Contributors in this year's Bake and Take month went above and beyond the norm in their efforts to celebrate the rewards of home baking with friends and family.

Bake and Take month is an invitation for home bakers of all ages to embrace the community spirit of baking. Participants in the annual event use their culinary skills to share baked goods with neighbors, friends, or people who may not be able to bake for themselves.

Pratt County 4-H members learned basic kitchen skills while baking cookies and cupcakes to take to local 4-H supporting business and cooked lunch for another local 4-H group. Other participants took food to housebound neighbors, senior citizens and

busy young couples. One contributor took it upon herself to use her baking skills to help show condolences to families who had lost loved ones.

Mardi Traskowsky of the L Prospecta 4-H club in Dickinson County was the winner of the Bake and Take drawing. Mardi hosted a snow and ice party for friends and family. She baked cinnamon rolls and French bread for the group to enjoy and helped her mother provide a meal. Mardi says her favorite person to take baked goods to is her grandfather, and she is always happy to add in some sand plum jelly with the bread takes.

As our drawing winner, Mardi receives a book basket featuring the Home Baking Association's popular "Baking with Friends" cookbook by Kansas authors Charlene Patton and Sharon Davis. Other books featured in the package include: "Exploring Plants," a Kansas Crop Educators' Guide sponsored by the Kansas Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom; "Celebrate Wheat," a Kailey's Ag Adventure book from the Kansas Farm Bureau: and the Kansas Wheat Commission's "Kansas Gold," book, a 50year history of the Kansas Wheat Commission complete with historical recipes.

Bake and Take Day started as a community service project of the Kansas Wheathearts in 1970. The Kansas Wheathearts, an auxiliary organization of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, set out to generate goodwill in their communities by sharing baked goods with family, friends, neighbors, and those in need. This idea

became so successful that the Kansas Wheathearts created a nationwide Bake and Take Day in 1973. Even though the Kansas Wheathearts disbanded in 2001, the tradition continues to be supported by the Kansas Wheat Commission and Kansas Association of Wheat Growers.

For some, this effort has grown to something more than just a community service project. Betty L. Legge, a participant from Topeka, shared how contributing to Bake and Take Month brings light into the lives of others. Since her retirement she refuses to limit her Bake and Take endeavors to just one month a year.

"I have heard the saying 'You bring your own weather to the picnic'," she says. "So taking baked goods to friends, neighbors, and family makes most of my days sunny."

Prairie Ponderings

I just love it when my husband makes a great decision that I get to come along years later and take at least 50% credit for simply by virtue of being married to him. When our kids were young, he brought home their very first bucket calves. They named them, fed them, groomed them, played with them and in general, fell in love with them. Then they showed them at the fair and when the time came, sold them. There was no shortage of tears that day from everyone, including my husband and I.

Within that process, as well as with the many bucket calves that followed through the years, more life lessons were learned than I ever would have imagined. The kids learned very quickly that the calves got breakfast before they did. I learned that if I didn't set the alarm a good 45 minutes earlier, everyone would miss the bus and I would have to drive them to school.

They figured out how to feed multiple calves at a time, and I learned that if I didn't hold onto the bottle tightly while manipulating the stiff rubber nipple onto it, it would fly out of my hand and spew warm milk replacer all over the place.

I learned that if I wanted them to remember to bring the bottles in after feedings, I had to stop reminding them and let them scrub a few themselves. They learned that it's much harder to scrub off dried milk replacer than to wash a freshly-fed bottle.

They learned that sometimes, no matter how hard you work at it, a calf will get sick and die. I learned that a bathtub can double as a calf infirmary and that a little boy's first broken heart can come from losing a bovine buddy.

When our youngest daughter was in high school, she and her dad



I don't know what it is; maybe it is age, or maybe things do get harder each year (blame it on climate change, the sequestration, partisan politics or the designated hitter) especially in the spring. This year I was more relieved than ever to get the cows out to grass. The rain was very welcome and the ponds and grass look far better than I thought they would at this point. It will take me at least a year to complain about rain and moisture, but this was a hard couple of weeks.

That is why I lingered and watched for just a little while as the last couple of cows stepped off of the trailer and stuck their heads straight down into the grass. To be honest, I think they were just as relieved as I was. Very few things in this world are as satisfying to me as soaking up the warm sunshine on a spring day and watching the cows graze new grass.

The other thing I find relaxing this time of the year is to get back to our working facility and just enjoy the silence. Only an hour or so ago, this same location was a bustling place with cows and calves. It was so loud that phone calls were either missed because we didn't hear the ring or intentionally missed because we couldn't have heard anything anyway. Now it is complete silence, except for maybe the birds chirping or the wind rustling.

I enjoy that first morning after the cows go to grass realizing that there is no hay to feed or cows to worry about getting out (well, not for a while at least). Sure, there is the picking up, putting up and cleaning up that goes along with being done working cattle, but even that seems to be at a slower, more relaxing pace. Well, most years.

This year was a little different because we still had to finish planting corn. That was another product of the wet, cool April. Again, I am not going to complain about cool springs and especially wet weather. But it did give us a greater sense of urgency to try to get closer to being "caught up." That too passed, a couple of good days and we had the rest of the corn in the ground and life was good.

It is funny how each year is different but somehow things are really the same each year. We stress about getting the cows to grass, and it seems that each year has some sort of obstacle we have to overcome. Maybe it is running short of hay or it is the weather, but there is always a sense of urgency both in the days leading up to working cows and the days we actually haul them to summer grass. Yet, each year the cows end up on pasture despite the challenges.

Planting crops is no different. Each year has its problems. It might be too much rain (that would be nice), too little rain, the temperature isn't right or any one of a million other things that can and do go wrong. Again, we worry and stress over them, and in the end, the crop gets planted each year. It would seem that the worrying did nothing but occupy the hours we could have been sleeping and gray our hair even more.

Why do we worry? I am not at all sure; I guess it is just what we do. What I do know is that as I watch the cows stick their heads into the grass and munch away or as I look down the freshly planted rows of corn, it was all worth it. This time of the year reminds me of how lucky I am. I live in the best place on earth doing a job that I find satisfying. Life does not get any better.

