

# EPA administrator hands in resignation

Environmental Protection Agency administrator Scott Pruitt, who visited Kansas in mid-June, resigned last Thursday as ethics investigations continued to mount – more than a dozen federal and congressional probes, including questions about security spending, first-class flights and an under-priced condominium lease.

In his resignation letter to the President, Pruitt wrote that it was extremely difficult to leave office, and that he counts it a blessing to serve Trump in any capacity. “However, the unrelenting attacks on me personally, my family, are unprecedented and have taken a sizable toll on all of us,” the letter said.

In accepting Pruitt’s resignation, Trump said,

“Scott is a terrific guy. He came to me and said ‘I have such great confidence in the administration, I don’t want to be a distraction.’ He’ll go and do great things and have a wonderful life, I hope.”

Previously Pruitt had served as Oklahoma’s attorney general. His close ties to the oil and gas industry drew criticism from ethanol supporters, who believed the many RFS waivers he issued harmed the ethanol industry and benefited Big Oil.

“It’s no secret corn farmers have been frustrated with Scott Pruitt’s ongoing actions over the past year that have seriously undermined the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS),” said Kevin Skunes, National Corn Growers Association president. “Even with this leadership change at the EPA, our priorities do

not change. We will continue to push the EPA to stop granting unjustified RFS waivers. We expect the EPA to account for the more than 1.6 billion gallons the agency waived from 2016 and 2017 RFS obligations, and we will continue ask EPA to follow through on the president’s commitment to remove outdated regulations to allow higher blends of ethanol like E15 to be sold year-round.”

EPA deputy administrator Andrew Wheeler took over as acting administrator on Monday.

“We are hopeful acting administrator Andrew Wheeler will work with America’s corn farmers to give consumers more options at the pump to save them money and reduce emissions and provide farmers with certainty in the marketplace that comes with RFS integri-

ty,” Skunes continued.

“Administrator Pruitt’s tenure as administrator of the EPA put a heavy strain on this administration’s relationship with supporters, farmers, and biofuel producers across the heartland,” commented Emily Skor, CEO of Growth Energy, a group that represents producers and supporters of biofuels. “We urge the EPA under the new leadership of acting Administrator Wheeler to reinforce those bonds and work as a partner to the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the White House in efforts to revitalize rural communities and unleash American biofuels. He can start today by reversing the demand destruction caused by EPA waivers, acting on the president’s pledge to unlock E15, and upholding a strong Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS).”

“Scott Pruitt’s decisions on biofuels drove a wedge between President Trump and his backers in the Midwest,” said Brooke Coleman, executive director of the Advanced Biofuels Business Council. “We’re very hopeful this will open a new chapter in the relationship between the EPA and rural communities. Andrew Wheeler could very easily come out of the gate strong by acting on the president’s pledge to lift regulations on E15 and halting abuse of refinery waivers. It would earn him a deep and loyal bench of supporters across rural America.”

While in Kansas Pruitt had indicated his office was examining the legality of granting an RVP (Reid Vapor Pressure) waiver for E15 to allow for its sale year-round. “It’s my belief that the statute permits

it and it’s something we should embrace,” he told the group gathered at the ethanol plant in Garnett.

Much of Pruitt’s time in office has been spent nixing environmental regulations from the Obama administration, and he told ranchers in Reading, Kansas that the regulatory reform in the EPA alone saved the economy \$1 billion. One of the bigger victories from agriculture’s perspective was the Waters of the U.S. rule, which drew high levels of concern as the agency under President Obama expanded it to include things like drainage ditches and dry creek beds. Under Pruitt the agency was also working to turn air quality issues created by prescribed burns into exceptional events that would not impact attainment under the Clean Air Act.

## CommonGround volunteer program launches Carpool video series

In new national video series rural farmer volunteers head to the big city to help local moms tackle their busy lives and answer the food questions that nag so many parents.

“We get it. We’re moms too. There’s just not time to sort everything out.

There’s too much information,” said volunteer farmer and mom Kristin Reese from Baltimore, Ohio. “Spending time with these moms – carpooling, grocery shopping, running errands – helps us learn more about how they make their food choices

and gave them access to real-time answers about food in the daily lives.”

