USDA to gauge financial well-being of **Kansas farmers** and ranchers

In late December, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) began gathering information about farm economics and production practices from farmers and ranchers across Kansas, as the agency conducts the third and final phase of the 2019 Agricultural Resource Management Survey (ARMS).

"ARMS is the only survey that measures the current financial well-being of Kansas producers and their households as a whole," said Doug Bounds, Kansas State Statistician. 'The results of this survey will help inform decisions on local and federal policies and programs that aifect Kansas farms and farm families.' In an effort to obtain the most accurate data, NASS will reach out to more than 30,000 producers nationwide, including nearly 1,700 in Kansas, between December and April. The survey asks producers to provide in-depth information about their operating revenues, production costs, and household characteristics. The 2019 survey focuses on costs associated with producing agricultural commodities, with a special version focusing on sorghum sector costs and returns. "In February, our interviewers will begin reaching out to those farmers who have not yet responded," said Bounds "We appreciate their time and are here to help them with the questionnaire so that their information will continue supporting sound agricultural decision-making." In addition to producing accurate information, NASS has strong safeguards in place to protect the confidentiality of all farmers who respond to its surveys. The agency will only publish data in an aggregate form, ensuring the confidentiality of all responses and that no individual respondent or operation can be identified. The expense data gathered in ARMS will be published in the annual Farm Production Expenditures report on July 31, 2020. That report and others are available at www.nass.usda.gov/ publications. More reports based on ARMS data and more information about ARMS are available at www.ers.usda.gov/arms.



K-State eyes new approach to soil health in dryland cropping systems; Dryland Soil Health Network meeting set for February 18 in Hays dryland systems.

Brunner's 2019 WNFR, his second consecutive qualification, was accented by a fifth-place win in the eighth round, good for \$ 6,769.23, followed up by splitting second and third in the tenth and final round with a 3.8, earning Brunner a check for \$18,192.31.

will reap the benefits of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA), which President Donald Trump signed last week.

"I've always said we want trade, not aid," KFB president Rich Felts says. "We also want to be good neighbors, and this agreement solidifies our relationship with America's top two trading partners. The USMCA is projected to increase U.S. agricultural exports to Canada and Mexico by \$2 billion, and I know Kansas farmers and ranchers are eager to do their part to supply the increased demand."

"USMCA will bring some guarantee to the unpredictable climate of farming," said National Association of Wheat Growers (NAWG) president and Lavon, Texas farmer Ben Scholz. "Trade deals create markets which provide stability for growers, making the profession more attractive to future generations. NAWG would like to thank the administration again for working to get this agreement finalized."

"Wheat farmers and Mexico's wheat buyers are very glad to see the cloud of uncertainty lifted from our trade relationship," said U.S. Wheat Associates (USW) chairman and Paulding, Ohio, wheat farmer Doug Goyings. "Replacing NAFTA without harm to the wheat trade

relationship was a priority for all of us - mission accomplished."

USMCA retains tariff-free access to imported U.S. wheat for those long-time flour milling customers in Mexico, a crucial step toward rebuilding trust in the U.S. as a reliable supplier in this important neighboring market. In addition, the USMCA makes important progress towards more open commerce for U.S. wheat farmers near the Canadian border by allowing U.S. varieties registered in Canada to receive reciprocal grading treatment.

Other measures that benefit the wheat industry include the Agreement's language around agricultural biotechnology which supports 21st Century innovations in agriculture and new language to strengthen disciplines for science-based SPS measures.

"This final step by President Trump ensures soybean growers will maintain access to two of their top markets, and it will also support the poultry and dairy industries that are important to soy,' said Bill Gordon, American Soybean Association president and grower from Worthington, Minn. Gordon continued, "We reiterate our hearty thanks to both houses of Congress. the President, and their staff who worked together to make this important deal happen."

Mexico has already acted on USMCA, and



Canada's Parliament is expected to follow the United States and approve the deal in the coming weeks. The deal is expected to take effect later this year after additional procedur-

al steps. Mexico is the #2 market for whole beans, meal and oil, and Canada is the #4 buyer of meal and #7 buyer of oil for U.S. soybean farmers, making the trade agreement essential to sustaining the growth realized in those two countries under the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Under NAFTA, U.S. soybean sales to Mexico quadrupled and to Canada doubled.

The signing of the agreement is a big win for Kansas corn farmers, according to the Kansas Corn Growers Association. Mexico and Canada represent the largest market for U.S. corn and corn products with purchases of U.S. corn and corn products valued at \$4.56 billion in 2018.

