Kansans are encouraged to 'Plant a Row for the Hungry'

Garden centers and discount stores are busy with shoppers buying vegetable seeds and plants and the Sedgwick County. Extension Master Gardeners are encouraging Kansans to plant a little extra when they plan their gardens.

The annual Plant a Row for the Hungry campaign kicks off its 11th season in Sedgwick County during the month of April, said Rebecca McMahon, Sedgwick County horticulture Extension agent. "When you plan your garden this year, please join the thousands of gardeners who Plant a Row for the Hungry," said McMahon, who added: "There is no typical hungry person. Rather, he or she looks like all of us and is usually someone who, due to some unforeseen events, finds himself or herself needing help. Hunger affects us all, prompting health problems and deteriorating productivity."

The cooperative effort between Sedgwick County Extension Master Gardeners, a program of K-State Research and Extension, and the Kansas Food Bank is making it possible for the individual home gardener to make a tremendous impact on the widespread hunger problem in Kansas, she said. During the growing season, the Kansas Food Bank will pick up donated produce from local garden centers, which have volunteered to serve as drop-off sites. The produce is then distributed to local soup kitchens and church pantries. The effort in Sedgwick County grew from a national Plant a Row for the Hungry project begun in 1995 by the Garden Writers Asso-

McMahon said that local food agencies are often the only hope some people have to put food on the table for themselves and their children. By donating produce directly to the Kansas Food Bank, gardeners help organizations and their patrons stretch their meager resources.

"In the last ten years, gardeners from Sedgwick County and the surrounding area have donated 232,894 pounds of produce to the Kansas Food Bank," McMahon said. "Many gardeners grow more than they can consume. Instead of sneaking a sack of zucchini squash into your neighbor's unlocked car, take it to one of the following drop off-sites closest to you."

"Plant a Row for the Hungry is rooted in the tradition of sharing a bountiful garden harvest with others," McMahon said. "This incredible program offers a way for those who love to grow vegetables, fruits, herbs and even flowers to have an instant, effect on the persistent problem of hunger in Kansas. One pound at a time . . . one row at a time. Together, we make a difference."

New cattle-on-feed report confirms tight cattle supplies

There is no doubt that the latest USDA Cattle on Feed report will cause a market reaction. After four months of lower placements, year over year, the trade was expecting a large increase in feedlot placements in March.

The recent run up in feeder cattle prices suggests that demand for feeder cattle has been strong and a couple of months of limited feedlot profitability (after many months of losses) provided the motive. However, there was a wide variation in regional placement patterns and the resulting average was not only lower than expected but lower than the lowest pre-report estimate.

The industry was keyed in on large placements in Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska which were heavily offset by reduced placements in Texas and Oklahoma. The resulting level of 103 percent of 2009 March placements does not even cover the fact that there was an additional business day in March. In short, there was no increase in March placements this year.

Marketings were close to pre-report estimates at 104 percent of last year, again only holding steady when adjusted for the additional March slaughter day this year. The April 1 on-feed total 10.769 million head, down four percent from one year ago. This is the lowest April 1 on-feed total since 2004.

Feedlot placements have relatively little to do with current fed cattle markets (which are strong for other reasons) but lots to do with fed cattle markets in the future. Not only was the level of placements lower than expected but most of the increase was in light weight

feeders that will finish in September and October. This should moderate some of the concerns about summer market pressure.

Obviously we are still assessing beef demand recovery but it appears that supply fundamentals have a lot of momentum going forward. Having said that, there will likely be some relative increase in placements April and May with cattle coming off of grazeout wheat.

If it has any impacts it will be in short term timing of marketings in the fourth quarter but it does not change the fact that total feeder supplies are and will remain very tight.