Three farmer volunteers from rural communities took to the towns and cities. And while these mom’s lifestyles and their scenery may be different, they have more in common

than not.

“At the end of the day we all just want to stay on top of the crazy to-do list and take care of our families, stressing about food doesn’t fit into that mix. We are all overwhelmed,” said Bekah Gustafson from Dresser, Wisconsin. “Standing in the milk aisle with a mom who has no agriculture context, it’s easy to understand why.”

“This platform provided the opportunity to have a real conversation about food, where it originates,

how it makes its way to their table and what that all might mean for their families,” said Kyla Hamilton from Lubbock, Texas.

The Carpool video series is part of the farmer-led CommonGround program. CommonGround is a group of farmers having conversations about the food they grow and how they produce it. They share personal experiences, as well as science and research, to help customers sort through the myths and misinformation surrounding food and farming.

More than 200 women farmers volunteer to participate in conversations with consumers. The program has brought answers to millions of customers in all 50 states. A past campaign included an “Ask a Farmer” button in a grocery store aisle. Activating the button brought a live farmer volunteer right to the store, surprising and delighting the customers.

CommonGround is funded by the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) and supported by state corn and soybean organizations.



# Industrial hemp regulations draft available for public input

An early draft of regulations for the Industrial Hemp Research Program in Kansas is now available for public input on the Kansas Department of Agriculture website. The draft was developed by KDA in consultation with the industrial hemp advisory board and with input from the public.

The draft can be found at [agriculture.ks.gov/IndustrialHemp](http://agriculture.ks.gov/IndustrialHemp), and comments may be submitted to [kda.industrialhemp@ks.gov](mailto:kda.industrialhemp@ks.gov) through July 18. Following this public input

stage, all input will be considered in revising the next draft prior to beginning the next step in the formal adoption process. As part of the formal adoption process, the regulations will be reviewed by several entities, including the Department of Administration, the Attorney General, and the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules and Regulations, and will be subject to a public hearing which will be announced in the Kansas Register 60 days prior to the hearing.

# After months of asking for alternative, soy farmers hit by China tariff

A soft farm market, already-declining prices, and now, China's retaliation against President Trump's 25 percent tariffs on \$34 billion worth of Chinese goods, which took effect July 6. Soybean farmers, whose crop represents 41 percent of the value of products on China's tariff list, will feel the full effect.

The value of U.S. soybean exports to China has grown 26-fold in ten years, from \$414 million in 1996 to \$14 billion in 2017. Since talk of the tariffs began back in March, U.S. soy prices have dropped more than \$2.00 per bushel.

"Soybeans are the top agriculture export for the United States, and China is the top market for purchasing those exports," says John Heisdorffer, a soybean grower from Keota, Iowa, and president of the American Soybean Association (ASA). "The math is simple. You tax soybean exports at 25-percent, and you have serious damage to U.S. farmers."

Soy growers rely heavily on exports to China: In 2017, China imported 31 percent of U.S. production, equal to 60 percent of total U.S exports and nearly one in every three rows of harvested beans. Over the next ten years, Chinese demand for soybeans is expected to account for most of the growth in global soybean trade, which underscores the importance of this market for future U.S. soybean sales.

When the possibility of tariffs first arose, ASA asked President Trump to consider other policies for reducing the U.S. trade deficit with China. Then ASA organized a fly-in to urge Congress to encourage the administration to rethink the tariffs. Finally, in a last-ditch social media effort, individual soybean farmers who will be directly affected by the trade conflict attached their photographs to statements appealing directly to the President and his advisors.

# Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market trade activity is light to moderate. Demand remains very good for all hay types. Producers have reported that there has been a significant increase in the number of acres planted to Sudan. # Soybean growers request accurate bioengineered food labeling

Supporting transparency and urging USDA to follow the statute while finalizing the rule, American Soybean Association (ASA) on July 3 filed comments with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) regarding its proposed rule to implement the National Bioengineered Food Disclosure Standard (NBFDS).