But that moment is fleeting as reality again sets in. The soybeans need to be planted and it is supposed to rain for the next three days. A quick check of the weather shows that the rain chances have decreased. What if the rain knocks us out of the field for a few more days? Or worse yet, what if it doesn't rain anymore this year? So much to worry about and so little

CHIPOTLE BURGERS WITH GUACAMOLE **Burgers:**

- 2 1/2 pounds lean (at least 80%) ground beef
- 4.5-ounce can chopped green chiles
- 3 tablespoons chopped canned chipotle chiles in adobo sauce,
- 8 slices Cheddar or Monterey jack cheese
- 8 burger buns, split
- 2 medium tomatoes, sliced
- Guacamole:
- 2 large avocados (about 1 pound), pitted, peeled & cubed
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 1/4 teaspoon red pepper sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, if desired
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped

Heat gas or charcoal grill. In a large bowl mix beef, green chiles and chipotle chiles. Shape into 8 patties, about 1/2 inch thick. Firmly press thumb into center of each patty, creating a dent to allow more even cooking. In medium bowl, mash guacamole ingredients, using pastry blender or fork. Place patties on grill over medium heat. Cover grill, cook 13 to 15 minutes, turning once, until meat thermometer inserted in center of patties reads 160 degrees. Top each patty with cheese slice; cook just until cheese is melted. To toast buns, place cut sides down on grill during last 1 to 2 minutes of cook time. Layer buns with tomato slices, burgers and guacamole.





The Kansas Cowboy Regiment of the Spanish American War

The citizens of Kansas responded promptly to President William McKinley's call for volunteers when the Spanish-American War was declared. The Twenty-Second Regiment, Kansas Infantry was organized and commanded by Colonel Hugh H. C. Lindsay. Approved by the President, April 22, 1898, the regiment began service May 16, 1898. Lewis Miller was in the regiment and wrote of Company K for a history of Nemaha County. Company K was composed

of young men from eighteen to forty-five years of age. "The great majority were farmer boys, but we had men from the mines. the shops, the mercantile business and a few professional men."

Organized at Seneca, the first camp was on the old fairgrounds in Topeka. The new recruits drilled without arms or uniforms for about thirty days. After one month's training the regiment joined approximately forty thousand troops at Camp Alger, near

Falls Church, Virginia. Most of the troops were National Guardsmen, well equipped with uniforms and Springfield rifles. Word had spread through the camp that the Kansas Cowbov Regiment was coming. "We, in our regular Kansas garb, were a sight for them. They lined up for miles to see and welcome us." Miller wrote, "We had some real cowboys in the regiment, we gave them some real exhibitions of the right way of throwing the rope called the lasso and of fast and efficient revolver shooting. Some of our boys had captured several Kansas coyotes, and we had them with us. So our regiment was the regiment that attracted attention not only of the camp, but for miles around, including Washington, D.C."

After three months of drilling according to the manual of arms, the Kansas boys were a wellequipped and fairly welldrilled regiment. The Kansas Cowboy Regiment was in a brigade made up of the Third New York and the One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Indiana. Both units had previously been National Guard regiments filled with experienced soldiers.

Every effort was made by the men of the Twentysecond Kansas to become as efficient as the Indiana and New York regiments. The men worked hard and by the time training was completed they were ready for a fight with the Spanish. Word was received to be

prepared at any moment to embark for Cuba. All the boys were anxious to go to the front. However, on the morning of the fourth of July, war news went through the camp "like an electric wave." The Spanish fleet under the command of Admiral Pascual Cervera had been destroyed by U. S. Naval Commodore William Schley. The camp was in turmoil. Everyone knew the war would soon be over. "Forty thousand voices were cheering or cursing their

luck of not having had a chance to get into the thick of the fray. Some of the men actually shed tears of disappointment of not having had their fling."

The entire division of ten thousand men, commanded by General Graham, broke camp and marched in the rain to Broad Run Camp in the Thoroughfare Gap of Virginia. Streams were swollen. Provisions were running low because the provision wagons were bogged down. "The roads (were)

wretched.... In many cases we stripped ourselves of clothing, hung our clothes on the points of our bayonets and forded the streams." While on that miserable three-day march the men of Company K received the sad news of the death of W.D. Sherman, captain of the company. According to his obituary Captain Sherman had been "very low with typhoid fever." He had resigned the position of city marshal of Seneca to join the Kansas regiment. Sherman was credited with making his company "one of the best in the service."

The news cast a gloom over the entire command. but the men carried on with courage and cheer, "characteristic of young Americans." At Broad Run Camp a certain amount of foraging was expected and done. Some of the command had not had any food for thirty-six hours. Colonel Lindsay, an experi-

enced Civil War veteran informed the men that "anyone who permitted themselves to starve in a land of plenty should either be classed as cripples or ...

The following morning the colonel was presented with a fresh pork roast, compliments of the Regimental Band, and a message that "there were no cripples in the band anyway." By the time the Kansas Cowboy Regiment mustered out of service at Fort Leavenworth the United States Army was well aware that the best of its volunteers could be found on The Way West.

Tractor safety course — June 4 & 5

A Hazardous Occupations Safety Training in Agriculture course (tractor safety) will be conducted on Tuesday, June 4 and Wednesday, June 5 at KanEquip in Wamego. The class will run from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. the first day and from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the second

The course is taught by KSU Extension agents from Pottawatomie, Riley, Shaw-nee and Wabaunsee

counties and is recommended for youths age 12 and older. Any youth 14 or 15 years old who will operate a tractor for someone other than their parent is required to pass the course to be legally employed. Youths age 12 and 13 are welcome to participate in the class, but can't be certified until age 14.

Two hours of practical tractor experience is also required for certification.

A parent or employer will supervise the two hours of practical experience at a later date. Actual tractor driving will not be included in the safety course.

31 percent fair, 25 percent good and 3 percent excellent.







Corps of Discovery Part II -Fort Mandan to Lemhi Pass

The Corps wintered at Fort Mandan in what is near Bismarck. present-day North Dakota. When the ice went out in early April 1805, Lewis and Clark sent the keelboat and a dozen men downriver to St. Louis with maps, reports, Indian artifacts, and boxes of scientific specimens for President Jefferson. That same day, the remaining party heads upriver, traveling in two pirogues and six smaller dugout canoes. The expedition totals 33 now, including Charbonneau, Sacajawea, and her baby boy.

