Tuttle Creek WRAPS meeting looks at cost/benefits of stabilization projects

Are stream bank stabilization projects an effective method of controlling sedimentation in the state's federal reservoirs? Or are they merely an expensive band-aid with few measurable long-term benefits? Attendees at the November 7 Tuttle Creek WRAPS meeting had the opportunity to hear from Matt Unruh, an environmental scientist at the Kansas Water Office and Josh Roe from KSU's Department of Agricultural Economics, as they detailed research into the cost-effectiveness of stream bank stabilization projects. Their research looked specifically at the Big Blue and Little Blue basins above Tuttle Creek Reservoir.

Acknowledging that one of the objections to such projects is the difficulty in measuring water quality improvements, Unruh explained that they created reservoir road maps in an attempt to quantify all the issues faced by those reservoirs. Among them would be sedimentation that reduces capacity, which then reduces the ability to utilize the federal reservoirs as flood control and water supply storage.

"One of the things we do as part of this reservoir road map is really do some watershed assessment type activities to quantify where the highest sediment load might be taking place in the respective watersheds," Unruh said. "The majority of the sediment that is reaching Tuttle Creek is coming from the Big Blue and Little Blue rivers. Those are the two major rivers in the watershed, so it's not really a surprise to see that those would have the highest sediment loads take place in the Tuttle Creek Reservoir Watershed."

But identifying those

acres per year. "So you can see there was not an acceleration of erosion on that downstream site once the upstream site was installed," he said.

Unruh noted that there were 146 failing stream banks that were identified adjacent to cropland in the Tuttle Creek watershed, causing a loss of 595 acres of cropland. "When you're losing 595 acres of cropland, there some economic impact regionally that takes place when you're taking all of that ground out of production."

Unruh's presentation was followed by one by Josh Roe, a water and resource economist with the department of agricultural economics at Kansas State University, who looked at the economic impact of such projects.

"We see nearly 600 acres of cropland just gone, never to return again," he said. "We're not talking about putting it in CRP or buffers that take the land out of production and you still get a payment. This land is gone." He described how the loss of the land has both a direct income and net worth impact. "With the land prices these days, you're literally owning less land because of the stream bank. Regionally there are less inputs being purchased, less crops being sold."

Roe's research did not factor in the cost of dredging the sediment out of the reservoir and looked only at the direct economic impact caused by the erosion and the cost of the stabilization projects. "In the end, these things are very expensive to stabilize," he said. "Assume a \$20,000 engineering cost before there's even an ounce of diesel burned."

Looking at all 146 sites over a 20-year period, there was an \$8.2 million loss if they were all stabilized, almost \$2 million lost if the top 50% were done, and a little over \$1 million in gain if the top 19 were stabilized. Again, that does not factor in the cost of dredging, which would come in at \$224 million over a 17-year period.

"That's treating stabilization purely as a cost," he pointed out. "But if you pump 27 million dollars worth of construction costs into the streambank stabilization it is going to have a nice impact on the local economy when you start looking at contractors and all the construction. That's where you have to be careful with an impact study, because what one person treats as a cost, the other one can skew as a benefit."

As far as the total annual sediment load, we've got over 5 million tons a year of sediment at that point right above the reservoir," he continued. "And looking at the data itself, half of it we can

attribute to the Little Blue and half to the Big Blue." He went on to explain that the 27% or greater number as far as the failing streambanks in the watershed illustrates for the Water Office that stream-bank stabilization would be a viable Best Management Plan (BMP) for that watershed.

Another argument against stream bank stabilization projects is that there just isn't a good track record to establish the their effectiveness and in some areas there hasn't been enough time passed to give an accurate assessment. Failure of the project is another concern raised, as well as the argument that even if they don't fail, they aren't working as well as they should. And finally, there is the belief that doing a stream bank stabilization project in one place will just pass the problem farther downstream to the next landowner.

"But in the Little Blue River Basin, one of the things that we've had work for us is there have been some projects that have been in place for a great deal of

time," said Unruh. "So we can really take a look at these projects and measure their effectiveness for the last ten to fifteen years and really try to dispel some of the information out there that's really giving stream bank stabilization a bad name, and to measure their performance."

Using the aerial slides, many from as far back as 1991, Unruh was able to mark where the stream bank was then, then watch it through the subsequent years. The comparisons showed where a large chunk of ground was lost by 1999, due in part to the flood of 1993. In 2002 a stream bank stabilization project was done and they were able to begin measuring forward from that.

In 2005 the weirs that had been installed were still holding and none of them had been lost and some fill of soil behind the weirs could be seen, so some soil deposition was taking place.

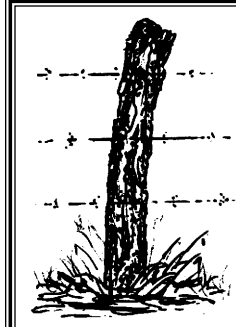
"You can see from the time that project was established, the bank didn't move any from the time of installa-

tion and you even have deposition that's taking place, so we're starting to get a little bit of land back from the river," Unruh pointed out. "It's not to the point where you would be able to farm it, but we do know that particular stream bank has held for that time frame."

He went on to explain that the erosion that took place from 1991 to 2002 amounted to nearly 14 acres of crop land, which he calculated to represent 433,000 tons of soil that eroded from just that one site, which translates to roughly 407 acre/feet of storage in Tuttle Creek Reservoir.

Unruh then compared the cost of removing the sediment from Tuttle Creek Reservoir to preventing it from flowing in to begin with. At basically \$6.60 per cubic yard, it would cost about \$4 million to dredge it out, compared to approximately \$210,000 to design and install a stream bank stabilization project on that site. "So the cost/benefit aspect of that, you can see from the state of Kansas' perspective, it would make much more economical sense to have stream bank stabilization coming in for this site as opposed to removing it mechanically through hydraulic dredging once it's entered into Tuttle Creek Reservoir," was his conclusion.

Addressing the concern of pushing the problem farther downstream to the next landowner, Unruh's research showed that a non-stabilized site further downstream was losing .4 acres of land per year to erosion prior to the installation of the upstream site, and afterwards, from 2005-2012 that rate was .29

**Meeting to address controlling
two bad pasture grasses**

Many of our pastures in Kansas are being invaded by two grasses that livestock will not eat. In some pastures I would estimate their stocking rate needs to be increased from six acres per cow/calf pair up to nine or ten acres.

To put a value per acre on these pastures means they would go from around \$2,000 per acre down to \$1,000. In buying or leasing grass, one needs to be able to identify these two grasses and then pay according to what extent they have increased in the pasture.

Let's take this analysis one step further.

If the pasture drops by half in value, then the tax base should also be reduced accordingly. Think how this could affect our school systems, hospitals, roads, cemeteries and on and on. Of course the income for livestock people would be reduced significantly, affecting their buying power and the economy of their area.

These two invading grasses should be a concern for all Kansans. Agronomists at Kansas State Uni-

versity are in the process of informing livestock people about these hazardous intruders that many are not even aware of as they look so much like our good bluestem grasses but are not succulent. The grasses may taste bitter to cattle, sheep, horses and goats so they are uneaten. In some pastures, they are by far the most prevalent grasses as the good plants such as the big and little bluestems and gramma grasses are over-grazed and grubbed into the ground while the ungrazed invaders flour-

ish. These nasty grasses even push out the good bluestems and take over good grass areas.

The worse grass is named Caucasian Bluestem, also known as Old World Bluestem as it originated in Turkey and neighboring countries. The less serious grass, but still one livestock won't eat, is called Silver Bluestem. It is imperative that livestock people become aware of their sly enemy that is quietly invading their pasturelands.

