Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay trade picked up a bit lately. Demand best for dairy alfalfa and pellets, moderate for ground/delivered and grass hay; prices remain fairly steady. Although most areas of the state saw several foggy days, above normal temperatures and dry conditions persist. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, the abnormally dry (D0) category increased to 31.25 pct and moderate drought (D1) increased to 4.19 pct. The NASS Kansas Crop Progress and Condition report for the week ending October 30, 2016 stated that pasture and range conditions rated 1 pct very poor, 5 pct poor, 27 pct fair, 56 pct good and 11 pct excellent. By Miranda Reiman When it's just not possible to bring 600 people from across the globe to the feedyard, the next best thing is to bring a little of that Herington family operation to them.

Cattle feeders Shane and Shawn Tiffany took the stage during educational sessions at the Certified Angus Beef[®] (CAB[®]) brand annual conference in Tucson Ariz The brothers gave foodservice and retail professionals a glimpse of life in a feedvard. often one of the most misunderstood parts of the beef community.

"It gives us an opportunity in our supply chain to bring those calves together from different genetics, different environments, different weights, shapes and size, born at different times - and create uniformity," said Mark McCully, CAB vice president for supply, during their introduction. "It allows us, as a beef supply

chain, to have a 52-week supply of marketable finished cattle for your business.'

The Tiffanys have an open-door business model. They're happy to talk about any part of the feedyard, they said, so they started at the beginning.

"Shawn and I literally grew up there," said Shane. Their dad managed the feedyard for 14 years, and as boys they started out washing waterers and cleaning "boot (grain-receiving) pits" in the mill. "There was no such thing as a snow day. When school was cancelled, you went to work."

Then they both went to college and on to other careers before forming a partnership to buy what is now the 14,000-head Tiffany Cattle Company.

"We took the chance and we jumped in," Shane said. "The last nine years have been a whirlwind and it's been a fun ride, but really

They gave a backdrop for the 45-minute conversation by explaining the typical schedule and chores at the yard.

"We're in our office chairs by six in the morning. We expect the feed trucks to be rolling and dropping feed in the bunks before 7 a.m.," Shawn said. "Cowboys are out saddling their horses in the dark and getting ready to go inspect every single animal in the yard, every day, for any health issues that may arise."

They talked about their customers and the quality animals they receive into the yard.

"We're 99% customerowned cattle, so we provide a service for our customers that own the cattle. So think of a bed and breakfast," Shawn said. "We sell food and rent a room."

keters and others had a chance to text in questions for the cattlemen to answer live. Inquiries ranged from

the transition to grain from forage and defining "feed conversions" to the kind of legacy they wanted to leave and future challenges.

"Your focus is pretty narrow when you're young and broke and you're trying to get a business off the ground," Shawn said. "The goal is to stay in business until tomorrow."

Now, there are eight kids that make up the next generation. They said that forces them to look longer-term, and makes them more determined than ever to share their story.

"The ruminant animal has the wonderful ability to take low-quality proteins, such as grass or corn silage and produce some extremely high-quality protein products that we can consume." Shawn said, noting that most people just want to

learn more about that process.

"If somebody will give you the time to explain your story and why you do what you do and how you do it, every single time people go away with a better feeling and better understanding of our industry," he said.

The men and their wives spent the three-day conference interacting with people from very different geographies and diverse backgrounds.

"The moment we got off the stage, the rest of the weekend, we were constantly talking to somebody," Shawn said. They chatted about cattle and everything in between, from grinding hamburger in San Diego to cutting steaks in Toronto. "There were just some great conversations with people who are from a considerably different segment of our industry, but are every bit as passionate about it as we are.'



Feeding cull cows prior to sale may add value

Every year beef cattle producers have to make decisions about how to handle open cows that didn't become pregnant. Most producers simply sell the animals after pregnancy check time. However, it's possible that with a little more investment, they can provide more revenue to their operation, according to Kansas State University professor Chris Reinhardt.

Cull females make up around 20 percent of ranch revenues, he said. Through proper marketing, it is possible to add value before selling the animals.

