

Schwieterman Market Outlook A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

This week we will start off with the September supply and demand report, which will have many adjustments from last month. The consensus seems to be that USDA will decrease their corn yield estimate and increase the sovbean yield estimate. In addition to that we will see numerous changes on the demand side since exports have remained strong. There is a good chance that we see lower corn ending stocks and not much change to the sovbean numbers. The key to the report will end up being how traders view the likelihood of further cuts to

Some early yield reports have been disappointing, which could be a sign of things to come, but it is hard to be bullish when the crop condition ratings are so high. In three weeks, half of the corn will be harvested and we will know a lot more about the actual yield.

Last week the December corn made it up to the 50day moving average where it stalled out on Friday. Monday was a key day for the charts because if the report doesn't provide a reason to be a buyer, we have reached a great place to stall the market out and head lower for the rest of the month. the corn yield this fall. A new research report from Midan Marketing explores how meat purchasing decisions differ between members of the Baby Boomer and Millennial generations. The research found that Millennials are spending more per month on meat than Boomers but consume it less consistently. Despite the fact that Millennials change their meat-eating pattern more often than Boomers, Millennials spend an average of \$162 on meat monthly compared to Boomers spending \$62. According to the report, this is due largely to Millennials purchasing more prepared meats for larger households at a higher price point. In fact, 44 percent of Millennials' meat purchases are prepared meats, compared to only 22 percent for Boom-ers. Both groups cited health concerns as the top reason for cutting back on meat consumption, but both groups communicated positive attitudes towards meat with a few differences in details.



Hay trade activity steady. Demand light for all classes of hay, prices steady. Many folks in northwestern and north central Kansas had their Labor Day plans ruined after thunderstorms produced widespread heavy rainfall. Some areas saw over six inches of rain in a short period of time causing significant flooding. The rest of Kansas had a chance to dry out due to warm and windy conditions. 

K-State Diagnostic Lab seeking Kansas cattle producers to help with bovine anaplasmosis study

By Audrey Hambright The Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory is looking for Kansas cattle producers to participate in a study to determine the prevalence of bovine anaplasmosis in cow herds within the state and to investigate management risk factors associated with blood test results.

Bovine anaplasmosis is a blood disease caused by Anaplasma marginale which can cause adult-animal sudden death, abortion, weight loss, and a reduction

in performance. Animals that become infected and survive become lifelong persistently infected carriers. As carriers, they often show few or no symptoms and serve as a source of infection to the rest of the herd. Because of the nature of the disease, some herds remain at an unknown infection status.

Several studies have been completed assessing the prevalence of the disease in several U.S. states, but none have been completed in Kansas. The increase in the number of

positive cases in Kansas test submissions to the KSVDL from 2013 to 2015 suggests either an increase in bovine anaplasmosis awareness among veterinarians or producers or the prevalence of the disease has increased in certain areas of the state.

In addition to estimating the level of anaplasmosis in Kansas cow-calf herds, this study will also investigate the different A. marginale strains present in Kansas. Differentiation is important because strains differ in the severity of clinical signs they produce, and the only vaccine available contains only one strain. This strain may be different than those present in some areas of Kansas, which might help explain the lack of vaccine effectiveness that has been reported.

The study involves collecting blood samples from 16,100 adult bovines, which will represent 1,610 Kansas cow-calf operations. The samples will be stored, and because they will represent a large portion of the Kansas cow-calf industry, they can be used in the future to discover the prevalence and risk factors associated with several other important bovine diseases including bovine viral diarrhea, Johne's disease, and bovine leukosis.

Understanding anaplasmosis prevalence and the management factors that contribute to its presence in cow-calf herds will be important for formulating both prevention and disease management plans in the near future. This information will not only be useful for Kansas herds, but herds throughout the United States.

The targeted sampling period will start Oct. 1, 2016 with a targeted endpoint of Jan. 31, 2017.

VFD and Beef Quality Assurance meeting planned in SE Kansas

Beginning Jan. 1, 2017 livestock producers are required to obtain a Veterinary Feed Directive from their veterinarian to feed antibiotics deemed as medically important to their livestock. Aureomycin, an antibiotic widely used for the prevention of anaplasmosis in cattle, is an example of one of the many antibiotics that will require a feed directive under these adopted guidelines.

