

Kansas Hay Market Report

Compared to the last report, prices were mostly steady with the exception of the south-central region where grinding alfalfa moved a bit higher. Demand remains strong as evidenced by the number of phone calls producers are receiving, however, many producers are keeping their hay for their regular customers. Lots of corn, bean and milo stalks have been baled and are being used to blend with alfalfa. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for November 1st, temperatures were 2-4 degrees above normal in Kansas and remained mostly dry with only north-central Kansas receiving a little rain. Continued dryness over Kansas, where portions of southwest Kansas had their driest October on record, allowed for the expansion of extreme and exceptional drought this past week. Currently, abnormally dry conditions (D0) remained near 7.5%, moderate drought (D1) remained near 13%, severe drought (D2) decreased to 20%, extreme drought (D3) decreased to near 22%, and exceptional drought (D4) increased to 37.5%.

Calculating winter feed costs for beef cows

Escalating costs for hay and supplements has many cattle producers concerned, especially in the face of very poor pasture conditions and limited

hay supplies in some areas of the state.

Current feed costs have been run through the University of Missouri Extension Beef Cow Feed Cost Dashboard spreadsheet to estimate daily feed costs for a beef cow. The dashboard is an Excel spreadsheet

that was developed to estimate winter feed costs for beef cows based on varying quality and price of hay, comparing fall- and spring-calving cows and purchased versus raised hay.

Input prices are current from a local feed

supplier and Missouri Department of Agriculture estimates for hay prices of varying quality. Raised hay prices are based on 2022 MU Cropping Budgets. Spring-calving cows are assumed to be dry and in mid-gestation.

Hay prices: Good hay, \$150 per ton; fair hay, \$125 per ton; poor hay, \$115 per ton, based on reported prices per bale and estimating a 1,200-pound bale weight. Raised hay was estimated to have a value of \$90 per ton, regardless of nutrient quality. Hay quality was classified by USDA standards for protein and total digestible nutrients (TDN).

Several diets using various ingredients were calculated within each hay quality classification to get a median supplement cost for each type of hay. Average supplement per head per day for dry spring-calving cows, including salt and mineral, was 2 pounds of supplement for good hay, 3.2 pounds of supplement for fair hay and 5.2 pounds of supplement for poor hay. Fall-calving cows averaged needing 2.8 pounds of supplement for good hay, 4.8 pounds of supplement for fair hay and 6.3 pounds of supplement for poor hay.

The breakdown of feed costs per head per day for spring-calving cows is as follows. For purchased hay: good hay, \$2.68; fair hay, \$2.38; poor hay, \$2.48. For raised hay, daily feed cost is estimated to be \$1.75 for good hay, \$1.86 for fair hay and \$2.15 for poor hay.

Fall-calving cows have higher feed costs due to lactation. Using purchased hay prices, estimates of daily feed cost are \$2.90 for good hay, \$2.68 for fair hay and \$2.68 for poor hay. Fall-calving cows fed raised hay have estimated daily feed costs of \$1.94 for good hay, \$2.16 for fair hay and \$2.34 for poor hay.

These feed cost estimates do not include hay waste in the calculations. Poorer quality hay can be expected to have higher feed waste than higher quality hay, and this needs to be considered in calculating your per head feed costs.

These calculations are based on reasonable estimates of hay quality for each hay quality classification and should be used for comparison and planning purposes only. A hay test costs about \$20 and provides information to more accurately calculate supplemental feed needs

than these estimates.

These estimates are designed to give cow/calf producers a general idea of winter feed costs based on current prices. They may help with the decision to keep or sell livestock and to buy or not buy additional hay or other feed supplies.

Before making these decisions, however, producers should have a clear understanding of their feed inventories, the quality of the hay inventory, the necessity and amount of additional supplement that may be needed and the cost of feed ingredients. Weigh the potential for large amounts of waste, bringing in weed seeds and other factors before making a final decision on whether to purchase additional feed resources. There are other implications associated with selling off cows or bred heifers, so those need to be considered as well.

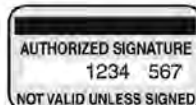

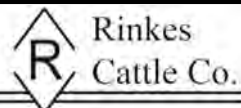

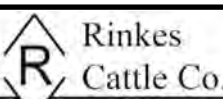

New web-based application can help producers with limited water

Kansas agriculture has been impacted significant-ly by drought conditions across the state, but Kan-sas State University water Extension specialist Jon-athan Aguilar said a web-based application could help farmers plan for the future. The K-State Mobile Irrigation Lab includes a crop water allocator to help farmers with limited water resources maximize their return. With this new

tool, Aguilar said farmers can decide the best crop combinations for their fields, then estimate net returns.

