Fall harvest is a fruity experience at Kanza Cattle and Vineyards

At age eighteen, Wade Hambright is often called the youngest vintner in the United States. The Dickinson County youth is the third generation in his family to grow grapes for the wine industry, his father having learned the art from Wade's great-grandfather in Alabama.

With the first vines planted in 2001, grapes make up about a quarter of the family enterprise, Kanza Cattle and Vineyards near Chapman. Polled Herefords represent the other three-quarters. Hambright has worked in the vineyard since he was seven or eight years old, and has loved soaking up all the knowledge he could through his labor.

"I love to do it," he said. "Over all the years I've been working on it, I've learned a lot about it and hope to turn it into a business after college." He is currently attending Pratt Community College majoring in Wildlife Outfitting and Operations. Along with working in his own vineyard, he manages Chapman Creek Vineyards and assists at Prairie Fire Winery Vineyards, who also buys Hambright's grapes.

Recently, several friends and other interested people gathered to help harvest the Chambourcin grapes at Kanza Cattle and Vineyards. The hybrid purple-skinned, French-American grape is actually more readily available in the United States and Australia than in its country of origin, France. Chambourcins have been grown in the northeastern and midwestern United States since the 1970s and winemakers often use it to enhance the

depth of blended red wines, while maintaining the fruit quality of the main variety they are using.

In spite of good rains this summer, this year's grape harvest was about fifty percent of last year's, as the vines finally began experiencing the effects of the previous two years of drought. "Grapes are like bushes or trees, rooted very deep," Hambright explained. "They like hot, dry weather, but they still need moisture. After two years of no rain, subsoil moisture was depleted, so we really started seeing the effect." The day's harvest yielded about 1,000 pounds of Chambourcin grapes and 680 pounds of Traminette, a late mid-season white wine grape.

No matter how many pounds of grapes he produces, Hambright has discovered he has no trouble marketing them. They all go to Prairie Fire Winery, but he gets plenty of other inquiries from interested buyers, and figures he could easily sell six times as many as he does. "During harvest, I get calls just about every day from different wineries and home wine makers," he said.

Growing grapes in the Sunflower State is not a new idea. In the nineteenth century, the long, sunny growing season and soils that ranged from limestone-laced to sandy made Kansas a significant grape-growing state. Unfortunately, national prohibition in 1920 decimated the industry. But Hambright says it is an industry that is growing and offers many opportunities. He himself hopes to grow his business after college with a focus on consulting and management.

Green fields

This year Kansas has green fields, kissed by the sun. There are blue skies with white clouds high above. There are valleys where rivers run. Heck, there's even water standing in terrace channels.

It's been at least five years since the pastures have been this green in the eastern half of the state and even in some of the drier areas of western Kansas the grass is showing signs of life.

If you've traveled anywhere in the state this summer, you can see what a little moisture can do, especially with the nurturing

ers. Corn crops tower above the ground. Ten feet tall is not unusual. Some farmers say some of their crops are 11 and 12 feet tall.

In Decatur County, far northwestern Kansas, farmers are hoping to harvest 90 to 100 bushel dry-land corn.

Grain sorghum fields sport huge heads nine, ten and even 12 inches long. These heads are heavy, filled with plump red and green berries.

Soybean leaves are the size of footballs. Pods weigh down the plants.

Calves graze in grass that nearly tickles their bellies. Even in the short-grass

country of western Kansas, the buffalo grass is green and full of protein. Low spots and buffalo wallows are filled with life-sustaining water. It's a stark contrast to so many years when the grass has already turned brown, parched by the sun.

The Sunflower State has been truly blessed with moisture during the summer of 2014. Rainfall has been plentiful in many areas of our state.

Timely rains keep falling. In some areas of Kansas, farmers have stopped irrigating and are anxious for their fall crops to dry down. They're ready to harvest.

The May family has farmed and ranched in Decatur County since 1887. Roger and Susan May are fourth-generation producers and they're thankful for the moisture in 2014.