Dr. Walt Fick, KSU rangeland specialist and Dwayne Rice, NRCS rangeland specialist will be presenting information on identification and control of these two invasive grasses. Their identification and control, which is very difficult, will be discussed by Dr. Fick and Dr. Rice at Miltonvale City Hall on Thursday, December 5 from 5-8 p.m. with dinner at the Kountry Kafe.

Prairie Ponderings

I've been thinking a lot lately about armchair quarterbacks. They undoubtedly don't know all the details of decisions that were made, but that doesn't stop them from bashing the professionals who actually get paid to make those calls – and whose careers depend on making the best decisions they possibly can.

It hit me recently that agriculture is plagued with a plethora of armchair quarterbacks – people who have just enough knowledge of what we do to feel they have a license to second-guess every decision and cast aspersions on what is not only our chosen careers, but our very way of life. And unfortunately, modern technology gives them a worldwide audience to whom they can spout their opinions freely with little regard to their accuracy.

I'm all for a good honest debate on any subject, but I also believe any debate should be based on complete, accurate information. Half-truths, outright lies and scare tactics have no place in any reasonable discussion. Whether the topic is GMOs, the farm bill, agriculture practices or anything else, people need to settle for nothing less than complete, accurate information and base their opinions on that. I'm not idealistic enough to believe this will lead to total agreement, but it will definitely foster better relations and the ability to work towards long-term goals and solutions.

We devote our lives to conserving the land, taking care of our livestock, teaching our children work ethics and serving our communities. We are not the greedy villains out to destroy the planet, contaminate the food supply and pad our pockets with handouts that many would make us out to be.



I am proud to be a farmer for many reasons; one of those reasons is because the corn I grow goes into ethanol. I have used gas blended with ethanol for many years in my vehicles and have never experienced any problems with them because of my choice of fuel. I also believe one of the greatest threats to our national security is our dependence on fuel from abroad. I truly think we need to be developing other fuel sources so we can someday move on to a renewable fuel source. I also recognize such technology is many, many years away.

That means we will be reliant on fossil fuels for the majority of our supply, so I also think it is good that we do support ethanol. It lessens our dependence on something we cannot control and supports our farmers at the same time. To me that is a win/win. That is why I bristled last week when I saw a report from the AP on the dangers ethanol posed to the environment. The contention was that run-off and fertilizer from increased corn production had found its way into the Gulf of Mexico and was now affecting the fisheries. Don't get me wrong, I am a big seafood fan and anything that affects the shrimp population is a problem in my mind.

Fertilizer run-off is a problem, but I really don't think the finger should be pointed at farmers growing corn for ethanol. Those of us that grow corn value fertilizer like gold (which also seems to be the standard it is priced on) and we work very hard to minimize the amount that does leave the field. Because fertilizer is valued like gold we also soil test and only apply the amounts needed. Those who are sloppy with their fertilizer and lose most of it are soon out of business.

We have also worked very diligently on soil conservation, putting in terraces, waterways and buffer strips to keep run-off out of our streams and rivers. The amount of sediment leaving most fields is very, very small. Conservation measures are often mandated especially when land leaves a conservation program like CRP. That was the reporter's

next point against ethanol. Too many acres of conservation lands have been plowed under and planted to corn.

We all know that the Conservation Reserve Program was very successful in removing marginal (and some not so marginal) acres from production. We also all know that this program was one that suffered greatly due to budget cuts. Many acres were not accepted back into the program or if they were it was at lower rates that made farming them more attractive.

I am a big proponent of grasslands and I must admit I cringe every time I see one of these CRP fields plowed up. I am also a proponent of making a living and if those acres are more profitable as fields of corn then so be it. If your argument against ethanol is the conversion of CRP into farmland then your real problem is with where we spend the money, i.e. conservation programs versus ethanol subsidies. On a related note, any CRP acres have had conservation measures already applied to them and therefore have lessened any run-off or erosion.

We can debate the subsidies on ethanol all day. However, I really do not think ethanol or the corn used to produce it should be blamed for the problems in the Gulf. If we do have a problem with fertilizer run-off in the Gulf I would probably start with looking at run-off in urban areas. Many times I drive through towns and housing developments and see water running down the street and into the gutters. This run-off is coming off of very green and highly fertilized lawns. My guess is that they are fertilized at a much higher level than our corn fields.

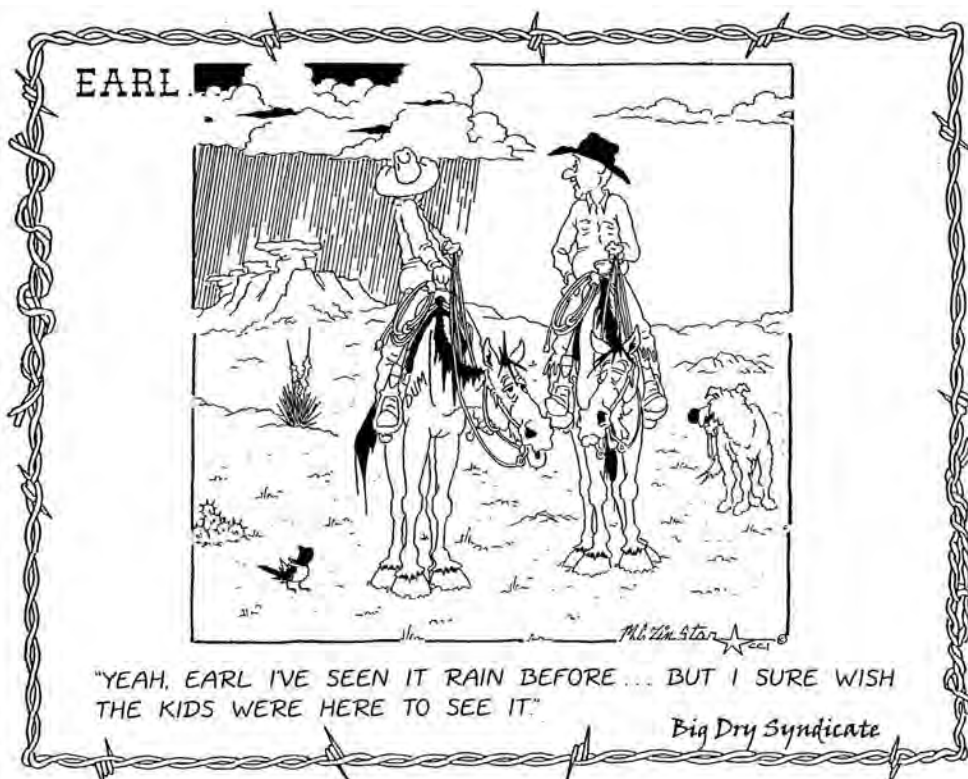

To say the farm bill has moved like molasses through Congress the past three years is a gross understatement. This branch of our federal government continues to be mired in the mud of partisan politics.

Congress seems hell-bent on infighting while this nation's business is left undone. Kansans and other farm-state lawmakers are urging their colleagues to look back to more bipartisan times and do something Congress hasn't done much of lately – pass a major piece of legislation.

Remember the old axiom: politics is the art of compromise?

Farm country needs a

farm bill and we could have used it yesterday. Much of the fall corn, beans and milo are out of the fields and farmers are ready to look toward 2014 and next year's crops.

Kansas farmers and ranchers need the certainty of a completed farm bill in order to make business decisions for next year, says Kansas Farm Bureau president Steve Baccus, an Ottawa County farmer.

