

Pottawatomie County Fairboard breaks ground on new facilities

The Pottawatomie County Fairboard has broken ground on a 68x225-foot multipurpose building, officially launching the first phase of enhancement projects for the fairgrounds in Onaga. This new steel building will be utilized by multi-species livestock projects during fair week, and provide a larger, more functional footprint for year-round use. With a growing number of youth enrolled in 4-H in Pottawatomie County, this new building will provide a home for new memories to be made as over 350 young people culminate their annual 4-H projects each summer at the fair.

Without the support from communities in all corners of Pottawatomie County, the improvements of the fairgrounds would not be possible. Early contributions for this project were generously provided by the Leon Cline family, honoring his love for the Fair and the youth who grow-up in programs like 4-H and FFA, as well as

In addition to the speakers, the program will offer breakout sessions where attendees can pick and choose which topics apply to them. This year's topics will be an Introduction of the Office of Farm and Ranch Transition by Ashlee Westerhold, KSU, Livestock Risk Protection (LRP) and Pasture, Rangeland, and Forage (PRF) policy by Dr. Jennifer Ifft, KSU, and Blue Green Algae by Dr. Jow Gerken, KSU.

They will end the program with a Crisis Management panel. Hear from livestock producers impacted by 2021 fires, industry representatives, and media personnel speak on topics relating to crisis management, emergency preparedness, and utilizing your resources in times of need.

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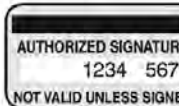
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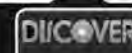

U.S. dairy leaders highlight sustainability, global food security at World Food Prize

A nutrition expert, an innovative dairy farmer and a global food-security leader shared how animal agriculture and dairy can be part of world climate and hunger solutions in a panel discussion side event at the World Food Prize. The panel also discussed the upcoming U.S. hosting of the 2023 International Dairy Federation World Dairy Summit in Chicago, the world's biggest global dairy conference.

Panelists include Katie Brown, EDD, RDN, senior vice president for Scientific and Nutrition Affairs at National Dairy Council; Suzanne Vold, a dairy farmer near Glenwood, Minn.; and Jay Waldvogel, senior vice president of strategy and international development for Dairy Farmers of America and a board member of Global Dairy Platform, an organization that brings together dairy companies, associations, scientific bodies and other partners to collaborate pre-competitively to

lead and build evidence on dairy's role in the diet and show the sector's commitment to responsible food production.

"To meet the grand challenge of nourishing a growing global population with limited natural resources, dairy is answering the call of providing sustainable, efficient, high-quality nutrition that can be accessed worldwide," said Brown. "The foods we choose every day contribute to dietary patterns that can promote health and wellness and reduce risk of chronic diseases at all stages across the lifespan. Dairy foods now and in the future will be critical to meeting the challenges malnutrition poses to the planet, just as U.S. dairy will be important to making sure the world is sustainably nourished."

"In a fragile world, dairy farms are strengthened by their generationally focused and family bonds, a truth that's followed by dairy farmers across the

United States as they show global leadership in innovation," said Vold. "In other words, we care for our cows and protect our resources so that our farms may thrive for generations to come and help nourish the needs of a growing world."

"The global dairy industry is a one-billion-person community, starting with more than 130 million farmers around the world, with 600 million people living and working on those farms, farms that create 125 million jobs, jobs that are supporting hundreds of millions of other family members, collectively more than a billion people," said Waldvogel. "The sheer scale alone indicates our role in food security. But even beyond that, if you look at how dairy plays out locally, its nutrition, its shorter supply chains, women-led in many cases, it's a combination of the sheer size and scale of dairy and its role in food security, but also that local touch where dairy is very much around the corner for the people who need it."

Panelists also discussed next year's IDF World Dairy Summit, set

for October 16-19, 2023 at Chicago's McCormick Place conference center. The honor provides an opportunity to showcase the dairy sector's innovations in sustainability, nutrition and health, standards, safety and quality, to accomplish its purpose of nourishing the world with safe, nutritious and sustainable foods.