They reach the Great Falls of the Missouri and Lewis states "the grandest site I ever beheld." Now they are faced with a grueling 18-mile portage around the falls. They make crude carts from cottonwoods and bury some of their cargo. They haul the canoes and remaining supplies over the





broken terrain. Broiling heat, hail storms, prickly pear cactus, and other obstacles mark the difficult portage. Instead of the half day the captains had planned the previous winter, the portage takes nearly a month.

Once the portage is complete, the party moves up the river toward the three forks Sacajawea has told them about.

The Missouri River splits into three separate forks in South Central Montana. When the Corps of Discovery, led by Meriwether Lewis and Captain William Clark reached this point in 1805 during their quest to find an overland route to

the Pacific Ocean, they made camp and endeavored to determine which of the forks would be the most likely route to lead them closest to mountain passes that crossed the Rocky Mountains and the Continental Divide. The Continental Divide is the spine of the Rocky Mountains that runs north and south traversing the continent and dividing the watersheds of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. All waters east of the divide drain to the Atlantic Ocean while all waters west of the divide drain to the Pacific. The party had to cross the divide to reach Pacific waters. Imposing mountains meant the end of their river travel on the east side of the divide and the beginning of hundreds of miles of mountain ranges that would have to be crossed. A daunting overland passage lay ahead of them.

It was imperative they find the people of the Shoshone or Snake Indians who they were told inhabited this area of the Rocky

Mountains in order to trade for horses to pack their stores, provisions and trade goods over the mountains. Their expedition would surely fail if they did not acquire horses

Lewis and Clark had been commissioned by the U.S. Government under the authority of Jefferson to explore the area known as Louisiana which the United States had purchased from France. The President knew that the future of the young nation lay in the land to the west of the Mississippi River for expansion, trade and other commercial interests vital to the nation. While wintering in the Mandan villages in 1804, the party hired Touissant Charbonneau, a frontiersman, as an interpreter in order to communicate with the Indians. Charbonneau was to become one the most famous members of the expedition because of his Indian wife, Sacajawea.

Sacajawea was a Shoshone Indian who had been captured by the Hidatsa a few miles from where the

expedition was camped on the three forks. She was taken back to the Mandan villages where Charbonneau married her. She would prove to be a great asset to the party as they prepared to ascend one of the forks leading to the

mountain passes. While at the three forks. Lewis and Clark named each fork for high ranking members of the government. The southeast fork was named the Gallatin River: the middle fork was named the Madison River and the southwest

fork was named the Jefferson River for the President. They intended to ascend the Jefferson as it seemed the most logical route over the mountains. Sacajawea had informed Lewis and Clark that before she was captured, she had traveled with her tribe, the Shoshone, over the mountains from the west through passes and came down onto the plains in search of buffalo and other game every year after the winter snows had left the high mountains. She indicated that her people had many horses and used them to hunt and pack meat back to their camps.

Lewis knew that for their expedition to be successful, they must meet the Snake Indians and attempt to trade the goods they brought on their journey for horses to cross the mountains. They had many blankets, trinkets, knives and other items brought along for the express purpose of trading with Indians for supplies to help them across the continent. Horses would determine if they succeeded in reaching the waters that flowed into the Pacific. As they ascended the Jefferson, Sacajawea showed them the spot on the river where she was captured five years before. She began picking out landmarks she recognized. The party came to the place

where two smaller streams entered the Jefferson and Lewis sent out parties to scout both forks. These forks are today called the Big Hole and Ruby Rivers. It is here the Jefferson ends and the main channel becomes the Beaverhead River. They ascended the Beaverhead and Sacajawea soon saw a well-known landmark that she recognized as a place her people passed many times when traveling in this area. It was a high promon-

people, Beaverhead Rock, for its resemblance to the head of a beaver. She informed Lewis that her people would be somewhere in this area. Lewis knew that as they neared the high mountains of the Rockies, the waterways leading west would end and travel by boat and canoe would be impossible. With their food and provisions running low, it became urgent for him to find Sacajawea's people and barter for horses and even food to continue their jour-

tory that rose above the river and was called by her ney by land. Beef Shootor &

Captain Meriwether Lewis decided to take two men and continue past Beaverhead Rock overland in search of the Shoshone and their horses. Lewis traveled by land some fourteen miles up the river. He found a well-marked Indian trail that followed the river as it enters the mountains. When the small river forked, he named the place The Forks of the Jefferson. Traveling on the trail he soon found that further river travel by boat would impossible as the

streams became too shallow and small for even canoes. He proceeded along the small stream toward what appeared to be a pass through the mountains in the distance.

Lewis sees an Indian on horseback riding toward him some two miles distant and is overjoyed with the anticipation of finally meeting the Indians he has been seeking. At one mile distant the Indian halts and Lewis makes signs of friendship. Lewis moves towards him but when he is 100 paces

from him, the Indian turns his horse and whips him into a run away from Meriwether Lewis and disappears into the willow brush. As the Indian flees the strange white men, all hopes of obtaining horses for the Corps of Discovery vanishes and their overland journey to the westward flowing Columbia River is now in jeopardy. 

NASS releases report on Bluestem pasture conditions and rent

At the beginning of the 2013 Bluestem Pasture grazing season, pasture condition in the Flint Hills region of Kansas is rated as 16 percent very poor, 41 percent poor, 34 percent adequate, 8 percent good, and only 1 percent excellent. As of May 5, topsoil moisture conditions were rated as mostly adequate across the Bluestem region with more surplus in southern and eastern areas.

Sources being used for stock water are: ponds, 56 percent; streams or springs, 27 percent; wells, 11 percent; and spring developments, 6 percent. Kansas stock water supplies on May 5 were rated as 22 percent very short, 26 percent short, 50 percent adequate, and 2 percent surplus.

The percentage of available pasture already contracted, as of mid-April stood at 97 percent. Of the acres contracted, 46 percent are under full summer season contracts, 34 percent under partial-season contracts, and 20 percent leased for the full year. Partial season grazing may include both early intensive grazing and three-quarter length season reports.

The average grazing season start date for full summer season contracts is

April 24 and the average ending date is October 17. The average starting date for partial season or intensive grazing is April 23. The average number of grazing days for partial summer season contracts for steers and heifers under 700 pounds is 95 days while the average grazing days for all cows is 112 days.

Partial season contracts have been broken into two categories: contracts with ninety grazing days or less and contracts with more than ninety grazing days.