A strong, affordable crop insurance safety net will help producers develop individual risk management plans, he adds. Reauthorizing livestock disaster programs will protect Kansas ranchers from catastrophic losses such as those suffered by South Dakota ranchers after the recent blizzard.

Baccus urged Congress to fund all titles in the new farm bill to avoid abandoning important conservation, research and trade programs to the mercy of the appropriations process. He also called on

lawmakers to preserve traditional rural-urban cooperation on nutrition issues. "A farm bill without a meaningful nutrition title will make it difficult, if not impossible, for the House and Senate to reach agreement on a bill that can be signed by the President," Baccus said. "Congress must pass a unified farm bill that continues the partnership between the nutrition and farm communities and their constituents."

Seems the main challenge in arriving at a new farm bill is the differences on food stamps, officially called the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

The House has passed legislation to slash approximately \$40 billion annually, or about 5 percent, including changes in eligibility and work requirements. The Senate wants to cut a much smaller \$4 billion.

SNAP funding has more than doubled during the past five years as the nation's economy struggled. Democrats contend it is working as intended, providing food to those in need when times are tough. Republicans believe it should be focused on the neediest people.

When most Americans think of a farm bill they think of farm subsidies. Few think of all the other things that are covered in this nearly \$1 trillion program.

Few Americans know that 75 percent of the farm bill is actually helping feed folks who need nutrition assistance. Let me repeat, 75 percent of this bill goes to feed hungry people.

Most of the current law's ag provisions expired in September. Direct payments would have been eliminated and our lawmakers could have taken some of that money applied it to deficit reduction as well as an affordable crop insurance program.

If we don't have a farm

bill by 2014 and Congress allows dairy supports to expire, 1930s and 1940s-era farm law would kick in. Some estimates conclude the government will then pay up to four times more for dairy products. If that scenario plays out, many farmers would sell to the government instead of commercial markets, decreasing the commercial supply while raising prices for shoppers at the supermarket.

So the question remains – can the House and Senate pass a farm bill?

U.S. farm equipment sales fall in October

(AP) – An industry report shows that sales of farm tractors and combines fell in October from the same month a year ago.

But the report from the Association of Equipment Manufacturers also says that U.S. sales of the items in the first ten months of the year still remain ahead of last year's pace.

Sales of farm tractors totaled about 19,600 in October, down 3.4 percent from October 2012. Farmers bought 1,153 combines in October, a drop of nearly 35 percent from the same month last year.

During the first ten months of this year, farmers bought nearly 173,000 tractors, for an increase of 10.1 percent compared with the same period a year ago.

Farmers bought 8,847 combines during the first ten months for a sales increase of 5.6 percent.

Winner Lisa Winberry, Topeka:
MINI CORN DOG MUFFINS

- 1 package corn muffin mix
- 2 ounces Velveeta, cut into 24 small cubes
- 4 beef franks each cut into 6 pieces
- 1/2 cup Grey Poupon honey mustard

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Prepare muffin batter as directed on package. Spoon into 24 mini muffin pan cups sprayed with cooking spray. Press 1 each Velveeta cube and hot dog slice into batter in center of each muffin cup. Bake 10-12 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 5 minutes before removing from pans. Serve warm with mustard.

- Gin Fox, Holton:
CHOCOLATE-COVERED RITZ CRACKERS
- 1 1/4 sleeves Ritz crackers (around 45 crackers)
 - 1 cup brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup butter
 - 1/3 cup creamy peanut butter
 - 1 1/2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Line a 9-by-13-inch pan with foil and spray lightly with nonstick spray. Line with the Ritz crackers; they will overlap, so feel free to break them into pieces to make a mostly even layer. The good news is that it doesn't have to be perfect! Melt together the butter, peanut butter and brown sugar over medium heat until the sugar has just dissolved; pour immediately over the Ritz crackers and spread to evenly distrib-

ute. Place in the oven at 425 degrees for about 5 minutes until it just starts to bubble. Remove from the heat immediately and sprinkle with chocolate chips. Let the chips sit for about 1 minute, then spread evenly with an offset spatula or knife. Place in the freezer for about 20 minutes, then break apart. Or just eat it straight out of the pan!

- BANANA BREAD
- 2 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup butter
 - 3/4 cup brown sugar
 - 2 eggs

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9-by-5-inch loaf pan. In a

large bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt. In a separate bowl cream together butter and brown sugar. Stir in eggs and mashed bananas until well blended. Stir banana mixture into flour mixture; stir just to moisten. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan. Bake for 60-65 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean. Brown beef and chopped onion (or use minced and add with spices) in butter. Add water and simmer for 1/2 hour. Add soup, mushrooms, Worcestershire and spices. Simmer 1 1/2 hours. Just before serving add sour cream. Stir in cooked Downhome Noodles.



DOWNHOME NOODLES

- 1 beaten egg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 cup flour

Mix egg, salt and milk. Add flour and stir to form a stiff dough. Divide in half. Using a rolling pin, spread each piece very thin on a floured surface into a rectangular shape. Let stand for 20 minutes. Roll up loosely lengthwise. Slice 1/4-inch wide and unroll each strip. Spread out and allow to dry for 2 hours. Cook uncovered for 10 minutes in a boiling pot

of salted water. Makes 3 cups of noodles.

GOLDEN POTATO SOUP
- 6 cups cubed red potatoes
 - Enough water to cover potatoes
 - 1 cup sliced celery
 - 1 cup sliced carrots
 - 1/2 cup chopped onion
 - 2 chicken bouillon cubes
 - 2 teaspoons dried parsley flakes

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup flour
- 3 cups milk

12 ounces American cheese, cubed

Combine potatoes, water, celery, carrots, onion, bouillon cubes, parsley flakes, salt and pepper in a 4-quart saucepan. Bring to a boil; reduce heat to low and simmer covered for 8 to 10 minutes. Blend flour into 1/4 cup milk to form a smooth paste. Stir into soup. Add remaining milk and cheese. Cook over medium heat until thickened, stirring frequently. Serve with crackers or cornbread.

Another one from Loretta Shepard:

- PICKLED BEETS
- 5 cans of small whole beets
 - 1 1/2 cups beet juice
 - 1 1/2 cups sugar
 - 3/4 cup vinegar
 - Dash of salt

Place beets in sterilized jars and set aside. Bring beet juice, sugar and vinegar to a boil and pour over beets in jars. Let cool. Place in refrigerator for 3 days and enjoy!

BUSTER BARS

- 1 small package Oreo cookies, crushed
- 1 stick oleo, melted
- 1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream, softened
- 12-ounce jar hot fudge sauce
- 11 ounces salted peanuts
- 9 ounces whipped topping

Mix together cookies and oleo. Reserve 1 cup for topping. Press mixture into bottom of a 9-by-13-inch pan. Spread ice cream over crust; freeze until firm. Spread fudge sauce over ice cream. Sprinkle peanuts over sauce. Spread on whipped topping. Put reserved crumbs on top and freeze. Remove from freezer 10 minutes before serving.

Cherry Cake

(Makes 8 servings)

Nonstick cooking spray
1 1/2 cups sliced almonds, divided

1 1/4 cups maraschino cherries, quartered

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour or gluten-free flour blend

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

3/4 cup unsalted butter, room temperature

1 cup sugar

3 large eggs, room temperature

1 lemon

1 tablespoon turbinado sugar

Freshly whipped cream

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray 8- or 9-inch cake pan well with cooking spray. Line with parchment paper on the bottom and sides.

