The trends in the grain markets remain down. We saw new contract lows in the Kansas City wheat and a test of the contract lows in the December corn. The lack of bullish news from USDA in the August supply

and demand report has set a negative tone for the grain markets and we haven't been able to get any news to counteract it.

The next best hope for the bull camp is the Pro Farmer Crop Tour, which ginning of October. The cattle market isn't

The cash market is still declining and the beef market has been declining as well. There was a little bit of rebound at the feeder cattle auctions, but not enough to get the attention of the feeder cattle futures, just enough to create

The truly interesting markets of the week were the gold and the stock market. We are starting to see some support failures in the stock market and some technical indicators of a top. It has not paid so try and pick a top in the stock market for

South Dakota cattle breeder joins sustainable beef roundtable discussion

USRSB encourages and promotes continuous improvement in the U.S. beef value chain by identifying sustainability indicators, verifying methodologies, and generating field project data to test sustainability concepts. The USRSB began in 2011 as an extension of the Global Roundtable for Sustainable Beef with the goal to enhance the supply chain's ability to produce environmentally sound, socially responsible and economically viable beef.



Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market activity slow; demand light for all classes of hay; prices steady. Per NASS, Kansas alfalfa hay condition rated 2 pct very poor, 10 poor, 32 fair, 53 good, and 3 excellent. Third cutting was 86 pct complete, near 83 pct last year and ahead of the 71 pct average. Fourth cutting was 14 pct complete. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, counties in eastern Kansas received a month's worth of precipitation in one week, erasing abnormally dry conditions. Central Kansas saw an expansion of moderate drought (D1) as continued rainfall deficits dried out soils, lowered streamflow, and stressed vegetation. The abnormally dry (D0) category has decreased to 43.91 pct and moderate drought (D1) increased 13.87 pct. Increase in ethanol production likely to outpace near-term demand

According to a new report from CoBank's Knowledge Exchange Division, the ethanol market will soon face worsening slim-to-negative profit margins, which could potentially push the industry toward consolidation. However, producers that are well-capitalized with strong balance sheets and cash reserves will be in the best position to weather the

The report, "Ethanol's Growth Path: Output and Export Uncertainties Both Rising," outlines how an ethanol market fueled by corn prices at multi-year lows coupled with reinvestment into production capacity will push supply past demand growth.

Forecasts indicate that total ethanol production by 2020 will have increased by approximately 850-900 million gallons, compared to 2017 levels," said Tanner Ehmke, Co-Bank senior economist. "Without a substantial increase in domestic demand or exports to clear excess supplies, ethanol producers are facing a downturn over the medium term. Those who have access to multiple transportation markets and have invested in new technology will be leaner and more cost efficient enabling greater flexibility to endure prolonged periods of low prices."

Multiple Variables Complicate Demand Picture

Domestic demand for gasoline blended with ethanol has been strong over the last 18 months, as low fuel prices resulted in consumers driving more. A second bright spot for ethanol has been continually rising ethanol blend rates at the pump. While E-10 (gas containing 10 percent ethanol) remains the dominant fuel blend, consumers are increasingly buying higher blends like E-15 (15 percent ethanol).

However, the longer-term picture for ethanol in gasoline is less optimistic. In 2017, export weakness and lower distillers grains (DDGS) prices have hurt margins.

Exports of ethanol, particularly to Brazil and China, have been strong over the last year, but that picture has changed significantly and the outlook for future ethanol exports suggests a continued decrease over the foreseeable future.

China has effectively ceased ethanol imports from the U.S. following its implementation of a 30 percent tariff on U.S ethanol. Exports to Brazil are also expected to erode as Brazilian sugar refiners come back online following a sugar crop failure in 2016, which led to the country's heavy reliance on ethanol imported from the U.S.

Growth of U.S. exports to new markets such as India,

Mexico and Indonesia, where governments are seeking to improve air quality, is possible, but will likely take time to fully materialize.

Who Will Weather the Storm

While a market correction is anticipated over the next two years, it is not expected to be as severe as prior corrections. Tight margins, limited profitability and consolidations are anticipated for the ethanol industry in the near future. However, ethanol producers who survived the last market correction have become wiser about the vagaries in the market and hedge their inputs and products - corn and ethanol – via the futures markets.

More idling of production is expected in the next 18-24 months and aging facilities could be retired," adds Ehmke. "Financially weak and less efficient producers who have limited access to dependable corn supplies and transpor-



pursue a wounded animal if it crosses a property boundary. The unethical hunter will want to sneak onto your property for a variety of reasons. HB2207 is intended to protect you the landowner from these unwanted trespassers.

