Kansas farmers know well that having a bountiful crop year is pretty exciting. So, a Kansas State University agronomist said this year's winter canola likely brought a few smiles.

Mike Stamm said that the combination of cool temperatures in April and May and the resulting extended bloom allowed the crop to grow and produce

"It really was an exceptional year for canola yields," he said.

riod, according to Stamm. "That extended grain fill that we had based on

those cooler temperatures added to the density and number of pods we had in the field as well as pod size. All those different yield factors really contributed to high yields," he said.

"The crop filled in the empty space like I had never seen before and we just had these huge, dense canopies, especially in the central and northern part of the state. I think that

lowed the crop to withstand the frigid conditions that took place in Febru-

"When we went out to rate winter survival, we really didn't see any winter kill because of that major cold snap," Stamm said.

Other factors contributing to high yields, according to Stamm, include the canola varieties grown, management, getting a good stand and the environment.

"As we move north in

canola crops were "outstandingly consistent" across the fields.


For example, he said. the yields reached 70-80 bushels in Manhattan. "I got to run the combine for most of the harvest and it was encouraging to see

the yield consistency," he said.

Kansas Hay Market Report

Hay market prices for the week ending August 21 remain mostly steady for alfalfa and grass hay. Demand is fair to good with trades slow to moderate across the state as producers report a lull in the action. Many areas are spraying for army worms, especially in the southern regions of the state, adding pressure to areas experiencing dry conditions. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for the week of August 17th, aside from a few pockets of heavier rain in parts of Kansas and in eastern and central Colorado, most of the region was dry this week. For Kansas abnormal dryness (D0) increased to 30.5%, while moderate drought (D1) remained near 10% and severe drought (D2) remained at 1% and isolated to Cheyenne and Rawlins counties. As the drought continues to worsen for our northern and western neighbors the Kansas Department of Agriculture has created a web page highlighting multi-state hay exchange web links that can be found at www.agriculture.ks.gov/HayForDrought. Join agriculture leaders from across the state for the Virtual Kansas Governor's Summit on Agricultural Growth, this week, on August 26th. The state rules and regulations board has approved the adoption of temporary amendments to the Kansas industrial hemp regulations which were proposed by the Kansas Department of Agriculture. The regulation amendments will align Kansas' industrial hemp regulations with the USDA's Final Rule on commercial hemp production.

The amended regulations extend the timeframe to complete sampling and harvest, provide flexibil-

ity to producers regarding potential remediation of plants if sampling tests above acceptable THC levels, and increases the threshold at which a crop will be deemed to have been produced negligently. The full amended regulations for K.A.R. 4-34-24, K.A.R. 4-34-25 and K.A.R. 4-34-29 can be found at www.agriculture.ks.gov/IndustrialHemp.

Because these amendments directly address regulations that affect harvest, they were expedited to be

in place on a temporary basis. Plans are in progress to make them permanent through the official rules and regulations approval process. Public comments may be submitted online after September 2 and a public hearing will be held on November 8 as KDA considers finalizing the regulations; KDA will release details on the public comments and hearing

Grower groups disappointed neonicotinoid draft biological evaluation does not reflect actual product use

representing a variety of crops are disappointed with the Environmental Protection Agency's draft biological evaluation (BE) for several neonicotinoid products, including imidacloprid, thiamethoxam and clothianidin. The groups representing farmers across the country say that failure to consider real-world usage data in the analysis conducted as part of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) could limit growers' ability to protect their crops and livelihoods and not assure endangered species are any safer.

