Compared to the last report, the hav market bumped up a little in all regions in response to the short supply and deteriorating drought conditions. Producers in many parts of the state saw some rain this past week but, once again, for most it wasn't enough to move the needle on the drought. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for September 13th, abnormally dry conditions (D0) decreased to 21%, moderate drought (D1) decreased to 11%, severe drought (D2) increased to 21%, extreme drought (D3) remined near near 31%, and exceptional drought (D4) increased to 12%.

Kansas Farmers Union members participate in NFU's D.C. Legislative Fly-In

Over 250 Farmers est of our members that Union members from across the country arrived in Washington, D.C. during the week of September 12 to advocate for family farmers. Over the course of a few days, Farmers Union members attended hundreds of Congressional meetings, met with over a dozen federal agencies, and directly participated in discussions with Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, Federal Trade Commission chair Lina Khan, Assistant Attorney General Jonathan Kanter, and Commodity Futures Trading Commission chair Rostin Behnam, among other leaders.

"This has been an incredibly productive and successful fly-in for Farmers Union. It's a testament to the passion and interthey're willing to take time away from the farm and come to Washington and build bipartisan support for Fairness for Farmers and their farm bill priorities," said NFU president Rob Larew.

Kansas Farmers Union (KFU) members participating in the legislative fly-in included KFU state president Donn Teske, Wheaton; Lavern Potuzak, Agenda; Jeff Kindel, Concordia; Rob Fisher, Ozawkie: Donna Pearson McClish and Keisha and Randy Couts (Wichita); and KFU executive director Nick Levendofsky, Courtland.

Attendees met with legislators or staff from each of Kansas' Congressional delegation and shared priorities on the 2023 Farm Bill, climate change, conporate consolidation in agriculture, and local and regional food systems.



Understanding body condition scores

As I've entered my mid-forties, there are signs of my changing body condition (fatter, less hair, etc...) but that's not where this article is going. Those who attended the Tailgate Talk got to hear me ramble on about cow body condition scoring assessment and the opportunities to add body condition in fall. Since that's fresh on my mind, let's dive in a bit to BCS.

The Body Condition Score (BCS) system used for beef cows range from 1 to 9, with a score of 1 reflecting an emaciated cow and a score of 9 an obese cow. The BCS system allows producers to visually assess their cow herd using numbers to objectively describes the amount of condition or fat reserve of an animal. Cow body condition score is closely related to reproductive efficiency and is a more reliable indicator of nutritional status of a cow than is body weight. Concepts are similar in other species; with dairy cattle, goats, sheep and swine using five-point scales.

Body condition is important because there is a BCS at calving and the first 90 days after calving to reproductive success. In addition, cow body condition influences the calf's ability to develop a strong immune system. Don't forget the bulls! BCS can affect fertility in the male side of the equation too. BCS is a snapshot of cow herd management, similar to a financial balance sheet, and should be assessed at specific production points throughout the year.

You can evaluate body condition anytime you are around cattle, but it is recommended 60 to 90 days before calving, at calving, and weaning. This can simply be done with a tally of the number of cows that fall into each BCS category while riding, walking, or driving through the cattle or chute side as processing. You can record this on about anything, but the

K-State Body Condition Record Book (MF3277) is a great tool for recording

Knowing BCS is one thing, but how and when is it beneficial to work to change scores? Obese cows can be an issue, but generally this discussion centers on getting flesh on thin or borderline cows (BCS 3 or 4) by moving them to more optimal scores of 5 or 6. One body condition score is roughly seventy-five pounds, so adding that much condition doesn't happen overnight. The more time you have, less energy demands the animal has, the fewer scores you have to jump and the higher quality of feed available; all have direct impact on changing body condition score.

Fall is an excellent time to add condition in spring calving herds. Cows are second trimester gestation, have weaned a calf and are going through the period of lowest maintenance energy requirement. This is also 90-120 days away from common calving windows, which gives the additional time factor. Moderate quality feedstuffs can be used to add condition, with cool season grasses having their secondary production window (if it rains!) and crop residues are available, some with high nutritional value cover crops as we discussed at Tailgate Talk. This can be accomplished on low quality forages with protein supplementation as well.

K-State's Guide to Body Condition Scoring Beef Cows and Bulls (MF3274) highlights work from Spitzer et al on first calf heifer rebreeding rates, looking at BCS. The study shows that heifers going into breeding who were at score 4, had a 43% pregnancy rate at Day 40 of the breeding season. Comparatively, heifers at score 6 showed a 90% pregnancy rate, a substantial difference. This guide gives good additional information on Beef Body Condition Scoring. Hopefully Body Condition Scoring is, or will be, a part of your herd management plan.

