

Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

Unfortunately it was another ugly week for the grain markets. We saw new contract lows in the corn and in the Kansas City and Chicago wheat contracts. The markets were not overwhelmed with bearish but we didn't find

much bullish news to speak of either.

The Farm Journal Crop Tour didn't come up with a bullish boost for the corn like many traders were hoping, but they did more or less confirm that we will likely see lower production estimates as we move through the fall. The beans actually fared pretty well this week because the Crop Tour generally found much lower pod counts than expected, which implies a lower yield. There is still some time left for the soybean crop to improve, but that time is running out and it looks like we will have a dry finish to the growing season. So now, as far as major fundamental information goes, the next thing we have is the September supply and demand report, which should show lower corn production and may show lower soybean production as well. Over the next three supply and demand reports it is much more likely that the supply and demand balance sheets tighten for the corn, wheat, and soybeans than it is to see growing ending stocks. Don't forget that we should see lower spring wheat production estimates in either the September supply and demand report or in the Small Grains Summary at the end of the month.

That being said, the corn charts look terrible thanks to the string of new contract lows and we now have to

Grass & Grain, August 29, 2017 look at continuation charts to find support points. The September contract is running out of time, but unfortunately, the next support doesn't come in until the \$3.16 area.

The wheat actually showed some signs of life when that market reversed higher on Thursday. We didn't see a good close on Friday, which is what we really needed to confirm a bottom, so the outlook for wheat is still pretty bleak.

The soybeans have the best looking chart and probably the best chance at a sustained rally. Many of the pod counts were far enough below last year to suggest that yield potential may be much lower than many would like to believe. Farm Journal used a yield estimate of 48.5 bu/ac, but it looks like 46.5 is not out of the realm of possibilities. If there isn't a good end to the growing season, the soybean yield will likely suffer.

In the financial markets, something to pay attention to is the fact that the U.S. Dollar Index made a new low for the year Friday and is very close to taking out the 2016 low as well. Dollar weakness hasn't seemed to help the grain markets very much, but the gold is trending higher and if that remains the case we could see investors on the hunt for cheap commodities. At the very least the combination of low futures and a weak dollar will keep us competitive in the world market. What we need right

bottoming and this report shouldn't wreck that like the last one did. Look for a recovery back to the \$115 area in the October live cattle contract, and then it will be time for another sell-off.

Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market activity slow to moderate; demand light for most classes of hay; prices steady. Movement picked up only slightly last week with grass hay leading the way. Per NASS, Kansas alfalfa hav condition rated 2 pct very poor, 10 poor, 35 fair, 50 good, and 3 excellent. Third cutting was 92 pct complete, near 90 pct last year and ahead of the 81 pct average. Fourth cutting was 24 pct complete, near 27 pct last year, but ahead of the 17 pct average. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, with the recent rainfalls, conditions returned to normal in northwestern Kansas along the Nebraska border and across extreme southern Kansas. The abnormally dry (D0) category has decreased to 36.84 pct and moderate drought (D1) stayed steady at 13.87 pct. If you have hay for sale, and/or need hay here in Kansas, use the

USDA NASS to collect 2017 small grain production and stocks data

The agency is taking a comprehensive look into the 2017 production and supply of small grains, which include wheat, oats, barley, and rye.


"The small grains industry is important to Kansas agriculture and it is crucial for everyone to have accurate data about this key sector of the economy," said NASS' Kansas state statistician Doug Bounds. "We will contact more than 2,700 producers in Kansas to accurately measure 2017 acreage, yield, and production for small grains and the quantities of grains and oilseeds stored on farm."

'Responses to the survey will also be used in calculating county yields," explained Bounds. "USDA uses county yield information from the survey to evaluate and administer vital farm disaster mitigation and insurance programs such the Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC). Farmers who receive this survey should use this opportunity to assure their county is accurately represented in the calculation of Kansas coun-

ty yields."

NASS safeguards the privacy of all respondents and publishes only aggregate data, ensuring that no individual operation or producer can be identified.



