

# Page addresses climate shifts and the future of food

**By Lucas Shivers** Detailing the importance of climate alternations for agriculture, Cargill Inc. executive chairman Greg Page spoke at Kansas State University on Oct. 12 on the economic impacts of climate change on the world's food

production. "Climate change is the transcendent issue of our generation," Page said. "How to respond and how much to spend against an uncertain outcome is the essence of risk management."

Page presented a lecture entitled "Climate Change and the Future of Food Production" in McCain Auditorium to hundreds of participants as part of the Henry C. Gardiner Global Food Systems Lecture Series.


"We must be open to collaboration and cooperation, assume good intent and enter into conversations to make smart decisions about the future," Page said.

#### Forum of Ideas

Striving to be a top five college of agriculture, K-State broadcasted the speech streaming online with watch parties at the Olathe and Salina campuses, as well as in high school FFA and science classes.

"K-State is a global leader in agriculture," said K-State president Kurt Schultz. "We're using our expertise to now support global food systems."

John Floros, dean of the College of Agriculture and director of K-State Research and Extension, said the lecture provided a scientific basis behind the food system by bringing thought leaders from academics, industry

Floros said. "Yet, compelling arguments sometimes blame the industrial food systems. Our food system faces many challenges: water, soil, limited accessibility to food, longer human life span, food safety and terrorism."

Floros said the lecture shares a passion of agriculture and tells the story of the global food system from various perspectives and points of view.

"Given these issues and the criticism, nevertheless the question remains, will we be able to sustainability feed 11 billion by the end of the century?" Floros said.

The evening provided science-based education. The

ipants to openly learn together with a natural curiosity.

"If you think about feeding nine billion in 35 years, I remember the words of Henry Gardiner: 'We can do it.' Let's have an open discussion," Gardiner said. "Often, we apologize for being farmers; but let's educate the world because we have to feed the world."

Referring to Page, Gardiner said he anticipated a

rigorous interaction with many questions from the audience following the prepared remarks.

"He's one of us," Gardiner said. "He's from the Great Plains. We're excited to have him share about the opportunity before us. The K-State way is to leave our world better than we found

Page shared about the urgency of the issues in climate change intersecting with agriculture.

"The challenge is clear: 9 billion by 2050 with more urban, numerous and prosperous citizens," Page said. "We have to do more with heightened awareness of our planet's limited resources."

Page noted it was a fitting time and place with international talks in Paris later this vear.

"Together, we have moved the world further from famine than ever be-

fore," Page said. "All of the world's people own a debt of gratitude to the science of land-grant universities."

For example, it takes 33% less nitrogen to produce a bushel of corn in the last 30 years. These successes have dramatically lowered greenhouse gases.

"There is impressive human capital right here in Manhattan, Kansas," he said.

**Risks of Change** 

In addition to his work at Cargill, Page is a member of the Risky Business project, which was formed in 2014 to prepare companies for climate change.

"We tried to not focus on the controversies, just the economic outcomes and risks with shifting agriculture patterns," he said. "We asked: what can we do now to plan for a range of options and make reasonable preparations? Why? Because the challenges become more difficult in farming.'

Page said the reliance and capacity of farm families are doing things differently than earlier generations.

Page discussed how to embrace the signaling power of price; honor comparative advantage and open trade; pursue sustainability intensification and tackle climate change head on.

"More food will need to cross borders with imports and exports on a global scale

# **Huelskamp holds Town Hall in Leonardville**

Last week Rep. Tim Huelskamp continued the tradition of holding a Town Hall in every county in the Big First district by holding one in Leonardville at Nelson's

series allowed university students, faculty, staff and Kansas citizens to interact with U.S. and international food industry leaders.

Mark Gardiner, rancher and organizer of the lecture series named in his family's honor, reflected on the role of partnerships.

'We've endured and survived 130 years in Clark County," Gardiner reflected on his family's personal story. "If we have a question, we seek an answer. Often, who do we call: K-State. If they don't know, they network around the world to help us do things better."

Gardiner called for partic-

Landing. It was his 312th Town Hall since taking office.

Veterans' issues were a prevalent topic of discussion, as a couple of attendees expressed frustration with the difficulty in receiving the proper care and benefits. One attendee, who lost a nephew to suicide when he didn't receive adequate help for PTSD, pointed out that we are losing 8000 veterans a year to suicide. "Where is our war on PTSD?" she asked. "How are we going to meet this crisis?"