The Kansas Department of Wildlife Parks and Tourism announced they are opposed to this bill. While the bill is strongly supported by some representatives, other Kansas legislators have shown no interest to pass HB2207, or in reality, they have voted against your right to control trespassing on your privately owned land. If you feel the state has the authority to allow trespassers onto your land without your knowledge, then do nothing. However, if you feel this is a violation of your most basic rights as a landowner, contact your legislators and express your opinion to them. I encourage you to attend an open forum meeting hosted by your representatives, and ask them to explain their view of this bill. Also, keep in mind that if they will not support the 97% who are the landowners, in November 2018 we can express our opinion at the voting booths!

able navigation tool. If the night is clear and stars are visible, locate the Big Dipper. The Big Dipper is the best known group of stars in the northern sky and is easy to distinguish from all others. The Big Dipper is located just north of the celestial pole. Knowing how to find the Big Dipper makes it easy to find the North Star. Look for bright stars that make up a handle with a cup on one end. It looks exactly like its name, like a dipper. Locate the outer edge of

the Big Dipper's cup. Line up the two stars that comprise the outer edge of the cup. They are known as "pointers." Draw an imaginary line through the two stars and that line will point

Grass & Grain, August 22, 2017 to the North Star. It is a bright star, and in fact, is part of the Little Dipper. It is the brightest star of the Little Dipper and sits at the end of the Little Dipper's handle.

Don't wait till you are lost to try and find the Big Dipper and North Star. Practice finding them on clear nights so you will have a better idea of what to look for when you need them to find your way home. The Big Dipper rotates around the North Star, Depending on the time of night and month of the year, it will orient itself differently to the North Star. As the dipper rotates around the North Star, its orientation may be right side up or upside down or vertical to the North Star but the two pointer stars will always point to the North Star. Prepare yourself for all orientations in order to find it easier.

Once you find the North Star, you will be able to determine other points on the compass. If you are standing facing the North Star, East will be to your right and West will be to your left. Obviously, South will be behind you.

inaugural Advocate of the Year announced

The National Cattlemen's Beef Association, a contractor to the beef checkoff, has selected blogger and cattlewoman Anne Burkholder as the recipient of the inaugural Advocate of the Year award. The Advocate of the Year is selected by NCBA and state checkoff staff as the standout advocate amongst the 12 monthly award winners.

A Florida native, Burkholder moved to Nebraska with her husband in 1997 to run a family feed yard that had been in her husband's family since the 1970s. Since then, the mother of three started a successful blog entitled "Feed Yard Foodie" and works for Progressive Beef to ensure that its supply chain is producing high-quality, sustainable beef.

While many beef advocates grow up with an agricultural background, Burkholder grew up in Palm Beach County, Florida, a self-proclaimed jock, and attended Dartmouth University where she majored in psychology. This unique perspective allows her to relate to consumers who may not be familiar with beef production.

"Managing a feed yard for 20 years inspired me to learn to identify and fill meaningful gaps. With thousands of cattle relying on me each and every day, recognizing if an important gap existed between the care that I offered and what the animal needed was absolutely critical for good welfare. This same philosophy of working to 'fill the gap' extends to all of the areas of

my life including beef advocacy," explains Burkholder. "A gap clearly exists between the truth of how beef is raised and the general consumer knowledge of the beef industry. As someone actively engaged in caring for cattle and raising beef, it is my job to help fill that gap with truthful information."

Burkholder's passion for communicating with consumers led her to become an early graduate of the Masters of Beef Advocacy (MBA) program. She has taken that training,

paired with her firsthand experience, to another level over the years partnering with the beef checkoff as a spokesperson. She has participated in national media interviews and high-profile panel discussions to share beef's positive story with consumers around the coun-

"Feed Yard Foodie is a natural extension of me --It is an "Anne Gate" that creates appropriate transparency as I try to bridge the seemingly unending chasm between urban and

rural America. I truly believe that 'together we are stronger' and my advocacy efforts focus on finding common ground with those that were not granted the blessing of living on a farm," said Burkholder.

Burkholder is no stranger to awards. She was awarded the BEEF Magazine Trailblazer award in 2014. she was named to Vance Publishing's 40 under 40 in agriculture in 2013, and in 2009, she was awarded the Beef Quality Assurance Producer of the Year award.







Soil Health Partnership, NCGA endorse new list of soil health measurements

The Soil Health Partnership has endorsed a set of 19 soil health measurements, encouraging the agriculture industry to quickly adopt them. Once widely adopted, the indicators are expected to help farming become more sustainable and precise in areas such as nutrient management.

