

Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market activity slow; demand moderate to good; offerings of grinder hay light; prices steady. The interest in finding grinding alfalfa continues across the state without much luck. Producers are reporting that they are receiving increased inquiries for grinding alfalfa, but they either do not have it, have not had the time to sell it or are holding on to it for their own use. However, with grain harvest winding down, sales of hay should pick up after the holidays. According to NASS, fog and drizzle hampered harvest progress in some areas, but rainfall totals remained at or near zero throughout

the entire state. The abnormally dry (D0) category increased only slightly to 14.20 pct, while moderate drought (D1) stayed steady at .64 pct. BQA launches new transportation training and certification program

The checkoff-funded Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) program has launched a new training and certification program for cattle transportation. The program, known as Beef Quality Assurance Transportation (BQAT), provides cattle producers and haulers with comprehensive training based on their roles in the cattle industry. Online training will be made available beginning immediately, and in-person training

opportunities will begin soon. "The BQA Transportation training and certification program has been a long time coming," said Chase DeCoite, director of Beef Quality Assurance for NCBA, a contractor to the beef checkoff. "By educating cattle haulers and producers on the best practices in cattle transportation, BQA is helping make improvements in cattle care and beef quality. Participat-

ing in BQA Transportation will be an indicator that the beef and dairy industries are committed to responsible animal care during transportation and makes both the BQA and dairy FARM animal care programs more complete." The BQA program was first funded by the beef checkoff in the early 1990s and developed its first guidance on transportation in 2006. Today, the program offers train-

ing and certification programs for all sectors of the industry: cow-calf, stocker and feedyard. This is the first time a nationally recognized certification has been offered for the transportation segment of the industry. Online training for BQAT will be offered in two different modules: Farmer/Rancher and Professional. Farmer/Rancher modules will focus on the use of stock trailers and smaller

loads of cattle that beef and dairy cattle producers might typically haul themselves. The Professional modules focus on the use of tractor-trailers and larger loads that are typically hauled farther distances. "Today the BQA program is taking another step in being the leader when it comes to educating producers and the cattle industry on the right things to do," said Dan Kniffen, chair of the

BQA Advisory Board, assistant professor of Animal Science at Pennsylvania State University and a cow-calf producer. "We have known for a long time that transportation plays a critical role in our industry. Now we are fully able to train and show our commitment to beef quality and cattle care from pasture to plate." For more information visit <https://www.bqa.org/>.

Brand the barn – CAB seeks paint-worthy nominees for 40th anniversary

Enthusiastic ranchers have long sought permission to use the Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) brand logo. For a company that owns only a brand – no cattle, no product – that registered trademark is a pretty important asset. Its use is restricted to licensed partners that sell the beef product.

Since 1978, ranchers have focused their high-quality Angus genetics to supply the CAB brand with greater and greater success. Over those decades, the logo, product and breed have been making a mark on the beef industry; a big mark. To celebrate, CAB is doing something big.

As big as a barn, in fact. To commemorate 40 years, the world's largest and most successful brand of beef will paint that logo,

the most valuable thing it owns, on 40 barns across the United States.

The brand is accepting nominations for barns that will be painted by Ohio artist Scott Hagan. Go online to nominate a barn for the 40th anniversary painting campaign. The simple application requires a minimum of three photos of the structure and surrounding area. Preference will be given to wood-sided barns, and they will be selected

based on location, scenic beauty and high-traffic areas.

"It's exciting to embrace a form of marketing that's all but disappeared over the years, yet one that's still very appropriate today for our mission to support Angus producers," says Erickson. "Use of our logo is typically limited to our product, but for this campaign, we are

proud to be able to display a brand created by Angus producers on their farms across the country."

The first barn painting is set to begin in early 2018 with a sequence of paintings throughout the year. Hagan will wrap up his final logo mural in Ohio, home state for the brand.

"We're looking forward to honoring farmers and

ranchers across the nation while engaging their local communities along the way," Erickson says. "We are honored and humbled to celebrate this anniversary with them."

