



Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The October supply and demand report was a bit less bearish than expected. The corn yield was higher at 174.2 and the ending stocks were increased to 2.081 billion, but many traders feared something worse. That being said the corn was still down about 10 cents on the day, so it might have gotten really bad had the report come in as expected. The fear now will be that big crops get bigger and traders will now be looking for another yield increase in the November report.

The December contract posted an outside day down on the chart and indicators are still in over-bought territory, so from a technical standpoint the corn market is on very shaky ground. I look for a

test of the recent lows very soon. The market never got as weak as I expected ahead of the October report, so it may make up for that going into the November report.

The wheat numbers were actually a little bit bullish, which was a surprise and the wheat traded higher most of the day. Ending stocks were cut to 654 million thanks mostly to higher exports and higher feed usage. One may wonder why we would feed more wheat with all that corn available, but perhaps this report is reflecting some of the quality issues the U.S. wheat crop has faced this year. Exports haven't been good enough to justify an increase either, so USDA may just be trying to be optimistic.

The report did encourage quite a bit of bull spreading Friday, or at least the combination of lower ending stocks and rain in the HRW Belt encouraged some bull spreading. The December versus July KW spread reached the highest level in about a month, so perhaps that spreading can continue for a little bit longer.

The soybean numbers were a little bit friendly because ending stocks were cut to 450 million. Most of that was because of the cut in beginning stocks that occurred in the September Quarterly Stocks report. Yield and production were higher and will probably be higher again in November, which is why the beans ended up being weak Friday and posted an

outside day down on the charts.

Like the corn, we should look for a retest of the lows in the soybean market. 450 million bushel ending stocks are still very comfortable, so it will take much better exports to draw down supplies to a level that would warrant lasting gains in the market.

The cattle had an exciting week with \$164 - \$165 cash cattle trade and new all-time highs in the feeder cattle index. We also saw quite a bit of weakness after new contract highs were made in the futures. It doesn't look like the feeder index will be coming down very soon, so there probably isn't a lot of reason for pressure in the front months of the feeders, but we will have to have higher live cattle trade to give a reason for more strength. One thing to watch will be the stock market. If we take out the August lows next week it could really make traders nervous.

State fair has highest attendance since 1998

(AP) – Kansas State Fair officials say great weather and attractive entertainment acts helped push this year's attendance to its highest level since 1998 and could turn out to be the fourth-largest fair of all time.

The *Hutchinson News* reports the total attendance during the 101st year of the fair was announced Monday at 355,329, which is about 15,000 more people than the year before.

The large crowds made it tough to walk the roads across the fairgrounds – especially on weekends – and lines were long for both fair lines and food booths alike.

General manager Denny Stoecklein says the fair's carnival recorded its highest gross revenues ever with \$1.264 million, a 3.3 percent increase over last year. He says the previous record was \$1.257 million in 2010.

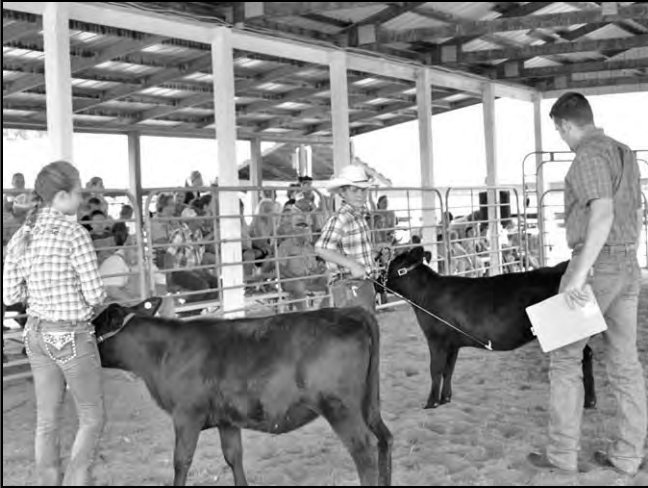

BCI develops training modules in collaboration with \$25 million research effort

A series of new beef cattle online training modules has been released by the Beef Cattle Institute at Kansas State University. The series was produced in part with funds from a \$25 million grant distributed to 16 institutions in 2012.

The purpose of the \$25 million effort is to focus on the prevention, reduction and control of the shiga toxin-producing *Escherichia coli* (STEC) from pre-harvest through consumption of beef products. Awarded to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) National Institute of Food and Agriculture Coordinated Agricultural Project (CAP) grant team is made up of 50 investigators, including many from K-State.

In continued efforts to raise awareness for the grant's objectives, the latest training modules focus on the fifth major objective of the grant: education and outreach. Made up of 11 sections, the STEC Beef Safety Training, titled "Translation of STEC: Mitigation to Field Implementation," is a series of comprehensive modules, available in both English and Spanish. Covered topics of E. coli prevention in beef safety include pre-harvest operations that consist of feedlot, cow-calf, veal and cull dairy cows, and post-harvest operations for small-scale processors, distributors and restaurants.