To help producers sort through what it will take to comply with the new VFD, K-State Research and Extension will host a Veterinary Feed Directive and Beef Quality Assurance meeting on Monday, Sept. 26 beginning at 6:30 p.m. The meeting will be held at the Oswego Community Center located at 203 North Street in Oswego

Gregg Hanzlicek, director of K-State Veterinary Medicine Production Animal Field Investigations, will explain how the implementation of VFD will work and the steps beef producers must take to follow the guidelines.

In addition, A.J. Tarpoff, K-State Extension veterinarian, will lead a discussion on beef cattle care that will enable participants to become certified under Beef Quality Assurance Guidelines.

Fall control of Sericea Lespedeza

Wildcat Extension District Sericea Lespedeza is a serious threat to our pastures and rangeland. Because of its aggressive root system, prolific seed production and ability to thrive on soils of low fertility, landowners who have battled this weed probably have stronger and more col-

orful words than just de-

scribing sericea as a nox-

ious weed. But, since

sericea is labeled a noxious

weed by state law, assis-

tance in purchasing herbicides to battle this pest is available through your county weed department.

The recent rains in our area have caused sericea to begin growing rapidly and began the onset of setting flowers. This is a prime time to apply herbicides and get effective control. After sericea has flowered and up until the first freeze, metsulfuron (marketed under Escort, Ally, Cimarron, and other trade names) is the herbicide of choice for control. Metsulfuron can control sericea even through seed fill, unless the plants are under drought stress. However, to avoid the formation of viable seed timing of spray is ideal toward the end of full flower.

It is also a good idea not to graze hay sericea after it has gone to seed. This can prevent spread of seed by cattle to other areas.

Controlling sericea is a mulit-year process and any control measures will need followup to maintain effectiveness Spraying remaining plants next in June when the plants are in a vegetative growth stage with Remedy or PastureGard according to label directions can further reduce stands of sericea.

Grass & Grain, September 13, 2016 Page 21 Profitability in focus at Red Angus Commercial Cattlemen's Symposium in Oklahoma City

Cattlemen from around the country gathered in Oklahoma City to attend "Dollars in Your Pocket," the Commercial Cattlemen's Symposium held in conjunction with the National Red Angus Convention. A full slate of speakers addressed 200 cattlemen and women on overall profitability in the industry, present economic conditions, nutritional changes to improve cowherd efficiency, and calf crop marketing methods. Dr. Clint Rusk, head of the animal science department at Oklahoma State University, served as emcee for the day.

Darrell Peel, Oklahoma State University Extension Ag Economist, opened the session with a market forecast. "Cattle slaughter is up, carcass weight is up resulting in a 4.7 percent increase in beef production. Total meat supplies will be up, with beef leading the way," Peel noted. "It should be noted that there is only a 1.5 percent increase in beef consumption."

He also stated that beef demand continues to be strong. He expects it to rise further as beef prices come back down in the meat case and consumers return making additional purchases. "Beef demand will come back in line with people who were priced out of the market a year ago," Peel forecasted.

Peel shared with cattlemen and women that volatility has been an issue in recent years and predicted he expects fewer larger swings in the market. "Looking ahead, we have a lot more potential for stability. While cattle prices may erode a bit more in the future, for the most part, we are looking for more stability. The biggest unknown in the future will be on the demand side. Demand could go a long way to gories to survive and thrive. offset the supply pressure," Peel added.

Tom Brink, Red Angus Association of America CEO, brought the keynote address to the conference and encouraged the cattle raisers in attendance to strive for progress in his presentation, "The Curse of Being Average.³

Brink challenged beef business owners to look at their cost of production and the available data in their businesses in order to be better than average in one, two, three or even four areas of profit-driving cate-Study shows benefits of 'Livestock Friendly' designation

"There is over a \$300-perhead advantage by beating the average," Brink said. "Average won't take anyone very far in the cow-calf business. You have to know your numbers."

In encouraging producers to get serious about improvement, Brink pointed out the opportunity to use DNA tools in selecting commercial heifers. "They don't tell us everything, but they are a powerful, powerful tool," said Brink.

During the afternoon session, Dr. John Arthington, the University of Florida, director of the Range Cattle Research and Education Center, shared the importance of mineral supplementation and the effective use of products to improve beef cattle performance.

Darrell Busby, livestock specialist and manager of the Tri-County Steer Carcass Futurity, explained and assisted members in gaining a greater understanding of retaining ownership of beef calves for additional profit opportunities. This subject was of particular interest in the current market environment to garner the most profit per head.