"There are two different types of cull females," said Reinhardt, who is a beef specialist with K-State Research and Extension. The first is an older cow that has been a productive cow in the past, but for whatever reason, did not become pregnant this year. It's possible she's missing teeth so she cannot process the nutrients available and was thin at breeding time.





basis, a thin cow will bring in less revenue than a heavier, fatter cow will, but there is an opportunity to add value to the thin cow.

"Given the amount of rain this year, the amount of grain available, the price of feed and possibly standing pasture on which you could supplement, producers have the opportunity to add pounds to thin cows. If a cow is old and thin there is an opportunity to add weight and actually increase her weight as well as the price per pound you receive by feeding her for a period of time.'

Producers, however, should be mindful of the law of diminishing returns. If a cow is thin there is probably a reason, such as poor teeth. If that's the case, high quality silage, grain, protein supplements, hay and pasture can help add condition to the cow. While she may not gain weight as she did in the past, the use of high quality feeds can help. This typical-

ly takes six to eight weeks.

"Our goal is to put on weight, body condition, muscle, and fat, and get them to market," Reinhardt said. "The length of time the cow is on feed will be driven by how thin she is and the cause of her loss of condition. If it is a matter of old or missing teeth and we can feed her grain, corn silage, or distiller's grains, the goal is to move her body condition score to a five, in which she has full expression of muscle and a slight but not excessive cover of fat over the ribs, brisket, and round. Anything beyond a body condition score of five, where we begin to see overall smoothness and pockets of fat, and she rapidly becomes inefficient.'

Reinhardt referred to a body condition scoring method for beef cows, which describes an animal's relative fatness on a nine-point scale. A body condition score of five (BCS 5) is average. A score of one would be

extremely thin. Nine is extremely fat.

The goal is to feed the cow to a BCS of five or five and a half, he said. This raises the cow to a different carcass value grade, which boosts what the buyer will pay per pound.

Reinhardt encourages Kansas producers to work with local K-State Research and Extension staff to develop a program for each female.

Feeding to sell as bred cattle

"If a producer has a fairly young cow that for whatever reason didn't settle during the breeding season they could feed her to rebreed and sell," Reinhardt said. "This is a unique year as we are going to have inexpensive grain and a lot of ranchers have abundant hay. Some cattle producers in the south still have really good grass. This presents an opportunity to turn her from an open female in the fall in a marketplace flooded with open females to a fall calving cow for next calving season.'

"There are plenty of fall calving operations who are looking to bolster their numbers and bring in bred females as opposed to carrying over an open female throughout the season waiting for the next breeding season," Reinhardt said. "There is an opportunity to add price per pound to her as a useful, reproductive female.'

As fertility tracks in a linear fashion, Reinhardt recommended producers improve the body condition score of open cows. He also recommended having a veterinarian ensure that such cows do not have health issues that could be preventing them from conceiving.

"Producers do not have to be nearly as aggressive in feeding these females if they are looking at an early winter or mid-winter breeding time," Reinhardt said. "Good quality feedstuffs must be available to meet the nutrient requirements for that open female as she should put on a little weight."



As a pilot, I understand the importance of pre-flight checks and as a horseman, I also understand the importance of a pre-ride check before I get in the saddle. It's somewhat funny some of the things I've found wrong before stepping in the saddle.



A pre-ride inspection can reveal all kinds of neglected or routine tasks that may need your attention. We all know how some horses sometimes hold their breath when you're tightening the cinch and then let their air out, effectively loosening the cinch after you've gone on to something else so they don't have to suffer a tight cinch. But they've left you with a loose cinch and a dangerous situation. It's always a good idea to re-check the cinch for tightness just before you step on.

A walk-around inspection can reveal simple things like a head stall that was only pulled over one ear and hanging loose in front of the other ear. That happens a lot because sometimes riders don't actually look at what they are doing when it's a simple, routine task. You might find other small things that could turn into big things like the connection between the rear cinch and the front cinch broken or missing. It could be a big thing if that rear cinch slipped back into the flank area and caused the horse to react as if he was in a rodeo and doing what comes naturally.

