We are always in search of the perfect cow that will earn us the most profit. The problem is not everyone agrees on what is better.

Seedstock producers are always willing to sell us a better bull. The real question is: Is he better for you?

Commercial cattlemen are striving to produce a better calf. The dilemma is we tend to look at "better" from our perspective, but better is ultimately defined by the buyer.

Admittedly, even though we work from our own perspective, we don't

always know what we want. I'm sure we have all had the experience of wanting something a lot, then discovering we didn't want it as much when we finally got it.

That is one of the fundamental failures of marketing. We often try to convince others they should want what we made. The most effective marketing is geared toward explaining why your product is the one the buyer wants to buy.

What does your customer want?

All of this is, of course, simplistic, but the main point is one we tend to forget. Marketing is about providing objective information that helps the buyer know the product will do what they want it to do. This can only be accomplished by having an indepth knowledge of your target customer's business and an understanding of what they value.

The most effective marketing is geared to explaining why your product is the one the buyer wants to buy.

Cattle feeders are in the business to make money, but the business models they employ are many. They may want to reduce risk, decrease health costs, improve market access, increase market flexibility, beat performance expectations, maximize grid performance, find cattle to hit specific markets or time frames, etc. The list is almost endless. They may have the same ultimate goal, but they get there in different ways.

Build relationships for the long term

Your basic marketing must be designed to address as many of these factors as possible. However, ultimately, great marketing is built on relationships. Those relationships truly enable you to understand what is important to your customer. It allows you to empathize with them. It is the relationship that allows you to move beyond a transactional mentality to a more longterm perspective, where everyone benefits by moving toward their goals in a collaborative way.

That is perhaps the biggest change we have seen in our industry. In the past, a major obstacle to the exchange of information between segments was the fear that one side would use the information as a weapon. It was thought that keeping information could provide a competitive advantage.

Now we realize that information is only valuable if aggregated and shared to make better decisions. Increased profitability is not created through adversarial transactions, but through cooperation between two partners with similar goals.

AngusLink(SM) The program focuses on providing customers with the objective measures to make better selection decisions and providing verifications to capture more value for their cattle. In the long run, its greatest benefit is helping build relationships between buyers and sellers. It helps create an exchange of information where buyers and sellers can improve the buying and selling outcomes.

There are three main types of fertilizer, nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. Depending on the crop and soil, a farmer may need one or all three types. Nitrogen fertilizers like Anhydrous Ammonia are made by mixing nitrogen in the air with the hydrogen from natural gas at high temperatures. Sixty percent of the natural gas is used as the ingredient while 40% is used as the energy source. Phosphorus and potash fertilizers are made from mostly imported mined rock, which then go through a chemical process to create several different compounds.

The U.S .only makes up for 10% of global fertilizer use, despite producing 35% of its corn and sovbeans. Even with our efficiency we are a major importer of fertilizer therefore our market price is largely driven by global supply and demand. This means both international and domestic issues have a significant impact on our fertilizer prices - all suffer to some extent from supply disruption policies like paying more for people to stay at home than work. This is also complicated by weather disruptions that put a dent in U.S. production of nitrogen.

Sixty percent of total U.S. ammonia production capacity is in Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Texas because of their large reserves of natural gas. Natu-

izer exports - a common trick they use to artificially create shortages and raise prices. This means fertilizer producers outside of Europe and China are seeing significantly higher demand, pushing prices upward. The U.S. has countervailing duties on phosphate from Russia and Morocco and several other major global producers are also limiting exports which exacerbate the supply shortage globally.

At the same time, just

like they did with medical

supplies during the worst

days of the COVID pan-

demic, China has signifi-

cantly curtailed its fertil-

pollution.

As global prices rise around the world, the costs of U.S. imports continue to climb. The price of goods produced in the U.S. also increases as local demand competes with foreign demand to keep products in the U.S. – a vicious cycle of a dog chasing its tail, a tail that's on fire as those on the left continue to borrow and print money like a drunken sailors.