The Commercial Cattlemen's Symposium was the opening session of the 2016 National Red Angus Convention, held September 7-9 in Oklahoma City.

More than a decade after Nebraska created its "livestock friendly" designation, participating counties have gained more cattle farms and lost fewer hog farms than those that lack the designation, a new study by agricultural economists at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln shows.

analysis Regression showed the livestock friendly designation had a stronger positive correlation to livestock expansion than almost all other factors measured, including the nearby presence of meatpacking plants.

The article, authored by Brian Mills, Azzeddine Azzam. Kate Brooks and David Aiken, is forthcoming in the Online Journal of Rural Research and Policy.

The Livestock Friendly County Program was adopted in 2003, in the wake of controversy over large hog confinement operations being established in central Nebraska in the late 1990s. Some opponents of the hog facilities unsuccessfully sought to give counties emergency powers to block the development of large livestock facilities.

By contrast, the livestock friendly program enables counties, on a voluntary basis, to seek a designation from the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, declaring them receptive to new livestock developments within their counties. The program appears to be unique in the nation, although agriculture department officials say they have received inquiries from at least one other state considering a similar strategy.

Greg Ibach, director of

ket Nebraska sites to the livestock industry nationally and internationally.

"It signifies at the county level they're more open to projects and more open to growing their industry," Ibach said. "Livestock Friendly Counties have made a commitment to transparency and consistence to their producers."

Morrill County, in the Nebraska Panhandle, was the first county to obtain the designation, in 2005. Presently, 37 of Nebraska's 93 counties have achieved the designation, with several more under review.

The agricultural economists studied 21 counties that achieved the designation between 2002 and 2012, comparing the numbers of farms reported in 2002, 2007 and 2012 censuses.

In raw numbers, counties with the livestock friendly designation saw larger growth in cattle operations - a 12 percent increase in livestock friendly counties between 2007 and 2012, compared to an 8 percent increase in counties without the designation. More than three fourths of counties (16 of 21) with the livestock friendly designation saw a net increase in their cattle farm numbers. Although most Nebraska

counties saw a decline in the number of hog farms during the study period, the decline was significantly slower in counties designated as livestock friendly. From 2007 to 2012, there was a 15.6 percent decline in the number of hog farms in participating counties. For counties without the livestock friendly designation, the decline was 62 percent.

"It does seem to attract more farms." said Brian Mills, who studied the livestock friendly designation as his master's degree thesis. "For that, I think it's good. Where I'm from, the population's been going down and it's nice to have people come back and farm."

Mills grew up on a diversified farm near Ansley. He now is studying for a doctorate in agricultural economics at Oklahoma State University.

Co-author and thesis coadviser Azzeddine Azzam. an agricultural economics professor, said the study's conclusions are more nuanced than the raw numbers show.

what's going on just by the numbers," he said

Other factors included population density; per capita income levels; cattle and hog prices; corn prices; the presence of a meatpacking plant in the county or a neighboring county; the presence of an ethanol plant in the county or a neighboring county; the concentration of livestock in the county, as measured by cattle per square mile and by percentage of the state's total cattle inventory; the county's geographic region of the state; and the number of years a county has been in the livestock friendly program.

The study did not review farm sizes or zoning regulations.

"After controlling for other factors, on average, farm numbers in counties with livestock-friendly designation are higher than those counties without the designation," the study concludes.

Grass Founder

Earlier this year, I back on hay and within a watched one of our champion cow horse mares walking across her pasture. She had the distinct gait of a slightly lame horse. It alarmed me since she was one of our most valuable horses. I had ridden her to many National Reined Cow Horse Championships including several state championships and one national championship in the NRCHA Hackamore Class. We won a Seven State Regional Championship in the Southeast. She is a super athlete and has never been outrun going down the fence in competition.

Two years before she came up badly lame so I called the vet. His diagnosis was grass founder. In other words, she was eating too much grass and putting on too much weight. The x-rays indicated the start of rotation of her coffin bones. We caught it in time and put her in a stall with hay and no grain. She was also fitted with a pair of those fancy Soft-Ride boots that elevate her heels and counter the rotation. She healed quickly with the confines of the stall, low protein hay and the therapeutic boots.