The IDF World Dairy Summit provides a vital forum for dairy leaders, experts, farmers, processors, traders and journalists worldwide to discuss how to further advance the collective global dairy sector forward in a positive, sustainable way. Held in the United States for the first time since 1993, this year's meeting is themed "BE Dairy - Boundless Potential. Endless Possibilities." U.S. dairy is developing programming that will feature global and industry leaders, experts, scientists, technical specialists, farmers and more, exploring the global dairy sector's most significant opportunities today and tomorrow.

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Kansas Hay Market Report

Compared to the last report, prices were mostly steady for a second week while demand remained strong, supplies available to purchase remained slim. Reports indicate there is not much alfalfa out there to purchase, unless one is willing to pay up for it. A number of wildfires erupted across the state over the weekend due to the extremely dry conditions and high winds. Although Monday's rain brought some relief to the eastern half of the state, it did little to help the tinder box out west. A dusty fall harvest continues in all regions with reports of below normal yields, and everyone seems to be ready to move on to a better 2023 year. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for October 18th, despite observing near to below-normal average temperatures, a combination of dryness, below-normal precipitation, and high winds resulted predominantly in continued degradation of drought categories region-wide. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 62% very short, 29% short, 9% adequate, and 0% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 61% very short, 30% short, 9% adequate, and 0% surplus. Currently, abnormally dry conditions (D0) remained at 9%, moderate drought (D1) decreased to 10.5%, severe drought (D2) increased to near 21%, extreme drought (D3) decreased to near 28%, and exceptional drought (D4) increased to near 30%.

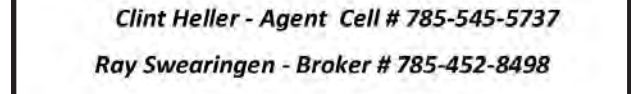

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Kansas 4-H meat judging team wins national contest

The Kansas 4-H All Star meat judging team was crowned national champions, beating teams from 14 states during the 4-H Meat Judging Contest championship held at the American Royal in Kansas City.

It is the first-ever national title for a Kansas team, which won by 27 points over Texas. The contest has been in existence since 1970.

"The Kansas team was successful due to their work ethic," said Katie Lybarger, a meat science graduate student at Kansas State University and the team's coach.

"These kids met with us for virtual practices weekly, studied on their

own time, and practiced from sunup to sundown in the days leading up to the contest. They never once complained and took advantage of every opportunity to get better. More importantly, they had fun together throughout all of this and had a very strong team bond."

The team placed first in retail cut judging, retail cut identification, oral reasons and overall judging. They were second in pork judging and beef judging.

The Kansas 4-H All-Star Meat Judging Team consisted of individuals who placed in the top ten at the state 4-H meat judging contest in August. According to Lybarger, students needed to have excellent meat evaluation and decision-making skills, and

exceptional oral communication.

- Lyle Perrier, Greenwood County
- Lillian Hulse, Central Kansas District (Ottawa County).
- Liam Nichols, Central Kansas District (Ottawa County).

In addition to Lybarger, the team was coached by Steph Witberler.

"Steph and I enjoyed

coaching this team because it was an opportunity to invest back into the next generation of meat judging," Lybarger said. "We both competed on the K-State meat judging team and found the experience to be incredibly impactful."

Lybarger credited the 4-H members' coaches and volunteers at the local level who, she says, "have invested years into these kids."

"They truly give these students the essential meat judging foundation needed to be successful at this level. Our roles as the coaches of the all-star team was just to take the kids to that next step."

Individually, four Kansas 4-H members placed in the top ten, including Stubbs (first), Perrier (third), Frankhauser (fifth) and Fry (seventh).

Stubbs placed first in retail cut identification with the only perfect score in the contest; first in oral reasons, and first total judging. She was second in pork judging and retail cut judging.

Perrier was second in

in beef judging. Fry was third in total judging and fifth in retail cut judging.

Students evaluated six classes of carcasses or cuts and gave three sets of oral reasons during the contest. Additionally, they identified 30 retail cuts and specified the species, primal, and cookery of each. This year, the team evaluated pork carcasses, beef ribs, pork loins, beef rounds, porterhouse steaks, and pork blade chops. Reasons were given on the pork carcasses, pork loins and porterhouse steaks.

Lybarger said: "This was a talented and hard-working group of leaders, and we feel very lucky to have gotten to know them each through this team."

