Producers focus on replacement heifer selection

As the air turns crisp and the leaves change color, replacement heifer selection begins to weigh on cattle producers' minds. The process can be confusing and stressful for producers, as the decisions made can directly impact the future of their program. Kansas State University animal scientist Bob Weaber offers tips to aid producers in selecting heifers with the best likelihood of becoming productive and efficient cows for vears to come.

Genetic components

Weaber encourages producers to make appropriate sire selection decisions for building quality replacements. If a producer plans to keep more replacement females, tactical selection of bulls to be sires of replacement heifers that emphasize maternal traits versus other traits is a must.

"If you've made an investment in genetics," Weaber said, "either via bull purchasing or through an AI (artificial insemination) program over the last year, and these replacement candidates are a result of those decisions, certainly those females produced by bulls that have been selected for their maternal traits - maternal calving ease, appropriate mature weight, lactation, stability EPD (expected progeny difference) should be given priority in your selection criteria."

Weaber also points out that crossbred heifers typically have a more productive life and possess greater reproductive qualities than their straight-bred counterparts. Therefore, crossbred heifers should be given special consideration as replacements.

Birthdate

Figuring out where heifers were born, in terms of the calving distribution and their weights and performance measures, are key pieces of information, he

"We know heifers born early in the calving season have a higher likelihood of themselves calving earlier in the calving season and lasting longer in your management system," said Weaber, a cow-calf specialist with K-State Research and Extension. "They have more opportunities to become pregnant within the breeding season, because they cycle earlier and calve earlier. When mated in a defined breeding season, they have more wiggle room in their reproductive performance than do females that were born at the end of the calving season."

Weaber provided an example to further explain: "Sav vou have a heifer calf that was born the last day of your calving season. When she enters your breeding herd, she's going to be one of the last females to reach puberty, have the fewest opportunities to become pregnant in your structured breeding season, and if she misses by two or three days in the breeding season, she's out as a two-year-old."

"If you've invested \$1,000

or \$1,500 on development costs above her market value as a calf to get that heifer to have her first calf." he added, "you don't want to lose her because she missed by two or three days. That's why we skew our selection heavily toward females born in the first 21 or 30 days of the calving season."

Mature size relative to resources

Feed and other input costs, has some producers concerned about mature cow size and lactation potential. Weaber said it is important to choose replacement females that fit the

mature size and maintenance requirements appropriate to forage constraints of the operation.

Over time, he said, many producers have selected heifers that have higher performance and growth traits to meet demands further down the beef value chain. While cattle that grow quickly are an important contribution to the beef production system, producers must be careful not to go too far. With today's genetics, it is fairly easy to build cows whose nutrient requirements can substantially exceed the nutrients

environment. For this reason, he recommends producers keep an eye on maintaining, or in some cases slightly decreasing, the mature weights of their cows.

available in a grazed forage

"Replacement female selection has accelerated our path of maybe making cows too big," Weaber said. "Our usual practice of walking into the replacement heifer pen leads to selecting 'the standout.' The biggest, nicest fleshed, easiest conditioned heifers in the pen are the ones that we naturally want to select."

"Certainly older heifers have a tendency to be that way because of age," he continued. "But, we have to be careful that we don't select heifers that are the extremes in that group, because they represent the highest growth genetics, and likely the highest mature weight out of our cow herd."

Another factor linked to selecting these "standout" replacements is that they are likely from cows with the highest lactation potential in the cow herd, Weaber said, which leads to increased production and maintenance requirements for these cows.

To combat this trend, he

recommends that producers select replacement heifers that reside in the middle of the group for adjusted 205day weight or adjusted weaning weight. The adjusted weight takes into account differences in age of the heifers and age of their dam.

"To keep the weights of your cows pretty constant, pick the middle third of the heifers in terms of weaning performance," Weaber said. "Skew that selection to include heifers born early in the calving season to have this optimization of born early in the calving season and from the middle group in weight and performance. That should put a downward pressure on the increase of mature weight."