Completely customiz-able, the tool helps pro-ducers plan their goals and make decisions based on current conditions and future predictions. As an example, Aguilar said in-puts could be modified to change the price of the commodity, projecting ei-

ther that the price will be better next year or that it will go down. Addition-ally, by altering the seeding rate, the nutrient or the fer-tilizer that will be applied, a producer could change the labor cost, yield goal, the number of acres plant-ed to a certain crop and the water allocation.

“If you only have a water allocation of five inches in western Kansas, that typically will not get

through a corn crop,” Agu-ilar said. “So, you would be better off going to either grain sorghum or wheat in that scenario. But if you have more water than that, then you have more flexi-bility in terms of looking at what kind of crops you would be able to put in your field.”

More information on the crop water allocator is available by contacting the local Extension office.

Recognizing animal protein’s critical role ahead of UN Climate Summit Agriculture Day

The Interamerican In-stitute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA) con-vened its first-ever “Sus-tainable Agriculture in the Americas” pavilion at the UN Climate Summit (COP27) and partnered with the Protein PACT and other stakeholders to con-vene a total of nine events focused on animal agricul-ture’s key role in sustain-ability solutions.

The Protein PACT events included a Novem-ber 9 panel on sustainable livestock across regions and production systems (see IICA press release here), National Pork Board Assistant Vice President Ashley McDonald shared U.S. pork’s commitments to ethical principles, best practices, and document-ing proof. The Pork Board and Pork Checkoff pio-neered on-farm sustain-ability reports, which have

been awarded \$20 million in USDA Climate-Smart Commodities grant fund-ing to expand measure-ment and implementation of climate-smart practices.

North American Meat Institute Chief Strategy Officer Eric Mittenthal moderated a November 10 panel featuring scientific evidence on the essential dietary contributions of animal-source foods and optimizing animal agricul-ture’s environmental im-pact.

The Meat Institute’s first-ever continuous im-provement data report released last week found that among companies ac-counting for an estimated 90% of meat sold in the United States, 81% of re-ported facilities are cov-ered by company-wide commitments to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The Meat Institute aims for

100% of members to have delivered emissions re-duction targets approved by the Science-Based Tar-gets Initiative by 2030.

Speaking on the No-vember 10 panel, Dr. Ade-gbola Adesogan, Director of the University of Florida Food Systems Institute commented:

“Most common mea-sures of environmental im-pact ignore nutrient-den-sity – the contribution of foods to achieving recom-mended intakes of critical nutrients. Sustainability solutions must ensure sus-tainable production of an-imal-source foods, which are “brain foods” for the children our future de-pends on.

Eating meat, dairy, and eggs improves children’s

cognition and growth, and raising animals for food provides livelihoods and is a cornerstone of many cul-tures, particularly in the Global South.”

Dr. Manual Otero, Di-rector General of IICA, welcomed the Protein PACT’s partnership and said:

“The livestock sector is moving at full tilt to-wards sustainability in the Americas and around the world and continues to play a central and invalu-able role in global food security. IICA and its mem-ber states will continue to champion at COP27 and fu-ture COPs the critical role of sustainable agriculture, including livestock pro-duction, in the Americas.”

Registration open for Nov. 29 Carbon Summit on UNL’s East Campus

As state and federal leaders look toward ways to mitigate rising global temperatures, much dis-cussion has focused on carbon.

Researchers are study-ing the extent to which regenerative agricultural techniques, such as plant-ing cover crops and adopt-ing no-till management, can help trap carbon in the soil and keep it from escaping into the atmo-sphere.

And in the past few years, carbon markets have emerged, allowing farmers and ranchers that implement regenerative management practices to profit.

But there is still much to learn about carbon in agricultural systems, prac-tices intended to seques-ter it, and the emerging carbon market industry. To demystify carbon and the buzz around it, the Univer-sity of Nebraska-Lincoln’s Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources will host a Carbon Summit

on Nov. 29.

The summit, which will take place from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the Nebras-ka East Union, 1705 Arbor Drive, is intended for any-one who wants to learn more about carbon and agriculture. The event builds on last year’s Soil Health Summit, which blended presentations on the elements and func-tion of healthy soils from leading soil scientists and producers with participant discussion about conserva-tion strategies and produc-er best practices.

The Carbon Summit will follow a similar for-mat, said Ron Yoder, Se-nior Associate Vice Chan-cellor for IANR.

“Carbon is a big issue right now, but there is still much we do not know,” Yoder said. “The event is intended to be an over-view that gives those who choose to attend the tools they need to make their own decisions about car-bon management, carbon markets and other issues around carbon.”