Make no mistake, President Biden's disastrous policies are equally to blame for the cost of fertilizer in the U.S. His energy policy curtails the production and transport of natural gas and has impacted every facet of production. Moving away from energv independence affects domestic transportation costs. Vaccine mandates limit the labor supply. The extra unemployment dollars kept people at home rather than at work. Extra regulation continues to constrain business. At every step, the president has made a bad situation worse. In a time of crisis you don't create roadblocks, you get out of the way and let business do what they do best.

Inflation means so much more than just increased fertilizer costs for

USDA agrees to post slaughter animal records online

USDA has recently agreed to publicly disclose on its website records related to the treatment of animals in U.S. slaughter plants to settle a lawsuit filed by the Animal Welfare Institute and Farm Sanctuary.

Marian Payson, a federal magistrate judge for the U.S. District Court for the Western District of New York, approved the settlement Jan. 3. The 2018 complaint alleged that USDA failed to proactively disclose records relating to the enforcement of two laws - the Humane Methods of Slaughter Act and the Poultry Products Inspection Act — as required by the Freedom of Information Act. The groups believe such records expose inhumane treatment of animals at slaughter plants across the country. The settlement comes after the court denied USDA's motion to dismiss the case in 2019.

Hay market prices for the week ending January 8 remained steady for alfalfa and grass hay; movement remains slow. Although New Year's Day saw the first snow of 2022, it didn't drop enough to help drought conditions across the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for the week of January 4th, southern Kansas saw some deterioration near Oklahoma, where the last 60 days brought very little precipitation. But given it is the coldest and climatologically driest time of year there, deterioration was limited to a patch in the southernmost reaches of Kansas where the weather has been somewhat warmer. Abnormally dry conditions (D0) increased to 22.5% moderate drought (D1) increased to 38% severe drought (D2) decreased to 11.5% and extreme drought (D3) increased to 2.5%. Relief efforts for the recent wildfires remain under way and information to help can be found at the Kansas Department of Agriculture website, www.agriculture.ks.gov.

Kidding season is right around the corner, or for some producers it may have already begun. If kidding has not already started for you, now is a good time to go through your supplies to make sure you have everything you may need. There are a few basic supplies that should be kept on hand no matter the herd size or the type of goats being raised. These supplies are: towels, bulb syringe, exam gloves, OB lube, iodine, colostrum, bottles and nipples for bottle feeding, esophageal feeding tube and 60cc syringe, heat lamps, scale, and record sheets.


There is always the possibility that a doe will need assistance delivering her kids. It is important to have exam gloves and lubricant on hand in case you need to assist a doe. A kid puller or leg snare can also be helpful when pulling kids. When assisting a doe during kidding it is handy to have towels nearby for cleaning off the kid's face and to dry kids off if needed. Another handy tool to have is a bulb syringe, these work great for clearing the kid's airways of any birthing fluid they may have inhaled. One of the most important supplies to have on hand is seven percent iodine. It is important to dip the umbilical cord of the kid in iodine right after birth to help prevent infection. Frozen colostrum or colostrum replacer is very important to have in case a doe does not have enough colostrum to feed her kids or there is a weak or orphaned kid that needs to be bottle fed. Colostrum is the first milk does produce; it is nutrient-rich, and most importantly, contains maternal antibodies (immunoglobulins). When

born kids do not have any antibodies to protect them from disease, but the antibodies kids absorb from colostrum help develop their immune system and protect them against disease. If kids do not get colostrum their chance of survival is very low. It is very important to make sure kids receive colostrum right after they are born, kids can only absorb the antibodies in colostrum within the first 24-36 hours after they are born and they absorb them best within the first few hours after birth.

If using colostrum replacer, make sure to follow the mixing and storing instructions on the package. It is important to remember that colostrum should not be warmed up in the microwave, because the high temperature will kill the antibodies in the colostrum. Bottles and nipples should be kept on hand for kids that need to be bottle-fed, as well as an esophageal feeding tube and 60cc syringe for kids

that are too weak to nurse and need to be tube-fed. Heating pads, heat lamps, and kid coats are also good to have on hand to help keep kids warm during extremely cold days or for kids that need to be warmed up.