I suspected this was a recurrence of that previous grass founder. I took her out of the pasture and put her

few weeks she had lost weight and was again lamefree and the problem was solved. According to Dr. Thomas

R. Lenz, DVM, laminitis or founder, as it is commonly called, is inflammation of the laminae of the horse's foot. Laminae are the delicate, accordion-like tissues that attach the inner surface of the hoof wall to the coffin bone (the bone in the foot). The sensitive laminae interlock with insensitive laminae lining the hoof, much like interlocking fingers to keep the coffin bone in place within the hoof.

A horse suffering from laminitis experiences a decrease in blood flow to the laminae, which in turn, begins to die and separate. The final result is hoof wall separation, rotation of the coffin bone and extreme pain. In severe cases, the coffin bone will actually rotate through the sole of the horse's hoof where it becomes infected and can ultimately end in the horse having to be euthanized.

Laminitis is triggered by repeated concussion on hard ground (road founder), grain overload, retained placenta, hormonal imbalance (Cushing's syndrome), certain drugs (corticosteroids), obesity and lush grass.

Dr. Lenz goes on to explain that in cases of grass

founder, the sugar fructans produced by rapidly growing grass stimulates an overgrowth of bacteria in the horse's large intestine. The bacteria produce and release toxins (endotoxins) that are carried by the bloodstream to the foot where they cause damage to the laminae and small blood

Veterinarians and nutritionists have known for some time that plants store energy in their seeds in the form of starch that can cause laminitis if the horse is introduced to grain too quickly or eats too much grain. Only recently have researchers discovered that grasses not only store energy in their seed heads, they store energy in their roots, leaves and stems as fructan. If, during the warm spring daylight hours, rapidly growing grass produces more energy than it needs, it stores the excess as fructan. The fructan is converted back to energy that is required for growth at night or on cloudy days.

Dr. Lenz's description of grass founder describes the causes of that type of founder and why certain hoses will fall victim to too much early grass.

Since my good mare is semi-retired and is 12 years old, she doesn't get as much exercise as when I was actively using her. She has always been an easy-keeper so the fat is hard to keep off of her. If you have easykeepers, it might be a good idea to keep a close watch on them in the spring or during droughts when the grass doesn't grow fast and the sugar or fructan stores up in the short grass. Pastures that were over-grazed in the winter can also store excess fructan in their short grass and you should be wary of that also.

I had never had a horse

grass founder until I bred this mare. Her mother was an easy-keeper but never had a problem. I had always allowed the problem mare to free-choice graze but now that she was older and wasn't receiving much work or exercise, the weight gain was causing her problems so I will have to take corrective measures to keep her healthy.

There are ways to protect your horses from grass founder. Here are some ways to protect them.

Keep your easy-keepers off lush, fast growing pastures until the grass has slowed down in growth and began to produce seed heads.

Try to graze them on pastures that have a high percentage of legumes like clover or alfalfa.

Avoid grazing them on pastures that were overgrazed during winter.

Keep overweight, crestynecked horses in a stall or paddock until the pasture's rate of growth slows and then introduce them slowly to the pastures. Let them fill up on hay first before letting them graze. Consider using a grazing muzzle for part of the time they are on pasture.

Horses that are prone to grass founder are usually older horses that don't run and play as much as when they were younger or are not worked or exercised often to work off the excess fat.

Having too much grass is always a welcome event. Usually it's the other way around but when spring gives us a bounty of too much grass it's not always a good thing. Grass founder is one of the detriments of too much grass for horses.

Retrospective

By Miranda Reiman A lot can change in ten vears

A quick glance at my family Christmas card provides proof. From a picture of an old Kansas farmhouse to Nebraska-based todav's scene, where nearly half a dozen smiling faces fill the frame, transformation is obvious

But the dramatic change in the beef business is much more pronounced than my newlywed, newly graduated 22-year-old self could have imagined. Even from the vantage point of my new job as an ag journalist.

Some of my first assignments included writing about what the "prediction of \$4 corn" would do to cattle management and the possibility of camera grading in U.S. packing plants. Many Reiman-authored articles circa 2006 or 2007 talk of "marbling as a lifetime event." (Still true, but more

accepted as a fact now than a new discovery.) There's been a stream of

new technology and some shifts in philosophy, too.

One big shift I've witnessed? Quality grades made a U-turn.

Ten years ago, we were talking about the worrisome 30-year decline in quality grades. I covered nearly every aspect of it from feeding changes to health trends.

Then, just like that, things started to reverse and a few years later the talk was centered on the swift upswing.