The event will begin with a panel discussion about carbon and its role in agricultural systems, in-cluding cropland, grazing lands livestock systems. Discussions on measuring carbon, carbon sequestra-tion and carbon markets will follow. A keynote ad-dress will explore the role of agriculture in the larger carbon cycle. Throughout the event, participants will have the opportunity to take part in conversations on these and other issues.

Fall is ideal time to set home landscape up for spring success

Crisp, fall temperatures may signal a step away from warmer summer weather, but Johnson County horticulture Extension agent Dennis Patton says it's not a time to completely put away summer work.

Patton says several fall chores can set up lawns and gardens for success next spring.

Home lawns

Leaves from trees can create a barrier to healthy lawns by blocking sunlight that the grass receives – creating dead areas in the lawn next spring.

“You need to get those leaves off the grass so that you'll have a healthy lawn next spring,” Patton said.

“I like mulch mowing,” he said. “After you get a thin layer of leaves on the layer – not six to eight inches, but just a thin layer – take the bagger off your mower and mow over the leaves. The mower will chop and shred those leaves and they will filter back to the soil surface.”

Mulch mowing, Patton notes, breaks leaves down as compost to the soil level, releasing organic matter. He said homeowners should consider mulch mowing when a thin layer of leaves covers the grass.

“You know that you're safely mulch-mowing when you look behind you

and what you see is a majority of grass and a few little pieces of leaves here and there,” Patton said. “If you look behind you and you see mostly leaves, then you probably waited too long between those mulch mowings.”

Leaves can be added to a compost pile to mulch gardens next spring, or Patton says they can be spread at the base of shrubs and other areas this fall as soil amendments.

Lawns should be mowed to their summer length before putting the mower away for the winter. Cool season lawns – tall fescue and Kentucky bluegrass – may still be growing as late as Thanksgiving; warm-season lawns – zoysia and bermuda – are usually done once the first frost hits.

Gardens

Patton suggests a full cleanup of gardens this fall, including removing remaining vines and weeds. He said gardeners should also consider spading or tilling the soil.

“Do a ‘rough till’ in the fall,” he said. “Leave it looking chunky. Then in

March or April, hit it with a rake and you're ready to plant.”

Cleaning up and tilling the soil in the fall saves gardeners a common dilemma of waiting for wet soils to dry up before doing work in the spring.

Lawnmower maintenance

Patton said modern gasoline tends to be a little more stable than older products, but it's still important to decide whether to run the mower dry before winter, or to add a stabilizer before storing the mower.

“Either way is fine; it depends on your preference,” Patton said. “Also, do a tune-up of your mower before winter hits; change the oil and air filter and sharpen the blade. Many people wait until March to do this, but you can do this in fall and when spring comes, you're ready to go.”

Patton said one thing most overlook is the tires on a lawnmower. “Just like on your car, tires wear down, so mowing heights aren't true,” he said. “Putting new wheels on your lawnmower might add ½ inch to the mowing

height.”

Garden hoses

Patton said homeowners should remember to unhook garden hoses from outdoor faucets. Leaving them attached may cause backup pressure, leading to frozen pipes.

Also, he said, drain hoses after unhooking them. Water expands as it freezes, which could rupture the hose.

“Ideally, you should store the hose inside or in a container out of the sunlight,” Patton said. “Drain them, roll them up, tie with twine and hang in the garage. A good hose is an expensive investment, and you want to be sure you treat it with kindness.”

Watering trees

In most winters, Kansas gets adequate rain or snowfall for trees. “But if we get one of those dry winters with not a lot of precipitation, you might want to check soil moisture around trees in January or February, and give the trees a drink of water on a warm day when the soil is not frozen,” Patton said.

Houseplants

When kept outside during the warmer months of the year, houseplants are exposed to many elements and insects. Homeowners should routinely check houseplants for insect development – aphids, white flies, spider mites or others – once plants are moved inside.

“Once they are in the home around 70 degrees Fahrenheit, (insects) love to multiply really fast,” Patton said. “Insecticidal soaps work really well for taking care of most indoor problems.”

Houseplants should not be fertilized during the winter months, he said. “Keep them on the dry side, and watch for insects.”

It is normal for houseplants to lose leaves while inside. “The goal is to keep them alive, then give them a haircut when you put them out next May. They'll soon get bushy again and start the process all over.”

USMEF: potential shakeup to come in Mexican meat market

The Government of Mexico recently issued a decree describing an agreement with a number of private companies aimed at reducing prices of basic foods, including some pork and beef cuts, the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) reports. This decision is two-fold.

In May of this year, the Government of Mexico announced duty-free imports on pork, beef and poultry through the end of 2022 in an effort to combat food price inflation. This decision opened doors for suppliers previously subject to retaliatory duties to tap the Mexican market at higher volumes.

