modules were developed. Now producers have the option of attending an in-person session, as I did, or taking the modules online. The online classes have the advantage of allowing the participant to go at his or her own pace, but I liked the in-person teaching.

BQA modules now cover best practices around cattle handling, facility management, cattle transportation, good record keeping and protecting herd health. Calving season can be an exhausting time on the ranch, especially when cows experience difficulty giving birth, say the experts at Kansas State University's Beef Cattle Insti-

Speaking on a recent Cattle Chat podcast, K-State veterinarians Bob Larson and Brian Lubbers and nutritionist Phillip Lancaster answered a question from a listener who observed a change in calf birth weights after relocating the herd from an arid region to a lush area of the country, leading the group to discuss reasons for variability in birth weights.

One of the factors that Lubbers cited for birth weight differences relates to calf gender.

"Bull calves will typically weigh more than heifer calves, so herds with a disproportionally large number of bulls will have higher average birth weights in the calf crop," Lubbers said.

Along with gender, Larson said the genetics of the dam and sire are going to influence the calf's birth

"About 45% of the variability in birth weight can be described by genetic differences," Larson said. "If producers are observing that the birth weights are too high, one way to improve that situation is to put selection pressure for calving ease in future matings.

The experts also agree the cow's nutrition during gestation influences the

"Cow nutrition can have a large impact on birth weight of cattle of similar genetics." Lancaster said. As an example, he said

causes the cow's body to move the blood to the extremities to dissipate heat, causing less nutrients to go directly to the fetus,"

Don't overlook He explained that summer monitoring of pastures and hay fields

The start of the growing season can be an exciting time. Grass greens up. We might be getting ready to put cattle out on grass or are looking ahead to haying season.

Mid-summer is sometimes a different story. It's hot. Ticks attack from below and mosquitos from above. Regularly checking pastures might get replaced with the busyness of haying. After haying, the busyness of hauling water or moving livestock to other grass means we don't return to those hayfields like we did earlier. Most of the time, it all balances out and we're just fine, but sometimes, it's good to be a little more deliberate about monitoring.

When you're chasing weeds in the pasture, take a yard stick and do some random checks of grass height. It's easy to 'guess' how much grass might be left out there, but actually measuring may tell us a different story. It may mean we have to make decisions about rotations or supplementation earlier - but it may mean a better stand in the long term.

A look now and again at hay fields post-harvest isn't a bad thing, either. When we remove almost the entirety of the plant during harvest operations, we force root reserves to push out new growth. Regular visits may only tell us what we don't want to hear: that drought conditions are worse than we thought and recovery hasn't happened as quickly as we'd like. It can also allow us to catch issues like fall armyworm feeding or lack of recovery in thinner soils that we can do something about.

It might be a good time to start that more deliberate monitoring. It doesn't have to be much, but regular scouting can help you make decisions in the short term that you'll reap the benefits from for years to come.

Kansas Hay Market Report

Proud sponsors of the Kansas Hay Market Report are Bestifor and Yoder Seed Cleaning.

Compared to the last report demand remains good, trade activity slow to moderate, and prices remained mostly steady. New crop production outlook is overall slightly positive with the abundance of rain and bales slowly hitting the ground as prices continue to trickle in. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for June 15th above-average rainfall fell over parts of the Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska and southeast Wyoming plains again, leading to improvements in the western portion of the region. However, eastern conditions deteriorated where rainfall was not enough to overcome high temperatures and evaporation. The categorical percent area for abnormally dry conditions (D0) slightly increased to 11%, moderate drought (D1)increased to 18%, severe drought (D2) decreased to 17.5%, extreme drought (D3) remained near







KLA members encouraged to join fellow ranchers in rejecting public lands rule

On April 3, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) published a proposed rule that would make significant and concerning changes to the agency's authority under the Federal Land Management and Policy Act. As written, the proposed rule would violate the multiple-use mandate and give "conservation" the ability to override and exclude other uses the agency or a third party consider "incompatible." This would open the door to removing livestock grazing from public lands and create additional burdens for producers. BLM does not have the authority to take this action, and removing cattle from the landscape would hurt local economies, national

food security and landscape health.

The proposal was developed with no stakeholder involvement or awareness and is extremely concerning for cattle producers who hold federal grazing permits. Although Kansas does not rely on public lands grazing, government overreach through burdensome regulations like this cannot be ignored.

NCBA and the Public Lands Council have launched a grassroots campaign to send comments to BLM asking for this rule to be withdrawn. KLA encourages members to participate by visiting https://p2a.co/VB9vf0B and signing the letter provided.

Ten ways to reduce stress on your beef cattle operation

vaccination can get animals off to a great start, but even in a vaccinated animal, stress can compromise their immune system and make them susceptible to respiratory disease.

"We need to be considerate of all the different stress factors that can set an animal up for the onset of disease," said Joe Gillespie, DVM, Boehringer Ingelheim. "How we manage livestock during their growth phase is really important. We must be

diligent and proactive on all fronts in order to protect calves.3

Implementing the following management practices can help mitigate stress and prevent disease in your herd:

1. Screen incoming calves for bovine viral diarrhea virus (BVDV) and remove persistently infected calves from the herd.

2. Shield cattle from harsh weather conditions and give them plenty of bunk space.

3. Avoid overcrowding, as it causes stress and promotes the spread of disease.

4. Bed cattle frequently. Bedding provides added warmth, improved comfort and a barrier between cattle and the ground below, which can contain patho-

5. Maintain proper ventilation to keep cattle from inhaling dust and harmful BRD-causing pathogens.

6. Ensure cattle have access to water and a properly balanced diet. This is necessary for healthy im-

mune function and proper growth.