An Excel spreadsheet is available at www.ksubeef. org that calculates adjusted birth weights, weaning weights and yearling weights. The spreadsheet requires producers to enter information on their heifers, such as the birthdate or birth week and age

Other factors

Another item to consider when selecting replacements is biology. Look for replacements out of mature cows that "fit" the system.

"They 'fit' in the production environment, and because of that 'fit' they have the ability to reproduce every year," Weaber said. "Those cows are likely on target in terms of weight. body condition, lactation potential and have obviously been fertile."

So when choosing replacement heifers, one from a designated "fit" mature cow should be toward the top. If a producer has to choose between picking a replacement heifer out of a proven mature cow or one out of an unproven cow, consider picking the daughter of the proven cow.

"About three-quarters of the genetic flow of the cow herd is driven by sire selection," Weaber said. "That doesn't mean female selection is not important. It can be particularly important if you are trying to limit supplemental feed sources."

"I encourage producers to sit down and figure out the trajectory that they want to go, understand the data they may need to make that informed decision, collect that data, and then make an informed and thoughtful replacement heifer selec-

Partnering with farmers and ranchers to address climate change and food security challenges

As world leaders gather in Paris to negotiate a new global climate agreement, it is important to recognize the contributions of farmers, ranchers and foresters in the United States towards achieving a more food secure world while adapting to climate change, increasing carbon sequestration, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Over the course of my tenure as Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture, U.S. producers have faced a record drought, which the University of California estimates has cost farmers in California alone an estimated \$3 billion in 2015. We've seen increasing incursions of invasive pests and diseases and extreme weather, everything from bark beetle to severe droughts, which have cost billions in lost productivity. We've faced a series of record wildfire seasons in the western United States—the worst decade in U.S. history for wildfire. The growing El Nino weather pattern in the Pacific has created the perfect storm for disasters to strike the already damaged and weakened western landscape.

The U.S. Department of

Agriculture will release a new report, titled Climate Change, Global Food Security, and the U.S. Food System. This report will outline the impacts of climate change on global food security, including food availability, access, utilization, and stabili-

Never before has agriculture faced challenges of this magnitude. We've all seen the statistics: Nine billion people by 2050. Feeding these new citizens will require at least a 60 percent increase in agricultural productivity. We must do all of this in the face of climate change that is threatening the productivity and profitability of our farms, ranches and forests.

As we embark on our efforts, we have found that one of the first steps is to educate and inform our farmers, ranchers, and forest land managers - and our own USDA professional staff in the field - about climate change and the threats posed to our resources and the opportunities to contribute to solutions.

For example, earlier this year, USDA announced our 10 Building Blocks for Climate Smart Agriculture, a comprehensive set of voluntary programs and initiatives that we expect to reduce net emissions and enhance carbon sequestration by over 120 million metric tons of CO^2 equivalent by 2025 - about 2 percent of economy-wide emissions, building upon a U.S. government-wide commitment to emission reduction. And through efforts by the federal government and a broad coalition of partners, the United States has restored more than 9 million hectares of lost or degraded forest since 2011 - more than halfway to our Bonn Challenge commitment of restoring 15 million hectares by 2020.

We are promoting the building blocks strategy through our Extension and technical service providers. To support our efforts, we have established a network of regional climate hubs to analyze risks and deliver localized information to help farmers adapt to climate change. We continue to support research into technologies and practices that will reduce climate risks. We are moving rapidly to integrate climate change into our domestic conservation and renewable energy programs.

Collectively, these efforts make U.S. agriculture and forestry a more publicly visible part of the climate change solution in the United States and abroad. They demonstrate to the world that these sectors can provide solutions to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, while simultaneously boosting productivity to meet growing demands for food and fiber, stimulating the rural economy, and offering compatible environmental and economic benefits.

We don't face these challenges in a vacuum. These same conditions have dire effects across the world, especially for poor, rural smallholder farmers in developing nations. Drought in the western United States and drought in Central America threaten farmers and livelihoods, disrupt communities, and strain food systems. Increasing climate threats, whether it is drought, high temperatures, increases in pests, or wildfire, are separate symptoms of the same problem.