Huelskamp said they are working with Kansas Community Health Centers to try and get veterans the mental health services they need, but agreed that not enough is being done. He believes that it's not just a matter of incompetence at the Veteran's Administration, but possibly malfiesence, as well, if documents are actually being destroyed as he suspects.

Discussing the Waters of the U.S. rule that recently received a stay from a federal, Huelskamp said that is just a temorary solution. Regarding the role of EPA, Huelskamp said, "Unelected people get that much power because elected people aren't doing their job."

Planned Parenthood, gun control and the role of money in politics were also discussed, as well as Huelskamp's belief that conservtives are marginalized and punished for the way they vote.

Huelskamp released the following statement following the event:

"I've held more than three hundred Town Halls, and what I hear is this: "Kansans are fed up with Washington insiders and Republican leadership that isn't serving them.

"As my colleagues and I consider candidates for a new speaker of the House - the second in line to the presidency - I'm looking for someone who will work with conservatives, not attack, ridicule and punish us for standing up

for the conservative principles we all campaigned on. Kansans' voices matter just as much as those in Ohio or whichever state the next speaker will be from - special interests should not win out over those that voted us into office.

# Family farm

It seems people outside agriculture routinely try to define the family farm. In our contemporary society this means people two, three or four generations removed from the land live in sprawling suburbia.

Today, men and women whose great-grandfathers or grandfathers worked the land with mules and horses, progressed to tractors and are now using GPS, sit behind desks and computers dealing with an agricultural public they rarely, or never, see or know

The world as we knew it a few years ago is different

today. Today, computers, smartphones and social media have changed the way we communicate, live and work. These tools have replaced traditional sources of learning, made our world smaller and in some ways, more constrained.

Considering these factors, let's take a look at the family farm. Today's contemporary farm needs to be based on owner operation. This means the rights and responsibilities of ownership are vested in an entrepreneur who works the farm for a living.

The second key in defining the family farm system

should include independence. Independence is defined as financing from within its own resources using family labor, management and intellect to build equity and cash flow that will retire the mortgage, preferably in the lifetime of the owner.

Economic dispersion is the next important step in defining what a family farm should entail. Economic dispersion would include large numbers of efficient-sized farms operating with equal access to competitive markets worldwide.

No family farm would be complete without a family core. This family-centered operation must have a famishould help reduce price risks and maximize the use of farm resources to produce crops and livestock that would, in turn, provide greater self-sufficiency.

One final attribute necessary in defining today's family farm would be the acceptance and use of innovative technology. This should not only enhance farm labor but also help boost production


Family farming carries with it a commitment to specific, independent values. These values become a part of the community and include conservation, frugality, responsibility, honesty, dignity in work, neighborliness, self-reliance and concern and care for future

While it's rare indeed that one particular family farm may possess all of these attributes, together they have created a system of agriculture that has been a part of our rural culture since this nation's beginning.



As a member of the project's risk committee, Page has urged members of Congress and farmers to take climate change seriously. He encourages student, business and government leaders to have serious conversations about accommodating climate change scenarios in the future.

# Sustainability not to be used in final dietary guidelines

The USDA released a blog post recently in which Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and Health and Human Services Secretary Sylvia Burwell announced that sustainability would not be used in determining the final 2015 Dietary Guidelines for Americans. TCFA and NCBA have strongly advocated for this action since the release of the recommendations early in the year, because the issue of sustainability does not affect nutrition and is far outside the boundaries of the advisory committee members' areas of expertise.

The blog post states, "In terms of the 2015 Dietary Guidelines for Americans (DGAs), we will remain within the scope of our mandate in the 1990 National Nutrition Monitoring and Related Research Act, which is to provide 'nutritional and dietary information and guidelines'... based on the preponder-

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ance of the scientific and medical knowledge. The final 2015 Guidelines are still being drafted, but because this is a matter of scope, we do not believe that the 2015 DGAs are the appropriate vehicle for this important policy conversation about sustainability."

Also that week, the House Agriculture Committee held a public hearing over the Guidelines. Vilsack and Burwell were both present at the hearing and answered questions posed by committee members on the process used in developing the Dietary Guidelines for Americans. This was the first time both Secretaries have commented together on the process.