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Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The natural gas market took out last week's high and challenged the April high on Friday. While the market has not posted consistent, strong gains, it also hasn't made a new low since April 1st. It looks more and more like there is more upside risk in the natural gas than down-

Friday's commitment of traders report showed that Index funds held a record large net long position in the corn. Investors continue to put vast sums of money into commodity markets. Rising metal and energy prices attract investors and a portion of that money ends up supporting the grain and livestock markets. There is so sign that this trend is near an

The corn market was choppy last week with sharp drops on Monday and Friday and gains in between. The July corn ended up losing 13 cents for the week and the December contract lost 16. Looking at the charts, the corn is still stuck in a sideways trading pattern. Two weeks ago the December corn finished at the 50-day moving average resistance, last week it finished at the bottom of the trading range. From a technical perspective it is very important that last week's lows hold. Otherwise the market will continue its grind down to the September lows.

There was a little bit of bull spreading in the corn market, which is a positive

sign for prices. It indicates that the recent improvement in exports is having an impact on the market. Gulf basis is also on the rise, which is another symptom of improved exports. Last week's total came in at 1.48 MMT, which was the best week since mid January and the 3rd best week of the year. It was also the 3rd consecutive week of 1 MMT, which we haven't seen for ages. A few more weeks of numbers like this and USDA will have to raise the export esti-

China is still in the news as a potential importer. There hasn't been any business yet, but more and more analysts agree that China will probably have to buy corn this summer. That is encouraging other importers to buy now to avoid the competition later in the year.

Planting progress is going very well, which is a little bit negative to the market. Monday's planting progress figure probably won't make it to 50%, but it will be well over 40% complete. There will be some wet weather this week that slows progress, but it doesn't look like planting delays will be an issue this year.

After a terrible start to the week, the July KW climbed back, reached the highest level since early March, and made four consecutive closes above the 50-day moving average. The July KW finished the week ¼ cent lower due to Friday's weakness,

but overall the chart pattern looks friendly. Eventually the July KW will reach the trend line resistance at the \$5.30 area.

Fundamentally, there still isn't much to say about the wheat market that is positive. Old crop export sales were terrible at 166,400 MT, but at least there were 198,300 MT of new crop sales. Despite the lack of fundamental reasons to be a buyer trading funds have liquidated a number of short positions and Index fund net long positions are growing slowly. So, supply and demand is still negative, but money flow is positive, and it is money flow that wins in

The soybeans had a good week. The July contract gained 15 cents for the week and the November picked up 13 1/2, so there was a little bit of bull spreading this week.Export sales were good again at 308,600 MT for the old crop and 60,000 MT for the new crop. With 19 weeks left in the crop year we have already shipped out more soybeans than ever before. This week we will see very large new crop numbers in the report since the Chinese were very active securing new crop supplies.

On the charts the soybeans are a overbought and due for some corrective activity, but the move through the 50% retracement this week suggests that we will at least see a test of the 62% retracement, which is at \$10.26 in the July contract, in the near future. Due to the strong old crop demand, traders are still not certain how much supply will be left at the end of the crop year, therefore as long as the demand stays strong, the beans can keep grinding higher.

The June LC were slightly higher for the week despite Friday's sharp break. From a technical perspective the failure to make new highs this week and the outside day down look negative. However, the cattle on feed report was positive with only 96% on feed, 103% placed, and 104% marketed. Those numbers are supportive in the long run and the beef market hasn't broken, so it is hard to be negative.

Cattle market rally due to tight supplies, improved consumer demand

Fed cattle prices touched a \$1 a pound the first week in April, signaling strength in all facets of the cattle market as well as improving consumer demand, according to a Texas AgriLIfe Extension Service livestock and food products

"In mid-February, prices were in the low-to-mid 80s, but now our supply situation has set us back up to a \$1 and it appears it may be sustained for a little while," said Dr. David Anderson, AgriLife Extension economist. "As of Tuesday (April 8), we're seeing a lot of movement on the demand side. Part of what we're seeing is a seasonal increase in prices, but stronger. It's lasting longer than nor-

Fed cattle prices at a \$1 per pound or \$100 per hundredweight "has been a relatively rare event," Anderson noted in his recently weekly cattle market comment report.

Anderson said there's indication that consumer demand is picking up due to the activity in the wholesale market.