Research shows that the benefits of improving soil health include: Improved crop yield, enhanced water quality, increased drought resilience and flood resistance, and decreased greenhouse gas emissions.

After three years of collaboration with scientific and agricultural partners, the Soil Health Institute announced its endorsement of the "Tier 1" national soil health measurements. Examples of the specific Tier 1 measures include organic carbon, pH, and available water holding capacity. A complete list of all 19 endorsed soil health measurements is available at the Institute's website.

"We recognize the vigorous scientific collaboration that went into the development of this list of indicators, and urge the widescale adoption of them," said Nick Goeser, director of the Soil Health Partnership, and National Corn Growers Association director of soil health and sustainability. "We encourage farmers and agronomists to test soil on a regular basis, and use these indicators as business management tools to help them make smart decisions on the

farm."
Goeser added he hopes the new guidance on soil health indicators will lead to a faster implementation of practices that will improve soil health, like reducing the intensity of tillage to build soil organic matter.

An initiative of NCGA, the Soil Health Partnership is a data-driven program working to quantify the benefits of practices that support soil health, including reduced tillage, the use of cover crops, and advanced nutrient management, from an economic as well as environmental standpoint.



On-ranch vaccinations establish lifetime cattle health

Healthy cattle equate to profitable cattle in all sectors of the beef production chain. Aiding in disease prevention – through astute management and proper vaccination protocols - is the first step in setting up a calf for a healthy life.

In numerous published sources, consulting veterinarians and nutritionists have provided health and well-being recommendations for feedlots, but no published data addressed cow-calf operations on this subject. That is, until the Red Angus Association of America and Kansas State University teamed up in September 2016 and surveyed a large number of beef cow-calf veterinarians.

The Doctor Says

"We wanted to document some of the common health care practices recommended to cow-calf producers by veterinarians," explained A.J. Tarpoff, MS, DVM, assistant professor and beef Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University.

Tarpoff served as corresponding author of the abstract. "A survey of recommended practices made by veterinarian practitioners to cow-calf operations in the United States" (Fike, G.D., J.C. Simroth, D.U. Thomson, E.F. Schwandt, R. Spare, and A.J. Tarpoff).

"Each cow-calf operation is unique in terms of size, number of head, terrain and climate, and that is why the veterinary-client-patient relationship is so important," he said. "But, despite operations' differences, the survey unveiled a nice trend of similar vaccination protocols that veterinarians are recommending to their clients."

Responding veterinarians hailed from 35 states and three Canadian provinces with a majority de-

voting 50 percent or more of their time to commercial cow-calf producers. Over two-thirds of the veterinarians' practices represented 5,000 to 10,000 cows, with 39 percent servicing more than 10.000 cows through their clinics. In short, these are experienced health experts for cow-calf producers.

The survey's findings identified immunization as the most important component of a healthy beef cattle herd to aid in the prevention of infectious diseases. Vaccinating cattle is a relatively common practice among cow-calf producers, and the survey validated what many ranchers already know. Disease prevention via a thorough vaccination program is the foundation of good

Even so, a portion of the beef cattle population remains unvaccinated, leaving those animals susceptible to multiple diseases and lost profit.

"Bovine respiratory disease is the most common - and costly - ailment in all stages of beef production.' said Tarpoff. "Feedlot cattle that break with pneumonia have decreased production and health, and it is the leading cause of death in feeder cattle."

BRD alone costs the beef industry millions of dollars every year in treatment and death loss. Viruses commonly isolated from calves infected with BRD included IBR, BRSV, BVD and PI-3 - all of which can be controlled or mitigated through vaccination.

"BRD complex is multifactorial," said Tarpoff. "We must do our best to reduce the stressors that contribute to sickness onset - like weaning, transportation. commingling and inclement weather. Through vaccination, we can boost and challenge a calf's immune system to help protect him against bacterial and viral pathogens that result in illness.'

"Vaccines are not magic in a bottle. Regardless of the brand, producers must have realistic expectations of the product and diligently implement low-stress management practices for optimal results."

Buying Health

Veterinarians aren't the only ones who endorse progressive approaches. When purchasing feeder or stocker cattle, Cody Cornwell, Cornwell Ranch, of Glasgow. Montana, focuses on management practices that add value to a set of calves, such as a vaccination protocol, program-specific ear tags, fly control and weaning before shipping.

"The Red Angus tags - either Feeder Calf Certification Program or Allied Access – are a visual indicator of a rancher who is willing to take the extra step in their herd management," said Cornwell. "It shows that they understand the importance of traceability and that they take complete ownership in raising that calf."