Other supplies to have on hand are a record sheet and scale to weigh kids. While kidding is a busy time and it can be easy to overlook record keeping, just keeping simple records of birth weights, number of kids born to each doe, and if the doe

Governor sends letter urging USDA secretary for additional aid for Kansas farmers and ranchers

Governor Laura Kelly announced her efforts to gain additional relief from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for Kansas farmers and ranchers affected by last month's wildfires, including the 120,000-plus acre "Four County Fire" in Russell, Ellis, Osborne, and Rooks counties.

In her letter, Kelly thanked Secretary Tom Vilsack for the aid that is currently being provided through programs administered by the USDA's Farm Services Agency and its Natural Resources Conservation Service. Also, Kelly shared her concern with the benefits and eligibility criteria of programs that would help with the relief efforts.

"We must continue to look for ways to assist farmers and ranchers recover what was lost so they can put this catastrophe behind them and get back on their feet," Kelly said. "Eligibility and flexibility in these programs would go a long way for the Kansans who lost their grasslands, feed, livestock, and in some cases, their entire homes."

The Governor emphasized the need for Vilsack and the USDA to revisit the payment rate of the Livestock Indemnity Program, to better mirror the value and cost to replace cattle killed in the fires. She also encouraged the Secretary to look at the Emergency Conservation Program and increase the rate of the cost share agreement to adequately reflect the cost to replace fencing. The Governor suggested the Secretary empower the regional and local representatives. who have direct knowledge of the cost and availability of fencing materials, to approve modifications for the program.

said KARL president Jill Zimmerman.

"Graduates of the program become part of a network and have gone on to serve in legislative bodies, farm and commodity organizations, agribusiness, community entities and their local communities, which is vital for the future of Kansas. Participants engage in a series of seminars throughout the state, domestic and international study tours, Washington, D.C., Gettysburg (Pennsylvania)."

Zimmerman said KARL invests more than 400 hours of intensive training per person in seminars, speakers and domestic and international study tours over two years.

KARL got its start in 1989 when a group of individuals representing various segments of Kansas agriculture met to discuss the need and potential for an extensive educational program designed to build a leadership base for the

state's agriculture and related industries. The first class of 30 participants began leadership development training in 1991. Since then, more than 440 participants have completed the program.

From the field of applicants, a list of finalists will be interviewed by a selection committee in May and the class roster will be announced in June. Zimmerman said upon completing the program, class members will demonstrate leadership potential and willingness to serve in decision-making roles.

Masters of Beef Advocacy Program reaches 20,000 grads

Twenty thousand members of the beef community have graduated from NCBA's Masters of Beef Advocacy (MBA) program.

Created in 2009 and funded by the Beef Checkoff, the MBA program is a free, self-guided online course that provides producers, students, supply chain members and consumers with the tools and resources needed to become strong advocates for the beef community. In 2021, the program launched updated training modules that split the course into five online lessons:

The Beef Community: Context of raising beef from pasture to plate with a focus on the people involved throughout the beef life cycle.

Raising Cattle on Grass: An introduction to the first step in the beef lifecycle and the benefits of raising cattle on grass pasture.

Life in the Feedyard: The role of feedyards, including animal care, nutrition and environmental stewardship. From Cattle to Beef: A look at the slaughter process

and the humane handling and safety measures in place beef processing facilities.

Beef. It's What's For Dinner.: A primer on choosing and cooking the right cuts of beef and the important role of beef in a healthful diet.

After completing the course, MBA graduates will receive monthly newsletters and access to a variety of resources and additional lessons of beef's nutrition, sustainability and animal welfare.

The questions, "Will easy calves grow into cows that have more calving difficulty?" and "Will calves from easy cows have higher mortality?" prompted the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center (USMARC) research on calving ease cows. Dr. Gary Bennett, from USMARC, presented their findings at the Beef Improvement Federation Symposium in Des Moines. Iowa, June 23.

Checkoff spotlights beef nutrition at pediatric offices

Recent research funded by the Beef Checkoff put a spotlight on health professionals' continuing need for in-office educational brochures and handouts, particularly among physicians. With the new edition of the 2020 Dietary Guidelines for Americans (DGA) emphasizing the importance of making every bite count in the early years, it was the perfect time for the Kansas Beef Council (KBC) to share information with physicians and child birth educators across Kansas and Kansas City about beef's role in early child nutrition and inspire the inclusion of beef as a first food. The Checkoff-developed materials specific for this audience included a newsletter and consumer booklet with an in-office display.