Grass & Grain, August 29, 2017 Learn about growing flowers, vegetables, fruits, turfgrasses, and woody plants. Other sessions will be on plant growth and developed. the care of plants, and their pests. Wildlife management is also covered.

Giving back is the best part of the program. One of the earliest projects started by the first class is the annual garden tour. There were 341 ticket holders viewing the six private landscapes showcased. Proceeds support the Gardens at Kansas State University and local gardening education.

Butterfly garden habitat is a passion for many gardeners. The Master Gardeners continue to care for their demonstration garden at

the Sunset Zoo. It provides a living demonstration all year. Earth Day is a special event where the gardeners grow and give out butterfly milkweed and other plants butterflies love and information.

Flowers that are identified as having exceptional growth in Kansas are given the title "Prairie Star." These K-State researched flowers are planted by the Master Gardeners around the courthouse plaza for viewing. Each spring, 30 to 40 varieties are given out

renegotiations - round one recap

from the United States, Canada and Mexico met in Washington, D.C., August 16-20 for five full days of meetings covering rounds of negotiation topics. Subject matter experts presented proposals and comments related to various topics affecting the agriculture industry. The three countries have committed to an aggressive schedule to work through the negotiating texts. The second round of negotiations will reconvene in Mexico City from September 1-5, continue in and return to the United States in October.

In a joint statement issued at the conclusion of the first round of talks, the three countries noted a commitment "to an accelerated and comprehensive negotiation process that will upgrade our agreement and establish 21st century standards to the benefit of our citizens.'

In a statement at the first round of NAFTA negotiations, the U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer said, "The views of the President about NAFTA, Canada in late September, which I completely share,

be clear that he is not interested in a mere tweaking of a few provisions and a couple of updated chapters. We feel that NAFTA has fundamentally failed many, many Americans and needs major improvement." Indeed, the President has threatened withdrawal from the deal and recently remarked that we'll end up probably terminating NAFTA at some point. However, Ambassador Lighthizer and other leaders in the Administration have acknowledged that NAFTA

ranchers, many of whom count on Canada and Mexico as their largest export markets.

The United States previously announced its negotiating objectives-jointly developed between Congress and the Administration with respect to NAFTA. Among those goals are reviewing the trade deficit and other imbalances, rules of origin (particularly in the automotive sector), the inclusion of labor provisions in the agreement. rules against currency manipulation, redesigned dispute settlement, government procurement and anti-dumping provisions.

The first round ended without a strong agreement on the exact issues and number of chapters to include in the modernized and renegotiated agreement. For certain, the parties have a lot of negotiating text to work through in the coming months, and they are working against the clock to finish ahead of the 2018 midterm elections in the United States and the Presidential election in Mexico.

a couple of 2-cc subcutaneous shots to head off problems down the line. Sometimes it takes a few tons of steel, careful planning and focused construction. And remember that time when all it would have taken was to close one gate to save

Sometimes it only takes a day's work? In any case, when it comes to beef cattle, prevention is way better than trying for a fix later.

Ben Franklin was referencing fire safety when he wrote an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, but the 16-to-1 edge often understates it.

Thrill-seekers aside, when most of us perceive risk, we try to avoid or reduce it.

The market for both cattle and the inputs to feed them include hedging and options, from futures to USDA price insurance and private contracts. Producers can limit risk with a continuous presence in the market so they literally win some, lose some, but experience allows for winning more than is lost.

There are all kinds of insurance and strategies to manage financial risk and beat the odds on weather-related losses.

Keeping cattle healthy, however, takes more direct action that limits their stress and delivers just the right dose and timing of vaccines.

These strategies save billions of dollars in potential losses, but like other plans

Grass & Grain, August 29, 2017 to prevent or reduce risk. they are not perfect.

It's worth noting that consumers try to manage their risk when buying beef, too.

As the price of beef increased over the last decade, consumers learned it doesn't pay to save money by trading down to lower quality grades. Instead, they started paying a little more attention to the grades and brands that delivered eating satisfaction time after time.

Their continued purchases of higher quality beef as those prices went up shifted the demand curve in favor of the top end. The price signals moved through the market.