"If a producer is will-

ing to enroll his calves in FCCP or Allied Access, we know they are buying registered bulls, traceable to Red Angus genetic lines. Age and source verification is extremely important right now for export markets." Sixty-nine percent of the veterinarians who responded to the survey agreed that calves should be ear tagged for management purposes.

Cornwell reinforced the findings of the veterinary health survey, recommending a modified-live vaccine with pasteurella administered on the ranch.

"Ranchers need to set themselves apart so buyers know their cattle are worth more," he said. "That marketing distinction begins by vaccinating at branding and then boosting before weaning. Those that don't follow a vaccination regime or that sell bawling calves will be left behind in the industry. Do everything you can to prepare that calf for the next chapter in his life."

Tarpoff said the optimal time to vaccinate is before a disease challenge. Since weaning is a stressor, cattlemen should vaccinate three to four weeks before that event, then boost them when they are weaned.

Cornwell emphasized the importance of a lifetime vaccination protocol and weaning calves 45 to 60 days before shipping. "A lot of feed vards won't receive bawling calves," said Cornwell. "By weaning calves on the ranch, you have better control of your weighing conditions and timing of shipping, adding more value to your product.'

Veterinarians said the earliest age their clients should wean calves is 90 to 120 days, and they should administer the last preventative vaccination seven to 21 days before shipping.

"It is important to use the vaccines as they are intended. Administer them properly and at the correct time in the calf's life," said Cornwell. Calves should receive their first immunizations at branding time - between two and four months of age – when the maternal antibodies from colostrum run out and they start to develop their own immune system.

Calves are usually weaned at six to eight months of age, and it's recommended to give preconditioning – or pre-weaning - shots three to four weeks before separating them from their dams.

"On-ranch vaccinations work every day for the rancher, adding value on shipping day," he said. "Buyers and feeders recognize the value of a good health protocol, knowing the cattle will perform better in the lot. A calf's health is progressive. Each step adds value until it reaches the consumer's plate."

Cornwell said it is essential that cattlemen know what vaccines they are giving and understand why each one is important. He recommended producers visit with their veterinarian or pharmaceutical representative to truly understand the purpose and functionality of the immunization.

He also emphasized proper handling of vaccination and implementing low-stress cattle handling techniques.

According to CattleFax data, the U.S. is the No. 1 beef producer in the world, producing 11.5 million tons of beef in 2016. The cow-calf operation is the first stage of the beef supply chain, therefore it is critical to lay a solid health foundation.

"Proper management starts at birth. What's done on the ranch begins the stepping stones for the animal to become a productive member of the cattle industry. Properly managed calves are healthier throughout all stages of the production cycle - they perform better with less inputs to maintain production levels. Healthy cattle simply have a much better flow through the system," concluded Tarpoff.

The official abstract and veterinary health survey will be published in The Professional Animal Scientist later this year.

Black bear population grows in Kansas

(AP) – Wildlife experts say black bears wandering into Kansas from Missouri and Oklahoma will likely become established residents of the state within the next decade.

The *Wichita Eagle* reports that two bears were documented in southeast Kansas and another along the Colorado border as recently as two summers ago. For most of the past 15 years, bears only have been seen in extreme southwest Kansas.

Experts say the possibility of Kansas having a permanent population of bears could cause safety problems. Neither Oklahoma nor Missouri have reported bear attacks recently, but experts are advising residents in those states on how to protect pets and livestock from the wild animal.

Wildlife officials say bears still deserve respect and that most people appreciate having bears around.



Now, it will culminate in Abilene. The Chisholm Trail essentially began when a railhead to handle cattle was established in the town of Abilene in 1867. One hundred fifty years later, the anniversary celebration of the Chisholm Trail will culmi-

nate in a big celebration on Labor Day weekend of 2017.

Since Abilene was the first of the famous cowtowns on what we now call the Chisholm Trail, it was fitting that Abilene would be the first to host an event commemorating the 150th anniversary of the trail. The Trails, Rails and Tales event on Labor Day weekend of last year was the kickoff for a year of celebrations, but it was also a kind of dress rehearsal for an even bigger show in 2017. Now that bigger show is here. On September 2-3, 2017, Abilene will host an even more impressive collection of talent and activities. It's a bigger and better version of Trails, Rails and Tales.

Michael Hook is director of the Dickinson County Heritage Center in Abilene. He's coordinating this major event in 2017. Activities primarily take place around Old Abilene Town, the recreated 1860s village just south of the railroad tracks (and south of the Eisenhower Museum). Saturday kicks off with a parade at 10 a.m.