In a small saucepan combine cereal and 1 cup water. Cook covered for 20 minutes. Stir in 1 cup water and add butter, honey and salt; cool to lukewarm. In a large mixer bowl combine 2 cups flour and yeast. Add cereal mixture and the 2 eggs. Beat on low speed for 1/2 minute, scraping sides of bowl constantly. Beat 3 minutes at high speed. By hand stir in enough remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth (5 to 8 minutes). Shape into a ball. Place dough in a lightly greased bowl, turning once to grease all surfaces. Cover and let rise in warm place until double. Punch down and turn out on floured surface. Divide in half, cover and let rest 10 minutes. Shape into 2 loaves and put in 2 greased and floured pans (8 1/2-by-

4-by-2 1/2-inch). Cover, let rise until double. Combine egg yolk with 1 tablespoon water; brush on tops of loaves and sprinkle with quick oats. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. **Remove from pans and cool** on wire rack. Makes 2 loaves. \*\*\*\*

Lydia J. Miller, Westphalia: **IRISH POTATO CANDY** 

3 cups grated or flaked coconut

3 cups sugar

3/4 cup evaporated milk 2 tablespoons butter or

margarine **Pinch of salt** 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cinnamon

Mix together coconut, sugar, evaporated milk. butter or margarine and salt. Cook in a heavy saucepan until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to a boil. Continue cooking and stirring until thickened. Stir in vanilla extract and turn out onto buttered platter. Spread out with a wooden spoon while still warm. Cut into bite-size pieces in the shape of miniature potatoes. Sprinkle generously with cinnamon. \*\*\*\*



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# **Seasonal Pumpkins Tips**

Pumpkins offer far more than a door-stop at Halloween. This season is also the prime time to find and use sugar or pie pumpkins, the best for cooking and baking. Pumpkin seeds from any pumpkin can also be dried and roasted.

Home canning is not recommended for pumpkin butter or any mashed or pureed pumpkin or winter squash. In 1989, the USDA's Extension Service first published the Complete Guide to Home Canning that remains the basis of Extension recommendations today, found in the December 2009 revision. The only directions for canning pumpkin and winter squash are for cubed flesh. In fact, the directions for preparing the product include the statement, "Caution: Do not mash or puree."

Freezing is the easiest way to preserve pumpkin, and it yields the best quality product. Select full-colored mature pumpkin with fine texture (not stringy or dry). Wash, cut into cooking-size sections and remove seeds. Cook until soft in boiling water, in steam, in a pressure cooker, or in an oven. Remove pulp from rind and mash. To cool, place pan containing

pumpkin in cold water and stir occasionally (So Easy to Preserve, 2006). Pack into rigid containers leaving headspace, and freeze.

Drying Pumpkin and Pumpkin Seeds. Wash, peel, and remove fibers and seeds from pumpkin (or Hubbard squash) flesh. Cut into small, thin strips no more than one-inch wide by 1/8-inch thick. Blanch strips over steam for 3 minutes and dip briefly in cold water to stop the blanching action. There is no need to cool to room temperature prior to drying. Drain excess moisture. Dry the strips in an electric dehydrator until brittle.

Drying seeds and roasting seeds are two different processes. To dry, carefully wash pumpkin seeds to remove the clinging fibrous pumpkin tissue. Pumpkin seeds can be dried in the sun, in an electric dehydrator at 115-120 degrees for 1 to 2 hours, or in an oven on a very low, warm temperature only, for 3 to 4 hours. Stir them frequently to avoid scorching. Dried seeds should not be stored with any moisture left in them.

To roast the seeds, take dried pumpkin seeds, toss with oil and/or salt and roast in a preheated oven at 250 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.

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# **Children & Nature: Outdoor Activity Helps Promotes Health & Well-Being**

Outdoor activity and access to nature promotes the health, development and well-being of children and youth and forms the foundation for responsible environmental behavior as children grow up. Outdoor activity and play look different as children grow. However, each development stage presents a window of opportunity during which nature can make a difference in children's readiness for the next phase and in their ultimate outcomes. Research has shown many benefits of nature.

• Outdoor play improves physical abilities and coordination. Preschool children who play among rocks and trees and who move over uneven ground develop stronger skills in motor coordination, balance and agility than those who play on conventional playgrounds.

• Access to nature improves concentration and attention. Middle and high school students, who have access to green spaces in their backyards and schoolyards, and simply more natural views from their bedroom and classroom windows, are better able to concentrate. Children with ADHD display fewer symptoms after a walk in nature and playing outdoors.

• Outdoor play encourages the development of social skills. Pro-social behaviors and quality of social interactions increase when children spend time in nature.

