spend a lot on hay and supplement. Just how much can vary and depends on many moving factors, say two University of Missouri Extension specialists.

Agricultural business specialist Brent Carpenter and livestock specialist Gene Schmitz looked at how current prices affect winter feeding costs for several different diets.

"Winter feeding is a critical time for herd health and production. It's also the most expensive time on the cow calendar," Schmitz says.

Carpenter says grass hay prices dropped only slightly from last winter following a drought. Although USDA reports strong production in 2019, hay stocks at the start of harvest season were the lowest in 35 years. Heading into the winter feeding season, prices remain 25-30% higher than two years ago.


The team compared the cost of hay and supplement for spring- and fall-calving cows.

They found that the difference in daily cost with current prices is about a dime per day. Spring-calving cows are in late gestation and dry most of the hay-feeding season. Fall-calving cows are in mid-to-late lactation during winter.

Without laboratory testing, grass hay quality is difficult to establish, says Schmitz. No grading system exists for grass hay, so the longtime Extension specialists assigned "poor, fair and good" grades based on crude protein and energy content. Similarly, hay prices are quoted by rough quality grade.

They considered multiple feed mixes to meet the cow's nutritional needs. They estimated cost at about 8 cents per pound for delivered feed in central Missouri.

The cost of raised hay is set to \$62 per ton, based on MU Extension production budgets. Carpenter says producers who grow their own hay should strive for high quality. The costs per ton to grow poor-quality and high-quality hay are the essentially the

The realized cost of feeding good-quality raised hay is about 59 cents less than comparable purchased hay. Feeding poor-quality raised hay actually cost the producer about 16 cents more each day than buying comparable hay. This difference is even higher in years of surplus hay supplies, es, producers who buy hay save about 64 cents per cow per day by feeding the lowpriced, low-quality hay even though it requires a higher level of supplementation.

Carpenter says he knows the "cheap hay" calculation flies in the face of traditional cattle and forage wisdom. "But that is how the math works," he says. "The idea is not to feed junk, but to keep hay costs low even if it means spending more on supplement.'

Good management practices remain key to profitability. "Hay expense, not supplement, is the main driver of winter feeding costs and potentially the profitability of the enterprise," says Schmitz. "Management practices can have a large impact on the number of days on hay and overall winter feeding costs."

Kansas Hay Market Report



Tips

Indoor Plant Decorations

It is the season for getting holiday plants and caring for them. Amaryllis, poinsettia, holiday cacti, Kalanchoe, and others brighten up indoor space. Long-lasting plants will need good watering practices and proper indoor placement. Amaryllis like day temperatures in the 70s and night tempera-

tures in the 60s. The flower bud may start to appear right away or the plant may remain dormant for a period of time, but eventually all mature bulbs do bloom. Water thoroughly and place the plant in a warm, sunny location. Move the plant to a cooler location and out of direct sunlight when the flower buds begin to show color so the flowers last longer. Amaryllis can remain in bloom for about a month. Poinsettias need a sunny window or the brightest area of the

room, but don't let it touch cold window panes. The day temperature should be around 70 degrees with 60 to 65 degrees at night. Temperatures above 75 degrees will shorten bloom life, and below 60 degrees may cause root rot. Move plants away from drafty windows at night or draw drapes between them to avoid damage from the cold. Poinsettias are somewhat finicky in regard to soil moisture. Keep potting media moist but avoid overwatering which is likely to kill the plant. Holiday cacti prefer bright indirect light. Too much sun can

result in the leaves turning yellow. Common household temperatures are fine. Soil should be kept constantly moist but not waterlogged. Give them a light fertilization every other week. Blooming will normally cease in late winter to early spring, but continue to keep them moist and fertilized until the following fall. Kalanchoes do best with an abundance of light. Thorough watering with the media allowed to dry out between applications suits these plants. They tolerate a wide range of indoor tempera-

Western Stars

Who was Hollywood's first him to love horses and ride big western movie star? He starred more than a century ago in the silent movie era, so perhaps not many people today know the name: Tom Mix. However, his influence can still be seen today.

Readers may recall that I recently taught an adult class on Kansas cowboy history and poetry. In preparing for that class, I learned about Tom Mix's significant contributions to western lore.

Tom Mix grew up in rural Pennsylvania where his father managed a stable for a wealthy lumberman. His father taught them well.

