Kansas Hay Market Report

For the week ending April 23rd, compared to the last report, overall alfalfa hay and grass hay were mostly steady while movement remains slow to moderate. With high winds, minimal precipitation, and freezing overnight temperatures, producers are concerned about alfalfa recovering in time for first cutting. Producers and buyers are still hesitant to commit to new crop prices due to the ongoing drought and increased input costs. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for April 19, abnormally dry conditions (D0) increased to near 7%, moderate drought (D1) decreased to 14%, severe drought (D2) remained near 35.5%, extreme drought (D3) increased to 15%, and exceptional drought (D4) remained at 2%. Fertility challenges can also be opportunities

Angus Beef Bulletin When it comes to reproduction, so many factors can be challenges, but also opportunities if a person views them through the right lens. As we know, nutrition can play a major role in the success of a breeding season, and that right level of nutrition can be obtained multiple ways. Depending on your calving season(s), you will be able to use Mother Nature's bounties in different ways.

Those who fall-calving cows can rely on good summer forage to replenish their cow herd's body condition score (BCS). The most taxing time of year for those when they need a stockman's assistance to

get through — is the winter lactation period. Cows calving in early spring require the most assistance during early lactation, before most forage growth has occurred, and tend to be fairly self-sustaining during the heavy lactation period. The third opportunity that does not get used by as many producers is late spring.

Most tend to steer clear of this, likely due to tradition and the fact the calf crop doesn't fit into traditional marketing scenarios, but this can be a great way to best utilize the natural forage growing season. The calves produced this time of year can be merchandized very successfully, fitting into low-supply times of the year for feeder-calf mar-

Additionally, this nontraditional calving season requires basically no calving facilities and provides an opportunity to create a calving environment that has a naturally reduced bacterial and viral population.

When quality forage is not readily available, another sometimes overlooked tool to help with cows' nutrition is the use of grains to supplement calorie intake. Although it seems human nature to avoid the use of grains in cow-calf production systems, there are many grains that can be fed to help offset the lack of energy in short pastures or

low-quality hay. Admittedly, the up-front cost of grain is not a financial burden cow-calf producers want to take on, but in certain circumstances it. is the most viable option. When feeding grains, it is important to consider the energy density compared to hay — especially when purchasing hay - and the fact that the percentage of waste is considerably less compared to feeding hay.

It is impossible to argue with the notion BCS is an important piece of the fertility equation. Perhaps the most important thing to remember is that the best time to evaluate your cow herd is at weaning. It is best to make nutritional adjustments then for the simple fact that it is easiest to add body condition to a dry cow.

Herd health is of the utmost importance when it comes to fertility on a set of cows. This is an area where there is no room for error as decisions made one day will affect your calf crop several months to more than a year later. This area of discussion is an extremely in-depth area that has had an unmeasurable amount of research hours and dollars spent developing vaccines, protocols and treatments for occurring issues.

Working with your veterinarian to establish an annual vaccination and mineral protocol for your herd will eliminate many bumps in your herd's reproductive road. Having an open line of communication with your veterinarian throughout the year will help them make any adjustments they feel necessary and will continually fine-tune the needs of your program.

Finally, genetics certainly play a role in a successful breeding season. Even though most reproductive traits are lowly heritable, producers can still make genetic prog-

Traits like heifer pregnancy (the probability of a sire's daughters to get pregnant as virgin heifers) can be useful to improve breeding outcomes over time. Economic selection indexes, or profit indexes, have been designed to target profitability of commercial cow-calf operations. Maternal weaned calf value (\$M) targets the commercial breeding objective, which includes raising replacement females - replacing 20% of the herd each year and selling the rest of the males and cull females as feeder calves. Traits from heifer pregnancy to mature cow size are included in this profit function. These types of tools are useful to target bulls that will make productive females to keep throughout the years.







varieties of annual flowers with outstanding performance, along with tips for growing annual flowers more successfully this summer. The program is on Wednesday, May 4 beginning at noon.

Flowers come from a multi-branched stem. Like mums that are pruned until mid-July, annuals can be pruned to get more branches. I prune my flowers while they are in the tray. It is faster that way. Most people like to see their flowers in the bed before they remove all the blooms. It is worth the added wait.


Spacing is to ensure coverage of foliage over the soil prior to high soil temperatures. To have no exposed soil by the first part of June is the goal. High soil temperatures really reduce the vigor of the annual. Annual flower canopy that shades the soil will aid in gorgeous flowers.

Water and nitrogen fertilizer is important for the early season rapid growth. Water-soluble fertilizer can be added each week during the irrigation operation. I use a granular slow-release nitrogen fertilizer to raise my annuals. A little nitrogen fertilizer added throughout the growing season to annual flowers is the key.