That is why the United States is committed to sharing information globally. The lessons we learn, we want to share through the Global Alliance for Climate-Smart Agriculture. Through our collective efforts, agriculture can make meaningful contributions to the effort to limit global temperature increases to less than two degrees Celsius. We are also proud of our efforts through the Global Open Data for Agriculture and Nutrition initiative, which supports efforts to make data available, accessible, and usable for unrestricted use worldwide.

USDA also directly supports international cooperation and development projects to help promote climate-smart agriculture. For example, last year we supported 11 Borlaug Fellows to work on climate change topics. This program allows agricultural scientists from around the world to work side-by-side with U.S. scientists on finding ways to increase food production while mitigating the effects of climate change.

In order to address climate change, we have to get ahead of it, and I'm convinced that no one innovates in the face of challenge better than agriculture. This will not be an easy task, but I am confident that working together and building on a legacy of partnership, efficiency and innovation, the Alliance members and other interested parties will continue to strive to achieve the three important goals of climatesmart agriculture: achieving food security, sustainably increasing agricultural productivity, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions, where possible.

Food security has implications far beyond what's on our plates. A more food-secure, nourished world, able to feed itself and the future, is essential to the long-term prosperity and security of individuals, communities, economies, and nations.



Agricultural land use value is increasing

The good news: according to the Kansas Division of Property Valuation, agricultural land is worth quite a bit more than last year. That also happens to be the bad news. Why? Property taxes on agricultural land are calculated based on these figures and with commodity prices being relatively poor, higher costs are not ideal.

How much of an increase? In Southeast Kansas, the agricultural land use value is 17 percent higher in 2015 than it was in 2014. These are on a countyby-county basis and the lowest county increase in southeast Kansas is Labette

County at a little under 11.5 tural income or productivity percent while the highest increase will be for Chautauqua County at over 28 percent. For reference sake. the statewide average is 16.3 percent higher. The nine regions of state vary greatly with ranges from southwest Kansas only having an 8.5 percent increase to Northwest Kansas with an over 26 percent increase.

Many people do not understand how agricultural land is valued for taxation purposes. First off, the value of the land is governed by state law. In fact, the Kansas legislature passed a law in 1985 requiring agricultural land to be valued for property tax purposes based on the agriculof the land, not the fair market value of the land. Even though the law was passed in 1985, it wasn't until 1989 that agricultural use value was used to calculate property tax.

In overly simple terms, the system is set up to estimate landlord net income from each class of land by county based on production levels, and then divides that estimated income by a capitalization rate to determine a per acre value. The capitalization rate is used to estimate a value of the landlord share of agricultural income. It is based on a fiveyear average of Federal Land Bank interest rates and the county average agricultural property tax. Since it is the divisor in the equation, the larger the capitalization rate, the lower the agricultural use value.

For cultivated land, which is subcategorized into dry and irrigated categories, the agricultural use value is based upon an inherent land productivity potential by soil type. To estimate this, the state estimates several factors on a county-by-county basis. One important one is the Soil Rating for Plant Growth (SRPG) developed by the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) which provides a numerical rating for all soil types without factoring management practices into the rating. Along with this rating, the county crop mix, yields, prices, production costs, and landlord shares of crops and expenses are factored into the

For grazed land, which is subcategorized into native and tame classifications, the value of productivity is based on the grazing index assigned to each soil type. Also included in the equation are pasture estimates are rental rates, gross rental income, and expenses.

So, why are the values increasing? In an effort to minimize large shifts in the agricultural use values. eight year moving averages of estimated landlord net income are included in the calculation. This basically

means that one good (or poor) year doesn't move the calculation as much as it would in calculating simple averages. The stretch of relatively good years of the recent past are now factoring into the equation which has increased the values.

With higher agricultural use values, land property taxes could be higher. Hopefully, landowners can prepare for these higher costs and budget accordingly. Fundamentals signal opportunities for Kansas wheat in South America

Argentina may dominate the South American wheat market, but Kansas hard red winter (HRW) wheat is no insignificant player. Together with U.S. Wheat Associates (USW), the industry's export market development arm, Kansas wheat farmers are building markets in the Southern Hemisphere.