"We are pleased to deliver this important tool for people involved in the beef industry to learn about preventing E. coli in beef and veal," said Dan Thomson, director of K-State's Beef Cattle Institute. "I commend the USDA for stepping forward

and funding such outreach projects that will reach the trenches of production animal caregivers."

Since the training modules are available in both English and Spanish, the efforts will likely reach a wider audience.

"Providing bilingual employee-based training will be a great tool for people involved with beef production, from the farm to the plate, to learn how to do their part to provide safe, nutritious beef products," Thomson added.

Rodney Moxley, professor in the School of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences at UNL and project coordinator for the STEC CAP grant, feels that working with the BCI to develop the modules will allow them to reach a larger audience.

"This takes advantage of BCI's expertise, as (the BCI) is state of the art for this kind of education," he said. "The beauty of the modules is that there is assessment built into the training, providing assurance and documentation of what they've learned."

Whether it's working with live cattle in the packing plant or on the retail end of beef products, Moxley is confident the modules will help the team achieve its goals in education and outreach, as the trainings target individuals in specific areas.

Report projects positive outlook for pork producers and consumers

The U.S. pork industry today is small by historic standards. But, signs of producers holding back more females to increase the breeding herd mean the industry is in the process of expanding, which could put more pounds of pork in grocery stores by the middle of next year.

"We continue to have historically high hog prices, as well as retail pork prices," said Glynn Tonsor, livestock economist for K-

State Research and Extension. "We also have improving production costs as grain prices are coming down. That's sending a signal, an economic incentive, for pork producers to expand so they can sell more pigs at a positive dollar per head margin than they did last year."

Information about the state of the U.S. pork industry was included in the quarterly Hogs and Pigs Report, released by the U.S. Department of Agricul-

ture's National Agricultural Statistics Service on Sept. 26. Tonsor said the report provides the best estimate of the current size of the industry and how large it will be in the future.

According to the report, the inventory of all hogs and pigs on Sept. 1, 2014 was 65.4 million head, which was 2 percent lower than a year ago but up 6 percent from June of this year. The breeding inventory was at 5.92 million head, up 2 percent from last year and up 1 percent from June. The market hog inventory was at 59.4 million head, down 3 percent from last year but 7 percent higher than it was in June.

Further, U.S. hog producers intend to have 2.89 million sows farrow, or have pigs, during the September through November 2014 quarter, which is up 4 percent from the actual farrowings during the same period in 2013 and up slightly from 2012. A projected 2.87 million sows will farrow December through February 2015, up 4 percent from 2014 and up 3 percent from 2013.

A consumer focus

What does this expansion outlook mean for pork consumers? Tonsor said most likely around the mid-

dle of next year, retailers will see an increase in pork supplies coming from this expansion. An increase in supplies likely means cheaper pork prices for consumers.

"None of this is guaranteed, but our current estimate is that we're going to have more sows, and therefore more pigs and more pork pounds that show up starting around April 2015," he said. "There will be some relief in high prices (consumers) have been seeing for some time now. Most of these adjustments take a long time, not quite as long of a biological lag that we have in the cattle industry, but they still take time."

Specifically, it would take in excess of eight months from starting the process of holding back females, to breeding them, to farrowing them, to weaning their pigs and feeding them to a finished market weight.

"The reason I highlight that is the tight pork supply situation we have today is here for the rest of 2014," Tonsor said. "Couple that with strong meat demand in general, strong pork demand in particular, we're probably going to have historically high pork prices the rest of 2014."

One of the greatest challenges the U.S. pork indus-

try has faced recently is PEDv, or porcine epidemic diarrhea virus. Discovered in the United States for the first time in 2013, PEDv is a disease caused by a porcine coronavirus and can lead to vomiting and occasional diarrhea in sows and gilts and severe diarrhea and vomiting in nursing and recently weaned pigs, according to Kansas State University's College of Veterinary Medicine (http://www.vet.k-state.edu/depts/dmp/service/news/KSVDL_PEDV_fact_sheet.pdf).

PEDv spreads quickly and can lead to severe sickness and death in pigs, although it is not a threat to food safety or humans. A Pork Checkoff report (www.pork.org/News/4678/PEDVs_Impact.aspx#.VC7IH3i9Kc0) estimates the disease caused a loss of 7 million to 8 million pigs from June 2013 to April 2014.

"To the extent we have additional concerns about PEDv, that could mute some of this increase in pork production," Tonsor said.

PEDv has reduced the amount of pigs weaned per litter, he said, and the net effect is fewer market hogs in the United States, therefore fewer pork pounds produced. In the past, the virus has hit swine herds worse from November through

April. Although vaccines have been developed recently, it's unknown if producers can battle the virus more effectively through the coming winter with use of the new vaccines.

Pork demand still high

Despite the recent and current tight supply situation caused in a large part by PEDv, Tonsor said retail pork demand has been strong. Given the pounds produced and consumed in the United States recently, the retail price realized was higher than most expected.

"The second quarter of 2014 was actually the best quarter for retail pork demand, the way I estimate it, in more than 10 years," he said. "It's important to recognize that's a positive signal for the entire pork industry, because the public was willing to pay more for those reduced pork pounds than we expected."