The American Farm Bureau Federation, American Sovbean Association. National Cotton Council and Minor Crop Farmer Alliance say ESA analyses are, by law, required to "use the best scientific and commercial data available" to ensure endangered species and their habitats will not be adversely affected by an agency's action. The groups point out the draft BE does not use the "best available data" and cite multiple examples of assumptions made in the EPA assessment that do not align with growers' real use of neonicotinoid products:

• The draft BE assumes U.S. soybean farmers apply imidacloprid at 0.50 pounds per acre, the annual maximum rate

Scoglio awarded USDA grant to develop tool to estimate insect pathogen risk

Caterina Scoglio, professor in the Mike Wiegers Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering at Kansas State University, has received a U.S. Department of Agriculture — Research Education and Economics grant to develop a computer tool used to estimate the risk for arthro-

pod-transmitted pathogens.
Scoglio, who holds the
Paslay professorship in
electrical and computer
engineering and is a Steve
Hsu Keystone research
scholar, will lead the
more than \$275,000 fouryear project, conducting
research on "Predicting
Insect Contact and Transmission Using Historical
Epidemiological Data."

Researchers will collect data, develop algorithms and design a computer tool that provides predictive models that estimate arthropod-borne pathogen transmission risk in locations using environmental and dynamic real-time data, all with the goal of optimizing resources.

"Estimating pathogen transmission risk will reduce waste of limited shelf-life products and the movement of resources between locations," Scoglio said. "Planners will use this tool to evaluate mosquito-borne virus risk of a geographic location at specific times or durations of time. Users can also monitor conditions at specific locations to decide when and which products to reorder."

The platform will classify landscapes into three levels of transmission current risk — high, medium and low — and will feature a forecasting tool.

This project is closely related to major research goals in the Carl R. Ice College of Engineering for the areas of infectious diseases and health.

However, USDA declined to release the breakdown for foliar applications compared with lower-risk seed treatments in its ARMS survey: In 2018, there were fewer than five total foliar applications of all three chemistries reported nationally, which fails to meet the threshold to allow for survey data release.

Kevin Scott, soybean farmer from South Dakota and president of the American Sovbean Association. says the draft BE compares proverbial apples to oranges: "USDA survey and commercial use data are available and show how growers actually use these tools, but the draft BE instead includes application rates, numbers, types, and reapplication timing for these neonicotinoid products that are remarkably inconsistent with the actual, available data. These erroneous assumptions could have real, negative consequences for farmers



and other end users if they are used for the final ESA analysis."

American Farm Bureau Federation president Zippy Duvall said, "We are disappointed that the Environmental Protection Agency failed to use the most accurate data in the draft biological evaluation. Farmers are judicious in their use of pesticides. EPA overstates the quantities used and therefore overestimates the impact on species. The Environmental Protection Agency should always utilize the most accurate data, especially when making decisions that could affect farmers' access to important crop protection tools."

Stephen Logan, a Louisiana cotton producer who serves as chairman of the National Cotton Council's Environmental Task Force, said, "EPA's current ESA compliance process is more like a 'what-if' scenario rather than use of best science and data. It's a legislative conflict that no longer questions whether EPA will be sued but how soon EPA will be sued. EPA's current compliance process seems to suggest that science

and data are being dismissed due to frustration over continuous lawsuits. Meanwhile, farmers—not big companies—are the ones being economically affected. We have to rely on fewer options that often are more expensive and less effective."

EPA's overly cautious assumptions have led to significant inflation in the number of species receiving a "likely to adversely affect" designation. This could result in greater and unnecessary restrictions for products, which will do nothing to help species and only impede use of tools farmers rely on to sustainably grow a healthy and nutritious product.

Farmers are using new technology and practices every day to better manage their fields and protect wildlife For example, farmers regularly use neonicotinoids and other crop protection tools as seed treatments, which can reduce soil surface exposure area by more than 99% compared with surface treatments—thus reducing risks to wildlife. Growers also seek participation in conservation programs and alliances such as the BeSure! Program and the Monarch Collaborative that aim to 1. improve policy 2. spread awareness of best-use stewardship practices for protecting species health and managing responsible product use. The grower groups will continue to review the draft BE and participate in the public comment period to encourage use of best available scientific and commercial data in the final BE.