'We're seeing consumers increasing purchases of middle cuts of beef, so we're seeing a trading up of purchasing," he said. "I think that's an indication that consumers may be starting to feel somewhat more comfortable when it comes to grocery purchases, and so far that seems to be sustaining from what we're seeing with the wholesale market activity.'

On the supply side, cattle producers have been reducing cow herds as a result of sharp input increases and the Texas drought, Anderson said.

"Texas especially cut cow numbers due to the drought," Anderson said. "What we can expect is to see some producers think about restocking herds as there is more talk about a rally in the calf market."

"Higher calf prices encourage people to reinvest in their operations," he said. "However, we continue to cull cows at a fast clip. Why? There's been so much demand on the consumer side for ground beef purchases that the cull cow market has been very attractive."

The biggest risk in the current market is the future of calf prices and prices paid for corn, Anderson said. If ample rains hit the corn — growing regions of the U.S., supplies will be ample to fulfill both livestock and ethanol demands.

"We need good timely rains to produce a good crop," he said. "For several years now we've had good growing conditions. Another thing is we need the economy to continue to recover to keep beef demand going up."

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onservation service marks 75th anniversary

By Eric B. Banks, **State Conservationist** On April 27, 2010, the

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will celebrate its 75th anniversary Hugh Hammond Bennett

is considered the "father of conservation" and was passionate about soil conservation. He worked tirelessly to have the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) established. His mantra was "If you take care of the soil, the soil will take care of you."

In 1935, it was his vision that soil conservationists would work with farmers and ranchers to take care of the soil and that they would walk together across their private lands and determine what was best. Their voluntary decision of how to protect the land was the farmers and ranchers to make. Voluntary decision making remains true to this day.

Bennett lived when almost everyone had a relationship with the soil producing food and fiber. Today, according to the 2007 Agricultural Census, the number of producers has dwindled to less than 2 percent of the population of the United States (US).

Hopefully, you will take time to reflect and celebrate the protection of your natural resources affords you. The timeline below will provide you with progression of accomplishments of Kansas soil and water conservation. The next time you travel a highway or country road, take time to look across the Kansas landscape, noticing the land with terraced fields,

grassed waterways, acres planted to native grass through the Conservation Reserve Program, field and farmstead windbreaks, no -

tilled fields, watershed dams. You may be able to make a connection to the past 75 years when soil conservation organizations, programs, or projects became important to taking care of the land in Kansas, and why Kansas remains a leader in getting conservation on the ground.

History of the Natural Resources Conservation Service in Kansas — 1920 to 2010

•1920 — Hugh Hammond Bennett, later named father of the soil conservation movement, lectured on the dangers of soil erosion. Some farsighted farmers in eastern Kansas built terraces in an attempt to check erosion. A severe and sustained drought period started followed by huge dust storms and the Depression.

•1933, April 5 — Civil Conservation Corps (CCC) established.

•September 19 — The Soil Erosion Service began operation in the U.S. Department of Interior with Hugh Hammond Bennett as director and first employee.

•1934, May 11 — First major dust storm originated in the Great Plains followed by several massive storms.

•April 14 — Black Sunday declared the worst storm of the Dust Bowl days.

•1935, April 27 — Congress established the SCS as an agency in the U.S. Department of Agriculture with Hugh Hammond Bennett, as its first chief.

•1935 — 1942 — PrairieStates Forestry Projects (shelterbelt and shrub plantings) underway.

•December 2 — Central Great Plains Region office was established with headquarters tentatively designated as Wichita (later made permanent in Salina).

•1936 — Nursery was established at Manhattan, Kansas, now known as the Manhattan Plant Materials Center (PMC) which was established as of July 1, 1953.

•June 22 — Flood Control Act was enacted to develop measures to retard water flow and prevent soil erosion in selected water-

•1937, February — President Franklin Roosevelt sent letter to all state governors urging each state to set up soil conservation districts.

•March 25 - Kansas Governor signed into law a bill creating conservation

•April 10 — State Soil Conservation Commission (in 1972 renamed State Conservation Commission) was established to protect and enhance Kansas' natural resources.