Partial season contracts with ninety grazing days or less reported an average lease rate of \$27.90 per acre where care is provided and \$23.10 where care is not provided. Price per head with care for steers and heifers under 700 pounds averaged \$79.90 with a guarantee of 2.8 acres. Without care, the price per head averaged \$63.60 with 3.0 acres guaran-

The average price per acre for partial season contracts of more than ninety days was \$22.60 per acre where care is provided and \$19.50 per acre where care is not provided. Price per head with care for steers and heifers under 700 pounds averaged \$77.00 with a guarantee of 3.3 acres.

Without care, the price per head averaged \$69.40 with 3.9 acres guaranteed.

When the stocking rate is based on pounds of live cattle per acre, for a full summer season the average beginning weight is 599 pounds. The average beginning weight for a partial summer season is 569 pounds. The average live pounds per acre for a full summer season are 287 pounds and for a partial summer season the average is 284 live pounds per acre. For a full summer season, the average price per acre with care is \$25.90, while the average price per acre without care is \$21.00. 





The Faces of the Cattle Business

The cattle business today has evolved into several distinct segments. Each draws certain people whose personality, skill and savvy make them best suited to that segment.

We'll start with the purebred breeders, the architects who design prototypes for the industry. They academic-minded. They steep themselves in statistics, fiddle with and refine genetics in an effort to define subjective traits, objectively. Not unlike ancient mariners drawing and redrawing the constellations in the night sky.

The next segment is the commercial cow/calf operator. They are the bedrock of the industry; the worker on the assembly line. They produce our product, beef, from scratch just as a welder builds a bumper guard, a cook bakes an apple pie and an artist paints a picture. They think in terms of generations (both human and bovine), take the good with the bad and have a loyalty to the land. You rarely hear them say "I'm just ranchin' to make enough money to buy the car dealership downtown!'

The grower, segment 3, takes calves once they've been weaned and keeps them until they are big enough to go to the feedlot. These grower calves come from a wide variety of sources; farms, ranches, sale barns, dairies, dog pounds, gypos, traders and team ropers! It is a handson, intensive, frustrating demanding job. It's equivalent to teaching Kindergarten through third grade, lots of babysitting. Economically, it's like buying used cars and trying to make them re-saleable!


Segment 4 is the feedlot. This is where we take a new car off the show room floor and turn it into a NASCAR Sprint contender! Today average daily gain, conversion, genetics, fixed expenses, health problems, purchase price, feed price and sale date are predictable within reason. However, predicting the market, the sale price 120 days later is like rolling the dice! Those who call themselves cattle feeders could easily be wildcatters in the oil business, prospectors, explorers, crap shooters, test pilots, magicians' assistants, circus acrobats, punt returners or Wall Street Speculators. They thrive on risk. If you guaranteed them a 20%

profit on a truckload of steers, they'd hold out for

And the final segment in our cattle business is the packing house where live cattle are turned into beef. Very little is known about this curious group of men. They sequester themselves in ritualistic confines, not unlike the Dalai Lama or Idi Amin, where they chant

and mutter phrases like "yellow sheet," "on the rail," "triple grande no foam latte." To all of us who have provided every animal that enters into their castle-like facility, they are as mysterious as the Vatican. We are only aware of their presence when we see a white puff of smoke and the phone rings... offering less!





Senate and House ag committees pass farm bills

On May 14 the Senate Agriculture Committee passed a farm bill with the House following suit the next day. While commodity groups praised the efforts of committee leadership in crafting the bill, Kansas Sen. Pat Roberts expressed displeasure at major differences from the one that he and Senate ag committee chairwoman Debbie Stabenow put together last year. That bill was passed through the Senate, but the House version was never brought up for a vote, leading to an eleventh-hour extension of the 2008 farm

"This time a year ago I believed that the Farm Bill we passed in the Senate was the best bill possible," Roberts said in his statement. "Let me be clear - I still want to pass a Farm Bill and provide long-term certainty to farmers, ranchers and their families in Kansas and across the country. However, as it stands at this point today, this is not a reform bill. This is a rearview mirror bill."

Roberts' main issue with the bill is target prices, which he believes to be trade and market distorting. "It is beyond frustrating that a year ago we passed a bill with nor counter-cyclical program - real reform and today we are asked to

support the new Adverse Market Payments program that just AMPs up (aptly named) subsidies and continues target prices for all

commodities," he said. Citing his longstanding WTO concerns, Roberts pointed out that the U.S. lost the cotton WTO case to Brazil, partly due to the decoupled target price program. "It simply isn't right to force that same risk onto other commodities when we already know the pitfalls," Roberts said. "The WTO stove is hot. We should not reach out to touch it again."

Roberts joined senators Mike Johanns, Nebraska, John Thune, South Dakota, Kristen Gillibrand, New York and Mitch McConnell, Kentucky in voting against the bill, which passed 15-5. The House bill passed 36-

The Senate bill included roughly \$2.4 billion a year in cuts and the House version would save \$4 billion annually. The elimination of direct payments accounted for much of the savings in both bills.

Both the Senate and House bills accomplish what producers have said all along is important to them - protecting crop insurance.

National Corn "The Growers Association is pleased to see the committee listened to the concerns of our nation's corn farmers and have done a great job keeping our priorities, especially the importance of crop insurance and risk management, under consideration while drafting the legislation," said NCGA president Pam Johnson.

Cattlemen's National Beef Association president Scott George said the Senate farm bill incorporates the priorities of NCBA. "There is not a livestock title, the conservation programs are maintained and the research title is sustained," he said. "These priorities address the needs of cattle producers while limsight and ensure that farmers and ranchers can continue to produce a wholesome, safe and affordable food supply." The bill also did not include the Humane Society of the United States/United Egg Producers language that many in the livestock industry feared would open the floodgates to giving the federal government more jurisdiction in production practices for all of agriculture.

The Senate could begin debating the bill this week, while leaders in the House project their bill will come to the floor in June.

UNL scientists experiment with corn silage in finishing diets

University of Nebraska-Lincoln scientists are experimenting with the use of corn silage in cattle finishing diets, finding that it can be an economical replacement for corn in feedlot diets containing distillers grains.

On another front, research is being conducted into feeding distillers grains that have some corn oil removed, so the oil can be used in biofuels.

Corn silage long was a staple of cattle diets, particularly in times of high corn prices, since it allows feeders to use the entire corn plant, but animal scientist Galen Erickson thinks UNL's current research may be the nation's first that looks into evaluating elevated levels of corn silage in finishing diets containing distillers grains.

