

## Schwieterman Market Outlook A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

Last week didn't amount to much in the corn market. The December contract has been trading in the same area since July 21st and there isn't much indication that is going to change. The only exciting thing for the corn last week was the Pro Farmer crop tour, which turned out to be less bearish than expected. Generally speaking the crop is in great shape and there doesn't seem to be any doubt that we will have a record national average yield, but it looks like we can quit talking about a 175 yield. The Pro Farmer Tour isn't necessarily accurate when it comes to their production estimates, but I think that it is quite telling that they weren't overly impressed with the crop in S. Dakota, Minnesota, or Iowa and that is what will keep the national average yield from ballooning.

So does that mean that the December corn won't drop to \$3.00? Well, if it does go to \$3.00 it won't be right away. For the time being the market will likely go nowhere until the September supply and demand report and after that market direction will come from harvest reports and expectations for the October supply and demand report. We probably won't see much pressure in the short run because traders will be worried about USDA not raising the yield estimate very much, and at the same time there isn't much reason to be a buyer with a record harvest just ahead of us. The trend is sideways and it will remain that way.

It was a similar story of the soybeans, but the No-

vember contract did fall to a new low for the move at one point this week. The Pro Farmer tour didn't find any more yield potential than what USDA has penciled in so that wasn't a bearish factor, but the weather still looks very good for the foreseeable future so the crop could still be getting bigger, which is a negative factor.

Demand is still very, very good, but it has to be to absorb the crop that is coming on. It will probably take either an early freeze or freakishly large export sales to break the soybeans out of the sideways to lower pattern the market is stuck in. There just isn't much reason for the market to do anything else.

The wheat market was higher for the week but it still hasn't done anything to suggest that the market is ready to turn higher. We get a little strength from time to time because of problems in Ukraine, but we don't get any follow-through buying. Export sales have dropped off as well, which isn't good because this is supposed to be the time of year that we make big sales, and if we don't make them now, they might not get made.

HRW stocks are very tight and if we ever see consistently large export sales it will be bullish, but for now I am waiting on a good long-term technical buy signal before I chase after this market. I would really like to see the December KW close above \$6.70 and we are quite a ways from that happening.

The cattle on feed report came out with 98% on feed, 93% placements, and 91%

marketed. Most of what I have read is calling it slightly bearish since all the numbers were a little worse than expected. I don't know how you would ever call the smallest placements since 1992 bearish, but what do I know.

The trends are still down, and that is probably why the report is called bearish. Right now I am looking for the October LC to rally back to the \$153 area, at which point I would be a seller, or preferably a buyer of put options. With cattle numbers as tight as they are a retest of the highs is not out of the question.

## **USDA** continues to seek input for the 2017 Census of Agriculture

Agriculture (USDA) continues to seek input for the 2017 Census of Agriculture. Conducted only once every five years by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), the Census provides detailed data covering nearly every facet of U.S. agriculture down to the county level.

NASS released the complete 2012 Census of Agriculture results on May 2, 2014. In June, the agency began asking for content suggestions for the 2017 Agriculture Census and is

the public. Any individual or organization may ask to add or delete items on questionnaire, as well as send any other ideas about the Census.

"Many industries want data that we currently don't collect," said NASS associate administrator Renee Picanso. "There are also some data that people think are no longer relevant with changing trends in agriculture. This is the time to express those ideas and concerns."



## **Expedited beef traceback measures** aimed to combat foodborne illness

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has added another layer of food safety screening to the U.S. beef supply chain. A recent announcement by the agency stated that new procedures would mean quicker traceback of ground beef contaminated with E.coli O157:H7 and removal of that ground beef from the supply chain to prevent foodborne illness.

The new procedures would allow the FSIS to immediately investigate a product that had initially tested positive for E. coli at a grinding facility, as well as conduct immediate investigations of the suppliers of the raw trimmings for that product, said Travis O'Quinn, assistant professor of meat science in the Department of Animal Sciences and Industry at Kansas State University.

Currently, he said, the FSIS takes samples of ground beef at grinding facilities that receive raw materials, such as beef trim, from packing facilities. The grinding facilities make the packaged ground beef that is then shipped to retail stores for consumers to purchase.