Young Tom wanted to go west and become a cowboy. He went to Oklahoma and learned to rope and shoot. Tom was hired on with the Miller Brothers 101 Ranch in Oklahoma. When the 101 started putting on its own live Wild West shows, Tom Mix was featured.

In 1910, a film producer wanted to make a documentary titled Ranch Life in the Great Southwest. He hired Tom Mix to provide and handle horses. Mix did so well that the producer featured him in the documentary, and then cast him in the lead of fictional western action movies. They were a huge success.

This was the era of silent films. Dashing young Tom Mix made a fine figure on the silver screen, and his skills in roping, riding and shooting made for dramatic action. He would end up making almost 300 movies.

Three things about Tom Mix's work would set the pattern for many of the western stars who followed. First, he wore gaudy, elaborate clothes. In the Wild West shows, he had worn flashy clothing to get attention, and the contrasting shades of these outfits showed up in the black-and-white films also. Second, speaking of contrasts, the plot of his movies always painted a stark difference between the good guys and the bad guys. These were morality plays, where the bad guy was an awful villain and the good guy in the white hat always won. Third, this was the first time when the star in his own right.

Tom Mix had a mount named Tony the Wonder Horse, recognizable by his white-stockinged back feet. Tony could do all kinds of amazing tricks. He could untie ropes, race trains, jump cliffs, and often rescue his master. Tony became so popular that he got thousands of letters of fan mail at the studio. Fans would mail him sugar cubes, for example. When Tom Mix put his handprints in the cement at Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood, Tony's hoofprints were placed right next to them.

Think of what an influence Tom Mix had on future generations of cowboys. Without Tom Mix and Tony, would Roy Rogers have had Trigger and the Lone Ranger had Silver? Young Gene Autry and others would watch and be influenced by the stories of the incorruptible good guy cow-

A revolutionary fish stocking program by the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism (KDWPT) has largemouth bass thriving in waters nearly void of America's highest-profile fish not long ago, and Kansas bass anglers are taking notice.

"The early-spawn program is a real game-changer for bass fishing," said Steve Hausler, a 50-year bass angler of Ellis and officer in bass clubs on the state and local level. "This is one of the few times man has figured out how to do something better than nature. It's really turned things around."

KDWPT's early-spawn bass program "tricks" hatchery brood fish to spawn up to 60 days earlier than normal when in the wild. The added time gives young stocked bass the chance to grow to a size that can survive a Kansas win-

Now, the number of federal reservoirs with "good" or "excellent" largemouth fishing by KDWPT criteria has doubled in the last decade. It's just one of several programs currently improving Kansas fishing op-

portunities.

"It's been all hands on deck to get these programs going, and so successful," said Doug Nygren, Fisheries Division director for KDWPT. "Credit needs to go to a lot of different people." Nygren added lake biologists, hatchery staff and private conservation and angling groups as making major

contributions. Early-spawn bass program Despite intensive stocking programs in the past, many Kansas reservoirs maintained relatively poor largemouth

bass populations for decades. It wasn't until recent years, when KDWPT fisheries biologists began taking an even more critical look at the situation that the limiting factors were identified.

"The problem was our young bass weren't big enough to make it through the winters because they weren't really big enough to take advantage of available food. Most were only four to five inches," said Nygren. "We learned if we could grow those fish to about eight inches, their odds of survival were greatly improved."

Meade Fish Hatchery manager Jason Vajnar learned to manipulate water temperatures and light levels to trick February and March brood fish into thinking it was late May, stimulating the fish to spawn up to two months early.

"We're now stocking 1.5to 2.5-inch bass before wild fish have even hatched," said Nygren, "And we're finding many more of our stocked bass now survive their first winter. After that, they're in

good shape." Now in its tenth year, the early-spawn bass program produces nearly 2 million fish annually, having a profound impact on angling quality. From 2005-2009, Kansas averaged four reservoirs with "good" or "excellent" rankings for largemouth bass. This year, nine reservoirs - Big Hill, Glen Elder, Kirwin, LaCygne, Milford, Perry, Sebelius, Webster and Wilson - all earned "good" or better ratings; and, more are expected to be added for 2020 and beyond.

"In some of these lakes, like Webster and Kirwin,

probably every bass they have is an early-spawn hatchery fish. Bass were once almost non-existent in these areas and now they're two of the best bass lakes in the state," said Nygren. "We have other lakes coming on, too. Kanopolis never really had a bass fishery but it's pretty good, now."