Distillers grains are a byproduct of ethanol production and have become an increasingly important element of cattle feed, particularly in Nebraska, which relies on cattle, corn and ethanol production like no other state.

"I'm a big fan because I think it fits our state," Erickson said. "As corn becomes more expensive, it's under certain conditions, it quite economical."

"We're on a mission to improve the use of corn residue, whether grazed, baled, or harvested as silage as long as it's done in a sustainable way," the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources scientist added.

"The objective of our experiment was to determine the performance effects, carcass characteristics and economics of feeding elevated levels of corn silage and MDGS (modified distillers grains with solubles) as a partial replacement of corn in finishing diets," Erickson said.

The research, which partially replaced corn with the more economical corn silage, found that as corn silage increased, there was a slight increase in feed-togain ratio and a decrease in dry matter intake and average daily gain. However, ADG and F:G were improved when corn silage was fed with MDGS.

Scientists also studied the economics of this approach, comparing the impacts at different price levels of corn and cost of silage. They found that

makes economic sense, and "it especially fits for some of our smaller producers," Erickson said.

"In general, corn silage in combination with MDGS can be utilized to partially replace corn in finishing diets," the UNL scientists concluded in a summary of their work. "Cattle performance is reduced with increased level of corn silage in finishing diets containing MDGS. However, feeding corn silage with MDGS is better than without MDGS for average daily gain and feed to gain

As for the de-oiling research, Erickson said it's yet another way to take better advantage of the synergy in Nebraska's mix of corn, beef and ethanol. Erickson and his colleague Terry Klopfenstein are comparing the effects of feeding condensed distillers solubles, and distillers grains plus solubles, with and without corn oil removed in steer diets.

Condensed distillers solubles (CDS) are a liquid byproduct and distillers grains plus solubles are a semisolid byproduct, both

from ethanol production. CDS are generally added back to distillers grains before feeding, but earlier IANR research found they can be fed separately in cattle diets.

Ethanol plants can remove some corn oil from the CDS; it can be sold for about 30-35 cents a pound to be developed into biofuels. So, IANR scientists wanted to determine how performance of cattle fed the de-oiled byproduct compares to that of cattle fed regular CDS or regular distillers grains plus solubles.

Findings so far are surprising. Scientists found that when CDS are fed at a higher percentage of cattle

diets, removal of corn oil improves digestion in forage-based diets. In feedlot diets, two experiments have shown either no impact or a slight decrease in value for finishing cattle. However, the impact on performance is much smaller than predicted, or had no impact at all. More work is under way.

University team receives \$9.6 million USDA grant to help develop solutions for beef cattle grazing systems

Drought, flooding, extreme heat, subzero temperatures: All of these climatic events and more in Kansas can threaten the supply and affordability of the nation's beef supply. It's hard to do much about the weather, but a team of Kansas State University scientists will be trying to find solutions so cattlemen can better adapt to any future climate extremes in their grazing op-

Much of the nation's beef supply is produced on permanent grazing lands southern Great Plains, including Kansas. Protecting this vital supply from the stresses of climate variability is one key to our nation's food security, said Chuck Rice, university distinguished professor of agronomy and one of the leaders of the team.

Realizing the importance of this issue, the U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced a \$9.6 million, five-year grant to a multistate partnership that includes Kansas State University, Oklahoma State University, University of Oklahoma, USDA-Agricultural Research Service, Noble Foundation and Tarleton State University, Rice

The Kansas State University team also is led by Peter Tomlinson, assistant professor of agronomy and environmental quality specialist, and Gerad Middendorf, associate professor of sociology. The evaluation component will be directed by the university's office of educational innovation and evaluation.

Others on the university's team include Justin

cialist, Southwest Research-Extension Center: Doug Shoup, crops and soils specialist, and Jaymelynn Farney, beef systems specialist, Southeast Research-Extension Center; Dan Devlin, professor of agronomy and director of the Kansas Center for Agricultural Resources and the Environment; Aavudai Anandhi Swamy, research assistant professor of agronomy; Jim Shroyer, crop production specialist and professor of agronomy; Walter Fick, range specialist and professor of agronomy; Dorivar Ruiz Diaz, nutrient management specialist and associate professor of agronomy; and DeAnn Presley, soil management specialist and associate professor

agronomy. "Our uniquely qualified team will answer critically important research questions and deliver Extension programming about impacts of climate variability on beef cattle grazing operations in Kansas and the southern Great Plains," Tomlinson said. "We also will work on the sustainability of rural economies under variable and changing climates."

The project's goal is to increase the resiliency of beef cattle operations on grazing lands and wheat pasture, both dual purpose and graze-out, so they can better sustain productivity in the future through a wide range of potential climate changes, Rice said.

The team will work with ranchers and farmers to evaluate management practices and suggest changes for better resiliency. Specif-

The National Institute of Food and Agriculture made the Southern Great Plains award through its Agriculture and Food Research Initiative funding opportunity.

Variability and Change challenge area is focused on reducing greenhouse gas emissions and increasing carbon sequestration in agricultural and forest production systems and preparing the nation's agriculture and forests to adapt to changing climates.



Test fescue pastures for endophyte

Now is an excellent time to test fescue pastures for the tall fescue fungal endophyte. By knowing if a pasture is infected, and if so the level of infection, you can take the necessary management steps to make the most of a potentially bad situation. Unless you are certain that you have a pure stand of a fungus-free fescue variety or one of the newer "friendly" endophyte fescue varieties, testing every few years to monitor the level of infection is probably a good invest-

Poor animal performance has often been exhibited by cattle grazing on tall fescue pastures, especially in the summer months. Several terms including summer syndrome, summer slump, fescue toxicity and fescue toxicosis have been used to describe this phenomenon. The condition is characterized by one or more of the following symptoms: reduced feed intake, decreased rate of gain and/or milk production, rough hair coat, rapid breathing, increased body temperature, excess salivation and nervousness.

In the mid 1970s researchers at the University of Kentucky found that a fungal endophyte was present in fescue plants taken from pastures where poor animal performance was observed. This fungus, coenophi-Acremonium alum, grows within the host plant. The fungus is found in the seed, seed stem, leaf sheaths and crown. It is not

found in leaf blades and

The fungus does not cause any symptoms on infected fescue plants, so there is no way to tell if the plants are infected just by looking at them. However, toxins are produced in plants that are infected by the fungus. These toxins are what cause the poor animal performance by grazing livestock, that's why testing is the only way to have an accurate estimate of the potential endophyte problem.