• Young children who learn outdoors are more ready for school including improved early literacy skills.

• We protect what we love. Outdoor experiences are critical to developing attitudes and behaviors that protect the environment. People that participate in nature-based outdoor activities as children are more likely to have attitudes favorable toward the environment and engage in behaviors that are protective of the environment.

So this fall, get outside with the children in your life. Whether they are months old or teenagers outdoor activities are beneficial for all.

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
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




# Laying Low

Titus Buckbee was a well known denizen of Ellsworth and the surrounding territory. He was a survivor of infamous Andersonthe

ville, a prisoner-of-war camp operated by the Confederacy during the Civil War. In 1875 he and Nettie Buckbee moved into a new



Titus was steadily growing weaker, the result of the detrimental conditions experienced at Andersonville. A young man by the name of James Blake was hired as a full-time herder on the Thompson Creek ranch, but his real job was to look after Titus. John Misner, a hotel and livery man in Ellinwood was a particularly close friend to Titus. The poor man "would have peculiar streaks, spells when he would act a little mad."

Titus was struggling with his health but his brotherabout to give him a headache that would endanger not only Titus but his wife and child. Evander was a classic frontier entrepreneur. Providing ties and firewood for the railroad was, no doubt, profitable. He was an experienced merchandiser. having served in the quartermaster's department in the military. He traded with Indians on the plains. He loosely operated some sort of a mercantile house for a while out of Ellsworth. When cattle became valuable property he evidently invested in trail herds. And when train robbers attempted to hold up an eastbound Santa Fe train at Kinsley early in 1878, Evan-

in-law Evander Light was

the railroad. He proposed to work "undercover," posing as a friend of the desperados.

Once that was accomplished Evander sent the men to Titus and Nettie Buckbee's ranch on Thompson Creek. That particular part of Thompson Creek is an isolated, wild and woolly part of the country. The creek meanders with several oxbows before making its way to the Smoky Hill River. Titus had chosen an excellent location for his cattle handling operation. A box canyon of sheer sandstone made a perfect corral for handling cattle, especially when enclosed by a stone fence with a barn at one corner. The ranch house was built thirty or forty yards away from the mouth

of the canyon to catch the pleasant breeze that drifted through the valley. Spring water flowed freely from the hillside. The place was a perfect ranch site and a great hideout.

Evander apparently was unconcerned that he had placed the dangerous crowd of men in his sister's home. They were the leftovers from the Rudebaugh-Roarke gang. Dirty Dave Rudebaugh and three others were captured by Dodge City lawmen. Mike Roarke, Dan Dement, and a man known only as Tillman were supposed to be "laying low" when they moved in with Titus and Nettie.

Another fellow by the name of Ed Brooks was named in some reports as being part of the gang, but Brooks turned out to be a hired man for Evander Light. Brooks was a bit of a desperate character in his own right and may have been Evander's connection to the gang through an earlier association.

"Laying low," wasn't Dement's style. He couldn't resist going into nearby Brookville for refreshment and entertainment and undoubtedly drew his friends along for the fun. In the midst of the outlaw's leisurely exercise, Dement paid a little too much attention to the wife of saloon man, William Kersey. On Kersey's information, local law enforcement learned that the strangers were bold and daring robbers.

But as Buckbee was taken in, Dement ran for

Evander Light's farm just west of Salina. Evander, believing he could hold out no longer, in a moment that must have been one of astonishment for Dement, the outlaw heard the words, "I have a warrant in my pocket for your arrest."

Dement went for his gun and as his bullet passed near Evander's face the undercover agent was able to get off a full load from his shotgun. Dement pulled the trigger one last time. As the bullet went wild Dan Dement was laid low, never to rise again on The Way West.

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





This gnat-like fly is often ranked as the most important insect pest in winter wheat production. The injury it causes frequently goes unnoticed until harvest and infesta-

Wheat is the preferred host of the Hessian fly, but rye and barley may become infested to a lesser degree. The adult is a tiny, dark colored insect about 1/8 of an inch long. It emerges on warm fall days from August through November, generally following a rain. Females

days, the eggs hatch and the larvae migrate downward between the leaf sheath and the stem stopping just above the crown. They move during the night when humidity is high and once they reach the bottom of the plant, they will withdraw sap from the plant for eight to 30 days.

will lay eggs in the leaf grooves of fall seeded onset of winter weather. The wheat. Within three to ten full-grown larvae gradually form brown, 1/8 inch long capsule-like cases commonly called "flaxseeds." The insect will pass the winter in the flaxseed stage.