Weeds can be pulled or an herbicide can be used. Wait three days after planting before applying an herbicide to keep weed seeds from getting estab-

We have no choice but to want it bad, because if we don't, nobody else does. We are not just raising crops and livestock, we are one of the last pieces of decency left in the world. Economists' report on cash cattle mandate

A working group of ag economists assessed the Cattle Price Discovery and Transparency Act of 2022 ahead of a hearing on April 26. In their assessment, the legislation introduced by a bipartisan group of senators did not fare well.

The new proposed bill requires USDA to establish five to seven regions covering the continental United States, designates a set of approved pricing mechanisms for covered packers that contribute to price discovery and transparency, requires USDA to set minimum levels of purchases through approved pricing mechanisms, mandates that each regional mandatory minimum be not less than the average of that regions negotiated trade, requires USDA to conduct an initial review of mandatory minimums after two years and allows USDA to review and modify regional minimums after a public notice and comment

In the report, the economists state that the legislation is attempting to solve a problem that does not exist, and the legislation offers zero benefits for fed cattle markets and would impose several millions of dollars of additional cost, added risk and lost value resulting in lower feeder cattle prices and higher consumer beef prices. They state that thinning negotiated trade is a concern and that there is a need for continued monitoring and research to understand how to mitigate a potential lack of adequate price discovery. They agree that the industry should be working to identify alternative mechanisms to mitigate or compensate producers to overcome the disincentives to participate in price discovery.



EPA issues emergency fuel waiver for E15 sales Last Friday the U.S. American agriculture and imize and prevent disrup-

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued an emergency fuel waiver to allow E15 gasoline - gasoline that uses a 15 percent ethanol blend - to be sold during the summer driving season. This action will increase fuel supply and provide consumers more choices at the pump. The waiver is a critical step to implement President Biden's announcement that he is taking action to protect Americans from supply crises by reducing our reliance on fossil fuels, building real U.S. energy independence, supporting

manufacturing, and accelerating the transition to clean energy

"President Biden and this administration are committed to protecting American consumers from the impacts of Russia's unprovoked attack against Ukraine," said EPA administrator Michael S. Regan. "Putin's war has had a profound impact on global and domestic energy markets. In consultation with Secretary Granholm, I have concluded that it is necessary to take action to allow E15 sales during the summer driving season in order to mintion of summertime fuel supply to consumers."

The Clean Air Act allows the EPA administrator, in consultation with DOE, to temporarily waive certain fuel requirements to address shortages. As a result of the war in Ukraine, Regan determined that extreme and unusual fuel supply circumstances exist and has granted a temporary waiver to help ensure that an adequate supply of gasoline is available. As required by law, EPA and DOE evaluated the situation and determined that granting the waiver was in

the public interest.

Currently, in roughly two-thirds of the country, E15 cannot be sold from terminals starting on May 1 and at retail stations starting on June 1. EPA is providing relief by extending the 1-psi Reid Vapor Pressure (RVP) waiver that currently applies to E10 gasoline to E15, which will enable E15 sales throughout the summer driving season in these areas, if necessary. This action only extends the 1-psi waiver to E15 in parts of the country where it already exists for E10. E15 can already be sold year-round in parts of the country that have a Reformulated Gasoline (RFG) program.

Because the RVP of E10 and E15 gasoline used by consumers will be the same (both will be 1 psi higher than otherwise required by EPA or state regulations) EPA does not expect any impact on air quality from this limited action. EPA's research has shown no significant impact on evaporative emissions when the 1-psi waiver is extended to E15. With no significant impacts on emissions from cars and trucks, we expect consumers can continue to use E15 without concern that its use in the summer will impact air quality.

EPA's emergency fuel waiver went into effect on May 1 when terminal operators would otherwise no longer be able to sell E15 in the affected regions of the country and will last for the statutory maximum of 20 days. EPA will continue to monitor the supply with industry and federal partners, and the Agency expects to issue new waivers effectively extending the emergency fuel waiver until such time as the extreme and unusual fuel supply circumstances due to the war in Ukraine are no longer present.

Rising retail prices will

U.S. consumer demand for retail meat remains exceptionally strong despite higher prices stemming from increased production costs and supply chain limitations. However, once the full effects of producer price inflation finally hit retail meat cases, consumer demand for meat will be tested again, according to a new report from Co-Bank's Knowledge Exchange.

"Retail meat prices will remain elevated throughout 2022," said Brian Earnest, lead animal protein economist with CoBank. "The sharply higher costs for feed, energy and labor have yet to fully impact wholesale and retail meat prices, but that will soon change. And as consumers notice their dollar is not going as far as it used to, they may trade down at the meat case, with chicken being the primary beneficiary."

With combined cutout values of beef, pork and chicken climbing 22% year-over-year for the first quarter of 2022, consumers are all but certain to see higher prices in the meat case.