"The U.S. public sees more value in those (pork) products," he continued. "Maybe the products are more convenient. Maybe the consumers were less sensitive to the price or had improving incomes. Probably some of all of the above is actually truth, which led to this positive demand story."

The training sessions will be led by Dan Thomson, DVM, PhD; Chris Reinhardt, PhD; and Dave Rethorst, DVM; all of the Beef Cattle Institute.

October 27 – Parish Hall, Sharon Springs – 6:00 – 9:00 p.m. MDT

November 4 – Washington County Livestock, Washington – 6:00 – 9:00 p.m.

Producers, veterinarians and feedyard employees will receive Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) training and information relevant to the cow-calf, stocker and feedlot industry segments; animal husbandry best management practices; and downed animal care and humane euthanasia training. In addition, stockmanship principles and low-stress cattle-handling techniques will be studied. All producers and veterinarians who attend will earn BQA certification. BQA certification is valid for three years. The workshop in Garden City will be translated to Spanish.

Each workshop is free of charge and includes a complimentary meal. Pre-registration one week or more prior to the event is requested. You may pre-register by contacting the Beef Cattle Institute at 785-532-4844 or kjoliver@vet.ksu.edu. Walk-in attendees are welcome, but are not guaranteed a meal.

Reduce stress on calves at weaning time

Weaning of calves is one of the most stressful parts of most calves lives. In some situations, not only is the calf removed from it's dam, the calf is moved to a new location and offered a different ration. Numerous research studies show that calves weaned using low stress methods have less sickness, less death loss and gain more weight during the succeeding weeks after weaning.

There are multiple ways to wean. Some are abrupt (hard weaning), while others are more gradual (soft weaning). Hard weaning methods immediately separate calves from their mothers until they stop bawling. These would include putting unweaned calves in a pen or drylot or taking them directly to a livestock market

Soft weaning methods prevent nursing, but still

allow the calf to have contact with the cow. Nose clips and fenceline weaning are the two most common soft weaning techniques. Plastic nose clips, attached to the calf's nose, have a flap that prevents the calf from getting the cow's teat in its mouth; some also "stick" the cow so that she moves away when the calf tries to suckle. With fenceline weaning, cows are moved into an adjacent pasture and calves are left in their "home" pasture, allowing them to go nose-to-nose and do everything except nurse.

Both of the soft weaning methods reduce signs of walking and vocalization of newly weaned calves when compared to hard weaning. Measurements of postweaning gain indicate that fenceline weaned calves outgain traditionally weaned calves as far as 10 weeks after weaning whereas improvement in gain in 2-stage weaned calves was only ap-

parent in the first 2 to 3 weeks after being removed from dams.

When you look at the various weaning methods, soft weaning methods clearly create less stress for the calf and should be employed whenever feasible and appropriate for the operation. Specifically, research has revealed that fenceline weaning comes closest to replicating the performance of the pre-weaned calves in terms of how much time they spend resting and eating, as well as how much they gain at 2 weeks and at 10 weeks.

If implementing fenceline weaning the first step is to have a calf-proof fence to keep calves from nursing

from their mothers on the other side. If possible move the cows and calves into the area you plan to leave the calves in for a few days prior to weaning so the calf will be acclimated to their surroundings. Use your creativity when coming up with methods you can use, corrals next to a pasture or sub dividing with electric fences are some methods that will work. More suggestions on fenceline weaning can be found in a bulletin by Wright and Pruitt at <http://agbiopubs.sdstate.edu/articles/ExEx2049.pdf>.

If using anti-suckling devices, they should be put on the calves three to seven days prior to weaning. If they are allowed to remain on the calf longer, some

calves may learn to flip the device up so they can still nurse. Devices can be reused but be sure to disinfect between uses.

Regardless of method used, the advantages of soft weaning methods are clear. Calves are less stressed, have better gains and enjoy better health than those weaned in other ways. I know of several producers in our area who have implemented soft weaning methods and none have gone back to hard weaning.

To ensure that newly weaned calves can respond to the disease challenge they will face also make

sure that calves have been trained to eat feed and follow a vaccination protocol prior to weaning.

GOP's Roberts needs rural friends more than ever

(AP) - The scrubby rangeland and table-top fields of western Kansas have been a fertile source of wheat, soybeans and sorghum and home to one of the nation's largest cattle herds. The region has also been a steady provider of votes for conservative Midwestern Republicans like Pat Roberts.

But Roberts, a small-town boy who went to Washington, is now struggling to win re-election, and the prairie is both his best chance for saving his Senate career and the biggest reason he could lose it.

In a month, Roberts must wring every friendly vote out of Kansas' 99 rural counties to fend off a challenge by a suburban businessman running as an independent. Greg Orman is capitalizing on sentiment that the incumbent is out of touch.

Roberts grew up in tiny Holton, north of Topeka, in the 1940s and 1950s. For more than three decades, he has listed the famous frontier town of Dodge City, population 28,000, as his hometown. The many farmers, merchants and senior citizens who live in the region's patchwork of small communities know him and are still as solidly Grain Belt conservative as ever,

regularly giving 80 percent of their vote to Republicans.