Out on the cattle farms and ranches, people reacted by shifting their genetic selection decisions to capture more of the growing market for premium beef. Genomic technology allowed for

Page 27 greater accuracy so that the U.S. fed beef supply saw a rapid rise in quality.

It all makes sense in the interwoven tapestry of risk reduction.

The old mindset of commodity beef production held that "pounds are all that matter." Decades of declining consumer demand for that commodity as other proteins won the price-perpound contest led to new strategies in this century.

Consumers have shown they'll gladly buy several excellent ounces of premium beef before they will buy a pound of no-roll, unbranded beef that risks refusal at the table.

The KWA is responsible

for advising the Governor, Legislature and Director of the Kansas Water Office on water policy issues. They also ensure that water policies and programs address the needs of all Kansans as well as serve as advisors of the Kansas Water Vision and Kansas Water Plan. The KWA was established in 1981 and consists of 13 voting members who are appointed by the Governor or Legislative leadership. State agency directors serve as ex-officio members.



Showcase helps expand red meat exports to rapidly growing Latin American region

The U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) held its seventh annual Latin American Product Showcase July 26-27 in Cartagena, Colombia. This year's event was the largest to date, with 56 exporting companies welcoming about 140 meat buyers from 18 countries throughout Central America, South America and the Caribbean. The showcase was conducted with funding support from the Nebraska Beef Council, the Beef Checkoff Program and the Pork Checkoff.

"This event just continues to gain momentum year after year," said Dan Halstrom, USMEF senior vice president for marketing. "It's a fantastic opportunity for U.S. exporters, because visiting personally with the range of buyers we have here would require a month or more of travel on their own - but here, they can do it in two days. And it's not just the number of buyers attending, it's the quality of buyers - real decision-makers who are here to conduct business."

This sentiment was echoed by Josy Castro, lead sales manager for Latin America for Atlanta-based trading company Interra International, a longtime USMEF member.

"This year I have really noticed that all of the customers who are here are very qualified – people who are already importing products and have experience with the process," she explained. "This is always a productive event for Interra, but I want to extend a big kudos to USMEF for attracting such a strong lineup of customers this year."

"We serve every type of food service establishment, from family-owned restaurants to large restaurant chains to all-inclusive hotels," said Pablo Salazar of Atlantic Foodservice, Colombia's largest beef importer and one of the country's largest buyers of imported pork. "We have good relationships with our suppliers, but an event like this allows us to build on those

existing relationships as well as to meet with traders and explore new options for our customers. I can save two or three months of travel with a showcase like this, so it's a very worthwhile event for our company." the event also included educational seminars. Representatives of Midan Marketing, a Chicago-based firm that services meat industry clients, shared insights designed to help businesses in the Latin American region

Importers from Brazil attended the showcase for the first time, with Brazil having opened to U.S. beef earlier this year. Buyers from Ecuador returned to the event this year, as Ecuador recently eliminated temporary import duties that had made it a difficult market for U.S. exporters to serve.

Dawn Caldwell, a cattle producer who serves on the Nebraska Beef Council and as vice chair of the Federation of State Beef Councils, attended the showcase for the first time. She noted that the experience confirmed the Nebraska Beef Council's decision to help fund the Latin American Product Showcase when it was first launched in 2011

"Nebraska Beef Council has supported this event from the get-go, and we've always had great reports from producers who have attended." Caldwell said. "So I'm glad that I now get to see the showcase for myself, and what a great investment it has been. We as producers don't always understand everything that's involved in getting our beef on the consumer's plate, especially in another country. So I have really learned a lot here, talking with meat exporters and traders of every size and scope."

Missouri pork producer Everett Forkner represented the National Pork Board at the showcase, and expressed similar feelings about the return on investment it provides for the U.S. pork industry.