Finely grind 1 1/4 cups almonds in food processor (you should end up with 1 cup); combine with cherries in small bowl. In separate bowl, place flour; take out 1 tablespoon

flour and stir into cherry mixture. To the remaining flour, add baking powder and salt; whisk to combine.

Cream butter and sugar with electric mixer for 3 minutes or until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well and scraping down sides of bowl after each addition. Add flour mixture and fold together. Stir in the cherry mixture. Finely grate lemon peel into the batter and add juice of the lemon; stir to combine. Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup sliced almonds and turbinado sugar on top. Bake 50 to 75 minutes or until cake is golden brown and toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool in pan 15 minutes, then remove from pan to wire rack. Cool completely.

Serve topped with whipped cream, if desired.



Farmland — coming soon

When a friend recently posted a Facebook link to the trailer of an upcoming movie titled *Farmland*, I couldn't click the "play" button fast enough. And if this movie is anything like the trailer depicts it to be, then I'm just as eager to see the full version.

The movie, by award-winning director James Moll, is due to be released next spring. Moll has won two Emmys, an Oscar and a Grammy for his documentary films, which include the sports adventure epic, *Running the Sahara*, executive produced by Matt Damon and *The Last Days*, executive produced by Steven Spielberg. Pretty good credentials, wouldn't you say?

Moll traveled around the country talking to young farmers and ranch-

ers about their work and the high risk/high reward inherent in it. In the film, six farmers and ranchers, all in their 20s, make up the core of this documentary. They talk with passion and dedication about the joys and challenges of their way of life and offer validation that our farms and ranches are in good hands as they are passed on.

I was impressed that Moll included several women depicted in hands-on farm work, as well as several of the other important support roles we play. Women have always been involved in agriculture, but since 2002, there has been a 30 percent increase in the number of female-run farms.

Farmland grew from

the realization that most Americans have never set foot on a farm or ranch, or have really ever talked to the people responsible for growing their food. The trailer begins with the startling statistic that most people are now at least "five generations removed from the farm." Five generations! And that grows more distant with every new generation.

This film should offer all of them a glimpse into the world of farming and the men and women who are living, working, cursing and loving life on our farms and ranches. It also stresses, even though this is a labor of love, farming and ranching is still more labor, and risk, than many may realize.

One woman in the movie, appropriately dressed in her dirty t-shirt after a day of toil, says into the camera, "Lots of people talk about hard work, but until you know a farmer, you don't know what hard work is."

Can I hear an "Amen"?

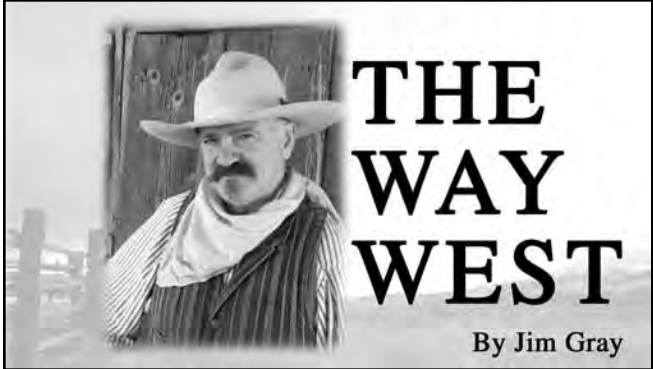

THE WAY WEST

By Jim Gray

Good Boys Gone Bad

The Reverend Johnson M. Adams brought his young family from Kentucky to Lawrence on an immigrant wagon train in 1870. In 1874, he moved to a farm near Sun City, Barber County. Although an ordained minister of the Baptist Church, most folks knew him as "Uncle Bud," a man who stood for the right in religion, temperance, and society, and lived consistently by the precepts that he taught. Uncle Bud delivered the first sermon ever preached to a congregation in Sun City when most of the population consisted of cowboys.

Uncle Bud had seven children by his first marriage and another five from his second wife. The wild country in which he chose to raise his family bred a certain reckless character in many of range-raised offspring. Uncle Bud was bound to lose part of his brood to the ways of the Wild West. Leander (Lee) at sixteen might have been excused, twenty year old Greenville (Green) Adams should have been well versed in his father's righteous ways. But who could resist the open range and the wild cowboy way? In later years, Green recalled that Barber County was "filled up with horse

thieves and desperadoes." He further observed that "It looked as though it was impossible for a man who wanted to live upright to stay here." The first settler in Barber County was killed by Indians the year before the Adamses arrived.

By 1880 Green was entertaining cowboys in his "Whiskey shop" in Sun City. Whiskey flowed, cards flashed, and the crack of billiard balls provided a dependable source of income for the preacher's son. But courting the sporting crowd brought its dangers.

George Riter took time off from herding his cattle on nearby Mule Creek to ride into Sun City Saturday, November 13, 1880, for some drinks and a few games of billiards. Riter engaged Green and his brother Lee in a little friendly wager on the outcome of the game he was playing against a fellow known as Hopper. When Riter lost the first game the bet on the next game was doubled.

According to the Medicine Lodge Cressett, dated November 19, 1880, Riter won the next game and the bet, but the Adams boys were not exactly forthcoming with the stakes. After a mild altercation the boys finally handed the money over. But the ordeal wasn't

over. While putting his winnings in a pocket Riter discovered the money that he was carrying was gone. Believing it was taken during the altercation; Riter accused the Adams boys and pulled a gun to back up his suspicions.

Lee unexpectedly snatched the pistol from the cowboy's hand and knocked him down. Both Lee and Green started for the door with Riter on their heels. Incensed, Riter overtook Lee just outside the door, grabbed the pistol and began firing. When Lee dropped to the ground Riter turned his attention to Green, firing several more shots. One bullet hit Green in the back "Some two inches from the spine, passing through the spleen and out, two inches below his heart."

A doctor who happened to be on the scene immediately administered "all the surgical assistance necessary." Green eventually recovered but the physician could do nothing but alleviate the pain for Lee. The ball had entered his hip and passed "upward and inward, through his bowels", finally lodging in his groin. Lee died two days later.

Lee was buried at the top of the hill north of Sun City next to his brother Harrison, who had died shortly after the family arrived in

Barber County. At the time of Harrison's death Reverend Adams selected the burial site for his son at the top of the hill because it was an inaccessible place and not liable to be disturbed by Indian or buffalo. It became the last resting place for several members of the family as well as for the early settlers of Sun City.

Apparently the loss of Lee, coupled with Green's own brush with death, brought the wayward son to his senses. Green and his wife Roseana raised eleven children. Roseana died in 1903. In that year Green was active in building the Sun City Baptist church. His name appears as a charter member of the church. At the time of his death in 1930 his obituary documented twenty-seven grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren. Having reached his seventy-fifth year, Green Adams could boast his life had been redeemed one fateful day on The Way West.