"Trade with Mexico especially is top of mind for our Kansas corn farmers. There's no doubt that Kansas corn, DDGS, ethanol and red meat are being shipped to Mexico, and we are directly benefitting from that trade." Kansas Corn CEO Greg Krissek said. "Just last week, about 250 corn growers attending our Kansas Corn Symposium participated in a panel discussion on Mexico trade that included Head Consul Alfonso Navarro Bernachi, Consul-

ate of Mexico's Kansas City office."

The panel also featured the U.S. Grains Council (USGC) Mexico City Office Director Stephan Wittig and U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) director of Trade Development for Mexico Gerardo Rodriguez. The Kansas Corn Commission supports the efforts of USGC and USMEF to build export markets in Mexico. Canada and countries around the world.

Passing USMCA was a top legislative priority for KCGA and the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) in 2019. NCGA and KCGA will continue to work with the administration to identify future opportunities for market access and new agreements.

Once implemented, the agreement will also provide much-needed certainty for U.S. pork producers. National Pork Producers Council (NPPC) president David Herring attended the signing ceremony, as well as seven other NPPC board members: Scott Hays (Missouri), Dale Reicks (Iowa), Duane Stateler (Ohio), Lori Stevermer (Minnesota), Kraig Westerbeek (North Carolina), Terry Wolters (Minnesota) and Russell Vering (Nebraska).

"USMCA provides U.S. pork producers with certainty in two of our largest export markets and we thank President Trump and his administration for making USMCA a top priority," said Herring, a hog farmer from Lillington, N.C. "We look forward to implementation of a trade deal that preserves zero-tariff pork trade in North America."

In 2018. Canada and Mexico took more than 40 percent of the pork that was exported from the United States and a similar volume is expected in 2019. U.S. pork exports to Canada and Mexico support 16,000 U.S. jobs. "With USMCA now signed into law, NPPC is focused on another top trade priority for U.S. pork producers: unrestricted access to China," said Herring. "We believe that pork will be the litmus test for China's compliance with its phase-one purchase commitments to the United States. We urge China to eliminate the 60 percent punitive tariffs and other restrictions on U.S. pork exports. Tariff elimination would more than double annual U.S. pork sales, generate 184,000 new American jobs and reduce the overall trade deficit with China by nearly six percent, all within the next decade."

Disruptive or innovative?

Touching down in more than 120 countries, Terry Jones shared his worldly views Nov. 2 with a captive audience of Angus breeders at the 2019 Angus Convention in Reno, Nev. What caught the cattlemen's attention? Jones' buzzword: disruption.

For many in the audience, thoughts immediately went to social media and the intrusive cell phone. Jones was quick to explain the concept of disruption and why producers should embrace it.

"Things are moving fast, and it's connectivity that's made things move so fast," Jones said. "The telephone took 75 years to reach 50 million users. Pokémon Go only took 15 days to reach that number."

In 2008, Blockbuster's CEO wasn't worried about looming streaming systems. Just 10 years later, Blockbuster closed its doors permanently.

"If you don't like change; you'll like irrel-

evance even less," said Terry Jones. Adaptability is becoming the name of the game even in cattle country.

What that CEO viewed as a disruption was an innovation for Netflix. It's that manner of thinking that clinched Blockbuster's fate and everything Jones encouraged convention attendees to avoid.

Jones challenged producers to think outside the box when it comes to revolutionizing the Angus cow. Production doesn't typically change much from one generation to the next. but Jones predicted that won't be an option anymore.

"Over the next five years we will see as much change as we have seen in the last 70," Max Armstrong said as he introduced Jones.

In a world where "this is how we've always done things" prevails, Jones told breeders to follow his lead when it comes to risk. "I started my career as

a receptionist for a travel agency almost 50 years

ago," Jones said. His career quickly evolved into becoming an entrepreneur when he saw an avenue for recreating the travel agency system.

He is the founder and former CEO of Travelocity. That's just one of three other successful startups Jones has launched in his 70-year life. His most recent startup was a failure, he said, but that's not something Jones frowns upon.

"Failure is ok," Jones said. "It's an open door. You don't have to totally fail, but you do have to experiment. At Kayak.com 20% of what you see every day is a test. We are constantly failing and continuously learning."