Sampling a pasture at this time of year is relatively simple and should not take too much of your time. You simply need to collect 50 individual seed stems (culms) at random from the pasture. It is best to cover the entire pasture in your sampling and do not take more that one stem from each clump.

Cut each stem near ground level and collect the entire stem including the seed head. It is important that each stem be green and healthy. Do not collect dead, decayed or dried up stems. Once you've collected the 50 stems, bundle them up and place them in a plastic bag. It is okay to fold the stems to get them into the bag.

Take the samples to your local K-State Research and Extension office and the stems will be sent to the Plant Pathology Laboratory at Kansas State University for testing. If you can't take your samples in immediately, refrigerate them until they can be delivered to the Extension office.

There is a fee of approximately \$20 for each sample to cover the cost of the test. I feel this is a small price to pay for getting the information vou need to make management decisions concerning your grazing live-

It takes two to four weeks to complete the test and get the test results back. When the results come we can discuss ways to cope with the endophyte problem, if there is one. Management options vary depending on the level of endophyte infection, but some methods of coping with the problem include: grazing management, harvesting for hay early in the season, interseeding the pasture with legumes, and destroying the infected stand and replanting.

Fescue seed can also be tested for the fungal endophyte. Newly harvested seed (two months or less) may be directly analyzed, so this test also takes two to four weeks. Stored seed must be grown out and then analyzed which requires about eight weeks to complete.

I am a Paul Harvey fan. I grew up listening to his broadcasts. Don't you remember hearing him say "Page Two" and "Good Day" and "Now you know the Rest of the Story"?

I am also a sports fan. I like watching sporting events, especially K-State games. It has been a great season to be a Wildcat fan.

To put this season in perspective: It has been more than thirty years since K-State won a conference championship in basketball, and in football, I can remember when thought of K-State winning a conference championship would have been laughable. So to win conference championships in

both football and basketball during the same school year is an absolutely incredible accomplishment. Amazing.

But to get back on point, one of my favorite memories from a sporting event this year was about an advertisement, not the game itself. Of course, I am referring to the Super Bowl, and specifically the Dodge Trucks advertisement featuring Paul Harvey. You saw it too, right? So did 108 million others.

The ad was masterfully done. While beautiful images of working farmers and ranchers appeared on the screen, the mellifluous and unforgettable voice of Paul Harvey expressed a tribute to farmers. Over and over, in the wonderful way he had of composing and delivering a message, he repeated the phrase "So God made a farmer." It was a fabulous tribute.

Now, it seems that everything has a critic these days. There were criticisms of this ad as well. Some Latino organizations felt that Hispanic farmers were under-represented in the ad. Others were critical about farmers being promoted over other types of careers or businesses. Some felt that several of Paul Harvey's examples were out of date and unrealistic. Even ag groups had concerns that Paul Harvey had gotten sucked in to the animal rights movement in later vears.

But even so, this was a wonderful moment on national television. Paul Harvey's voice and the images portrayed on screen struck home with the American people. What I appreciated most was hearing people say about the ad, "That looked like my dad" or "That could have been my grandfather." This ad re-created a connection to the land and lifestyle for many people.

So thank you Paul Harvey, and thank you to Dodge Trucks for airing this ad. Dodge managed to generate lots of good will for their products without even promoting them in the ad. Furthermore. Dodge agreed to donate \$100,000 to the National FFA Foundation for every one million views that the YouTube video of the ad received up to one million dollars. That goal was reached in less than five days.

Such donations to FFA were very fitting, because the audio from the ad was taken from Paul Harvev's speech to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City in 1978. Perhaps that was why this was especially meaningful to me. For yes, I was at that same convention myself.

And now you know the rest of the story. Good day!

K-State Animal Sciences faculty member honored

Kansas State University faculty member, Terry Houser, has been named a recipient of the American Meat Science Association's Distinguished Achievement Award. He will be honored at the AMSA's Reciprocal Meat Conference June 18 in Auburn, Ala.

Houser, an associate professor in K-State's Department of Animal Sciences and Industry, teaches and conducts research primarily in adding value to meat and the effect of livestock diet on meat quality.

"Dr. Houser's published and proprietary research has directly improved color stability and eye appeal of beef and pork products produced in Kansas and surrounding states, which are marketed nationwide," stated the AMSA in announcing the award. "He, in collaboration with other Kansas State researchers, was asked by the National Pork Board and American Meat Institute Foundation to benchmark the amount of heterocyclic amines (HCAs) found in a large number of commercially available meat products and to research possible mitigation strategies to decrease HCA formation."

As a result, Houser and the K-State team are investigating new mitigation strategies to decrease HCA formation, and have published several peer-reviewed articles on the subject.

Two other researchers, Christy Bratcher of Auburn University, and Jeffrey Sindelar of the University of Wisconsin-Madison will also receive AMSA's Distinguished Achievement awards.



Eleven to one—those were the odds the beef industry was up against for two decades. "We got \$10 in new spending over that 20 years, meanwhile our pork and poultry competitors got \$110," said Nevil Speer, an animal scientist at Western Kentucky University. "You can't grow an industry without new revenue coming in, and we basically worked in a stagnant industry for 20 years."

Speer presented as part of the Harlan Ritchie Beef Symposium during Midwest American Society of Animal Science meetings in Des Moines, Iowa in March.

Beef struggled with health perception issues, convenience woes and the challenge of being the most expensive protein in the meat case, he said.

Then, the independent sector orientation began to adjust for mutual good.

'We began to understand that we need to work together in this industry," Speer said.

That lent itself to more branded programs and supply-chain alliances.

'Today we're averaging somewhere around 12% to 15% branded sales on a weekly basis," he said. "This push will probably continue in the years ahead."

As a result, grid and other negotiated sales make up 75% of all fed-cattle marketings today.

Part of that also comes from increased competition for feeder cattle, and the need to recoup premiums paid on cattle coming into the feedyards.

"They've begun to implement more and more

supply management over the last ten years, and those are strategic business decisions," Speer said. "If we can find cattle that meet some end-user specification and then match our inputs and do that securely, we begin to kind of distance ourselves from the rivalry of fighting it out in a commodity mar-

That's not only happening on the cattle side of the business, but once it's processed into beef, too.

