the pools is tailored perfectly to their needs. The algae thrives on well water because it contains a good amount of nitrates and nitrites. The fry give off ammonia, which also breaks down into the nitrates and nitrites. "So the fish themselves are spurring on the growth of their own food," he said. The only filtering he does is using a sump pump to pump the bottom third of the water out of the large pools into a nearby orchard and garden.

As Sperman looks to the future of his business, he hopes to lease some nearby land in the next year or so to expand his operation. "I'm really good at producing a lot of fish in a small area, so I've been able to satisfy my demand here with what I have. But I need to expand," he stated. He would like to custom-design full sized high tunnels to accommofor everything he would like to grow. He also hopes to set

Scientists complete chromosome-based draft of wheat genome

Several Kansas State University researchers were essential in helping scientists assemble a draft of a genetic blueprint of bread wheat, also known as common wheat. The food plant is grown on more than 531 million acres around the world and produces nearly 700 million tons of food each year.

The International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium, which also includes faculty at Kansas State University, recently published a chromosome-based draft sequence of wheat's genetic code, which is called a genome. A chromosomebased draft sequence of the hexaploid bread wheat genome is one of four papers about the wheat genome that appear in the journal Sci-

The genetic blueprint is an invaluable resource to plant science researchers and breeders, said Eduard Akhunov, associate professor of plant pathology and a collaborator with the International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium.

"For the first time, they have at their disposal a set of tools enabling them to rapidly locate specific genes on individual wheat chromosomes throughout the genome," Akhunov said. "This resource is invaluable for identifying those genes that control complex traits, such as yield, grain quality, disease, pest resistance and abiotic stress tolerance. They will be able to produce a new generation of wheat varieties with higher yields and improved sustainability to meet the demands of a growing world population in a changing environment."

Although a draft, the sequence provides new insight into the plant's structure, organization, evolution and genetic complexity.

"This is a very significant advancement for wheat genetics and breeding community," Akhunov said. "The wheat genome sequence provides a foundation for studying genetic variation and understanding how changes in the genetic code can impact important agronomic traits. In our lab we use this sequence to create a catalog of single base changes in DNA sequence of a worldwide sample of wheat lines to get insights into the evolution and origin of wheat genetic diversity."

Akhunov, Shichen Wang, a programmer and bioinformatics scientist in plant pathology, and Jesse Poland, assistant professor of plant pathology, collaborated with the International Wheat Genome Sequencing Consortium to order genes along

the wheat chromosomes.

Other Kansas State University researchers in the department of plant pathology involved include Bik-ram Gill, university distinguished professor and director of the Wheat Genetics Resource Center, and Bernd Friebe, research professor, who developed genetic material that was essential for obtaining the chromosomebased sequence of the wheat genome.

A second paper in Science details the first reference sequence of chromosome 3B, the largest chromosome in common wheat.

Some believe "big data" may be the next renaissance in agriculture. Others call it the greatest advance in agriculture since the Green Revolution during the 1940s, '50s and '60s when one of the biggest waves of research and technology spurred the growth of agricultural production around the world. Some compare big data with the biotech revolution.

High praise, but still so many questions remain about big data. Pressing questions facing farmers now are who owns this big data?

Who controls it and how will it be used?

And if you don't know what big data is join the crowd, there are countless people who don't know or have multiple and diverse answers.

Not to alarm anyone, but less than a year ago, few people had heard this buzzword that means gathering and analyzing the vast amount of digital information produced by farmers.

Drones flying above farm land recording high resolution images, and field sensors providing immediate information concerning crop conditions including moisture, nutrients, pests, etc., may become commonplace during the big ag-data era.

No matter what beatitudes are bestowed on big data, most believe and hope it will improve farmers' yields and productivity. Some say it will help feed the growing population, expected to hit nine billion in 2050. Agri-business companies are banking on its fu-

Successful farmers and ranchers have always kept data. While it may have begun when the first cave man dug a hole in the soil and planted the first seed and progressed to a pocketsized notebook and pencil. keeping and gathering information has always been beneficial to profitable agriculture.

About the mid-1990s,

gathering data rocketed forward as computer technology fueled the concept of precision agriculture. This only intensified with the application and interest driven by the ever-growing data infrastructure. Greater affordability of this technology coupled with more computer processing power has also fanned the usage flames.