Georgia cubes Quality bass habitat is always a concern, especially in Kansas reservoirs where natural habitat, like submerged brush piles, can quickly deteriorate. That's why in 2015, Kansas biologists began experimenting with artificial habitat, sinking four-foot cubes made of PVC pipe, interlaced with flexible sewer pipe, into lakes and reservoirs. As expected when they were invented in Georgia, the "Georgia cubes" instantly attracted Kansas bass and consequently, bass anglers.

Submerged in prime locations, the cubes are sometimes placed in clusters of up to 20 or more - configurations fisheries biologists refer to as "fish cities." The clusters which can quickly introduce a significant amount of habitat in areas previously void of underwater structures - are expected to pay dividends for

decades to come. There are currently more than 2,000 cubes attracting fish in KDWPT-managed waters, with more being added every year. Anglers can obtain precise GPS coordinates for every cube/cluster at ksoutdoors.com/Fishing/Fishing-Reports.

Financing, constructing and placing the cubes wouldn't have been possible without the

support of area bass clubs, lake organizations and even Boy Scout troops interested in improving their local waters.

"B.A.S.S. Nation has been challenging local clubs to get involved in local projects. These cubes are perfect," said Hausler. "They're so easy to build and we can get three or four on a bass boat, take them out and place them. They've been a great way to get anglers involved."

Though highly successful, artificial fish habitat won't completely replace natural structures, as many fisheries biologists still see benefits in sinking cedar brush piles and planting dense water willows in shallow areas.

But the progressive thinking of KDWPT Fisheries staff doesn't stop at habitat. Strides are also being made in the way of revitalizing forage fish populations in lakes and reservoirs in need. Threadfin shad have been successfully introduced at Horsethief Reservoir instead of common gizzard shad, a species which could have quickly overpopulated the 450-acre lake.

Rep. Marshall encourages advances in weather forecasting Subcommittee, heard testimo-

Accurate and timely weather forecasts are essential for the long-term success of Kansas farmers and ranchers. As ranking member of the Environment Subcommittee of the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology, U.S. Rep. Roger Marshall, M.D. has continued to advocate for advances in weather modeling and predictions, including partnerships with the private sector to ensure the U.S. remains at the forefront of fore-

"The impacts of severe weather events across this country have made it clear that the U.S. must continue to advance its work in this area potentially changing the way it models and predicts severe weather and natural disasters," said Marshall. "Additionally, more prolonged weather effects, like drought and flooding, can also play a role in the success of many industries, including agriculture. The U.S. has slowly fallen behind other countries in its ability to timely and accurately predict storms and weather events. That's not acceptable for our farmers, who rely on the weather reports to make planting and harvest decisions, nor rural families who need to know when to prepare for severe weather.'

In 2017, Congress passed the Research Forecasting Innovation Act (the Weather Act) and reauthorized the National Integrated Drought Information System. The Weather Act was the first authorizing legislation to address weather forecasting in 25 years and prioritized improving weather data, modeling, computing, and forecasting. The legislation mandated the creation of the Earth Prediction Innovation Center (EPIC) to crowdsource the expertise of the private sector and research communities to improve forecasting models.

Recently, the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology, Environment

ny from experts on the work being done by EPIC and advances in forecasting models. "I am proud of the work

we have done on the Science, Space and Technology Committee to advance our understanding of weather and create public-private partnerships to utilize all available technologies and experts," said Rep. Marshall "The Federal Government should be doing more to utilize the resources of private companies and university researchers, who are often the leading sources of innovations. In addition to having world-class facilities and minds, private companies and academics are extremely flexible in research development and cost-effective in their methods. It is in the best interest of Kansas farmers, ranchers, emergency personnel, and every day residents to have more accurate forecasts."

U.S. pork can reduce overall U.S. trade deficit with China by nearly six percent

Securing zero-tariff access to China for U.S. pork would be an economic boon for American agriculture and the country, according to the National Pork Producers Council (NPPC). Based on an analysis by Iowa State University (ISU) Economist Dermot Hayes, NPPC says unrestricted access to the Chinese chilled and frozen market would reduce the overall trade deficit with China by nearly six percent and generate 184,000 new U.S. jobs in the next decade. NPPC recently launched a digital campaign to spotlight the importance of opening the Chinese market to U.S. pork as trade negotiations

"Were it not for China's tariffs that are severely limiting access to American goods

and other restrictions, including customs clearance delays, U.S. pork could be an economic powerhouse, creating thousands of new jobs, expanding sales and dramatically slashing our nation's trade deficit. China's actions would unleash tremendous benefits to U.S. pork producers, our nation and Chinese consumers who rely on this essential protein," said Haves.

analysis, U.S. pork sales would generate \$24.5 billion in sales if U.S. pork gained unrestricted access to the world's largest pork-producing nation over ten years.