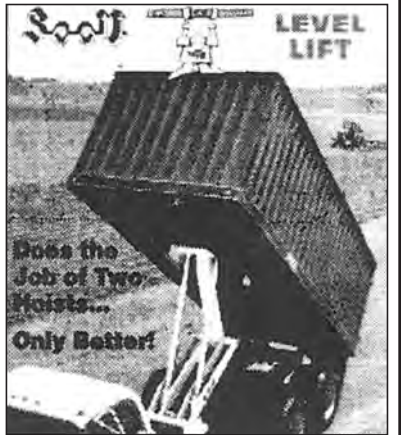

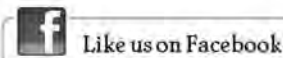

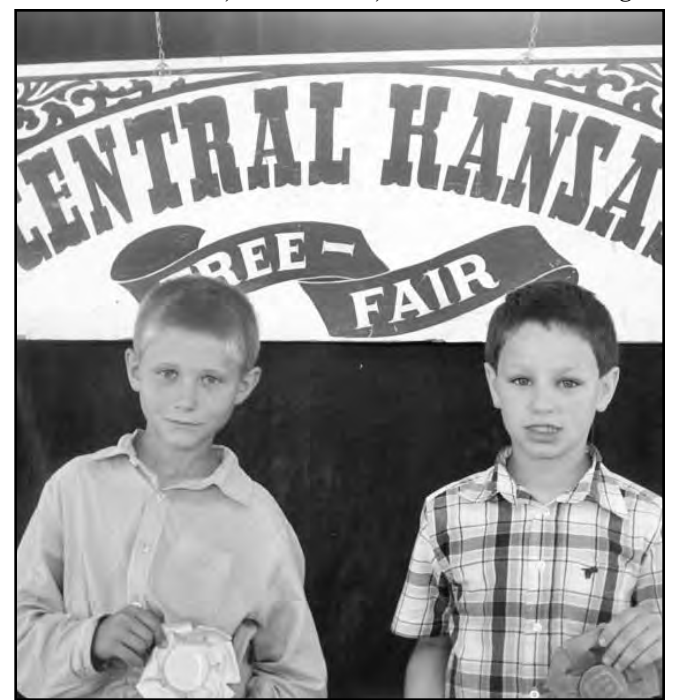

introduction of the Valions in 2012, the company has been testing guards made of heat-treated cast steel, but with tungsten carbide inlays in the lower edges that take the brunt of wear from the blades flexing hard against the guard. Longtime agronomy consultant and Exapta founder Matt Hagney says, "The original Valions are lasting about two-and-a-half to four times longer than OEM guards. While that's a huge improvement, we thought we could do even better. So we kept trying, and the tungsten carbide inlays of the Valion Ultras have passed extensive testing this past spring on planters across the U.S. I think farmers deserve the option of something that will last essentially the lifetime of the planter, without the hassle of constantly replacing softer OEM guards to keep the planter working correctly."

Hagney steps back to explain why this planter part is so important: "What is generally referred to as a 'seed tube guard' - the cast piece that hangs down be-

tween the opener blades, just ahead of the seed tube itself - would be more appropriately called a 'blade flex guard,' since it's a crucial element in getting the planter to perform day after day without alteration of the furrow shape." Hagney continues, "Pinched furrows have been a long-standing problem. We've been pointing this out for over a decade - as unbiased observers without any financial stake. There was a definite need for more durable seedtube guards. Now, we've developed products that prevent opener blade flex over a much greater lifespan, thus creating a properly shaped furrow that's consistently wide enough to get the seeds to the bottom of it, which gives farmers more planting depth control."

While intended to limit opener blade flex, standard OEM seed tube guards can wear substantially in just a few hours of use due to their construction from mild cast iron, and small wear surface. In all but the mellowest of tilled soils, the seed tube

guard is a crucial part of the furrow-forming process by preventing the pliable opener blades from being compressed together by the soil's resilience (structure, and/or crusting). The consequence is a furrow that's pinched at the bottom, sometimes no thicker than a credit card, and far too narrow to get a corn, soybean, cotton, or sunflower seed to a uniform depth - since the amount of blade flex (and the degree of pinching) varies every few feet as soil mellowness changes. This depth variation causes less uniformity in timing of emergence, and thus robs yield.

Hagney remarks, "Farmers are surprised that this piece of the planter is all that important. Yet if you sit on the back of the planter and watch, if it's running Keetons, and the guards are worn, you can sit there and watch the effective depth of the furrow change as you go through the field - the top of the Keeton rises and falls in relation to the soil surface, which indicates that the

seed depth is also changing, because the furrow is too pinched, and the amount of pinching continually varies in firm or moderately firm seedbeds. But on rows with new seed tube guards installed, the Keeton will run smoothly, and all the seeds will be at the same depth."

Valions provide consistent performance from Day One of planting season, and not just weeks but years to come. Some farmers in tougher soils are known to rebuild their planter with new OEM guards midseason, but the Valion's extreme durability eliminates this hassle during planting season - when days and hours are critical. Plus, the Valion's internal channel can hold 1/4" plastic tubing at the ideal location to deliver liquids to the seed furrow, and this capability means more versatility for farmers.

The new Valion Ultras are available for all Deere planters with XP cast row units (\$63), and Deere pre-XP row units (JD 7000 thru early 1700-series) and

Kinze 2000s (\$68). The original Valions - high-chrome castings, but without the tungsten inlays - remain in Exapta's product line-up for all of these planter models.

In another major product introduction, original-type chrome-alloy Valions for Kinze 3000s are now available (mid-Nov 2013) for \$23.50 ea., but do not have liquid capability. Leah Lanie, Exapta's sales manager, explains: "The Kinze 3000-series owners were begging us to develop something for them, since the Kinze 3000 guards not only wear quickly and are annoying to replace with

their allen bolts, but neglecting to replace them often enough results in destruction of the shank of the opener itself."

Exapta Solutions, makers of the Thompson wheel and Mojo Wire, was founded by Matt Hagney in 1998, with the simple vision of providing better tools for no-till seeding. Hagney has been an independent crop consultant for no-till systems since 1994, and agronomy is still his passion. Finesse

Tiger Woods has it and I'll bet you'll have to agree Joe Montana showed finesse when he won a string of Super Bowls. Joe seems to display a smooth way of moving even when he climbs a fence. Nothing clumsy about the former NFL player and that includes the way he sits a horse. We watched Joe at the NCHA Futurity in Fort Worth and it was easy to see his athletic ability in action while he competed in the Super Bowl of cutting horses.

Finesse has a way of showing itself but sometimes you have to look hard to recognize it. Some people are born with it and others work hard to develop it. It's a smooth way of moving, talking, coaxing or performing a certain task that accomplishes the job with a higher degree of skill that produces better results for the activity.

Joe chose to enter the practice pen at the Will Rogers Coliseum near where we were sitting. His horse was already tied in the pen and, when he climbed the fence, I couldn't help notice the way he cleared the fence going into the pen. There was no imbalance or awkward moves. He came down the aisle,

cleared the fence and was untying his horse in an efficient, easy manner: no wasteful moves. Other people teetered and tottered a little before they made it over the fence onto the practice pen floor.

Finesse wins Super Bowls and golf tournaments but it also is used to produce some good horses. Snaffle bit reinsmen, the good ones, must display a high degree of finesse to train the outstanding performance horses we see on the ranch and in the arena.

Heavy-handed trainers

never achieve the results that can be attained by thoughtful gentle pressure on the reins connected to the rings of a snaffle fitted in a young horse's mouth. They're frightened and nervous on those first few rides and if you merely use those rings to apply gentle persuasion to tilt the horse's head in one direction or the other to coax them around the pen, you'll be showing a bit of your own finesse in training your horse.

Putting a good rein on a horse is one of those instances where finesse is hard for me to recognize unless I intently watch the rider's hands and legs for the slightest movement to see just what is going on. It's hard to see and most times when I'm watching the hands, I'll miss those ever-so-subtle leg, calf or heel movements that communicate through hide, hair and leather to the horse's brain and back to his body to move the part the rider wants moved.

Training horses takes finesse to the highest level. Those good trainers that display it must use the feel of the animal's every move to respond with their own moves to coordinate the animal's body with their own light touch or pressure on one rein or the other, or maybe both, to send signals that the animal can learn to respond to in certain ways. I came to realize how difficult and challenging it is to train a good horse. You've got to show double finesse to not only smooth out your movements but also insure the colt makes his moves in a soft, efficient way.