Prescriptive planting, or relating soil, climate and seed data with a farmer's productions records, seems to be some of the potential of big data in agriculture. The potential for an increase in grain yields is another upside.

During the last couple years the Guettermans in Johnson and Miami counties have used big data equipment provided by John Deere on their family farm. Nick Guetterman believes the more information he has at his disposal, the more likely he is to figure a better way to do things.

What he's most interested in during this initial phase of using these new data collecting tools is to become even more efficient, farm as productively as possible and increase the return on his investment.

"Farmers collect data on almost every pass over the field - planting data, tillage data, spraying records and machine performance," Nick says. "We're trying to help use this data in real time - right now to make decisions that potentially make us better, more profitable farmers. Before, we always looked at this data and analyzed it after the fact."

But who gets that information — the farmer or the provider? Will they be prescribing what best suits their interests or those of the farmer?

Guetterman believes because he's paid for the equipment, the data should belong to him and not be shared with anyone without his knowledge and permission. He'd also like to know where and what companies collecting big ag data are doing with this information.

The Johnson/Miami County farmer says he's been told the data is not being used individually but in an aggregate format. Guetterman also believes companies selling ag-data services acknowledge farmers' concerns in their policy and marketing statements, but their contracts don't make that explicit,

"A farmer makes decisions based on his own experience and expertise, supplemented with his own data," Guetterman says "That's how I produce value as a manager."

Some producers also worry the proliferation of ag data will erode the advantages producers have developed throughout several generations. Farmers like Guetterman also harbor real concerns about data privacy. That's the world today's farmers live



"The wheat genome only has 21 chromosomes, but each chromosome is very big and therefore quite complicated," Akhunov said. "The largest chromosome, 3B, has nearly 800 million letters in its genetic code. This is nearly three times more information than is in the entire rice genome. So trying to sequence this chromosome — and this genome - end-to-end is an extremely complicated task."

vast amount of genetic information, researchers used a technique called shotgun

wheat genome into chromosomes and then split each chromosome into smaller segments. Chromosomal segments were analyzed by short gene sequences and overlapping sequences were stitched together with computer software.

The chromosome-based draft sequence the critical step before the full wheat genome is sequenced, Akhunov said. The sequencing approach developed for the 3B chromosome can

Invasive weed increasingly taking hold in Kansas

Bv Mary Lou Peter Judging by the number of phone calls he receives, Dallas Peterson is very pop-

ular this time of year. The typical topic is weeds - something Peterson, a Kansas State University agronomist, knows well.

Spurred by late spring and early summer rainfall, farmers' row crops across much of the state are thriving. And so are the weeds they're trying to control, including Palmer amaranth, an aggressive and invasive weed that used to be controlled by the popular herbicide glyphosate. Increasingly, however, Palmer amaranth is resisting

"We have had numerous calls about poor control of Palmer amaranth with glyphosate this year," said Peterson, who is a weed specialist with K-State Research and Extension. "Glyphosate-resistant Palmer amaranth was first confirmed in Kansas three years ago but seems to be exploding across central Kansas this year. Poor control doesn't mean you have resistance, but if the herbicide treatment provides good control of some plants and not others, that is an indication you may have resistance.'

The weed, also known as

season summer annual weed that generally starts to emerge in May as soil temperatures warm and continues to germinate into summer, especially following rainfall events, Peterson said. It grows rapidly with hot conditions, maybe as much as one to two inches per day. It is competitive with crops and is a prolific seed producer, up to several hundred thousand per plant.

The hardy weed has been a serious problem in Kansas for many years and had previously developed populations resistant to atrazine and the ALS (acetolactate

synthase) inhibiting herbicides. With the introduction of Roundup Ready® crops in the late 1990s, glyphosate helped to solve some of those problems initially, but glyphosate resistance has now become a problem because of the heavy reliance on it for weed control.

Glyphosate resistant Palmer amaranth first showed up in the southeast United States and has had a dramatic impact on farmers' production systems and

"Producers need to use an integrated approach to weed control that utilizes a variety of cultural practices and herbicide modes of action to help control weeds and minimize herbicide resistance," Peterson said. "The use of effective preemergence residual herbi-

just a few scattered Palmer amaranth that have escaped a glyphosate treatment, it may even be worth hand removing those from fields to prevent seed production. If not, the resistant biotypes will increase and get spread across the field and to other fields by the combine.