This recent decree adds a twist. According to USMEF vice president of economic analyses Erin Borror, the effort will allow imports from additional supplying countries.

“Our immediate concern was ensuring that the Mexican authorities were still going to strictly enforce all animal health and food safety requirements. Our trade obviously goes both directions, and we can't have any risk introduced.”

As more information is revealed about the decision, it appears that all sanitary regulations will continue to be enforced. However, these changes could cause a shake up in the Mexican market, USMEF notes.

KBC uses consumer preferences to promote beef

The Kansas Beef Council (KBC) is committed to reaching consumer audiences effectively and efficiently to increase beef demand in Kansas.

To make that possible, KBC routinely collects market research throughout the state to create checkoff-funded dashboards that use the results from questionnaires various consumers complete about their protein preferences and beef perceptions. KBC's most recent dashboards included a sample size of 150 people in Kansas and 150 people in the Kansas City area.

The questionnaires were taken during the month of August, and respondents were between 18 and 65 years old.

The results show 75% of Kansans and 72% of consumers within the Kansas City metro area have a positive perception of beef. However, those percentages drop down to only 42% and 35%, respectively, when asked about cattle raised specifically for food.

Around 84% of Kansans and 79% of Kansas City residents eat beef weekly. Only 3% of Kansans eat beef less than weekly, but

5% of Kansas City residents never eat beef.

There are three main considerations Kansas consumers have when selecting which protein to purchase and eat: taste, value and safety.

Over 80% of Kansans and Kansas City residents believe beef is great tasting and good for many types of meals. Just 63% of respondents said they believe beef is safe to eat. Consumers stated in the questionnaire that access to quick, easy and healthy recipes could encourage them to increase their beef consumption.

Product packaging is where Kansas consumers primarily get their information about beef nutrition, but Pinterest and influencers are where they look for recipes and information about how cattle are raised. Other social media sites are used to find similar information.

"These dashboards help us understand our local Kansas consumer audiences better, so we can build beef demand," Kevin Thielen, KBC executive director, said. "Our producers trust that we use their dollar well, and we take every opportunity

to do exactly that."

KBC used this information when navigating their fall social media campaign. The campaign featured 10 fall soups – all featuring beef. The cam-

paign used targeted ads on Instagram, Facebook, Pinterest and TikTok. The content was seen over 750,000 times and had over 160,000 engagements.

Unexpected cow death questions answered

No matter whether it is a pet or livestock, an animal dying unexpectedly is sad and concerning. It often leaves owners with questions about what happened and whether other animals will be impacted.

To get to the bottom of what is going on, Kansas State University beef cattle veterinarians emphasize the importance of a producer working with their local veterinarian to determine the cause of death.

On a recent Cattle Chat podcast, the veterinarians discussed a listener question in which two cows recently died unexpectedly in the herd and anaplasmosis was determined to be the cause of death.

"Anaplasmosis is a disease of the blood in which a parasite causes the red blood cells to be destroyed and the animal can die due to a lack of oxygen," veterinarian Bob Larson

said.

Veterinarian Brian Lubbers added that this disease more significantly impacts cows older than age 2 than it does the others in the herd.

"With this infection, the immune system takes the damaged red blood cells out of circulation and younger animals do a better job of regenerating them more quickly," Lubbers said.

Both veterinarians agree that cattle death comes with little warning.

"Two days before they die, the cattle can appear normal, but then they fail quickly. It isn't uncommon to have cattle death be the first sign of anaplasmosis in the herd," Larson said.

The only visual sign of the disease prior to death is pale or yellow mucous membranes, Lubbers said.

Because the infection is spread primarily by ticks, the likelihood of disease is often greatest in the fall, a few weeks after tick populations peak. And, Larson

said, the amount of anaplasmosis in the area will vary among geographic regions.

"If you live in an area that has anaplasmosis, then I would only buy replacement animals from areas that also expose replacements to the disease," Larson said.

Once animals have recovered from this illness, they can be carriers of the disease, explains Lubbers.

Because this blood-borne disease is carried by ticks, it easily spreads through the herd. Syringe needles and palpation sleeves that are used with multiple animals in the herd can also spread the disease.

The K-State veterinarians also said cattle that do recover from this acute sickness may require a few months to build back healthy red blood cells.


Prevention is difficult, say the veterinarians, but prescribed feed additives can be used to mitigate the spread.

"This parasite is susceptible to some antimicrobials, and one FDA-approved drug used to treat it is tetracycline," Lubbers said.

At this point in time there is not a good vaccine option to prevent this disease, said Larson.

"There is a lot of anaplasmosis vaccine research being done at K-State; this disease is difficult to build a safe and effective vaccine for, but I am hopeful that this research will lead to a better option in the future," Larson said.