•1938, June 22 — State of Kansas approved Labette County as first conservation district in Kansas. (Shawnee County Conservation District was the last county conservation district to be established in 1954.)

•June 29 — First Kansas CCC camp opened at Parsons — 33 CCC camps were established in Kansas.

•November 16 — First SCS employee arrived in Labette County to assist farm-

•December 29 — Pete Benson signed up as the first cooperating farmer with the Labette County Conservation District and in the state.

•1942 - SCS state offices established in each state. Salina was chosen as location for the Kansas State Office.

•1944 — Kansas Association of Conservation Districts (KACD) formed to help advance the soil and water conservation cause.

•1951 - Kansas Land Improvement Contractors Association (KLICA) organ-

•1952, November 15 — Soil survey activities became responsibility of SCS. (In 1899, Congress authorized soil survey program and established National Cooperation Soil Survey. In 1904, first soil survey completed in Allen County.)

Legislation introduced to protect management practice

duced legislation recentlyy, H.R. 5118, the Flint Hills Preservation Act, to protect the ability of landowners in the Flint Hills to use prescribed fire as a tool to preserve the tallgrass prairie ecosystem

The Flint Hills region of Kansas and Oklahoma contains the world's largest share of remaining tallgrass prairie, and is the only place where that habitat exists in landscape proportions. Only four percent of North America's presettlement tallgrass prairie survives to this day, and 80 percent is located in Kansas.

Each year, ranchers, landowners and conservation groups use prescribed fires to mimic the seasonal fires that have shaped the

sands of years. Prescribed burning is an essential management practice for protecting the ecosystem, enhancing grazing land and reducing the chances of destructive wildfires such as those in California and other states. Prescribed burning is also an important component in ranchland management. It helps ranchers keep pastures free from invasive species, like eastern red cedars, and leads to higher quality grass that increases weight gain in their cattle.

Last year, a condensed timeframe for grassland burning caused heightened air quality readings in Kansas City and Wichita. As a result, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is seeking to regulate how

and when landowners can burn in the Flint Hills region by asking the state of Kansas to develop a smoke management plan. H.R. 5118 recognizes that prescribed fires are a necessary and natural phenomena. It exempts landowners and local governments from EPA enforcement of Clean Air Act standards, if the enforcement action is attributed to smoke from prescribed fires in the Flint Hills region.

"The Flint Hills region is one of the last contiguous stretches of the tallgrass prairie in the United States. It is disappointing that the EPA would try to disrupt a vital management tool like prescribed fires," said Moran. "This legislation will allow landowners to preserve a unique

scribed burning around the forces of weather and other factors impacting safe conditions, without worrying about a schedule dictated by some EPA bureaucrat in Washington.'

"We applaud Congressman Moran's initiative to correct a flaw in the Clean Air Act with this legislation," said Kansas Livestock Association President Mark Smith. "Prescribed burning in the Flint Hills is a proven, economical tool that protects and enhances the tallgrass prairie. Smoke that results from this practice should not cause regulatory compliance problems for our urban neighbors."

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
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

Farmers with arthritis can learn to work with

Forty-six million Americans suffer some form of arthritis, according to the National Arthritis Data Workgroup. Many aging farmers continue to farm well into their 70s, making them more affected by arthritis than most workers.

"Farm work is constant bending, twisting and lifting. Many farmers also

stress at times like planting and harvesting. That is why it is important for farm families to learn the psychological, emotional and physical impact of arthritis on their lives," said Karen Funkenbusch, a University of Missouri Extension safety specialist and coordinator of the Missouri AgrAbility

work long hours under Project, which helps agricultural workers with disabilities adapt their homes and farms to allow them to continue working.

> May is National Arthritis Month and spring is a good time for families with a member suffering from arthritis to keep in mind operational limitations imposed by chronic joint

symptoms, Funkenbusch said.

"Reduced mobility and reaction time may result in injury for machine operators. Reduced endurance may also put farm workers at risk as they push their limits," she said.

Methods to help control joint stress and pain can be as simple as wearing quality, non-slip footwear or using appropriate assistive aids.