"A real highlight of my tenure with the National Pork Board has been the alignment we've had with USMEF and the marketing effort that they are making worldwide," Forkner said. "This showcase is a great example of that effort. Being able to attend this event has really opened my eyes to the tremendous opportunities we have, not only in Colombia but in all of Latin America. I also had a chance to visit cold storage facilities here in Colombia that are as modern and upand to visit a retailer that has 435 outlets carrying U.S. pork. Seeing this modern infrastructure makes me feel very good about the amount of U.S. pork we are going to be able to market internationally.'

Larry Marek, an Iowa producer of soybeans, corn, cattle and hogs, traveled to the showcase representing the United Soybean Board. He said the level of activity gave him added confidence in the soybean industry's investments in red meat exports.

"I've never attended an event like this before, so I'm really impressed and surprised at the demand for our products and the magnitude of activity," Marek said. "A large volume of U.S. red meat is already entering this region and there's definitely going to be growth in the future."

In addition to the main showcase and ample networking opportunities for both buyers and exporters, ucational seminars. Representatives of Midan Marketing, a Chicago-based firm that services meat industry clients, shared insights designed to help businesses in the Latin American region successfully merchandise more U.S. red meat. Michael Uetz and Maggie O'Quinn discussed trends in consumer behavior in their "Modernization of Retail and Foodservice Marketing" presentation. This included a discussion of recent changes in shopping and dining practices, and how companies can capitalize. The Midan team's second presentation, "Digital Marketing: Proven Strategies to Drive U.S. Red Meat Sales," underscored the value of a meat distributor or retailer being able to tell its unique story online in the digital

Prior to joining Midan Marketing, O'Quinn represented Certified Angus Beef (CAB) in Latin America for many years. She was very impressed with the growth in U.S. exports to the region and with the high level of interest in U.S. products.

"For me this event was a real homecoming, and it's just amazing to see the exponential growth in the amount of business for U.S. exporters," she said, "I appreciate the investment the exporters are making in this region, and it's so exciting to see red meat importers in these countries rewarding the United States with a lot of business. It certainly sends a great economic signal back to U.S. cattle producers and hog farmers that these buyers appreciate the great quality of U.S. meat and they need more

USMEF representatives in the region, including Gerardo Rodriguez (Central America), Jessica Julca (South America) and Elizabeth Wunderlich (Caribbean) also presented valuable information in the educational seminars, discussing emerging demand trends in the food service, retail and processing sectors. USMEF chef German Navarette provided guidance on how to prepare beef and pork variety meat items and other underutilized cuts.

"Product-wise, these presentations provide a lot of great information," said importer Jose Escobar of El Salvador-based food distributor Diaco. "It is very helpful to know about pricing trends and the availability of different cuts. For example, I'm taking back a couple of products such as pork rib tips and brisket bones that I wasn't familiar with before."

Buyers and exporters also had an opportunity to tour the Port of Cartagena, one of Colombia's busiest ports. Several participants in the tour were impressed with the advances in automation at the port and other methods being used to move cargo quickly and efficient-

The Latin American region is a destination of increasing importance for U.S. red meat. Last year the region accounted for nearly 180,000 metric tons (mt) of U.S. pork exports, valued at \$438 million. U.S. beef exports in 2016 totaled about 59,000 mt valued at \$332 million.

Mycogen Seeds awards year of forage testing to silage corn grower

Ed Hilger, a silage corn grower from Ulysses, has won a year of free silage testing courtesy of Mycogen Seeds. The Mycogen Seeds Silage Testing Sweepstakes was one way the team at Mycogen demonstrates the importance of testing to properly track the quality and composition of silage.

"Producers and corn silage growers need the ability to understand silage quality with testing both at harvest and before feeding," says Jim Henry, western dairy development manager for Mycogen Seeds. "We partner with farmers to decode their silage composition through testing. That gives them a clearer picture of their feeding program to build the best ration possible for their herds."

Hilger grows 6,000 acres of corn that is used as silage, earlage or high-moisture corn for a large scale dairy in southwestern Kansas.

"We need to know what makes that cow happy," Hilger says. "The only way we can do that is testing our silage and knowing how to use the product when it comes out of storage."

Hilger uses testing data to evaluate the starch and fiber content as well as the digestibility of his corn silage hybrids. With results in hand, he works with his

teams at the dairy and Mycogen to produce a high-quality forage that meets the dairy's needs.