According to Dr. Hayes'

"The U.S. pork industry is missing out on an unprecedented sales opportunity in China when it most needs an

affordable, safe and reliable supply of its favored protein," said NPPC president David Herring, a hog farmer from Lillington, N.C. "The United States is the lowest-cost producer of pork in the world, but with 72 percent tariffs we are not nearly as competitive as Europe, Brazil, Canada and

other nations." Pork is a staple of the Chinese diet and a major element of the country's consumer price index. China's swine herd has been devastated by African swine fever, a disease affecting only pigs and having no human health or food safety risks, reducing domestic production by more than 50 percent and resulting in a mounting food price inflation challenge for the country.

There has been the standard discussion of timely marketing of fed cattle, slaughter weights being modestly behind last year's, packers running substantial fed-cattle

slaughter on Saturdays, and other supply-focused points. What is being discussed less is the strong retailer and, by definition, consumer effects.

Packer margins have been very strong in August, September and likely October, approaching \$500 per head. These are the live-to-wholesale beef price spreads. This value is much higher than other months and much higher than prior year highs. This is, of course, due in part to the plant closure. It is interesting that the live-to-retail price spread has moved little in these same two months. The live-to-retail spread is up only less than 2%-3%. The retailer margin or the wholesale-to-retail spread has declined sharply. Again, the live-to-wholesale spread is up and the live-to-retail spread is even, so it is the retailer who has taken a chunk out of his or her margin.

Where did this go, or what is the retailer paying more for? The boxed-beef composite value increased almost \$30 per hundredweight (cwt.) in a three-week period prior to Labor Day. The cut that was the biggest mover was loin,

increasing \$200 per cwt. The ribeye increased about \$150 per cwt. and remains strong into the rib roast holiday season. Other primal cuts are both positive and negative, so it is the middle meats and steak

cuts that the retailer is driving. Finally, an interesting thing that has yet to be explained is the strength of the Choice-Select spread — the USDA Choice grade premium or the Select grade discount. The Choice-Select spread has normal seasonal strength in spring months and then as Choice supplies increase over summer, the premium normally fades. The Choice-Select spread has yet to show anything other than modest and temporary weakness this year. The spread is currently better than +\$25 per cwt. and has been that way since June. A typical Choice-Select spread for this time of year is much closer to \$10 per cwt. Thus, it is clearly the retailer who has helped the cattle market turn the corner on any pessimism from summer supplies and



Highland staff are on hand to offer advice and help but businesses are independent from the incubator. Kohl said wineries must bring their own grapes and bottles, but they rent the space and equipment.

"They're their own business," Kohl said. "We advise and help as much as we can, but it's their own business."

Highland occupies one of the spaces, and Bodine Wine Co. occupies another.

Bob and Joe Bodine, owners of Bodine Wine Co., worked

on a family farm in Osage County and were looking to diversify their crop. They became interested in wine making and took classes at Highland to learn more about it. Bob said having the resources is helpful as their business gets rolling.

"That's pretty invaluable," Bob said. "It takes away a lot of the risk and fear."

Kohl said he hopes those new, small wineries working closely together will help them grow. He added that having more wineries in the state could also increase tourism.

"We're looking to help the wine industry statewide," Kohl

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Science and Technology Directorate (S&T) and the National Pork Board recently entered into a collaborative agreement to assess potential methods to disinfect and decontaminate surfaces from African Swine Fever (ASF) virus. As a proactive mea-

sure to address the spread of ASF virus occurring now in other parts of the world, scientists at S&T's Plum Island Animal Disease Center (PIADC) will evaluate commercial disinfectants and methods to decontaminate porous and non-porous surfaces typically associated with swine production fa-

cilities.

The research will be conducted through a funded cooperative research and development agreement (CRADA) between S&T PIADC and the National Pork Board, a program funded by pork producers and sponsored by the USDA. This is part of the work being done by an interagency ASF Task Force to develop vaccines, improve diagnostic tests and disinfectant testing for this emerging disease threat.

