

Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The June Supply and Demand Report turned out to be quite the yawner. There were no changes at all to the U.S. corn balance sheet, and very few to the wheat and soybeans. It wasn't really a surprise that there weren't any changes, and traders quickly went back to focusing on the weather and the progressing wheat harvest.

It was the weather that got the corn out of the sideways trading range and the Minneapolis wheat to new contract high. The Drought Monitor is worsening in the Dakotas and there will be quite a string of high temperatures through a big part of the Corn Belt. There are rain chances late in the

week for parts of the Corn Belt and traders are going to be watching the forecasts very closely. Although corn condition ratings improved in the last report, and may again Monday, there is a very good chance that the ratings fall on the 19th. With condition ratings starting well below last year, traders will get very nervous if we see early declines in the ratings. In addition to that, we can also plan on the spring wheat conditions making further declines due to lack of rain. Some of northern North Dakota will like get some rains, but much of the spring wheat belt is going to get missed.

On the charts, things are

looking much more bullish than they did a week ago. The July corn moved out of the sideways range and is now testing the March high of \$3.93 34. If we take that out, there really isn't much chart resistance until we reach the continuation chart highs, which are at the \$4.35 area. The December contract has already traded through the March high and that contract looks like it will be moving up to the \$4.20 area as long as traders are a little nervous about the weather. The funds still have a lot of short positions they might get out of and money flow alone can move the market quite a ways.

The wheat charts are

looking better as well. The July KW is made multi-week highs and as mentioned earlier, the Minneapolis wheat made new contract highs. The next chart point to look at for the July KW is the trend line resistance at the \$4.63 area. There is a good chance that we test that resistance next week. We have seen some improvement in the Kansas City vs. Chicago spreads thanks to the strength in Minneapolis wheat. This is going to be another good year for protein premiums, so if you can, figure out how to store any wheat with high protein.

The soybean market is lagging behind the corn and wheat, but we did get a nice turn higher in the beans, meal, and oil this week. The next upside objective for the July soybeans will be the 50-day moving average at the \$9.52 area. Demand is good and it was very surprising that we did not see an increase in the old crop export estimate. We will at some point, which will make the

supply and demand tables look better, but the problem with the soybean market is still the supply side of the equation. Unless we see a severe weather problem, it will be very difficult to ever draw stocks down enough to create a bullish atmosphere in the market.

We saw the live cattle make new contract highs, with the exception of the June contract, then then slip to negative territory for the week. Basically we are looking at a double top in the June and August live cattle, which looks pretty ominous. It would have helped if the cash cattle trade was higher, but that was basically non-existent. The feeder market and the feeder index are still moving higher, but we will have to see the cash cattle market improve in order to regain some upward momentum. The short term fundamentals still seem pretty bullish, so I don't think we are ready to see a change in trend.

momentum for secure Pork Supply Plan **Pork Checkoff builds**

The National Pork Board, with major support from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is creating a Secure Pork Supply plan to help America's pig farmers

respond quickly and successfully to a major threat, such as a foreign animal disease (FAD). The plan will enhance communication and coordination of all pork



chain segments to help producers keep their farms operating and all related business activities functioning.

"We're thankful that our country has not experienced a disease such as foot-andmouth (FMD) since 1929," said Terry O'Neel, National Pork Board president from Friend, Nebraska. "However, if we get the news that FMD. African swine fever or another foreign animal disease has arrived, the Secure Pork Supply plan will pay big dividends by getting pork production back to normal much faster."

An Iowa State University study estimates potential revenue losses to U.S. pork and beef industries from an FMD outbreak would run \$12.8 billion per year

or \$128 billion over a tenyear period. Related losses to corn and soybean markets over a decade would be \$44 billion and \$24.9 billion, respectively.

The Secure Pork Supply plan will provide procedures that pork producers, processors and federal/state agencies agree are feasible should an FAD strike, according to veterinarian Patrick Webb, director of swine health programs for the Pork Checkoff. This would include the safe movement of animals from farms in an FAD control area to harvest channels or to other production sites as long as the pigs have no evidence of disease.

