Compared to the last report, demand remains low, trade activity remained slow, and prices were mostly steady, but alfalfa dropped again in the southwest and south-central regions. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor for November 7th, the categorical percent area for abnormally dry conditions (D0) remained at 21%, moderate drought (D1) remained near 24%, severe drought (D2) remained near 32%, extreme

drought (D3) remained just over 7.5%, and no exceptional drought (D4) was recorded in the state of Kansas.

New members to be inducted into **Cattle Feeders** Hall Of Fame

The 2024 inductees into the Cattle Feeders Hall of Fame (CFHOF) are Jack Reeve, DVM, of Garden City and Kee Jim, DVM, from Alberta, Canada. The two will be honored during the group's 15th annual banquet, which will be held February 1 as part of the Cattle Industry Convention in Orlando, Fla.

Reeve, a fifth-generation cattleman and founder of Reeve Cattle Company, earned his degree in veterinary medicine from Kansas State University and launched his practice in Garden City after serving in the U.S. Army. Transitioning to the cattle business full-time, Reeve started the family-owned feed yard in 1962 and proceeded to dedicate his life to the industry, which included serving as KLA president in 1975. His son, Lee, who was KLA president in 2018, now manages the family business as the sixth generation in the cattle industry.

Others who will be honored during the banquet include Delbert Miles of Colorado, who will receive the Industry Leadership Award for his work in feedlot veterinary medicine and beef cattle production research; and Greg Wolfe with Timmerman & Sons in Nebraska, who is being recognized with the Arturo Armendariz Distinguished Service Award.

The Cattle Feeders Hall Fame was established in 2009 to honor the exceptional visionary men and women who have made lasting contributions to the cattle feeding industry. Banquet tickets are \$200 per person in addition to convention registration. All proceeds from ticket sales and corporate sponsorships benefit future Hall of Fame initiatives.





Each day offered a variety of opportunities for attendees to gain knowledge and catch up with friends, old and new. Many took advantage of tours offered, including the National Angus Tour to Deseret Ranch and Kempfer Cattle Company, Beef Blitz hosted by Certified Angus Beef (CAB), and Kennedy Space Center. The weekend officially commenced on Friday evening with the trade show grand opening and welcome reception, featuring Certified Angus Beef® brand hors d'oeuvres and

lively conversation.

The main stage hosted three general sessions designed to inform attendees on the latest changes in the industry. At the opening session, "Innovation: Start with the End in Mind," attendees heard from McCully and John Stika, CAB president, looking together from the seedstock producer to the retailer, and how innovations at every level help drive demand.

'We're here to create an economic pull that ultimately allows you as the membership of the American Angus Association® to get more for what you do, so that you can pass your farm or ranch on to the next generation and continue that legacy moving forward," Stika said. "We will continue to innovate. We'll continue to work, and we'll continue to strive to deliver on this brand's mission: to increase demand and value for your registered Angus cattle."

General session two, sponsored by Neogen®, highlighted innovations in genomics, featuring a trio of trailblazers in the genetic fields of beef cattle, aquaculture and human fertility: Kelli Retallick-Riley, president, Angus Genetics Inc.; Debbie Plouffe, vice president of business development with the Center for Aqua-Technologies; culture and Kristin Brogaard, co-founder and chief strategy officer with Inherent Biosciences. When eating a salad, imagine how it might taste if all there was to eat were the stems of the plant. Not very appealing, right?

Similarly, cattle that are offered corn stalk bales to eat in place of hay also often find that to be less palatable, said Phil-

lip Lancaster, beef cattle nutritionist for the Kansas State University Beef Cattle Institute.

Speaking on a recent Cattle Chat podcast, Lancaster said there is an increase of corn stalks being baled as a feed resource this year because of the shortage of hay and the decrease in pastures available for fall grazing due to a lack of moisture.

"Traditionally, grazing cattle in the late fall on harvested corn fields can be an option to extend the grazing season because cattle can eat the husks and leaves, which have a decent nutritional value," Lancaster said. "However, this year farmers are baling up the corn stalks after they've harvested the crop, which leaves only the stalks that are lignified and indigestible."

He said that when cattle are offered a corn stalk bale, they will consume the resource at a higher proportion of stalks than they would if they were just grazing the field.

"Producers feeding bales will have quite

a bit of wastage unless they grind them and add them to a mixed ration," Lancaster said.

For producers who need to use this as a feed resource, Lancaster said they need to supplement the cattle with protein.

He added: "For cows going into their third trimester this winter, their maintenance requirements are higher, so along with protein they will also need to be supplemented with energy as well."

Additionally, there is a potential health concern with bales that were made from a failed corn crop when fed to the cattle, Lancaster said.

"If nitrogen fertilizer was put on the crop in the spring and then it failed, the plant may still be holding that nitrogen," Lancaster said.