The consequences of a hard hand or temper induced spur can set the horse back weeks and sometimes leave a permanent scar that may never be erased. Finesse with horses means less is more. Good trainers sometimes stop the horse and sit still for ten or fifteen minutes trying to figure out why they're not getting across to the colt. The rest gives the horse and rider time to think about what is happening. That short interlude could turn the lights on and provide the answer. Sitting still and doing nothing is better than to keep hammering on the horse causing him to become more confused and often times more frightened. A minute is a long time. Try sitting

still and giving the horse a breather for five minutes. Time it. You'll be surprised how long it takes for that second hand to tick-tock five times around the dial. Your pony will be glad for the break and most likely when you go back he'll have a clearer mind and may surprise you by catching on this time.

Next time you go to pull on a rein to turn or sit back and pull on both of them to stop, try doing it a little softer. I mean be soft and melt back in the saddle and barely lift on the reins and say "whoa." Barely lay the neck rein on your horse and ask him to turn, if he's slow to respond, gently push your outside calf into his side and give him time to respond. Practice giving him a chance to do it the easy way and you might find he'll cooperate a little more willingly.

The only difference I see between horse trainers and sports heroes is that maybe a horse trainer really does need a bit more skill and finesse to get his job done. Too bad the pay scale isn't based on finesse. It would sure help the horse business.

Kansas Wheat Commission issues call for research proposals

Research proposals that can enhance the profitability of Kansas wheat farmers are being sought by the Kansas Wheat Commission for the 2015 fiscal year.

The KWC, a farmer-funded organization based in Manhattan, needs preliminary letters of intent by Nov. 29, 2013. These will be reviewed by a committee of farmer-commissioners, who will issue an invitation for full proposals on Dec. 18. Final proposals will be due by Jan. 24, 2014 and on Feb. 18-19, proposal applicants will be invited to give a brief proposal presentation to a research review committee in Manhattan. Final award announcements will be made in April, 2014.

"With the current rapidly evolving world of crop technology, Kansas Wheat Commissioners take their job of advancing wheat research very seriously," says Aaron Harries, director of marketing for the Kansas Wheat Commission. "Nearly one quarter of the Commission's producer-funded budget is appropriated to wheat research."

Research proposal applicants should consider the following three goals when submitting research proposals:

Focus research by selecting research initiatives that support the industry's ability to gain and sustain market share profitably in both domestic and international markets.

Educate Kansas wheat producers to adopt technologies that are shown by research and development to be profitable.

Cooperate with the wheat supply chain to adopt and implement technologies and innovations that support the profitability of Kansas wheat producers.

Some specific areas of interest include:

New Variety Development

Improvement of HRW and HW wheat varieties for Kansas.

Improved insect and disease resistance.

Wheat varieties with increased human health benefit.

Quality screening of new wheat varieties.

Use of wheat doubled haploids for rapid trait discovery and variety development.

Develop wheat varieties that are consumable by people with gluten sensitivity (Celiac disease).

Production

Insect and disease monitoring and development of new management tools.

Stored grain management tools

Best management practices to maximize yields and profit.

Mobile technology apps for wheat farmers.

Trait Discovery and Biotechnology

Tools, technologies and methods to sequence the wheat genome.

Identify traits that could be introduced into wheat that would encourage consumer acceptance of biotech wheat.

Yield enhancing and adaptability traits (heat tolerance, drought resistance, nitrogen-use efficiency, insect resistance, disease resistance).

Identify proteins that lead to gluten intolerance (Celiac disease).

Testing Methods and Procedures

Efficient and rapid market applicable test for identifying and predicting end-use quality of HW and HRW. Available to growers and grain trade for identifying and capturing value.

Value-Added Uses

Non-food or feed uses for wheat that return value directly to the farmer and have potential mass-market appeal.

Benefits of whole grains and healthful components of wheat in the diet.

New uses of wheat.

HRW wheat for Asian-style and instantnoodles.

To submit a two-page, preliminary letter of intent, the following must be included:

Title, Estimated Project Cost (without budget),

Project Status (new or continuing),

Principal Investigators (contact information - including e-mail addresses),

Introduction, Objectives, Project Location and Duration,

Other Funding Received For Project (include other potential funding sources),

Research Cooperators, Expected Outcome (including benefits to Kansas wheat producers). Proposals not

meeting these requirements will be rejected.

All letters of intent should be submitted via electronic mail in a Microsoft Word document or Adobe Acrobat format to aharries@ks wheat.com no later than Nov. 29, 2013. Proposals are evaluated and prioritized by committee based on relevance to Kansas Wheat goals and funds available. Not all research projects will be funded.

Crop progress on pace this fall

For the week ending November 10, 2013, precipitation totaled around a half inch across most of the state, with heavier amounts in north central and southeast Kansas, preventing some remaining crops from being harvested, according to USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Heavy rains over the last few weeks in the southeast district have delayed soybean harvest, damaged wheat stands, and prevented some farmers from getting their wheat seeded. There were 3.9 days suitable for fieldwork. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 5 percent very short, 18 short, 67 adequate, and 10 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 14 percent very short, 25 short, 56 adequate, and 5 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat emerged was 92 percent, near 91 last year but ahead of 87 average. Wheat condition rated 0 percent very poor, 3 poor, 33 fair, 58 good, and 6 excellent.

Corn harvest was 91 percent complete, behind 100 last year, but near 90 average.

Sorghum harvested was 78 percent, behind 87 last year but ahead of 74 average.

Soybeans harvested was 86 percent, behind 93 last year and 89 average.

Cotton with open bolls was 98 percent, behind 100 last year but equal to the average. Thirty-one percent of the crop was harvested, well behind 63 last year but near 35 average. Condition rated 3 percent very poor, 11 poor, 50 fair, 33 good, and 3 excellent.

Sunflowers harvested was 70 percent, behind 81 last year but equal to the average.

The fourth cutting of alfalfa was 93 percent complete, behind 98 last year and 97 average.

Livestock, Pasture and Range Report: The condition of range and pasture rated 17 percent very poor, 18 poor, 33 fair, 29 good, and 3 excellent. Stock water supplies rated 9 percent very short, 15 short, 71 adequate, and 5 surplus.

Data for this release were provided at the county level by USDA Farm Service Agency and KSU Extension Service.

Livestock lease agreements a new option

Older farmers and young farmers strapped for capital are teaming up in increasing numbers to form livestock lease alliances.

"Leasing land is common. Why not cattle?" said University of Missouri Extension agribusiness specialist Mary Sobba.

Young producers who may not have adequate finances are working with ready-to-retire producers to share income and profits on cattle by sharing land, machinery, breeding stock, labor, seed, fertilizer and other costs.

Sobba suggests that producers and would-be producers test the fairness of a lease by using a two-column worksheet, one for the landowner and one for the tenant.

Owners can cash-lease beef cows, or the owner

could furnish a set of bred cows or heifers for a predetermined lease price. The operator receives the livestock, cares for and manages the animals, keeps a percent of the calf crop, and returns the cows to the owner at the end of the lease.

Ways to determine cash rental rates are livestock ownership costs, livestock owner net share, rent and operator's net return to livestock.

Some considerations include fence repair, bull expense, how and when cows are culled and sold, how and when calves are sold, and replacement females.

Owners and tenants also should decide the length of the lease, incentives for lower death loss and higher calving percentages, and provisions for drought and disaster.

Heath earned this opportunity as he was winner of the Pottawatomie County Conservation District's local speech contest on October 24th.