It doesn't take long to check things out before you step in the saddle but it will pay off if you find something and fix it before compromising your safety and the

horse's safety and wellbeing. Little things can turn into big things in a hurry when you're sitting on a thousand-pound prey animal that believes his survival depends on running

away or trying to buck off the threat on his back.

arena confident I would be the winner. I don't even remember the type of event because all I remember is flying off my horse and lying on the ground. My Dad came out in the arena and helped me up. I couldn't help hearing people laughing.

My world's greatest horseman ego was shattered and I was a laughingstock. During my run one of my reins broke and I and my horse went separate ways with me ending up on the ground in front of all those people.

If I would have had any good sense back then, I would have checked my tack and horse before riding in the arena. I would have seen that the little rawhide string that secures the rein was frayed and ready to break. That was sixty-some years ago and I still remember that painful day.

It was one of life's lessons and one I try never to forget. You have to check your gear or equipment before you ride, drive or fly. It will pay off big time. One of the most common mistakes riders make is not checking the cinch before mounting.

By Steve Suther When anyone thinks about beef grading, USDA quality grades such as Prime, Choice and Select likely come to mind. Quality grades have been in effect for nearly a century, but yield grades have been required in the United States

for more than 50 years. While research continues to prove how well quality grades work, the same cannot be said for yield grades. To be fair, quality grading has been updated regularly, while today's yield grade system is exactly the same as what went into

effect in 1965.

West Texas A&M University animal scientist Tv Lawrence explained the issues at this summer's Feeding Quality Forum (FQF) in Grand Island, Neb., and Amarillo, Texas. He authored a research paper on the topic this fall entitled, "Beef Yield Grading: History, Issues and Opportunities," available online at www.cabpartners.com/research.

Lawrence told the 200 FQF attendees that numerous studies have cast doubts on the reliability of the YG system, finding weak to only moderate correlations between yield grade and all of the carcass measurements it was intended to predict, so

that those measurements could predict red meat yield.

"We're trying to predict a predictor of a predictor," he said, noting it all started with the 1960-published data on 17 independent variables on 162 "representative" cattle processed in the 1950s.

"When the government's General Accounting Office looked at grading in the late 1970s, they learned that if you sold half of a large pen of cattle to Packer A and the other half to Packer B, you would get two different results," he said. "Grading was a human, subjective deter-

since put a man on the moon wanted better. In fact, Lawrence said NASA was asked for help, but the Agriculture Research Service soon turned to Kansas State University's more focused expertise "in 1980, to estimate red meat yield using a camera.³

Published data proves the "very rudimentary camera" worked. Regardless, for the next decade, the industry "took a left turn toward nuclear magnetic resonance, near-infrared imaging," the animal scientist said.

More promising technology allowed for a return to video image analysis in the 1990s, as grid marketing emerged amid inconsistent grading by humans. Empathy led them to resist imposing discounts while more readily granting premiums.

"Now you take a picture of a ribeye, convert that to red and white pixels, and you're counting pixels," Lawrence said. "This technology gained approval [in 2009] for measuring ribeye area, vield grade, marbling score and back fat thickness." It cannot measure the kidney, pelvic and heart fat (part of the yield grade equation), so the system accounts for that with a con-

"Now you can take a pen of 500 cattle, sell half to Packer A and half to Packer B, and if they're both using the camera, you're going to get the same answer," he said.

Still, trying "to predict a predictor of a predictor" without accounting for thin

meats, brisket or trimmings, using data on 162 carcasses from the mostly Hereford cattle of 60 years ago that ranged from 350 to 900 presents pounds inescapable challenges. It accounts for just 40% of the variation in red meat yield for today's average fed cattle, and 0% for Holsteins.

The non-linear stair steps for premiums and discounts represent another major flaw in the system, Lawrence said. When the camera calls one carcass a 3.99 and the next a 4.00 yield grade, the grid may suddenly impose a \$15 per hundredweight discount.

This system based on a few cattle "of a biological type that no longer exists" predicts red meat yield of cuts from carcasses "increasingly more variable in genetic type and management."

"We apply that estimate to carcasses that weigh beyond the inference of which (the system) was designed, and we have ignored the opportunity to develop new yield estimates afforded by camera grading," Lawrence summarized. "Leadership within the beef community must decide if the status quo is acceptable, or if improvement is warranted."