"If poor control was achieved with glyphosate, it is probably best to assume that it is resistant and plan accordingly, both this year and in the future," he said.



A Shooting Affray In Wichita

With the coming of the Santa Fe Railroad in 1872, merchants longer had to watch the great herds of Texas longhorns pass through to the markets of Abilene, Newton, and Ellsworth. By 1874, Wichita was in the middle of a cattle town boom. Cattlemen made Wichita their headquarters for most of the summer, regularly contributing to the wild end-oftrail atmosphere. Texas cowboys frequented business establishments at all hours of the day and night.

Historically, cattle towns hired men with tough reputations to keep the revelry under control. Marshal Mike Meagher had kept the lid on the wild cowboys, but indicated he was ready for a change of scenery. In the spring of 1874 the city of Wichita appointed William "Billy" Smith to replace Meagher as city marshal. Smith prepared to meet the cowboy invasion of Texas trail drivers with a squad of deputies.

Early in July Deputy Samuel Botts suddenly found himself staring at the drawn pistols of a dozen cowboys after he had attempted to arrest one of their own. Just as suddenly, an estimated forty or fifty citizens armed with shotguns and rifles backed the cowboys down. The Wichita Eagle commented, "The past two years Texas dealers, cow-boys, roughs and gamblers have obeyed our laws and regulations and respected our citizens, and if they would avoid trouble, it

would be well for them to continue to do so."

The incident cooled cow-

boy bootheels, boosting the confidence of the lawmen. Deputy Bill Dibbs may have underestimated the amount of "fight" in a young gambler by the name of Thomas McGrath. Down on his luck, McGrath was arrested as a vagrant with no visible means of support. When he was unable to pay the fine, the judge put him to work cleaning city streets. While supervising McGrath, Dibbs told his prisoner that he was inclined to use a ball and chain on him to keep him in line. That was McGrath's cue to leave. The surprised deputy chased after him with his gun drawn. When Dibbs caught up, he pistolwhipped McGrath and drug him through the street as if he were a cur dog on a leash. "Dibbs heaped upon him a volley of oaths and threats, which were replied to by McGrath in much the same style of language. Vowing to place that ball and chain on his prisoner, Dibbs added that he could kill McGrath if he wanted to. As if to punctuate the authenticity of his statements Dibbs suddenly "dealt the prisoner a blow to the face" with his left fist. A hard right jab led to a wrestling match. In the confusion McGrath got hold of one of the deputy's pistols.

Under the byline "A Shooting Affray," The Eagle wrote, "...as Dibbs saw the revolver in the hands of Mc-Grath, a deadly pallor o'er spread his face and he turned and fled, his ashen lips crying. 'Hold on, hold on! Don't shoot.'...McGrath managed to fire one shot at him, which only served to increase his speed." The pursued was now the pursuer. Dibbs reportedly ran like a "scared wolf" but was able to get off one shot with his other pistol even as the emboldened McGrath fired a second shot. McGrath and Dibbs again clinched in a wrestling match. Dibbs pistol went off. McGrath received only a slight wound in his hand.

Ben Newman, a part-time police officer separated the two men just as officers Sam

Botts and John Behrens arrived. Dibbs declared that he had been fatally shot but upon further inspection no wound was found. The brave officer was only very frightened. Regaining his bravado Deputy Dibbs rang the big triangle to alert all able bodied citizens to come to the support of the lawmen.

The citizens arrived in time to witness Deputy Botts dragging McGrath to jail.

Thinking Dibbs was dying; Botts severely pistol whipped McGrath. Deputy Behrens stepped in to stop the beating. McGrath was in no condition to cause further trouble.

Marshal Billy Smith was strangely absent from the entire affair. His popularity with the townspeople suffered over the coming months. Mike Meagher returned to run for the office



Under the current law, the residual interest rule from the CFTC will eventually require futures customers to fully cover the margin of their contracts by the morning of the day following a trade. To comply, brokers would be more likely to demand a drastically increased initial payment, which has the potential to drive some farmers out of the futures markets or restrict available funds that could otherwise be used to hire new employees or make capital improvements.