Overwintering pupae that produce the spring brood will become adults in late march and April. The spring maggots will attack the base of the plant or just above the nodes of jointing wheat. In addition, some of the "flaxseeds" will lie dormant in the stubble until they emerge to produce the main fall brood. There is yet another portion of the "flaxseeds" that will remain dormant for weeks, months


Some tips to help manage Hessian fly include destroying infested stubble, grazing or burning fields that have had high levels of injury, destroying volunteer wheat. rotating crops, planting after the fly-free date, using insecticide treated seed and planting resistant varieties. Also, it is important to note, that while planting after the free-fly date is essential for fall infestations, very delayed planting can increase the risk of a Hessian fly outbreak in the spring since females prefer laying eggs on smaller younger plants.

While we may not know what this next year's wheat crop will bring, at the very least, there are measures to take now to avoid Hessian fly infestations in the near future.





# Kansas veterinarian wins national award

Dr. John Boyington, doctor of veterinary medicine, has been selected as the 2015 Zoetis Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Veterinarian of the Year.

The Phillipsburg man was selected from among five finalists, and is honored because of his "dedication and service to rodeo livestock," the PRCA release stated.

Boyington, who owns Crossroads Veterinary Clinic in Phillipsburg, has served as the rodeo veterinarian for Kansas Biggest

Rodeo for the past 25 years. In his college days, he competed as a steer wrestler, team roper and tie-down roper, finishing the 1974 season as a Central Plains Region champion. He competed at the professional level, qualifying for the Prairie Circuit Finals Rodeo in 1974 and winning the Phillipsburg rodeo in 1978. Soon thereafter, he quit rodeo competition to focus on veterinarian school.

Boyington was delighted when he heard he had won

the award. "I tell you what, it's amazing. The competition was stiff," he said, of the other four nominees.

The importance of having a vet at rodeos is crucial, Boyington said. "Concerning the welfare of the animals, it's good to be there. In case something happens to an animal, it can be cared for quickly." Boyington is in attendance at each night of the Phillipsburg rodeo and at slack. "I just love to be at the rodeo anyway, so it's perfect for me, really."

Being an equine vet and a former contestant, he has a unique perspective of pro rodeo. "You realize how important (horses) are to these rodeo contestants. A lot of people don't realize what goes into making a rodeo horse. Their horse is their livelihood." Beutler and Son Rodeo, who brings the bucking horses and bulls for the Phillipsburg rodeo, takes good care of their animals, Boyington said. "They do such a good job of caring for their animals. They're at their top condition."

Boyington opened his practice in Phillipsburg in 1990. He and his wife Donna, who have been married for 37 years, have two children: Brooke, a student at Kansas State University and the 2014 Phillipsburg Rodeo Queen, and son John, who is also a student at Kansas State.

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# K-State to open new Southeast Research and Extension Center in Parsons

Kansas State University welcomes the public to the grand opening of its new Southeast Research and Extension Center in Parsons on Thursday, Nov. 5 from 9:30 a.m. until noon.

The building at 25092 Ness Road (corner of 32nd Street/Ness Road and 400 Highway) will be a new home for K-State Southeast Agricultural Research and Southeast Area Extension faculty. This building creates the opportunity to bring together the researchers who had been located in Parsons with Extension specialists previously located in Chanute.

Through its research projects and educational programs across Kansas, K-State Research and Extension is focused on strengthening global food systems, water resources, human health, youth development and community vitality.

"This building enhances the capacity of our Extension and research faculty in the discovery and application of research-based information important to the people across this region of Kansas," said John Floros, dean of K-State's College of Agriculture and director of

K-State Research and Extension. "With this new facility, we will also be able to bring 21st century information technology to southeast Kansas through the new conference center."

Floros will speak at the beginning of a brief ceremony at 10 a.m. Tours of the center and refreshments will be available following the ceremony.

The 13,289-square-foot building's main conference room can accommodate 175 people with state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment. The room can be divided into smaller meeting rooms, and a catering kitchen is available for conferences and workshops.

The building has ten offices for faculty and an open common area for support staff, as well as another small conference room.

A laboratory in the new building will support agricultural research programs, said Lyle Lomas, K-State professor and head of the Southeast Agricultural Research Center.