The FSIS screens the samples using an initial test to identify the presence of E. coli, O'Quinn added. If a sample initially tests positive, the FSIS sends the presumptive positive sample to a third party laboratory to conduct a confirmatory test. It isn't until after the product is confirmed positive for E. coli when FSIS investigations would start to traceback the raw materials that created that particular ground beef product.

"The new investigation procedures would change that and allow for the confirmation two-day process to not be mandatory before the FSIS can investigate the potentially contaminated product," he said. "Two days in a food safety investigation means a lot in terms of being able to trace a source of a product and remove a potentially contaminated product from commerce. The new procedures would allow the timeframe to be a lot faster."

The most affected areas of the supply chain, based on this announcement, would include beef grinders and further processors, as well as the packer suppliers who sell beef trimmings to the grinding facilities, O'Quinn said. The FSIS would be able to identify any other grinding facilities where that supplier might have sent the potentially contaminated product from the same lot or batch of

trimmings. The FSIS said it predicts that dozens more recalls could occur once these new protections are in place. But, O'Quinn said con-

sumers should not be alarmed when they hear "more recalls," as most of the recalls the FSIS mentions as potentially occurring won't be meat that reaches the retail level.


"The new procedures would actually allow for that product to be identified prior to going to most retailers, and so it would allow for the grinders to recall product that has not been shipped out the door to the retail level yet," O'Quinn said. "This does save the consumer from potentially receiving the contaminated product in the first place."

"This all goes back to consumer safety and trying to reduce the number of foodborne illness related to ground beef products," he added. "The USDA FSIS has a big initiative trying to decrease foodborne illness related to ground beef products, and (these new procedures) go into that."





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## Page 29 Decision could boost use of popular weed kill

(AP)-Faced with tougher and more resistant weeds, corn and soybean farmers are anxiously awaiting government decisions on a new version of a popular herbicide - and on genetically modified seeds to grow crops designed to resist it.

Critics say more study is needed on the effects of the herbicide and they are concerned it could endanger public health.

The Environmental Protection Agency is expected to rule this fall on Dow AgroSciences' application to market Enlist, a new version of the 2,4-D herbicide that's been around since the 1940s. It's partly a game of catch-up for the agriculture industry, as many farmers are dealing with weeds that have become resistant to glyphosate, an herbicide commonly used on corn and soybeans now.

If approved, the 2,4-D would be used in combination with glyphosate.

An Agriculture Department decision on the company's genetically modified seeds also is expected this fall. In the department's final environmental review, the USDA recommended approval. The agency said that if both the seeds and herbicide are approved, the use of 2.4-D could increase by an estimated 200 to 600 percent by the year 2020.

While the USDA only oversees the safety of the plants, the EPA oversees the safety of the herbicide for human and environmental health. The agency has already found the chemical safe several times for other

species as well as for the public and agricultural workers.

Groups lobbying the agency to prevent the herbicide's expanded use say they are concerned about the toxic effects of the herbicide and the potential for it to drift. Corn and soybeans are the nation's largest crops. and the potential for expanded use is huge.

Scott Faber of the Environmental Working Group said the EPA studies so far have not been comprehensive enough and need to look more closely into the effects of pesticides on children.

"This is a once-in-a-generation decision that will have a huge impact on public health, especially on farmers and rural residents," Faber said. "This is a moment to step back and ask if this is a durable weed control solution for farmers.'

Damon Palmer of Dow AgroSciences says the new version has been re-engineered to solve potential problems, like drift before and after the herbicide hits the plant. The company says it is moving forward at a critical time in agriculture, helping farmers be more productive so they can meet an increasing demand for food. Officials say multiple studies and reviews over the last six decades have confirmed the herbicide's safety.


2,4-D is now used on other crops, including wheat, and on pastures and home lawns. It is the world's most popular herbicide and the third most popular in the United States, behind atrazine and glyphosate. Most corn and soybeans


grown in the U.S. are already genetically engineered. Before Monsanto's Roundup herbicide was introduced in 1976, most farmers tilled their fields prior to planting, flipping the soil over and burving the weeds to kill them. The technique exposed tilled earth to the air, creating problems with erosion and runoff and releasing greenhouse gases.

Herbicide-resistant

seeds introduced in the 1990s allowed farmers to spray fields after their plants emerged, killing the weeds but leaving crops unharmed.