Heath's speech was given on the topic set by the KACD. This year's topic was "Soil to Spoon." Mr. Overmyer encouraged others to take care of the soil under us in order to produce the food we eat. Heath will receive a prize of \$100 made possible by KACD. Each contest is held every year and all Pottawatomie County high school students are encouraged to enter.

Kansas Association of Wheat Growers offers scholarship

High school seniors pursuing careers in agriculture are encouraged to apply for the 2014 Herb Clutter Memorial Scholarship. The Herb Clutter Memorial Scholarship was established in 2009 to honor Herb Clutter's influential role in organizing leadership groups on behalf of Kansas wheat producers and is administered by the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers.

The scholarship fund will award one \$500 scholarship per year, to a college or university-bound incoming freshman from Kansas, pursuing a career in the field of agriculture. To be eligible for the scholarship, applicants must plan to be a full-time student at any two or four year Kansas college or

university. Recipients will be selected based on academic achievement, leadership qualities and career objectives focused around the field of agriculture. Recipients will receive the scholarship to be applied toward tuition for the student's college or university education. The scholarship is non-renewable.

The Herb Clutter Memorial Scholarship was established through a fund in memory of Herbert W. Clutter, a farmer from Holcomb and the first president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, which was established in 1948. Clutter encouraged Kansas wheat farmers to organize as a strong, unified voice, which led to the formation of the Kansas Association of

Wheat Growers in 1952. He encouraged research in education and industrial uses of wheat, improved variety development and methods to produce the best product at the lowest cost. Clutter's efforts led to the formation of the Kansas Wheat Commission by the Kansas legislature, in 1957.

"Herb's story and the impact he had on the wheat industry serves as an excellent example to young adults as they begin their college careers," says Justin Gilpin, CEO Kansas Wheat. "His vision, hard work, and sense of community are all qualities tomorrow's leaders will need to possess. This scholarship is intended to carry on his legacy in the Kansas wheat industry."

Applicants of the Herb Clutter Memorial Scholarship must complete the scholarship application, which includes a 400-500 word essay discussing why they have chosen to pursue

a career in agriculture. The selection committee will use this essay along with the student's application in determining the scholarship winner. The deadline for scholarship applications is February 1, 2014.



The Cycle of Fire

The Mountain West as pictured by the European immigrants in the days of Lewis and Clark, was covered with immense healthy forests that had recycled themselves naturally for centuries. They grew from seeds, matured, reproduced, died, burned and prepared the land for a fresh seeding. Fire was not the enemy.

Explorers first saw the forests holding their place in the bio-system of the West. Settlers came and built forts and fences, houses and dams, cities and free-ways. Forests were harvested for fuel and construction. They had to be cleared so man could build on the ground.

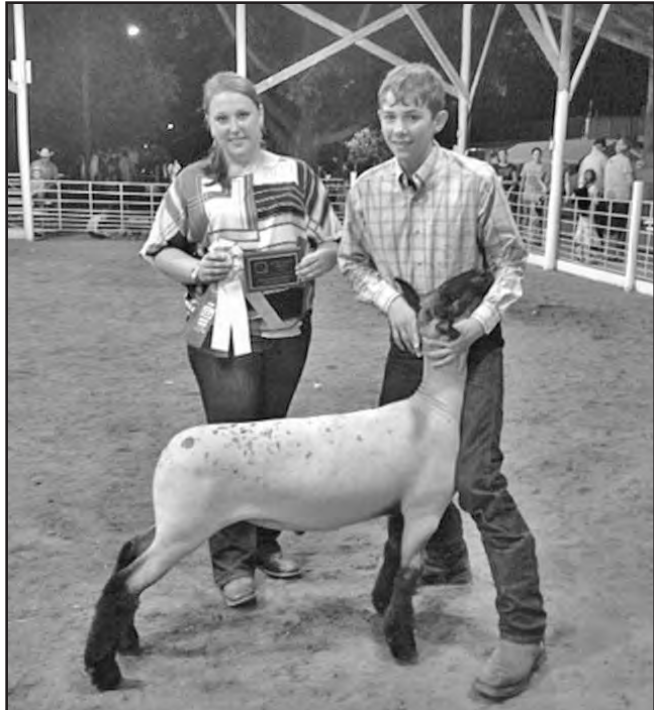
Timber companies, ranchers and railroaders thought the virgin forests were unending. In the latter part of the 19th century they were allowed to recycle. During the early 20th century timber companies and government agencies began to replant clear-cut forests to sustain timbering.

Then mid-century came the conservationists, politicians, environmentalists and tree huggers. They took

the stand that thinning, clear-cutting, grazing, hunting, improving water tanks, roads and settlers just harmed the forest. So they instigated restrictions. They chose forest fire as the enemy, Smokey Bear told

them so! For the next 50 years of forest management they fought forest fires. This encouraged people to build beautiful homes in the tall pines. Any attempt to utilize the crowning, crowded timber or deadfall as a private industry resource was scorned. The trees kept growing and seeding, seeding, shedding, dying and falling on the forest floor. In the 1980s the pine-bark beetle became an obvious factor and large stands of pine trees turned yellow and died.

Then lightning stood up

and took his turn. He set the West on fire. It is still burning. Today forest fires consume twice as much land each year as they did in 1970. The burn season today is two and a half months longer than it was in 1970. Nature is taking it back until every acre of pine trees in the West is recycled in the inferno. It will take years and years to recover from our hubris that allowed us to think we can bend nature's rules and get away with it.

We all watch with fear and admiration every year as fire jumpers by the thou-

sands risk their lives daily to protect man-made structures. And what happened to the environmentalists and conservationists and politicians who led the battle to drive lumberjacks, cowboys and miners out of the woods? The same activists who used the spotted owl and their incestuous sycophant, the EPA, to shut down sawmill towns and grazing permits and road builders... the greasy politicians parading their magnanimous influence like circus monkeys in a sideshow shutting down the West by decreeing it a

wilderness- where are they now?

Now that, through unintended consequences, they have helped savage the West, I expect they've moved on. They've taken their Sierra Club calendars, endangered species T-shirts, fundraising bumper stickers and non-profit lawyers to work on bombing horse slaughter plants, protesting GMO grain, burning animal research laboratories, sabotaging modern animal agriculture and, as always, trying to save the old reliable whale.

Ignorance repeats itself.

Sow packers will require premises ID tags starting in 2015

In an effort to improve pre-harvest traceability and improve national disease surveillance in the pork industry, many major U.S. packers and processors will require a USDA-approved, official premises identification number (PIN) swine tag as a condition of sale for breeding stock beginning Jan. 1, 2015.

“This is a positive step for our industry as we continue to create a more robust surveillance and traceability system that can help protect our animals, our livelihoods and our customers,” said National Pork Board president Karen Richter, a producer from Montgomery, Minn. “That’s why I encourage producers who may not already be using official PIN tags to register their premises and begin using the tags now.”

According to Dr. Patrick Webb, Pork Checkoff’s director of swine health, the USDA-approved, official PIN tags for breeding swine are customizable with or without a management number and can be purchased in multiple colors.

“This allows producers to use the official tag in any color as a management tag or wait to apply the tag to sows and boars before leaving the production site to enter harvest channels,” Webb said.

Once an animal is identified with an official PIN tag, it should not be removed or given a different official tag in the case of parity-segregated farms. Also, records documenting the identification and movement of breeding stock should be kept for three years.

Allflex USA, Inc., Destron Fearing and Y-Text Corporation have USDA approval to manufacture official PIN swine tags. When ordering, producers must provide the nationally standardized PIN for the breeding farm. If the site does not have a PIN, producers can register for one by going to www.pork.org/PINtag.