Casey Chumrau recently transitioned to the marketing manager of the USW South American Regional Office in Santiago, Chile from her previous position as the USW market analyst Arlington, Virginia. Fresh from her first Association of Latin American Millers (ALIM) meetings November 15 to 18, 2015, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, she shared her perspectives on the region's potential.

The Players

The USW South American regional office in Santiago, Chile, covers six countries: Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador and Peru. Peru and Colombia consistently purchase the most HRW wheat in the region, at respective annual averages of 14.3 million bushels (390,000 metric tons) and 12.5 million bushels (340,000 MT). "In the last ten years, about 16 percent of all HRW exports have gone to the six countries in this region," Chumrau said. "The population is growing and the economic situation improving in many of the countries. Those two things, combined with the longstanding relationship USW and U.S. wheat farmers have with customers here, provide a very optimistic outlook for increased HRW sales."

The largest overall wheat importer in South America is Brazil, but purchases from the United States vary greatly from year to year. Brazil has purchased an average of 55.1 million bushels (1.5 MMT) of U.S. HRW over the last five marketing years. However, Chumrau noted that annual imports from the United States ranged from zero in 2011/12 to 150.7 million bushels (4.1 MMT) in 2013/14. Brazil had already purchased 5.95 million bushels (162,000 MT) through the end of September, but varying factors in chief competitor Argentina will affect purchases the rest of the 2015/16 marketing year.

The Competition

Argentina is the principal wheat exporter in the South American region, followed by smaller exportable supplies from Paraguay and Uruguay. Geographic advantage is cou-

pled with preferential treatment under the Mercosur trade agreement, which slaps an automatic 10 percent import duty on non-Mercosur wheat.

To further complicate the South American market this year, Chumrau said the strength of the U.S. dollar adds cost to U.S. wheat imports. As a result, HRW is still priced higher than abundant competing supplies of similar wheat classes, in spite of lower cash and export prices.

She reported the topic was discussed at this year's ALIM meetings

"The strength of the U.S. dollar came up over and over," Chumrau said. "The dollar is so high right now that it has completely offset the reduction in wheat prices, providing less incentive for customers who want to buy U.S. wheat."

It is important to note that the recent political situation in Argentina has not favored wheat farmers. Current president Cristina Fernández de Kirchner instituted policies that dissuaded

farmers from planting wheat, including a program of restrictive export licenses. Mauricio Macri, elected as the new Argentinean president on November 22, has pledged to ease these restrictions. However, Chumrau explained more basic economic factors may offer a market opportunity for U.S. wheat farmers this marketing year.

"Assuming Macri keeps his promise, which is never a given in politics, the fundamental supply and demand situation in Argentina this year could naturally limit exports," Chumrau

To start, USDA projected Argentina, currently harvesting their wheat crop, will produce 385.8 million bushels (10.5 MMT) of wheat this year, down 73.5 million bushels (2.0 MMT) from 2014/15. However, Chumrau said that estimate may be inflated as other analysts in country project production nearer to only 330.7 million bushels (9.0 MMT). USDA also projected Argentinian domestic consumption at

226 million bushels (6.15 MMT), making a significant increase in exports unlikely.

"Combined with exports, that would exceed the generous production estimate and Argentina does not have many reserve stocks from which to draw," Chumrau said.

The Potential

The three traditional Mercosur suppliers (Argentina, Paraguay and Uruguay) combined are projected to export 257 million bushels (7.0 MMT). Consid-

ering the entire South American region imported an average of 438.3 million bushels (12.2 MMT) per year over the past five marketing years, Mercosur exportable supplies will be insufficient to meet even average demand this year. Of note, Brazil alone is estimated to purchase 231 million bushels (6.3 MMT) in 2015/16. These supply/demand factors signal potential market wheat farmers to supply

opportunities for Kansas American South needs.

even before considering quality needs and miller preferences.







Pork industry committed to responsible antibiotics use

The National Pork Board recently reiterated the proactive steps the U.S. pork industry has taken to ensure responsible antibiotic use on pig farms. Pork industry leaders say calls by various organizations to end antibiotic use on farms are misguided and would have a negative impact on food safety.