But the rural areas, with declining populations, now account for less than half of Kansas' electorate. More important, some of Roberts' longtime supporters there are skeptical about him. A primary challenger who called out Roberts for his more than four decades in Washington racked up almost half the vote in some farm counties before losing 48 percent to 42 percent.

"It's an uphill fight. I hope it's not too late," said GOP state Rep. John Rubin, who is part of the massive GOP rescue effort launched to keep the seat in Republican hands.

Recent polls have shown Orman with an edge, but about 15 percent of voters are undecided.

The two candidates' campaign strategies are flip-sides of each other, as are the men themselves.

Orman, a youthful 45, tanned and fit, lives in the Kansas City suburb of Olathe, which has doubled in population to more than 130,000 since 1990. He is targeting younger, better educated and less partisan voters who work in the metropolitan areas around Kansas City, Topeka and Wichita. With a Princeton eco-

nomics degree and a business portfolio worth between \$21 million and \$85 million, he's stressing disgust with partisan gridlock and a pro-business message that aims to be neither Republican nor Democratic.

Orman's sights are on the state's registered Democrats, who make up 24 percent of the electorate and were left adrift when the Democratic nominee dropped out of the race, as well as the 32 percent independents and disgruntled Republicans who are weary of Roberts.

"Voters across Kansas are sick and tired of the finger-pointing by both parties in Congress," Orman spokesman Sam Edelen said.

Roberts is going rural and old-school. Often wearing a U.S. Marines baseball

cap that reminds people of his time in the service from 1958 to 1962, the balding lawmaker talks about farm issues and the threats posed by liberal Democrats. Roberts stressed his steady support for farm programs going back to his time as Agriculture Committee chairman in the House, though he voted against the farm bill this year when facing a tea party primary challenge.

To survive, "He's got to win the rural areas by quite a bit," said Clay Barker, executive director of the Kansas Republican Party.

By last week, about a dozen campaign staffers were scrambling to ramp-up efforts across an area covering 78,000 square miles. But only a few Roberts-for-Senate signs were visible along the 300-mile main route

from Topeka to Dodge City.

After a slow start, "We're running a robust campaign," said Corry Bliss, the new campaign manager sent last month by worried Republicans in Washington.

Bliss said hundreds of volunteers are now calling voters in western Kansas. Republican celebrities, such as Bob Dole, Sen. John McCain and Jeb Bush, have dropped in for appearances. Texas Sen. Ted Cruz is scheduled for this week, as Roberts starts a statewide bus tour.

But some rural voters noted that Roberts himself was a rare visitor until lately. His GOP primary challenger, Milton Wolf, exploited the fact that Roberts had a house in the Virginia suburbs but only a rented room in Kansas.

"We've been support-

ers," said retired rancher Floris Jean Hampton, among about 200 people who turned out for a reception with Roberts and Dole in Dodge City. "But we've got questions about where he's been, and we're open to others."

Republican Sherwood Songer said he voted for Wolf in the primary "because we need someone younger" and now is undecided.

"I'm keeping an open mind," Songer said.

GOP strategists say Roberts must also campaign actively in the suburbs to keep Orman's vote totals there down.

It's a tall order, said Bill Lacy, a former Dole aide. "You can't really go in and organize a U.S. Senate campaign overnight. And I think what happened is they got behind the curve."

Genetically modified wheat found in Montana

(AP) – Unregulated genetically modified wheat has popped up in a second location in the United States, this time in state of Montana, the Agriculture Department said recently.

No genetically engineered wheat has been approved for U.S. farming, and the discovery of unapproved varieties can pose a potential threat to U.S. trade with countries that have concerns about genetically modified foods.

USDA said that the incident is on a smaller scale than a similar finding in the state of Oregon last year that prompted several Asian countries to temporarily ban U.S. wheat imports.

The herbicide-resistant wheat was found on one to three acres in Montana, while the genetically engineered plants found in Oregon were spread over more than 100 acres. And the plants were found at a university research center in Huntley, Montana, where genetically modified wheat was legally tested by seed giant Monsanto 11 years ago. The plants in Oregon were found in a field that had never conducted such tests, prompting questions about how they got there.

The department said it is investigating the discovery of the Montana wheat,

which is a different variety than the genetically modified wheat found in Oregon. USDA said the wheat would be safe to eat, but none of it entered the market.

In a final report USDA said it believes the genetically modified wheat in Oregon was an isolated incident and that there is no evidence of that wheat in commerce. The report says the government still doesn't know how the modified seeds got into the fields.

The discovery of the genetically modified wheat in Oregon in 2013 prompted Japan and South Korea to temporarily suspend some wheat orders, and the European Union called for more rigorous testing of U.S. shipments.

Monsanto Co. suggested last year that some of the company's detractors may have intentionally planted the seeds. Robb Fraley, Monsanto's executive vice president and chief technology officer, said in June 2013 that sabotage is the most likely scenario, partly because the modified wheat was not distributed evenly throughout the field and was found in patches.