USDA accepts 2.8 million acres for the Conservation Reserve Program

The U.S. Department accepted 2.8 million acres in offers from agricultural producers and private landowners for enrollment into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) in 2021. This year, almost 1.9 million acres in offers have been accepted through the General CRP Signup, and USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has accepted over 897,000 acres for enrollment through the Continuous Signup. The Continuous Signup remains open and CRP Grasslands Signup closed recently, so USDA expects to enroll more acres into all of CRP than the three million acres that are expiring.

"Despite Congress raising the enrollment target in the 2018 Farm Bill, there have been decreases in enrollment for the past two years. The changes we made this spring have put us on the path to reverse this trend," FSA administrator Zach Ducheneaux said. "Even with the improved direction, USDA will still be about four million acres below the enrollment target. The CRP benefits for producers, sportsmen, wildlife, conservation and climate are numerous and well-documented. We cannot afford to let them to be left on the table."

The four million-acre shortfall in CRP would have had the following impacts:

More than 359,000 acres less annual forage under CRP Grasslands: A loss of 1,500,000 acres

of quality wildlife and pollinator less habitat for wildlife: 20% fewer apiaries in

major production regions meeting critical forage thresholds; A loss of more than four

million upland game and other grassland birds; About 90 million pounds of nitrogen entering water-

Over 30 million tons of soil eroded, leading to increased pollution and sedimentation in streams and rivers; and

Foregone sequestration of more than 3 million metric tons of CO2.

Like other USDA conservation programs, CRP is a voluntary program that has a variety of options specific conservation issues of a state or region and desires of the landowner. The options run the gamut from working lands such as CRP Grasslands to partnerships with states and private entities to target a specific joint concern such as water quality or quantity.

"We are grateful to the leadership and staff at the USDA, who have worked diligently over the last several months to ensure that the Conservation Reserve Program remains a viable and effective conservation tool," says Whit Fosburgh, president and CEO of the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership. "Today's announcement demonstrates that when the CRP is administered with the needs of landowners in mind, they respond by investing their lands in conservation. This course correction is needed now more than ever, as management decisions in recent years have left program acreage at a 30-year low, with an additional four million acres set to expire by October 2022. We look forward to continuing to work with the USDA to improve the trajectory of the CRP and guarantee that the program benefits our natural resources, landowners, and the sporting community for years to

Continuous CRP Signup

Continuous CRP allows

USDA to target the most sensitive land like highly erodible land, the most environmentally beneficial land like wetlands and buffers along streams and rivers, or locally identified critical habitat like State Acres For Wildlife. This targeted approach also reduces the whole-farm type enrollment in CRP that was more common when it first began and helps meet the conservation goals while maintaining the majority of the land in production agriculture. FSA has accepted offers from over 37,000 producers to enroll more than 897,000 acres through the Continuous Signup. This is double the enrollment from last year and three times the enrollment from 2018 and 2019. FSA expects this process to be completed by the end of September so contracts may start on Oc-

tober 1, 2021. The growth in the targeted enrollment through Continuous Signup is due to a recommitment of USDA to incentives and partnerships that brought in nearly 1.4 million acres in 2016 and 2017. These efforts have also included the expansion of the Clean Lakes, Estuaries, and Rives Initiative 30year (CLEAR30) from two regions to nationwide as well as moving State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) practices from the General to the Continuous signup. This year, offers for 20,000 acres have been submitted for CLEAR30 and 296,000 acres in SAFE practices.

General CRP Signup FSA opened the Gener-

al CRP Signup 56 in January 2021 and extended the original deadline to July 23, 2021, to enable producers to consider FSA's new improvements to the program, which included higher rental payments and more incentivized environmental practices.

Additionally, FSAintroduced a new Climate-Smart Practice Incentive to increase carbon sequestration and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. This incentive provides a 3%, 5% or 10% incentive payment based on the predominate vegetation type for the practices enrolled from grasses to trees to wetland restoration.

Through CRP, producers and landowners establish long-term, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland. In addition to the other well-documented benefits, lands enrolled in CRP is playing a key role in mitigating impacts from climate change.