"We understand people are confused about the role of antibiotics in meat production and, unfortunately, recently released reports only add to that confusion," said Dr. Jennifer Koeman, DVM and Director of Producer and Public Health at National Pork Board. "It's simple - when you produce healthy livestock, you get safe food. The meat you eat is safe due to Food and Drug Administration rules on antibiotics and U.S. Department of Agriculture testing of meat."

The pork industry has collectively embraced USDA and FDA efforts to phase out the use of antibiand, in turn, to limit them to treatment and prevention against the spread of disease. The National Pork Board is implementing a three-point plan of action focused on five research priorities, shaping educational outreach to pig farmers and broadly sharing information with the retail and foodservice industries and pork consumers.

"Pig farmers have an obligation to use medicine responsibly and as needed to treat or prevent illness in pigs," said Koeman. "That's why pig farmers also work closely with veterinarians to decide when and how to use antibiotics to protect a pig's health."

On behalf of more than 60,000 pig farmers across the nation, the National Pork Board is leading the effort and dialogue around responsible antibiotic use, including:

Establishing a blue ribbon panel on antibiotics, an outcome of the Pork Checkoff's stewardship plan anotics for growth promotion nounced this past June. The new, third-party panel includes seven experts with specific experience and knowledge in antibiotic practices or consumer marketing, but who are independent of National Pork Board practices.

Educating America's pig farmers on new FDA rules for the use of medically important antibiotics (to treat human illness) in feed and water and investing up to \$400,000 in education and awareness programs to ensure pig farmers understand and adopt these new guidelines.

Investing more than \$750,000 in new research projects that span five distinct priorities intended to provide data for animal and public health outcomes (pig health/welfare, human health/safety, environmental impact and pork quali-

Sharing the innovation of today's production practices and efforts to responsibly use antibiotics with food chain partners and other important stakeholders. This past month, meetings were held with animal health companies, packers and processors, and retail and foodservice leader-

"Our efforts are focused on sharing a story of innovation and excellence in pork production," said Derrick Sleezer National Pork Board president and a pig farmer from Cherokee, Iowa. "Our farmers are experts in animal care and sustainable farming. And that expertise is needed to maintain our track record of responsible antibiotic use with a goal to protect the health and well-being of people, pigs and the planet."

The Pork Checkoff funds national and state programs in advertising, consumer information, retail and foodservice marketing, export market promotion, production improvement, science and technology, swine health, pork safety and sustainability and environmental management.

The International Year of Soils: Soils and Climate

Several components of the earth influence its climate. The climate system involves the earth's oceans, land surfaces, soils and the atmosphere, according to Kendra McLauchlan, associate professor of geography at Kansas State University. The interactions among these components with one another and with various

life forms on earth also play a role in climate.

Carbon is the fourth most abundant element in the universe, and the carbon cycle on earth is one of the most important interactions that influence climate, McLauchlan said. Carbon on earth is found in various forms: in oceans as carbonic acid, in the atmosphere as carbon dioxide, in wood as cellulose and in the soil in the form of organic matter.

"Soil contains a large portion of the carbon on earth." McLauchlan said. "It contains more carbon than all the carbon dioxide in the

atmosphere and all the forests on earth combined."

Carbon in the soil is mostly stable and remains locked away beneath the surface, she added, However, it can be oxidized back into the atmosphere by exposure to oxygen or when eaten by microbes and turned into carbon dioxide.

"The greenhouse gas carbon dioxide is this little molecule that has the amazing ability through its molecular structure to retain solar radiation and emit it back to the atmosphere," McLauchlan said.

Therefore, the carbon

cycle helps keep the planet warm and supports life, but too much carbon dioxide in the atmosphere can have the negative effect of warming the planet too much.