Roberts and Heitkamp say the bill is similar to provisions in H.R. 4413, a ate Agriculture Commitbill reauthorizing the CFTC, which was by passed by the House on June 24. At the time, Sen-

tee Chairwoman Debbie Stabenow (D-Mich.) said she could see some agreement between House and



Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The corn, wheat, and soybeans all fell to new lows for the move last week. Blame the weather and the crop condition ratings. There are a few dry weather concerns and the extended forecasts look drier than normal for the Corn Belt, but the temperatures are expected to be cooler than normal, which lessens the concern. Maybe crop conditions will drop in this week's report, but drops are normal at this time of year, so it will have to be a big one to get anyone's atten-

Traders are still thinking

about huge yields this fall for the corn and sovbeans. Analysts are becoming very comfortable with estimates in the mid 170s for the corn. and some are even higher than that. There is very little doubt that the production estimate will be higher in the August supply and demand report.

On the chart, everything points to \$3.50, \$3.30, and then \$3.00 in the December corn. The market is due for a corrective bounce, but good demand and a little bit of a weather threat haven't managed to help the market, so don't be too hopeful for a rally. Unless we see a major change in the weather, rallies will be shortlived and any strength will be a selling opportunity.

It is a similar story for the soybeans. The beans have shown a little more sign of life than the corn, but rally attempts have failed despite the huge demand numbers that we have seen. The prevailing attitude is that the November contract will fall below \$10.00 and possibly to \$9.00. I still think that increases in demand will prevent the move to \$9.00, but the trend is still clearly down and if the weather stays good I would hate to try and prove the bears wrong.

The wheat market has been struggling for more than two months and we still don't have a definitive sign that the bottom is in. Thanks to a strong close on Friday the December KW was flat for the week, which isn't a very bullish accomplishment. In order to convince traders that the low has been set, we will have to see a move above \$6.70.

HRW stocks are very tight and there are some quality problems with the U.S. SRW and French wheat crop, so there are some bullish fundamental factors in the marketplace, but until that translates into large export sales of U.S. wheat, this market is going to struggle. It would also help if the corn and beans turned higher and that doesn't look likely at the moment.

Friday's cattle on feed report was, as expected, friendly to the market. The on feed estimate came in at 98%, Placements at 94%, and Marketings at 98%. The placements figure was smaller than the average trade guess and will keep fed cattle supplies tight for the foreseeable future.

The August live cattle futures gained about \$7.50 for the week, but are still about \$7.00 behind the \$163 - \$165 cash trade we had this week. The June futures didn't really take off until after option expiration and that may be the case for the August contract as well. Options for the August contract expire this Friday.

If you need price protection use put options. There is still no telling how high this market might go.

Sales of U.S. sorghum for the new marketing year beginning September 1, 2014, have increased by 55,000 metric tons or 2,164,642 million bushels. Test wheat seed germination if harvest aid herbicides used

Welcomed, but perhaps untimely rains delayed wheat harvest in some areas of Kansas to the extent that herbicide applications had to be made to burn down weeds prior to harvest. Steve Schuler, executive director of Kansas Crop Improvement Association, advises farmers intending to hold back some of their harvest for use as seed this fall, to have that wheat tested for germina-

Some herbicides, such as glyphosate, are not recommended on wheat to be saved as seed. Most if not all of the common herbicides used as pre-harvest aids in wheat require that the grain be below thirtypercent moisture before application. At or below this moisture content, the grain is post-physiological maturity and unlikely, or less likely, to be adversely affected. Seed germination can be greatly inhibit-

ed if pre-harvest herbicide applications are made at an improper stage of grain maturity.

The only way to be sure that germination has not been harmed by herbicide application is to have the seed tested by a professional laboratory such as Kansas Crop Improvement Association's Seed Quality Testing Lab. A producer may be tempted to conduct their own germination test, but home tests

may not tell the whole

Whether or not seed germination has been harmed by herbicide is really only part of the story, says Eric Fabrizius, KCIA associate director and manager of the KCIA seed testing laboratory. Seed germination is relatively easy to conclude from a germination test. What is not quite so obvious is the potential damage done to

seed though it appears to germinate.

Our trained analysts evaluate each seedling in a test to make sure it has all the essential structures to establish a plant in the field, explained Fabrizius. The lack of roots or a damaged coleoptile resulting from a herbicide application may have a profound effect on that seed's ability to establish itself planted

Of course, we would like to see every producer plant Kansas certified seed, which has been professionally cleaned and tested, says Schuler, but if a producer has a legal right to use saved seed, we think it is a prudent step to have that seed professionally tested.