"It's been a great year," Roger says. "The cattle are looking good and in great

At first she did some day work for him but soon Gerald asked her to be his herdsman. Little did I know that

statements like that in any other sale catalog anywhere else, but Gerald did not want anyone thinking he was anything but straight- forward and honest. We sure could use more people like that in this world.

I live each day trying to emulate that same honesty and integrity. However, the one lesson from Gerald that had the biggest impact on my life was the way he treated his livestock. Gerald treated his animals with a quiet respect and was always calm when handling them. I must admit that I am a bit of a hothead and very impatient when it comes to animals, so I marveled at how Gerald worked cattle. I was also impressed with how gentle his stock was. and then the light went off in my head.

Livestock are a reflection of how they are treated. Treat them with gentleness and they will seldom get worked up. Then came my biggest revelation - be patient, quiet and move calmly and you will get done so much faster than "ramming and jamming." The only stories I ever heard of Gerald showing any displeasure was when it came to someone mishandling his cattle. Hitting one of Gerald's cows was not something you wanted to do. He used the same approach when it came to dealing with people too. He drew others in because they knew they would be treated with kindness and respect. Gerald Schmidt was a man others wanted to be around because he made them feel good. You couldn't spend a day around him without feeling better about yourself. That is a very rare quality. There are very few days I do not think of Gerald, particularly when I am working with my cattle. I am absolutely convinced that the world would be a much better place if we had more people like Gerald in it. I just hope that I live my life each day with at least a small portion of the integrity, honesty, humbleness, humility and respect that Gerald showed each person and animal he came into contact with each day. In the end I must say I am a much better person for knowing Gerald and for that I am very grateful.

shape. It's been several years since our grass has been this green this late in the (growing) season."

Plenty of showers, moisture from 35 to 60 hundredths of an inch, have been sure and steady throughout the summer, the Decatur County farmer/ rancher says. They've also enjoyed a couple of more abundant rainfall events that totaled a couple inches. So far this year, nearly nine inches of rain has fallen on their land.

On this early September morning, temperatures hovered in the low 70s. Barn swallows bobbed and weaved in the sky searching for insects. Many of the insects are pesky black flies that pester the cattle and calves.

These insects don't like to fly on such cool, early mornings. As the cattle kick them up from the ground, the swallows snatch them from the sky, eat them or carry them home to feed their hungry offspring. Looking out the pickup window at his herd, Roger says he'd rank them at near the top on a scale of one to five.


ever I'm doing and pay attention whenever it comes on television.

First 4x4 quilt block hung in city of Ottawa

The Franklin County Quilt Block Tour has added its first 4x4-foot quilt block to its tour in the City of Ottawa.

Carolina Lilly recently was hung on a restored carriage house at 703 S. Princeton St., Ottawa. The colors in the block reflect the colors in the trim of the home, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Dustin Mitchell. While the two-story carriage house looks much the same as when it was built in the early 1900s, its current use is to store motorcycles. and Williamsburg have 4x4 blocks on their museums, which are both volunteer-driven to preserve, protect and share the history of the area. The 4x4 blocks are designed to be hung on outbuildings with a historically documented agricultural use, such as a carriage house, small milk barns or chicken houses, that have been well-kept or restored. Franklin County has 34 8x8-foot quilt blocks hung throughout the county on barns and other agricultural-related structures. The tour was the first organized

quilt block trail in Kansas. The project, started by the Franklin County Convention & Visitors Bureau and Franklin County Quilt Block Committee in 2010, continues to be a tourist attraction for the county.



As Weather Turns Cooler **Expect More Spiders Inside**

MANHATTAN — This is the time of year when the Kansas State University entomology department receives a lot of calls. The question most asked: Why am I getting so many spiders in my house?

"Insects move inside the house seeking warmer temperatures," said Jeff Whitworth, assistant professor of entomology. "Just like humans, insects prefer a climate around 72 degrees Fahrenheit. Spiders are seeking those warmer environments as well as searching for food.'