Grass & Grain, November 8, 2016 **Reducing stress on calves at wear**

Weaning can be one of the most stressful periods of a calve's life. In some situations, not only is the calf removed from its dam, the calf is also moved to a new location and offered a different ration. Research studies from several Land Grant Colleges show that calves weaned using low stress methods have less sickness, less death loss and gain weight more rapidly during the weeks immediately after weaning.

There are multiple ways to wean. Some are abrupt (hard weaning), while others are more gradual (soft weaning). Hard weaning methods immediately separate calves from their mothers until they stop bawling, these would include putting unweaned calves in a pen or drylot or in the most extreme case taking them directly to a livestock market

Soft weaning methods prevent nursing, but still allow the calf to have contact with the cow. Nose clips and fenceline weaning are the two most common soft weaning techniques and in some cases both may be used on the same set of calves. Plastic nose clips, attached to the calf's nose, have a flap that prevents the calf from getting the cow's

teat in its mouth; some also line weaning the first step is "stick" the cow so that she moves away when the calf tries to suckle. With fenceline weaning, cows are moved into an adjacent pasture and calves are left in their "home" pasture, allowing them to go nose-to-nose and do everything except nurse

Both of these soft weaning methods reduce walking and vocalization of newly weaned calves when compared to hard weaning. Measurements of postweaning gain indicate that fenceline weaned calves outgain traditionally weaned calves for as long as ten weeks after weaning whereas improvement in gain in 2-stage weaned calves was only apparent in the first 2 to 3 weeks after being removed

When you look at the varing, as well as how much they gain at two weeks and at ten weeks. If implementing fence-

to have a calf-proof fence to keep calves from nursing from their mothers on the other side. It is also very helpful to expose the calves to the ration they are going to be consuming prior to the weaining process. If possible move the cows and calves into the area you plan to leave the calves in for a few days prior to weaning so the calf will be acclimated to their surroundings. Use your creativity when coming up with methods vou can use, corrals next to a pasture or sub-dividing with electric fences are some methods that will work. More suggestions on fenceline weaning can be found in a bulletin by Wright and Pruitt at https://

If using anti-suckling devices, they should be put on the calves three to seven days prior to weaning. If they are allowed to remain on the calf longer, some calves may learn to flip the device up so they can still nurse. Devices can be reused but be sure to disinfect between uses.

Regardless of method used, the advantages of soft weaning methods are clear. Calves are less stressed, have better gains and are have less sickness than those weaned in other ways. I know of several producers in our area who have implemented soft weaning methods and none have gone back to hard weaning.

To ensure that newly weaned calves can respond to the disease challenge they will face also make sure that calves have been trained to eat feed and follow a vaccination protocol prior to weaning.

By Anthony Ruiz, Central Kansas District Livestock Agent

We all want to grow big and strong. Even in agriculture we want to expand our operations and successfully weather the rough patches that come our way. Some rough spots are caused by weather. Others are triggered by pests and diseases. Markets even contribute to difficult times. After record wheat harvests, a bulging corn crop, and very good fall crop growing conditions supply is outpacing demand. This looks to be the trend for the next few years pending significant shifts in market fundamentals.

For livestock producers and crop raisers strengthening their management and finding opportunities to re-

duce cost is imperative. One tool used two separate ways can help you accomplish your goals. To grow big and strong in the current farm market conditions, eat your wheaties.

I'm not advocating for a specific breakfast cereal. Instead, I'm saying let's look at our resources and use them wisely. Wheat is an ancient grain supposed to have been first cultivated over 10,000 years ago. Wheat was a large part of the industrial revolution in the 1700s and 1800s as improved farming methods increased quality and quantity of grains. Since first introduced into Kansas in 1874, wheat has become a staple of Kansas agriculture. Today Kansas provides approximately one-fifth of the

US produced wheat each vear. We lead the country in wheat produced, wheat milled, and wheat stored. It is safe to say that wheat has been and will continue to be a major crop in Kansas. I'd recommend producers look deeply into feeding wheat grain to cattle and grazing wheat pasture.