USDA offers PEDv reporting instructions

how to understand and comply with its federal order on June 5 that requires pork producers, veterinarians and diagnostic labs to report presumptive or confirmed positive occurrences of Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea Virus (PEDv), Porcine Deltacoronavirus, (PDCov) or other swine enteric coronavirus diseases (SECDs) that meet the case definition.

USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) is working to address these infections with a plan that includes: 1) required disease reporting and 2) development of herd management plans that will indicate the producer is taking actions to implement biosecurity steps designed to reduce further dissemination of PEDv or PDCov. To this end, APHIS will provide subsidized funding for biosecurity actions by producers described in the herd plans, such as the costs of truck washing and disinfecting agents.

According to APHIS, some of the work to be performed by producers in fighting SECDs that may be reimbursable includes laboratory testing fees for SECD samples, continued monitoring of pigs post-sampling,

The USDA has followed up with more specifics on livestock vehicle washing if called for in an approved or contaminated materials. These diseases require herd health plan and the use of disinfectants for cleaning premises, provided funding is available.

Dr. Paul Sundberg, vice president of the National Pork Board's science and technology department, says, "Continued monitoring of farms through submissions to the veterinary diagnostic laboratories is important and those specific tests will be paid for by USDA at this point. If producers plan to take advantage of the money USDA is making available for cleaning and disinfection, they should work with their herd veterinarian to ensure that their herd management plan indicates that they have the required protocols in place before they fill out the paperwork and submit it to USDA.'

To date, U.S. research into SECDs has confirmed that





open range cowboys of early Montana died July 6, 1964, at the age of 90.

Ambrose V. Cheney rode the rails west from Illinois in 1887 when he was 13 to ioin his cattleman brotherin-law and sister Ella on their Wolf Creek Ranch in Montana's Judith Basin. He arrived in time for the Judith Basin spring roundup. His brother-in-law helped him get hired on as the day wrangler. It was the start of a cowboy career that spanned the era of the open range cattle industry in Montana. Charlie Russell, a cowboy and soon to be famous artist, was the night wrangler when Ambrose was hired for his first roundup. Later in life. Russell made a famous painting at the start of the 1887 Judith Basin spring roundup. The Pool's day wrangler, Ambrose Cheney, can be seen taking a "string" of horses out to the rope corral in the background.

That first cowboy job imprinted Ambrose with the desire to spend his life working with horses and cattle and led the young man to work at becoming a skilled horseman, roper and top hand cowboy in Montana. He proved his worth as a green kid during that first job and when the roundup was over, he went back to his sister's ranch and practiced riding and roping all summer and winter of 1887. By the next spring, he was hired again by the Judith Basin Pool but because of the 14-year olds roping and riding skill, he was hired as a regular working cowboy for \$40 a month. Since he was only 14, he was known as "Kid Amby" and was called by that name for the rest of his life.

Kid Amby learned the cowboy trade from some good teachers. He learned to throw the backhand loop from Pete Vann and how to

One of the last, genuine, handle broncs and halfbroke horses from Charlie Russell's friend, Conn Price. Amby went on to become a top hand but Charlie Russell remained the night wrangler. Amby used to say that "Charlie was afoot when it came to real cowpunching, but we hurried in at night just to listen to his yarns and stories and to laugh at the sketches he made of the happenings that day. He stood damn well with the best of them".

Sid Willis, an open range rider for the Judith Basin Pool and later the owner of the Mint Saloon in Great Falls, used to say that "There were only two ropers who could throw a back hand loop to pick up both hind legs of a calf, and never miss - Pete Vann and 'Kid Amby' Cheney".

Amby became famous for his skill at throwing the back hand loop in roping any kind of animal. Wild Bill Sutter. another open range cowboy who later became a brand inspector, also said he knew of only two experts of the back hand loop-"Kid Amby" Cheney being one of them.

In his book, So Long Cowboys of the Open Range, Amby's son, Truman Cheney quoted his father, Kid Amby, explaining how he threw the back hand loop.