"It's fair to say there are folks who don't like biotechnology and would use this to create problems," he said then.

Bernadette Juarez, who oversees investigative and enforcement efforts for USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, said the department wasn't able to prove any such scenarios.

"Ultimately, we weren't able to make a determination of how it happened," she said.

In a statement, a Monsanto spokeswoman did not repeat Fraley's 2013 speculation about sabotage but said the report provides closure. Monsanto also said it is fully cooperating with the investigation into the Montana wheat.

Montana State University's Southern Agricultural Research Center, where the modified wheat was found, also said it has been cooperating with USDA's investigation.

Most of the corn and soybeans grown in the United States are already genetically modified to resist certain herbicides or to have other traits. But the country's wheat crop is not, as some wheat farmers have shown reluctance to use genetically engineered seeds since their product is usually consumed directly by

people. Much of the corn and soybean crop is used as feed for animals.

Some in the wheat industry have also been concerned that genetically modified wheat, if ever approved, would contaminate conventional wheat, causing problems with exports. Opponents of modified

crops used the Oregon wheat as an example of that threat. "Genetic contamination is a serious threat to farmers across the country," said Andrew Kimbrell, executive director for Center for Food Safety.

There has been little evidence to show that foods grown from engineered

seeds are less safe than their conventional counterparts, but several states have considered laws that would require them to be labeled so consumers know what they are eating. Vermont became the first state to enact such a law this year, though it is being challenged in court.

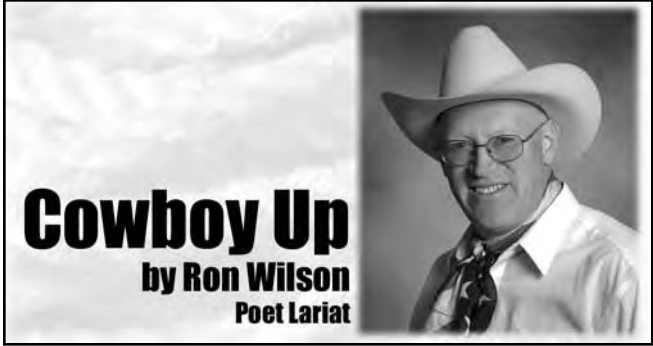

Cowboy-isms

“It’s a good day to ride a horse.” That is a saying of a friend of mine. He uses that sentence somewhat universally, whether ending a conversation, commenting on the weather, or making plans for the day ahead. While this saying is rather simple, there are many other cowboy sayings and terms which are unusual or convey folk wisdom.

In the history of the Old West, particularly on the cattle trails, some interesting terms came into use. Cowboys would put their own brand of sarcasm and humor on the things they saw. For example, beans became known as “Pecos strawberries.” A cowboy

who dressed up might be said to “rag proper.” If he was going courtin,’ he would be said to “cut a rusty.” If the lady turned him down, he was said to have been “given the mitten.” On the other hand, if they got married, the couple would “jump the broom.” The preacher performing the ceremony might be called a “sky pilot.”

On a ranch, a bunkhouse might be called a “dog-house,” “dice house” or “louse cage.” A long sharp knife was an “Arkansas toothpick.” A hat was a “war bonnet” or “hair case.” Currency was “Lincoln skins.” A dance house was a “stepping Ken” (where does this stuff come from??).

One cowboy saying stated, “You should drink only when you’re alone or when you’re with someone...” Whiskey was called “family disturbance,” “wild mare’s milk” or “Kansas sheep dip.” Consumption of such can

lead to a hangover, sometimes called “barrel fever.” It might also land you in the jail, called a “hoosegow” or “crowbar hotel.”

Of course, the food at the chuckwagon was a constant source of talk. Donuts were called “bear sign” and bacon was “overland trout.” “Cackleberries” were eggs and “belly wash” was weak coffee. Silverware was “eatin’ irons.” Butter was “axle grease.” “Sonofagun stew” (and its similar, unprintable name) was a cooked concoction of the miscellaneous leftovers from a carcass, i.e. cow heart, liver, tongue, and generally unappealing parts. An onion was a “skunk egg.” A cook

might be called a “biscuit-shooter,” “grub-slinger,” “pot-rustler” or “belly-robber.”

Then there are other sayings that encapsulate cowboy wisdom, such as “Always drink upstream from the herd” and “Don’t squat with your spurs on.” One of the classics is “Never a horse that couldn’t be rode, never a cowboy couldn’t be throwed.” A new saying to me goes “The only reason to ride a bull is to meet a nurse.” Another saying is, “Never approach a bull from the front, a horse from the rear, or a fool from any direction.” Here’s a wise observation: “Timing has a lot to do with the outcome of a rain dance.” This one has

been credited to John Wayne: “Courage is being scared to death – and saddling up anyway.”

Here is one my dad believed in: “The fastest way to move cattle is slowly.” He was very wise. A cowboy saying about the weather is the basis for the accompanying poem.