Tennessee medical officials have reported an increase in brown recluse bites this year. However, Whitworth says there is no indication there are more spiders this year compared to previous years. The brown recluse, most common in the central and southeast regions, is the most feared spider in the Midwest because of its hemotoxic

venom. But Whitworth says the brown recluse isn't as scary as you think.

"The nice thing about the brown recluse spider, as its name implies, is it is reclusive," he said. "We have reared spiders now for approximately two to three years and we have found the brown recluse to be non-aggressive."

Whitworth; Holly Schwarting, research associate in entomology; and J.R. Ewing, master's student in entomology, are researching the most reliable method of managing brown recluse spiders. Pest control operators are divided on whether sticky traps, pesticide or a combination of the two are a better way to kill spiders in your home.

Whichever form of removal you choose to use, Whitworth says to wait until March. Brown recluse spiders become inactive from mid-October until March.

Kansas NRCS receives \$3.8 million to protect and enhance agricultural and wetland easements

Eric B. Banks, Kansas State Conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced that \$3.8 million in conservation funding has been allocated in Kansas to help landowners protect and restore key farmlands, grasslands, and wetlands. This announcement follows Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack's statement that \$328 million is being invested nationally for this USDA initiative.

"Through conservation easements, farmers will be better able to protect valuable agricultural lands from development, restore lands best suited for grazing, and return wetlands to their natural conditions," said Banks. "Conservation easements are making a dramatic and positive impact for food supply, rural communities, and species habitat."

The 2014 Farm Bill created the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program, or ACEP, to protect critical wetlands and keep lands in farming and ranching for the future. According to Banks, approximately 18 projects statewide were selected to protect and restore 4,800 acres of prime farmland, grassland, and wetlands.

Through ACEP, private or tribal landowners and eligible conservation partners working with landowners can request assistance from USDA to protect and enhance agricultural land through an agricultural or wetland easement.

The plentiful moisture, good grass and plenty of milk for the calves has been a real asset this summer.

"They're in top condition they're fleshy and their coats are sleek and shiny," Roger says. "With these cows in such fine shape, they'll raise a better, healthier calf this coming winter."

The Mays manage a 350head cow/calf operation as part of their farm and ranch operaton. Most years they feed the calves out to finish.

The cornerstone of his livestock operation has always involved making sure they have good feed, good nutrition and the proper health care. He likened his cattle to his family.

Each and every day the Decatur County stockman drives out to look at their herd. Once in the pasture, he meanders slowly through his stock, checking carefully for any sick cows or calves. Roger also checks to see if the cattle have water, mineral and salt.

Another important part

of this daily routine is to count the stock and make sure they're all inside the fence. The Decatur County stockman likes to keep his stock in his pastures.

"If you can keep livestock in, off your neighbor's property and off the road, that's a real accomplishment," May says. "Every cattleman must keep track of his fences - make sure they're in top repair."

Like the poem by Frost says, "good fences make good neighbors."

Yes sir, out here on the

May place cattle have always been a major part of their operation. The better they take care of their livestock, the better the cattle will take care of them.

That's the way it was with his dad and his grandfather before him. As a matter of fact, that's the way Roger believes it will always be.



On the Trail with Doc Barton

Tough times did not go away soon enough for the Barton brothers following the Civil War. Their father had barely scratched out a living after he suffered severe cattle losses during the war. By 1871, "Doc" and Alfred Barton were making plans to get out of Texas. Sod busters and sheep men

were making life uneasy on the family ranch northwest of Austin, and as young men are disposed to do the brothers turned their sights toward the distant horizon They had heard stories of lush grazing lands in the Arkansas River valley and the High Plains of eastern Colorado and western

Kansas. The rumor was good enough for young men with adventure on their minds. The brothers partnered on a herd of three thousand trail cattle with boyhood friends Tom Connell and Dee Eubank.