Because soil is a main player in the global carbon cycle, "Soils and Climate" is a fitting theme for the 2015 International Year of Soils, which involves a coordinated effort to educate the public about the importance of

Retaining carbon in the soil

"It's a great idea to keep as much carbon in the soil as possible," McLauchlan said. "Conservation tillage management and other activities land managers can do help keep carbon in the soil. Most of those activities involve using plant matter to retain carbon inputs and avoiding loss pathways, such as erosion or disruptive tillage practices that may oxidize the carbon."

Examples of ways to retain carbon in the soil could include planting riparian buffers and cover crops.

"Anytime we can get plants growing in the soil and adding their carbon from the atmosphere to the soil will increase soil organic matter stocks," McLauchlan said.

Further, she said land managers can use conservation tillage practices, such as no-till farming, to keep soil and carbon storage more stable. Many examples from past civilizations show how intensive agricultural tillage practices that gradually removed a bit of soil their demise.


"The message from those past civilizations is to watch for these slow changes and be as careful as you can with the soil resource," Mc-Lauchlan said. "The processes that form soil are slow, so just a little bit of loss every year can erode your soil resource."

Reflectance and water storage

In addition to carbon storage, soil can influence climate in two other key ways — reflectance of solar radiation and water storage, the paleoecologist said.

The soil surface reflects radiation, solar whether the soil is dark or light can either serve to cool or heat the atmosphere. Water is held in soil and can either be retained in liquid form or released as water vapor. When the latter occurs and water vapor is released into the atmosphere, it serves as a greenhouse gas that can warm the planet, similar to the mode of carbon dioxide.



How to keep pigs comfortable through weaning for better long-term productivity

A pig's environment can be a deciding factor in longterm productivity. By providing quality water, nutrition and air, weaned pigs have a greater potential to transition smoothly through weaning and reach the finish line.

Dan McManus, DVM, swine specialist for Purina Animal Nutrition, serves as a resource for nursery and wean-to-finish managers across the country. The first thing he does when visiting a farm is evaluate the envi-

"The environment is something that people often overlook, but it plays a significant role in the pig production cycle. If pigs are comfortable, they are more likely to go to the feeder," he says. "Checking the environment should be one of the first things you do day after day when you are looking at pigs.

Three areas to focus on are: water availability, air quality and feed space.

Water availability The first essential com-

ponent of a proper wean-tofinish environment is water. Unfortunately, an esti-

percent weaned pigs do not consume water in the first 25 hours post-weaning. This delay in hydration may be caused by the stress of transport or the transition from farrowing facility to nursery.

"If pigs are dehydrated, they're much less likely to transition onto dry feed," McManus says. "Make sure the facility has enough drinkers and adequate flow rates. Provide electrolytes through a water medicator and gel on mats to help promote hydration during this critical phase."

By the numbers:

Provide at least one water drinker for ten pigs with a flow rate of 250 to 500 milliliters per minute for pigs in the grow-finish phase.

Add electrolytes through a water medicator for five to seven days post-weaning.

Mat-feed gel for at least two days pre-weaning; for the first five days postweaning; and one day before and one day after vaccination.

Air quality

The air pigs breathe can also impact their long-term performance.

When evaluating the pig's environment, evaluate humidity, odor levels and moisture. All of these air quality factors are controlled by the minimum ventilation settings on the facility's control system.

McManus recommends the environment temperature for the wean-to-finish barn or nursery to be approximately 80 degrees Fahrenheit. When it comes to humidity, this factor does not negatively impact swine performance. However, combined with high temperatures, high humidity can have negative effects on pig performance.

"When looking at ammonia levels, use equipment or your eyes," McManus says. "If the ammonia levels are high, your eyes will start to water.

Modifying ventilation systems and managing manure can lower ammonia levels. Strategies for reducing ammonia levels include: increasing airflow rate, controlling air distribution, removing manure frequently and treating pit manure.

Feeder space

The ultimate goal of the weaning transition is to create eaters. To help pigs start eating quickly, provide highly-palatable starter feed, like UltraCare® 100, 200 or 240, and adequate feeder space.

Like water, it is important for the pigs to have enough feeder space. Mc-Manus says one inch of feeder space per pig is needed for pigs ranging from 40 to 50 pounds. As the pigs grow larger than 50 pounds, the recommended feeder space increases to two inches per

The amount of feed in the feeder can then help increase consumption.