One story tells of a trail drive cowboy who almost forgot the unwritten rule that if you complained about the food, then you had to do all the cooking yourself. His goof and quick-thinking recovery went something like this: “These derned grits is all burned... and that’s just how I like `em.”

I think it’s a good day to ride a horse.

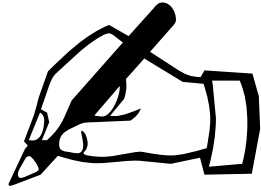

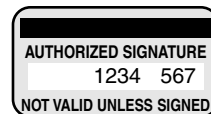

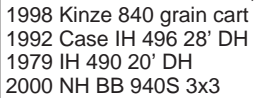

Stewardship of new technologies embraced by U.S. meat industry

For the past several months, a diverse group of representatives from technology companies and the U.S. beef, pork and lamb industries has tackled a critical question related to global access for U.S. meat: What steps can the meat industry take to ensure that the introduction of new production and processing technologies does not interrupt trade?

“The U.S. meat industry is a global leader when it comes to advancements in quality, safety, efficiency and productivity, which is why our products are in such great demand around the world,” said Forrest Roberts, chief executive officer of the National Cattlemen’s Beef Association (NCBA). “Our goal as an industry is to adopt new technologies in a manner that is consistent with continuing to grow exports. To meet this objective it is imperative that we continue to work together as an industry in a proactive manner.”

Roberts was recently elected chairman of the Meat Industry International Stewardship Advisory Council (MIISAC), which was formed with exactly this goal in mind. Its primary focus is to foster better communication, coordination, and collaboration

at all levels of red meat production, processing and marketing so that new technologies are introduced in a manner that minimizes disruptions in exports without stifling the development of next-generation technologies. Norman Bessac, vice president for international pork sales at Cargill Fresh Meats, was elected MIISAC vice chairman.

To ensure that MIISAC draws upon experience and expertise from a broad range of meat and livestock sectors, it includes representatives from the Cattleman’s Beef Board, NCBA, National Pork Board, National Pork Producers Council, American Lamb Board, the feedgrains sector, meat packing and export trading companies, technology providers, American Meat Institute, North American Meat Association and the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF). Roberts and Bessac have appointed working group chairs for operations, strategy, and communications to carry the work of the council forward.

As new technology products are launched into the U.S. market, MIISAC will collaborate with the companies introducing the products to assess the po-

tential benefits and costs of their adoption to the red meat industry and develop strategies for minimizing impediments in export markets that have not approved the technology. Questions addressed in this process could include:

Do regulatory approvals need to be secured in key international markets?

How long will this process take?

Will approval be controversial, and how will this impact consumer confidence?

Is there an avenue, such as the Codex Alimentarius Commission (CODEX), for establishing an international standard? Which trading partners are likely to adopt a CODEX standard?

How do we address foreign markets that have no functioning regulatory process?

In carrying out its mandate, MIISAC will not be setting industry policy, nor will it approve or disapprove new technologies.

“The goal is definitely not to serve as a standard-setting or policy-making body, but rather to provide a broad, forward-thinking perspective on how a new technology will impact our industry once it is approved,” Roberts explained.

United States and Brazil reach agreement to end WTO cotton dispute

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and U.S. Trade Representative Michael Froman have announced that the United States and Brazil have reached agreement to settle the longstanding Cotton dispute in the World Trade Organization (WTO). Under the terms of the agreement, Brazil will terminate the Cotton case, giving up its rights to countermeasures against U.S. trade or any further proceedings in this dispute. Brazil has also agreed not to bring new WTO actions against U.S. cotton support programs while the current U.S. Farm Bill is in force or against agricultural export credit guarantees under the GSM-102 program as long as the program is operated consistent with the agreed terms.

“Through this negotiated solution, the United States and Brazil can finally put this dispute behind us,” said Vilsack. “Without this agreement, American businesses, including agricultural businesses and producers, could have faced countermeasures in the way of increased tariffs totaling hundreds of millions of dollars every year. This removes that threat and ensures American cotton farmers will have effective risk management tools.”

“I am pleased that the United States and Brazil have found a permanent resolution to the Cotton dispute,” said Froman. “Today’s agreement brings to a close a matter which put hundreds of millions of dollars in U.S. exports at risk. The United States and

Brazil look forward to building on this significant progress in our bilateral economic relationship.”

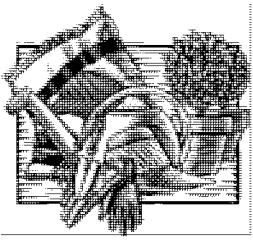
Background
 The Cotton dispute is a decade-long dispute brought by Brazil against the United States at the WTO. In 2005 and again in 2008, the WTO found that certain U.S. agriculture programs (domestic support to cotton under the marketing loan and countercyclical payment programs, and export credit guarantees under the GSM-102 program) were inconsistent with the United States’ WTO commitments. In August 2009, WTO arbitrators provided the level of countermeasures that Brazil could impose against U.S. trade.