These items were delivered to more than 2,300 pediatric health professional offices across the country on behalf of the Beef Checkoff. KBC assisted in the outreach by providing resources to offices in Kansas and the Kansas City metro. A follow-up survey found that 77% of respondents are more likely to recommend beef as one of an infant's first foods after receiving these materials.

This effort is part of a broader effort by KBC to offer health professionals science-based resources showing how beef can be part of a healthy, balanced diet.

What the study found. however, was that selection on calving ease may reduce duration of labor and result in a more vigorous calf regardless of birth weight.

"Genetically smaller calves might not be at a disadvantage, unlike phenotypically smaller calves," Bennett says.


Selection on calving ease only decreased gestation length by about two days in the USMARC study. Bennett explains an expected progeny difference (EPD) for calving

ease using gestation length could decrease gestation below optimal viability. but was not evident during this study.

Additionally, contrary to prior beliefs, the US-MARC researchers did not find that calving difficulty reduced rebreeding of heifers in this study.

The study found that cows from the calving ease selection line had significantly smaller mature weights and heights and may have smaller maintenance costs on a per cow basis. Calving ease heifers had better calf survival

Would you like to buy a four-door truck for \$180? How about a semi truck for \$225? Maybe a stock trailer for \$150? Those prices can't be real, so you must know that I'm just toying with you.

Today we'll meet an innovative Kansas company that has diversified its product line to include miniature-sized trucks and farm equipment - toys that are being shipped coast to coast and beyond.

Larry and Teresa Goodwin are owners of Goodwin Industries in Burns. One of the company's product lines is Goodwin Miniatures.

Larry grew up near Burns. He worked with his father. Ron Goodwin, who we previously profiled years ago. Ron produced a line of smokers for cooking meat.

"I learned the skill of welding from my dad," Larry said. While in high school, he attended tech school in Emporia. Larry

opened his own welding shop in Burns and did the manufacturing of the smokers that his father was selling.

In 2006, Ron retired and sold the smoker line. Larry's business is now known as Goodwin Industries.

Goodwin Industries produces several products in addition to doing custom metal work. They now build another model of the family smoker. The company makes a corn header sweep to go on a combine to help with corn harvest. "We do custom work for individuals and other companies," Larry said.

Larry and his wife have two sons and two daughters. Their boys. Dustin and Zac, are working in the business.

In 2012. Zac was in col-

miniatures These are 1/16 scale handcrafted steel replicas of semi trucks, pickup trucks, trailers, and cattle working equipment. These are not cheap made in China products. They are handbuilt in the shop and powder coated to last.

These miniature models include the types of products one might find on a working Kansas farm. In addition to the trucks, there is a grain bin, a flat bed trailer, a ground load trailer, a gooseneck trailer, a stock trailer, a hay trailer, a mixer bed, a high loader, a cube box and a bale loader.

For the livestock operator, there are livestock panels, feed bunk, water tank, gate frame, alley, loading chute, squeeze chute, four-way connector and a bale feeder. Items are sold individually or in sets. The panels actually connect so they can be arranged in countless ways.

These are considered generational toys. They are built to last and can literally be handed down from generation to generation.

"A customer told us they were at a wedding in Montana and the kids there were playing with our toys from the previous three generations," Larry said. "They are built to last.'

In fact, he has his own built-in testing crew. "I have three grandboys so we let them play with the toys first," Larry said. "They are my R&D department - that's wreck and destroy," he said with a smile

Goodwin Miniatures have been shipped across the U.S. including Alaska, from coast to coast and as far away as Alberta, Canada. "It's nice to do something that brings people joy," Larry said.

Their high demand period is from September through December when Larry and his wife take these products to farm and craft shows before the holidays. "We get a really nice response from the people who get them," Larry said.

It's great to find this business in a rural community such as Burns, population 228 people. Now, that's rural.


To register, reserve hotel rooms and sign up for email updates, visit SICNA.net. Early registration rates apply through Feb. 28, and a registration category is available for student attendees.