"The Secure Pork Supply plan will provide business continuity to producers who enroll prior to an outbreak, which will allow them to be back in business faster than those who do not participate," Webb said.

Basics of the plan that will help producer achieve this include implementing sound biosecurity, using premises identification tags, keeping detailed production records and maintaining all necessary health papers and certificates.

"As a pork producer, I want to be ready when it's time to sign up as a participant in the Secure Pork Supply program," O'Neel said. "In the meantime, let's all prepare by ramping up our farms biosecurity measures and other steps so we'll be ready to go."

The Secure Pork Supply

plan is the result of ongoing collaboration between the USDA, the National Pork Board, the National Pork Producers Council, the American Association of Swine Veterinarians and academia as well as other state and federal partners.

"The National Pork Board and our producer leaders believe that investing in the Secure Pork Supply Plan now will help the entire industry in the face of a future FAD outbreak," said Bill Even, National Pork Board CEO. "Pork producers are known for being innovative leaders, and through this work. the Pork Checkoff is taking a leadership role in being prepared."



Fed Cattle Exchange announces release of newly redesigned platform

The Fed Cattle Exchange is pleased to announce the release of its redesigned website, which will feature a reduced Pass Out (PO) fee of \$1 per head and a rollback function to help quickly establish trade. The rollback function was developed to aid in creating more competitive bidding and robust data points for the industry to view during trading sessions. The first three lots will be the only lots implementing the rollback and all listings from now on will benefit from the reduced PO fee of \$1 per head. The "Rollback" will work as follows:

- Cattle will be placed with a base price similar to current FCE format
- If the cattle do not receive a bid for ten seconds, the price will decrease by \$1 every ten seconds until a maximum of \$3 has been reduced on the base price.
- If the price reduces by a total of \$3 and an addi-


tional 15 seconds has passed without a bid arriving, the cattle will not be sold and the next lot will be offered.

- If a bid arrives at any time during the rollback process, the floor will be set and the price may increase until no more bids arrive.
- All sellers have the right to PO the sale of their listing, by clicking the "PO" button in the grid.

The Fed Cattle Exchange was created to not only increase price discovery and frequency of trade in fed cattle, but to also assist cattle feeders in achieving greater exposure to buyers. Most of their consigners benefit from having multiple buyers bid on their cattle on a weekly basis. This can especially be a benefit to producers who feed in areas where the number of field buyers has decreased in recent years. Some of the areas with the best cattle often have fewer buyers

Charles Marion Russell, 1864-1926. Charlie was an artist of the west. His work depicted in great detail the life of a cowboy on the open range. Charlie Russell painted and sculpted more than 4000 artworks in his lifetime. He knew what saddle leather smelled like and could ride and rope, but not with the best of them.

His work was based on the life he lived. His paintings of cowboys, horses and Indians came from the experience of having lived the life as part of the crew on the big roundups, cold winters and hundreds of lonely nights riding herd.

Charlie was born in St. Louis and moved to Mon-

He spent eleven years in the saddle working for different cattle pools and on different ranches. His long-time friend, Kid Amby Cheney, said, "I usually roped Charlie's horse for him. We could never let him in the horse herd because he would swing his rope and scatter the herd and break down the rope corral."

to learn the trade.

Kid Amby Cheney's son, Truman Cheney, wrote of the open range cowboy's life in his book, So Long, Cowboys of the Open Range. In the book, he related many of the stories told to him by his father. Kid Amby Cheney. Russell and Kid Amby shared many adventures and hardships. Russell's work so well portrayed the cowboys he worked with that in later days many of the men could recognize

themselves in his paint-

One of his most famous paintings is of a roundup camp and cowboys eating breakfast when a bucking bronc comes barreling through camp near the wagon. The rider hangs on as the horse scatters the

cook's fire, pots, pans, coffee and men. Nearly 40 years later some of the old-timers present when the actual event happened clearly recognized the men in the painting. Sitting near the wagon is Russell, Kid Amby taking refuge on a wagon wheel and the rider, Doc Nelson.