Other ways farmers can reduce the risk of injury and strain while staying productive:

Use the largest joint possible to complete a task.

Maintain proper posture when sitting on a tractor for a long time.

Avoid gripping and grasping for extended periods.

Simplify tasks and pace the amount of working time throughout the day.



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Yard & Garden Tips By Gregg Eyestone

There is nothing that compares to the taste of locally grown sweet corn. Sweet corn is easy to grow if you have the room. Seeds should be planted 8 to 12 inches apart in rows at least 3 feet apart. Closer spacing only produces weak, spindly and unproductive stalks.

Sweet corn is loved by many. There are a few pests to contend for the sweet kernels. Earworms may be treated with insecticides.

Personally, I have never done it and have learned to share

Raccoons and squirrels have affection for the sweet stuff. The family dog was chasing the squirrel and we haven't had a raccoon issue the past few seasons. Places with excessive pressure from racoons may find that electric fencing may be required.

There are basically three levels of sugar content in different varieties. Normal and sugar enhanced types can be planted now. The super sweet corn varieties that have the Sh-2 or shrunken -2 gene need warm soil which is typically not until May.

Corn is planted in short blocks for good pollination and successive plantings when the corn is an inch tall is recommended.

Extension Master Gardeners have the opportunity to trial five varieties this summer. Three varieties which are Miracle, Chippawa and Navajo are SE or the sugar enhanced

There is one super sweet variety that needs to be isolated from the others or planted so that it is tasseling when the others are not to prevent cross pollinating. Revelation is a variety that has both super sweet and sugar enhanced genes.

We will see how these compare with our family's favorite variety -the bicolor Ambrosia.

Bodacious is the yellow kernel sister to Ambrosia. A few other suggested varieties are Delectable, Argent, Silver King, Incredible, Miracle and Kandy Korn All of these are SE or have the sugar enhanced

To get a good crop of corn it needs water and nitrogen. An application of mostly nitrogen is applied along the row of corn every several weeks. The fertilizer should be watered in. Make sure the corn gets an inch of water a week by rainfall or irrigation.

Too many morels? Freeze for later

Lucky mushroom hunters who have bagged more fungi than they can eat can freeze some for later, said a University of Missouri Extension nutrition specialist.

"It's best to freeze the extras the same day you picked them, not several days later when you haven't had time to use them," said Janet Hackert.

First, you need to clean them. "Wild mushrooms tend to have lots of tiny insects in all those cracks and crevices," she said.

To clean, rinse in salt water, changing the water several times to draw out the bugs. Remove clean mushrooms promptly; soaking mushrooms too long can dilute the flavor.

For freezing, use small to medium mushrooms. You can quarter, slice or leave them whole. Prepare mushrooms by blanching, steaming or sautéing to inactivate enzymes that can cause color and texture to deterio-

To blanch, place mushrooms in boiling water mixed with either 1 teaspoon lemon juice or 1 1/2 teaspoons citric acid for each pint of water. Boil slices for 3 minutes, quarters and buttons for 3 1/2 minutes, and whole mushrooms for 5 minutes.

To steam, first dip mushrooms for 5 minutes in water with the same proportion of lemon juice or citric acid as used for blanching. Steam pieces or whole mushrooms for the same amount of time you would blanch them.

To sauté, heat small amounts in butter or oil until almost done.

After blanching, steaming or sautéing, immediately cool the mushrooms in ice water and drain well.

You can freeze them plain or breaded. Breadings include flour, a mixture of corn and flour, and breadcrumbs. Eggs, milk or water

half inch of space at the top. "For best flavor, use within one to two months," Hackert said.



Workshop studied ways to improve profits to farms

"Here in Eastern Kansas, we're blessed with the amount of forages we can grow-and we have to work to select the forages we can use," explained Gary Kilgore. Professor Emeritus. Kansas State University, at a recent "Improving Livestock Production Workshop" workshop in Frankfort.

"Match the system to the animal," he said. "Your goal as a livestock person is to match the requirements of the animal to the available forage."