Kansas Water Office releases 2022 Kansas Water Plan

The Kansas Water Office (KWO) released the finalized 2022 Kansas Water Plan (KWP). This is the first comprehensive water plan for the state of Kansas to be released since 2009 and provides a roadmap for navigating the vast array of water issues throughout the state.

The water plan provides an outline for management, conservation and development of the state's water resources. To do so, it names five guiding principles – conserve and extend the High Plains Aquifer; secure, protect and restore our Kansas reservoirs; improve the state's water quality; reduce our vulnerability to extreme events; and increase awareness of Kansas water resources.

The KWP is created by the Kansas Water Office with input from partner agencies and Regional Advisory Committees (RACs). The draft is offered for public comment before being reviewed, finalized and approved by the Kansas Water Authority.

The finalization of the plan leads into the implementation phase, where the Kansas Water Office will work with other state agencies and Regional Advisory Committees across the state to address the principles outlined in the KWP. Implementation is supported by the State Water Plan Fund, a statutory mechanism created to pay for the projects and programs identified in the KWP. This year, two statutory transfers into the fund were fully provided for the first time since 2008.

"The drought conditions throughout the state drive home the importance of having a comprehensive plan," said KWO director Connie Owen. "Water is the most valuable resources we have, and we must manage it strategically to ensure a safe and secure supply now and for the future."

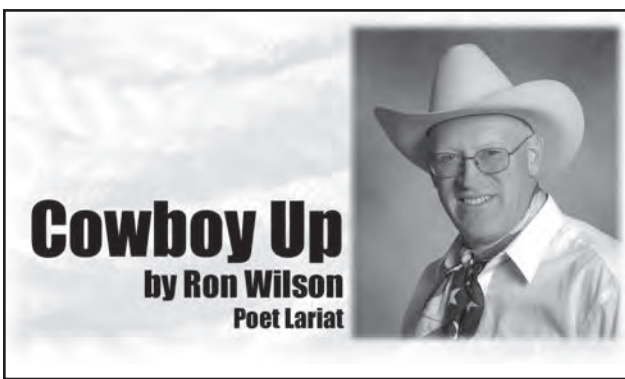

Trail Tale

Along with other historic trails of the Old West, I recently learned of another old trail. This one passes directly through Manhattan, Kansas.

A friend in Texas sent me a map of something called the Chief Standing Bear Trail, from northern Nebraska to Oklahoma. To my surprise, it showed the trail passing through Manhattan. I had never heard of Chief Standing Bear. Here's what I've learned since then.

In the 1870s, Chief Standing Bear was a tribal leader of the Ponca tribe, an agriculturally based native band in northeast Nebraska. In 1877, the federal government moved the Poncas to Indian Territory (northeastern Oklahoma today) over protests from Standing Bear and others. Federal troops enforced the removal orders.

It became a Ponca version of the Trail of Tears. The tribe walked hundreds of miles south, with casualties along the way. Standing Bear's 16-year-old daughter, Prairie Flower, perished from

tuberculosis before they ever left Nebraska.

Government Indian agent E. A. Howard accompanied the tribe and filed a detailed report of their travels in 1877. The map shows that they came by Marysville, Manhattan, Emporia, and Parsons before entering Oklahoma. Based on Howard's report and newspaper clippings of the time, on June 23-24, 1877, the Ponca camped three miles southeast of Manhattan along Deep Creek - not far from our ranch today. From Riley County records, it appears that the tribe camped on a parcel of land now owned by our neighbors.

The tribe continued south to its new reservation but arrived too late in the year to plant crops. The tribe was devastated by disease and malnutrition. Promised food supplies from the government did not arrive. An estimated one-third of the tribe died within the first two years.

Chief Standing Bear's 16-year-old son Bear Shield was one of those.

While on his deathbed from malaria, Bear Shield asked to be buried in the tribal homeland. Standing Bear honored his son's last wish, escaped the reservation with a small band, and carried his son's remains back to Nebraska.

The Army arrested them, but Army General George Crook sympathized with Standing Bear and asked a local newspaperman for help. The newspaperman found two prominent Omaha attorneys who filed a court case

Among the native Indian chiefs of which you should be aware,

There is the fascinating history of one named Standing Bear.

He was born in the Ponca tribe, northeast Nebraska way,

Where farming and hunting were part of their everyday.