Jones introduced 10 forces of digital disruption: connectivity, big data, internet of things (IOT), mobility, robotics, drones, artificial intelligence (the other AD, virtual reality. 3D printing and AI becoming the new user interface.

Though the internet

might appear to be the heartbeat of these disruptions, it's the perspective of the cattleman that makes the difference.

"If you don't like change; you'll like irrelevance even less," Jones said. Adaptability is becoming the name of the game even in cattle country.

Drones fly parallel to mounted cattlemen as the two check cattle; tractors are plowing fields but harbor no driver; fitness tracking-like bands are becoming commonplace on cattle pasterns. The point Jones was making was this: Don't let some kid in Silicon Valley steal your business.

"Disruption and innovation are just two sides of the same coin," Jones said. Innovations are only viewed as a disruption when that organization didn't do it. If the coin were flipped and you had the brilliant idea, it wouldn't be considered a



Beware of common ag lease misunderstandings ram (Tordon, Grazon P+D,

January and February is a time when people look at their financials for the year, mostly for taxes, but this often brings up conversations about agricultural leases as well. The majority of landlords and leasers know what the payment terms are for their contracts, but don't realize that there are a number of other inherent terms in the contract as well, ones that are formed by the lease laws of Kansas.

Although there are great number of misconceptions when it comes to agricultural leases in Kansas, there are three common ones that have less to do with rates and dates of the contract and more to do with what does an agricultural lease contract entail.

Landlords Entering Property

An agricultural lease represents the tenant having an estate in the land for a specific period of time and it's not entirely unlike an apartment lease. If you covered your apartment in posters of Wham! and Duran Duran, and your landlord hated new wave bands of the '80s, that doesn't mean he could come in unannounced and a take them down. In an agricultural lease, unless otherwise stated, the decision of production is up to the tenant. However, that doesn't mean doing something unfavorable won't result in losing the lease for next year. A landlord can really only enter the property for a few reasons like to make inspections. conduct repairs, collect rent, and show the land to potential buyers (if selling). This makes the decision to lease part of the ground out to gas wells or wind turbines one that is

between the tenant as well, unless otherwise specified in a written contract. However, in good fashion, most tenants should be okay with a landlord driving across the land if crops and the ground are not being damaged.

Hunting Rights

Many people are confused by hunting rights when it comes to leased ground. Dr. Roger McEowen, law professor with Washburn University. states, "The landowner cannot hunt on the leased ground without the permission of the tenant unless the landowner retained these rights in a written lease." And Dr. McEowen says that this includes crop share leases as well. However, this does not give the tenant the ability to lease the hunting rights of the ground out to an outfitter or anyone else, as this would be a sublease. Really this needs to be a conversation if the landlord, or the tenant, would like to hunt the ground. Many soybean crop farmers would probably prefer a few more dead deer. Hunting rights is one of the terms that every written agricultural contract should have, even though the vast majority don't.

Firewood

Firewood and hedge posts is another one that sticks in between lease understanding and for this one there is no direct answer. It's more complex as trees are part of the leased ground but also part permanent fixture of the land. The cutting of firewood question goes to the direct overall purpose of the lease. "The scope of a farm lease would not, without explicit authorization from the landlord. include cutting timber to make way for more farm ground. Nor would it include the consumption of




the leased land (e.g., the cutting of wood) for fuel, etc." states Dr. McEowen. If it's not scrubby valueless brush in the way of the farming operation, then it is outside the lease. Earlier it was stated that an agricultural lease represents an estate in the land, but that is not to say that a lease means "ownership" of the land beyond a leaseholder interest. This is another point of conversation between landlord and tenant and would also be a good idea to have in any written or oral contract. Most landlords will be okay with a farmer or rancher cutting up a naturally dead tree or taking out a valueless one over hanging a crop field, just be sure to ask first.

The same goes with being careful with herbicide use. Controlling brush in a pasture is a responsibility of the tenant but be sure to know how and what you are spraying. Many chemicals, especially ones like PicloRemedy Ultra), can travel through roots or maintain persistence in the soils to picked up by non-target trees. For crop farmers, most large trees can stand up to crop herbicides, but I have personally seen huge trees of various species with what looked like overdrift herbicide damage.

Like with any lease complication, it all comes down to a conversation. If a landlord or tenant wants to use the land for something outside the scope of the farm lease, then permission from both parties needs to be agreed upon. 



Elizabeth impressed the application committee with her strong involvement in the beef industry combined with a drive to be part of the future of beef genetic improvement. Elizabeth will earn