"In throwing the back hand loop, I never swing my rope, but with my coil in my left hand and the loop in my right hand, I throw the rope so that the opened loop hits the ground and rolls up against the front of the back legs of a calf or against the front legs of a horse. Then the animal has to step into the loop with both feet and I pull the rope tight and take a couple of dallys around the horn."

Truman Cheney also mentioned that back in 1902, Amby was still riding bucking horses. The town of Stanford was a gathering place for cowboys. One Sunday Amby forked a horse that the assembled cowboys said couldn't be ridden. He scratched the horse with his spurs and finished the ride to the cheers of onlookers who then passed the hat to give him a reward. The collection of \$65 was given to Kid Amby—the most money he had ever had together at any one time.

In the late 1880s, homesteaders began taking up the Judith Basin land and began fencing the land with the new barbed wire denying cattle access to grass and water. The Judith Basin Cattle Pool began to disintegrate as cattle owners moved their vast herds across the Missouri River into the open range of the Milk River country. They ioined with other owners in the area and formed the Bear Paw Cattle Pool.

During the summer of 1890 and '91, great herds of cows, calves and yearlings totaling over 150,000 head were gathered in the Judith Basin and driven toward the Missouri River at Judith Crossing. The river was shallower and more fordable in this area and was the best access to the Milk River country and Bear Paw Mountain areas of boundless pasture across the river.

The cowboys moved the cattle into the river in herds of 2500 to 3000 head. The river was high from spring runoff and it took every trick they could conceive to get the cattle into the wide Missouri River and cross to the other side. Cattle would balk, quit and turn and run back toward their home grounds and the men were constantly swimming the river and chasing the herd quitters. It was hard dangerous work but the herds were moved into the new country.

The men who worked the Missouri River crossings became so expert that they ended that gigantic job without loss of cowboy, cow or horse. "A hundred-fiftythousand head across that river and we never lost a cow or cowboy," Kid Amby later recalled with pride as he told of those crossings of 1890 and '91.

Kid Amby's reputation grew as a top hand after the crossings and his ability to recognize the brand of different outfits in the Bear Paw Cattle Pool during roundups soon earned him the position of cattle rep. Kid Amby's skill as a roper and rider gained him the reputation as a top hand among the ranches making up the new Bear Paw Pool and soon he was being sent out as a representative or "rep" to the other ranches and open range organizations of northern Montana. It was the reps responsibility to ride through the herds to pick up any of the stray Bear Paw Pool cattle that had gotten mixed in with the others. Reps had to know all the brands of the Pool ranches, some forty-five different brands according to Amby, and were also responsible for turning back Pool cattle to the correct ranches. Reps like Teddy Blue Abbott, Conn Price, Charley Stuart (son of Granville Stuart) and Kid Amby Cheney were among the highest-paid, most dependable and skillful cowboys of the Pool. They were usually kept on the ranches and the payroll over the winter, when most of the cowboys, including Charlie Russell were holed up somewhere or rode the grub line. Being a rep put them a notch higher than the ordinary cowboy. Kid Amby spent fourteen years cowboying on the Judith Basin and Bear Paw Cattle Pools. He returned to the Judith Basin and ran a jerkline freighting operation hauling freight from the ferries at Fort Benton to towns throughout central Montana. He filed for homesteads on Surprise Creek in the Judith Basin and began ranching on his own. He married Elizabeth McGiffin and raised seven sons and a daughter. The following years found Amby's homestead ranch increase to over 5,000 acres and his herd of white-faced Hereford cattle made Amby's Surprise Creek Ranch one of the largest shippers of cattle out of Stanford, Montana.

Cheney sold the ranch in 1945 but Amby remained in the Judith Basin near Stanford roping at brandings and working as a state brand inspector.

In 1963, Kid Amby was elected honorary president of the Montana Cowboys Association and was featured in a *Life* magazine article. He was inducted into the Montana Cowboy Hall of Fame in 2012. His documentary in the Hall of Fame begins with the paragraph and auote:

The rancher laid down the branding iron, brushed the dust from his Levis and looked up at the man on the horse. "Amby, you're still the best darn calf roper in Judith Basin County. That's 86 calves in one day and no misses. For an 84-year-old kid, you're doing pretty well. I'll be counting on you again next spring.

"Kid Amby" Cheney was a cowboy legend who endured and survived the rigors of the era of the open

Genomics enhance beef cattle breeding

Selecting breeding animals on how they look, by phenotype, worked for centuries. Progress in improving cattle was made just on appearance.