The trail outfit consisted of twelve cowboys. Nineteen-year-old Doc Barton was trail boss. The outfit left Burnet County, Texas in February, 1872. They drove the cattle west to the Horsehead Crossing on the Pecos River. Oliver Loving and Charlie Goodnight passed by the crossing in 1866 as they blazed the Goodnight-Loving Trail.


Driving north into New Mexico Barton and his outfit crossed the Rocky Mountains into Colorado at Raton Pass. Mountain man Uncle Dick Wootton had cleared the narrow pass of rocks





and other obstacles, built bridges and generally turned the pass into a usable road. Barton didn't mention it when recalling drive but Wootton the charged a toll that he would have had to pay. Each wagon cost one dollar and fifty cents. Each rider cost twenty-five cents, and each animal driven over the road was assessed a toll of five cents. Assuming Doc drove one wagon with the herd, twelve cowboys and three thousand head of cattle would have netted Uncle Dick a tidy one hundred fifty-four dollars and fifty cents.

The trail herd reached the Arkansas River east of Pueblo, Colorado about a week later. From there they slow-grazed the cattle to the east along the Arkansas River valley searching for just the right location to establish their ranch. With 250 miles of Arkansas River behind them the Texas boys decided to hold their cattle for a while. Since leaving Texas they had been three months on the trail. The location was southeast of present-day Garden City. Open prairie greeted the eye as far as one could see. Garden City would not materialize for another six years.

Fifty miles to the east Fort Dodge guarded travelers on the Santa Fe Trail. Changes were coming. The Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad had reached Great Bend and the surveyors were rapidly putting down stakes near Fort Dodge. Henry Sitler watched as the survey stakes inched ever closer to his sod ranch house on a stretch of land just outside the Fort Dodge military reservation. Sitler's house quickly became a stopping place for refreshment and relaxation. Recognizing the commercial opportunity of selling whiskey to soldiers and travelers, George Hoover and John McDonald set up a tent saloon near the Sitler ranch house on June 17, 1872. Following closely

on Hoover & McDonald's heels, buffalo hunter turned entrepreneur, Hoodoo Brown and partner Charlie Stewart built a more substantial saloon out of lumber hauled from the Kansas Pacific Railroad at Russell. With the expectation of rail service, buffalo hunters began stacking hides along the right of way. Folks were already referring to the new "town" as Buffalo City. It was later officially named Dodge City.

Grading crews quickly followed the surveyors. The Barton outfit found an unexpected market for their cattle, feeding the large crews of railroad men. By late summer Doc discovered the corrals and sod structures of an abandoned road ranch at the Cimarron Crossing on the Santa Fe Trail (presentday Ingalls. The road ranch had served travelers along the trail. It was a perfect ranch setup. Six months after the outfit left Texas they had found a home. The big steers grew into fat cattle on the luxuriant

grass and were ready for market by the fall. Dodge City was not yet a cattle town but Great Bend, a hundred miles east of their new headquarters had stockyards. The Barton outfit shipped two thousand Texas longhorns out of the new railhead. The herd filled forty-six cattle cars giving Great Bend a legitimate place among the cattle towns and establishing the name of Doc Barton as "The King" of the men who ventured to establish the cattle business on The Way West. .







A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The cattle on feed report was more or less as expected with 99% on feed, 97% placed, and 90% marketed. The placements for the month of August were the smallest ever in this data set, which began in 1992 and that follows July placements that were the smallest since 1992, so we definitely aren't going to see cattle on feed numbers go over year-ago levels very soon.

The live cattle futures weren't too impressive last week with the October contract slipping a little, but the feeders were firm and are closing in on the contract highs again. The auctions weren't noticeably higher than the week before, but they aren't backing off and the feeder index is above all the futures contracts.

The \$153 area should be good support for the October live cattle and I would be preparing for another leg higher in the October futures very soon. A move to \$170 isn't out of the question before expiration.