Critics expressed concern that if the herbicide is approved, weeds will eventually become resistant to it, too. George Naylor, an Iowa farmer who is on the board of the advocacy group Center for Food Safety, called it a "pesticide treadmill" that needs to be slowed down. The Center for Food Safety has lobbied

against expanded use of genetically modified crops and chemicals in agriculture.

Palmer said Dow has created the new seeds with "multiple locks on the door" in an effort to avoid

increased weed resistance. In its environmental assessment, the USDA said in-

creased resistance is a risk. and farmers will have to find ways to adapt if they find it decreases in effectiveness. The agency said

it's hard to predict how that will play out, however.

Therefore, it is difficult to accurately predict when and the extent to which 2.4-D-resistant weeds will become a problem," the USDA said.

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



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## **BPI to hire workers, source** beef trim at Kansas plant

Beef Products Inc. announced recently it plans to begin collecting fresh beef trimmings at its Garden City location. in conjunction with the Tyson Foods production operations there, in support of its current Dakota City, Neb., facility which manufactures lean finely textured beef, *Meatingplace* reports.

The Garden City facility will operate two shifts of fresh beef trimmings collection as of Aug. 18 and plans to hire 40 to 45 fulltime employees. The Garden City plant was one of three BPI plants shuttered in March 2012 when demand for the LFTB product dwindled after a spate of media and social media stories about the product. The product was never unwholesome or unsafe. At the time of its clo-

sure, the Garden City plant

employed 236 workers. Plants in Amarillo, Texas (207 workers) and Waterloo. Iowa (216 workers) were closed at the same time and remain closed. "BPI continues to experience growth and remains confident this growth will continue. Although business conditions are not vet at the point where we can resume lean beef production operations in Garden City, this is certainly a step in the right direction," says Craig Letch, BPI's director of food quality & food safety. "As the global demand for quality lean beef continues to rise, BPI is ready to meet that demand by providing consumers high quality, wholesome, safe and nutritious lean beef, just as we have done for decades."

# **Kansas Department of Agriculture** joins with Costa Rican cattlemen to increase exports and build industry

Improving and expanding the Costa Rica beef industry while increasing the opportunity for the sales of U.S., - and specifically Kansas – beef genetics is the goal for the Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) along with the American International Charolais Association, the Montana Department of Agriculture and the Costa Rica Institute of Innovation and Ag Technology Transfer who have partnered on a project to showcase U.S. beef cattle genetics. The joint project began three years ago with the focus on improving beef quality in Costa Rica while at the same time increasing market opportunities for U.S. ranchers to sell genetics in the Central American

sen for the project are in fed finishing program, thus the top or bottom ten percent of each respective breed for their marbling expected progeny difference (EPD). One of the sires utilized in the project was bred by Mushrush Red Angus Cattle of Strong City.

In the spring of 2013, 600 units of Charolais and Red Angus semen were exported to Costa Rica from eight U.S. bulls. Twenty-five calves were born in early 2014 with an anticipated 150 more due in early 2015.

Performance data including birth weight, weaning weight and carcass weight will be collected on the calves from birth to slaughter in order to compare the U.S.-sired calves with the Costa Rican-sired

animals are typically slaughtered at about 36 months of age. The resulting heterosis from the U.S.sired cattle will hopefully decrease the production cycle by at least six months while producing a higher quality carcass for the Costa Rican beef industry. The demand for higher quality beef in Costa Rica is being fueled by a larger number of middle class consumers as well as a growing tourism industry.

"The project has great potential to connect Kansas ranchers with Costa Rican cattlemen to improve the genetics of Costa Rican cattle while increasing export opportunities for Kansas seedstock producers" says Billy Br K

Kansas cattlemen will participate in a field day in January 2015 with Costa Rican cattlemen where they will be able to visually compare the differences between the crossbred calves and the native calves. The project is made possible by the three partnering organizations as well as the U.S. Department of Agriculture Foreign Agriculture Service and U.S. Livestock Genetic Export, Inc.

Wheat buyers from the Republic of the Philippines long ago discovered the quality, value and reliability of U.S. wheat. Trade relationships with Philippine buyers have been maintained for more than 50 years and have resulted in the Philippines being the United States' fifth largest market for wheat. In order to maintain this relationship, U.S. Wheat Associates brought five Philippine milling industry customers to the United States from Aug. 6-16. These managers have a diverse range of responsibilities and experience, said Manila-based Joe Sowers, USW assistant regional director for South Asia, who traveled with the team.