Kilgore suggested selecting forages "best adapted to your farm's soil and climate." He said an effectively managed forage-based system is cheaper than putting up hay. "Grazing is lesscostly if the nutritional needs of your animal are met." He said a producer should utilize both warm and cool season grasses as well as the method of stockpiling forages to meet the animals' requirements yearround.

The result, he explained, is good animal performance and improved water quality due to adequate ground cover to control erosion and trap nutrients. "Think about the water quality aspect there is no better protection

Over 50 people attended the "Improving Livestock Production Workshop" on April 13, which was sponsored by Middle Kansas Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategy (WRAPS); Tuttle Creek WRAPS; Kansas State University Research and Extension: Jackson and Pottawatomie County Conservation Districts, and the Kansas Rural Center.

Dale Kirkham, field organizer with the Kansas Rural Center's Clean Water Farms Project (CWFP) referred to the evening's catered meal and asked if cows were being catered. "Are we going to cater to their needs?" he asked. "Let four legs and a rumen do the harvesting," Kirkham suggested. He said the cow's rumen is designed to graze and break down fibrous materials.

Kirkham said a producer should think of ways to make a positive impact on the landscape while improving herd production and health. He said allowing the animals to graze year-round improves herd health by avoiding reduced gain due to mud: reduces occurrence of scours, and reduced stable fly population. It also

controlling erosion and compaction, and distributing minerals across the landscape, he said. Jason Schmidt, CWFP field organizer, explained the services available through the Kansas Rural Center in connection with WRAPS. He said the components of the CWFP include: the River Friendly Farm Plan (RFFP) Environmental Assessment; limited cost-share funding, and grazing information and education.

According to Schmidt, the RFFP, which is voluntary and confidential, helps a farmer establish priorities on the farm. "It helps you decide what to tackle first." he said. He said the CWFP can also connect producers with technical assistance to implement best management practices (BMPs) which improve water quali-

Barbara Donovan, Coordinator of the Tuttle Creek WRAPS, explained the WRAPS program is a volunteer program that works with residents "to protect our water and soil." She said a cost-share program is currently available to residents of the watershed with an extended deadline of

For more information on the cost-share program, please contact Donovan at 651-247-8292 or email her at donovanmn@aol.com. Will Boyer, Watershed Specialist with Kansas University Research and Extension, said it is important to the bottom line of an operation to have an adequate supply of clean drinking water. "Reduced water consumption equals reduced feed consumption," he said. "I'm not telling you to fence your streams out, instead look at developing another water source," he said. He said, if possible, one should develop a water source in an underutilized portion of the pasture. Boyer also urged graziers to think about ways to improve grazing distribution in a pasture by strategic placement of mineral feeders, fly rub or gates.

Dr. Larry Hollis, Extension Beef Veterinarian with Kansas State University, presented a spring health calendar for cattle herdsincluded are pre-breeding shots that build immunity to prevent Lepto-Vibrio, abortions and non-bred cows, as well as protection from scours in newborn calves.

Hollis prefers modified vaccine over killed for improved immunity; as long as the cows are not pregnant when the vaccine is administered. Calves should be vaccinated, dehorned, and

He also suggested marking cows that are in poor body condition, weaning their calves early and culling them from the herd.

"This saves bull power," he said. Hollis said to use caution when buying used bulls due

to trichomoniasis or "trich". Trich is a venereal disease in cattle that causes infertility and may cause cows to abort. He said many states require testing for trich when importing an out-ofstate bull, however Kansas does not. Hollis suggested talking to a veterinarian about the history of the bull to see if testing for the disease is necessary.

Hollis also provided suggestions for marketing "value-added" cattle. Hollis said to start with the end in mind. He said to ask: "What do customers want to buy?" He suggested adding value to your calves by using better genetics; a uniform breed type, and a shorter breeding season to develop a group of calves that are uniform in color, size and build. He said cattle buyers are willing to pay a premium for calves that look like "peas in a pod."