7. Clean water sources, feed bunks or other heavyuse areas regularly.

8. Minimize the commingling of animals from different sources. If unavoidable, use a preconditioning program.

9. Practice low-stress handling to ensure the process goes moving smoothly for both producers and the cattle. Lowstress handling techniques include presenting a calm disposition, avoiding loud noises, reducing the use of cattle prods, and removing visual distractions.

10. Work with a veterinarian to implement a deworming protocol for parasite protection. Clinical or subclinical parasitism decreases the animal's ability to fight disease, and may negatively affect response to vaccination by competing with the immune system for protein and energy.

Even with the best management practices in place, some stressful events such as shipping are unavoidable. "When producers know that animals are about to experience a stressful event, metaphylaxis is an option Gillespie. Administering metaphylaxis, or a group antibiotic treatment, for at-risk animals can help reduce morbidity and mortality on beef operations.

'Talk with a veterinarian about finding an antibiotic for metaphylaxis that works best for your specific class of cattle," emphasized Dr. Gillespie. "Typically, several factors should be evaluated, such as spectrum of activity, speed of action, and post-metaphylactic interval, or the length of time the antibiotic is at effective levels in the bloodstream before another dose is required. Because a number of different bacteria can be involved with respiratory disease, it's also important to choose a broad-spectrum antibiotic that reaches the lungs quickly

"BRD is the costliest cause of sickness and death in the beef industry, and implementing a holistic approach to battling the disease could help to provide the protection producers are looking for," concluded Dr. Gillespie. "With the right management strategies, producers can put their cattle on track for lifelong produc-

Proper hay storage benefits

Meadowlark District Extension Agent, Livestock and Natural Resources

I've been trying to "Kick the Hay Habit" after following Jim Gerrish and other vear-round grazers. That said, putting up hay is still a favorite summer tradition on a personal level and is an important summertime activity for many agriculture producers. Travel down any gravel road this time of year and you'll likely get stuck behind or meet hay equipment in this busy time. Proper haying practices take time, effort, and resources to harvest properly. With so much invested, it is critical to make the most of this effort with proper storage. In preparing to write on this subject, I came across an Oklahoma State Extension release from Mark Johnson, beef cattle breeding specialist. Let's look at what Dr. Johnson recommends for storing hay.

Proper hay storage is always important. This year, with limited amounts of harvested forage available and record high prices, it is worth discussing some simple storage practices that can lead to less spoilage. First, one of the few upsides to the drought of the past few months is that there has been very little precipitation falling on hay stored outside. Precipitation, air temperature and humidity all lead to more spoilage in big bales.

Twine wrapped bales are more subject to spoilage than net wrapped. Greater bale density leads to less spoilage. That being said, keep the following in mind when considering how your hav is stored.

Select a site on higher ground that is not shaded and is open to air flow to enhance drying conditions. The site should be well-drained to minimize moisture absorption into the bottom of bales. Ground contact leads to more bale spoilage. When practical keep bales off the ground using low-cost surplus materials like old pallets, fence posts, railroad ties and tires. Another option is a six-inch layer of coarse ground rock. A thinner layer of packed ag lime can also be used to create a soil barrier layer. Anything that can be done to maximize drainage and minimize moisture within and around the storage site will be beneficial.

Bales should be stored in rows, butted end-to-end. and oriented in a north/ south direction. Avoid stacking three rows of hav on top of each other, in a triangle shape. This formation leads to more spoilage, particularly in the two bottom rows. North/south orientation combined with at least three feet between the rows permits good sunlight penetration and airflow, allowing for faster drying. Vegetation between the rows should be mowed.

Large round bales stored outside with plastic or canvas usually sustain much less spoilage compared to unprotected bales. If barn storage is an option, this is the best method. Dry matter losses in round bales stored for up to nine months in an enclosed barn should be less than two percent. If the discussion involves rectangular bales, storage under roof or tarps becomes extremely important, as they do not shed water as well as the round bales do.

All forages packaged in large round bales benefit from protection and proper storage practices. Producers are encouraged to consider the cost to benefit ratio of providing this protection. Factors to consider include the value of hay, projected in storage losses, local environmental conditions, the cost of providing protection and how long the hay will be in storage before it is fed. At the very least it may be worthwhile to restack or re-orient your hay supply according to the best practices described.

Although the publication referenced is a bit dated on the economics. there is good Kansas data recommendations found within the K-State Research and Extension publication, MF-1066 Large Round Bale Hay Storage which further details ways to address storage losses.

The Innovative Feed Enhancement and Economic Development (FEED) Act of 2023 (S.1842) was adopted as an amendment to the Animal Drug and Animal Generic Drug User Fee Amendments of 2023 where the legislation, as amended, passed out of Committee 21-0.

"The agricultural industry sets the gold standard when it comes to livestock production," Marshall said. "My producers at home continue to want to make more with less and leave the world safer, cleaner, and healthier than they found it. Our legislation would establish a new pathway at the FDA for novel feed additive manufacturers to increase livestock efficiency and production. I thank my colleagues for recognizing the value of this legislation and helping to give American agricultural industry the tools necessary to feed the world and maintain global competitiveness."

Program Applicants to ReConnect Program funding must serve a rural area that lacks access to service at speeds of 100 megabits per second (Mbps) download and 20 Mbps upload.

Additionally, to ensure that rural households that need internet service can afford it, all awardees will be required to apply to participate in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). The ACP offers a discount of up to \$30 per month towards internet service to qualifying low-income households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands.