"This is a modern, stateof-the-art facility that will enhance agricultural research programs in southeastern Kansas and employ

the latest technology to deliver up-to-date sciencebased information to our southeast Kansas clientele," Lomas said.

"This building with its distinctive styling, conferencing ability and communications and technology capabilities provides a unique Kansas State University presence in southeast Kansas," said J.D. McNutt, K-State Research and Extension southeast area director. The building was funded through a variety of sources pooled together over the past several years.

"This new conference center is designed to enhance research as well as educational outreach to the community," said K-State Research and Extension associate director. Darvl Buchholz. "There is nothing like it in southeast Kansas for conferences and workshops brought by Kansas State University." 


Why are we judged for what we do, when government policy through easy

# Graze corn stalks to extend season



**Livestock-Natural Resources** As corn harvest is progressing, the residue left in the field looks pretty good. Grazing corn stalks is an excellent way to extend the grazing season and give the pastures some extra rest.

Cows will be pretty systematic about their consumption in the field eating first the ears and leaves and then moving to the stalks as the "good stuff" is removed.

Keep in mind the other nutrients that the livestock need in order to maintain body condition. Corn stalks are quite low in most vitamins and minerals and the protein level is low, as well. Vitamins and minerals are essential to good herd health and supplements can be provided. Protein is required by the body to break

down all the forage that is being digested by the rumen. Proper supplementation will help keep the rumen functioning. If you are using a non-protein nitrogen source, such as urea, make sure you understand the feeding restrictions related to their use, as you could cause other problems

If there is a corn-soybean rotation, the situation of volunteer corn can be eliminated with herbicides. In corn-on-corn situations this can be trickier if you are using similar corn varieties. It has been a while but I actually saw cultivators out in the fields again this year due to the volunteer corn situation.

So how do you determine a grazing rate for stalks? Two common methods are used - charge on a per acre basis or on a head per day basis.

Last fall the going rate for grazing stalks went up, based on the conversations I had with producers, due to the large harvest and the amount of ears on the ground. This will also be variable across the state and even the county where you live. It is hard to make an estimation about the amount of corn left in the field.

The yield consideration also needs to be taken into consideration if you are going to rent fields on a per head per day valuation. \$0.50-\$1.00 per head per day was a common figure paid for grazing last year. Making adjustments due to fields with little to no corn production needs to be made.

What else needs to be considered when you are going to rent stalks? Fences and water will be two of the big issues for the cattle producer. Water will be a big limiting factor this year. Many of the dams and sloughs that have been traditional water sources during the winter months have dried up. Hauling water is expensive and it is hard to ensure all animals are getting the water they need. Fences also become an issue and if an electric fence needs to be ran and then taken down versus a barbed-wire fence being around the field, that can be factored in as well.

# Agriculture economic impact on the rise

In the 66 sectors of Kansas agriculture that were recognized for this data compilation, the total output is approximately \$62.8 billion. Agriculture also supports more than 229,934 jobs statewide.

"Kansas agriculture contributes 43 percent of the state's total economy," said Secretary of Agriculture Jackie McClaskey. "It's easy to see cattle in a pasture or tractors in a field, but it's not always easy to fully know the impact agriculadvanced and cellulosic RFS, we are helping to rebiofuels industry at a crucial time."

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

# Research in focus at 2015 Swine Day Nov. 19

Research focused on helping swine producers improve production, from genetics to nutrition to disease management and more, is at the heart of Kansas State University's annual Swine Day, this year on Thursday, Nov. 19.

Swine Day 2015 starts with a technology trade show that opens at 8 a.m. at the K-State Alumni Center, 17th and Anderson Ave., in Manhattan. The program begins at 9:30 a.m. and includes lunch. The day wraps up with a reception at 3:45 p.m. featuring K-State ice cream.

Finding ways to improve pig performance and curb the risk of pathogens was a focus of feed processing research trials conducted in the past year, said Mike Tokach, swine specialist with K-State Research and Extension. The results of those trials are part of this year's conference program.

Participants will hear about the new rules governing feed antibiotic use and how it will impact their farms.

"The rapid increase in litter size has led to smaller pigs at birth," Tokach said. "Producers will also learn the latest findings on what may or may not work to increase piglet birth weights."

### Planning important when converting cropland back to pasture

When corn was \$7 a bushel, a lot of farmers converted pasture from grass to row crops. Now, with crop prices much lower and pasture values on the rise. many of those farmers are thinking about putting those acres back into grass.