The letter accompanying the comments noted, "As farmers, we understand and support the consumer's desire to know what is in their food. We are proud of the methods and technology we use to deliver a safe and affordable product to the consumer while developing ways to reduce impacts on the environment." The letter went on to say that biotechnology allows farmers to reduce inputs like water, fertilizer, and pesticides.

The NBFDS headed off a potentially chaotic situation of having a patchwork of conflicting BE labeling

requirements on grocery products at the state level that would have been confusing to consumers and cumbersome and costly for processors and food companies. ASA strongly supported enactment of the law establishing the standard, which preempts individual state labeling laws like that in Vermont.

While ASA's comments commend AMS for trying to arbitrate competing views by offering several options for the final rule, they urge USDA to adhere to the statutory definition of bioengineering, which requires mandatory labeling of foods that, "contain genetic material modified through transgenic biotechnology and exempts products that could be developed through conventional breeding techniques or found in nature." ASA further argues that USDA should adopt five percent as the threshold for the presence of bioengineered content required to trigger mandatory disclosure and em-

phasized that the purpose of the law is to establish a marketing mechanism, not a food safety standard, since foods produced with bioengineering have already been found to be safe.

ASA President and soybean grower John Heisdorffer from Keota, Iowa, says, "Farmers certainly understand people wanting to know where their food comes from and what is in it - we're consumers, too. That is why we're always in search of and support new methods and new technologies that allow us to produce safe, affordable products that decrease environmental impacts. Biotechnology is a great example, and more than 90 percent of U.S. soybeans grown today use this technology."

In addition to its comments to AMS, ASA is a member of the Coalition for Safe Affordable Food, which has filed joint comments on its members' behalf.



**Research fields and experiment stations play the long game**

Back in 1971, Idi Amin seized control of the African nation of Uganda. The 26th amendment to the U.S. Constitution lowered the voting age to 18. Norman Lear's "All in the Family" debuted on CBS. And in a crop field near Topeka, Kansas State University researchers established a soybean fertility study that is still going strong today.

Long-term experiments and studies are common in the field of agricultural research (no pun intended). Even a human that lives to 100 years of age is barely noticeable to a crop field that has been growing and nurturing food for one species or another, for perhaps thousands of years.

Eric Adee is the agronomist in charge for two of the experiment fields operated by K-State's Department of Agronomy: the Kansas River Valley experiment fields near Topeka, and the East Central experiment fields near Ottawa. He has been in charge of these fields for about seven years, and that fertility study was established by the predecessor of his predecessor, about 48 years ago.

"A lot of this was about answering farmers' questions," he said "That was what got this started. We secured funding from a few different sources, but the large part we just kind of kept it going because we thought it was valuable for the farmers in our area."

Granted, 48 years is a long time, but the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign established their Morrow Plots in 1876 – they are the oldest agricultural experiment fields in America. The world record belongs to the Broadbalk Wheat Experiment at Rothamsted Research in the United Kingdom, established in 1843.

The research supervised by Adee focuses on three key fertilizers: nitrogen, potassium and potash. Corn and soybeans are rotated annually, with lots of soil measurements taken at regular intervals.

"We're looking at various combinations, trying to find the proper balance of these fertilizers over time," he said. "Some of that's been changing as our yields have been increasing over time. A long-term study like this allows us to look at changes, and their progression."

"For example, do we



need to add more fertilizer just to keep up, or are the hybrids we're planting today more efficient than what we were planting 30 and 40 years ago?"

About 200 miles to the west, at K-State Research and Extension's Agricultural Research Center in Hays, director Bob Gillen says they, too, have some long-term research fields.

"We have some trials that were started in the 1970s and have been going continuously ever since," he said. "They relate to tillage management and the use of no-till crop production. Out in Tribune we have some plots that are at least 45 years old, studying nitrogen fertilizer."

Many of us probably had that grade school experience of sprouting a bean in a Styrofoam coffee cup filled with soil. As an adult you may sprout your own tomato and pepper seedlings down in the basement every spring. What grows in the soil happens in the blink of an eye, compared to how soil itself changes, over time. Gillen says with soils, particularly, it may take decades before changes really reveal themselves.