In the grain markets it was a pretty ugly week, but it is hard to expect much else when all the talk is about record corn and soybean yields. It took until Friday for the corn and soybeans to make new lows, but the wheat seemed to make a new low nearly every day. It seems that the wheat market is now working to become a feed grain despite the very tight supplies of U.S. HRW. Nobody seems to care about that when world supplies are plentiful and we can't get consistent export sales. Low prices cure low prices, so apparently we haven't gotten low enough.

With last week's support failures in all the markets we need to look for new downside targets. For the moment I don't think the December corn will get in a hurry to fall below \$3.25, but as we approach the October supply and demand report there will probably be more pressure and it wouldn't be a surprise to see the market near the \$3.00 level at that time.

For the wheat it is hard to find much support even when looking at weekly and monthly charts, so for the moment I am using the \$5.25 - \$5.35 area for the next downside target in the December KW. If that fails then we will have to look for a move down to the \$4.50 level, which probably wouldn't happen until the July contract makes its harvest lows. If we have a good crop, and no trouble around the world, then that long term support area will become likely.

November contract is rapidly approaching the \$9.50 level, but the bears probably won't be satisfied until the market is closer to \$9.00. Fortunately the soybeans are seeing excellent demand, but unfortunately USDA already has record large exports penciled in, so that means we have to see huge sales to meet expectations. If the big sales slow earlier than normal this market will end up below \$9.00 as the S. American crop comes on.

As for the soybeans, the

Some of our export business will be affected by the U.S. dollar, which is on the rise. The stronger dollar is coming as a result of our quantitative easing coming to an end and weakness in the yen and euro. A strong dollar is generally detrimental to commodities, so that is just another weapon in the hands of the bears. Prepare yourselves for an era of large production and low prices because at this point the only thing that will prevent further erosion in prices is bad weather in the Corn Belt next summer. U.S. railways hot topic as harvest advances

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack met recently with Warren Buffett to ensure BNSF Railway is ready for expected record harvests this fall. BNSF and Canadian Pacific Railway have been working to reduce the backlog of grain car deliveries that stemmed from complications last winter. These backlogs were a result of a heavy harvest, higher coal and oil volumes and the extended cold winter, which reduced the size and speed of trains in operation.

During a hearing focused on examining rail service issues, South Dakota Sen. John Thune and other Senate Commerce Committee lawmakers expressed concern about the impact rail service delays are having on state economies. Later, the committee passed unanimously the Surface Transportation Board Reauthorization Act (S. 2777) sponsored by Senate Commerce Committee Chairman John Rockefeller (D-W.V.) and Ranking Member

John Thune (R-S.D.), which would offer more authority to the STB to investigate rail shipper complaints.

As harvest advances, grain elevators, farmers and ethanol stakeholders continue to express concern about the railways' ability to handle the expected large volume of grain, especially in the Midwest and Plains regions. Some steps are being taken to counter these concerns and ensure infrastructure remains viable. Recently the South Dakota Department of Transportation received a \$12.7 million federal grant to help cover the costs of refurbishing a 41.6-mile stretch of railway owned by Mitchell-Rapid City railroad. These funds will be used to replace railroad ties and repair overall infrastructure between Chamberlain and Presho. While the rail improvements will not resolve the rail backlogs predicted to worsen with fall harvest, the economic impact on communities in its path is expected to be positive.

Kansas Hay Market Report

Demand moderate for dairy alfalfa and alfalfa pellets, light to moderate for grinding alfalfa and grass hay. Hay trade slow. 

Cargill Inc. files suit against Syngenta

Cargill Inc. recently filed a lawsuit against Syngenta over losses stemming from China's rejection of genetically modified corn for "negligence" in selling U.S. farmers a genetically modified seed that had not yet been approved for import in China. China has rejected boatloads of U.S. corn since November due to the presence of Syngenta's trait called Agrisure Viptera or MIR 162, which makes the corn resistant to insects. Cargill claims it lost \$90 million as a result of Syngenta not first obtaining import approval from China. Syngenta began selling the MIR 162 seed in 2010 after gaining approval from the U.S. China has been considering an application to approve the variety for four years. Syngenta has stated this lawsuit has "no merit."