More Information

In April, USDA announced several changes to CRP to increase participation while improving climate-related and other environmental benefits. CRP sequesters carbon while preserving topsoil, mitigating greenhouse gas emissions, reducing nitrogen runoff, and providing healthy habitat for wild-

The 2018 Farm Bill established a nationwide acreage limit for CRP, with the total number of acres that may be enrolled capped at 25 million acres in 2021 and growing to 27 million by 2023.



Specialist offers tips for managing lightweight calves

SDSU Extension

Weaning calves early is a powerful management tool to reduce demands on range and pasture. By pulling the calves off the cows earlier than normal, we can cut the cows' daily forage intake by 25% or more. While early weaning offers a lot of potential to improve performance and cut costs on the cow side, the disadvantage of

weaning calves early is ing that kind of perforthat we're faced with the choice of either selling a lighter-than-normal calf that will bring in less total dollars or taking on the challenge of feeding fourto six-month-old calves.

Diet & nutrition

Early-weaned calves can perform very well when fed high-quality diets. Feed conversions of about 5:1 (feed:gain) are certainly possible. Achiev-

Calves of this age require a diet containing about 16% crude protein (CP) and 70% total digestible nutrients (TDN). That typically means diets containing about 60% grain plus 10%-20% higher-protein ingredients such as soybean meal or distillers' grains, with roughage making up the balance. Diets should also contain a vitamin-mineral supplement. This is especially important to support immune function and vaccine re-

mance requires that calves

consume a sufficient quan-

tity of nutrients to meet

their needs.

Feeding a "cheap" diet might not be the best option for starting light calves. Calves that don't eat well during the first few days on feed often end up with health problems and/or poorer performance later in the feeding period. Feeding a more expensive diet (i.e., commercial creep or starter feeds) for the first ten to

14 days might be justified if that results in more consistent intake initially. These feeds may also be a fit if an operation isn't set up to mix and deliver small quantities of a starter ration.

Health considerations

Keeping these calves healthy is also a concern. In some respects, these cattle transition through the weaning process in early fall easier than later in the year as they don't have to deal with the potential of cold, snowy weather. Plus, there is still some disease protection from maternal antibodies. Producers should consult with their veterinarian to develop a management plan specifically for their operation. Keep in mind that this year a veterinary feed directive (VFD) is required for any feed-grade antibiotics. Calves coming from drought-stressed areas might require some additional attention if vaccine response is inadequate due to nutrient restrictions this summer.

Some other suggested management tips include:

Make sure the facilities will handle light calves. Smaller calves may not be able to access water and feed as easily in pens designed for larger cattle. Small calves can also slip through small holes or gaps in fences and gates much more easily. Some feedlots use wire panels over the feedbunks so that calves are less likely to escape, but feed can still be delivered.

Controlling dust in a drylot setting during drought can be a significant challenge. Some options include keeping group sizes small to minimize the amount of dust kicked up in the air. Reducing pen size to about 60 square feet per calf also can help, and make sure that calves are close to

feed and water. Bedding the pens can also help, as well as sprinkling the pen surface with water.

Water intake is critically important. Simply put, if cattle don't drink, they don't eat. If they don't eat, they are much more likely to get sick. Make sure that tanks are clean and the calves find the water. Letting tanks run over for a day or two might help, especially for cattle not used to tanks or automatic waterers.

Even though there may be ample supplies of high-moisture feeds from salvaged grain crops in some areas, small calves don't have enough rumen space to eat enough of those feedstuffs to meet their needs. Avoid feeding silages and other high-moisture feeds until the calves weigh 400-450 pounds.

USDA establishes Dairy Donation Program as part of continuing pandemic assistance

U.S. Department of Agriculture Deputy Secretary Jewel Bronaugh has announced the establishment of a \$400 million Dairy Donation Program (DDP) on a call with Senate Agriculture Committee Chair Debbie Stabenow. The DDP, established by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) in accordance with the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021, aims to facilitate timely dairy product donations while

reducing food waste. The establishment of DDP is part of \$6 billion of pandemic assistance USDA announced in March and follows the recent announcement of \$350 million Pandemic Market Volatility Assistance Program for dairy farmers on August 19. It is the second part of an over \$2 billion comprehensive package to help the dairy industry recover from the pandemic and improve or establish programs to make it more resilient to future challenges.