"If we only did the research for two or three years and said 'Well, nothing's happening, we'll switch to something else,' we would miss a lot of long-term trends," Gillen said. "And those long-term trends are really more common than the short-term trends."

More common, but also more expensive. Researchers like Adee and Gillen would like to have more long-term research, but the benefits come with a bigger price tag. When grant money from one source runs out, there can be a scramble to secure additional funding from somewhere else. "These long-term studies are very valuable, but they cost a lot to keep going," Adee

said. "That's why a lot of them aren't continuing."

Gillen points out that what he and his colleagues do is different from other kinds of research.

"You look at some of the basic research done at K-State, in the laboratories – the very detailed genetic or very detailed chemistry – that not only takes a while," Gillen said, "but once we learn those things, it still takes time to work them into the production system."

"What we're doing – whether it's better rates of fertilizer or a more efficient method of irrigation – those things can be picked up almost immediately and put into practice by the producers."

If these improvements are put into practice by producers, and followed consistently, real long-term benefits can be realized. Financial consultants frequently tout the benefits of consistent saving or investing over the long haul. In much the same way, good soil and fertility practices today can pay dividends to the next generation of farmers. Adee says long-term research results bear this out.


"Looking at yield following a harvest, that's pretty easy to look at, but when we're monitoring the nutrient levels in the soil, some of those don't change real fast," Adee said. "It takes a long-term history to know what you've put into the soil, what the crop is taking out or what you've lost through denitrification. You can begin to see trends over time that you might not see in just a short two- or three-year study. When you look at multiple years of data, you might be able to say, 'Yeah that did pay off, I do have this reserve built up that will get me through tough times.'"

"That's a benefit that's hard to see in two or three years of data."

## Four-Legged Superstars

Every Friday, Saturday and Sunday, some of our animal friends are idolized by millions of people across the country. Horses, cattle, buffalo and even coyotes are the stars of the show at sporting events across America.

They are the mascots of colleges and universities and are thought to bring luck representing the school or team as the official mascot. They inspire the fans and instill in them a sense of identity and pride of belonging to the school and team.

They decorate jerseys, t-shirts and caps and fans proudly wear clothing with the picture of their mascot that represents their team. The mascot's job is not easy. They have to walk in parades, attend all games and events and sometimes perform to the crowd. Some mascots are people who wear costumes depicting the likeness of a real-life animal.

Kansas Wesleyan University's mascot is a coyote.

There is a statue of a bronze coyote at "Coyote Corner" on the campus in Salina. The University of South Dakota has a coyote mascot too. Nowadays, he's named Charlie and is a costumed mascot. Charlie wasn't always a costume. The original mascot started out as a real coyote named "Tootsie."

Florida State University's symbol is an Appaloosa horse named Renegade. His rider is dressed as Chief Osceola and they are on the field at all home games. When Bill Durham was a sophomore on the homecoming committee in 1962, he envisioned the idea of a team mascot for the Florida State Seminoles, consisting of a horse and Native American rider. His dream came true at the opening home game on September 16, 1978 against Oklahoma State. The highlight of every home game occurs right after the coin toss, when Chief Osceola and Renegade gallop to center

field and plant a flaming spear. For the University of Florida game only, the Chief will dismount and brandish the spear at the opponent (Florida Gators) before planting it.

For over 25 years, Chief Osceola and Renegade have been named the number one college mascot in America!

"It's about the little old lady from West Florida that comes to every game just to see the horse; it's about the chill bumps that go up and down your spine when the spear hits the ground. The spirit of FSU and the Seminole Indian tribe of Florida is what it's all about," said Bill Durham, Renegade's trainer.

Then there's the pleasure of seeing a Texas Longhorn at all University of Texas games. Their Longhorn mascot is named Bevo and he's an impressive steer. The shape of the Longhorn's head and horns gives rise to the school's hand symbol and the saying, "Hook 'Em Horns." The current Bevo is fourteenth in the line of longhorns that have been the university's mascot.

The idea to use a live longhorn as the university's mascot is attributed to UT alumnus Stephen Pinckney in 1916. Pinckney gathered \$124 from other alumni to purchase a steer in the Texas Panhandle, which they originally

named "Bo" and shipped to the university.