The funded CRADA with the National Pork Board allows DHS to leverage an important cooperative partnership to execute its mission effectively. Today, ASF poses the greatest threat to America's swine industry, which is the largest pork exporter in the world with a market valued at \$24 billion

"America's pig farmers continue to invest in seeking ways to keep ASF and other foreign animal diseases out of this country by partnering

neysuck struggle. Cut stump and basal

While it often flies under the radar as an invasive species, Asian bush honeysuckle has become a big nuisance in many woodland stands, road ditches, and even some pastures - not to mention the landscapes where it likely got its start. Along the way, it's having a huge negative impact on wildlife habitat and forage

It's pretty easy to spot right now. Wild bush. Bright red berries clustered around the stem. Leaves are still a bright green color. Can range in height from six to 20 feet tall. Once a predominantly landscape shrub, it has spread far and wide, and has become a serious understory invasive

from eastern Kansas to Ohio. Why do they do so well here? For starters, they put out leaves much earlier than most other trees and shrubs,

giving them a competitive advantage for resources to start the growing season. They also have leaves that stay green much later into the fall. This long growing season gives them a competitive advantage over other native species, and the vigorous growth can take over a woodland understory, reducing the number of native woodland wildflowers and other shrubs.

If you are attempting to promote native tree species in your property, you will no doubt run into bush honeysuckle as a 'weedy' species. Control will be important.

Honeysuckle seedlings can be readily hand pulled when the soil is damp, though the extensive growth system will likely make it overwhelming unless stands are just getting started. Chemical control is needed for larger infestations since cutting alone results in vigorous resprouting. Foliar applications of glyphosate (i.e., Roundup) in late summer



Determining pasture lease rates and By Wendie Powell, livestock Having a written contract, with

production agent, Wildcat

Extension district Perhaps the most popular

question I receive throughout the year involves pasture leasing. Land is changing hands, landowners and tenants want to make sure they have up to date information to leasing arrangements, and frankly, there's a lot of money that can be tied up in these situations. Setting pasture rent on a

per-acre basis or a share of gain basis gives an incentive to the livestock owner to stock heavily. The landowner, on the other hand, may desire light stocking rates in order to preserve pasture quality. It is in the interest of both parties to develop a lease agreement that achieves maximum economic returns to all resources while maintaining the grass stand and quality.

When a landowner and tenant are making arrangements for a pasture lease, there a few things to keep in mind.

an ending date, will help tremendously to keep everyone on the same page; and if one party becomes unavailable to carry out the contract, then family members can be clear on what the expectations were. The ending date is important because it gives the landowner and tenant a set time to review the contract and either go their separate ways, or renew the agreement. Furthermore, it's advisable to do a pasture walk so both parties are aware of what is in the pasture as far as forage quality, junk that may have accumulated, fence conditions and other such factors.

When writing the contract be sure to include which party will be responsible for maintaining the fences and watering systems. Write down who will be providing care for the livestock, who will be monitoring the pasture condition, etc. There are sample contracts available at each Extension office for your use.

Determining rental rates is

not an exact science. Local demand and supply conditions, anticipated market conditions and even long-standing working relationships can have some bearing on rental rate negotiations. Other influences on rate is forage quality, stocking rate and length of grazing season.

There are a few tools that you can utilize to determine the proper leasing arrangement. K-State Research and Extension conducts surveys across the state to collect leasing information. Rental rates are surveyed, and broken out by forage type. Lease agreement practices are explored. Additionally, there is a decision tool offered to determine the value of your exact situation. Your local county Extension agents are available to do field visits and talk with you one on one

Service (ERS) publishes state-level export statistics of selected commodities based on farm cash-receipts data. The statistics are reported annually from 2000 through 2018 on a value basis. In 2018, U.S. ex-

reported to be more than \$30 billion. Iowa was the top exporter of animal products at \$3.4 billion followed by Texas at \$2.1 billion and California at \$1.9 billion.

Nebraska led all states in

beef export value at \$1.3 billion followed closely by Texas and Kansas at \$1.1 and \$1.0 billion, respectively. These three states accounted for approximately 40% of U.S. beef export value which was \$8.5 billion in 2018, according to the ERS data. The pork export value was reported at \$6.4 billion for 2018. More than 58% of the pork export value was from Iowa (\$2.3 bill.), Minnesota (\$0.8 bill.), and North Carolina (\$0.6 bill.). Iowa has long been the leader in pork export value and in 2018 the

state captured 36% of the total. Over half of the \$3.2 billion broiler export value is from four states: Georgia (\$453 mill.), Arkansas (\$406 mill.), North Carolina (\$383 mill.),