To date, packers that will require PIN tags as of January 2015 include: Johnsonville, Hillshire Brands, Calihan Pork Processors, Bob Evans Farms, Wampler’s Farm Sausage, Pine Ridge Farms, Pioneer Packing Co., Pork King Packing and Abbyland Pork Pack.

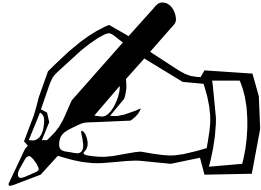

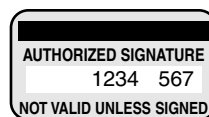

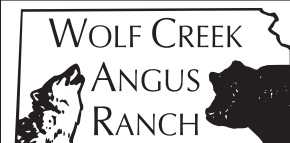

Kansas corn growers forecast to bring in bountiful harvest

(AP) – Government forecasters predict Kansas farmers this season will bring in far bigger harvests of corn, sorghum and soybeans than during last year's drought.

In its monthly crop production report released recently, the National Agricultural Statistics Service said this year's corn harvest in Kansas would bring in 520 million bushels. That's 37 percent more corn than a year ago, even though only slightly more acres are being harvested.

Kansas farmers are harvesting some 4 million corn acres this season, up 1 percent from a year ago. The anticipated average yields of 130 bushels per acre are

up 34 bushels an acre from what farmers were cutting in 2012.

The government forecast also estimates the state's sorghum crop, at 187 million bushels, will be more than double what farmers cut last year.

Growers in the state are cutting 2.75 million acres of sorghum, or 31 percent more acres than they did last year. Yields are forecast at 68 bushels per acre, up 29 bushels from last year.

Soybean production is forecast at 124 million bushels, up 45 percent from a year ago, the agency said.

The agency said the 3.54 million acres of soybeans

being cut this year are down 7 percent below last year, but production is still up because yields are so much better this season. Farmers have been getting 35 bushels per acre of soybeans this year, about 12.5 bushels per acre more than a year ago.

Cotton production is forecast at 34,000 bales. That's down 51 percent from last year, even though cotton yields are up, because farmers planted far fewer acres of it.

Kansas farmers also planted fewer acres of sunflowers and dry beans this year, but the agency's production forecast for those crops won't be published until January.

CK Ranch awarded inaugural Hereford Heritage Award

Fiscal year 2013 has been a record-setting year in many ways for the Hereford breed, and the inaugural Hereford Heritage Award is a continuation of the trend. For the first time ever, a breeder has registered 10,000 head total. Better yet, in this year alone, three ranches have achieved that level.



Glory Everhart of the Detroit Ramblers 4-H Club was named the reserve champion junior sheep showman at the Central Kansas Free Fair in Abilene.

This achievement has prompted the American Hereford Association (AHA) to create an award to commemorate such a milestone. CK Ranch, Brookville; Dudley Bros., Comanche, Texas; and Upstream Ranch, Taylor, Neb., are the recipients of this award commemorating their unprecedented level of commitment to the

Hereford breed. They were recognized during AHA's annual meeting Nov. 1 in Kansas City, Mo.

CK Ranch is located in the Smoky Hills region of Saline and Ellsworth counties of central Kansas. Jack and Donna Vanier and their son, John, own the ranch and the cow herd. Ray and Mary Negus manage the ranch.

The ranch includes approximately 15,000 acres of native pastures and 1,000 acres of tillable cropland. The Vanier family has owned the land since 1933, when the 5,600-acre Root Ranch was purchased.

CK Ranch was first stocked with steers, but in

the 1950s the ranch managed 2,000 registered cows and registered approximately 1,200 calves each year. Currently the CK commercial herd consists of 600 Hereford and Red Angus cows, and 175 registered Hereford cows make up the seedstock herd.

The primary purpose of the commercial cows is to serve as a testing herd to prove Hereford and Red Angus genetics. CK Ranch uses premium programs to collect data and to improve traits in the commercial herd. The ranch has participated in the AHA National Reference Sire Evaluation Program and the Hereford Verified program.

Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The corn market reversed higher following the supply and demand report then built upon those gains Monday, Nov. 11 on short covering action, but that was the end of our rally. The corn has not been able to move higher despite bull spreading, strong basis levels, strong ethanol production, and fantastic exports. If last week's production estimate is correct then there is a good chance that we see the ending stocks estimate fall as we move through the crop year because both the current export sales pace and ethanol production pace are exceeding the levels needed to meet the current estimate. The assumption, however, seems to be that the good demand numbers won't last. There is a great deal of fear that both the cash and futures markets will soften as we move forward due in part to the threat of a large crop in South America.

Export competition will definitely be a problem at some point, but in the meantime putting pressure on the market now

seems to be creating a bargain buying opportunity for our customers. Expect the large export sales of corn and grain sorghum to continue for the time being and expect USDA to raise the export estimate in the January report. The December corn chart still suggests that a move to \$4.50 is possible. It is also likely that we see the bull spreading continue thanks to the strong basis levels. Although we won't see spread activity anything like last year, where many of the bull spreads set records, there is a good chance that the December contract gets even with the March.

The wheat has been a major disappointment thanks to the supply and demand report and improving crop condition ratings. The export sales pace is slowing as well, which doesn't help because exports are the only source of demand that can draw down stocks at this point. The December KW did manage to break a string of 11 consecutive lower closes, but it followed that up with a new

low for the move and yet another lower close. I still look at the tight old crop supplies and think that the market is underperforming. I also look at Paris Milling Wheat futures trading at the top end of their trading range and think that U.S. wheat has to be cheap enough, but it keeps getting cheaper. Basis levels are firm thanks to the tight supplies, so perhaps the wheat is going to act like the corn market has the few years and the cash market is going to be the leader and not the futures.

The soybeans have-n't given up all of their post report gains, but they got close on Friday. The bullish enthusiasm caused by the lower-than-expected ending stocks and excellent demand gave way to overbought technical indicators, a

steady bio-diesel mandate recommendation from EPA, and fear of a large South American crop. Demand has been hot, and it will only get hotter, but as we closed out the week traders are only focused on the negatives.

The chart pattern suggests that the January beans could find support at the \$12.75 level, but a failure there would suggest that we will see the market fall to new lows. The early week action will be critical. A quick failure at the \$12.75 support will be a very negative sign and suggest a quick move to the bottom of the range.

Cash cattle traded at \$132, which was an improvement from the prior week. It looks like the front months of the live cattle will at least test the recent highs, but it will probably take cash cattle trade over \$134 to make new contract highs. The fundamentals of the live cattle market give me optimism, but the market hasn't been moving very quickly. Look for the bull market to continue, though it may do so slowly.

January feeder cattle found support at the 50-

day moving average again this week. That market is still about \$4.00 off of the contract high, but there is definitely a shot at testing the highs once again. The weakness in the corn market helps, but what the feeder cattle really need is strength in the deferred live cattle futures. Stay long as long as the January feeders are above \$164.25.

He shares wisdom and advice with the team in addition to supplying his time and space. Carr is exiting the tractor-pulling business, and wishes to see the team have continued success.

The Kansas State University Tractor Team competes annually at the ASABE ¼ Scale Tractor Competition in Peoria, Ill., along with 25 universities from the U.S. and Canada. During the year, the team designs and produces a ¼ scale pulling tractor for use in the competition. Powercat Tractors has experienced success with ten international championships since creating the team. Much of the success is contributed to the strenuous design testing by use of sleds like the one Carr donated to the team.