Their forced walk became a Ponca trail of tears.

Standing Bear's own daughter died,

To be buried in the homeland was among his final pleas.

Standing Bear chose to honor his son's dying wish,

To the land of their grandfathers from which they'd ventured forth.

There the Army caught the chief and took him to Fort Omaha,

But some lawyers represented him in a federal court of law.

The judge found in his favor, using cases the lawyer cites,

And this ruling became a landmark case for civil rights.

So I honor Standing Bear who once camped in Kansas land,

For his commitment to his family and the way he took a stand.

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On Standing Bear's behalf. At the end of his testimony, Standing Bear held out his hand to the judge and pleaded eloquently for recognition of his basic humanity in these words:

"My hand is not the color of yours, but if I pierce it, I shall feel pain. If you pierce your hand, you also feel pain. The blood that will flow from mine will be the same color as yours. I am a man. The same God made us both."

The federal judge ruled in his favor. Standing Bear

thus became the first Native American judicially granted civil rights under American law. Standing Bear died in 1908 and was buried in the land of his grandfathers.

In 2019, a nine-foot-tall statue of Chief Standing Bear was put in place to represent Nebraska in Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol at Washington D.C. How interesting to think that his trail took him through our neighborhood, the Flint Hills of Kansas.

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Cattlemen remain committed to quality

With ranchers continuing to produce high-quality beef at notable marks and consumer demand staying strong, Certified Angus Beef closed its books on the second-highest sales year of record.

The brand's success is a reflection of an entire community pointed toward providing premium beef, starting with steady supply.

"Angus cattlemen and women remain committed to meeting the demand for the best-tasting and best-sourced beef," says John Stika, president of Certified Angus Beef. "Our diverse, global and growing customer base recognizes the brand's commitment to quality from the ranch to the plate."

Certified Angus Beef sold 1.234 billion pounds in 54 countries during

the 2022 fiscal year. Up 1.6% percent or 19 million pounds from fiscal 2021, the brand celebrates its seventh year reaching more than a billion pounds sold and set a new record sales month with 113.8 million pounds sold in March 2022.

Demand Supported by Supply

The second-largest supply in the brand's history, 5.78 million carcasses achieved the brand's ten beef quality specifications. The year also marked a record 16.38 million Angus-influenced cattle evaluated for the brand, a 1.7% increase from the previous year.

Cattlemen's commitment to increasing high-quality beef supply continues to be rewarded through grid premiums.

As reported in March, premiums paid by pack-

ers to producers for brand-qualifying cattle totaled \$182 million annually or \$3.5 million per week.

"While we celebrate the success of the 2022 fiscal year, we are looking ahead to 2023 with a sense of optimism - driven by strong demand for the brand and a sense of realism. We know the challenges facing producers, and ultimately the cattle supply, over the next few years," Stika says. "Moving forward, we will remain focused on what is within our control - growing demand and supporting ranchers as they push forward in targeting the brand to supply customers the high-quality beef they desire."

Beef Sales Stay Strong

Consumer spending patterns encouraged a more typical distribution of beef sales for foodservice, retail and international businesses this year. Restaurant dining elevated foodservice to the brand's second-best year

at 405 million pounds, mirroring the previous year's double-digit gain.

Following two consecutive years with more than 600 million pounds, grocery store meat departments across the U.S. sold 548.5 million pounds of the Certified Angus Beef® brand in fiscal 2022.

While U.S. retail dipped slightly, beef sales by global partners grew.

Partners outside of the U.S. increased sales to 178.5 million pounds for the year, with three of the top five markets—Canada, Mexico and Taiwan—growing by more than 24%. To complement international growth in these markets, the Middle East, Central America, Dominican Republic and Qatar each experienced their best year with the brand.

Limits on labor in restaurants and grocery stores, coupled with shoppers seeking prepared and ready-to-cook items, led value-added products to a new annual record. The

40.7 million pounds sold marked a 6.3% increase, with gains in 15 of 23 product categories—especially fully cooked briskets, shaved steak and beef bacon.

These same partners identified opportunities for ground beef, a versatile and less costly item for menus and retail shoppers. Ground beef sales reached a record 261.7 million pounds, 10.7% above 2021.

Certified Angus Beef® Natural also grew by 7% year over year to 4.7 million pounds.