Not All at Once

Do you think you could learn to play chess all in one day? I doubt it. Chess is not a simple game. It took me quite a while to learn the names of the pieces. Then it took much more time to understand how individual piece each moves. Granted, some humans have a higher intelligence level than horses and have the ability to learn new things faster but horses have their own aptitude for learning. Since they don't speak our language, it is more difficult for us to break through their barrier and make them understand what we want them to do. When we first introduce a young horse to a new training exercise, it may be difficult for them to understand exactly what you are asking. Work slowly but consistently with your cues to try and get the horse to move his body the way you want him to move. Like playing chess, it takes a lot of thought and planning for the rider and a lot of thought and puzzlement for the horse as he tries to understand why you are poking or pulling on him a certain way. What does that mean? Why is that

human sitting on my back touching me with his boot against my belly? Does he want me to lie down, eat. drink or pee? I don't know what that means.

A voung horse is not sure what your cue means so most times they will move a certain way that is not the way you want them to move. So the rider pokes and pulls on them again to get the horse to make a specific movement. After trying several times to get the horse to understand what you are asking and not getting the results you want, the horse will begin to get frustrated because he doesn't understand what those pokes and pulls mean. He begins to counter the pokes by showing frustration with minor rearing or kicking out with a hind leg or sometimes even shaking his head in defiance.

Whoa! Now it's time to back off and let that pony clear his head and allow the frustration to ebb. When that happens, ease him into a walk and let him relax with no pokes or pulling on the reins. Walk him around until you feel his body settle down. You can't force a young horse to do what you want. He first has to understand what you want. Continually fighting with him to move the way you want doesn't win the match. It helps to let them make mistakes before you try to correct them. For instance, if you are asking your horse to walk figure eights and he continually breaks into a trot, let him trot but keep him in the same circle on a loose rein. He will eventually get tired or bored of trotting and drop back to a walk. You've allowed him to realize that he doesn't have to trot or lope and that walking, like you asked, is easier.

If he happens to go from a walk to a trot and then a lope, let him lope till he tires and drops back on his own to a trot then a walk. Your goal is to do figure eights at a walk. Continue to do this exercise until he realizes that you want him to only walk. That is a simple exercise that really helps a horse to realize he has made a mistake and life is better if he simply does what you asked.

Teaching body movements like side-passing or turnarounds is more difficult and harder than trotting or walking circles but walking circles is a good way to get the horse relaxed and in the right frame of mind. Your goal with a young horse is to teach the basics, the ABCs, so solidly that when you ask for a certain movement, the horse has been schooled so well to do that maneuver with that same cue, he instantly recognizes the cue and exe-

table; box big screen TV; round

cutes the command you are asking for.

Trotting in figure eights or circles is a good way to start a training session. When the horse is trotting as you wish on a loose rein, vou can go on to teaching another lesson. Let's use side-passing or moving sideways with the horse's body lined up straight from poll to tail. Remember, the horse is not going to understand what you are asking so you have to introduce the cues while understanding that the horse will be confused at first and treating him with patience but a firm hand. Walk him up to a fence, preferably a board fence. Place him perpendicular to the fence with his nose a foot or two away. Holding him straight with the reins, begin bumping him gently behind the girth with the heels of your boot on only one side. If you want to teach him to move left, bump on his right side. You want to teach him to move away from the pressure of your boot. At first, he will not know what to do and may take a step forward or backward. The fence stops him from going too far forward and eliminates one avenue of escape. If he moves backwards, move him back to the fence. If he turns his body, use the reins to straighten him.