In June 2010, the United States and Brazil signed a Framework Agreement to avert the imposition of countermeasures by Brazil against the United States that at the time would have affected approximately \$800 million of U.S. trade, including U.S. intellectual property rights. The Framework provided specific interim steps and a process for quarterly discussions on the programs at issue. The United States also made monthly payments to the Brazil Cotton Institute for technical assistance and capacity building activities for the sector under a related Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). During discussions under the Framework over the past four years, Brazil and the United States worked on the elements of a settlement to the dispute, includ-

ing changes to the operation of the GSM-102 program and changes to cotton domestic support programs. The Framework expired on February 7, 2014, when the 2014 Farm Bill was enacted. The Farm Bill included significant changes to U.S. cotton domestic support programs, along with changes to the GSM-102 program.

Over the last several months, the United States and Brazil have held intensified discussions to resolve the dispute. Now the two governments have reached an agreement that provides for formal termination of the Cotton case at the WTO Dispute Settlement Body within 21 days. Brazil will also relinquish all rights to countermeasures against U.S. trade. Other terms and conditions are contained in a MOU that includes new rules governing the fees and tenor for guarantees under the GSM-102 Program, a final transfer of funds to the Brazil Cotton Institute, and limitations on new disputes against U.S. cotton domestic support programs and the GSM-102 program.

The 2014 MOU provides for additional support for the technical assistance and capacity building activities begun under the 2010 Memorandum of Understanding. The United States will make a one-time final contribution of \$300 million to the Brazil Cotton Institute, or IBA. The 2014 MOU also provides for additional uses for the funds, such as research in conjunction with U.S. institutions.

piled up and composted in an area for use later.

Any organic materials can be composted. Paper products, cardboard, kitchen scraps, hay and other items can break down into compost. These items need to be mixed with some fertilizer or "greens" for composting to begin.

The conversion of organic materials to compost involves several types of naturally occurring bacteria and fungi. Fungi begin the process by breaking down cellulose and other complex molecules in the materials. Chopping up the organic materials allows for the fungi and bacteria to work quickly which re-

duces the time it takes to convert the raw material into usable compost.

Moisture and nitrogen is important in the compost process. Since the fungi and bacteria do the majority of work, they need moisture and nitrogen to work efficiently. If you want to make compost quickly, then these will need to be monitored. Otherwise, compost will be made eventually.

Compost improves looseness and workability of soil. Oxygen is needed by plant roots and the addition of organic materials creates air pockets in the soil for roots. It also contains nutrients that plants require.

My compost pile receives materials only from the home. The other items are composted where they fall. Composting in place saves me a lot of time and is good for my plants. You can learn more about composting by getting the K-State Research and Extension publication on "Making and Using Compost at Home."

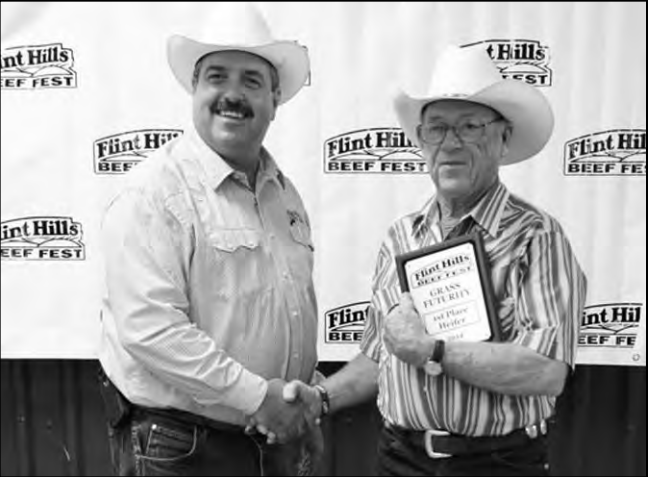

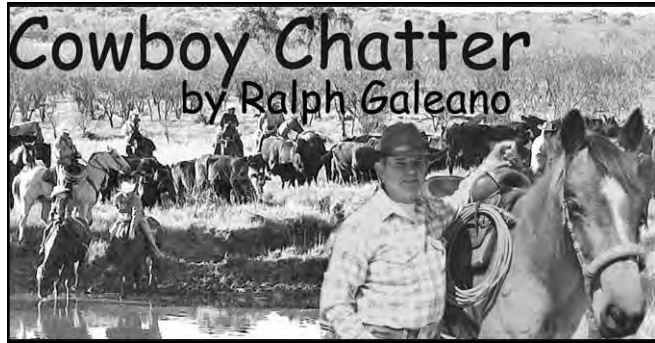

Cowboy Chatter by Ralph Galeano

The Equine Memory

I noticed the other day when I was putting a horse away how they seem to know where the rest of the herd is even though they are not in sight. I opened the gate to the horse pasture and the horse I was leading put her ears to attention and gazed over a slight rise. I looked in the same direction and saw nothing.

When I turned her loose, she trotted in that direction and whinnied. I heard an answering whinny from the other side of the rise. She somehow knew where the other horses were without seeing them. They could have been anywhere but she knew exactly where they were.