Under the DDP, eligible dairy organizations will partner with non-profit feeding organizations that distribute food to individuals and families in need. Those partnerships may apply for and receive reimbursements to cover some expenses related to eligible dairy product donations. DDP was inspired in part by the donations made by Michigan Milk Producers Association in conjunction with the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan in response to the Flint water crisis.

"The benefits of the Dairy Donation Program are twofold - it supplements other financial support for producers while providing nutritious dairy products to American families," said Bronaugh.

"When there is surplus Knight, executive director milk production, we encourage the milk be donated instead of being dumped. Together we can help someone in need, minimize food waste and support the U.S. dairy industry."

"The Dairy Donation Program is a win-win for farmers and families. It will be easier for dairy farmers to donate milk and other dairy products, which in turn helps feed vulnerable Americans, including our children," said Stabenow, Chairwoman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry. "Michigan dairy farm families and food banks continue to lead by example. I am proud of the role they played in pioneering this initiative which has become a model for the na-

The Michigan Milk Producers Association stated, "MMPA is excited for the launch of this new program, which builds on the significant donation partnerships we have been undertaking in Michigan for the last several years. Our dairy farmer members and others in the dairy sector have long supported giving back to our communities, and this program helps expand our efforts. We thank Senator Stabenow for her leadership in getting this program enacted into law, and we applaud the U.S. Department of Agriculture for its work in implementing this new program, which will aid hunger relief efforts across the country while reducing food waste and supporting local dairy farmers."

"This program comes at a time when the need has never been greater for fresh foods to help Michiganders," said Dr. Phil of the Food Bank Council of Michigan. "Michigan's agricultural community, especially the state's dairy farmers, have come alongside of us throughout the pandemic. Their partnership means fresh, nutritious food and milk for families, children and

seniors."

Dairy farmers, cooperatives, or processors that purchase fresh milk or bulk dairy products to process into retail-packaged dairy products and meet other requirements are eligible to participate. Costs reimbursed through the program include the cost of milk used to make the donated eligible dairy product and some of the manufacturing and transportation costs. Reimbursement of these costs is designed to help offset some of the costs associated with processing and donating eligible dairy

products. Program details are available at www.ams. usda.gov/ddp. Interested partnerships must apply by completing and submitting a Dairy Donation and Distribution Plan. Upon plan approval, partnerships will be able to submit claims and supporting documentation to obtain reimbursement for eligible dairy products donated since January 1, 2020.

imbursement Program (MDRP) will be automatically enrolled in the Dairy Donation Program.

The interim final rule formalizing the program will soon be published in the Federal Register and will provide eligible handlers and cooperatives procedures on how to participate in the program. The program becomes effective one day after it is published in the Federal Register. A preview of the interim final rule is posted on USDA Agricultural Marketing Service web-

The announcement is part of a broader package to help the dairy industry respond to the pandemic and improve or establish programs to be more resilient. Upcoming additional announcements will include \$580 million for Supplemental Dairy Margin Coverage for small and medium farms. Outside the pandemic assistance funding, USDA will also make improvements to the Dairy Margin Coverage safety net program updating the feed cost formula to better reflect the actual cost dairy farmers pay for high quality alfalfa. This change will be retroactive to January 2020 and is expected to provide additional retroactive payments of about \$100 million for 2020 and 2021. Unlike the pandemic assistance, this change

will also be part of the permanent safety net and USDA estimates it will average about \$80 million per year or approximately \$800 million over ten years for dairy headed into the upcoming Farm Bill. Full details on these additional actions to support dairy farmers will be provided when regulations are published in the coming weeks. Dairy farmers should wait until these details are available to contact their local USDA Service Center for more information.