"The success of the last 44 years hasn't come by luck or chance for this brand," says Stika. "It's been achieved through ranchers' determination to produce a high-quality product, combined with our partners' hard work and intentionality to continue to plan, prepare and position themselves and our consumers to be successful."

USB launches Soy Innovation Challenge to increase value for soybean meal

The United Soybean Board (USB) and The Yield Lab Institute (YLI) challenge companies to create innovations that increase the use and value of soybean meal in existing markets through the Soy Innovation Challenge.

"Soybean oil demand is increasing as a feedstock for renewable energy, creating unique opportunities for soybean farmers. But an increase in expanded crush for oil means higher meal supply. With U.S. soybean meal's strong reputation as a high value product, additional pathways are necessary to advance consumption both domestically and internationally," said Ralph Lott, USB Chair and farmer from New York.

The Soy Innovation Challenge will enhance the value of soybean meal in existing markets and uses by targeting:

- Innovations that increase use and value for soybean meal in animal agriculture, aquaculture, pet foods and soyfoods for human consumption.

Innovations that advance the commercial viability of existing uses and segments in both food and feed spaces, overcoming the technical challenges of increasing soybean meal usage.

Innovations that advance the transportability and storage viability of soybean meal.

"With clear sustainability differentiators, such as soil health and land stewardship, this competition has the potential to create unique revenue streams for U.S. soybean farmers in meeting customers' evolving preferences," said Mac Marshall, USB vice president of market intelligence. "Sustainability is the future of our industry, and these new innovations will enhance the profit opportunities for our farmers."

Soybean meal is used as a feed ingredient for animal agriculture. These markets are limited by demand constraints of poultry and livestock volume, competition from alternative ingredients, storage capacity and transportation challenges. The Soy Innovation Challenge aims to solve these problems.

The application period is open through Decem-

ber 6. USB and YLI invite ag-tech startups, project/research teams and groups to submit applications online. This includes entities that operate in the soybean meal value chain and have an innovative solution that can enhance known uses and markets of soybean meal. The challenge is sponsored by USB and Amazon Web Services (AWS). The selected teams will compete for:

- \$170,000 in cash prizes courtesy of USB.
- \$5,000 in in-kind technical services and credits per finalist courtesy of AWS.

All selected teams will receive mentoring and resources to help advance their ideas in the areas of technical, business and financial impact.

"With a favorable market for soy, an increased interest in enhancing the existing value of soybean meal is often forgotten in the equation. This innovation challenge will uncover ideas and technologies that will drive more value for soybean meal and its constituents within existing markets and uses. This is truly an exercise in circular economy and optimizing the bean," said Brandon Day, COO of YLI.

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The history of rotational deworming, its risk today, and how to spur change

While word may travel fast, change can sometimes happen a bit slower. Such is the case with rotational deworming – an outdated approach that is still used today (albeit less, as studies indicate).

The History of rotational deworming and its risk today

The approach of rotational deworming goes back more than 40 years ago. The thought, at the time, was that horses should have zero parasite eggs in their stools, so they incorporated deworming every 60 days using a different dewormer product each time. An effective approach then, decades later it set horses up for parasite resistance, as the practice inadvertently selected for resistant parasites with each deworming treatment.

“Back when dewormers came out, they worked well against everything. We were able to deworm every animal with lots of suc-

cess,” said Tony Hawkins, DVM, Valley Vet Supply Technical Service Veterinarian. “Since then, and the introduction of rotational deworming practices, small strongyles have developed to become the larger problem, and they develop resistance more easily. To avoid contributing to further resistance, deworming recommendations had to change.”

The American Association of Equine Practitioners (AAEP) Parasite Control Guidelines – an important resource for horse owners to review and discuss with their veterinarian – states, “The true goal of parasite control in horses (and other equids) is to limit parasite infections so animals remain healthy and clinical illness does not develop. The goal is NOT to eradicate all parasites from a particular individual.

What is needed are properly timed treatments with effective anthelmint-

ics administered at the appropriate time of the year, which correspond to the epidemiological cycles of transmission and the relative parasite burdens in individual horses.”