One of the legends has it that a prank was perpetrated by Texas A&M students in 1917. They kidnapped Bo and branded 13-0 on his side. That was the score of their 1915 win over Texas. Texas students retaliated by altering the brand to Bevo. Since then the Longhorn mascot has been named Bevo. At a football banquet in 1920, the original Bevo, who had been fattened and slaughtered, was barbecued. The Aggies were fed the side they had branded and then were presented with the hide, which still read Bevo. Texans are known for their skillful pranks and that one ranks right up there with the best.

The University of Central Missouri is known as the Mules and the student newspaper is *The Muleskinner*. The men's sports teams are the Mules and women's teams are the Jennies. UCM has a living mascot named Mancow, and another named Mo the Mule.

Southern Methodist University selected the Mustang as the school mascot in 1917. The name was suggested by the secretary of the school's president. She was struck with the idea while watching the team practice. She said the team looked like "a herd of wild mustangs kicking up a cloud of dust." The name stuck and was made official. Seven other colleges

share the Mustang as their mascot.

Cam the Ram shares his distinction as Colorado State's mascot with seven other institutions that use a ram as the mascot. The ram was named Colorado's mascot in 1947. CAM is the 21st official Ram mascot. The first school mascot was introduced in 1947. There have been both live and costumed versions of the mascot. The 2006 version of CAM was a Rambouillet sheep and the 21st ram to represent the university.

The thoroughbred horse is Kentucky State's mascot and that is sure a fitting critter for that state college. The first thoroughbred was brought to Lexington in 1779, and a 1789 census showed more horses than people. Horses are a multibillion dollar industry in Kentucky. Central Kentucky's Bluegrass region has the world's greatest concentration of thoroughbred breeding farms. More registered thoroughbred foals are produced there than any other state.

Marshall College is known as "The Thundering Herd." Fittingly, their mascot is a costumed bison. The White Mule was adopted as Colby College's mascot in 1923. Currently there's a costume with a giant mule's head, known to students as "Morty."

The U.S. Naval Academy's first mascot was a gorilla. Then in 1893 a goat named El Cid made

his debut at the fourth Army-Navy game. El Cid was a gift to the Brigade of Midshipmen from officers of the USS New York. The goat helped Navy win 6-3 over Army that year, so the goat became the official Navy mascot.

In the early 1900s the Navy goat was finally given a name. On the return trip to the Naval Academy after Annapolis' triumph over West Point, the goat was led on a victory lap through the train and did not leave the midshipmen until they arrived back at the Academy. The midshipmen named the goat Bill. He was the first of a long line of "Bill the Goat" that still serve as Navy mascot.

There are hundreds more institutions and NFL teams with four-legged critters as their mascot. That says something about the high regard we place on our livestock. Our animals have attained the lofty status of symbols of power, ability and toughness that organizations try to emulate.

But wait—there are eleven colleges that have the Yellow Jacket as their school mascot. Are they trying to intimidate their opponents with the threat of being stung by a bee? I'll stick with the mustangs or thoroughbreds as my superstars.

## USDA report highlights benefits of Tax Cuts and Jobs Act for farmers

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue recently highlighted a new report showing the positive impacts of President Trump's Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA) on American farms. Six months after the President signed the tax cuts and reforms into law, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Economic Research Service (ERS) has released a report, titled "Estimated Effects of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act on Farms and Farm Households." The report examines in detail how the historic tax cuts and reforms will alleviate the tax burden on American farms to help them grow and prosper. According to the report, average tax rates are expected to decline across all farm sizes and commodity specializations and fewer farm estates will be subject to the Death Tax.

"Most family farms are run as small businesses, and they should be able to keep more of what they earn to reinvest in their operations and take care of their families," Perdue said. "Simplifying the tax code and easing the burden on farmers will free them up to make choices for themselves, create jobs, and boost the overall American economy. This report just shows what we knew all along: the tax cuts and reforms will benefit farmers."