"PCCA has been on a journey for the past three years to transform the company into a marketing cooperative of the future,' Brinkley said. "We started in 2019 by completely overhauling our risk management policies. We followed up that work with a top-to-bottom review of PCCA's mission, vision, and strategies. I'm pleased to report rapid progress on several initiatives that were developed through that work. While it takes time to implement changes at a large organization like PCCA, our membership has been supportive of introducing new and better products and services for our grower-owners, customers, and other stakeholders.'

In other business, directors for the following PCCA districts were re-elected by the membership: Clint Abernathy, District 1; Kody Carson, District 2; Dean Vardeman, District 6; and Dahlen Hancock, District 7.

Founded in 1953, PCCA is a Lubbock-based marketing cooperative owned by farmers in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, and New Mexico dedicated to supplying sustainably grown, high-quality cotton fiber around the world. In addition to cotton marketing, PCCA also owns cotton warehouse facilities in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas and develops and offers software programs and networks to local co-op gins that help add value to their grower-owners' cotton.

National Farm Safety and Health Week kicked off September 19

Agriculture is considered one of the most dangerous occupations in the nation, but safety measures can lower producers' risk of having a serious accident, said a Kansas State University official on farm safety.

Tawnie Larson, the state's coordinator of the Rollover Protection Structure (ROPS) program at K-State, said several webinars are on tap during the upcoming National Farm Safety and Health Week to serve as reminders on roadway safety; ATV and UTV safety; mental health and suicide prevention: grain bin and confined spaces safety; and more.

The online webinars are available for free from the AgriSafe Network. National Farm Safety and Health Week kicks off on Sept. 19.

"Kansas ag producers and their business partners are not only an important part of our economy in Kansas, but an integral part of our rural communities," Larson said. "Losing a producer to an accident can affect much more than the operation of the farm; it can take a vital person from a community."

Larson said agriculture safety focuses on the total health of agricultural workers, including healthy habits like sleep, diet, mental health and safety for the entire family around the farm. She notes it includes safety around equipment (including tractors and ATVs) and on roads; as well as hearing, vision and skin protection and working in the elements - both when it is hot and cold outside.

"Mental health is also important," Larson said. "Farmers have high levels of stress, which makes the rural suicide rate high. Mental clarity is an important aspect of safety too. It is important that producers and ag workers remain in the moment when doing all tasks."

Larson said a routine chore can become dangerous, "if we let our minds wander and our regard for safety is forgotten.'

She noted that many programs also are available for women, who are taking a larger role in agriculture. Programs include maintaining strong bones, avoiding secondary injury, and working smarter.

nancy, especially environmental contaminants, is an important practice for women to consider. The National Children's Center for Rural and Agricultural Health and Safety recommends a 'Parent First. It is important to plan to keep voung children out of the worksite and off equipment by creating areas for safe play and planning for childcare."

Larson said the Agri-Safe Network offers programming related to many aspects of health for those working in agriculture, including a podcast titled, Total Farmer Health.







Cattlemen's Beef Board approves FY 2023

The Cattlemen's Beef Board (CBB) will invest approximately \$38.5 million into programs of beef promotion, research, consumer information, industry information, foreign marketing and producer communications during fiscal 2023, subject to USDA approval.

In action at the end of its Sept. 7 and 8 meeting in Denver the Beef Promotion Operating Committee (BPOC) approved Checkoff funding for a total of 13 "Authorization Requests" - or grant proposals - for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 2022. The committee, which includes ten producers from the Cattlemen's Beef Board and 10 producers from the Federation of State Beef Councils, also recommended full Cattlemen's Beef Board approval of a budget amendment to reflect the split of funding between budget categories affected by their decisions.

Nine contractors and three subcontractors brought 14 Authorization Requests worth \$48 million to the BPOC, nearly \$9.5 million more than the funds available from the CBB budget.

"Producers are behind all the decisions that the BPOC makes during these meetings each September," said CBB and BPOC Chair Norman Voyles, Jr. "We carefully consider every Authorization Request to determine how to use Checkoff dollars to drive beef demand and provide producers with the best possible return on their Checkoff investments.'



Kansas Lange, Two Little Goats

Two little goats. That doesn't sound like a lot, but perhaps it could be the beginning of an entrepreneurial career.