Russell wasn't one of the top riders or ropers but he was always hired during roundups and drives. He carried a sketch book and lump of clay in his pocket to draw and mold what he saw. The men especially enjoyed seeing his sketches and clay sculptures when they found themselves as the subject of his work. He was a storyteller and was always spinning entertaining yarns that the men laughed at. Owners of the ranches and roundup foremen knew his worth for the harmony he spread with the cowboys who worked the great herds. His jokes and stories kept the men smiling and helped keep trouble to a minimum around the campfires at night and breakfast fires in the mornings. He always had a job as a night-herder or wrangler because he was such a good entertainer.

Kid Amby missed his

chance several times to own

a Russell original. No one knew the fame their saddle partner was soon to achieve. Amby loaned Russell some money when Russell was part of a crew of seven cowboys living in a dilapidated. bed-bug ridden cabin one winter near Chinook, Montana. The group was known as the "Lousy Seven" because of the bedbugs. They were out of work, waiting for the spring round-up and had spent all their money. Russell was one of the seven and promised Amby he would paint him a picture of the "Lousy Seven" if he loaned them some money. Amby gave them his month's wages but never took Russell up on his offer to paint him the picture.

Another time, Amby watched Russell sketching a picture near the herd. When Russell finished the sketch, he ripped it off the pad and threw it in the wind. Later that day, Amby saw the piece of paper fluttering in the wind on a wild rose bush. He picked it off and saw it was only a sketch of cowboys and horses. The same things he worked with every day. He let it flutter back to the brush.

Soon after that Russell

was married and his new wife began marketing his paintings for fabulous prices. Kid Amby speculated "I might have made a thousand dollars if I had kept that picture."

Russell didn't look like much, In fact, if you met him, you'd think he was just a no-account cowboy drifter. Amby described Charlie Russell as "the queerest sort of cowbov he'd ever seen. A homely awkward cuss-all his clothes looked like they'd been junked by some reservation halfbreed. Even his face looked like he had some Injun in him. A big-brimmed hat didn't have any shape or crown to it—like he'd slept in it many a rainy night on the range. His leather pants had seen the last of their second-best days—one leg tucked in a boot and the other hangin' out like a squaw dress. But don't get me wrong. He was one of the swellest guys I ever

Waste not, want not; by-product of ethanol industry makes suitable cattle feed supplement

Making a living raising cattle isn't as simple as just buying a herd and turning it out to pasture. Cattle require specific diets to maintain proper nutrition and weight gain. And how to do this in the most effective and efficient way possible has interested both ranchers and researchers for generations.

Scientists in Texas are interested in how seasons affect how well cattle can digest a type of Bermudagrass, Tifton 85. In a recent study, they found that as seasons progress, the grass becomes harder to digest. However, by supplementing with the dried distillers' grains, this effect can be minimized.

Dried distillers' grains are left over after ethanol production. They are what remains of the ground corn used for fermentation.

"Due to the ramp-up in ethanol production over the past few decades, there has been an abundance of this byproduct in the beef industry," explains Monte Rouquette, a professor with Texas A&M AgriLife Research. "Originally viewed as a waste product of the industry, research began looking into other uses of the byproduct."

He adds that using it as food for livestock is an efficient use of this product. The value-added aspect has moved the grains from wasted to wanted.

The dried grains are now commonly used as a relatively cheap source of feed. In some instances, it can replace primary feed ingredients like corn or soybeans. Some supplements provide additional energy, some more protein, and others minerals. The distillers' grain is used for both protein and energy.

How does this fit with the forage season? Tifton 85 Bermudagrass is a common forage grass across the south and southeast United States. However, as the plants mature, they become harder for livestock to digest. The cattle have a harder time extracting nutrients from the grass. The grains can help add back those nutrients.