Now genotype pushes phenotype back to horseand-buggy days. It's data and what's inside that

Arrival of huge computers and sequencing of the bovine genome changed all. "There's a better way of selecting," said Jared Decker, University of Missouri geneticist, at a Cattlemen's Boot Camp, July 14 in Co-

Training by MU scientists was sponsored by the American Angus Association with MU. The Cattlemen's Boot Camp is a national program.

Things changed in the 1970s with statistical models that predicted EPDs (expected progeny differences). Then software was developed to combine many EPDs into a single economic index number.

Indexes help herd owners search a sire catalog to match a bull's traits needed to improve a farmer's cow herd profits.

"We must still look at bulls and cows," Decker assured his audience of mostly Angus breeders. "Phenotype

still counts, as there's no EPD for feet and legs."

Genomics tells a lot about calving ease, weaning weight, carcass weight or carcass grade. But there is no index for feet and legs.

The eye of the stockman still plays a role in breeding. However, on traits of economic value, there are genetic tools.

Plain EPDs will fade away as breeders learn more from the DNA of individual animals. A calf's genes at birth predict much of what that animal will do in a life-

New tools provide genomic-enhanced EPDs. A GE-EPD cuts time spent waiting for EPDs from data collection.

EPDs are based on production records of offspring from a sire, for example. Those require recording weights at various stages of life. A growing calf is weighed and data collected. Not on just one offspring, but hundreds.

If a thousand calves are tested, accuracy goes up for EPD predictions for a sire. A thousand tests are better than a hundred.

Proven EPDs enhance breeding selections, but take time and money.

A bull might be 20 years

old before it gains high-accuracy proof, Decker said.

Some EPDs—meat tenderness, marbling of rib-eye or carcass grade and yieldcan only be collected after harvest. "Some data collection is very invasive," Decker said. "You can't collect and use semen to breed from that slaughtered steer.

"You buy a young sire, with few records, expecting high growth rate, but find after a year of use that actually it's a low-growth bull."

EPDs on young animals have low accuracy. There are no or few progeny to test. However, genomics improve accuracy on the young. Such a DNA test is like having 20 offspring to start.

Available tests range in price from \$17 to \$75, depending on depth of data.

Genomic tests five years ago tested one gene on one trait. Those were misleading, but new tests are useful, Decker said. "One trait, such as weaning weight, may be influenced by tens of thousands of genes."

With today's genomics, DNA can be collected and tested at birth for new herd replacements. DNA in a drop of blood can be tested with a chip called a "snip" or SNP (single nucleotide polymorphism). That gives more accurate answers from the whole genome.

A new University of Missouri SNP chip has 50,000 genetic markers.

Researchers at the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources study three areas in cattle: embryonic death, feed efficiency and resistance to bovine respiratory disease.

Jared told producers: "It's not all genetics. Environment and management still count. Genomics offer much for herd improvement to meet consumer demands."

Conservation views depend on where people li

(AP) – Mixed into the debate over what to do about declining water tables and reservoir storage in Kansas is evidence of a clash between those who don't irrigate crops and those who do, or perhaps those who live where there is more rain.

Similar opinions can be found all over the state, including the aim to extend the useful life of the Ogallala Aquifer. And, common positions on the Governor's Vision on the Future of Water in Kansas, a document that is currently open to discussion, also are evident by region. A final draft will be released Nov. 12 in Manhattan.

"There are definitely strong differences between the east and the west, in some cases, on what is considered the beneficial use of water," said Dave Brenn, of Lawrence, president and co-founder of the Kansas Water Congress, the Salina Journal reported.

Like many, he has watched the water economy in western Kansas unfold over many years, including a decade from the early 1970s to the early 1980s. That's when Brenn was the Haskell County Extension agent in southwest Kansas. He followed that with 20 years as an official with the Garden City Company, a large land holding company with about 30,000 acres in irrigation in Finney and Kearny counties.

Brenn, 64, retired from the Garden City Company in 2003 as senior vice president and general manager. He was appointed and reappointed by three Kansas governors to the Kansas-Colorado Arkansas River Compact Commission, served eight years on the Kansas Water Authority, and is a past member of the Southwest Kansas Groundwater Management District No. 3 board. From 2006 to 2011, Brenn also served as executive director of Ground-

water Management District No. 1, based in Scott

Speaking only for himself, Brenn said the only way to reach a resolution concerning the future of the Ogalalla Aquifer is to meet in the middle, "...as opposed to regulating the differences to death."