An estimated twothirds of retail marketings are "out front sales," Speer said. "They're not spot sales."

"What's happening is that we are continuing to have more need for efficiency of movement, precision, to meet consumer needs," he said. "We need the right cattle, the right products, at the right time and the right place, and that's ultimately because we want to offer highquality, highly competitive products with consistent, predictable turnover." That's especially important as beef looks to compete with much cheaper alternatives. Beef is running at 240% the price of chicken and 140% that of

"We're on the upper edge of where we've ever been," Speer said. "At what point do consumers begin to push back? I don't know; they've shown amazing resilience and continue to do so, but this is a concern."

"Certainly, higher price equals higher expectations," he said.

The apparent solution is more teamwork.

"If we can supply highquality product on a con-

Eastern Kansas Grazing School planned Sept. 11-12

Rotational grazing is one way in which cattle producers can use rangeland and forages as efficiently as possible. That's among the topics to be discussed at the third annual Eastern Kansas Grazing School planned for Sept. 11-12 in Ottawa.

The event, hosted by K-State Research and Extension, will be at the Franklin County Fairgrounds, 1737 S. Elm St., and area pastures. It will feature presentations by K-State Research and Extension, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resource Conservation Service and private industry, including:

Mark Green, NRCS based in Missouri, and Wes-Tucker, agricultural economist with University of Missouri Extension, will share their experiences:

Dale Strickler with Star Seed, Inc., will present information on complementary forages and share his experiences with rotational grazing:

Doug Shoup, K-State Research and Extension southeast area Extension agronomist will address the basics of grass growth;

Jaymelynn Farney, SE area Extension animal scientist, will discuss animal behavior and interaction as they graze;

David Kraft, NRCS state rangeland management specialist, will present "The Art and Science of Grazing" and along with Doug Spencer, NRCS rangeland conservationist, will conduct a hands-on pasture allocation exercise; and

A fencing demonstration will highlight advances in electrified fences.

Registration for the grazing school, which is designed for adult learners, is \$50 for the first person from a farm or ranch, with additional persons from the same farm or ranch at \$25 each. Registration includes snacks, meals and proceedings. Registration should be sent to Frontier Extension District, 128 West 15th Street, Lyndon, KS 66451. A 30-minute feature on preserving Kansas' tallgrass prairie that recently aired on public television is now being offered through Kansas State University.

'Preserving the Tallgrass Prairie' details the state's work to preserve what remains of America's tallgrass prairie, which once stretched from Texas to the Canadian border. Today, just 4 percent of that original prairie remains, most of it in Kansas.

The feature originally aired April 14 on TV station KCPT. It was produced by K-State Research and Extension and available online through the Great Plains Fire Science Exchange (www.GPFireScience.org), and on the Kansas Flint Hills Smoke Management website (www.ksfire.org).

In the video, John Briggs, director of the Konza Prairie Biological Station near Manhattan, said, "We want to preserve the tallgrass prairie. We have one of the most endangered ecosystems in the world sitting right here in our backyard in the Flint Hills. "It looks large, but less than 4 percent of the original prairie remains."

Prescribed fires are the key management technique in preserving the prairie. Fire prevents trees and other woody species from overtaking the tallgrass prairie, and provides stable habitat for wildlife and higher quality forage for grazing animals.

"Without fire, you lose the ecosystem," said Carol Blocksome, a K-State Research and Extension agronomist who helped to coordinate the university-produced

"I hope (viewers) learn to appreciate the role of fire in grassland ecosystems," she added, "and the role of fire in removing woody species that compromise the range, improving wildlife habitat and forage quality."

The feature also discusses the state's efforts to manage smoke associated with burning the prairie, including the health concerns of those in urban areas of Kansas and adjacent states. It is supported by research on burning and smoke management that has been conducted at Kansas State University since the 1920s.

"A large thank you to all the people who helped; there were a lot of people interviewed, and a lot of volunteer time went into producing this," Blocksome said. "This is a unique product."



Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

Bull spreading dominated the corn and sovbean markets last week. The July corn finished the week near the highs, while the December contract wound up testing the April lows. The spread gained 26½ cents, finishing the week at \$1.33, which is about 50 cents below the record closing level set back in 1996. As for the soybeans, the July contract gained 58½ cents and closed above the prestocks report high, while the November contract gained 22% cents. The July-November soybean spread finished the week at \$2.20 and probably has the potential to reach \$3.00.

There are two main reasons for the bull spreading, the first of which is the exceptionally strong basis levels we are seeing. At the current levels there is no reason to expect deliveries against the July corn or soybean futures and in order to avoid forced deliveries we will probably have to see the futures try and catch up with the cash market. The second reason for the bull spreading is the assumption that we will see large production this fall and supplies will be replenished. Despite the exceptionally slow planting pace, traders aren't too worried about the crop. It seems that they are much more concerned about the Corn Belt receiving good moisture than they are

about seeds being put in the ground. A late planted crop will be a much bigger concern if it stops raining, so as usual, everyone will have at least one eye on the forecasts through the summer.

On the charts the July corn is still struggling to get through the 50-day moving average. We have seen several moves through that level, but no closes above it. The market is working itself into a wedge formation and time will tell which way it breaks out. The basis and tight supplies suggest it should go higher, but we have a clear history of letting the cash market be the leader, so we can't count on the July corn

moving higher. I think we can count on the bull spreads continuing to work, because the December corn is on the verge of looking disastrous. The market barely held above the April low on Friday and my confidence in its holding through this week is very low. There are numerous support levels below the market like \$5.12 and \$5.00, but if the forecasts look favorable for crop development we could test them both this week and be looking at a move to \$4.50 or \$4.00 at some point in the future.

The July KW chart looks rough as well. The support at the 50-day moving average failed, which suggests we are in for a move down to \$7.30 or \$7.11. The crop is shrinking and exports are solid, but that doesn't matter because traders have their eyes on a big corn crop coming on, which will take way feed usage, which has been what has kept wheat stocks from ballooning.

There is a very good chance that the crop will be worse than what most analyst are expecting, but it will take strong export sales and some support in the corn market to give the market a chance at consistent gains.