Let him sit there and relax a few minutes and ask him again. Don't make a fight out of it. Let him relax each time before asking the same exact way again. Keep him calm and ask

again. Correct him when he makes a mistake but don't reprimand or get mad at him when he doesn't do it right.

Eventually, he is going to take one correct step sideways. When he makes that good step, pat him on the neck and try to let him know that you approve of what he just did. Let him sit still for a few minutes, releasing the pressure from him. It is important that each time you ask for the sideways step, you ask the same way. Only go one way until he can do it competently.

You've got one correct step, now try to get two and slowly work your way to more sideways steps. If you don't get them, try to stop after he makes one good step and don't push the horse further on the first session. Get the lesson firmly entrenched in the horse's mind before you move on

or try to go the other way. You have to get the horse to consistently move left when you cue him to move left with your heel pressure behind the right girth. Don't try to teach everything all at once! Slower is better. Slower creates a concrete foundation they will remember. During the next session, see if the horse remembers how to side-pass left. If he does well, it is time to try side-passing to the right using the same procedure only using your left leg to push him to the right. You have to train both sides of a horse so you may encounter the same difficulties you had moving the horse left. Use the same techniques until the horse is comfortable moving both left and right.

This summer Tyson agreed to continue to process cattle from county fairs even after three head (not from Kansas) were found to have been fed zilpaterol hydrochloride (also known as Zilmax or Showmaxx) after Tyson had stopped receiving cattle that had been fed that product.

For years, we have helped merchandise fair cattle from several counties in north central Kansas. The kids retain ownership and receive carcass data on their animals. It is a great learning opportu-

nity. This year we had par-Palenske, for working with ticipants from Republic, Marshall, Wabaunsee and Washington counties.

Initially, Tyson was going to cease receiving fair cattle. After review, Tyson agreed to harvest fair cattle providing each fair participant certified that their animals had not received any Zilmax or similar product and had followed proper drug withdrawal protocols.

This emphasis on proper drug use made for a valuable learning experience.

We view county fairs as a positive quality of life event in our rural counties and livestock shows are a big part of having a good fair.



Growing Hereford demand leads to increases in registrations, transfers, cows on inventory, membership, AHA reports

Fiscal year 2014 was a year of expansion and growth for the Hereford breed as commercial producers continue to find value and predictability in utilizing Hereford genetics.

"Record sale prices for bulls and females and increases in registrations, transfers and cows on inventory indicate the market is vibrant for Hereford genetics," says Craig Huffhines, AHA executive vice president. "We're excited about the increasing demand of Hereford genetics in the marketplace as well as the potential possible, as the current trend in the industry is expansion. As a breed, we are focused to produce the cattle that will meet the needs of the commercial industry."

A total of 188 Hereford production sales were reported by American Hereford Association (AHA) field representatives during the fiscal year, which ended Aug. 31. Bull sales averaged \$5,089, up nearly \$400 per head, and females \$4,637, up nearly \$440 per head.

The second largest cattle breed in the U.S., Hereford reported 71,444 registrations (a 5.2% increase) and 40,295 transfers (a 12.1% increase) with 107,277 cows on inventory, up nearly 7%. The Association has 3,641 active adult members (a 4% increase) and 2,670 active junior members (a 7% in-

crease). Hereford semen use in the commercial industry is also increasing. According to the National Association of Animal Breeders (NAAB), domestic Hereford semen sales increased 7% compared to last year. Hereford domestic semen sales have steadily increased since 2006, a testament to the increasing demand for Hereford genetics in the commercial industry. Helping with this progress in the commercial sector has been the AHA's Whole Herd Total Performance Records (TPR) program. Now 13 years old, the program has helped the AHA and Hereford breeders build a database that documents the breed's strengths.

More and more Hereford breeders continue to drive progress by submitting ultrasound data, body condition scores, udder scores and cow weights, which all add to the integrity and accuracy of the AHA database.