The results of this study, conducted by W. Brandon Smith, point to a potential two-season grazing strategy, based on animal size. weight, and age. For example, lightweight animals could graze in the early summer without the grain supplement because the grass is

able to give them the needed nutrients to thrive.

In the later part of the summer, the matured animals could graze with the distillers' grain supplement. The grain would add back some of the nutrients the cattle lose out on when the grass is further into season.

This research allows the scientists to determine the most effective and efficient way to use distillers' grains as a supplement. They can learn how much is best to give, when is best to give it, and how much return it can provide a rancher.

"These data can then be

used in an economic assessment to provide a baseline of potential responses from the use of a supplement,' says Rouquette. "This work sheds light on changes that occur chemically within the plant across the vear that affect its digestibility."

Read more about this work in Crop Science. The researchers' work was primarilv funded by Texas A&M AgriLife Research at Overton, and partially funded by a Beef Competitiveness Research Initiative grant from Texas A&M AgriLife Research.

A critical role of the dry cow program

Technical Services, Zoetis While dry cows are resting, the dry cow program should be hard at work, clearing up lingering subclinical infections, preventing bacterial invasion of the teat ends and boosting immunity to help prevent production crippling infections for the next lactation.

A pathogen map or pie chart can be developed from identifying the bacteria infecting your high somatic cell count cows. It is a vital tool for you and your veterinarian. Use it to make sure your program includes dry cow therapy labeled to treat the most common mastitis pathogens on the dairy, including both Gram-positive and Gram-negative bacteria.

Research shows the most prevalent mastitis-causing pathogens in dry cows are Gram-positive:

51% of all new environmental streptococci intramammary infections occurred while dry.

56% of clinical mastitis cases due to Streptococcus uberis originated in the dry period.

33% of clinical mastitis cases due to Streptococcus dysgalactiae originated in the dry period.

The prevalence Gram-negative bacteria also remains a threat to herd productivity and udder health, especially during the dry period. Nearly 40 percent of all mastitis infections on dairy operations are caused by Gram-negative bacteria,4 such as Escherichia coli (E. coli). If left untreated, milk and moderate Gram-negative mastitis can become severe and toxic, reducing herd productivity and a dairy's bottom line.

Kansas State University awarded funding for work with farmers in effectively managing groundwater

Kansas State University has received funding to further its work in managing groundwater – a topic especially important in Kansas and other states where critical water resources are being depleted much faster than they're being replenished.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture-National Institute of Food and Agriculture awarded \$499,917 to the university to determine the best ways for farmers participating in local groups to effective.

tively manage groundwater resources such as the Ogallala Aquifer, on which rural communities rely for water and farmers have depended on for years to irrigate their crops

The Ogallala underlies eight Great Plains states and provides water to nearly one-fifth of the wheat, corn, cotton and cattle raised in the United States. But the million-year-old, 174,000-square-mile underground reservoir is being depleted at an unsustainable

rate

Depleting an aquifer such as the Ogallala, a part of the High Plains Aquifer, through agricultural irrigation can ultimately have negative economic impacts on farmers due to reduced returns in the future, said Nathan Hendricks, a K-State agricultural economist who is leading the four-year project. For that reason, farmers have an incentive to collectively manage the extraction of water from the aquifer to maximize

the net benefits of using it over time.

To help extend the life of aquifers by conserving the water in them, Kansas recently embarked on a policy experiment to encourage greater collective management of the Ogallala in western Kansas by local farmers. In some areas, management plans called Local Enhanced Management Areas, or LEMAs, have been developed. Once approved by boards of directors from Groundwater Management Districts, those plans become binding on everyone within the policy boundary.

Other plans, called Water Conservation Areas (WCAs) are management plans that have also been implemented in parts of Kansas. Participation in WCAs is purely voluntary.

"Our project will examine how to formulate these LEMAs and WCAs in a way that obtains support among farmers to effectively man-

age the groundwater," Hendricks said. "We will also look at how LEMAs and WCAs can be used together effectively."