Beef consumption has not yet declined in the face of higher prices. But as overall inflation takes a bite of consumers' purchasing power, we may finally see a significant change in their willingness to pay for red meat, added Earnest If that turns out to be the case the U.S.

increasingly test consumers' appetite for meat modest growth and strong margins.

Shifting consumer purchasing patterns and market uncertainties stemming from the pandemic have been the primary drivers of higher and more volatile meat prices. But supply challenges have also played a role. The temporary closure of beef and pork plants in 2020 led to backups in fed cattle supplies that still linger today.

The nation's beef cattle inventory remains in decline, due in part to the ongoing drought conditions in the western U.S. and modest feeder calf prices. The combined cow and replacement heifer inventory has dropped by 12% since 2017. Likewise, the nation's sow herd is contracting and is down nearly 6% over the past three years, primarily due to losses sustained in 2018-19. USDA is forecasting a 2% decline in U.S. beef and pork production in 2022.

Price volatility across the animal protein sector has become a daily headache for procurement teams to manage. While prices started 2022 in post-holiday doldrums, wholesale values were still elevated compared with pre-pandemic levels. Volatility in wholesale markets remains an obstacle for promotional planning.

Increased volatility in spot markets and supply instability handcuffed retail marketing of proteins during the 2020 grilling season. Featuring activity rebounded substantially in 2021 as grocers sought to hold onto the sales they gained during the pandemic. For retailers in 2022, a flight to safety from higher meat prices may be to feature value items like ground beef, hot dogs and sausage items.

As grilling season enters full swing, it is likely that retail meat departments' focus will shift to profit margin over volume sales this year, meaning we will see increased creativity in the meat case. Rather than vying for consumer dollars through aggressive price points, "no price" features will be an attractive solution.

broiler industry may yet again be well positioned for African Swine Fever virus vaccine passes tests required for regulatory approval

Scientists with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Research Service (ARS) have announced that a vaccine candidate for African Swine Fever (ASF) passed an important safety test required for regulatory approval, moving the vaccine one step closer to commercial availability.

The test is an important milestone as part of a series of safety studies. These new results show that USDA's vaccine candidate does not revert to its normal virulence, after being injected into swine. This "reversion to virulence" test is required to ensure that the vaccine's weakened form of the ASF virus does not revert to its original state.

"This is a critical milestone for the ASF vaccine candidate. These safety studies bring this vaccine able to transmit from pigs

one step closer to being available on the market." said senior ARS scientist Manuel Borca.

These safety studies are necessary to gain approval for use in Vietnam and eventually in other countries around the world. Future commercial use, however, will depend on approval from the department of animal health within each requesting country.

Although the virus is causing profound economic losses to the swine industry, there have not been any outbreaks in the United States. The highly contagious ASF virus spread from Africa to the Republic of Georgia in 2007, and has since swept through Central Europe and Asia before reaching the Dominican Republic in 2021. The virus is unto humans.

"It is very hard to predict how selective pressure can cause a live attenuated vaccine to return to virulence," said senior ARS scientist Douglas Gladue. "In the case of this particular vaccine candidate, ASFV-G-DI177L, we deleted a gene, which makes it difficult for the virus to simply add the gene back. So, we expected reversion to its original form to be unlikely, but the test still has to be performed."

An attenuated vaccine strain retains much of its genetic makeup and could genetically change when

exposed to various external circumstances. All live attenuated vaccines are weakened versions of a virus and can be used as a vaccine because the live vaccine virus will not cause illness and can still provide immunity.

This research is highlighted in a recent issue of Viruses. The vaccine candidate was recently selected by NAVETCO for commercial development in Vietnam. NAVETCO has partnered with ARS on ASF vaccine research and development since 2020. Further development

Tiffany testifies at hearings on Capitol Hill

The U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry held a hearing April 26 to specifically discuss the Cattle Price Discovery and Transparency Act (S.4030) and additional oversight through the Office of the Special Investigator (S.3870). KLA president-elect and NCBA member Shawn Tiffany, a cattle feeder from Herington, testified in opposition to a government mandate as it potentially could result in fewer marketing opportunities and less incentive for producers to invest in genetics and innovative production techniques that lead to higher-quality beef. Both KLA and NCBA member-driven policy oppose market mandates.

"Every producer wants fair market value for the animals we raise and produce and many of us achieve that true value through value-based alternative marketing arrangements. Accordingly, I do not support a government mandate, of any kind," Tiffany said during his testimony. "Regardless of how well-intentioned the concept of helping producers obtain fair market value for their animals, the end result will be fewer marketing options for U.S. producers."

The U.S. House Agriculture Committee also held a hearing this week on issues surrounding cattle markets. During his testimony, NCBA president and Minnesota