Today we'll meet a young rural-preneur who is using her two little goats to learn the principles of entrepreneurship for the future.

Kansas Lange is a teenager who won her county's Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge in spring 2022. Kansas and her family live in Garfield, in Pawnee County.

Her father is Charles Lange, a K-State grad and public health veterinarian in Dodge City. While inspecting the packing plant in Dodge, Dr. Lang met one of the workers, Sabrina, who is originally from New Mexico. They married, moved to Garfield, and now have two daughters and a son.

Kansas is the younger daughter. "My grandfather

Kansas became very active in 4-H. "I'm homeschooled, so this is my creative outlet and my opportunity to meet people in the community," Kansas

In addition to showing multiple species of livestock, she enrolled in such projects as shooting sports, woodworking, clothing and textiles, and foods and nutrition.

Kyle Grant is the K-State Research and Extension 4-H agent in Pawnee County. "Kansas has excelled in our Pawnee County shooting sports program," Grant said. "She also excels at livestock judging, meats judging and skillathon, where she earned the opportunity to go to the national contest in Louisville, Kentucky. She is a good role model for Pawnee County 4-H'ers."

Kansas learned about the Pawnee County Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge, sponsored by Net-Work Kansas. YEC is a sequence of community-based entrepreneurship competitions for students in grades 6-12, culminating in a state championship. Students present their conceptual or business ideas to judges and compete against others in their age division locally. The top contestants advance to the state finals, held in April at K-State in partnership with the College of Business' Center for Entrepreneurship and the Kansas Masons.

Erik Pedersen is president and COO of NetWork Kansas. "When you walk into one of these events at a middle school or high school, you see a student standing there with a tabletop display that they've created," he said. "They're dressed up and talking to a group of adult judges; they're shaking hands, they're making eye contact, they're answering questions about their project or business idea. The

Grass & Grain, September 27, 2022 life skills that they're gaining will put them miles ahead of their peers." Kansas thought about

what project she might enter in this competition. As a teenager, she was experiencing acne on her skin and looking for better skin treatments. "I found a lot of articles that said that goat milk soap could help," she said. No big city stores carried such products nearby, but she could raise dairy goats and

make soap of her own. Kansas got two Nigerian Dwarf dairy goats that she milked twice daily, did the research and developed a process for producing scented goat milk soap. It worked so well that she wanted to share the products with others and started selling the product locally. She named her business Two Little Goats.

"My mom has a degree in business, so she could help with the business side, and my dad helped with the science and biology," Kansas said.

She entered her project in the Pawnee County Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge. In 2022, she took first place and advanced to state. At the Kansas Department of Ag-

More than 800 exhibitors to participate at KJLS

The Kansas Junior Livestock Show (KJLS) will host 826 youth for the 90th annual event. Exhibitors have entered 1,827 head of livestock, which includes 152 market steers, 380 breeding heifers, 229 market hogs, 152 breeding gilts, 310 market lambs, 213 breeding ewes, 210 market goats and 181 commercial doe kids. The statewide event will be held September 30-October 2 at the Kansas State Fairgrounds in Hutchin-

KJLS will award cash to exhibitors of the top five animals in both market and breeding shows in all four species. Direct cash payouts will range from \$4,000 to \$500 for steers; \$1,000 to \$300 for heifers; \$2,000 to \$500 for market hogs; \$750 to \$250 for breeding gilts; \$2,000 to \$300 for market lambs; \$500 to \$50 for registered ewes; \$500 to \$100 for commercial ewes; \$2,000 to \$400 for market goats; and \$750 to \$200 for commercial doe kids.

In addition, KJLS will present several scholarships during the show to exhibitors who have excelled academically, in community service and in 4-H/FFA. This is the 29th year for the scholarship program, which has awarded a total of \$510,600 to 359 exhibitors since 1993. Last year, a total of \$20,100 was awarded to 11 individuals.

Separate from the selection of species champions, a showmanship contest will be held. The top showman in the junior. intermediate and senior divisions of each species will receive a silver belt buckle. Prizes also will be awarded for second through fifth place in each division.

KJLS will again offer the LEAD Challenge, which is an educational and advocacy event that provides an opportunity for exhibitors to learn about current industry issues and apply that information in a competitive environment. Exhibitors will be divided into three age divisions: junior, intermediate and senior. All will participate in the LEAD Listen and Learn, showmanship, skills stations and an interview. There are 27 juniors, 52 intermediates and 41 se-

niors entered in this year's challenge.