"Angus GS is a DNA test built specifically for the Angus breed and is a big part of our strategic plan for breed improvement," said Allen Moczygamba, CEO of the American Angus Association. Angus GS, sold exclusively by Angus Ge-

netics, Inc., (AGI), is an affordable tool that will empower genomic selection for Angus breeders and accelerate breeding progress, Moczygamba added.

"Angus GS contains DNA markers that are highly informative for Angus cattle," said Dan Moser, AGI president. "This will help us more accurately see how these cattle will perform. The profile will also help pinpoint new traits of economic benefit." Cattle producers use DNA to predict traits bulls or cows will pass on to offspring, helping them make breeding and ranching decisions.

"Angus GS is designed to genotype the whole herd, not just the bulls," Moser said. "Using genomic tests with females helps a breeder know more about their cow herd and use what they learn to make better mating decisions that result in seedstock that meet their customers' needs."

The American Angus Association unveiled the new product during its International Genomics Symposium at the 2017 Angus Convention in Fort Worth. The genomic test was produced in partnership with Neogen GeneSeek Operations, which helped select the DNA markers for genomic predictions and future improvements in fertility, feed efficiency, meat tenderness, animal health and environmental adaptability.

Kansas State University meat scientists verify benefits of Omega 3 feeding regimen

Dennis Nuttelman was pretty sure that the Omega 3-enriched beef and pork he was selling from a family farm in Nebraska was not only healthy, but con-

sumers would also think it tasted pretty good.

Now, research from Kansas State University is telling him he is right.

Meat scientists at the university are reporting results of a study that indicates that Omega 3-enriched meat maintains its flavor, tenderness and shelf life just as well as meat that is not enriched with the beneficial fatty acid.

The human body needs Omega 3 fatty acids to function, but they also have been proven to provide substantial health benefits. The U.S. National Institutes of Health reports that some of the benefits of a diet rich in Omega 3 fatty

acids include a lower risk of heart disease, some cancers, age-related macular degeneration, rheumatoid arthritis and possibly even Alzheimer's disease.

Omega 3 fatty acids have also been shown to improve a baby's health and development when the mother's diet includes them during pregnancy and breastfeeding.

John Gonzalez, a meat scientist at Kansas State University, said a past problem with simply adding Omega 3 fatty acids to animals' diet is that it would cause an off-flavor or accelerate discoloration in consumer meat from that animal.

"The figure that has been thrown out in the history of meat science for the past 20 years is that \$1 billion per year is lost just on meat being thrown away from being discolored," Gonzalez said. "If you actually increase Omega 3's and it has a negative effect, that's a bad thing because you may be able to sell for a greater price, but you have to throw away more of your products."

Those concerns related to feeding Omega 3 enriched diets to pigs and cows may soon go away with K-State's recent findings.

The university tested meat from animals fed Omega 3's in a patented process called LIPEX and

developed by XFE Products of Des Moines, Iowa. The diet was fed to animals at Omega 3 Family Farms of Columbus, Nebraska, where Nuttelman is the farm director.

Gonzalez and the K-State meat scientists found that the Omega 3 content in the consumer meat product increased by 178 percent. Subsequent taste tests with trained panelists showed that there was no reported difference in the taste, color, tenderness or shelf life of the meat.

"So what we know is that the level of Omega 3's are increased, and those consumers who care about the level of Omega 3's in the meat will pay the premium," Gonzalez said. "The retailer doesn't have to worry about throwing away the product because this product will have a (reliable) shelf life."

Nuttelman said that his business had tested meat products for more than 15 years with Midwest Labs of Omaha, Nebraska, but had not previously worked with a public university to verify the benefits of the Omega 3 products.

He added that the patented feeding process that his company uses has increased marbling in the meat, which adds flavor.

"We believe the work that K-State did for our farm and for XFE Products will bring real value to our programs," Nuttelman said. "I believe that consumers can look for this product in order to receive very good Omega 3 levels in their diet, and for sure the taste will be great."