"Ed is one of my elite silage growers and he is constantly looking for the next best thing in quality and tonnage," says Landon Lukens, sales representative for Mycogen Seeds. "Every hybrid is tested and evaluated as it is grown, harvested, stored and fed."

"Landon helps me throughout the year to analyze data we receive from testing and use it to make decisions or adjustments for the next year," Hilger says. "That includes selecting the right hybrids for the right acres that will deliver a high-quality result."

Henry offers these harvest and silage testing best practices as producers near harvest and prepare to store and feed a new silage crop.

Pull a quality sample. Corn silage testing starts with a high-quality sample. Producers should remove at least a feeding, or better yet, a day's worth of silage from the exposed face. Next, reach deep into the pile or bag with a cup to scoop a representative sample of silage, placing the silage in a clean, dry bucket. Blend the silage in the bucket and dump it onto a clean, dry and smooth surface for subdividing. Mix thoroughly and cut the silage sample in half with a rigid instrument, like a clipboard. Discard half and remix the remaining half, following the same procedure until the desired amount of silage for sending to the lab for analysis is obtained. Place the final remaining sample in a sturdy, sealable plastic bag, squeeze out as much air as possible and seal the bag. I recommend sending two samples for analysis and averaging the results to minimize sampling error.

Work with a trusted lab. There are many labs to choose from when submitting and processing corn silage samples. Be sure to use the same lab for consistency in testing practices, types and procedures.


Tell your lab the hybrids you grew. Testing results may vary slightly based on what type of corn silage producers grow. Certain tests may yield more accurate results for particular hybrids. Mycogen Seeds recommends using a lab that practices invitro testing (wet chemistry) instead of near infrared (NIR) spectroscopy for measuring fiber digestibility. Invitro testing provides the most accurate values through a direct analysis of individual nutrients.

Test regularly. Corn silage should be tested at harvest and again at least monthly, after opening. If producers expect there to be variation, testing more often is recommended. Moisture content of the silage should be checked on the farm at least weekly or when rain or snow events occur. Throughout the year, producers should analyze samples and adjust their ration to fit the composition of their corn silage to achieve optimum results from the

Consult a local expert. Producers should meet with their local nutritionist regularly to pull quality samples, evaluate results and adjust their ration.

Silage testing is a fundamental tool for the farm to continuously evaluate quality and adjust to feed the best-possible forages. Hilger now will receive a year of free silage testing to support his goals courtesy of Mycogen Seeds in collaboration with Cumberland Valley Analytical Services.

Argentina was among several countries with non-science based barriers to U.S. pork imports. With today's White House announcement, trade-dependent U.S. pork producers now have unfettered access to this large pork-consuming nation.

"U.S. pork producers are the most competitive in the world and we have long sought the opportunity to provide affordable, high-quality pork in Argentina," said NPPC president Ken Maschhoff. "We thank Secretaries Perdue and Ross, and their teams at the USDA and the Department of Commerce, as well as U.S. Trade Representative Lighthizer and his team, for their diligent work to win Argentine market access."

Maschhoff added, "We also thank Vice President Pence for his efforts, including a recent visit to Argentina, to move a trade agreement that promises significant U.S. economic benefits over the finish line."

The U.S. pork industry, which has been the world's largest exporter of pork over the last ten years, depends on exports for growth. Exports added \$50 - representing 36 percent of the \$140 average value of a hog-to every U.S. hog marketed in 2016. NPPC continues to urge the administration to negotiate market access in other countries, such as India and Thailand, that remain closed to U.S. pork due to non-science based trade restrictions.

Kansas cattle on feed up three percent

Kansas feedlots, with capacities of 1,000 or more head, contained 2.18 million cattle on feed on August 1, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. This inventory was up three percent from last year. Placements during July totaled 430,000 head, down 3 percent from 2016

Fed cattle marketings for the month of July totaled 430,000 head, up 15 percent from last year.

Other disappearance during July totaled 10,000 head, unchanged from last year.




