

Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market trade remains slow; alfalfa prices remain mostly steady while grass hay prices weaken. Current trades are mostly on previously contracted hay with very few new sales reported. However, more hay moving on the roadways can be seen across the state and out of state. Many conversations have revolved around where this market will be going. Most agree the market should stay steady and perhaps soften a bit the closer we get to spring; that is assuming that winter weather does not decide to come in and

sit on us for three or four weeks. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, abnormal dryness (D0) decreased slightly to 22 pct, moderate drought (D1) decreased to 4 pct, and severe drought (D2) remained at 4 pct. 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USDA announces Disaster Declaration for Kansas counties

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue recently announced a Secretarial Agriculture Disaster Declaration for Riley and neighboring counties.

"Farmers and ranchers are always at the mercy of Mother Nature," said U.S. Rep. Roger Marshall, M.D. "It is important that we provide them with the resources necessary for rebuilding and overcom-

ing the damage done by prolonged severe weather events. I applaud Secretary Perdue for implementing this disaster declaration and continuing his support for our producers and rural communities."

The disaster declaration was made as a result of damage sustained from excessive rain, flash flooding, high winds, and hail that occurred from Jan.

1-July 10, 2019. Marshall has been designated as the primary natural disaster area. Nemaha, Pottawatomie, Riley and Washington counties have been named as contiguous disaster counties and are also eligible for assistance.

A Secretarial disaster designation makes farm operators in primary and contiguous counties eligible for certain assistance

from the Farm Services Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. This assistance includes FSA emergency loans.

Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the disaster declaration made on to apply for assistance. Local FSA offices can provide affected farmers with additional information.

Strong demand, leverage shift add optimism for year ahead

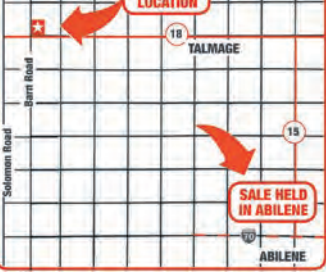
Beef demand is strong and with U.S. cattle numbers plateauing, prices are likely to be stronger in the year ahead as consumers at home and abroad support industry profitability. That was the message delivered Feb. 6 during the popular CattleFax outlook session, hosted as part of the 2020 Cattle Industry Convention in San Antonio, Texas.

Weather is expected to play a supporting role for agriculture during the year ahead, according to Art Douglas, professor emeritus at Creighton University. He said that following repeated El Niño events during the past five years, the United States will shift to a La Niña pattern, which will shift much of the nation outside of the northwest and southeastern portions of the country toward conditions slightly warmer and drier than last year, which will be favorable for planting and growing conditions during the spring and summer.

CattleFax vice president of Research and Risk Management Services Mike Murphy predicted that corn and soybean acres will increase during the year ahead, with corn plantings rising 4 million acres to 94 million acres and soybean acreage rising 7 million acres to reach 83 million acres.

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USDA NRCS in Kansas announces Environmental Quality Incentives Program sign-up

Kansas State conservationist Karen A. Woodrich, of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced the statewide cutoff for fiscal year 2020 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funding. All Kansas agricultural producers and landowners who wish to be considered for this year's financial assistance must apply by March 2, 2020.

While customers can apply year-round, this application cutoff announcement is for all general EQIP, as well as some special initiatives such as: On-Farm Energy, Organic, Seasonal High Tunnel, and the Working Lands for Wildlife. Producers should discuss these sign-up options with their local NRCS field office to see if any of the initiatives or projects are right for them.

EQIP contracts provide financial assistance to help plan and implement

conservation practices to improve soil health, water quality, improve grazing and forest lands, and establish or improve wildlife habitat. "NRCS is here to help Kansas farmers, ranchers, and private landowners make the best use of their land and natural resources," said Woodrich. "Programs like EQIP, encourage management techniques that help the producer maximize their economic and environmental benefits."

Historically underserved producers approved for funding through EQIP are eligible for the advanced payment option. This option allows these producers to receive conservation practice payments in advance of the practice implementation. A historically underserved producer is described as one of the following:

- Beginning Farmer or Rancher:** One who is new to farming or ranching and/or has operated a farm or ranch for less than ten consecutive years.
- Socially Disadvantaged Farmer or Rancher:** One who is a member of a group whose members have been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice because of their identity as members of that group without regard to their individual qualities.
- Veteran Farmer or Rancher:** One who has served in the armed forces and has not operated a farm or ranch, has operated a farm or ranch for less than ten consecutive years, or first obtained veteran status during the last ten years.
- Limited Resource Farmer or Rancher:** One who has a household income at or below the national poverty level.

Under the advance payment option, such producers with approved contracts may request payments when they have final designs and job sheets, and are ready to begin their EQIP practices. Advance payments provide at least 50 percent of the payment rate for each practice. The funds must be spent within 90 days of receipt, and practices must be completed as agreed to in an EQIP scheduled plan of operations. Producers may also opt to have NRCS pay the contractors or vendors directly.

Interested producers can apply at their local USDA Service Center by submitting a Conservation Program Application (NRCS-CPA-1200).