Hollis also suggested maintaining health records and weaning calves well ahead of the sale date as he said buyers are willing to pay a premium for healthy, weaned cattle that are broke to a waterer and

According to KRC's Mary Howell, CWFP field organizer, who organized the program, producers from seven Kansas watersheds and two other states were in attendance. "Extending the grazing season improves water quality-which results in increased herd performance and health. In the end, it all translates into improved livestock production and ties directly into the producer's bottom line," Howell

Financial support for the program came from the Kansas Rural Center via the Kansas Department of Health and Environment with U.S. EPA 319 Funds, with other support from the Jackson and Pottawatomie County Conservation Districts, and Middle Kansas and Tuttle Creek WRAPS.

Struggles with hiring help

Dr. Farmer, I know hiring and keeping employees is a widespread problem. I feel if I don't take action on this right away the outcome could be disastrous finan*cially* — *both physically and* mentally on me.

With the size of our operation I can't run it alone. Yet when I have an employee that I am depending on and he abruptly walks out on me I am in big trouble right now! Our last two employees worked five to six months and then abruptly left.

am outlining what I consider to be reasonable practices I use as an employer of farm laborers. Why are we having so much trouble dealing with and keeping employees? What am I missing? - a farmer from Illi-

I am honest with my employees and expect them to be honest with me.

I make it a point to stay completely out of their personal lives and respect their privacy and property.

I am open to their suggestions and comments. I don't tell an employee to do some-

thing, I always ask them to do something.

In the right situation I give them a choice of jobs and let them know that I have no problem taking the most difficult or dirty job.

I try to make employees feel they are part of a team. I share information with them, take them on field trips, and try to help them feel they are an important part of the operation.

I always give an employee the benefit of the doubt, even if they look me straight in the eye and tell me what I am pretty sure is a lie.

If an employee and I have a major disagreement, I tell them we will go sit down, have a cup of coffee and talk. We will have no shouting matches in the barn yard. I stress this when I hire

When I have to discipline an employee, before I confront the person I think to myself, "I can make this a constructive conversation or a destructive conversation." I try to be as calm as possible before starting this type of conversation. Most of my instructions, in order to be very clear, are written and also in verbal form.

I try to remain flexible and give people time off when they have things they need to do. I tell them to let me know as far in advance as possible. I expect an employee to be to work on time and if they have a problem being on time they need to call and let me know they

are going to be late. I stress safety at all times. I have never had an employee injured or hurt.

I always refer to an employee as an employee, not as a hired hand.

I try to set a good example of how I want things done. I try to spend an adequate, but not excessive, amount of time training

I think an employee must be responsible for their actions.

Dr. Farmer's answer. This seems like a pretty good list to me. It is not obvious what might be causing the difficulty in retaining employees.

What might be missing from this list is helping the employee feel connected to the farm by describing the overall management philosophy and farm goals from the outset.

The basics need to be done the owner's way. The reason management philosophy is so important is that it underlies the owner/ operator's favored explanation for success. When familv members and/or emplovees violate these principles it causes irritation or anger and sets the stage for ongoing conflict until there is coherence to the operator's basic goals and methods.

Don't be rigid with methods. Members and employees of the family business need to be on board with the overall principles and need leeway when it comes to methods and creative thinking when it comes to achieving farm goals. Not everything is a basic principle, some things are preferences especially when it comes to methods.

An owner/operator who dictates methods will eventually stifle the thinking, creativity and management perspective of employees/family members who need to be self-directed and to trouble-shoot problems with good judgment as they

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." When hiring and training employees, owner/operators who review their management philosophy and put it in proper perspective avoid bringing people into the operation who are hell bent on doing things their way. Also by emphasizing what is really important at the outset, it saves a whole lot of piecemeal explanations, especially after mistakes happen.

Recognition is worth about as much as money. Employees and family members need to feel important and that their work is appreciated. Comments about a job "well done" mean a lot. Building a team feeling and encouraging pride in the work helps with overall morale.

What management ideas work for you when dealing with employees and family members who are just joining your operation? How do you train them? How are mistakes handled? What guidelines do you have for hiring the right people?