The Association has continued to focus its research on feed efficiency as well as a multi-year project with Simplot Livestock Co. that is documenting the benefits of using Hereford sires in a large-scale, predominately Angus heifer program. Also noted at the fiscal

Internal parasites take a bite out of cattle profits

By Kaitlin Morgan Internal parasites in cattle --- often called worms --eat away at the performance and marbling potential in fed cattle, even when they're dewormed properly at arrival. That's according to research at Iowa State University (ISU), which also suggests deworming stockor preconditioned ers calves as a "best management" approach.

The research

In one trial, 43 steers from southeastern states varying in age and weight were shipped to a southwest Iowa feedvard, where fecal samples guided a division of cattle into high (HI) and low (LO) parasite burdens. All were treated with the recommended dose of eprinomectin to control what were 92% roundworms (strongyles). "These parasites live in the digestive tracts, where they cause damage to the stomach, steal nutrients and produce a loss in digestive ability." savs ISU Extension lead researcher Chris Clark.

After 24 days, another fecal exam showed all cattle were free of parasites, but effects of the initial parasite burden were still visible, he notes.

They were all gaining at the same rate by then, but the HI group, lighter on arrival and set back in the first weeks, never caught up. They required more days on feed than the LO group and the HI steers tended to have lower marbling scores, dressing percentages, internal fat and backfat at harvest. Being treated for clinical disease more times, the HI side also incurred higher

Protect your profits Even a relatively small research trial serves to point out how easily profitability can be decreased, and reinforces the value of effective internal parasite control starting months before the cattle go into a feedyard.

Clark says the southeast region, source of calves in the study, is known for high internal parasite risk because of long grazing seasons and a warm, humid climate. Still, he says, grazing cattle across the U.S. are at risk of infection from many different parasites and producers should have a strategic deworming plan that fits their operation. Patrick Gunn, ISU Extension cowcalf specialist, says timing is the first step in strategy.

Producers often deworm before pasture cattle turnout and again when they come off grass, says Gunn. But until the last year

or two, most of the deworming agents available on the market were only effective for approximately 30 days. That means the effectiveness of the deworming agents often wear off just as cattle begin picking up a significant parasite load.

He recommends waiting to deworm until after cattle have been on grass for six to eight weeks, or using one of the recently developed extended-release dewormers. Producers in warmer climates should also look into more aggressive deworming plans with a midseason option if they graze cattle for longer seasons.

Pasture health and rotational grazing play a role in effective parasite management, Gunn explains. Overgrazed pastures tend to result in higher parasite loads for cattle, so good pasture management can lead to healthier cattle.

Impacts in the industry Another recent study by Clark and Gunn looked at the impact of not deworming Angus stocker heifers upon arrival at the feedlot after all cattle were treated in the middle of their grazing period with an extended-release deworming agent.

The results? Cattle that were effectively managed to reduce or eliminate internal parasites while grazing did not require deworming at the feedyard. "We didn't note a difference in feedlot performance or carcass merit," Gunn says. "I think the broader impact of this is just reinforcing that producers need to have best management practices in place to minimize parasite load," he added. "For the feedlot producers, they want to sell a heavier carcass; and the cow-calf producers want to send a heavier calf to the feedvard. On both ends of the sector, it would benefit producers to control parasites to maximize weight

gain through all phases of the production cycle."

Clark agrees, adding that the key to all that is better communication between buyer and seller. "Sourcing good cattle and knowing cattle history can help feedlots know more about how to treat incoming cattle," he says. "Preconditioned cattle with proper vaccinations and deworming agents are healthier cattle with a higher marketability."

The first study showed HI cattle made \$40 less in higher treatment and feed costs, and a reduction in carcass quality leading to lost premiums. The cost to deworm a 500-pound calf once is \$2 to \$6 and, according to earlier ISU research, the largest return on investment in pharmaceutical technology for cow-calf and stocker operations.

Producers may invest in high-quality genetics, feed and nutritional supplements, but those may not pay off without strategic parasite control, they con-