Pretty smart, I thought, and wondered how horses can detect the other horses when they can't see them. I stopped wondering when I read an article about a horse's sense of smell. The article stated that a horse has smelling power a thousand times greater than a human, so maybe that horse, with its keen sense of smell, picked up their scent before we ever got to the gate and had them pegged long before we got there. I know horses have better noses than humans but I didn't know it was that much better.

While reading that article, I stumbled on to another article about a horse's memory and how good it is. Now that's something I felt I knew a lot

about but I was wrong again. I found out some very useful information that I realized would help me get along a little better with my horses.

Horses that are well trained never forget their training and poorly trained horses don't forget their training either. That is why you must correct unwanted behavior before it becomes a bad habit.

Part of training a good horse requires getting inside their head. It requires a lot of thought on your part. You might say a good trainer is also a Steed Psychologist. He tries to figure out what a horse is thinking and how he can go about channeling the horse's thoughts down the learning trail. It's been called "opening the door." That is, "opening the door" to accepting instructions from a human sitting on his back to do things that he already knows how to do - things that are instinctive to the horse like turning left or right and backing up to name a few. But now he must relate those things he already knows how to do to certain pokes, pulls on the reins and other irritating jabs and oral commands.

That is where memory plays an important part in passing this information through that door. A young horse will never forget his first lessons so you have to go slow and easy and don't frighten him because he will never forget it. I have

read that a horse's long-term memory can last for ten or more years. I believe it is even longer. So understand that we must take all the time needed to make the first encounters painless. We have to ensure a strong bond with the animal to be more effective in our training. The horse has to learn to trust you and know that you are not going to hurt or abuse him. If you abuse him, look out because he will definitely remember whatever foul deed you inflicted on him and be wary of you.

Horses also have good short-term memories. That is one the most important aids we can use to train them. A wrong cue can not easily be corrected so you must be sure to use the same cue consistently and correct a wrong cue immediately. When you cue the horse and he does the correct thing, you only have a few seconds to reward him with a pat on the neck or

releasing pressure for him realize he has done the right thing. If you wait too long to reward, he won't know what you are patting him for and won't relate it to making the right move. Bad timing in rewarding good effort can lead to him making bad associations in his memory.

Scientific memory tests have revealed extraordinary powers of memory in horses and an ability to learn by trial and error. That is why consistency and repetition in training contribute to the development of a good behavior pattern or habit.

It is important to make sure that your horse is relaxed when you are trying to teach him something. If he is stressed, he will learn very little. Possibly he will try and avoid that situation in the future. Stress, panic and perceived threat can make learning nearly impossible for your horse.

Try not to constantly

correct or interrupt your horse's thought process. That only prevents them from focusing on what you are trying to teach them. Go slow and concentrate on one thing at a time. Give them a chance to figure it out on their own. Remember, they are certainly going to remember everything you do to them, good or bad.

They can remember things from a training session for months and even years. That's why it is imperative to make each session end with a good note. I try to end each training session with a slow ride

around the pasture or out in the woods where the horse can unwind and forget all the unpleasantness of the round pen or arena. I want him to remember the good things like the leisurely walk after the training session.

Ray Hunt said, "Make the right thing easy and the wrong thing hard." They will remember the wrong things and, if you've done your job, they will remember how easy the right thing is.

It's crunch time for beef demand

Beef demand has been a nice surprise this year, as wholesale and retail beef prices have increased fast enough to uphold decent margins for beef packers and allow profitability for feedlots in the first three quarters of the year.

Derrell Peel, Oklahoma State University Extension Livestock Marketing Specialist, reports that high prices aren't over yet. He says retail prices do not currently reflect all of the wholesale price increase, and the coming months will be even more important for beef demand as retail adjustments continue. Also, boxed beef prices may have

declined in September, but the pressure for higher prices is not over.

Total cattle slaughter has been down over seven percent since the beginning of August with heifer slaughter down nearly 11 percent and cow slaughter down nearly 17 percent. Each of these continue to push the year-to-date totals lower with heifer slaughter down 8.8 percent and cow slaughter down 14.6 percent so far this year. Beef production in August and September was down 5.5 percent, less of a decrease than the year-to-date total, which is down 6.1 percent. Peel says limited beef supplies

will continue to challenge beef demand.

Competing meats may play a bigger role in late 2014 and into 2015. Despite recent production challenges, pork production is expected to increase year over year in 2015, and while higher pork prices have helped support beef prices in 2014, that may be less help in 2015. Beef prices have been less sensitive to poultry prices in 2014 than expected, but abundant poultry supplies will increase the challenge for beef prices to push higher in 2015.

Exports will play a big role in coming months, Peel

says, as international trade may be beginning to dampen with high prices. Beef exports in July were down year over year to all major beef importers, except South Korea.

Peel concludes by saying that for packer and feedlot margins, the most likely scenario is that demand will continue to grind higher but perhaps at a slower pace than in the first half of 2014. Packers and feedlots may face more margin squeeze as limited input supplies push input costs up faster than output prices are able to increase. As it has been for many months, and even more so in the coming months, beef demand is the key.