The main stage lineup includes a "who's who" of western entertainment, such as Red Steagall, Michael Martin Murphey, and the Sons of the Pioneers. Entertainment will be provided both Saturday and Sunday, with fireworks Saturday night. The Kansas chapter of the Western Music Association will provide a stage show featuring nationally-award winning performers such as 3 Trails West, the Diamond W Wranglers, Jeff Davidson, Annie Wilson, Ed LeValley, and yours truly. I even get to emcee the main stage both days. The Prairie Rose Rangers and other stars will perform Sunday afternoon, and the new Home on the Range movie will be shown Sunday evening.

The longhorn cattle return to Abilene in 2017. Not only will they be on display, they will be part of a daily cattle drive around Old Abilene Town and a daily demonstration of them being loaded onto the railroad cars pulled by steam locomotive - just like 150 vears ago!

This year, the Native American Indian dancers will have their own demonstration village for dancing and education. The rodeo arena will be the site of the saddle club demonstrations, buffalo soldiers, and Pawnee Bill's Wild West Show.

A novelty theatre tent in Old Abilene Town will feature much more in the way of re-enactors, historical speakers, and even cancan dancers. Gunfights with cowboys in period costumes will happen regularly on the main street.

There will be lots of activities for kids, such as the Buckaroo Camp and much, much more. Artisans will be

demonstrating their skills, educational sessions will be provided, and street performers will provide entertainment as well.

We invite people to come out and enjoy an entire weekend of western entertainment, food, and fun. How fitting that it happens in Abilene, where it all

Of all the cities in the west, is there a name so keen, As the great cowtown which started it all? The town of Abilene. In 1867 is when it all began. A man named Joe McCoy had one exciting plan. 

Will drought put an end to cow herd expansion?

It's possible the severely dry weather we are experiencing this year, especially up north in the Dakotas and surrounding areas, could potentially impact the size of the cow herd as we head towards the new year. Jim Robb of the Livestock Marketing Information Center recently took a road trip

around some of the more drought-ridden areas of the country, for a first-hand look at conditions on the ground.

"We're really on the cusp of this becoming a nationwide issue," says Robb, after touring parts of the drought-stressed Northern Plains. "The drought really covers central and eastern Montana, most all of North and South Dakota, and it's drifting down into Nebraska, especially the Northern Sandhills and eastern Wyoming."

Robb reports the land he covered looked even more droughtier than what is indicated on the Drought Monitor. Some of these areas have been in drought conditions going on two years now, mostly in low rainfall regions, making it a struggle for the land to recover. He notes that 15 percent of all U.S. cattle are currently residing in the drought zone. He says this is beginning to impact marketing patternswith cull cow numbers picking up, lighter weight calves arriving at markets and increased movement. To what extent, though, is still up for speculation, according to the Oklahoma Farm Report.

Are feedyards still a target for a bioterrorism attack?

It isn't sexy, it doesn't blow things up and kill lots of people. But the FBI also considers U.S. agriculture to be a prime target for such an attack, simply because agriculture can be a soft target. And make no mistake: agriculture is on the terrorist radar. Documents captured in caves and terrorist training camps indicate there are plans for just such an attack.

Cutting and cooking seminars in Costa Rica highlight quality of U.S. red meat

Promoting selected cuts of U.S. red meat to Central American chefs and importers, USMEF held three cutting and cooking seminars in San Jose, Costa Rica. The seminars, funded by the Pork Checkoff and the USDA Market Access Program (MAP), were also attended

by regional sales staff from Walmart and Belca, a major food distributor in Central America.

USMEF meat consultants Lucia Ruano and Saul Bueso, Chef Pablo Lou and Marketing Director Gerardo Rodríguez presented the seminars at the Keith & Ramirez Gastronomy School in San Jose.

"The main objectives were to train importers on new U.S. pork and beef cut options and show them cooking trends that could be successful in their markets," said Rodriguez. "We demonstrated new ways of cooking, serving and presenting a variety of dishes that can help restaurants differentiate their menu offerings."

Each seminar was divided into two segments. The first included an introduction to the quality, attributes, and characteristics of U.S. pork and beef products, including juiciness, tenderness and flavor. The second part consisted of a cutting demonstration in which Bueso showed attendees how to properly portion an assortment of pork and beef

Attendees then were given the opportunity to cook and taste the cuts demonstrated at the seminar: U.S. pork center-cut loin and riblets, along with U.S. beef ribeye, tri-tip and coulotte.

"This activity goes handin-hand with our strategy of informing importers and foodservice professionals of U.S. red meat's attributes and availability and showing them many ways to utilize our products," said Rodriguez. "We are confident that those attending the Costa Rica seminars will share this information, and we can continue to build momentum for U.S. pork and beef in Central