The TCJA significantly reformed the federal income tax system, including individual and business income tax rates, business expenses, taxable income deductions, and the alternative minimum tax. The TCJA also doubled the federal estate tax exclusion. The USDA ERS report estimates the impact of current federal income tax provisions on farm households by using 2016 tax-year data.

# NASS releases acreage report

Kansas producers planted 5.40 million acres of corn in 2018, down 2 percent from 2017, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Biotechnology varieties were used on 96 percent of the area planted, up 1 percentage point from 2017. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 5.10 million acres, down 2 percent from a year ago.

Soybean planted area is estimated at 4.85 million acres, down 6 percent from last year.

Biotechnology varieties were used on 95 percent of the area planted, up 1 percentage point from 2017. Producers expect to harvest 4.81 million acres, down 6 percent from a year ago. Sorghum acreage planted, at 2.85 million acres, is up 10 percent from a year ago. Area expected to be harvested for grain is 2.65 million acres, up 8 percent from last year. Oil sunflower planted area is estimated at a record low 35,000 acres, down 33 percent from last year. A record low estimated 33,000 acres is expected to be harvested, down 34 percent from a year ago. Non-oil sunflower planted area is estimated at a record low 10,000 acres, down 26 percent from the previous year. Harvested area is estimated at a record low 9,000 acres, down 26 percent from the previous year.

Oats planted for all purposes is estimated at 135,000 acres, up 35 percent from last year. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 50,000 acres, up 100 percent from last year. Barley producers planted 18,000 acres. Area to be harvested for grain is estimated at 12,000 acres. Alfalfa acreage to be harvested for dry hay is estimated at 490,000 acres, down 14 percent from last year. Other hay acreage to be cut for dry hay is estimated at 2.00 million acres, down 5 percent from a year ago.

Cotton acreage planted is estimated at a record high 120,000 acres, up 29 percent from last year.

Winter wheat seeded in the fall of 2017 totaled 7.80 million acres, up 3 percent from the previous year. Harvested area is expected to total 7.30 million acres, up 5 percent from last year. Summer potato planted acreage, at 3,800 acres, is down 300 acres from 2017. Harvested acres is expected to total 3,700 acres, down 400 acres from a year ago. Canola acres planted are 46,000, down 8 percent from last year. Area to be harvested is estimated at 39,000 acres, down 17 percent from the previous year.

Estimates in this report are based on surveys conducted during the first two weeks of June.

# Husker researchers on cusp of swine industry protection

Researchers at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln are leading research to help producers across the globe fight a devastating swine virus.

Porcine reproductive and respiratory syndrome virus (PRRSV) is a viral pathogen that causes abortion when infecting pregnant sows and pneumonia in young pigs. Additionally, the virus can suppress the pig's immune system, leading to enhanced susceptibility of pigs to other infectious diseases. When a pig contracts the virus, not only does the producer lose the production of that pig, but he or she also has to spend money treating nearby pigs and cleaning the facility. In the United States, PRRSV costs the swine industry over \$640 million per year.

Fernando Osorio and Hiep Vu, researchers in the Nebraska Center for Virology, are focused on the development of a universal or broadly protective vaccine that could protect against multiple, if not all of the variants of the virus circulating in the field.

"The challenge to make an effective vaccine is that the virus can mutate, or change very fast. This leads to the co-circulation of many variant forms of the virus in the swine herd," said Osorio. Consequently, the currently available vaccines fail to protect pigs against all forms of the virus in the field.

The researchers have employed an innovative approach in which they combined bioinformatics and molecular techniques to generate a fully synthetic PRRSV strain. Data produced by the group demonstrate that this synthetic PRRSV strain shows tremendous promise in the possibility of developing a live-attenuated vaccine for clinical applications.

Vu grew up on his parent's pork production farm in Vietnam. He has seen firsthand the deadly consequences of PRRSV, which is why he came to the university as a master's student in 2007 to work on the PRRSV vaccine. After completing his master's, doctorate and post-doctoral research with Osorio, Vu is now an assistant professor of animal science.

"I'm hopeful that the product we're able to develop here in the lab can one day be used to help my parents and pork producers everywhere," said Vu.