Hendricks and a team will study how economic incentives, characteristics of water users and policy design affect support for the collective management among water users. The team will also examine voluntary approaches compared with mandatory approaches to water management and the interaction between the two approaches.

The intent is help foster the success of LEMAs and WCAs with an eye toward slowing the aquifer's depletion

"More broadly, our project is of interest to other regions of the U.S. that seek to find ways for local resource users to collectively manage their resources," Hendricks added.

The grant is one of 49 USDA-NIFA awards to improve sustainable agriculture

and help rural communities thrive, according to a USDA statement. The funding, announced May 16 and totaling \$17.9 million, was made possible through NIFA's Agriculture and Food Research Initiative (AFRI) program, authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill.

USDA-NIFA also awarded \$49,716 to Kansas State University to coordinate and host a workshop on the economics of animal health and biosecurity. K-State agricultural economist Dustin Pendell is the lead investigator on that project.

"A number of factors are involved in achieving economic success in rural communities," said NIFA director Sonny Ramaswamy in the announcement. "These NIFA investments will help us understand the social and behavioral factors that inform decision-making in agriculture, which can help rural communities thrive."

Chapman FFA earns Triple Crown award for sixth straight year

Under guidance from advisors Johanna Ryckert and Alex Jost, the Chapman FFA chapter earned the highest score in the three categories. The chapter will receive \$300 and the Garlow Memorial Trophy, which is sponsored by the Bill Garlow Family in memory of past Kansas FFA officer Bob Garlow.

Runners-up for the Triple Crown award were as follows: Riverton FFA, second place; Arkansas City FFA, third place; Udall FFA, fourth place; and Holton FFA, fifth place.

Kansas State University researchers identify new gene to resist wheat streak mosaic virus

researchers have identified a gene that will provide resistance to the wheat streak mosaic virus, a disease that is currently causing economic losses in Kansas fields.

Bernd Friebe, a research professor with the Wheat Genetic Resources Center in the Department of Plant Pathology said the Wsm3 gene is just the third gene known to provide resistance to the virus - and the first that can do so at outdoor temperatures of 75 degrees Fahrenheit and higher.

We need more genetic diversity" for controlling wheat streak mosaic virus, Friebe said. "Leaf, stripe and stem rust each have about 70 named resistant genes. This is progress toward developing more resistance toward wheat streak mosaic virus."

Wheat streak mosaic virus is characterized by streaks of yellow non-uniform discoloration in wheat. Plants infected as seedlings are often stunted and have a reduced head size. The disease causes yield losses so severe that in extreme cases the crop can not be harvested.

Kansas Wheat, a partnership between the Kansas Wheat Commission and the Kansas Association of in late May that the wheat streak mosaic virus is negatively affecting fields in western and central Kansas. Crop losses could be as high as 20 percent in some areas.

In the past, farmers' efforts to control the virus have focused mostly on removing volunteer wheat, which harbors the wheat curl mite, the primary carrier of the wheat streak mosaic virus.

The first two genes known to provide resistance to the virus were Wsm1 identified by Kansas State University about 25 years ago – and Wsm2, which was discovered by researchers at Colorado State Univer-

But those two genes only provide protection in lower temperatures. Used in combination with Wsm1 or Wsm2, the warm-weather friendly Wsm3 could become part of a breeding mix that can give farmers' much-needed relief. Friebe

The new Wsm3 germplasm has been released through the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is currently available to breeders through the National Science Foundation's Industry/University Cooperative Researcher Centers program - whose members

Wheat Growers, reported have immediate access to the germplasm - but will also be available to public breeding programs in two vears.

> Through traditional breeding processes, it can take several years before resistance genes show up in varieties available for planting.

> "Kansas State University is putting it into Everest wheat lines," said Friebe, referring to the university's most popular variety currently. Everest was first released to growers in 2009, and in 2017 is the No. 1 wheat variety planted in Kansas for the fifth straight

Kansas State University's work in this area began more than 25 years ago when researchers studied resistant germplasm developed by South Dakota State University scientist Darrell Wells and his co-workers. Friebe said the resistance was derived from a wild relative of wheat, Thinopyrum intermedium, better known as wheatgrass.