In conjunction with KJLS, the Kansas Livestock Foundation (KLF) again will sponsor a club calf show and sale. Steer and heifer prospects from some of the top club calf producers in the Midwest will be consigned. The event will take place October 1. Sale commission proceeds will go toward KLF Youth in Agriculture scholarships.

The Mid-America Classic Collegiate Livestock Judging Contest will be held September 30 in conjunction with the show. This event, which has been held for more than

30 years, provides competitors the opportunity to sharpen their livestock evaluation skills; develop their critical thinking and decision-making abilities; and refine their public speaking skills.

Sponsors of the event include Cargill, Merck Animal Health, Seaboard Foods, Kansas Farm Bureau and Farm Bureau Financial Services Friends of KJLS, the Kansas Department of Agriculture, Farm Credit Associations of Kansas, Huvepharma, Evergy and ICT Great Plains. KLA and Kansas State University serve as the additional sponsors of the show.

Legislation prohibiting EPA monitoring methane emissions from livestock introduced

U.S. Sens. John Thune (R-S.D.), a member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry, and Joni Ernst (R-Iowa), a member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry and Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works, recently introduced a bill that would prohibit the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from monitoring methane emissions from livestock.

Specifically, this legislation would prohibit the EPA from using any of the new methane monitoring funding to surveil livestock methane emissions in South Dakota, Iowa or anywhere else in the country.

"Farmers and ranchers – the people who work tirelessly to help feed America and the world – should not be subject to government surveillance as part of a broader effort to implement radical climate policies that would threaten their ability to operate," said Thune. "This common-sense legislation would protect South Dakota livestock producers and their operations from government snooping."

Kansas wheat leaders sign purchase letter of intent with Taiwan Flour Mills Association

leaders inked a deal with a Taiwanese delegation on September 16 that will directly benefit wheat producers, thanks to a commitment to purchase 69.8 million bushels of U.S. wheat, worth approximately \$567 million from U.S. farmers over the next two sion Chairman Gary Millershaski, who farms in Kearny County, signed a joint letter of intent with representatives from the Taiwan Flour Mills Association (TFMA). Through the letter, Kansas wheat farmers committed to continuing to grow high-quality wheat supplies, while importers

Taiwan will privately negotiate the terms, quantities, prices and conditions for the purchase and sale of wheat.

"While we may face challenges on our farms in terms of weather and market volatility, we are committed to growing the best quality wheat possible,

the world's most reliable choice," Millershaski said in remarks to the delegation. "I'm honored to sign this agreement representing Kansas wheat farmers, the largest producers of hard winter wheat in the U.S. It is meaningful to all farmers in the U.S., especially for those of us in the state of Kansas.'

Taiwan is the sixth largest U.S. wheat export market, thanks in large part to nearly six decades of work through U.S. Wheat Associates and its legacy organization to establish a long and beneficial history of cooperation between Taiwan's flour milling industry and the U.S. wheat industry. Since first establishing a promotional office in Taipei, Taiwan has purchased more than 45 million metric tons (1.65 billion bushels) of U.S. wheat, according to U.S. Wheat Associates.

Taiwan has also sent 13 agricultural trade missions to the United States since

included stops in Washington, D.C., for meetings with leaders from the U.S. wheat and grain industry. Following these meetings, the flour milling group visited Kansas, Idaho and Oregon for a firsthand look at U.S. wheat production and to meet the people responsible for supplying high-quality wheat to Taiwan. The trade team visit included a stop at the Kansas Wheat Innovation Center in Manhattan.


In addition to the intent to purchase U.S. wheat in 2023 and 2024, the Taiwanese delegation also signed Letters of Intent with the U.S. Soybean Export Council (USSEC) and the U.S. Grains Council (USGC) to purchase sovbeans and corn. The overall estimated commitment in the three letters totals \$3.2 billion.

Together, the biennial goodwill mission showcases the economic benefits to Kansas farmers, agribusinesses and rural comagricultural trade.

"This has been a challenging year on Kansas farms," Millershaski said in his remarks. "We have faced an extreme drought, inflation, market volatility. and increased input costs and availability. In these uncertain times, what wheat farmers need are partners and long-term trade agreements that benefit both U.S. farmers and international wheat buvers.

"Your commitment to purchase U.S. wheat sends a strong message to our farmers that we will have a market and incentives for Kansas wheat farmers to continue to grow the best quality wheat to hold up our end of that agreement."