As the project progresses, the researchers believe partners like NUTech Ventures will be critical in bringing their discoveries to industry. NUTech facilitates the commercialization and practical use of innovations generated through research at the university. The PRRSV team is a prior winner of NUTech's Breakthrough Innovation of the Year award.

Along with Vu and Osorio, researchers Asit Pattnaik and Fangrui Ma also contribute to this project, along with post-doctoral research associate Haiyan Sun. The research is conducted at the Nebraska Center for Virology, which combines the expertise of Nebraska's leading biomedical research institutions — the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, University of Nebraska Medical Center and Creighton University — to focus on important viral diseases of humans, plants and animals.

# Cost-free quality drives beef demand

"Is marbling a free trait?" The question was put to Mark McCully, vice president of production for the Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) brand at the Beef Improvement Federation meeting held recently in Loveland, Colo.

His answer? Basically. "The data that's out there from a cow standpoint says we're really in a pretty good spot," McCully said, adding he'd like to see even more research.

There are a few correlations between marbling and some other traits such as milk production, but cattlemen can select accordingly, he said. "It's a pretty positive story for us as an industry: there's not going to be a sacrifice of cow function in our pursuit of improving the quality of our end product."

The cost must show up in the feedyard, critics say, but performance and quality are more simultaneous than mutually exclusive, McCully said.

He shared an analysis of 600 pens of high- and low-grading cattle (10% Prime and 0.6% Prime) fed at Five Rivers Cattle Feeding yards across the High Plains. The June-to-October 2017 closeouts showed feed efficiency and average daily gains were the same with the higher grading pens having a slight cost of feed (COF) advantage at \$0.70 per pound of gain compared to \$0.72. The lower quality cattle finished at 1,358 lb., giving up more than 40 lb. of final weight to their higher quality counterparts.

"I hear that a lot,

"These high grading cattle... you're going to have to sacrifice performance," McCully said. "Data we see every day would definitely dispel that idea."

That's good news for those trying to match their cattle to market signals.

The National Beef Quality Audit (NBQA) suggests the industry should produce 5% Prime and 35% upper two-thirds Choice, but McCully said, "Maybe that's too low."

So far in 2018, beef across the United States is grading 7.6% Prime, 23% upper two-thirds Choice and just 17% Select.

"When you think about our competitive advantage, what we can do with genetics today and what the demand signals are," he ventured, "I believe they're telling us we need to ratchet those up a little bit."

Today, packers market more boxes of Prime and branded beef than they do Select. The amount of Prime has nearly doubled from 2010 to 2018, going from 13 million lb. to 25 million per week. At the same time, Select has dropped 40% in eight years.

That "dramatic shift" in the marketplace came while premiums remained steady. The Prime to Select cutout spread was around \$40 last year.

The trends hold true for CAB, too, which will certify more than 5 million head of cattle, or 16% to 18% of the total fed-cattle supply.

"Packers reported \$75 million paid back to the cattle owners on grid premiums (in 2017), specifically

for CAB," McCully said. He expects the quality trend to continue, because it's good for all segments.

High-marbling cattle offer feeders marketing flexibility.

"We've been dealing with low feed costs for the last handful of years, but if we get into where we need to shorten days on feed, we'll be able to keep sending a high-quality product out to our consumers while dealing with that," McCully said.

The changing retail landscape demands more of the best beef in its pipeline. Costco has sold Prime beef for several years and Wal-Mart now carries an upper two-thirds Choice program, for example.

Larger supplies give retailers the confidence to feature beef in ads and "get very aggressive promoting high quality," McCully said. "I don't get the sense that they want to go backwards."

Ground beef sales have expanded with more than 100 million lb. of CAB branded grinds sold annually.

"It's no longer quality

grade neutral," he said. "That whole burger category is significantly different than it was five to ten years ago. I think that's a demand driver."

Together, the increased focus on ground beef and innovative fabrication of end meats have helped elevate the value of those primals.

"The more carcasses we merchandize into those steak items and away from low-and-slow cookery methods, marbling obviously has a bigger benefit," he said.

In export markets, it's U.S. beef's "high-quality, grain-fed" reputation that keeps global consumers coming back, McCully said.