While converting cropland back to pasture may make economic and environmental sense, and offers the chance to improve your forage system, it does take time and planning, says University of Missouri Extension forage specialist Rob Kallenbach.

"Deciding you want to change from row crops to perennial grass is not a decision to be made in 30 minutes," Kallenbach says.

Kallenbach says the first thing producers need to figure out is what kind of forage they want to plant and how it contributes to the whole farm system.

Just because you have cool-season grasses, it doesn't mean you need more, he says. Perhaps a warm-season grass can add diversity and provide better forage for multiple seasons.

Converting cropland back to pasture also offers the opportunity to establish nontoxic novel endophyte varieties faster and more easily than trying to go from one perennial grass to another.

It's important to test soil for residual herbicides that could affect grass and livestock fertility. Soil testing should be done early because limestone can take time to break down and change soil pH, Kallenbach

says.

He also recommends having seed delivered ahead of time. "Often we're

working with either perennial warm-season or coolseason grasses. Supplies of those products can be limit-

ed or at least are not as easily attainable in a short time frame, so planning ahead really helps.'

If fences were removed from the converted pastures, they will have to be rebuilt before livestock can graze there. Joe Zulovich, an MU Extension agricultural engineer, says this gives producers the opportunity to improve their pasture system.

"When you look at the intensive grazing or the rotational grazing programs that are out there, you may want to take a step back and see if one of those would help better utilize the pasture," Zulovich says.

Fencing can be expensive, but Zulovich says the Natural Resources Conservation Service has had a cost-sharing program for pasture fencing. Contact your local NRCS office for more information.


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

Kansas State University animal scientists have discovered that reducing the inflammation caused during birth of a calf may be the key to helping a dairy cow recover more quickly and go on to a more productive life.

Early findings in a study that began more than a year ago indicate simple anti-inflammatory drugs — similar to an aspirin for humans could help increase the cow's milk production by as much as 10 percent within a

year, compared to current trends of lactating dairy cows.

"I compare the dairy cow at the beginning of lactation to somebody who has been a couch potato for two months and then goes out and decides to run a marathon." said Barry Bradford, associate professor of animal sciences and industry. "The energy requirements of a lactating dairy cow, even though she's doing very little exercise, are quite comparable to somebody running a marathon and actually a little bit higher. There's that much milk being produced.'

Despite the increased energy needed to produce milk, many cows will stop eating shortly after giving birth.

"That becomes a crisis scenario because you have the marathon energy demand, coupled with an actual drop in energy intake," Bradford said.

The cow's self-imposed starvation leads to a condition called ketosis, a metabolic response that is harmful to humans but initially beneficial to cows because it allows them to use nutrients called ketones, which

partially replace the need for glucose to support brain function.

Longer term, however, ketosis also leads to poor productivity and fertility in the dairy cow, which are all the negative things that producers try to avoid, according to Bradford. As many as 40 percent of cows who have given birth have at least a mild case of ketosis that causes the negative symptoms, he said.

A simpler solution is to just eat after giving birth, Bradford says, but that isn't so simple when the cow resists the feed bunk. Typically, he said, it takes three to four weeks for cows to adapt to eating enough to match their milk output.

Bradford said that Kansas State University's research has uncovered some evidence that inflammation caused by giving birth is at least partly to blame for the cow's fussy eating.

"One of the big changes that is part of early lactation is probably tenfold increases in the blood markers of inflammation, even in cows that look perfectly healthy." Bradford said. "It's not that shocking; they just pushed out a 100-pound calf."

One promising finding in Kansas State University's research is that giving the cow a nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug – a NSAID — on the first day after birth increased the cow's milk production by 7-10 percent.

"There was no effect in the first four weeks, but one year after giving a single pill, that cow was making more milk," Bradford said. "We don't understand yet why that worked, but based on that finding, researchers mary biopsies to understand if we reprogrammed the mammary gland."

The researchers also have now veered from explaining the problem solely as a metabolic disease and are focusing on reducing inflammation right after birth.

"There is no evidence that this is hurtful to the cow," Bradford said. "If you can get 7-10 percent more milk from a cow, that's a large sustainability issue for the industry. We are using less resources to make more gallons of milk."

The university's work is in the early stages and would need additional testing and, ultimately, approval by the Food and Drug Administration before becoming part of standard practice for dairy producers

The research was funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Bradford said additional studies are being supported by a grant from the National Science Foundation.