The July soybean chart looks bullish. I already mentioned the close above the pre-stocks report high, but it is very important both from a technical and psychological standpoint. \$14.80 becomes the next upside objective and of course the cash market is above that, so there is some very good upside potential if the futures try to catch up with the cash between now and expiration. Like the corn, the bull spreads should keep working even if we don't see much action in the flat price.

The cattle on feed report was a mixed bag with the on feed estimate at 97%, which was basically as expected, the placements were a little bearish at 115%, and the marketings were a little friendly at 104%. All it means is that we should see bull spreading in the live cattle market. It doesn't mean that the June will be highthough because it seems that no amount of tion.

bullish news can make that happen. We have record boxed beef and a \$5.00 plus basis and that hasn't helped, so I don't know why any other fundamental data would matter either. The charts look bearish and the trend is down.

Calculator helps with soybean seeding-rate decisions

With less costly soybean seed and the wide range of which soybean plant populations produce similar yields, soybean seeding rates have not historically been as closely calculated as those for corn. But soybean seed costs have risen to the point at which farmers don't want to plant more seeds than they need for top yields, according to University of Illinois crop sciences professor Emerson Naf-ziger.

"Although we often don't see this, it's possible in some cases that high soybean plant populations might increase lodging or stress, and actually result in lower yields, especially in wider rows, where plants are closer together," he added. With yields usually maximized at 80,000 to 100,000 plants per acre, Nafziger suggests aiming to establish 100,000 to 120,000 plants, which allows for lower-than-expected emergence.

Nafziger said that de-

creased pod set due to stress in 2012 means that seed this year tends to be larger than normal. This can sometimes mean more stress cracks or mechanical damage, but germination percentages are generally reported to be good and it appears that seed quality isn't much of an issue.

"Even with good seed germination, we often find soybean seeds establishing plants at lower percentages than we see with corn," Nafziger said. "This is in part due to lower standard (warm) germination percentages and partly to the fact that soybean seeds, which need to stay healthy long enough to drag the large cotyledons up and out of the soil, often struggle to emerge, especially if conditions are wetter or cooler than normal, or if soils form a crust after planting.

"To help make seeding rate decisions for soybean, Dennis Bowman and I de-

veloped a seeding rate calculator-or rather, we resuscitated one that we had running some years ago," Nafziger said.

The web-based PC version is available at ow.ly/ko8gL, the Android app is at ow.ly/ko8sm, and the iPhone/iPad online spreadsheet is at ow.ly/ ko8au.

The calculator asks for either weight and seeds per pound for seed units sold by weight, or for seeds per unit for seed sold by number. It then asks for the percentage of warm germination, which is required to be on the seed tag or container, and for the cost per unit. Field size and row spacing are also requested.

The only subjective information requested by the calculator is an estimate of the percentage of germinable seed expected to emerge and establish

plants under the soil conditions and perhaps the weather forecast at plant-

Nafziger said that under very good conditions it is reasonable to expect close to 100 percent of good seed to emerge. But if soils are cold or wet (or likely to get wet), this percentage should be decreased. The calculator goes from 100 percent to 70 percent, with the idea that expecting less than 70 percent emergence of good seed should be a signal to wait for better conditions before planting.

"The calculator returns seed spacing down the row, seed requirements per acre and for the field, and the amount of time it will take to plant the field," Nafziger said. "While we developed the calculator for soybean, it works for corn or smallgrain seed as well.'

Landowners and producers can now enroll in continuous CRP with general sign-up to follow

ture Tom Vilsack reminds farmers and ranchers that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will conduct a four-week Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general signup that began May 20 and ends on June 14. Vilsack also announced the restart of sign-up for continuous CRP, including the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program, State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement Initiative, the Highly Erodible Land Initiative, the Grassland Restoration Initiative, the Pollinator Habitat Initiative and other related initiatives. Sign-up for continuous CRP began on May 13 and will continue through Sept. 30, 2013.

"As always, we expect strong competition to enroll acres into CRP, and we urge interested producers to maximize their environmental benefits and to make cost-effective offers," said Vilsack. "CRP is an important program for protecting environmentally sensitive lands from erosion and sedimentation, and for ensuring the sustainability of our groundwater, lakes, rivers, ponds and streams. Through the voluntary participation of our farmers and ranchers, CRP helps us to protect our natural resources, preserve wildlife habitat and bring good paying jobs to rural America related to hunting, fishing, and outdoor recreation.'

Vilsack encouraged producers to look into CRP's other enrollment opportunities offered on a

CRP has a 27-year legacy of successfully protecting the nation's natural resources through voluntary participation, while providing significant economic and environmental benefits to rural communities across the United States. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and develop wildlife habitat. In return, USDA provides participants with rental payments and costshare assistance. Contract duration is between ten and 15 years. Currently, 27 million acres are enrolled in CRP through 700,000 contracts on 390,000 farms throughout the U.S., with enrollment in 49 states and Puerto Rico. Contracts on an estimated 3.3 million acres will expire on Sept. 30, 2013. Enrollment authority for all types of CRP, which had expired Sept. 30, 2012, was extended through 2013 by the American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012.

Offers for general signup CRP contracts are ranked according to an **Environmental Benefits** Index (EBI). USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) collects data for each of the EBI factors based on the relative environmental benefits for the land offered. FSA uses the following factors to assess the environmental benefits for the land offered:

Wildlife habitat benefits resulting from covers on contract acreage; Water quality benefits from reduced erosion, runoff and leaching; On-farm benefits from reduced erosion; Benefits that will likely endure beyond the contract period; Air quality benefits from reduced wind erosion; and Cost.

CRP soil rental rates for non-irrigated cropland were updated this year to better reflect location and market conditions. A nationwide cap was placed on the maximum amount that may be paid per acre for the general sign-up. Taken together these steps help ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent in a fiscally responsible manner while producing the maximum environmental benefits for each dollar spent.

CRP is the largest USDA conservation program and continues to make major contributions to national efforts to improve water and air quality, prevent soil erosion, and protect the most sensitive areas including those prone to flash flooding and runoff. At the same time, CRP has helped increase populations of pheasants, quail and ducks and is recognized as benefiting certain rare species like the sage grouse, the lesser prairiechicken and other grassland birds. Highlights of CRP accomplishments include:

The restoration of more than two million acres of wetlands and two million acres of riparian buffers; Prevention of more than 600 million pounds of nitrogen and more than 100