It's hard to make predictions 25 or 50 years out, but all the clues point in the same direction.

"I have a hard time finding a business model that doesn't say if you increase the quality of your product, you're going to increase demand," he said. "We have the tools available to do this all while improving efficiency and reducing our cost of production."

# Schwieterman Market Outlook

A marketing commentary by Bret Crotts

The grain markets have finally made some indication of a turn-around. The corn, wheat, and soybeans all closed above the nine-day moving average Friday, which is something that we haven't seen since late May. The corn in particular has been struggling with the nine-day moving average resistance day after day, so it was good to finally see the market move through it.

As far as reasons for the surge higher go, the main reason is that Friday was "tariff day" and for the time being the negative trade talk is behind

us and traders covered shorts on the idea that it won't get any worse for a while. Other than that, there are going to be more hot temperatures in the Corn Belt and I keep seeing articles on the correlation between high overnight temperatures and sub-trend line yields. I don't think that too many people are worried about the weather right now and analysts are assuming that both corn and soybean production estimates are going to be higher in the July supply and demand report, thanks to increases in acreage and in yield.

The trading funds are net short in corn and beans, so we have the potential for short covering to carry these markets quite a ways, but we are going to have to see some substantive news in order to keep the rally going more than a few days. Demand for corn and soybeans is strong, and the demand for wheat seems to be improving, so we do have supportive information there, but it is going to be difficult to overcome the higher production estimates completely in the supply and demand report unless there is something

else to go with it. The best bullish bets right now are corn demand and heat. Now that traders are more relaxed about tariffs, they may give more weight to the heat causing sub-trend line yields and corn demand should continue on its very strong pace. The world supply and demand numbers should be very bullish again, which will add to those ideas of corn demand staying strong for the foreseeable future.

The wheat market probably has the best looking chart right now, and one should look for the December KW to make a run to the \$5.50-\$5.58 area in the near term. Once we get to that area one should consider hedging any stored bushels with a March put option strategy. It won't be a surprise to see higher production estimates for the

wheat as we move through the crop year, but hopefully production problems in the rest of the world turns some demand to us.

Cash cattle traded as high as \$114, which is a huge rebound from the week prior. That, unfortunately, didn't keep the live cattle futures from closing at the bottom of the daily range or the feeder cattle from posting an outside day lower on the chart. The technical action was definitely disappointing considering the strong cash cattle trade. We will probably end up seeing the August feeders pull back to the \$147 area in the near term and the August live cattle are likely headed back to \$104.

## KLA partnering on Kansas cattle traceability project

The Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) is one of the key partners in a new cattle traceability pilot project. Cattle Trace will involve an end-to-end disease traceability sys-

tem beginning with cow-calf producers and ending at the beef processing plant. A number of ranches, feedyards, auction markets and beef processing facilities have volun-

teered to cooperate on the project. The goal is to utilize ultra-high frequency tags and readers to collect the minimal amount of data necessary for disease traceability at the speed of commerce.

In addition to KLA and private sector partners, the Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) and Kansas State University are participating in the Cattle Trace project. It will be funded with both public and private resources.

Kansas is considered a

good testing ground for the pilot project because it is one of the few states with sizeable producer populations in each segment of the beef supply chain. Cattle Trace organizers hope the Kansas model will guide the development of a cost-effective traceability program that can work at the speed of commerce at the national level.

KLA is supporting the project based on policy approved by members in December 2017. The resolution supports a mandatory national individual

animal disease traceability system for all cattle that minimizes costs to producers, optimizes the role of the private sector and protects the confidentiality of individual animal owner records. It also suggests the KDA Division of Animal Health should be the state agency that manages any disease traceability plan.

"The Cattle Trace project matches those member policy priorities," said KLA Chief Executive Officer Matt Teagarden during a June 30 event near El-

linwood announcing the project.

On a broader scale, the project will help meet the objectives of the current Beef Industry Long-Range Plan, which emphasizes the importance of adopting individual animal traceability to help manage any potential disease outbreak.

"We are excited to be part of this effort to move traceability forward for Kansas producers and, ultimately, the entire U.S. beef community," said Teagarden.