In that case, producers will need to test the bales for nitrates, according to Lancaster

Harvested forages, like hay, are a significant investment for cattle nutrition programs. The USDA currently estimates hay to cost \$209 per ton as of September, up 28.3% from 2011. These prices can vary widely depending on your location and the demand for forage.

No matter your overall cost of buying or baling hay, it is vital to get a grasp on the quality of your forages to know if your cattle are getting what they need. Before you start feeding forage, get it sampled and then create a balanced nutrition program.

"While it can seem like daunting task, understanding a few key values can make results analysis easier," says Chad Zehnder, Ph.D., cattle nutritionist with Purina Animal Nutrition.

Here are a few values to pay attention to when you get your cattle forage analysis back:

Dry matter (DM)

Dry matter is the simplest measurement to understand, and it is critical to know. Analysis results should always be viewed on a DM basis to remove moisture variation, especially when comparing values between forage for

"Dry matter can tell you quite a bit about how forages were harvested and how they may transform during storage," says Zehnder. "You'll also know your risk for mold and yeast growth."

Crude protein (CP)

Crude protein is a calculation of nitrogen content multiplied by 6.25. In most cases, CP can be used to balance protein in cattle feed rations.

"Stored cattle forage that has undergone significant heating is an exception. In this instance, the analysis should account for bound protein or unavailable protein, defined as ADF-CP, where ADF is acid detergent fiber. This value is used to report available crude protein (ACP), which can be used to balance cattle feed rations for protein," says Zehnder.

Energy content

Values used to interpret energy content are often the most confusing. The only real determination of a feed's energy value is through feeding trials. Therefore, a forage's energy is estimated based on measurable values in a feedstuff.

"ADF and neutral detergent fiber (NDF) are laboratory procedures used to predict forage digestibility and intake potential," says Zehnder. "Forage intake potential decreases as forages mature and NDF fractions increase. Likewise, cattle forage digestibility decreases as ADF fractions increase."

ADF content is the best laboratory measurement of forage energy value. ADF is used in prediction formulas to calculate energy value expressed as net energy gain (NEg) and net energy maintenance

(NEm). These values can be used to balance cattle feed rations for energy requirements.

"Relative feed value (RFV) is often reported and considers forage dry matter digestibility and dry matter intake," says Zehnder. "RFV is not used to balance diets but can be useful in comparing multiple lots of hay or to get a basic idea of forage quality."

Minerals

Consider macromineral content (Ca, P, K and Mg). Concentrations can vary, but knowing forage macromineral content can help estimate supplementation requirements; for example, if you've experienced winter tetany in the past and want to estimate magnesium supplementation needs.

While macromineral analysis can be helpful, micromineral analysis is more expensive. It's also difficult to get a representative sample of microminerals because forage content varies by field and

"That's why providing quality mineral yearround is important, so you ensure your cattle are receiving the nutrients they need," says Zehnder.

Final thoughts A good rule of thumb for balancing a cow ration is to aim for the following daily nutrition requirements for a 1,400-lb. cow during the middle of pregnancy on a dry matter basis:[2]

23 lb. of DM

0.44 Mcal/lb. of

NEm 0.19%calcium (Ca)

0.15% phosphorus

These values will need to be adjusted based on a variety of factors, including animal age, stage of production, current body condition, animal size, environment, etc.

"Well-interpreted results can be used to finetune cattle diets, meet cattle requirements and optimize performance. But don't interpret alone," says Zehnder.

Bring your feed supplier, nutritionist and agronomist to the table. A whole-farm approach can help determine the best way to use your cattle forage today and help you raise better forages in the future.

After the harvest: time to soil sample

Soil sampling isn't extra. It's the first step of any cropping season that's just as important as the fertilizer application itself. The "practice" of applying the same amount of fertilizer every year without knowledge of the background fertility or goals is a recipe for loss of yield, or more likely, wasting money due to over-application.

Sampling Timing:

• Grid sampling every eight to ten years. (five acre grids)

To monitor soil pH. Grid sampling saves most in lime application, being a large 'one-time' expense. Will also identify nutrient "hot-spots" and provide basis of management zone formation. Test for: pH, P, K, O.M., Zn. Optional B and Mg

• Management zone sampling every two or four years. (25 to 30 acre areas)

To monitor P, K, and Zn. Every 2 years for 'building-up' fertility goals. Every 4 years for 'maintaining' fertility goals. Test for pH, P and K. O.M. and Zn if unknown for corn.

• As needed: Profile Sampling (60 to 80 acres)

To monitor N, S, and Cl. Mostly useful after corn in drought years before planting wheat. Can be useful for accurate sulfur quantity. Sulfur can be higher in subsoil, below six inches. Test for N, S, and Cl. Possibly pH if curious.

Every farmer should have their own soil probe, but if not, borrow one from any Extension office. Shovels are for digging holes, not sampling soil. You wouldn't use an axe to cut your steak. Remember at least 10 probe cores per sample, spread throughout the sample area. I'd be happy to look at soil test results, K-State or otherwise, and give recommendations.