"We recommend a 50 percent pan coverage when looking at feeders," Mc-Manus says. "It is very important for each feeder to hold about 24 hours' worth of fresh feed. This allows pigs to return to the feeder often as their consumption levels increase.

To ensure freshness, dispense no more than 24 hours' worth of early feed at a time and clean out feed refusals each day.



Wheat growers commend **Congress for reversing** cuts to crop insurance

Congress passed legislation last week reversing cuts to crop insurance that were made in the recent budget deal. The legislation—included as part of the highway bill—nullified what would have been a \$3 billion cut to crop insurance over ten years. NAWG president Brett Blankenship, a wheat grower from Washtucna, Wash., issued the following statement in response to the legislation.

"Last night's vote was a huge victory for our agricultural producers and consumers everywhere. Congress made a five-year commitment to our producers when it passed the Farm Bill last year, and vesterday's votes in the House and Senate confirmed that commitment. Wheat farmers across the country rely on crop insurance to help offset the risks of things that are beyond our control such as drought, severe weather events and market prices depressed by a strong U.S. dollar. The draconian cuts included as part of the budget agreement, which were reversed last night, would have increased the cost of delivering the program, reduced options for producers, and ultimately made premiums more expensive. We sincerely appreciate the corrective action taken by Congress, as do the thousands of farm families who grow wheat across our country."



The Importance of Soil - a topic well-understood by farmers

As 2015 is quickly coming to a close, so wraps up the International Year of Soils. This year was declared the International Year of Soils by the United Nations with the aim to increase awareness and understanding of the importance of soil for food security and essential ecosystem functions.

As farmers, you have a keen awareness of the importance of healthy soil in your fields for optimum vields. You see those compacted areas where you run your grain cart or other heavy equipment simply by observing the stunted growth of your crops patterned after wheel tracks. You know the creek bottoms are your best producing fields because good topsoil

washed there. You know the eroded or sandy areas in your fields because as soon as the hot dry Kansas winds blow in the summer, the plants in those spots will wilt first. Your precision ag operations and nutrient applications are based on the soil texture, type, health, etc of your soil in your fields. Therefore soil health and conservation is and should be a number one priority of any farmer to continue to produce good crops on his land.

Soil is a fascinating substance. There are scientists at K-State and many other places that simply spend their lives studying the complexities and interactions of soil. In one tablespoon of healthy soil, there are more organisms than there are people on earth. Soil is teeming with life; being a carried downstream has host to a quarter of our

One common way we lose our topsoil in fields here is by water erosion. Large rain events can wash loose soil off our fields and cut diches through the field. This is not the case. Rill erosion across vour field can easily cause .5-1 ton per acre soil loss each year depending on the environment. The cost of applied fertilizer nutrients carried away by soil ero-

sion, loss of soil organic till or minimum-till farmmatter, the costs to apply soil amendments and higher rates of fertilizer to offset erosion losses all impact your operation. Not only does soil loss affect you now, but it affects your farm value and ability to sustain good yields in the future.

It is time to remain vigilant in caring for your soil 2015/en/ in your fields. Practice no-

USDA announces enrollment period for safety net coverage in 2016

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) administrator Val Dolcini has announced that producers who chose coverage from the safety net programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill, known as the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs, could begin visiting FSA county offices starting Dec. 7, 2015, to sign contracts to enroll in coverage for 2016. The enrollment period will continue until Aug. 1, 2016.

"The choice between ARC and PLC is completed and remains in effect through 2018, but producers must still enroll their farm by signing a contract each year to receive coverage," said Dolcini.

Producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA office to schedule an appointment to enroll. If a farm is not enrolled during the 2016 enrollment period, producers on that farm will not be eligible for financial assistance from the ARC or PLC programs should crop prices or farm revenues fall below the historical price or revenue benchmarks established by the program.

The two programs were authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill and offer a safety net to agricultural producers when there is a substantial drop in prices or revenues for covered commodities. Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain and sweet rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity. For more details regarding these programs, go to www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc.