"We've got to respect current law, and if it isn't correct, there should be a mature approach to determine what to do."

Without water, said Mary Fund, programs and policy director at the Kansas Rural Center in Whiting, there will be no basis for that economy, so pumping the aquifer dry is not a sound approach.

Today's efforts may be "too little, too late," she said. "They keep saying, 'If we'd known about this 30 or 40 years ago...' Well, we did know about it then."

Calls for less pumping aren't necessarily disputed in the west, but dismissed as unrealistic, especially if one intends to pump no more than is recharged - about onefourth of an inch a year.

Gary Baker, former director of Southwest Kansas Groundwater Management District No. 3, based in Garden City, said achieving "safe yield" would require shutting off nine out of every ten wells in the region. He now works as a water right consultant and appraiser in Hugoton.

"We'd have to quit pumping," said Kirk Heger, of Hugoton, president of the Southwest Kansas Irrigation Association and a member of the GMD No. 3 board of direc-

Stevens County farmer Steve Rome e-mailed a comment after environmental groups weighed in for a June 1 Salina Journal story: "... The public wants water conservation but they have no skin in the game.

"It seems unfair for

someone that has nothing invested to expect 'sustainability.' I wonder if most of the proponents of that concept have any idea what it would take to achieve that."

Rome and Heger contend that they've been able to reduce pumping over the years.

"It's never enough," Rome said, in a reaction to the first draft of the Governor's vision, which was released July 1 on the Kansas Water Office web-

"For the guy working at Boeing (in Wichita), does it affect him if I irrigate or not? I will contend that (irrigation in western Kansas) doesn't affect most of the people in Kansas," Rome said.

To suggest conservation when it's already in the works is an insult to irrigators who already are cutting back, Heger said.

Fund agrees that some fairness would be appropriate.

"We do have a tendency to penalize those who have been the good guys all along," she said.

"The state said, 'You can keep it local, but you have to take care of it.' Well, you didn't take care of it," Fund said. The water vision draft is "just kicking the can down the road," she said.

"I'm interested in the long term."

ing July 9 in Assaria, Secretary of Agriculture Jackie McClaskey told the audience "If we don't take action, we are going to have even more of an eastwest clash that will be more difficult for us to manage."

While there are "extreme opinions on both sides, there are also moderate opinions, but we often hear the extremes through the media," Brenn said. "There is a real need to take the time to discuss the facts and not make snap judgments.'

Agreeing is one hurdle, said John Strickler, but another is paying for programs aimed at extending the aquifer, fixing reservoirs and securing new sources of water. Strickler was an aide to Gov. Mike Hayden and currently is a member of the Kansas chapter of the Nature Conservancy.

"Before they publish a final draft, I would hope they get into realistically addressing the cost and funding, or frankly, this effort won't amount to much," said Strickler, 78, who said he was speaking only for himself.

"I'm a little cynical about how serious this is, but we'll see," he said. "Ultimately, it's going to be up to the governor and the Legislature. That's why we have to have a dedicated source of funding."

After 50 years

tially to work with the Kansas Forest Service at Kansas State University, he has visited every county. Strickler said he wants the state water vision to also address "wildlife and ecological value" and push for more riparian areas to reduce sedimentation in reservoirs.

"I give western Kansas credit. There are a lot of efforts at conservation, but as far as I know, the water levels are still going down," Strickler said. "I'm sympathetic to the dilemma they face. They built the economy out there on irrigation, and then they built tremendous infrastructure - feedlots, packing plants and dairies - all dependent on water."

He has questions for irrigators.

"Are they going to simply continue to pump until the water runs out or until the cost goes so high that it's not economical, or will they make some adjustments?" Strickler said.

Water isn't the government's total responsibility. he said, "But the government does regulate the appropriate levels, and they're over-appropriat-

Can irrigators can pump less without devastating results?

"I don't know," Brenn said. "The impacts are tremendous. These challenges are more social and economic than in hydrologic engineering.

"We all realize these declines, and that these concerns and issues must be addressed, but it's not a simple thing."