In 2006, the share of Angus-influence cattle that met Certified Angus Beef[®] (CAB®) brand carcass specifications was 14%. Today it's double that, with year-todate figures in the 29% neighborhood. Choice and Prime have also been on a steady incline over the

2.6%, respectively, to 70%and just over 5.5% today.

Maybe we can give some credit to another movement I've observed: Cooperation is more common.

I remember eagerly highlighting notes from the conversation I had with a Nebraska cattle feeding family about sharing performance and carcass data with their ranch sources, even though the feedyard owned every head.

"Giving them that information lets them improve their cattle and it helps the industry," Doug Beller said

because most of our partners were able to get that information without us as a middleman.

In this case, it's the very best reason not to be needed.

When I started, many were just hearing about radio frequency identification (RFID) tags. This year I talked to producers testing ear tags that allow ranchers to heat-detect from their office. A cattle feeder told me about tags that use temperature readings to help identify sick critters and then

those same tags change colors so the cowboy crew knows which ones to pull.



It's the expansion phase for the North American beef cow herd. For most farmers and ranchers, that means finding ways to increase the number of cows rather than the size of each. And of course, everybody's talking about size - makes sense when you think about the escalating annual cost of keeping an average cow on the place.

Many things power that escalator, but higher land cost per cow might be the top step. For years, anywhere in the U.S. the average land investment per cow was in the \$2,500 to \$3,000 range. Today, driven in part by the ethanol impact on grain and subsequent farmland prices, that cost is three or four times higher, according to Texas A&M

economist Stan Bevers. Land cost per cow was recently noted in the range of \$7,500 to \$12,500.

A bigger-than-average cow requires the upper-end cost.

How big are typical commercial cows today? A decade ago, using USDA cull-cow harvest weights, Cargill nutritionist Brian McMurry examined the trend in Feedstuffs magazine. From 1975 to 2005, cow size increased by more than 300 lb., from 1,047 to 1,369. As you can see, that's more than 30 lb. per year. In the past ten years this author would suggest we've slowed the rate some, but surely added at least another 50 lb. to arrive at an average of more than 1400 lb.

So how much of an impact does cow size have on pasture needed per cow?

Scientists at North Dakota State University reported on research where 50 cows weighing 1216 lb. each required 529 acres or 10.5 acres/cow. Meanwhile, 50 cows weighing 1,571 lb. would need 642 acres or 12.8 acres/cow. That's 6.3% more pasture per 100 lb. of cow weight.

Other research tells us a 100-lb. increase in cow size only nets eight to 15 more pounds of weaned calf.

What's driving weights higher? That answer is easy. We have totally changed today's beef cow. She calves easier, milks more, weans a bigger calf in fewer days and, for the most part, she's a more functional cow. Clearly, she's bigger; that's the result of applied genetic selection for growth.

Since most cows contain some Angus genetics, the trend in that breed's growth be selling 1.560-lb, steers as EPDs (expected progeny differences) helps explain the change over time. Like many other producers, Angus breeders were uneasy about the 30-lb. annual weight increases 20 years ago, so they used EPDs to moderate mature cow size while selecting for growth.

You may think bigger cows are the big problem, but there's more to consider, including some that you likely did not know:

For one thing, big is not all bad, as the amount of beef per cow continues to grow. We've added an average of 5 lb. of carcass weight per year to the grain-fed progeny of those cows across 30 years.

Cow size gets all the attention because it's pretty easy to track, but we really should be talking about milk production, which we have greatly increased in these cows. My geneticist friends see no end to selection for milk or growth in the near future.


Dietary guidelines suggest a 100-lb. increase in cow size drives energy needs by 6% to 8%, which fits the North Dakota pasture example. But a 5-lb./day increase in milk production increases the TDN (total digestible nutrients) needed by 10%, and crude protein by another 13% to 15%. That says the level of milk production merits much more attention than it usually gets when selecting the perfect cow for each farm or ranch.

thing about it, but don't lose sight of the impact of any changes on consumer demand for beef. An excellent review recently published by Scott Greiner and Jason Smith at Virginia Tech helps put this in context. They conclude on the basis of all available research, that selection for marbling has no effect on birth weight, calving ease, age at puberty, heifer pregnancy, calving interval or mature cow size.


They do note a slightly positive correlation between marbling and milk production but point out that the size and variation in the Angus genetic database allow selection for more or less milk as dictated by forage resources available, with simultaneous and continued selection for marbling.