How to approach the conversation against rotational deworming

Upon learning that a trainer, barn manager or riding buddy still consistently follows a rotational deworming program, what's the best way to go about the conversation? Dr. Hawkins said, “I would start out by asking why they think rotational deworming is a good idea – and just know that ‘Because that's the way we've always done it’ probably isn't the best answer anymore.

“If they are open to having a discussion, then you could follow up with, ‘Recent work has shown that rotational deworming promotes resistance in these parasites, and to ensure that we have long-

term success with our deworming program, we might want to consider running fecal egg counts and deworming horses more selectively based on the results. Doing so will mean fewer dewormers to purchase, and it's going to offer an idea of the parasite population that you have on your farm. It gives us a lot of information and at the same time, it allows us to deworm these horses at the frequency that they really need to be dewormed and with the appropriate products that we need to use,” encouraged Dr. Hawkins.

When to deworm your horse

AAEP Guidelines recommend deworming when parasite levels can be at their highest, during the spring and fall. Treatment for bots and tapeworms should be timed to coincide with the end of the fly season for bots and the end of pasture season for tapeworms, typically late

fall or early winter.

“For foals, I recommend deworming every two months until a year old,” said Dr. Hawkins. “Foals are prone to ascarids early on, and benzimidazole dewormers (also known as ‘white dewormers’) are recommended. Yearlings and two-year-olds should be dewormed on average three to four times per year, based on their fecal egg count results, with either ivermectin or moxidectin and praziquantel for tapeworm control in the fall.”

As a general best practice, adult horses should be treated twice yearly, during spring and fall. Adult horses should be dewormed with either ivermectin or moxidectin and praziquantel for tapeworm control in the fall.

“Many senior horses become high shedders as they age, which is expected due to diminishing immunity,” Dr. Hawkins said. “It's ideal to treat them as you would a normal adult horse – do an FEC and based off of that, you may

be deworming them two to four times per year.”

Ask your veterinarian about performing a yearly fecal egg count (FEC), which will help guide you on the frequency of deworming treatments your horse specifically needs. Perform fecal egg count reduction test (FECRT) in both foals and adult horses every other year. In herds with high numbers of horses, FECRT does not need to be performed on all horses – six is the recommended number.

Dr. Hawkins also recommends to “Always dose dewormers to the actual weight of the individual horse. Many horse owners do not; they just give the whole thing, thinking ‘If a little bit's good, more is better, right?’ It's important to weigh them or use a weight tape to dose accurately.”

Bipartisan senators to EPA: “Biofuels are ready to meet the moment”

Thirteen senators wrote U.S. Environmental Protection Agency administrator Michael Regan urging him to set strong volume requirements for 2023 under the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS). The bipartisan group, led by Sens. John Thune (R-S.D.) and Dick Durbin (D-Ill.), also encouraged the administrator to use the pending rulemaking to optimize the RFS to deliver greater environmental and economic benefits from renewable fuels such as ethanol.

In a change from prior years, EPA will now determine RFS volumes based on a set of environmental and economic factors and guardrails in the statute. Biofuels such as ethanol cut greenhouse gas and tailpipe emissions and lower prices at the pump, benefitting the environment and consumers.

As senators stated in their letter: “Through this rulemaking, EPA has a historic opportunity to not only reinforce its efforts to restore integrity to the RFS, but chart a new course for biofuels that will help meet America's diverse energy

demands while further decarbonizing numerous sectors of our economy.”

NCGA has also weighed in with EPA on RFS volume obligations in 2023 and beyond. NCGA President Tom Haag said corn growers appreciate the Senate support for biofuels as a key energy and environment solution and agree EPA has new opportunities to capitalize on biofuels through this RFS transition.

“Corn growers are grateful for the senators' bipartisan advocacy for renewable fuels as EPA prepares to open a new chapter of the RFS,” Haag said. “EPA has a prime opportunity here to use the RFS as an even stronger tool in efforts to cut emissions, address climate change, increase our domestic fuel supply, hold down prices and continue to grow rural economies.”

Through 2022, the RFS statute specified annual volume targets for renewable fuels, reaching an implied volume of 15 billion gallons for ethanol. Beginning with 2023, EPA will determine RFS volumes based on a set of qualitative environmen-

tal, economic and agriculture factors, providing EPA with paths to grow the RFS and renewable fuel use. EPA is expected to issue a proposed rule by November 16.