"U.S. wheat has been a

big part of the Filipino milling and baking industry for more than 50 years," Sowers said. "Coming to the United States helps these new customers understand the work farmers, grain handlers and the USDA put into producing and delivering highquality wheat and services that can help them grow their businesses."

Kansas made up the last leg of the tour for the trade team. Over the last two days of their trip, they spent time visiting facilities in the state that showcased the professionalism and quality of the U.S. wheat industry. Their first stop in the state was visiting the Federal Grain Inspection Service Tech Center to learn about the inspection process. Next,

the team visited Best Harvest Bakery, one of the bakeries that creates buns for popular fast food restaurants, like McDonald's, out of Kansas-grown hard red winter wheat. The team then toured the International Grains Program and learned about the programs and courses the IGP Institute offers. The team also visited the Kansas Wheat Innovation Center to talk with staff and to learn about the research that is driving innovation in the wheat industrv.

Team participants also visited other locations around the country, including stops in Oregon, Washington and North Dakota. Because of the many tours and stops the team took, they were able to get a field-to-vessel look at the country's wheat industry. Many different topics were covered throughout the trip, including production. breeding. transportation, inspection and certification services and innovative uses. Aaron Harries, director


of marketing for Kansas Wheat, accompanied the team on their travels through America's Breadbasket.

Harries said, "The Philippines is consistently

one of the top five markets for all classes of U.S. wheat. Unfortunately, their smallest purchase is of hard red winter wheat. Their visit gives us a chance to promote the quality and durability of hard red winter wheat."

The Republic of the Philippines started off as a small customer of U.S. wheat in 1961 by purchasing 200,000 metric tons (7.35 million bushels). But over the last 53 years their demand has increased to nearly 2.2 million metric tons (80.8 million bushels)

in this last marketing year. The U.S. supplied over 93% of the Philippines' wheat imports last year. The Philippine milling industry is a dynamic and growing market. After not seeing a new entrant in the commercial flour market since 1990, two new mills entered the market last year and two more are under construction. After years of stagnant growth in the Philippine milling industry, the flour market is expected to grow significantly and trade relations are expected to flourish.



Porcine Epidemic Diar- ASF by farmers rhea Virus (PEDv) is on the minds of pork producers, but the U.S. pork industry needs to be vigilant about other disease threats on the horizon.

"A key threat is African Swine Fever (ASF), which continues to spread in Russia. It has moved into Poland and Lithuania, where it was recently found in wild boars," said Dr. Patrick Webb, director of swine health for the Pork Checkoff.

Russia placed an embargo on European pork when ASF was introduced to the European Union (EU). The European Food Safety Authority's Panel on Animal Health and Welfare recently assessed the risk of ASF becoming endemic in the EU's eastern neighboring countries and its spread to unaffected areas. The panel found that the movement of contaminated pork being fed to backyard swine to offset high feed costs was a major challenge in controlling the outbreak of ASF.

Other challenges include disease spread by contaminated vehicles and infected pigs, as well as delays in the detecand reporting of tion

Is the U.S. at Risk? The threat of ASF spreading further into the EU has European animal health authorities on edge, but could ASF make it to

our shores? "We don't share a common border with countries that have ASF, but the international movement of people and animal products puts the U.S. pork industry at risk for disease introduction," Webb said. This requires constant vigilance, such as during this year's Sochi Olympics, when USDA warned U.S. residents not to bring home products containing meat. This was done to reduce the risk of introducing foreign animal diseases that exist in Russia. such as ASF, Classical Swine Fever and Footand-Mouth Disease (FMD) into the United States through contaminated food products.


Visitors from countries with these diseases also present risks, especially if they've had contact with infected livestock or farms, Webb said. "Clothing or shoes that are contaminated can pose a risk, if not properly cleaned and disinfected before

coming across our borders."

#### Not Human **Health Issues**

It's important to note that these diseases are not human health issues. However, meat products, clothing or shoes contaminated with viruses can result in a foreign animal disease outbreak. "This would threaten the health and welfare of pigs and have a severe economic impact on pork producers and animal agriculture," Webb said. The World Organization for Animal Health maintains a list of foreign animal diseases (FADs) that would limit trade and commerce. Those that can infect pigs are FMD, ASF, Swine Vesicular Disease and Classical Swine Fever, Webb said. FADs must be reported and are considered regulatory diseases in the United States. If a FAD is detected, state and federal animal health authorities would have regulatory authority to implement response plans, including measures to quarantine farms and stop movement of susceptible livestock in affected areas to limit the spread of the disease.