The resistant gene was named Wsm1. Friebe said it took K-State researchers nearly 20 years from the beginning of the study to the point where they had developed a Wsm1 germplasm with reduced wheatgrass genetic material available

for wheat breeding.

Technology has since improved, and it took researchers about six years from identifying Wsm3, which was also derived from wheatgrass, and the release of a germplasm, which has only a small wheatgrass segment. Breeding programs have also improved, and instead of 10-12 years to see the resistance show up in new varieties, it will likely take less time for Wsm3.

"Interestingly, Wsm1 and Wsm3, as a bonus, are also conferring resistance to the Triticum mosaic virus (a related virus also affecting wheat yields) but only at cooler temperatures," Friebe said.

Until newly-developed resistant varieties are available, growers are urged to continue with best practices for controlling the spread of the wheat streak mosaic virus in their fields. They include timely removal of volunteer wheat and grassy weeds: avoiding early planting; and planting currently available, resistant variet-

What makes ice cream?

Sweet. Creamy. Delicious. Yes, ice cream falls into all three categories, but what exactly makes ice cream, well, ice cream?

While ingredients can vary from recipe to recipe or brand to brand, ice cream (whether homemade or commercial) includes at least three ingredients: milk (and/or cream), sweeteners and flavorings/mix-ins. Commercially made ice creams also include stabilizers and emulsifiers. Here's what all of that means:

Of course, the main ingredients in ice cream come from milk-and the most important part of that is milkfat, which gives ice cream its smoothness and creamy texture. In fact, in order to be called ice cream, the USDA requires it to contain at least 10 percent milkfat, which can come from milk or cream.

When it comes to sweetening ice cream, ingredients can range from cane or beet sugar to sweeteners or even honey. Stabilizers, such as plant-based gums (e.g. guar gum) are sometimes used to help prevent the formation of ice crystals and to give the ice cream its smoother texture. Similarly, emulsifiers (originally egg yolks) keep fat and water together and make ice cream more uniform as it freezes.

And ice cream just wouldn't be ice cream without your favorite flavorings and mix-ins. From vanilla to green tea, there's no limit to how you can flavor your ice cream!

As we mentioned, ice cream needs to contain at least 10 percent milkfat in order to be called ice cream. and there are similar guidelines for other frozen dairy treats. For example:


Soft serve includes the same ingredients as ice cream, but the soft serve machine adds air while freezing, which makes it "softer" than ice cream.

Like ice cream, frozen custard needs to contain at least 10 percent milkfat and also has 1.4 percent egg yolk solids.

Sherbets contain a minimal amount of milkfat - usually 1 to 2 percent. (Meanwhile, sorbets don't contain any dairy ingredients!)

Frozen yogurt is similar to ice cream, but the ingredients have been cultured.

Gelato, Italian-style ice cream, contains less fat (milkfat) and is churned slowly, which results in a denser taste.



USDA Farm Service Agency county committee nomination period begins June 15

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins on Thursday, June 15, 2017.

"County committees allow farmers and ranchers to make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve their needs," said acting FSA administrator Chris Beyerhelm. "We strongly encourage all eligible producers to visit their local FSA office today to find out how to get involved in their county's election. There's an increasing need for representation from underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers."

County committees are made up of farmers and ranchers elected by other producers in their communities to guide the delivery of farm programs at the local level. Committee members play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA. Committees consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month or as needed to make important decisions on disaster and conservation programs. emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nation-

farmer and ranchers serving on FSA county committees.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee. a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, and reside in the local administrative area where the election is being held.

After the nomination period, candidates will encourage the eligible producers in their local administrative area to vote. FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 6, 2017. Ballots will be due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec. 4, 2017. Newly elected committee members and alternates will take office on Jan. 1, 2018.

To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www. fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nomination forms for the 2017 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2017. Locate your local office at https://offices.usda. gov and visit to get more information.