Feeding wheat to livestock is not a new idea. It has been around for many years. Wheat has higher protein content than corn grain. The starches in wheat are also highly digestible. Both facts make it an excellent feed ingredient. Wheat's digestibility can cause problems if not managed appropriately. Environmental factors in two neighboring fields can cause changes in wheat grain that creates differences in wheat digestibility. Rolling wheat is preferred for livestock diets. A

recent study shows wheat digestibility can be increased from 60% to 86%simply by rolling. Rolling cracks the hard outer seed covering and exposes the starchy interior. This helps limit the variable digestibility of whole wheat. Failure to do so can cause digestive upsets, acidosis, bloat, and erratic intake patterns. As vou mix feed rations keep your eyes open for excessive fines which can exacerbate livestock digestive issues.

Rolled wheat works very well in growing, stocker, and finishing cattle rations, especially if limit feeding is being employed. Wheat should be added to a feed ration slowly and not constitute more than 40% of the ration on a dry matter basis. Begin with approximately 15% rolled wheat and increase that percentage every two weeks. As with any livestock diet changes, slow and steady wins the race. Grains are notoriously low in calcium. Adding limestone can help buffer rumen pH. Also, incorporating an ionophore into your feed can improve feed efficiency and reduce digestive upsets.

Your cow herd can also benefit from feeding wheat. As with a total mixed ration rolling wheat and adding an ionophore to supplement cows is an option. Saving a few pennies here could cost dollars down the road in reduced cow body condition scores and lower fertility rates. Cows on pasture should never be feed more than six pounds of rolled wheat per head per day. Feeding more can reduce feed digestibility and lead to digestive upsets when the "boss cow" eats more than her six pounds. The term supplemental feed implies we are not meeting a cow herd's total nutritional needs with a feed bucket. Instead, we are taking what forages she consumes and

complementing it to achieve desired management goals. Testing your forage base or stored hays can prevent overspending on supplementation or underfeeding. Ask your local, friendly K-State Research & Extension livestock agent about forage testing and feed ration formulating tips.

Wheat is grown on 20 million acres in the southern Great Plains. Over 12 million acres are used for grazing cattle. September is a great time to plant wheat for grazing and potential grain harvest. Fall planted wheat can produce between 2,000 and 4.000 pounds of dry matter before settling in for winter dormancy. This forage ranges between 20 and 30 percent crude protein. It is an excellent feed or supplement for growing and mature cattle.

Weaned calves or stocker cattle account for most of the inhabitants on the 12 million acres of grazed wheat pasture. Grazing your own weaned calves or purchasing stockers is a way to maximize resources and gain value from cropland. Too, doing so can defer income into another tax year. Cattle gains of one and a half to two pounds per head per day are common on wheat fields. For a landowner grazing rates on a dollar per pound of gain are most common. Generally, wheat pasture is priced around 65% the cost of gain in a feedyard. So if feedlot cost of gain is \$75 per hundredweight wheat pasture value of gain is around \$48.75 per hundredweight. Check out KSRE's Focus on Feedlots for current and projected feedlot financials. Cost of gain is negotiable depending on who supplies what: mineral, care, medicine, water, hay, etc. Grazing wheat pasture

with stockers is the most common strategy. Fall and winter stocking rates hover

around one to three acres per stocker, depending on forage availability and cattle size. In spring time 0.75 to 1.75 acres per head is acceptable, if the conditions are appropriate. Research out of Oklahoma has found supplementing a high energy feedstuff with an ionophore can further enhance animal performance. Cows and calves can also benefit from nutrient dense wheat pasture. Fall born calves allowed access to wheat pasture via a "creep gate" have shown improved weaning weights. For cows, dry or nursing, "limit grazing" is a way to reduce feed cost. Studies have shown allowing cows access to wheat pasture every other day or every third day can meet all or most of their supplemental feed needs.

Producers grazing cattle on wheat need to be aware of potential health hazards. Grass tetany, a magnesium imbalance, and bloat are the two most common risks on small grain pastures. Having mineral available with adequate magnesium levels and intake, poloxalene blocks, ionophore consumption, and hay available can go a long way in reducing both grass tetany and bloat obstacles.

The ag economists are predicting five unpleasant vears for Kansas farms. Grazing wheat can help add income, reduce feed costs, and provide operational flexibility. Keep your operation strong through 2021; bend but don't break. Eat your wheaties.