### **Play Key Role**

Producers who voluntarily enroll in the plan would agree to implement program standards and allow access by state animal health authorities to the movement, biosecurity and surveillance information necessary to demonstrate the absence of a FAD infection on production sites.

"Instead of doing this after an outbreak, producers would develop this capacity as a preventive measure," said Webb, who noted that enrollment in the plan will not guarantee movement of pigs after an outbreak.







Cows raised on organic and conventional dairy farms in three regions of the United States show no significant differences in health or in the nutritional content of their milk, according to a new study by Oregon State University researchers and their collaborators.

Many organic and conventional dairies in the study also did not meet standards set by three commonly used cattle welfare programs.

"While there are differences in how cows are treated on organic farms, health outcomes are similar to conventional dairies," said Mike Gamroth, co-author of the study and professor emeritus in OSU's College of Agricultural Sciences. "Few dairies in this study performed well in formal criteria used to measure the health and well-being of cows."

Nearly 300 small dairy farms - 192 organic and 100 conventional — in New York, Oregon and Wisconsin participated in the study, which was funded by a \$1 million grant from the National Institute of Food and Agriculture in the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The five-year project looked at many aspects of dairy cow health, including nutrition, lameness, udder cleanliness, and other conditions. Milk samples were screened for bacteria and common diseases, and farmers were asked about their operations, including the use of veterinarians and pain relief when removing horns from cattle.

Researchers found the following:

One in five herds met standards for hygiene, a measure of animal cleanliness:

30 percent of herds met criteria for body condition, which measures size and weight of cows;

Only 26 percent of organic and 18 percent of conventional farms met recommendations for pain relief during dehorning:

Four percent of farms fed calves recommended doses of colostrum, which helps boost their limited immune systems after birth:

88 percent of farms did not have an integrated plan to control mastitis, a common disease in dairy cattle;

42 percent of conventional farms met standards for treating lameness;

Cows on organic farms produced 43 percent less milk per day than conventional non-grazing cattle, the study found, and 25 percent less than conventional grazing herds.

Milk from organic and non-organic herds also showed few nutritional differences, researchers found. Organic milk can occasionally contain more omega-3 fatty acids, which may improve heart health. However, those increases come from seasonal grazing and are not present when cattle are fed stored forage, according to Gamroth.

To become USDA-certified, organic dairy farms must allow cows access to grazing, and the grain cows consume must be grown on land free of pesticides and fertilizers. Organic farmers are not allowed the use of antibiotics, hormones or synthetic reproductive drugs.

"Nearly seven in ten organic farms previously operated conventional herds, which explains the lack of differences be-

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tween them," said Gamroth. "Many organic farmers operate in a similar fashion to when they raised conventional herds, from milking procedures, to using the same facilities, to caring for sick cattle."

The study also found more conventional farms (69 percent) used veterinarians than organic dairies (36 percent). Organic dairy farmers often perform their own veterinary work, Gamroth said, because they feel vets do not always know or follow organic standards for care.

Some organic herds in the study also showed a strain of bacteria, commonly known as Strep. ag., that conventional herds eliminated long ago, by using antibiotics.

Organic farms did perform better in some areas of health: cows had fewer hock lesions-injuries to the legs that often form from being housed for long periods. Calves on organic farms were also fed a greater volume of milk and were weaned at an

older age than on conventional farms.

Results were based on criteria from three commonly used cattle welfare programs: the American Humane Association's Animal Welfare Standards for Dairy Cattle, Farmers Assuring Responsible Management, and the Canadian Codes of Practice. However, the dairies surveyed for the study were not committed to these standards, said Gamroth.

"Our data shows there is room for improvement in dairies and sets a benchmark to measure progress in the industry." said Gamroth. "We believe adopting animal welfare standards is part of the solution, as are increases to educational efforts to improve the care of cows."

The study included 24 organic and 24 conventional dairies in Oregon.

Articles from the study have been published in the Journal of Dairy Science and the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

Other project collaborators include Pamela Ruegg of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Linda Tikofsky and Ynte Schukken of Cornell University, and Charles Benbrook of the Organic Centre in Oregon.