PRIME Act introduced in Congress

Reps. Thomas Massie (R-Ky.) and Chellie Pingree (D-Maine) and Sens. Angus King (I-Maine) and Rand Paul (R-Ky.) introduced the Processing Revival and Intrastate Meat Exemption or the PRIME Act in Congress. The authors claim the purpose of the bill is to make it easier for local businesses to provide meat for customers by allowing states to develop their own meat inspection regulations for meat produced and sold in state.

Under current law, only meat that is slaughtered for personal, household, guest or employee use is exempt from federal inspection regulations. All other animals for slaughter must be sent to a state or USDA inspected slaughterhouse.

Elevators scrambling as Kansas wheat harvest gets under way

Where you grow what you grow - Camelina's varied response to location

Camelina: Have you heard of it? It's an emerging alternative oilseed crop in parts of the Great Plains.

A new study, led by Augustine Obour at Kansas State University, looks at how three varieties of camelina perform when grown in two different regions within the Great Plains.

The end goal is to find the camelina variety that performs best in each location or environment.

"It's actually a challenge to identify alternative crops that are well adapted to semi-arid areas of the Great Plains," says Obour. "Plus, these crops have to fit into existing crop rotations."

That's where camelina excels. It's a short-season, cold-tolerant crop that grows well on marginal lands. It is also compatible with existing farm equipment used for grain crops.

Oil extracted from camelina seeds has several uses. It can be used for biodiesel and renewable jet fuel production. It is also a good source of a-linolenic acid, a precursor for other healthy fatty acids essential for human and animal health. Together with camelina meal, the oil can also be used to manufacture adhesives, coatings, gums, resins, and varnishes.

Most of the research on

camelina cultivation has focused on the northern parts of the Great Plains - parts of Montana and Wyoming. But the Great Plains stretches over 500 miles east to west, and 2000 miles north to south. Environmental conditions can vary widely in different parts of the Plains.

'Conditions, such as rainfall and air temperature. can have significant effects on yield and oil content of camelina," says Obour. For example, heat and moisture stress during flowering can reduce seed yield and alter oil composition.

How would camelina perform when grown in the central Great Plains?

To answer this question, the researchers picked two test sites. One of the test sites was in Hays, Kansas, in the central Great Plains. Hays has relatively early springs and warmer summer air temperatures. The other test site was in Moccasin. Montana, in the northern Great Plains, with relatively cooler spring and summer temperatures. Moccasin also has lower average annual rainfall than that of

"These two sites provided us with an opportunity to test the effects of environmental conditions on camelina growth, yield, and oil composition," says Obour.

But environmental con-

ditions aren't alone in affecting how crops perform. Differences in the genetic makeup of crop varieties also influence which ones thrive in specific environments. "Different varieties of camelina respond to environmental stresses differently," says Obour. "That ultimately affects yield and oil content."

Over the course of three years, Obour and his colleagues grew three different camelina varieties in the two test sites. This way, the researchers could test how camelina genetics and environmental conditions together affected yield and oil content.

All three camelina vari-

eties performed similarly at Moccasin, despite their genetic differences. At Hays, however, one variety, called Blaine Creek, had 42% higher seed yields than the other two. "This highlights the importance of looking at both crop genetics and environmental conditions," says Obour.

Overall, camelina seed yields were 54% lower at Hays than at Moccasin. The researchers also found that camelina oil content was lower at Hays. However, seed protein content was significantly higher at Hays.


Oil composition was different between the two test sites as well. Monounsaturated and saturated fatty acid contents were greater at Hays but polyunsaturated oil content was lower. This is important for growers to know so they can better target their crop to a chosen market.


"Our findings confirm that camelina seed yield, oil content, and fatty acid composition are significantly affected by both the environment and camelina genetics," says Obour.

Obour's work continues. The next line of research is selecting camelina varieties that are tolerant to heat stress," says Obour. That will allow for improved seed yield, oil content, and fatty acid profile of camelina grown across the central Great Plains.
